DROUHIN WILL PILOT LEVINE IN FLIGHT BACK TO NEW YORK

LEADING MAN IN COMMERCIAL FRENCH FLYING

CHAMBERLIN TO SHOW HIM PECULIARITIES OF THE SHIP
BYRD AIDS PLANS
FULL DATA FOR FLIGHT BEING PREPARED BY AVIATOR

PARIS, July 7 (AP)—Charles Levine, noted French aviator, has been selected to fly the Columbia to America, and had accepted the offer to go as a passenger. Chamberlin, Drouhin, Levine will fly to Caydon, Island, tomorrow afternoon, and Chamberlin can show Drouhin how to pilot the ship and enlighten him on certain of its peculiarities. Levine does not speak English, but the owner of the Bellanca plane he was taking a pocket dictionary with him for the thirty-day trip so he could keep up conversation with the French pilot. Drouhin, is one of the world's leading commercial aviators. He has been planning for a considerable time a Paris to New York flight, and it was announced a few days ago that he was ready for the attempt. Levine was born in Paris in 1893. Three times he held the world flight duration record, last a few months ago to Caydon, D. Secrecy Mantles Confences of World Bank Heads While Policies Shape As To Method Gold Transfers To Be Made

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 7 (AP)—Despite the thick veil of secrecy which surrounds the conferences being held here by the executives of four of the largest central banks in the world, Wall Street bankers are of the belief that two important conclusions will be reached. These are, first, an agreement or understanding of some kind regarding the flow of gold among financial capitals of the world; and second, a credit of \$25,000,000 to the bank of Poland to be participated in by the New York Federal Reserve Bank and the European banks of issue. Reckless in recent Wall Street history has such secrecy and mystery surrounded an important gathering. Officials of the New York Federal Reserve Bank state that the conference represents merely the annual exchange of views by bank heads, which formerly took place in London or Paris, but which has been transferred here this year. Agree To Secrecy
It is understood that a gentlemen's agreement has been reached by the bank heads not to talk for publication while the conferences are being held. Montague C. Norriss, governor of the Bank of England, and Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the German Reichsbank, arrived here on the Mauretania, without having their names appear on the passenger list, and with baggage unmarked. FORD RETRACTS STAND AGAINST JEWISH PEOPLE

WAS UNAWARE OF THE ATTACKS MADE IN HIS MAGAZINE
REGRETS AFFAIR

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 7.—The New York American in a copyrighted article says Henry Ford has ordered the Dearborn Independent to discontinue permanently all articles hostile to the Jewish people. The pamphlet in which such items were being distributed and in a signed statement has expressed deep regret for any injury or hurt caused by the series. Mr. Ford's statement according to the American, includes the announcement that "Henceforth, the Dearborn Independent will be considered under such auspices that articles reflecting upon the Jews or never again appear in its columns." Makes Own Statement
"Let me add," this version of the statement concludes, "that this statement is made on my own initiative and wholly in the interest of right and justice and in accordance with what I regard as my solemn duty as a man and as a citizen."

The Detroit manufacturer was quoted as being "deeply mortified" that his journal has been made the medium for resurrecting exploded fictions, for giving currency to the so-called protocols of the wise men of Zion, which have been demonstrated as I learn, to be gross fabrications and for contending that the Jews have been engaged in a conspiracy to control the industry and capital of the world.

Didn't Know Contents
"Had I appreciated even the general nature of the contents of this journal, I would have forbidden its circulation without a moment's hesitation, because I am fully aware of the violence of the Jewish people as a whole, of what they and their ancestors have done for civilization and for mankind, and their benevolence and their unselfish interest in the public welfare."

Disclosing that William Randolph Hearst, publisher of the American, had offered \$100,000 for the Dearborn Independent, the article quoted Mr. Ford as saying in reply: "To be honest, I am not going to make it a house organ, and I am going to stop absolutely everything."

CHURCH THIEF IN PEN

Ray Marsden Gets Term Of Three To Fifteen Years For Stealing From Catholic Churches
COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 7 (AP)—Ray Marsden, confessed pillager of nearly 1,000 churches in the United States and Canada, today entered Ohio state penitentiary to serve 15 years for theft of sacred objects from the shrine of Mary, Ohio, several months ago. Marsden was sentenced today at upper Sandusky.

NEW GAS FRANCHISE

Commissioners Let New Contract To West Texas Gas Company To Supply Old One
A new gas franchise for the city of Lubbock was granted yesterday by the city commissioners to the West Texas gas company. The new franchise was issued by the commissioners because of error in the old one and the name of the company being changed. No change in the rates and regulations of the franchise was made. A second reading of this franchise will be made today by the commissioners. The city commissioners also considered the placing of street lights clear through Avenue H. Other routine matters were attended to.

Twenty Four Are Dead In Train Wreck

Buenos Aires, July 7 (AP)—May 24th of the civilian military academy on their way to Buenos Aires to take part in the north of July Independence day celebration were killed or injured when their special train collided with a regular passenger train today at Almirante Mendoza, a station on the Pacific railway. Twenty four bodies had been recovered from the wreckage up to mid-afternoon, but among these were ten members of the train crew. Headquarters of the Pacific railway gave the number of dead as 24 seriously injured 16 and 35 suffering from minor injuries. The train numbered 299 with three officers and a band of 38 musicians were proceeding by special train. Nine of the 15 coaches of the special, which was running fifty miles an hour, were wrecked, but only the locomotive and the baggage car of the passenger train. A combination of bad luck and a combination of factors is believed to have been the cause of the wreck engineer of the special failing to see danger signals set against him. The Chileans were in command of Colonel Barco Lira who was seriously injured, while Argentine attaché also was hurt.

TWO ARE ARRESTED FOR STATE THEFT

Padded Payroll Claimed In Arrest Of Former Chief Clerk
(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, July 7.—S. C. Tompkins, former highway division chief clerk, and H. Joehke, were arrested by Travis county officers today to answer to three indictments each, alleging theft of state funds and forgery involving around \$1,200.

Evidence pointer to "padded" payrolls by which \$1,000 to \$1,500 state highway funds were diverted, was found state officers assisting the grand jury said. A third person indicted with Tompkins and Joehke by the special grand jury called last Thursday to investigate alleged diversion of four state highway warrants of \$125 each, had not been arrested tonight.

Worked Under Ferguson
Tompkins, who was chief clerk under former Division Engineer L. J. Nachtrieb during the Ferguson administration, has been in business with Nachtrieb in Houston until recently, it is said here. One of the indictments against Tompkins charges him with theft and diverting special state funds in connection with a \$422 warrant paid to Joehke whom state officers declared was carried on the highway payroll but did not work. He is said to have been paid for supposed operation of several trucks in road work, Joehke also is indicted in this connection.

DEPUTY SLAYS NEGRO

Frank East Shot When He Attacks Deputy Sheriff's Office
EDINBURGH, July 7 (AP)—Frank East, 40, negro, was killed Thursday morning in a fight with Deputy Sheriff Lorenzo Garcia, two miles southwest of McAllen. East broke the officer's left hand with a stick of mesquite wood and then attempted to grapple for the weapon. Four shots were fired, the last taking effect in the negro's abdomen. Families living near where East was killed had been frightened by a negro for several days and had made complaints to sheriff's office in Edinburg. The negro was a member of a "King Tut" lodge in Cleveland, Ohio.

REQUEST LAND LAW BAN

Injunction Filed To Prevent The Application Of Mexican Ruling On Oil Land Restrictions
MEXICO CITY, July 7 (AP)—Another application for a foreign oil company for an injunction against the New Mexican oil law was filed by the Aguila Oil company in the first district court here today. The company complained that it had been refused drilling permits for some of its lands in the Tampico oil fields. The government contends that the company has not complied with the law.

ATTORNEYS RAP DELAY OF LAWS ENFORCEMENT

JUSTICE DEFEATED BY SLOW ACTION SAY SPEAKERS
REMEDIES OFFERED

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, July 7.—The law's delays was the general subject discussed by speakers before more than 300 lawyers who attended the annual convention of the Texas Bar Association here today. Joseph J. Webb, of San Francisco, told the gathering that the California bar had found it should "clean its own house" before attempting judicial reforms. Accordingly it adopted a self-governing law, of which Mr. Webb is the author, with a board of 15 governors who have full power to discharge unethical members. Can Be Remedied
T. Whit Davidson of Dallas, president of the association, asserted that "the law's delays, which it is charged are defeating the ends of justice can be eliminated only by trusting the legislature with creating the judiciary to administer it." They were principal speakers at the opening session. Committee reports were postponed until tomorrow. SAYS COOLIDGE TO SEEK THIRD TERM

LAFOLLETTE ATTACKS IDEA OF ALLOWING HIM TO SUCCEED SELF
WASHINGTON, July 7.—President Coolidge "gives every indication of being an active and aggressive candidate for a third term," declares an editorial written by Senator La Follette of Wisconsin to appear in the July issue of the La Follette's magazine. It adds that thus far he "has not made a very suspicious statement."

"There does not seem at this writing," it says, "to be any mad rush of important political leaders from the west to the Black Hills." Pointing out that the "unwritten law" against third terms was established by George Washington, the editorial continues: "The American people are not unaware of the enormous growth of the power of the executive since Washington's time. They have not overlooked the tremendous federal patronage machine, carrying with it control of southern delegates when the sitting president is a republican."

Claims Menace Exists

"The intelligent citizens of this country," the editorial says, "should have shaken the third term precedent there will be no effective limit to the tenure of a chief executive who has come to exercise kingly power which gives an unscrupulous man an opportunity to perpetrate himself in office."

"The danger that a president, when no emergency exists, out of mere greed for office, may attempt to grasp a longer term in office than Washington, Jefferson or Lincoln enjoyed, is imminent, not remote."

Recording a score of issues which he said the president would have to meet as a candidate, La Follette said that "from this early date it appears that the president will have to do more than wear a ten-gallon hat, kiss babies and catch fish, in order to carry him to a third term in the White House."

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Quiet assurance was evident today at the state department that the cruiser problem at the Geneva naval limitation conference would be untangled with satisfaction to the three participating powers. With the definite signing of Japan in support of the American proposal for a cruiser tonnage far under the British recommendation of 6000 tons, officials were more confident that an acceptable compromise would be worked out. All Want Agreement
The concerted effort being made by the powers at national capitals as well as at Geneva to find a common meeting ground, evidenced yesterday with the call of Ambassador Howard of Great Britain upon Secretary Kellogg, was emphasized today when the secretary received the Japanese ambassador Baron Matsuda. The department again today declined to throw further light on Sir Kame's visit, and if the Japanese ambassador amplified informally to the secretary the strong declaration made by the Japanese chief of delegation in Geneva yesterday against British cruiser tonnage proposals, the department did not find it expedient to reveal the details. Agreement Secured
No authoritative comment whatever on the developments of yesterday at Geneva was available at the state department. It was evident, however, that the Washington government has known all along that the Japanese would lend vigorous support to the American urgency for an agreement on cruiser tonnage that would mean in fact reduction of naval expenditures. 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Bill Terry Makes Gotham Fans Forget Long George Kelly

"You're the regular first baseman on this ball club. There isn't anybody that has a chance to get the job away from you. Now show me if you are as good as I think you are."

When Bill Terry of the New York Giants arrived at Saratoga, N.Y., for spring training, that was the gist of the greeting he received from Manager John McGraw.

That speech appears to have converted Bill Terry from just a player to one of the most valuable first basemen in the National League. It gave him the model confidence in his ability that apparently had been lacking.

For three years, Bill Terry has been playing understudy to George Kelly, one of the most versatile ball players in the majors, and one of the best guardians of the initial mark in the game. Bill Terry, Kelly for a job might be chased as picking the stiffest out of competition. It so proved for Terry.

During those three years, Terry broke into the lineup only when Manager McGraw was using Kelly.

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At second base or in the outfield because he was out of the game due to illness or injuries.

Terry's greatest opportunity as a regular came during the 1925 season when he broke into the lineup with the Giants. That he proved on regular work was shown by his batting average of .219, a jump of over 50 points over the previous season, when he was merely a substitute.

Prior to the opening of the present season, McGraw caused a near sensation when he traded George Kelly for the veteran outfielder, Ed Roush. That McGraw knew what he was doing has since been proved.

"I need outfield strength," said McGraw to me when I looked his club over at Saratoga in the spring. "I am sacrificing a great first baseman for a player whom I consider a brilliant outfielder."

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While I regret the passing of Kelly as a Giant, I feel that I can part with him since I am sure Terry has arrived and can play the bat as well and hit as satisfactorily as Kelly.

At the time a majority of the experts differed with McGraw but later events have shown that McGraw knew the strength and weakness of his club better than any one else.

In parting with the able Kelly, he got the very man he needed to round out his club. Ed Roush, an incidentally the passing of Kelly was the making of Bill Terry.

Terry is one inch better than his feet, tops the scales at 175 pounds, in prime condition, bats left handed and hits them high and far. He is also a left handed thrower, an added advantage for a first baseman.

LOYD WHEAT RAISERS PAID MILLION AND QUARTER FOR THIS YEAR'S CROP

FLORIDA, Tex., July 7.—One million, twenty-two thousand and one hundred bushels of 1927 wheat have been shipped from four elevators in Floyd County, according to figures furnished by wheat buyers over the county. This represents seventy-five per cent of a total yield is already in storage will be in the belief of the grain raisers. To date there has been over a hundred and thirty cars of wheat shipped out of this county by the four stations. A part of the wheat is being marketed through the National Wheat Growers' Association and Plainview. The average price paid for grain in Floyd County has reached \$1.27.750 from the harvest of "golden rain".

While the late wheat is yielding an average of seven to nine bushels per acre and testing as low as fifty-four there is still a good business among the buyers. Early last week was a big surprise for it yielded over the county an average of fourteen bushels per acre. This is practically a dry year as the grain did not receive any moisture for the 23rd day of December and some of it made as much as fifty-two bushels per acre. There is no early wheat that tested better than a number one. From a dollar a bushel viewpoint the county has yielded more from the 1927 crop than from the 1926 crop, which was considered a bumper year.

Cars Were Furnished

Contrary to the expectations of shippers there was no trouble in shipments. Cars were available throughout the season and shipments were made promptly. According to figures furnished by the elevators the shipments from the county were divided as follows: Floydada, 357 or approximately 1,800 bushels; Lockney, 260 cars or approximately 1,400 bushels; Alton, 161 cars or approximately 1,400 bushels; Muncie, 12 cars or approximately 500 bushels; 15 per cent not harvested, 153,000 bushels; in elevators and stored, 75,000 bushels. Total 1,229,200 bushels.

Shy Inventor Solves Worst Puzzle Of Aerial Navigation To Aid Byrd

WASHINGTON, July 7.—On the top floor of the National Geographic Society building, working over maps and computations of latitudes and longitudes, is a middle-aged man of science whose shy and withdrawn brain children lie always in the trail-blazing plane of Commander Richard E. Byrd. This man is Albert H. Bumstead, the mapmaker and inventor whose brilliant calculations have done much to increase the safety and precision of the aviator's course first to the north pole and now across the Atlantic.



Without stint, Byrd has always praised Bumstead. Whenever Byrd plans a flight such as his trans-Atlantic or polar ventures, there are always conferences with Bumstead.

Bumstead's Achievements

Here are some of the things Bumstead has done for Byrd:

1. Invented and produced the sun compass—more reliable in operation than any other compass which Byrd used and swore by in the Arctic with MacMillan, on his dash to the pole, and on the first flight of a multi-motored plane to Europe.
2. Charted a new trans-Atlantic course for Byrd which allowed a dead reckoning from the North American coast and virtually eliminated the chance of flying off the course.
3. Designed a new latitude and longitude chart which allowed Byrd to determine his position by night from the Pole Star as well as by day from the sun.

All these are innovations that mean much to long distance aviation. The sun compass is now being manufactured and marketed, but the others are recent.

Has Workshop in Cellar

Bumstead, whose position is chief cartographer for the National Geographic Society, is a most industrious person. He is 52 years old. He has brains in abundance. He is modest and unobtrusive and the last man in the world to court the limelight which endears him. But you get the impression that if Gene Tunney were to step on his toes, he would try to sock Gene on the jaw. And fortunately, he displays an extraordinary patience in explaining things to dumb newspapermen when they corner him.

His chief recreation, away from his map room, is figuring out a table to facilitate computation of distances between latitudes and longitudes. This only other recreation has been the building of a cottage in New Hampshire with his own hands, just completed after three years of work.

A product of Worcester Polytechnic Institute, Bumstead spent seven years with the Geological Survey, went along as topographer on Bingham's expedition to lines in Peru, and came to the Geographic in 1912 after "nine years of trying to run a farm and finding I couldn't."

Solves Byrd's Problems

In the basement of Bumstead's home are a lathe and a miscellany

of tools. It was here that he manufactured the first three sun compasses ever made. The first step of this job was the complete remodeling of three department store alarm clocks.

Just before Byrd sailed into the Arctic with MacMillan to fly over Antarctica, Bumstead's polar regions. Bumstead overheard him remark that he would have great difficulty owing to misbehavior of ordinary compasses between the north pole and magnetic pole.

Bumstead figured out the sun compass idea within a few minutes, told Byrd what he was doing, and went to work. The theory and successful operation of it have often been explained.

Bumstead made a fourth compass for Byrd's polar flight from Spitzbergen, and still another for a number of the National Air Tour, being made by about 20 planes representing practically every type of ship devised for commercial flying in an effort to demonstrate that commercial aviation is safe.

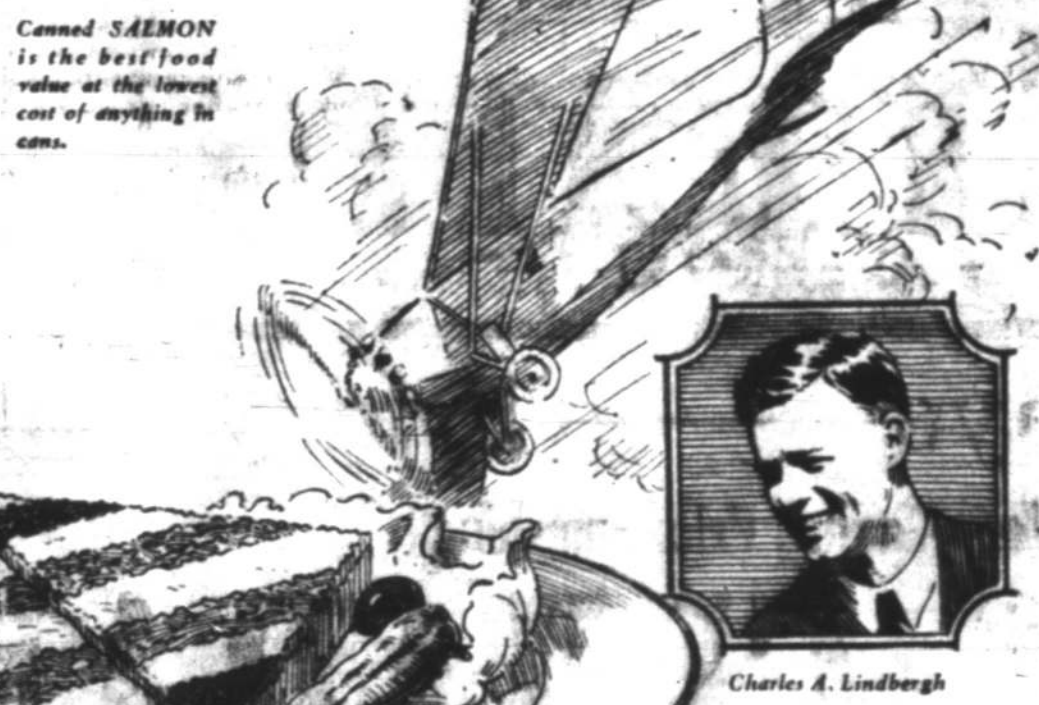
