Elsewhere in this issue is a news story telling about a proposed ordinance for the City of Friona that will make it impossible for that city's fire department to respond to fires beyond one-half mile of the corporate city limits without adequate compensation to cover the expenses involved. Friona at this time deems \$100 per call to be the "adequate compensation".

We agree with the Friona City Dads that the county must provide a realistic compensation for the use of equipment in fighting rural fires. We are not sure that a figure of \$100 is realistic on Friona's part.

This matter of incorporated communities within a county providing the fire protection for the entire county is one that is a current problem in other counties besides Parmer. To date we have not come across a workable solution by any county to the problems involved. It has been our general observation that this problem has been generated largely by inertia and procrastination within the involved county courts. Parmer is no exception.

This is not a new bone of contention in Parmer County and the local Commissioners Court has recognized it by providing a paltry \$750 per annum to each fire department in the county. In relation to the expenses of fire truck procurement, fire hall, building and maintenance and acquisition of auxiliary fire department equipment, \$750 per year is almost an insult.

On the other hand, to require a \$100 fee each time the local department responds to a call outside the city limits seems to us to be a poor solution. There could be many obvious abuses of such an arrangement. Particularly if a department needed to raise some extra money for a special purpose.

To compute the cost of a fire call is a risky chore. After all, a city purchases a fire truck to protect its property and if it is never used it is still a good investment. The existence of an organized and effective fire department saves each community thousands and thousands of dollars in insurance premiums that must be reckoned with in trying to evaluate fire department costs. A City is not going to be without a fire department because it is far too costly in terms of insurance premiums and property losses. So to say that it costs \$100 to respond to a rural call for assistance seems to us to be very questionable.

Yet, Commissioners Courts must be realistic in sharing the burden of fire protection in the county. City folks pay county taxes as well as rural residents so the enlightened interests of both sides must be evaluated in this type of problem.

With the Friona ordinance due to take effect January 1, 1974, our local commissioners need to get busy with the problem. Some kind of solution might be found by a county-wide meeting of the Friona, Bovina and Farwell city and fire department representatives. But whatever the case, dilly dallying and a parsimonious purse approach will not get the job done.

Well so far, October has adequately substantiated Wes Izzard's optimism concerning our fall weather. It has been great for the golden harvest and yet has held a promise of good pasture prospects for the winter months. If the weather holds up for the next several weeks, we will reap a tide of "golden" grain beyond our fondest expectations.

We in this area ought to look forward to Thanksgiving as the time to truly thank the Lord for His favors unto us. A day of prayer and thanksgiving would not be amiss for all Parmer County residents.

State Surveys New Texico City Park Site

A meeting last Saturday morning, Oct. 13, with David King, Director of the State Planning Office, gave Texico city fathers hope that a new city park will soon be more than a dream.

According to Mayor Manford Turnbough, the park has been in the planning stage for more than six years.

The plans are for the federal government to put up \$6,000, the state \$3,000 and the city \$3,000. The city's part can be included in donated labor, equipment or land. The site of the proposed park is directly south of the Texico School system.

Turnbough went to Santa Fe Sept. 26 for a hearing with the State Recreation Committee, at which time they tentatively approved the grant. He was told however that the land would have to be appraised by three different appraisers and the report sent back to the state for further approval.

The proposed park will involve 15 lots or two full blocks less four lots. Part of this area is earmarked for a small lake or duck pond, according to Bill Christian, city commissioner.

Christian also remarked that

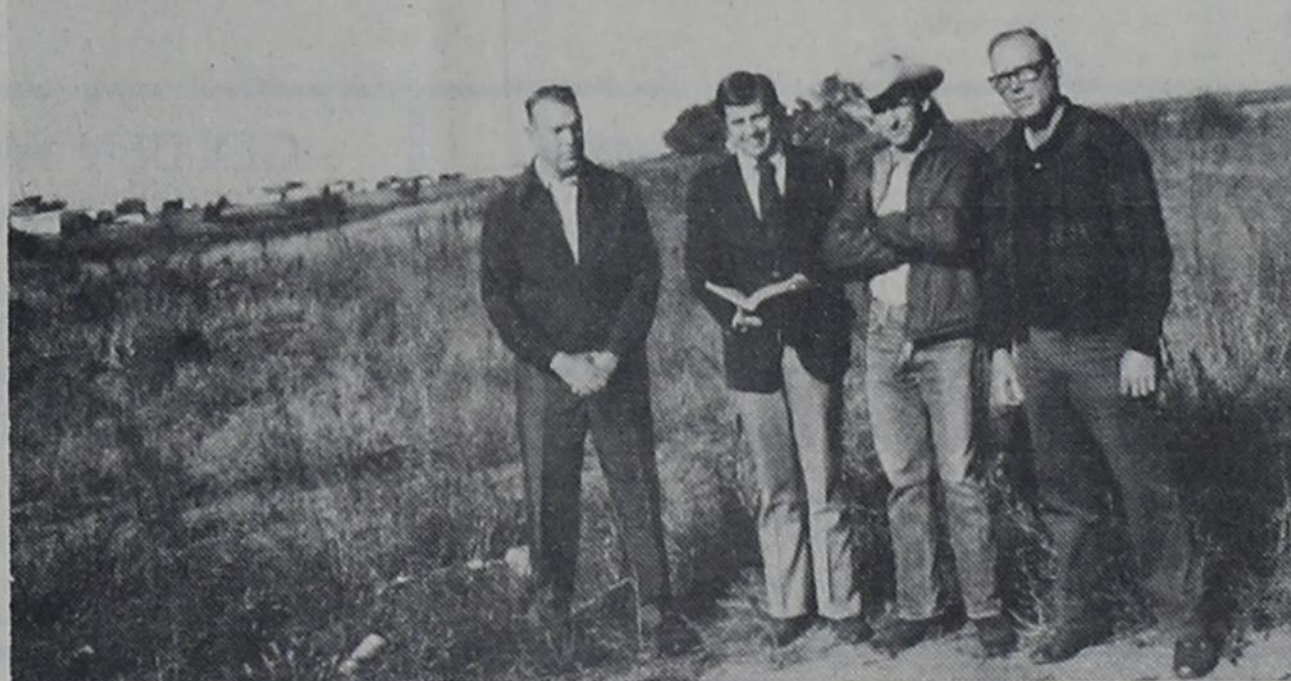

Parmer County Ranks In Top Ten In Texas

Parmer County is in the top ten counties in Texas agricultural production for 1972, according to recently published statistics, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

Parmer County farmers placed seventh in cash receipts of \$27,030,000 for crops and third in total crops and livestock with \$81,368,000. Including government payments, Parmer ranked third in the state. Farmers and ranchers received a total of \$95,317,000. Cash receipts from livestock

also placed Parmer as the third highest in the state with \$81,368,000.

The figures have just been published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, a joint effort of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the USDA, Commissioner said.

"Even with freezes, rains, and a fluctuating market, Parmer County should enjoy another productive year in 1973. Cash receipts for the first seven months of 1973 show increases over last year," Commissioner White said.

Friona To Cease Rural Fire Calls

Parmer County residents stand to lose 60 percent of their fire protection at 12:01 a.m. January 1, 1974, following the next two readings of Friona City Ordinance No. 481.

During the Oct. 15 meeting of Friona City Council, the proposed ordinance was read and it was explained that Friona Volunteer Fire Department can no longer make runs outside the Friona City limits without adequate compensation to cover expenses incurred.

Friona Mayor R.L. Fleming reported to the council members that he, Fire Chief Ralph Shirley and City Manager A.L. Outland had met with Parmer County Commissioners and proposed that the county pay \$100 for each fire call made outside the city limits.

It was noted that the county commissioners told the trio

that although adequate funds were available to pay the \$100 for fire calls, the commission was against such payment. The request was taken under advisement and the following day, the mayor said he was informed the proposal had been tabled, so the new ordinance was drawn up.

Fire Chief Shirley said that in the past the policy had been to answer any and all fire calls, but with the adoption of the new ordinance, the fire department will be restricted to the Friona corporate limits and within a radius of one-half mile to the city limits.

It was also reported by the fire chief that at least 60 percent and usually 70 percent of the fire calls received by the Friona Fire Department are calls for the rural area.

In the past, the Parmer County Commissioners Court has paid \$750 per year to Friona Volunteer Fire Department as a payment for rural firefighting. The fire chief said this is only 16.4 percent of the actual expense of the department, with the city taxpayer providing the balance of the expenses.

With the new ordinance, provided it is approved following the next two readings, it will be a violation of the law for the fire department to leave the one-half mile radius surrounding Friona unless the department is requested to help within the corporate limits of an incorporated town or city.

In effect, this will leave hundreds of homes in Parmer County without protection, as well as rural businesses, including cotton gins, elevators, grocery stores, feed lots and other businesses unprotected in case of fire.

According to a spokesman, unless the Parmer County Commissioners will agree to the \$100 reimbursement for rural fire calls, the new ordinance will take effect on schedule on January 1, 1974.

Fire Chief Ralph Shirley has prepared a 13-year complete break-down of activities of Friona Volunteer Fire Department in relation to city and rural calls. It follows:

Of the \$54,007.10, Parmer County has paid a total of \$9,750 during the past 13 years with the balance being paid by Friona City residents. Also paid by Friona city residents during the same period of time is a total of \$31,363.77 for improvements, excluding the \$50,000 bond issue approved to build the new fire department. Friona City Council and Friona Volunteer Fire Department have urged county rural residents to contact your county commissioner or commissioner's court immediately in order to have continued fire protection in the county.

Wolverines To Clash With Jal Panthers

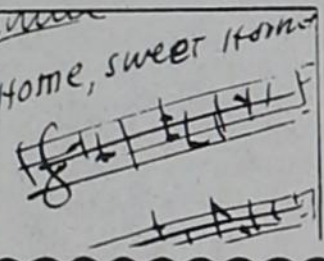

Wolverines 'Ride Down' Moriarty Pintos, 18-7

Texico Wolverines demonstrated great team work last Friday night when the offensive and defensive squads pulled together to defeat the Moriarty Pintos, 18-7.

The Wolves defense held the Pintos in their own territory throughout most of the second half and the Green and White offense was driving very effectively as they scored twice in the last four minutes of play.

The game started with the Pintos kicking off to the Wolverines who were a bit stiff and gained no yardage in three plays and were forced to punt. The Pintos started on the 35-yard-line and on the first play quarterback Frank Ortiz tried a pass but it was broken up by the Wolverines safeties. Moriarty soon lost the ball when they fumbled and the Wolverines recovered on the 34-yard-line.

Wolverine running back Tommy Galvan took the handoff from quarterback Curtis Lindley and picked up a first down on the Pintos' 48-yard-line. The drive was kept alive with Lindley keeping to add another first down for the Wolves on the Pinto 36. Two plays later, Lindley added more yards to the drive when he ran the ball to the opponents' 15-yard-line. The next play was a happy moment for the Wolverines when halfback Randy Harrison ran the final 15 yards to make the first touchdown of the night. The Wolverines extra

point attempt did not come through and the score was Texico 6, Moriarty 0.

After the Wolverine kickoff, the Pintos started a drive of their own from the 35-yard-line. Halfback Bobby Salvo broke to the Wolverine 30-yard-line and was finally brought down by Dwayne Kelley. On the next play, Ruben Trujillo gained good yardage to the Wolverine 16-yard-line before being dumped by Lindley. Ortiz was soon across the goal line to tie the score. The Pinto PAT was good and they took the lead 7-6.

After the kickoff the Wolverines looked like they were going to score again but a Wolverine fumbled the ball and Moriarty was there to recover.

In second quarter action, the Pintos tried hard to extend their lead by getting a drive going but Wolverines Roger Pace and Raymond Cantu kept them back and forced the Pintos to punt. During the rest of the second quarter, neither team seemed to be able to move the ball for another score and the half ended with the Pintos in the lead 7-6.

The Wolverines kicked off to the Pintos in the second half but soon got the ball back when the Pinto offense was forced to punt. In one of the offensive plays Harrison ran for 40 yards but was called back on a clipping penalty. After this the Wolves punted the ball. Moriarty also had some good runs but were

called back for illegal procedure.

The Wolverines really got tough against Moriarty during the fourth quarter. The Wolves had the ball on their own 31-yard-line when Lindley ran all the way to the Pinto 44. On the next play, Harrison picked up 11 yards and another first down. Lindley then ran the ball into the endzone for Texico's second TD. With 3:24 remaining in the game the scoreboard read Texico 12, Moriarty 7. Texico's extra point attempt was unsuccessful. After the score, the Wolverine defense got tougher to keep the Pinto offense from scoring.

Pinto quarterback Ortiz tried a pass to end Mike Ortiz but linebacker Craig Chumley hit him before the pass was thrown. This placed Moriarty in a fourth and nine situation but the kicker attempted a pass to one of the ends. Safety Albert Galvan was there to break up this big Pinto play. The Wolverine offense was determined to get another TD before the night was over and Harrison ran to the Pinto 17-yard-line. Quarterback Lindley ran a keeper and made it to the five before being stopped. With 35 seconds left in the game, Lindley was again across the goal line to make the score 18-7. Texico again failed on the extra point attempt.

After the Wolverine kickoff with six seconds left in the game, Pinto quarterback Ortiz

tried a long bomb pass but Sammy West was there to intercept and end the game. Final score was Texico 18, Moriarty 7.

In commenting on the game, Head Coach Bucky Walters said, "The boys did an outstanding job both defensively and offensively. The Pintos were pretty tough but the defense just kept them back especially after the Pintos made their first touchdown."

Walters added, "Our offense could not be stopped by the Pinto defense. We stopped our own drives by penalties or fumbles alot of the time."

The backs did some great running and blocking for each other and also the offensive line did their blocking assignments very well, according to the coach.

"Our defensive safeties did an outstanding job against the pass," stated the coach, who added, "Moriarty usually passes a great deal, but the safeties kept the game on the ground through most of the night."

Coach Walters also added that Randy Harrison had over 150 yards rushing against the Pintos.

Next game for the Wolverines will be at Jal where they will face the AA Jal Panthers tonight. (Friday). Kickoff time will be at 8:30 p.m. (CDT).

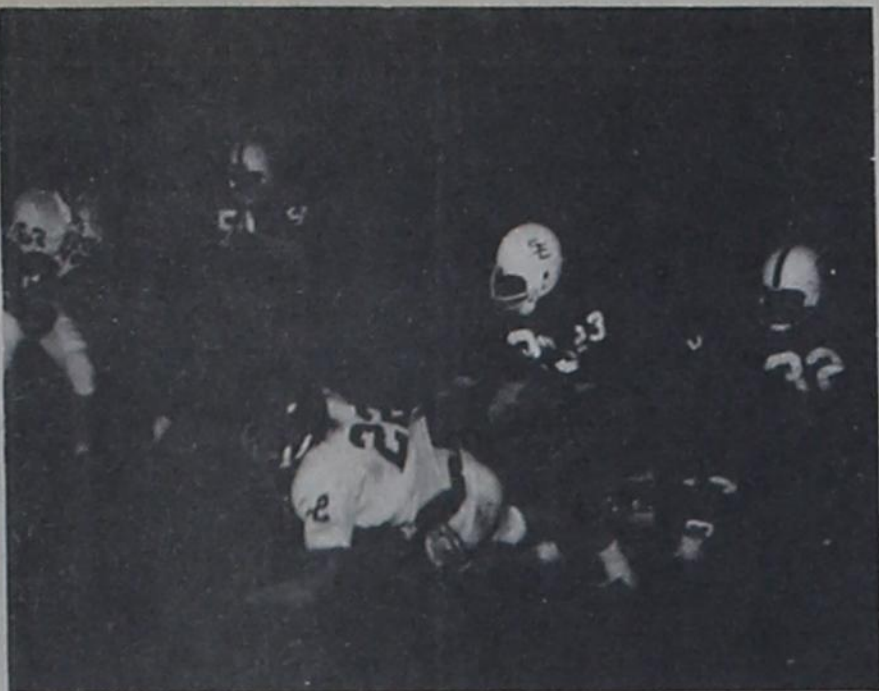

First District Win - -

Farwell Steers DeClaw S-E Wolverines, 33-19

The Mighty Steers from Farwell, Texas, just couldn't be stopped as they clobbered the Springlake-Earth Wolverines last Friday night in a thrilling ballgame at Steer Stadium. The Blue and White and their fans were keyed up and ready to play from the start. The night was great for football and also for a victory. One of the highlights of the game was when Winfred Long took the second half Wolverine kickoff two yards in the endzone and ran 104 yards for a Steer touchdown. The defense and offense both played exceptionally well throughout the game.

Farwell kicked off to Springlake to get the game underway. The Wolverines were able to get only two first downs and were forced to give up the ball. The Steers drove down to the Springlake 16-yard line only to have a pass intercepted by a Wolverine. The Wolverines completed only two plays when they fumbled and the Steers again took possession on the S-E 22-yard line. Unable to get a first down, Farwell attempted a field goal but it failed.

S-E fumbled on their first play and the Steers were ready to get those points. Three plays later, Carl Kirkland ran right through the middle for 14 yards and a Steer touchdown. The kick for an extra point was good and Farwell appeared on the scoreboard with 7 points with 40 seconds remaining in the first quarter.

Springlake was forced to give the ball up on a fourth down situation, but it seemed the Steers didn't want it either. Farwell couldn't make a first down, so S-E took the ball back. The Wolverines weren't satisfied with it, so they

fumbled. The Steers again gave the football back to the Wolverines with a fumble and by this time the ball was in S-E territory. Springlake decided to hang on to it and very soon a Wolverine took the ball in 2 yards for a Wolverine TD. Their kick for an extra point was also successful and the score was tied 7-7 with 7:04 left in the first half.

The Steers were forced to punt on a fourth down situation. Three plays after Springlake took possession of the ball, Quarterback Hal Woods ran 83 yards for a Springlake touchdown. Their try for an extra point failed and S-E pulled out in front 13-7 with 4:09 remaining in the second quarter.

Then it happened! The Steers came onto the field and awaited the Wolverine kickoff to start the second half. Winfred Long tried for the ball on the 7-yard line but couldn't control it. The ball bounced back into the endzone and Long started from there. He ran, and ran and ran! Tremendous blocking was provided as Long ran 104 yards for a Steer TD. Springlake Wolverines apparently were so shook up by the episode that they fumbled on their first play after the kickoff. After a pick-up of 8 yards by the Steers, Carl Kirkland took the ball for 5 yards and another TD for Farwell. The PAT kick was good and Farwell moved farther in front 21-13. The Steers were on fire with 10:20 remaining in the third period.

Following the Steer kickoff, the Wolverines were soon forced to punt. The Steers started another drive for that goal line. Mike Woods ran in from 2 yards out for the touchdown but the extra point kick failed. Farwell advanced its scoreboard reading to 27 with 3:28 remaining in the third quarter.

Carl Kirkland took the ball on the S-E kickoff and ran 46 yards to put us in TD territory once again. Two plays later, Mike Woods ran 13 yards in for another Steer TD. The kick for an extra point failed and the score increased on Farwell's side to 33 and the Springlake-Earth score stood 19. 7:46 remained in the ballgame.

While the Wolverines were trying to pass after the Steer kickoff, Jesse Cantu intercepted an S-E pass and ran for 12 yards, stopping the Wolverine drive, and the final buzzer sounded with a Farwell Win, 33 to 19.

The Mighty Farwell Steer Band provided an excellent halftime show. The special feature was the FHS twirlers twirling flaming batons as the band played "Son of a Preacher Man." The Band is preparing for the U.I.L. Marching Contest in Lubbock.

"The victory was a long time coming. We feel like we had to crawl before we could walk -- improve before we could com-

pete. The Steers displayed the best effort they have had in quite a while," stated Head Coach Toby Booth regarding Friday's victory over the Springlake-Earth Wolverines. The coach continued, "It remains to be seen if we keep doing it. We have to keep improving."

Offensively, the coach stated that the Steers moved the ball better than ever. "We've moved it good for three weeks, just couldn't score enough. With 35 first downs and nine penetrations we should have scored more but we really can't gripe," he stated. "Bill Johnson really looked quicker than he has looked all year," Booth added.

All Steer backs looked good, according to Booth, with Mike Woods and Carl Kirkland gaining 450 yards or more together. "Winfred Long's kickoff return of 104 yards was the first scoring kickoff return of the Steers since I've been coaching," Booth commented.

"On defense we hit better and were able to crack a few people. A good job defensively," commended Booth, who cited defensive players Jesse Cantu, Mark Haseloff, Larry Sutton and Kevin Hargrove for a job "well done" and said all defensive players displayed good ball. He stated that Hargrove should be commended both defensively and offensively for his efforts.

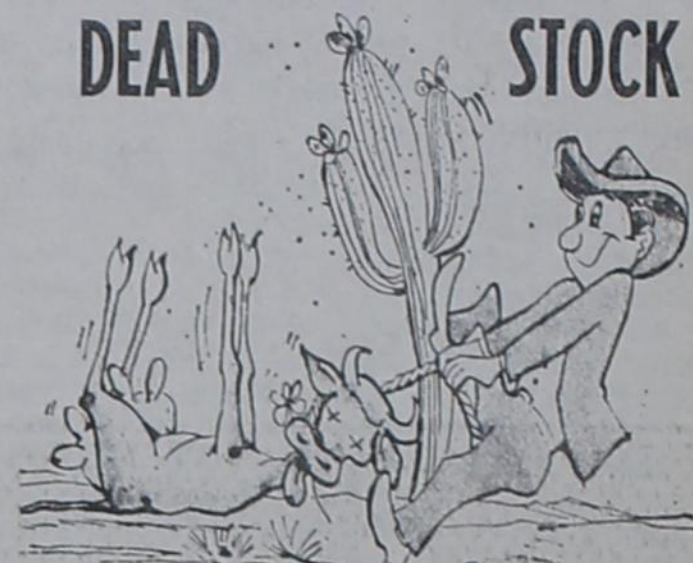
Williams Gives Lubbock Seminar

State Accreditation Team To Visit Farwell Schools

On Monday, Oct. 29, an accreditation team from Texas Education Agency will visit the Farwell Schools, according to W.M. Roberts, superintendent.

It is the responsibility of the State Department of Education for the accreditation of schools. Members of the staff of the Texas Education Agency visit as many school districts as possible each year. The Farwell School District has been selected as one of those to be visited this year.

The accreditation visit will be based primarily on the criteria outlined in Bulletin 560, Principles and Standards for Accrediting Elementary and Secondary Schools. All phases of the school program are involved in the evaluation. Classes representative of each area and level of instruction will be visited.

Other aspects of the school program are evaluated by examining physical facilities such as the library, classrooms and science laboratories, the gymnasium and school building facilities in general.

Following each accreditation visit, a written report is prepared by members of the visiting team with a recommendation on the accredited status of the school. Because of the large number of schools visited, accreditation reports

must be brief. They are not intended to cover all the good and bad aspects of a school's operation, but emphasize those areas in which standards may not be fully met.

A copy of the report is mailed first to the superintendent of the school visited, along with a request that he make any suggestions or comments that he feels are needed to present a fair and correct evaluation of his school. Later the report, with revision if necessary, is sent to the school board president.

It is also presented to the State Commission on School Accreditation at its summer

meeting for review and recommendations. The report then goes to the Commissioner of Education and finally to the State Board of Education for final action during the September meeting.

The last such accreditation visit to the Farwell Schools was made in 1957. Recommendations made by this visiting team were carried out during the next two or three years until requirements were satisfied.

Both the Farwell Schools and the Friona Schools will be visited by this team. They will be in Farwell Oct. 29 and in Friona later in the week.

Living Plants Add To Decor Of Home

Living plants often breathe "house life" into home life. They are that "something lacking" in the otherwise well-furnished home, according to Patricia A. Bradshaw, housing and home furnishings specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Plants add an immediate sense of intimacy and individuality to even carefully furnished rooms that lack warmth and personality," the specialist observed. In selecting plants, decor factors to consider include placement, size and container style, she said. Placement of plants can soften sharp lines or fill "vacancies" in a room. A floor plant set in a corner will soften the sharp line where two walls meet - if it's large enough and tall enough to do the job. Perhaps a stand will lift it to a suitable height.

The cocktail table requires a plant kept in scale with the table and other accessories on it, and the plant on a side table just below a picture on the wall shouldn't be so tall it hides the picture. Placing the plant on a base or pedestal adds to its importance, as well as protecting delicate furniture finishes," the specialist noted. "It's a 'no-no' to set a potted plant directly on a piece of furniture."

Turning to containers, she cited simple design as the keynote to beauty.

"Its container shouldn't compete with the plant for interest. Avoid ornate or elaborate containers except for a very special effect. Container material, design and color should harmonize with furnishings background."

Miss Bradshaw advised home decorators to consult the florist or nurseryman for proper care of plants, adding, "Most green foliage plants need plenty of light. They require proper watering techniques and well-drained soil."

PIZZA

CRUST

2 c. flour
1 t. baking powder
1 t. salt

Sift these ingredients.

ADD:
2 1/2 c. milk
1 1/2 c. cooking oil

Roll out as for pie crust, then place in pizza pan. Brown 1 lb. hamburger or sausage (which-ever you prefer). Sprinkle on crust.

SAUCE

1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce
1/2 t. oregano
1/2 t. salt
1/4 t. pepper
3/4 c. shredded cheese, more if desired.

Pour mixed ingredients over meat, then sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 425 degrees for 15 or 20 minutes or until crust is golden brown.

BROCCOLI CASSEROLE

1/2 stick oleo
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 stick garlic cheese
2 pkg. frozen broccoli (one pkg. spears and one pkg. chopped)
1/2 medium onion, chopped
Buttered bread crumbs
1/4 c. slivered almonds

Cook broccoli as directed. Melt butter, soup and cheese together, add onion. Add to drained broccoli in casserole dish. Top mixture with buttered bread crumbs and slivered almonds. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes.

COBBLER

2 c. flour
2 1/2 c. shortening
2 t. salt
1 T. vinegar
Enough water to form dough.

Roll out one-half the dough and put in pan, melt one stick of butter, put some over dough. Then put fruit (peaches, cherries, etc.) and one cup sugar on dough. Add enough water to cover fruit.

Roll out other half of dough, put on top of the fruit mixture. Add rest of melted butter. Put one cup of sugar on top of this. Cook at 350 degrees until golden brown.

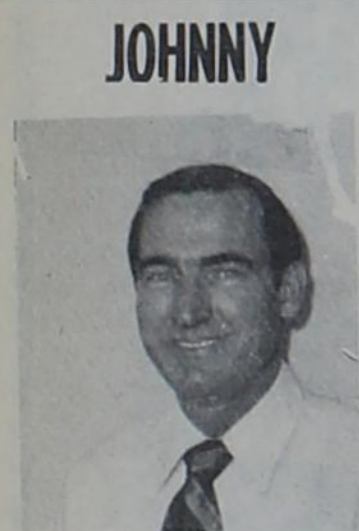

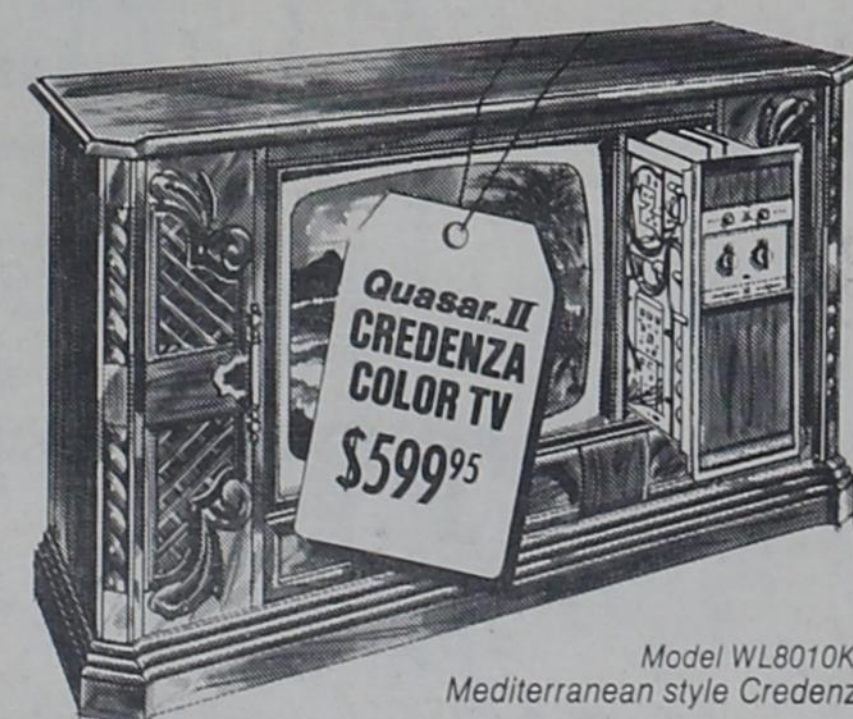

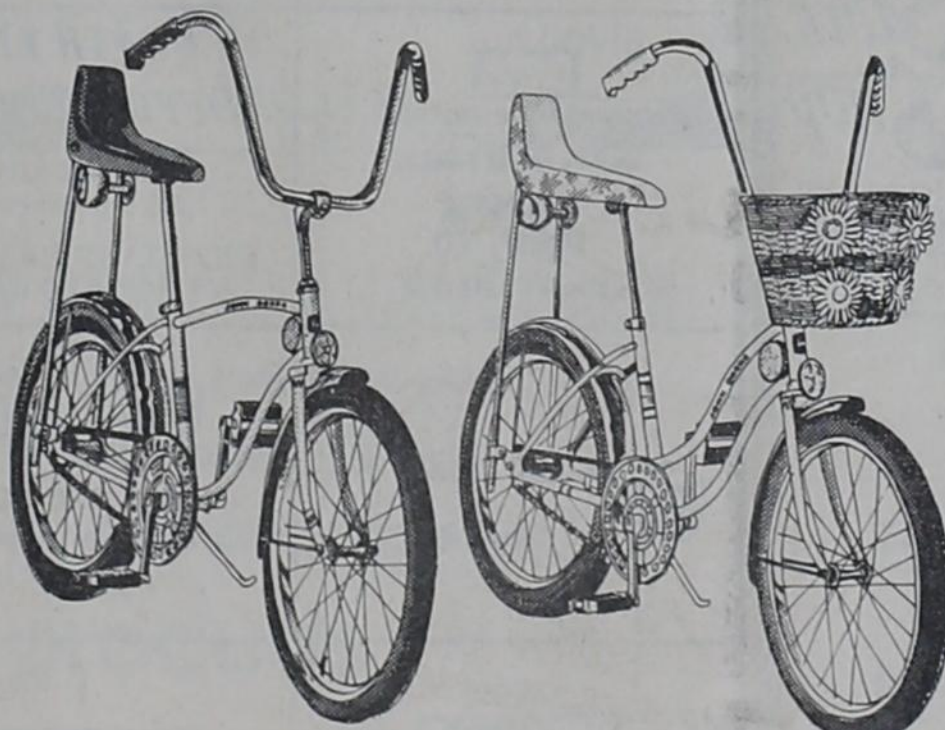

AN ORDINANCE PRECLUDING USE OF CITY OWNED AND MAINTAINED EQUIPMENT AND CITY PURCHASED SUPPLIES FOR FIRE FIGHTING OUTSIDE THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS AND DECLINATION TO ACCEPT PROFFERED PAYMENT OF SEVEN HUNDRED FIFTY DOLLARS (\$750.00) ANNUALLY FROM THE COMMISSIONERS COURT AS PAYMENT FOR SUCH.

WHEREAS, The City of Friona, Texas, at City expense, maintains a fire department consisting of equipment, supplies, clothing and a fire station manned by volunteer firemen for the primary purpose of fire protection for residents within the corporate limits of the City of Friona, Texas;

WHEREAS, all of such is paid with taxes collected from the residents within the corporate limits of the City of

Friona, Texas;
WHEREAS, it has been the policy in the past to answer any and all fire calls within the boundaries of Parmer County, Texas, and the Commissioner's Court of the County of Parmer, Texas has, for some years, paid the sum of \$750.00 per annum to the City of Friona, Texas, to defray some of the costs of fire protection furnished outside the corporate limits of Friona, Texas by such fire department;

WHEREAS, for some years past, there have been more fire calls handled by such fire department outside the corporate limits of the City of Friona, Texas, than within same;

WHEREAS, the City Council has made a study and determined that in order to continue to furnish this amount of fire protection outside the corporate limits of the City of Friona, Texas, it will be necessary that the Commissioner's Court of the County of Parmer, Texas, arrange to pay the county's fair share of such costs;

WHEREAS, a request was made to the Commissioner's Court of the County of Parmer, Texas, to increase the amount of annual payment to be made to the City of Friona, Texas, to an amount commensurate with the use being made of the Friona Fire Department outside of the corporate limits of Friona, Texas, and such Commissioner's Court has to date taken no action on such request;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS:

Section 1. That effective January 1, 1974, at 12:01 A.M. and from thenceforward, the volunteer fire department of the City of Friona, Texas, will answer fire calls only within the corporate limits of the City of Friona, Texas, and within a one-half (1/2) mile radius thereof; except that such fire department may, in the discretion of the Fire Chief or acting fire chief thereof, cooperate to the extent requested and in the manner requested by any other fire department situated in neighboring cities to Friona, Texas, which cities shall include, but be not limited to: Dimmitt, Farwell, Bovina, Muleshoe, and Hereford, Texas.

Section 2. That effective January 1, 1974, at 12:01 A.M. and from thenceforward, the City of Friona, Texas will no longer accept the payment of SEVEN HUNDRED FIFTY DOLLARS (\$750.00) annually from the County Commissioner's Court of Parmer County, Texas, for the furnishing of fire protection within Parmer County, Texas, outside the corporate limits of

THE APOSTLE OF GRACE

The conversion of Saul of Tarsus was an amazing event. Saul loathed the very name of Christ. He blasphemed Him and caused others to be tortured so as to compel them to blaspheme that holy name. He led his nation and the world in rebellion against the resurrected Christ -- the world which had already disowned and crucified the lowly Jesus.

But as Saul went to Damascus, still "breathing out threatenings and slaughter against the disciples of the Lord," (Acts 9:1) God did a wonderful thing. Rather than crush the leader of the world's rebellion, He saved him. Christ broke through the heavens, as it were, to speak words of love and pity to His greatest enemy on earth. As a result Saul's rebellious spirit was broken and in one moment the pitiless persecutor became the docile, indeed the devoted follower of Christ.

More than that. Saul of Tarsus, the persecutor, became Paul the Apostle. To him the glorified Lord committed "the dispensation of the grace of God" (Eph. 3:2) and "the gospel of the

grace of God" (Acts 20:24). Now, he went everywhere proclaiming grace, telling men how God loved them, how Christ had come into the world and gone to Calvary to pay for man's sins so that believing sinners might be saved.

The gospel of the grace of God, found in Paul's epistles, does not blame anyone for the death of Christ. Rather it presents the cross as good news. It declares that "we have redemption through His blood, THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS ACCORDING TO THE RICHES OF HIS GRACE" (Eph. 1:7). It says that "God hath concluded all in unbelief THAT HE MIGHT HAVE MERCY UPON ALL" (Rom. 11:32) and that "WHERE SIN ABOUNDED, GRACE DID MUCH MORE ABOUND" (Rom. 5:21).

How wonderful! By grace and through Christ's all-sufficient work of redemption, the vilest sinner may believe and rejoice in the consciousness of sins forgiven. As Paul said to the trembling jailor at Philippi: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

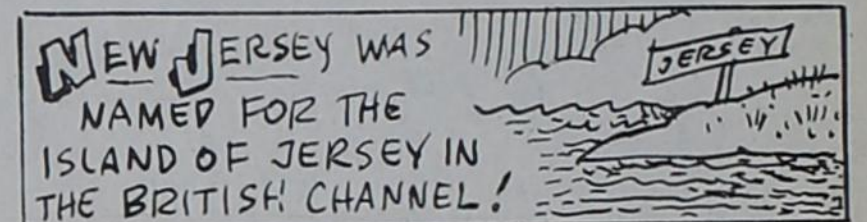

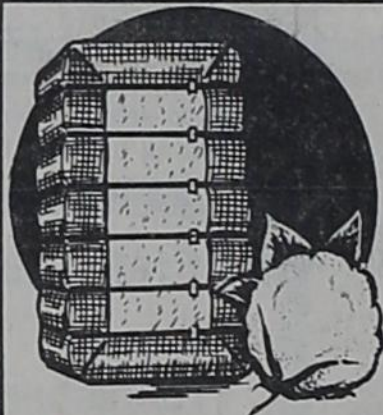
