FAITH SAVED HIM FROM SUICIDE

Bobby R. was born in the hills of Kentucky on a mountain farm. He attended a two-room school house as a barefoot boy.

While going to school he met a girl with brown eyes and black hair. He married her on Easter Sunday two years later. One year later he moved to Ohio and began a grocery business with his brother. The first year they lost \$600 but then the business began to grow.

He opened a dry goods store, then a used car lot and began to sell semi-trailers; after that a furniture and appliance store. Finally the brothers bought up a whole block and built nice buildings on it. Business continued to boom until May of 1956.

At that time he had just built 15 new houses. He owned the franchise on new and used cars as well as trucks and trailers. He also owned a trucking line.

Then pressure began to build up. By August the appraisals on his houses showed an inability to even meet costs. Bankruptcy reared its ugly head, and the fruits of his years of hard work hung by an eye-lash. The last of August he called in his brothers and told them his plight but they could not help him.

Desperately he sought an answer. He searched for one ray of hope. Where was "the way out?" ... the way out?

THE WAY OUT!

Drumming through his mind. Suddenly it flashed upon him—suicide—"that's the way out!" But on that day someone put on his desk a little book: God's Formula For Success and Happi-

ness. It is the story of ten men—one, whose name was Clifford Ford, had reached the same depths that Bob was in, but he had discovered the way back to success through faith in God.

Bob read it. It inspired him. Maybe there was some hope after all.

Then he said, "I knelt before God and prayed this prayer: 'Lord I've come to the end of the road. I have nothing left. You are my only hope—please help me!'"

"Suddenly," he said, "I seemed to get this message from God. 'Do not doubt or fear, simply believe.' 'At that moment,' Bob said, 'I knew what I wanted. I wanted God as my partner—not just in my business, but in everything. And so I invited Him to be my partner—with controlling interest in every part of my life. And I felt a strange assurance that He had accepted the invitation.'"

A few days later he felt an inner urge to go to a big truck corporation and tell his story. He told them that no one would loan him money but that he was honest and felt that God was with him. He asked this corporation, "Do you want to take a chance on me?" They answered, "Yes, we will take a chance on you." So he began to sell his tractors and trailers—one unit at a time.

In four and one-half months, he sold 28 tractor-trailer units as well as other trucks and used ones. During this time he paid off \$52,000 of his obligations. He is on the road back to success. God is a wonderful Partner.

Yarborough Demands Cut in Oil Imports to Save Area's Economy

Senator Ralph Yarborough of Texas took the floor last Friday to speak on the necessity of curtailing excessive foreign oil imports. He said as follows:

"Mr. President: I've spoken before in the Senate about the dangers to the economy of many of the Western, Southwestern and Rocky Mountain states caused by excessive oil imports. I have reliable information that the president's cabinet conferred this week about the oil import situation, but as usual, as far as oil imports are concerned, they merely conferred. No action was taken.

"The Southwest has steadily worsened. Seven years of drought followed by floods without precedent this spring, combined with the wrecking of the farm support parity program, have brought the farm economy to the verge of collapse.

The other strong prop to our economy, the oil industry, has suffered successive staggering blows by continued increases in oil imports.

"Mr. President, the economy of the Southwest and the security of the nation are being undermined by the dangerously high level of foreign imports. When I talk about the economy of the Southwest and the security of our nation, I am talking about PEOPLE—their safety, their means of putting bread on the table, their means of supporting the schools. I am talking about the men who drive trucks,

the men who work on drilling rigs, the men who run well-logs, the men who manufacture and sell and supply heavy industry tools and equipment, the men who work on service machines, and, Mr. President, I am also talking about small business men, in many towns and cities of the Southwest, West and Rocky Mountain states, who are kept alive by the free enterprise activity of our small companies and independent drillers.

Rigs are being stacked, men are being laid off, and independent contractors and operators are going broke. Drilling operations are being slashed, but even if they were to continue at the present rate, new discoveries this year would total about 2½ billion barrels—a drop of 12½ per cent below last year's inadequate level.

"The June 24, 1957 issue of the Oil and Gas Journal points to the importance of the small companies and independents. 'But it's the smaller companies... which drilled 75 per cent of last year's field well, and 83 per cent of the wildcats. When the smaller companies cut their exploration program, the effects will surely be felt in the development program the next year and the next.'

"Mr. President, it is time the six-man cabinet committee did something about oil imports before the oil industry is completely Bensonized."

Parents forget about this requirement until mid-August. By then the bureau is flooded with thousands of requests for photostat copies.

State Registrar Don Carrol asks that requests for photostat copies be made as soon as possible. Contact your local health unit or send the request to the Bureau of Vital Statistics, State Health Department, Austin. Be certain to include the child's name, name of both parents, and the date and place of birth. Enclose \$1 (cash, please) with your request.

Write today to be sure to get your photostat on time.

Soil Conservation

Time for destruction from grass fires has arrived — and the task of preventing these losses is the job of everyone, according to David Clinton of the SCS in Archer City.

A grass fire at this time of year can well be the most destructive force known in the local range area. Abundant growth of the cool season grasses that is now dead or in a dormant state on the surface along with the unusually heavy growth of weeds makes the threat of fires serious.

Preventing grass fires would be far easier if the only ones concerned with the prevention were farmers and ranchers of the area. For the most part these people are well aware of the dangers and take precautions against starting a fire. Main cause for concern is the careless action of individuals who do not realize the dangers that can arise from a lighted match, cigarette, carelessly tossed bottle, or a camp fire.

Experience has proved that the ranges that have been burned intensely often require a complete rest of two to five years before productive grasses are again abundant.

This not only represents a serious loss to the rancher in dollars, but in addition it often means that wildlife of the area is completely destroyed from lack of food and cover. Add to these losses the destruction of a carefully applied range conservation program pointing to an end of abundant native grass cover, and the amount of destruction cannot be valued in monetary measures.

Roads, fire-breaks, streams and ridges offer the best protection in fighting these fires, but the best protection is prevention. For this reason supervisors of the local soil conservation district join the fire-fighting associations in strongly urging everyone to be extremely careful not to start a fire.

Last week the House trimmed \$750,000,000 from the bill authorizing the foreign aid program and then approved a \$3.1 billion bill. Now this measure will go to a conference committee to iron out the differences between the House and the Senate.

Even with this reduction, it seemed to me that the bill still contained too many extravaganzas and unnecessary expenditures to deserve support.

Also the House defeated the aid-to-education bill by an extremely close vote. This measure was defeated after an amendment providing that no funds would be available in states having segregated schools was adopted. Chances are this action will kill this federal aid program for some time to come.

Problems that have grown up affecting agriculture all through this session, only emphasize the hopeless split that has developed between the people interested in agriculture over a suitable program. Committees of Congress continue to seek a means of solving this dilemma and work out a more practical and effective agricultural program.

Consideration of the civil rights bill continues in the Senate. It seems that much good has come from debate of this measure that has been going on there. There is little doubt if the people generally understood the effect of the provisions of administration of the civil rights, they would oppose it vigorously.

This was proved by the fact that as a result of the debate in the Senate, Section III was stricken. This was one of the most objectionable parts of the proposal, and if enacted would have made it possible for the federal government to use all kinds of force which, if used, would have violated every American concept of personal liberty.

TURN ME LOOSE—I'M GOING TO WALK

The world cannot hear this message too often. "God is a good God." He is able and willing to help you. Our problem is to turn our faith loose.

Anna's history was pretty bleak. In January 1951, she was in a train-car wreck and sustained a severely fractured right leg and complications. When Anna was released from Hermann Hospital, Houston, Texas—she was on crutches.

Sgt. Bill W., the friend with whom Anna was riding when the train-car accident occurred, fell in love with her and they were married. However on September 22, 1952, she was stricken with polio and rushed to Jefferson Davis Hospital, Houston's Polio Center. The baby, little Benjamin Rex, was born January 7, 1953. Two weeks later, Anna left the hospital—still on crutches.

Just one year later, spondylitis, a disease similar to polio, entered into Anna's life. This left her confined to a wheelchair.

April 25, 1955 they arrived in Wichita Falls, Texas where Bill was stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base. On the first Sunday, Bill and Anna and another young couple were watching a religious television program in their home. The program was concerning God's love and His power. He was presented as a Good God. One Who is able to heal. At the close of the program there was prayer for those viewing the program.

Bill shot a quick glance at his wife sitting across the room from him. He and the other

couple were praying quietly to themselves. He said, "At that precise moment a strange feeling entered into Anna's frail body and she said there was a general tingling throughout her body. Her legs felt strange and alive. An overwhelming compulsion told her to GET UP AND WALK."

"Honey," she said, "help me get up." She grasped his hands and pulled herself up from the divan with her own power.

Bill watched apprehensively. She lurched forward with staggering, unsteady steps. In panic, Bill grabbed for Anna's hand and attempted to steady her. "Turn me loose!" she exclaimed. "I'm going to walk. God has hold of me."

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Here is the story of the Wichita Falls miracle that has been published in every major newspaper in the United States and broadcast over several radio networks. It happened on May 1, 1955 at 1:53 p.m., Sunday afternoon.

The water department called A. D. Walker to bring his ditcher, after the Holliday equipment was found to be inadequate.

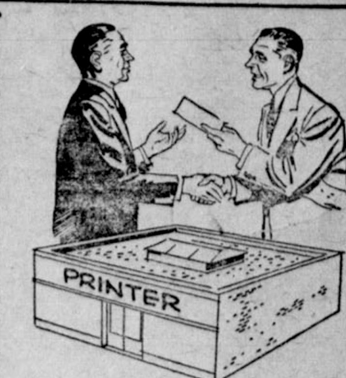
Pressure was off about 13 hours, and was turned on about 2:30 a.m. Sunday.

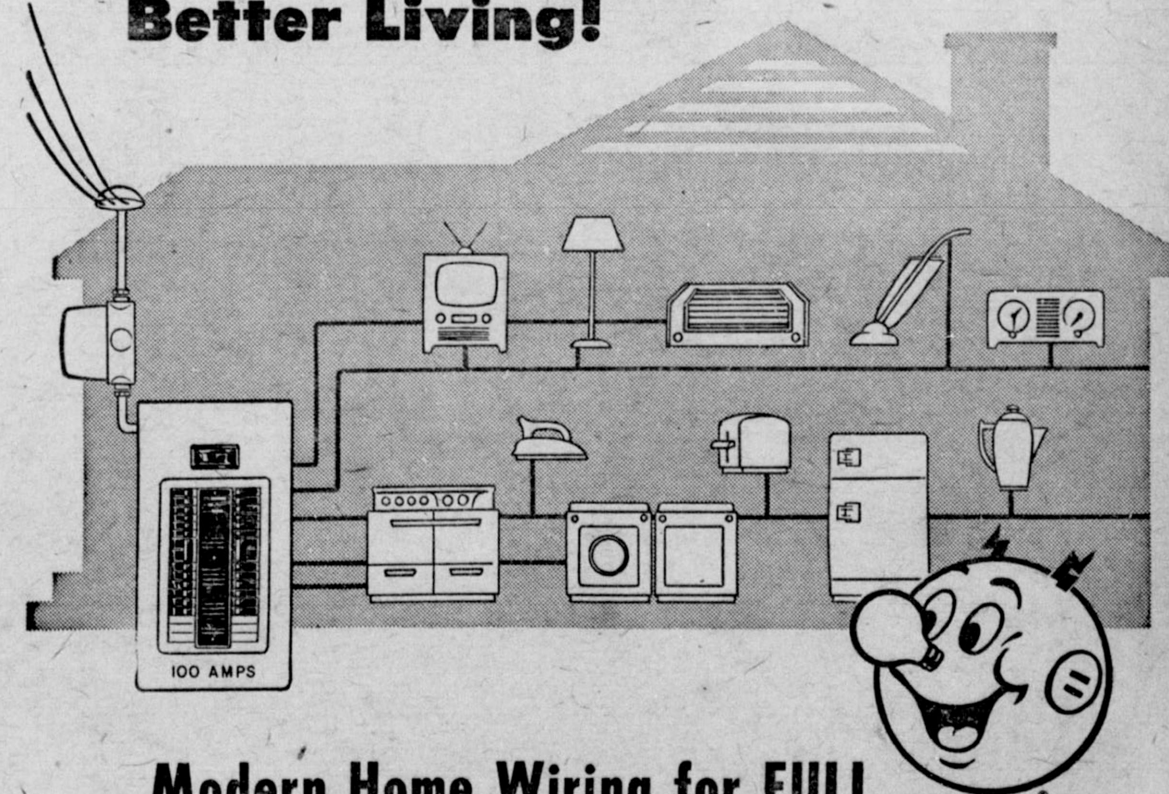
