Lesson Story

Our lesson saw the First Missionary Journey completed with the return of Paul and Barnabas to Antioch. How long they remained in this city we do not know. But "after some days" Paul suggested to his missionary companion that they visit the new congregations and "see how they do". Barnabas wanted to take Mark with them, but Paul objected because the young man had deserted them at Perga. The disagreement became so intense that Barnabas took Mark and sailed to Cyprus, and Paul chose Silas as his companion for the second missionary journey.

Antioch was the starting point of this tour. Syria and Cilicia were visited and encouraged in the work of the Lord. Derbe and Lystra were included in the itinerary. This latter town, the scene of Paul's stoning was the home of Timothy. No doubt the terrible persecution of Paul on the first trip to Lystra cemented in a special way the friendship of Timothy and the apostle. The young convert of Lystra had been taught the Sacred Books (2 Tim. 3: 15) by his mother, Eunice, and his grandmother, Lois, from his childhood (2 Tim. 1: 4). With the addition of Timothy to the evangelistic party, they went through the cities and delivered the decrees of the apostles and elders which had been given at Jerusalem. Great success attended their visit, and congregations were edified and enlarged. Phrygia, Galatia, and Mysia were touched, but the Spirit refused the party a visit to Bithynia that they might come to Troas. This city bore the ancient name of Troy after Alexander the Great (Alexandria Troas). The scene of Homer's Iliad was laid here.

But Historic Troas was to see greater things. Macedonia, a region which had been blessed with the greatest beauty, art, culture, and philosophy felt the great need of the gospel of Christ. No message like the gospel could transform men and women from servants of sin to sons and daughters of Jehovah. Europe's call for the gospel came to Paul in the night vision, saying, "Come over into Macedonia and help us". It is usually conceded that Luke, the "beloved physician" joined the company at Troas (v. 10). Paul's visit to Galatia (20: 6) had been attended with illness (Galatians 4: 13-15) and Luke's professional services as well as his missionary zeal would be a great help to Paul and the work.

Paul was a man of action as well as vision. Immediately the company left Troas for Macedonia. They sailed to the Island of Samothrace thence on to Neapolis, the seaport of Philippi. Ten miles farther brought them into Philippi itself. There was probably no synagogue in this Roman town, but a place for prayer was located on the bank of a certain river. With the blue sky for a roof and a group of prayerful women for an audience Paul preached his first sermon in Europe. A certain woman, Lydia, gave heed to the sermon, believed and obeyed the gospel of her Lord. Her household was also baptized. As teaching, faith and repentance must always precede scriptural baptism (Rom. 10: 14-17; Acts 2: 38; Mark 16:

16; Matt. 28: 19; Rom. 14: 23) all of the group were old enough to hear and believe the message of Paul.

Paul's rebuke to the evil spirit in a soothsayer broke into the profits of her masters. So he and Silas were thrown into prison. But their songs and praises in the night were answered by an earthquake. The jail doors were opened and the prisoners' hands were loosed from the chains. The jailor would have committed suicide, but was assured by Paul that all the prisoners were present. Humbled and convicted by the mighty miracle, he asked the missionaries, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" The answer, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved and thy house", came as a message of mercy to the trembling officer. They spoke unto him the word of the Lord. Thus he was told the terms of pardon. His penitent and obedient faith is seen by his washing the stripes of the missionaries and being baptized the same hour of the night. Thus the Great Westward Trek of Christianity had touched Europe with its gospel torch, causing idols to tremble on their thrones and superstitions to vanish like mists under the morning sun.

LUTHERAN CHURCH NOTES

450th Anniversary of Luther's Birth

To-day, November 10th, marks the 450th birthday of Martin Luther, who has rightly been called the greatest religious leader since the days of St. Paul. Martin Luther was born of poor parents in Eisleben, Germany, on November 10th, 1483. He attended school in Magdeburg and Eisenach and enrolled at the University of Erfurt in 1501. Among the more important happenings of his highly eventful life the following facts deserve special mention: In 1505 Luther entered the Augustinian monastery; three years later he became professor at the University of Wittenberg. The year 1511 found him making a pious pilgrimage to Rome, only to return home disgusted with the corruption and shocking immorality he witnessed among even the highest officials of the church. In 1512 he received the title of Doctor of Divinity. Perhaps the most memorable event in Luther's life was that which occurred on October 31, 1517, when Luther posted his famous Ninety-five Theses to the door of the Castle Church at Wittenberg, protesting particularly against the scandalous sale of indulgences as practiced by John Tetzel and others. That date, October 31, 1517, really marks the beginning of the Great Reformation. The two outstanding dates of Luther's life during 1520 were June 15th, when Pope Leo X. declared Luther a heretic and issued his bull of excommunication against him; Undaunted, however, by this papal threat, Luther publicly burnt the papal bull at Wittenberg on December 10th of the same year.

In 1521 Luther was summoned to appear before the Diet at Worms to defend himself and his doctrines. Demands were made upon him that he recant. However, in the presence of a brilliant assembly of the leaders in church and state, including the Emperor, Luther refused to recant, declaring that unless he were convinced or refuted by Scripture or logical deductions therefrom, he could not and would not recant anything; and he concluded with the memorable words: "Here I stand, I cannot do otherwise; God help me! Amen" Shortly thereafter he was outlawed; a price was set upon his head, necessitating his temporary exile at the Wartburg. Here he began the translation of the Bible, which he completed several years later. In 1525 Luther married Katharina von Bora. His two Catechisms were published in 1529. During the later part of his life he was occupied with the writing of countless books, pamphlets, essays, poems, hymns, and the like, besides continuing his duties as professor and preacher at Wittenberg. His best-known hymn is "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God", which has been translated into more than a hundred languages and dialects. He died peacefully, trusting in His Savior, at Eisleben on February 18, 1546, and was buried in the chapel of the Castle Church in Wittenberg.

Throughout the Protestant world special celebrations are being held this week commemorating the 450th birthday of Luther, the great re-

former, preacher, teacher, orator, author, poet, musician and composer—God's chosen instrument for reforming the church and restoring to the world the saving Gospel in its original truth and purity. Special anniversary stamps, medals, buttons, etc. have been prepared in honor of this great event.

This great anniversary will also be fittingly observed at the local Lutheran Church in two special services. The morning service at 10:30 will be English, that in the afternoon at 3 o'clock will be German. Sunday-school and Bible Class follow the morning worship; choir rehearsal will follow upon the afternoon service. Confirmation instruction will be given at the parsonage Saturday at 2 P. M. A cordial welcome extended to all!

During the week of June 17, 1933, the Herald had a payroll of \$44.25, with four part-time employees. The week of October 14, operating under the NRA banner, we had a payroll of \$92.00, working four employees full time and one part time. This was in addition to two not on a regular weekly payroll. This is the part that the Herald is doing toward the President's recovery program in Perryton, Ochiltree County, the state and the nation.

We have done this in an honest attempt to do our part to better conditions. We are sorry to state that there has been no increase in our business to justify such an increase in operating expenses. This additional payroll expended by us has gone into the cash registers of the business men of Perryton. Such an increase in operating expense cannot continue unless business conditions with us improve, but just as long as we display the Blue Eagle, we are going to live up to it's conditions.

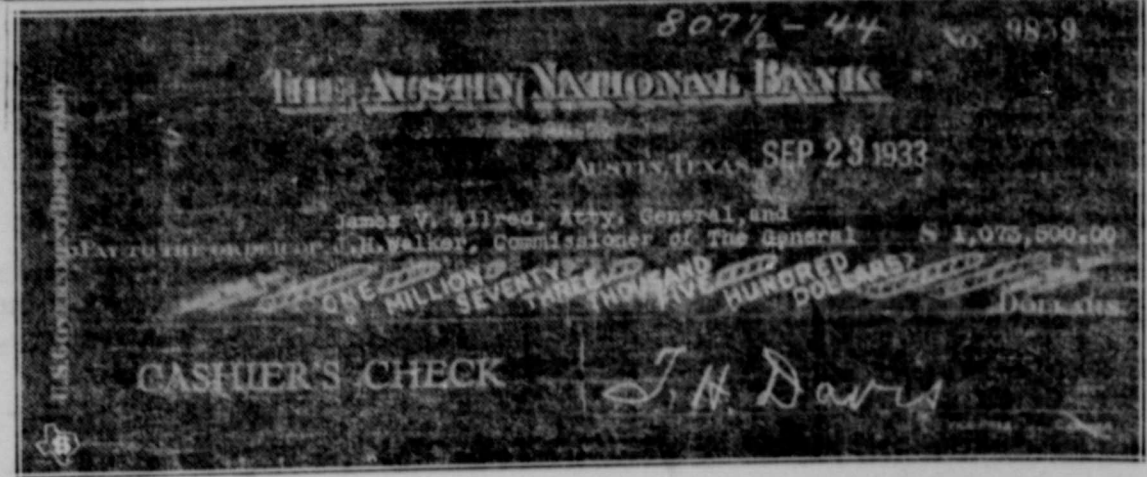
Many times of late we have wondered just what kind of a newspaper many business houses of Perryton expect in return for the scant patronage accorded us. THE '34 AMERICAN LEGION PROGRAM IN A NUTSHELL

MEMBERSHIP—National Commander Edward A. Hayes has expressed the necessity of early membership and of having half the eligibles from the World War in the Legion, with unanimity of thought, then expression, then action, to attain objectives.

REHABILITATION—1—Those disabled in line of duty restored to status prior to March 20, 1933.

2—Government hospitalization for all needy veterans requiring it.

3—Restoration of service connection existing prior to March 20, 1933.

4—Dependent widows and orphans to have government protection.

CHILD WELFARE—Increased aid to needy children of veterans, necessitated by economy reductions.

Ratification of Child Labor Amendment in states where this has not yet been done.

Legislation promoting public health facilities, nationally and state.

Educational campaigns concerning child welfare conditions, facilities, mothers' aid, legal adoption of minors, and assistance to departments in promoting child welfare.

AMERICANISM—Education: Protection from undue economy; promote patriotism, character and health.

Youth activities: Junior baseball, Boy Scouts, C. M. T. C., R. O. T. C., National Boys' week, Junior Rifle Clubs and 4-H Clubs.

Community Service: All posts urged to participate and make annual report.

Immigration: Reduction of quotas by 90 per cent down to 10 per cent allowed under 1924 laws. Urges federal laws excluding alien communists; expulsion of aliens who would overthrow our government or beholden to the Third Nationale. Declares naturalized citizens must bear arms in defense of this country.

Crime—Directs appointment of Law and Order Committee to study problem and devise plans for state and national Legion organizations to participate in curbing crime. Urges law to end sale of machine guns and similar weapons except to military and enforcement authorities.

Russia and subversive groups: Opposes recognition of Soviet Russia. Opposes teaching radical pacifism. Condemns formation of groups holding allegiance to foreign governments.

NATIONAL DEFENSE—Build up navy from third place, and army from 17th place, to provision of London Treaty.

BUY AMERICAN—Promote Buy American movement.

NATIONAL CONVENTION—The 1934 National Convention will be held in Miami, Fla., time and place to be determined by National Executive Committee.

WAR DEBTS—The American Legion is opposed to cancellation of any or all debts or any portion.

WORLD COURT—The American Legion is opposed to the entry of the United States into the League of Nations or to the adherence to the World Court, either with or without reservations.

BOARD OF REVIEW—The spec-

ial Boards of Review should not unduly hasten their decisions. Complete and conscientious consideration should be given to all facts and circumstances pertaining to every claim.

NRA—All departments and posts are called upon to cooperate fully with the NRA in this present emergency.

SOUND DOLLAR—The Legion favors a careful study by our government of the dangers of inflation and it favors a sound American dollar.

TAX EXEMPTION—The Legion demands equitable distribution of the tax burden and elimination of injustices brought about by tax exempt securities.

Farm Flock Important

Ochiltree One Of Seven Counties In State With Average Over 100 Hens To Farm

COLLEGE STATION—"The farm poultry flock will continue to be in the Texas farm picture in the new order of things in spite of the fact that poultrymen have had a harder time making a profit the last two months than at any previous time during the depression," declares E. N. Holmgreen, poultry husbandman in the Extension Service at Texas A and M College.

"Records of hundreds of farm demonstration flocks managed in cooperation with county farm and home demonstration agents show that August and September were particularly bad months for profits because feed prices advanced out of all proportion to poultry prices. Interest in demonstrations is keeping up remarkably well, however, and recent requests by 100 agents for new poultry flock calendars for the new poultry year beginning November 1st indicates that the poultry industry is here to stay."

"The present outlook is not encouraging," according to Mr. Holmgreen. "Fowls in cold storage have increased 200 per cent above those of a year ago, and cold storage eggs have increased more than 50 per cent. In spite of this there is every indication that the small farm flock which has brought in so much grocery money the last few years will not be sold off on most farms," he says.

"Few people realize that egg production per hen has doubled in Texas in the last 15 years," Mr. Holmgreen points out. "That means larger profits per hen at any price level. There may be small reductions in size of flocks but in the main it looks now as though most Texas farmers will keep their flocks on the strength of the timely help the flocks have previously given."

"Texas is a land of small flocks," says Mr. Holmgreen. "There are only seven counties listed in the 1930 census as having an average of more than 100 hens per farm. These counties are Kleberg, Fayette, Lavaca, Deaf Smith, Randall, Ochiltree and Lipscomb. Except for East Texas and part of the West Texas ranch country the rest of the State averages between 50 and 100 hens per farm."

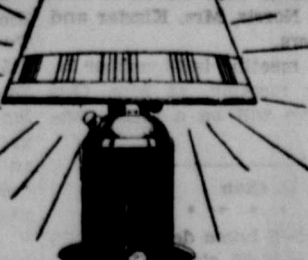

Asks Ruling Repeal

Class B Schools Do Not Want Eight
Semester Rule Investigation
Discloses

Repeal of the eight-semester rule
in athletics is favored by a major-
ity of superintendents of class B
highschools in Texas, it was learned
last week. Superintendent of Per-
ryton schools, W. B. Irvin, sent one
hundred questionnaires to represen-
tative schools throughout the state
and announced that two out of three
favored its repeal.

Mr. Irvin led the fight last year
against the ruling and had most of
the school superintendents behind
him but the Interscholastic League
refused to change it even in the face
of the storm of criticism against
it. The eight semester rule pro-
vides that any high school boy is
ineligible for athletics competition
after he has attended for eight
semesters. This ruling prevails in
twenty-six states.

Chili Recipe
15 pounds meat, ground coarsely
7 cups finely chopped onion
1-2 cup of finely chopped garlic
4 cups of fat
3 3-4 cups chili blend or pepper pulp
1-2 cup of salt
4 teasp. comino seed
4 to 6 quarts of water
Melt fat and fry onions and garlic until golden brown. Add meat and sear until white, then add chili blend, salt, comino seed and water. Cook until consistency to serve. Fill cans within 1-2 inch of the top and seal while hot. Process under 15 pounds pressure. No 1 cans 40 minutes. No 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes.

America Rallies to Save Schools

"Meeting the Emergency in Education" is the theme of American Education Week which is being observed by parents and educators of all degree throughout the United States November 6 to 11.

Facts collected by the Federal Office of Education, National Education Association, and other agencies show that extent of the emergency in education. More than 1,300 rural schools, it is estimated on the basis of recent reports, are closed. More than 100,000 children are being denied that fundamental right of an American citizen—an education.

Parent - teacher associations throughout the United States have adopted the slogan S. O. S., "Save our Schools." The American Federation of Labor has called for support of the schools and brands elimination of kindergartens, especially, as a "form of tragic waste."

The National Education Association, the American Legion, and the Federal Office of Education united in selecting "Meeting the Emergency in Education," as the central subject for this year's 13th annual celebration of American Education. They jointly call upon all citizens and all organizations to look to their schools. We must be vigilant lest our generation make innocent children pay for our follies that brought the depression down upon us.

War Veterans' Problems

Not since the period of the World War has the Red Cross faced a greater problem in handling the claims of World War and other veterans. Due to the changes in the regulations covering veterans' claims, chapters all over the nation have been crowded with veteran applicants for relief and for service in preparing appeals. During last year Red Cross home service workers in 3,268 chapters dealt with the problems of 411,124 ex-service men or their families. The chapters also aided 7,346 men still in the regular army, navy and marine corps.

Toll of the Earthquake

When a severe earthquake killed 15 persons; injured 4,311 and destroyed several thousand homes in Southern California last March, the Red Cross was first upon the ground with emergency relief. It required more than three months for the Red Cross to restore the needy to a self-sustaining basis. The organization expended a relief fund of \$411,000.

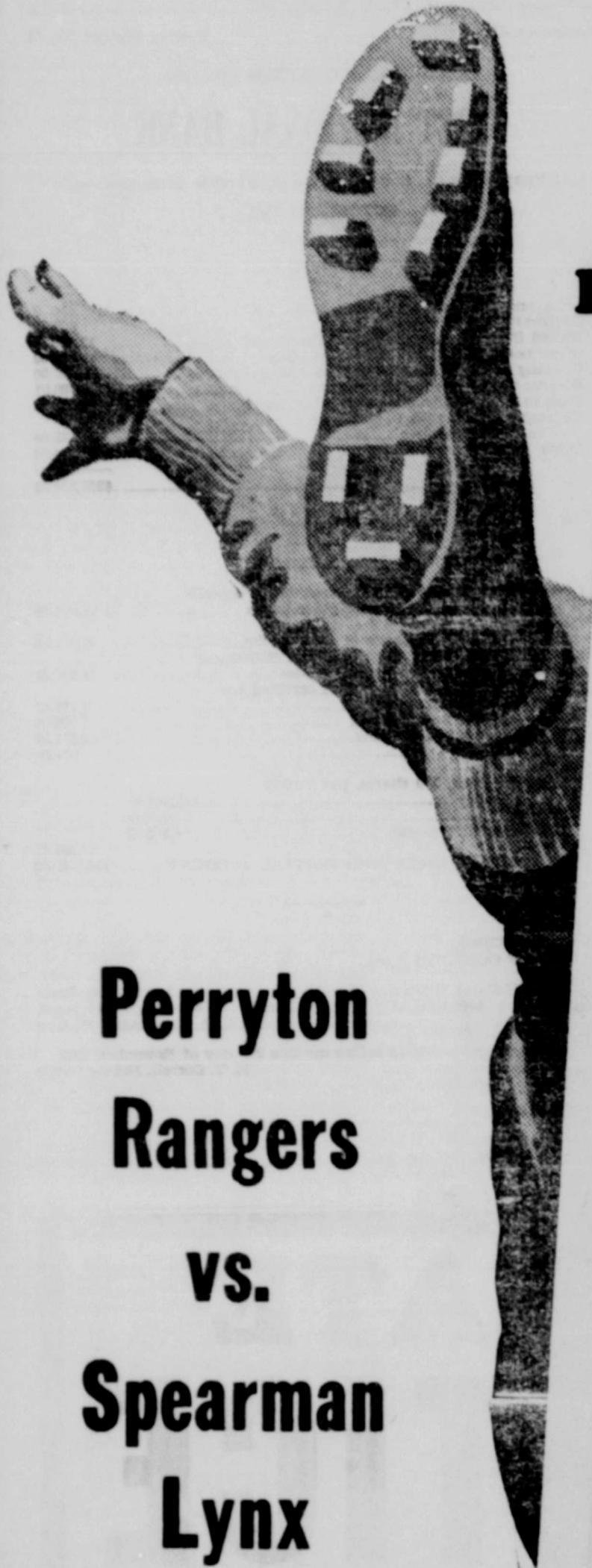

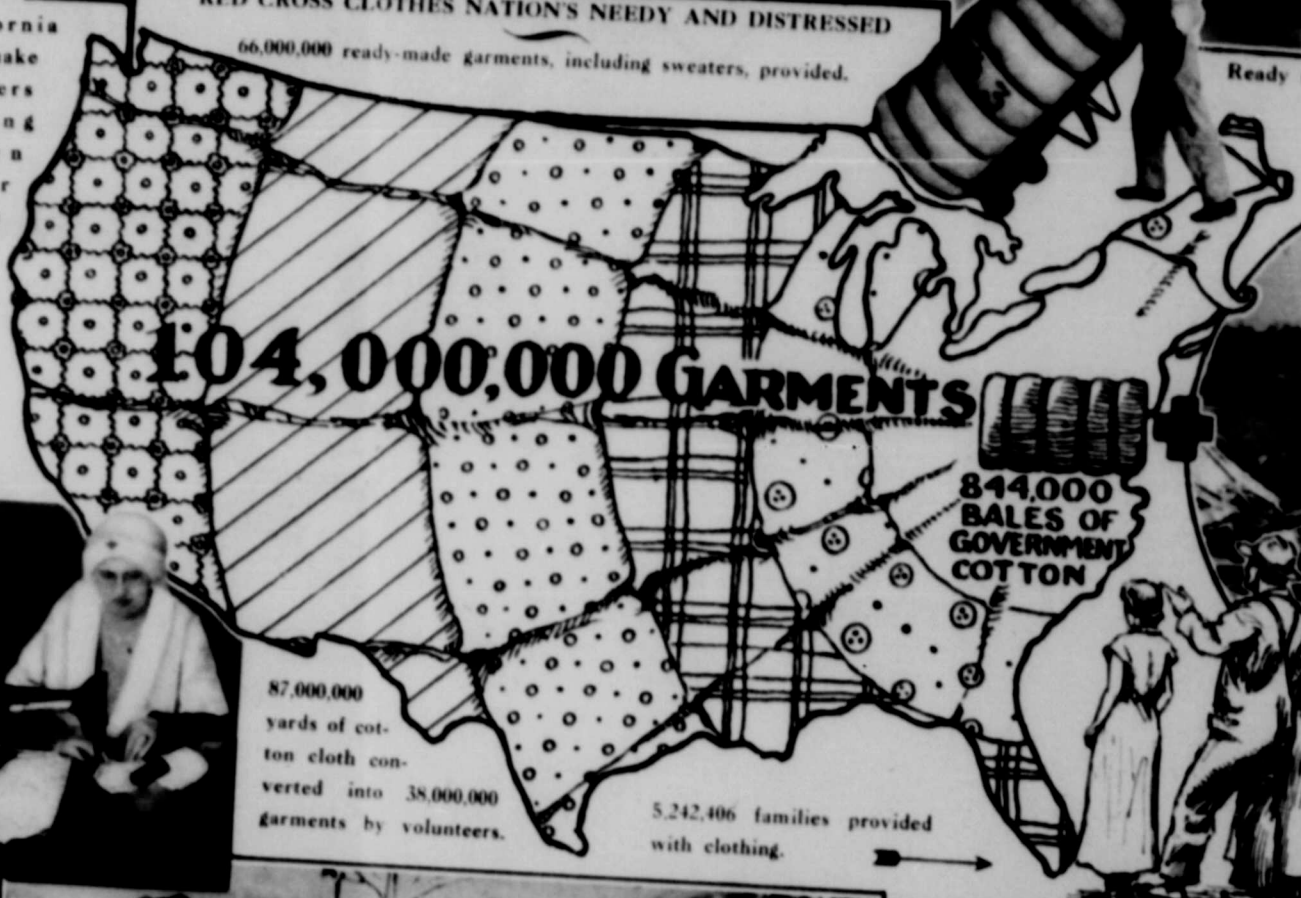

With 85,000,000 bales of government cotton it produced and distributed 10,500,000 barrels of flour to nearly 6,000,000 families, more than 25,000,000 men, women and children. From 844,000 bales of government cotton it produced 104,000,000 garments to help clothe more than 5,000,000 families. 2,627 Chapters expended \$2,428,000 in relief in various forms to the unemployed. 92 disasters in the U. The program will be held in the amphitheatre of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, where the President will lay a wreath at 11 o'clock.

Beaver River Bridge Gives Way As Truck Is Crossing; Road Is Closed

Liberal, Kans.—The Doll Bros. and Ross Garage wreckers have gone to the Beaver river crossing near Boyd, Oklahoma, today in an endeavor to extricate a truck which plunged into the river yesterday morning when the bridge gave away. The river was near flood stage on account of rains and the truck was submerged in the water, only a ripple appearing over where it is lodged in the river bed.

There were two men in the truck when the section of the bridge gave away under it, but fortunately the front end caught for a time on one of the bridge supports and the two were able to climb to safety before it sank into the water. Efforts were made all day yesterday to extricate the truck, with no avail. This morning it had drifted 100 feet east and 70 feet from the north bank of the river.

NRA Compliance Board

Code Violators To Be Reported To District Headquarters At Dallas

Complaints of non-compliance with an approved code of fair competition should be sent to Sherwood H. Avery, Compliance Director of North Texas and Oklahoma, whose offices are at Dallas, Texas, it was announced here today by A. C. Witt, chairman of the Perryton Compliance Board.

Special forms for filing complaints against violators of permanent codes have been furnished postmasters and local NRA Committee. Mr. Witt said. The use of these special forms was urged in order to assure prompt attention to the complaints.

Because of the increase of the number of approved permanent codes, it was necessary that a regional code compliance system be established. Functions of the local Compliance Board will not be altered by Mr. Avery's appointment, Mr. Witt said, since the Boards will continue to handle compliance under the President's Reemployment Agreement and the Director deals with compliance under the permanent codes.

Compliance Boards have no authority to approve or enforce local codes or agreements fixing prices or regulating closing and opening hours, according to instructions received from Washington to Compliance Board Chairmen.

Mr. Witt requests that citizens put a stop to false rumors and report to the Board complaints of violation of the President's Reemployment so that the proper action might be taken. "We are ready to investigate such complaints if people will report them to us. It is harmful to an honest and sincere employer who may be misinformed as to his duties, to have such rumors continue."
