## WICHITA FALLS CAN SECURE LOCATION OF WESLEY COLLEGE

That Wichita Falls has an opportunity to secure the Wesley College, a prominent Methodist school located at Terrell, Texas, is contained in information conveyed to Secretary Day of the Chamber of Commerce in a telegram received this morning from one of the prominent officials of that church. The telegram recited the fact that the college was to be moved from Terrell and that it might be possible for this city to secure the school upon the proper showing being made by the commercial organization of this place. The telegram stated further that the last session was the most profitable one in the history of the college and that removal was made necessary as a result of the growth of the school, which had reached that importance where the present location was inadequate.

It is understood that Greenville, McKinney and Gainesville will make a fight for the location and it is possible that other towns will strive to secure the school, the reputation of which is sufficient to render it an inviting proposition to any city in the state. That Wichita Falls will have an advantage over the points mentioned has been suggested, in view of the permanent location of the Lake shore Assembly at this place, and the

evident purpose of the two conferences of the church to make this city, in a measure, the headquarters for the church in this part of the state. The addition of a school like Wesley College would naturally add to the interest in other features of the church work at this place, and the Assembly with its attendant features and the development incident thereto would be of value to the school as well. The proposition is one that has made a very favorable impression on those to whom it has been presented and it is quite likely that an active movement will be started at once looking to the securing of the institution for Wichita Falls. In this connection it is expected that the matter will be taken up at the next meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce and it is thought that members of the church at this place will join heartily in the effort to influence the removal of the college to this city.

Wesley College, it is understood is under the direct control of the M. E. Church, South, and while not one of the largest, is one of the best schools of the kind in the entire state. It has been established for a number of years, has passed the experimental stage and would be a valuable acquisition for Wichita Falls or any other city in the state for that matter.

## THOUSAND TURKISH SOLDIERS IS SLAIN BY ARAB REBELS

By Associated Press. Hodeidah, Arabia, June 23.—One thousand Turkish soldiers were killed by Arabian rebels today near Ghoozan, a town on the Red Sea, north of here. The rebels surprised the Turkish column. Mahomed Ali Pasha, the Turkish commander is missing.

The fighting was so desperate and at such close quarters that the five hundred Turkish fugitives are suffering from serious dagger wounds. The survivors fled in disorder to Ghoozan, pursued by the rebels. The Turkish gunboat, Sutebe, intending to shell the Arabs, shelled Ghoozan instead of killing or wounding several hundred Turkish soldiers. The rebels captured four large guns, four maxims, two thousand rifles and a large amount of ammunition. They ultimately retired.

## YORK FOUND NOT GUILTY BY JURY

Man Charged With Several Forgeries Acquitted in First Case—Another Forgery Acquitted.

In the case of the State vs. E. L. York, on trial in the district court yesterday, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. York was charged with forgery in connection with the passage of checks recently to which the name of R. L. Sloop was signed. There are four other cases of a similar nature pending against him that have been postponed to the week beginning July 3.

The case of the State vs. Conway was this morning continued until the next term of court. Wm. Bell was this morning placed on trial in connection with the forging of the name of W. W. Coleman to checks sometime ago, and after the testimony was heard the judge instructed the jury to return a verdict of not guilty, which action was taken without the jury leaving the box.

This work completing the cases set for this week in which the parties were ready for trial, the judge discharged the regular jury for the term.

## Prince Edward is 17

London, June 23.—Next to King George it is probable that most public attention has centered this week in his eldest son and heir, Prince Edward, who celebrates his seventeenth birthday today. At the present time Prince Edward is giving much attention to the preparations for his investiture which is to take place at Carnarvon Castle next month. Whether he shall go to Oxford next fall or enter Sandhurst for a short military course seems not to have been determined as yet. In any event it is regarded as likely that his royal highness will soon have a separate establishment of his own. Various places have been mentioned already among them Frogmore.

## ROYAL PROGRESS THROUGH LONDON

CROWDS ESTIMATED AT 8,000,000 WITNESS RIDE OF ROYAL PARTY THROUGH CITY.

## 50,000 TROOPS IN LINE

State Carriage a Veritable Dream in Artistic Gold and Blue Enameling.

By Associated Press. London, June 23.—Upwards of eight million men, women and children are estimated to have witnessed the royal progress through London today. The great majority of Londoners and visitors as well as the procession was of greater interest than the coronation itself, for comparatively very few had an opportunity to view yesterday's pageantry.

It was shortly after 11 o'clock this morning when the booming of cannon from the artillery detachment stationed at St. James Park, immediately at the rear of Buckingham Palace, announced to the thousands who had taken their places along the route that the king and queen had entered their carriage and that the royal procession was prepared to move.

The state carriage in which their Majesties rode, and which was a veritable dream in artistic gold and blue enameling, was drawn by eight white horses, with outriders in uniforms of scarlet and gold.

Two hundred life guards in their magnificent uniforms and mounted upon black chargers cleared the way for the procession. Immediately before the carriage galloped a squad of Indian cavalry. Galloping behind marched the colonial detachments. All branches of the two services were represented in the line.

The route of the procession was from Buckingham Palace up Constitution Hill and thence by way of Piccadilly, St. James Street, Pall Mall, Trafalgar Square, The Strand, Fleet Street, Ludgate Hill, St. Paul's Churchyard, Queen Victoria Street and King William Street to London Bridge, where the procession passed over into Southwark.

Fifty thousand troops lined the route and at every important street intersection there was stationed a military band, which played the national anthem as the royal carriage passed. Back of the troops were the spectators, a veritable sea of faces, women and children, enthusiastic almost to wildness. Never before, probably, had a British sovereign received a more cordial greeting at the hands of his or her subjects. The roar started at the moment that the king and queen descended the steps of the palace to their carriage, and it lasted until their return.

It was a popular reception in every sense of the word. Myriads of dainty white handkerchiefs fluttered in the air and on either side of the avenues through which the procession passed in its early stages and seemed to keep time with the hoarse cheering of the masculine element, while children tossed out nosegays and baskets full of flowers, only to be trampled under the feet of the horses or crushed under the wheels of the carriages.

When the carriage turned into Piccadilly a large number of members of the Stock Exchange who occupied a special stand sang Rule Britannia with telling effect. A little farther on was a large stand occupied exclusively by Americans. Other stands and windows were filled with hundreds of Canadians who cheered enthusiastically and waved their flags as their Majesties came into view. The queen seemed especially pleased with the loyal demonstration by the representatives of the great overseas dominion and acknowledged the greeting by a graceful inclination of the head.

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## Penrose Says Coalition Between Democrats and Insurgents Cannot Stand.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., June 23.—Chairman Penrose of the Senate finance committee said today that the Canadian reciprocity measure will not fall of passage on account of the new coalition between the insurgents and democrats.

Penrose said of the coalition: "It is a rope of sand and will not hold. The performance of the insurgents and democrats on Wednesday was effective for a time, but the differences between the two elements are so radical that the combination will not continue. And if the purpose of it was to defeat Canadian reciprocity it will fail. With the tariff question dumped into the Senate in connection with reciprocity a delay is to be expected, but in the end reciprocity will go through and it will then remain to be seen what shall be done with the tariff bills now before the Senate, and distribute twelve thousand circulars."

## HOPKINS BEFORE LORIMER PROBE

DEFEATED CANDIDATE TELLS OF RUMORS OF BRIBERY IN ELECTION OF OPPONENT.

## AN EDITOR TESTIFIES

Said He Believed There Had Been Jackpot in Illinois Legislature for Twelve Years.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., June 23.—Former Senator Hopkins whom Lorimer defeated was the first witness in the Lorimer investigation today. He said he knew of no man who "could put his finger on" corrupt means in Lorimer's election but that rumors of use of money were in the air the day of the Lorimer election.

Hopkins said that in his fight for re-election to the Senate he hired a hall at which conferences of his followers were held every night or so. Hopkins said his private secretary told him that Senator McCormick had told him (the secretary) that \$25,000 had been offered McCormick to vote for Lorimer.

"Did he vote for Lorimer?" the witness asked.

"Not until after Lorimer had enough votes to elect him," was the response. "He had always voted for me and when he told me he was going to vote for Lorimer," said Hopkins, "I told him if he did he would not be able to convince his people he had not been purchased."

Hopkins said he had heard he was going to lose Logan and Duffee. Both had been at his room at eleven o'clock the night before the election. The witness said "I ate my apples and smoked my cigars."

"Where did they go after they left your room?" the witness was asked. "My friends told me they went to Senator Lorimer's room," was his answer.

One of the principal witnesses yesterday was Editor Hinman of the Chicago Inquirer. He testified that the calling of Mr. Hinman was a surprise, and was due so Chairman Dillingham explained, to the desire of Mr. Hinman to keep a pressing engagement.

The witness was questioned at length in regard to the "jack pot" funds of the Illinois Legislature. Mr. Hinman said he had never talked with anyone who said he contributed to a "jack pot" operated one or received money from one.

"But I believe there has been a 'jack pot' in every Legislature of Illinois since I went to Illinois twelve years ago," he added.

"What do you mean by a 'jack pot'?" asked Senator Fletcher.

"A company fund. I believe they call it the fellows who handle it in New York, where I came from, the black horse cavalry."

Mr. Hinman showed some heat when the committee asked him if he had borrowed money from either Hines, Tilden or Lorimer.

"Oh, well, I will answer under protest," Mr. Hinman said, after thinking it over. "On one occasion I borrowed \$4,000 from Mr. Hines on three or four months' time."

"When?"

"Within the last eight or ten weeks."

Declaring that he had never paid or received money to aid in Lorimer's election, Mr. Hinman was excused.

## 2 DENTON FIREMEN CRUSHED TO DEATH

CAUGHT BY FALLING WALLS AFTER THEY HAD BROUGHT FIRE UNDER CONTROL.

## BODIES MASHED TO PULP

Blaze Starting in Blacksmith Shops Swept Two Blocks on South Side.

By Associated Press. Denton, Texas, June 23.—After a desperate fight in which they had succeeded in checking a fire which threatened the entire destruction of the south side of the city, two volunteer firemen lost their lives here early this morning. The dead are Joe Turpin, aged thirty and Earnest Bushby, aged seventeen. S. S. Grant, another volunteer fireman aged eighteen was seriously injured. The fire started at one o'clock this morning and it was not until 2:30 that it was brought under control and that the lives of Turpin and Bushby were sacrificed. They were directing a stream of water against the walls of the Craddock building, when it fell burying them. Their bodies were smashed to a pulp. Grant was injured at the same time.

The blaze started in R. B. Rich's blacksmith shop burning two and a half blocks. F. M. Craddock is the heaviest loser, his loss being \$10,000 with insurance of \$3,000. The total loss exceeds \$20,000.

## GIRL SAYS THAT SHE WORKED MIRACLES

Chicago, Ill., June 23.—Mildred Bridges was on the witness stand again yesterday in Judge Honore's court and testified to her belief that Evelyn Arthur See is divine, and that he is a miracle worker. She completed her direct testimony and was turned over by the state for cross-examination.

By her direct testimony Mildred showed that she believes some of the writings of See were written in a supernatural manner. She was quite sure that the "love placards" which were placed in her bed, written in See's handwriting on thick cardboard, was spirit writing.

Prosecutor Burnham adroitly tried to draw from the witness her conviction that the placard was dropped by the unseen hands into her bed, but the girl's clever defense kept her out of danger until Mr. Burnham, point blank, asked her if she thought See is divine, or an ordinary physical mortal.

Deft evasion saved the girl, even here. "The physical See and the spiritual See were different," she said.

In the strictly physical sense the girl failed. To show a belief that See might remove a mountain, she explained See possesses a gift for receiving and transmitting divine revelations.

Mildred actually lost her temper for once. It was when the prosecutor tried to have her explain the word "symbol" as used in the "Book of Truth." For a moment her face flushed. In a rather tart manner, the witness told the prosecutor that his method of questioning her was confusing.

## CYCLONE DAVIS HERE TOMORROW

## ST. CLAIR GOES TO DALLAS TO PURCHASE FIREWORKS

F. P. St. Clair will leave tonight for Dallas to purchase six or seven hundred dollars worth of fireworks for use in connection with the celebration on the Fourth of July. It is planned to display on the lake one of the most extensive and attractive exhibits ever presented in this part of the state.

In discussing the preparations Mr. St. Clair stated that new attractions were being added to the program from time to time and that the day would be one of many pleasing features. He mentioned that it was planned to have in addition to the double-header baseball game, motor boat races, row boat races, foot races, sack races, the grand pig, the greased pole and the fireworks display at night. It is also planned to advertise extensively on the railroads. It is understood, will distribute twelve thousand circulars.

## ASSESSED VALUATIONS IN SCHOOL DISTRICTS AND TAX LEVIES

The total assessed valuations in Wichita county are \$13,123,923 according to a completed compilation of County Assessor John Robertson, who has just figured out the valuations in each independent and common school district.

Mr. Robertson will be kept busy during the next few months in making out the tax rolls. Although no provision is made for extra compensation the assessor is required to figure out the amount of school tax on each assessment.

Mr. Robertson has just completed a compilation of the total assessment in each school district in the county. In the independent school districts and in some of the common school districts the tax is fixed by vote and is changed only by a vote of the tax payers. In other districts it is fixed by the school trustees. In most of the districts the tax has already been levied.

## THE BIGGEST LINER ON THE WAVES

New York, June 22.—Moving majestically up North river, the White Star liner, Olympic, the biggest steamship afloat, docked at her dock at 3:50 Wednesday, completing her maiden voyage. All the way up the bay from the narrows a fleet of small craft had surfiled a noisy welcome to the new giantess on her first trip into New York harbor.

The top of high buildings and windows in the skyscrapers were crowded with persons watching the progress of the leviathan as she slowly made her way up stream. Vessels alongside resembled pyramids, and her funnels took like giant oil tanks.

The Olympic lived up to all the expectations of her builders on the journey across. She left Southampton at noon on Wednesday, June 14, and called at Cherbourg and Queenstown. Since passing Dublin Lock outside of Queenstown harbor, her city's press were as follows:

To noon Friday, 428 nautical miles; to noon Saturday, 524 nautical miles; to noon Monday, 525 miles, and the 217 miles to the Lights. Entering New York harbor she struck a fog which caused some delay. The passage to Ambrose channel was made in five days, sixteen hours and forty-two minutes, at an average speed of 21.7 knots an hour.

Two tug boats conveyed the big ship into her slip. Looking like a dirigible in size, the tug puffed and blew at the tug. The Olympic is the biggest ship that ever entered the port of New York or any other port in the world. She is also the most costly representing an investment of \$20,000,000.

The passengers were loud in their praises of the ship. As one put it: "I hated to make the voyage because I did not want to give up golf, but bless me, I played every morning on deck in the sunshine."

The game was known as deck golf. In the Olympic, which steamed up New York harbor today and moored at a specially built dock, the largest in America, the ocean has a culmination type, combining with moderate speed, aplousness, luxury and safety. This new hostelry of Father Neptune, the highest and longest and heaviest skyscraper of his realm, weighs 86,000 tons. The new Woolworth building in New York, the highest in the world, is to be 750 feet high but the Olympic is 82 1/2 feet in length.

## WINDOW GLASS MANUFACTURER TO INVESTIGATE ADVANTAGES

Andrew Hudson, president of the Chanutte Window Glass Company, of Canute, Kan., manufacturers of natural gas tank made window glass, is expected to reach this city the latter part of next week with a view of negotiating with the Chamber of Commerce for the removal of his factory to this city. This information was contained in a letter received at the headquarters of the Chamber of Commerce this morning, in which it was also asked whether or not a meeting of the business men could be held the last of next week to consider a proposition.

The letter was of a very encouraging nature in that it indicated the purpose of the company to move and left the impression that it was possible for Wichita Falls to secure the factory if satisfactory arrangements could be made. The letter referred especially to the matter of cheap gas,

When the Associated Press sends out a report of a shower that laid the dust in an East Texas town, it cannot be questioned that it is dry in Texas.

An employe of the San Francisco mint was killed by sacks containing nine million dollars in gold toppling and falling upon him. Next to drowning in a waterspout we know of no more acceptable means of death.

If the people of Illinois had the power to recall Senator Lorimer it is probable there would be no necessity for the re-opening of the investigation.

In an article "How Vernon got the Frisco Railroad," reprinted in this paper several days ago credit was given to the Frederick Enterprise, when it should have been given to the Frederick Leader.

### FARM ACREAGE DECREASE.

The movement of population from the farms to the cities is decidedly more pronounced in the East than in the South and West. In this connection some noteworthy tendencies are shown in the country's farm acreage during the past ten years by census figures. For example, these figures show that six of the leading States of the East had 2,834,000 acres less in farms in 1910 than in 1900. Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Maryland all lost in farm acreage from 2 to 16 percent, and the group as a whole shrank from 62,832,000 acres to 60,958,000 acres, or 4.4 per cent in ten years. Of these six States the percentage or loss was greatest in New Jersey, being 10 per cent; while Massachusetts came next with a loss of 9 per cent; West Virginia 7 per cent; Pennsylvania 4 per cent; New York 3 per cent; Maryland 2 per cent.

As these are the leading agricultural States of the North Atlantic slope, where population is densest, their failure to maintain their acreage in a period of rising prices for the products of the farm is significant indeed, observes the Wall Street Journal.

Still more significant, however, the same paper suggests, is the small increase in area in farms in the great surplus grain States of the interior. Seven of these, including the two leaders in wheat and corn growing, made a gain of only 4.9 per cent in their farm area in ten years. This increase of 10,873,000 acres occurred almost entirely in Nebraska, whose farming lands expanded from 29,912,000 acres in 1900 to 38,555,000 in 1910, or 29 per cent gain. But Iowa actually lost 1.9 per cent.

"A practically stationary acreage east of the Rocky Mountains," says the Journal, "is phenomena of worldwide importance. If the basis of our National agriculture has ceased to expand in a period when farm products rose 65 per cent in price, what may be expected under an area of falling prices? For the foreign world the interest centers in our future role as a producer of foodstuffs. From either viewpoint the facts as thus far published call for the gravest consideration."

Serious as the problem is, it is full of suggestion to the people of Texas of the broad opportunity for the profitable expansion of their own agriculture through the bringing into tillage the immense acreage as yet lying idle in its virgin fertility. Houston Post.

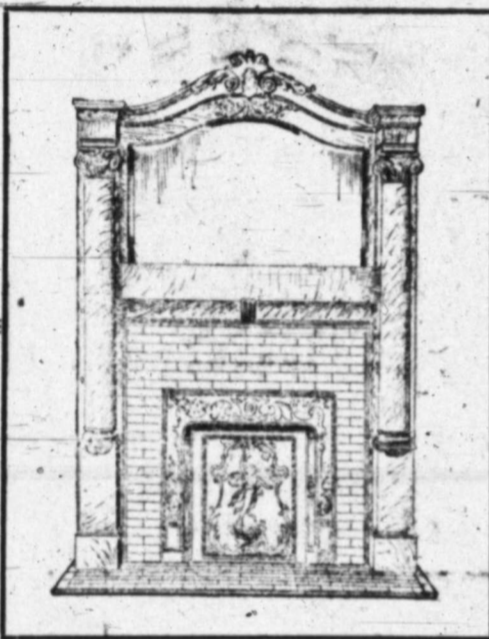

## MORDECAI BROWN TELLS OF CAREER

Moddecai Brown, the three-fingered genius of the Chicago White Sox flatly admits that he went to litching because of the money he could command if he made good. Born in a little Indiana town, Brown thought he was an infielder. He heard pitchers got more money than infielders, so when opportunity offered he signed with Terre Haute as a flinger. Brown tells about it himself in this fashion: "I started training right away after Christmas and soon as I knew I'd get a try-out next spring. By the time I joined, I was in great shape. They were going to let me go at once, but the fans got up a declaration stating they'd boycott the club if they did. Pretty good, eh. I worked hard and watched the other pitchers, studying their styles and trying to learn to pitch. You know my hand is crippled and I found that by twisting it a little I could make a ball curve more sharply than most of them. "When I went to the St. Louis nationals I was full of ambition. "I worked hard to learn to pitch and nearly ruined by arm by overworking it. St. Louis couldn't see me, but that club saved me, as it gave me plenty of rest, and when I got to Chicago I was back in form. "I think my best ball is the curve it overhand with a half round arm motion, starting slowly and finishing with a fast snap with the hand and wrist bent. My next best ball is a speedy one. I always make the ball twist, no matter what I pitch. My first ball I left off the third finger on the side, but near the tip, with the stub of the little finger pressed hard under the ball. I have a twisting, slow ball and a side-arm curve, also a fast underhand ball. "I think that the reason I have been so lucky is that I keep mixing them up and springing surprises on the batters. I seldom pitch to a batter's weakness.

### FEDERAL BUILDINGS HAVE LOOKOUTS

Concealed Stations in Buildings Where Inspectors Can Conceal Themselves.

Denison, June 22.—Of course everyone knows that federal buildings are constructed with infinitely more pains than any building by private individuals, yet few people know anything of the numerous details that enter into the planning and erection of every federal building. One detail of importance, which may be seen at the Denison federal building now, is the "lookouts."

Naturally one asks, What is a lookout? The average man might indulge in a half hundred guesses and fail utterly to come anywhere near the answer. A lookout in a federal building is a concealed station where postoffice inspectors may watch the federal employees and thus gain information in case of irregularities, thefts and like infractions of the laws.

Every federal building is built with several lookouts. They are concealed at various places in the walls and the openings are slatted so that it is possible for any one within to see clearly what is going on in the room into which the lookout opens but impossible for anyone within the room to see the person inside the lookout.

The very rooms of the federal building has two lookouts. One of these extends to the basement and also to the second floor, the closets, the swing room in the basements as well as the closets, all are under surveillance from the lookouts.

One may ask, Do the employees know that the building has lookouts? Certainly they do. The location of the lookouts is plain and every employe knows it. But the main usefulness of the lookouts lies in the fact that the employe do not know when an inspector is in them. Entrance to the lookouts can be only by keys in the possession of the postmaster and the inspector. An inspector can enter the building and go into a lookout from the hall without anyone knowing that he has entered. Thus it is that no one knows when he is under surveillance.

The lookouts are not put in buildings because the government officials believe that they have thieves or crooks at work as a general rule but because history has demonstrated that a "black sheep" will get into the service occasionally. When money is misused from

the mails, and irregularities occur, the lookouts are used to locate the wrongdoer and secure sufficient evidence to convict him. The doors to the lookout are so made that they can be looked only from the outside. An inspector may open any door from the inside and confront an employe whom he has seen tampering with the mails.

those yet to be presented." Even democrats and insurgents agree that probabilities favor the success of the reciprocity bill. There seems a bare possibility of an agreement upon the LaFollette, Bristow, Cummins tariff amendments, but it is more likely that no riders will be attached to the reciprocity measure.

The gain in the American Federation of Labor since the convention of last November has been 156,598 members of various trade unions.

Thirty-five States in this country have established bureaus of labor, for the purpose of collecting industrial information and for bettering state factory laws.
