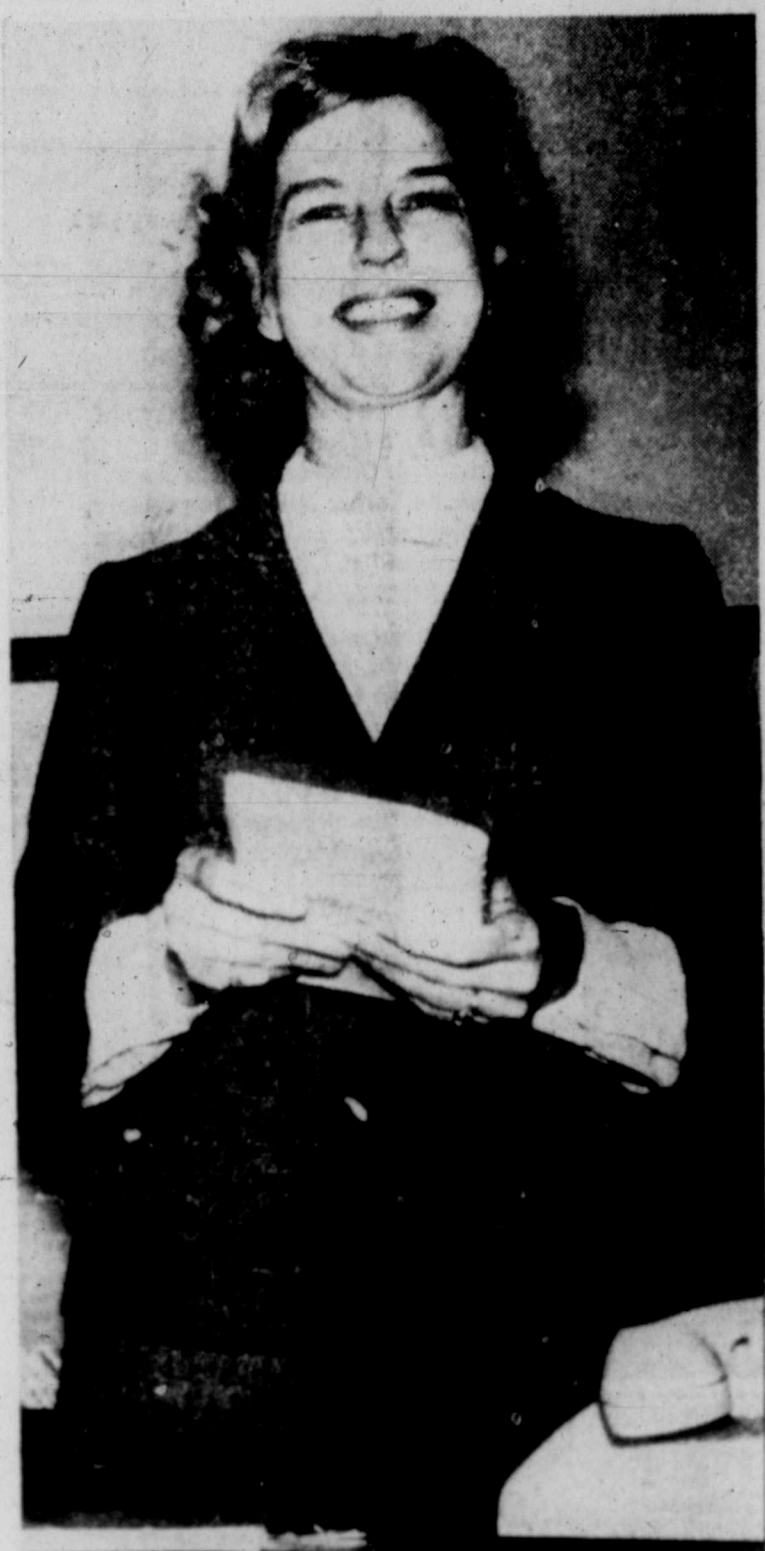

Try C-City First Slogan In Campaign

Merchant committee members of the local Chamber of Commerce are readying plans for a shop-at-home campaign. Slogan for the campaign, "When you shop try Colorado City first," was approved by the Chamber's board of directors Thursday evening.

Raymond Fuller is chairman of the Retail Merchants Committee. Luke Nichols heads a sub-committee for the campaign and other committees will be named next week.

First step of the shop-at-home campaign will be put at advantageous spots in the downtown area and other points.

Chamber of Commerce merchants committee also expects to buy radio spot announcements and newspaper advertising space to familiarize Colorado City citizens with the slogan and with the idea of patronizing hometown stores first.

The campaign is planned as a growing reminder to C-Citizens to satisfy shopping needs by spending dollars in the town which they live and work.

Light Bulbs To Help Blind

Steaks are at stake for "Saints and Sinners" in the Lions Club house-to-house light bulb sale for Lion charities next Thursday starting at 5:30 p.m.

Lions intend, said John Harper, money-raising chairman, to "Knock on every door" that day. In a sales contest involving two teams.

"The Saints" team is captained by Rev. Darris Egger, First Methodist Church pastor. Heading "The Sinners" as captain is Dr. Ralph Graham, pastor of First Christian Church.

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SECOND-DAY COUNT

Student Enrollment Totals 1,741 In City

Second-day count of Colorado Public School pupils put total enrollment at 1,741—exactly 52 less than had enrolled on the second day of the 63 school term.

Primary building's principal Brooks Teague reported an enrollment of 421 with 145 pupils in the first grade, 134 in second, 142 in third grade. Of the 145 first-graders, 15 are Negro children starting the step-by-step integration program for Colorado City schools.

Hutchinson School, with Weldon Moore as principal, enrolled a total of 414 pupils with 143 fourth-grade pupils, 147 fifth and 117 sixth. Special education class has 7 enrollees.

Junior High's L. B. Gibson, principal, counted 412 students. Seventh grade has 155, eighth has 134 and ninth grade, 123.

Colorado High School's second-day total was 310. In tenth grade are 104, in eleventh, 106, and in twelfth grade, 107 students.

Wallace School total is 167 pupils in grades two through twelve. Figures by classes are 13 for second, 16 for

third, 21 for fourth, 13 for fifth, 18 for sixth, 13 for seventh. Only 9 pupils are in Wallace eighth grade class, 15 in ninth grade, 14 in tenth, 13 in eleventh and 8 in the senior class or twelfth grade. Special education class has 14 pupils.

Second-day counts are usually not indicative of correct total enrollment figures for the year, said Frank W. Wilson, superintendent.

Wolves Go Down In Season Opener

Colorado City's Wolves went down to the strong Phillips Blackhawks by a score of 35 to 0 in a game played at Phillips Friday night.

Scoring every quarter and twice in the third, the Blackhawks made a total of 340 yards rushing and connected for 82 yards via passes. Wolves rushed for 120 yards on the ground and took to the air for another 108 yards.

"It was a real good game," said Truman Nix, head coach Saturday morning. "Offensively our line looked mighty good and we made good with our quick dive plays. Defensively we've got a lot of work to do but at least now we know what to do," the coach said. The Phillips game was first for the Wolf season.

"Actually," Nix added, "we were pleased as punch with our boys and came away hardly feeling we had lost the game."

"Those Phillips boys are so big and out-looked us so much we looked like a Junior High School team lined up against them. They had the weight, the experience, the speed. What we had was a lot of try-hard," he said.

David McKay, quarterback, called "a wonderful game," Coach Nix said. Percy Millsap, half, starred at the corner back position and Corky McAdams intercepted a Blackhawk pass in the third to help keep down the score for Phillips.

City's scoring chances most. A heavy downpour fourth quarter did not help things—and washed away Wolf statistics being kept by Gwan Strange, to boot.

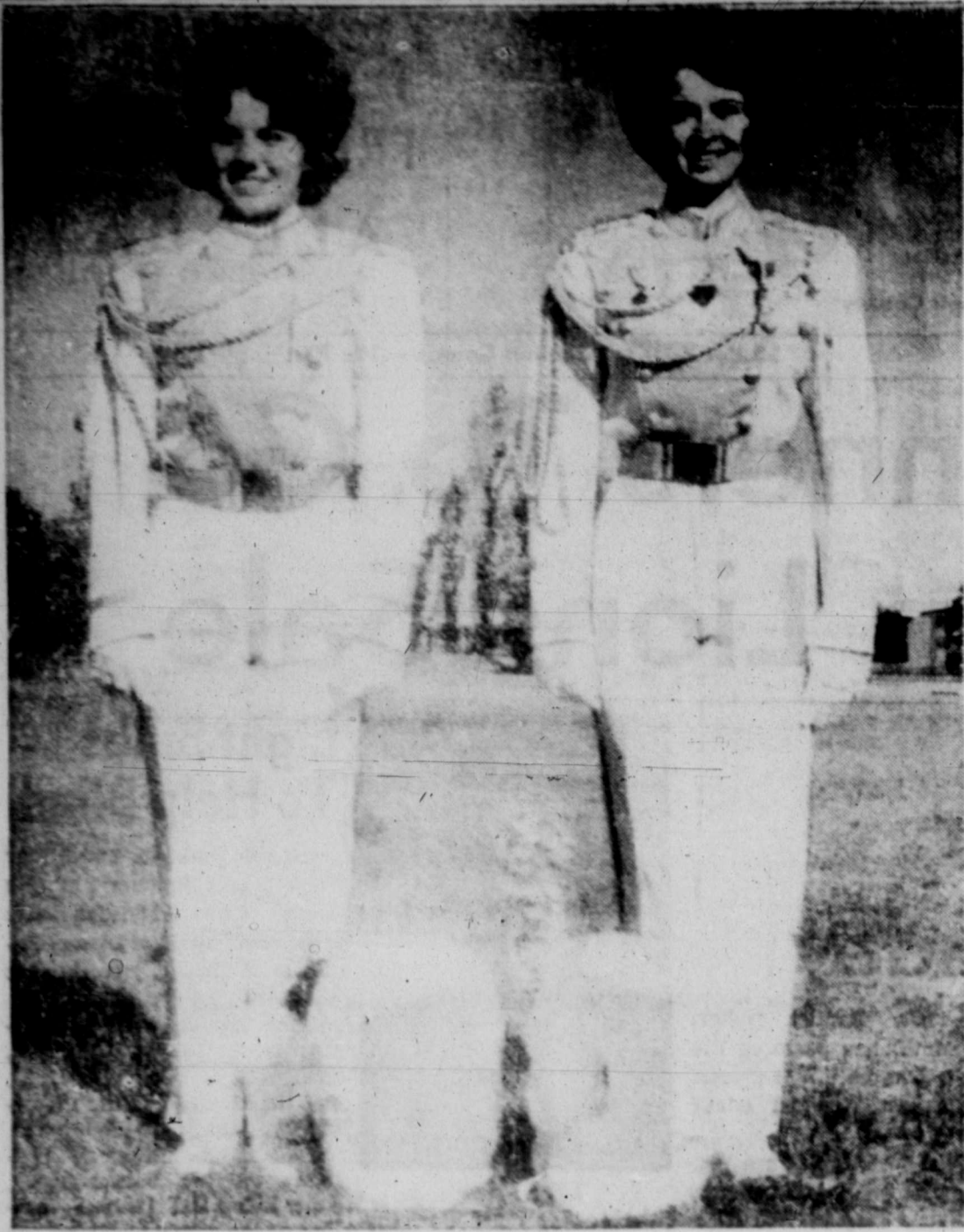
