

WISCONSINS SURPRISED AT MAGIC VALLEY

INSPECTION IS MADE
OF AREA; PRAISE
GIVEN GROWTH

(By Associated Press)
HARLINGEN, June 24.—The Magic Valley country, which three days ago produced the world's first bale of 1930 cotton, and back in January sold its cabbage that cost less than \$4 a ton to raise for as high as \$115 a ton, today was seen by its critics, members of the Wisconsin real estate brokers board.

This quasi-official body blacklisted valley lands early this year. It criticized prices paid for valley acreage. Today, members of the board and members of the Wisconsin Manufacturers association, led by the Governor of Texas, Dan Moody, saw acres of orange groves, grapefruit groves, cotton as high as a man's hips, bearing great, white bolls full of fleecy staple; heard stories of the valley's second tomato crop for this year, a crop which will total a million dollars, and stories of \$6 million dollars worth of 1930 development projects in this new empire of the southwest.

The visitors expressed amazement at what they saw, and many of them openly declared their praise for such a growing developing area. The delegation of six Wisconsin men and 23 Texans, will remain over and view the site of the valley's 26-foot port at Point Isabel, which will connect with the Gulf of Mexico and all the seas of the world.

CAMPAIGN ON TO CUT ACCIDENTS

Lubbock is uniting with other cities of the State today in starting a campaign against defective lighting of motor vehicles in an effort to decrease accidents.

State highway and city traffic officers are cooperating in the endeavor. A letter, received here yesterday from L. G. Phares, chief of the State Highway Patrol at Austin, stated that, due to the many accidents occurring daily, all state patrolmen have been instructed to bring into court all violators of the traffic laws as regards improper lighting.

Mr. Phares stated that he had just completed a tour over the state, most of the way driven at night for the purpose of checking up on night driving conditions. He declared that in many instances he witnessed vehicles with improper lighting devices. All drivers are urged to get lights tested, be sure there are two headlights and a tail light. Officers have been instructed to pick up all violators and bring them into court.

Patrolmen of this district are A. L. Ford and Jack Reeves.

Buchanan Will Be Confined To Home

BRENNHAM, June 24.—Congressman John P. Buchanan, candidate for re-election from the 10th congressional district, will be confined to his home for four weeks as the result of injuries sustained Saturday night when the automobile driven by his son collided with another machine on the Austin-Houston road. Buchanan was thrown from the automobile. His injuries consisted mainly of cuts and bruises. Friends will conduct the remainder of his campaign for the democratic congressional nomination, it was said.

SENATE GIVEN FUNDS BILL

HOUSE GIVES APPROVAL
TO MEASURE FOR
EXPENDITURES

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 24.—Carrying \$67,712,000 for contingencies in government operation, including \$10,660,000 for work on Boulder Canyon dam and \$25,000,000 for public buildings, the second deficiency bill has been passed by the house and sent to the senate.

An allotment of \$250,000 for the Hoover law enforcement commission, was stricken from the bill on a point of order by Representative LaGuardia, republican, New York, on the ground there was no law authorizing the appropriation. With it, went a reapportionment of \$80,000 of unexpended funds.

To Settle War Claims
The measure carried authority for the expenditure of \$51,000,000 for the settlement of war claims to Germany and Austria awarded by the mixed and tri-partite claims commissions.

An allotment of \$1,000,000 was made for Porto Rican relief, and a similar amount for extension of agricultural co-operative work to encourage farmers to avail themselves of the Federal Farm Board facilities.

The sum of \$4,766,497 was set aside for penal institutions, \$1,700,000 being allotted for a new penitentiary in the northeastern states.

GRAF ZEPPELIN CASTS ASIDE ROLE OF MATRON FOR THAT OF FLAPPER AS SUN CAUSES SHIP TO ACQUIRE BOUYANCY

BERLIN, June 24.—The Graf Zeppelin, which Germans call "she" and have credited with matronly steadfastness, paid the world power conference a visit Monday after indulging in a caprice of the sky in which her role of matron was abandoned for that of flapper.

It was the sun's fault. Warned by its rays at Hamburg yesterday the dirigible's silver nose acquired unusual buoyancy. It suddenly tipped into the air, and in a moment the dirigible itself rose high from the ground with only a few of its crew aboard and with officers and 45 passengers left startled and apprehensive behind.

Could Not Land
Captain Hans Lehmann and the passengers watched the ship above them expecting it to be brought back to earth, but while it cruised about over the city, the crew radioed that there was still excessive buoyancy, and that they would be unable to land again.

The ship made off for Berlin and Captain Lehmann, frightened by this new test in his beauty's character, followed in an airplane which carried \$1,000,000 for federal jails, one to be at Detroit, and another at El Paso, Texas.

The measure provided \$250,000 for a hydraulic laboratory and \$100,000 for the Theodore Roosevelt school at Fort Apache, Arizona.

Dawson Unemployed Total 242 Persons

LAMESA, June 24.—(Special)—Unemployed in Dawson county number 242 persons, according to preliminary figures given out by Dr. Irwin Barr, district census supervisor for this section. People out of work represent a small percentage in this county's population of 13,500.

Harris Resigns As Plainview Rector

PLAINVIEW, June 24.—(Special)—Charles Harris has resigned as rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church of Plainview, effective July 1st. He has accepted the rectorship of the Christ church, Central City, Nebraska.

Mr. Harris' successor has not yet been named.

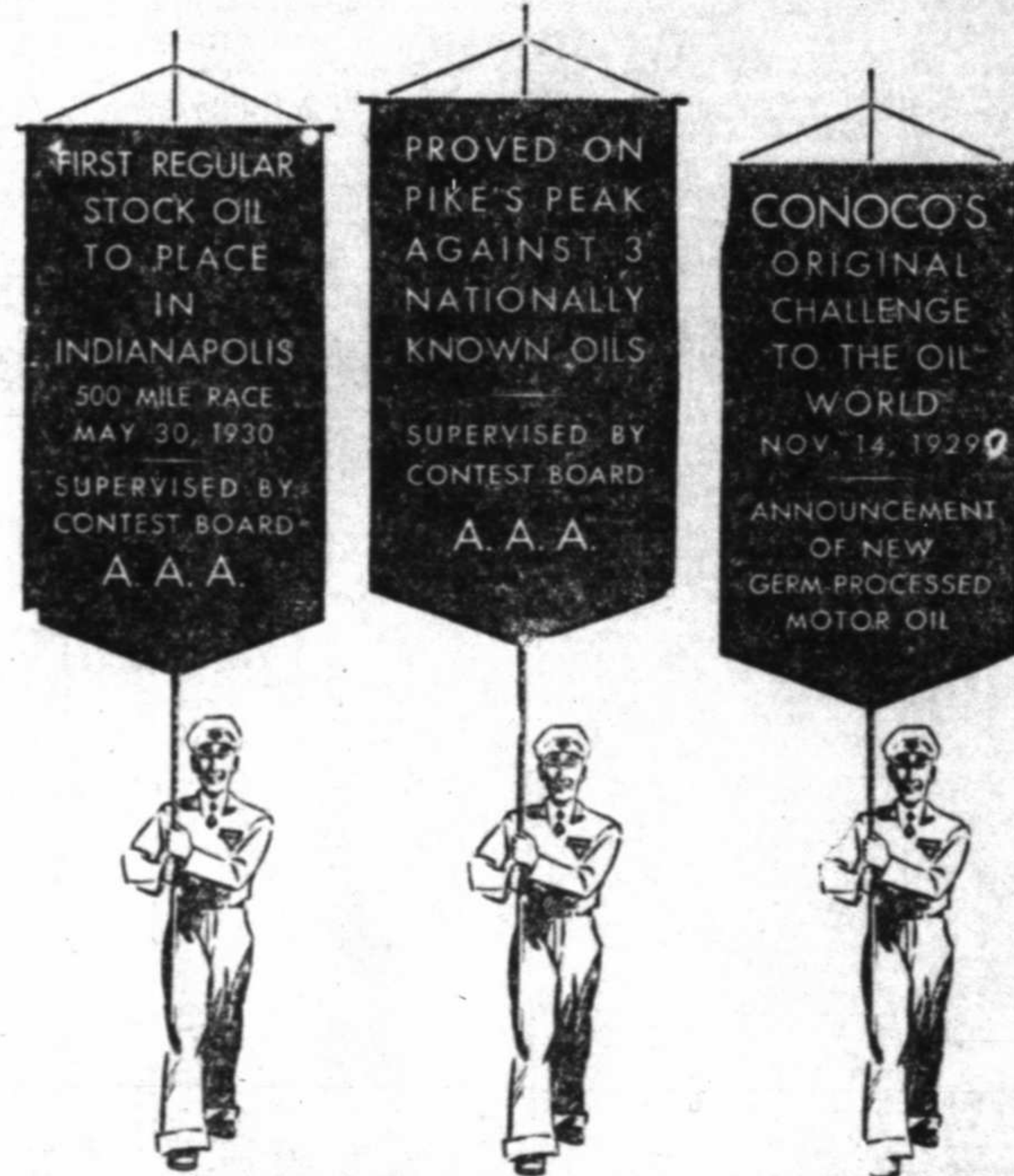

TEXAS LIKELY TO MOVE INTO THIRD PLACE

CENSUS REPORTS SHOW FIRST 13 STATES WITH INCREASES

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Sampling every section except the fast-growing southwest, the first thirteen states reporting in the 1930 census showed a 12.9 per cent increase over their 1920 populations.

This figure probably is a fairly close approximation of the rate at which the United States is growing, since the increase of the previous decade was 14.9 per cent, and some slowing up might be expected from the immigration restriction of the past decade.

However, California, not included in the count, anticipates a total population of about 5,573,000 a 65.5 per cent increase and Texas is looking toward the 6,000,000 mark which would mean a 25 per cent increase.

These two up-and-coming states seem certain to cause some shifting in the ranks of the big ten, ranked in 1920 as follows: New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ohio, Texas, Massachusetts, Michigan, California, Missouri, New Jersey. Texas may vie with Ohio, but cannot hope to outdistance Illinois, already secure in her third place.

Swisher's Population Totals 7,344 People

PLAINVIEW, June 24. (Special)—Swisher county's population is 7,344, according to a preliminary count of the 1930 census announced by O. M. Unger, of Plainview, district supervisor. This compares with 4,388 in 1920. The county has gained 2,956 inhabitants, increasing in the ten year period its population by 65 per cent.

There were 1,923 farms in Swisher county this year compared with 770 in 1920, and 108 unemployed persons at the time of the census.

Frozen-egg plants in Shanghai, China, are operating at capacity, with 1,630,283, a 17.6 per cent increase, the highest thus far officially reported.
