

Ninth Annual Stock Show Activities Now Underway

Judging in the Lynn County Livestock Show for 1986 will get underway today (Thursday) at 6 p.m. when the steer judging opens the show, which actually began Wednesday with weighing of steers and lambs. Lamb judging will begin at 7 p.m. The ninth annual event is

dedicated to the memory of Ray Adams, a promoter of the show since its inception and a familiar "ring man" at the auction sale. Adams' widow, Nan, will be presented a plaque by the association.

The biggest part of the show, the barrow competition, will take

place at 9 a.m. Friday. Also, at 11 a.m. Friday will be judging in the baked goods division. Baked items will then go on sale at 3 p.m.

The Pee Wee Barrow Show for children under nine years of age is scheduled for approximately 4 p.m. or 30 minutes after the barrow judging is completed (Barrows will be furnished).

Barbecue Planned

At 11:30 a.m. Saturday the popular barbecue luncheon will begin, with serving to continue for at least an hour.

Immediately following the barbecue will be the annual sale of animals and presentation of awards. The auction always is a big event with the results showing the youngsters how their efforts are appreciated by business and individuals in this agricultural area.

State Law Prohibits Following Emergency Vehicles On Duty

Recently several concerned citizens have mentioned that traffic in areas where an emergency exists is creating a dangerous situation.

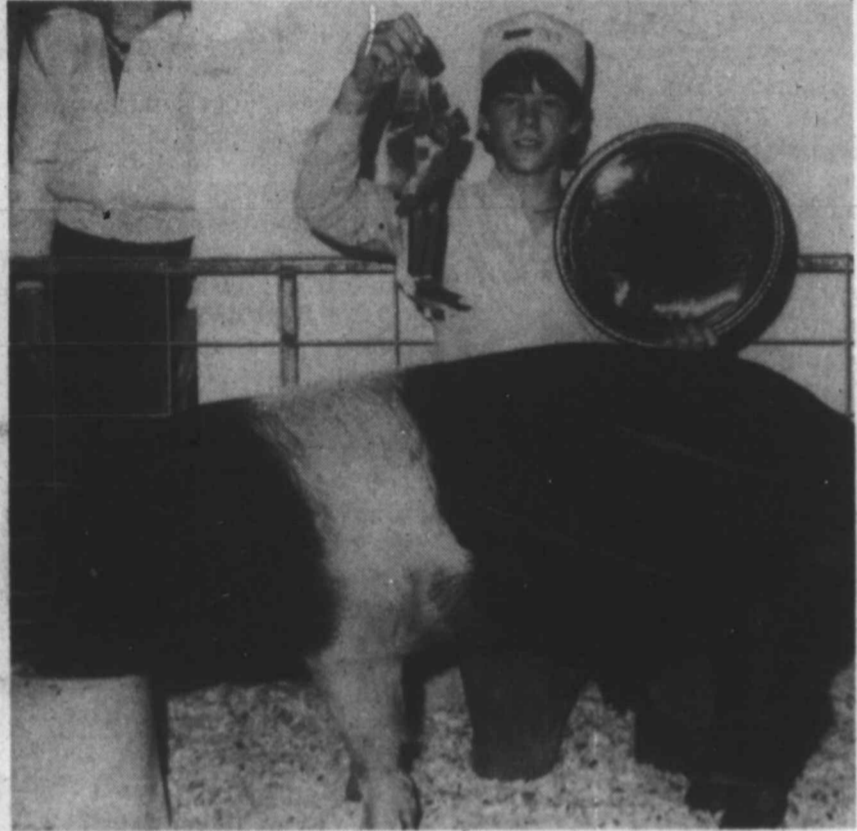
Fire Chief J.T. Miller asks all residents to please keep in mind that often times emergency equipment and trained fire fighters need room to work and move about in an emergency, without being restricted by traffic or well-meaning onlookers.

The Tahoka Police Department has received several complaints in reference to the following of fire trucks and Lynn County ambulance on emergency calls in violation of Texas Motor Vehicle Law Article XIII, Section 100: As follows:

The driver of any vehicle other than one on official business shall not follow any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm closer than 500 feet or drive into or park such vehicle within the block where the fire apparatus has stopped to answer a fire alarm.

(b) No driver of a vehicle, except a driver on official business, may follow closer than 500 feet behind an ambulance when the flashing red lights of the ambulance are operating. No driver of a vehicle may drive or park his vehicle at a place where an ambulance has been summoned for an emergency call in a manner calculated to interfere with the arrival or departure of the ambulance.

The police department, fire department and ambulance personnel ask that everyone be on the lookout for emergency vehicles.

Rural Burglary, Theft Investigated

Lynn County officials investigated a burglary at the residence of Donald Basinger located at the intersection of FM 211 and FM 212 sometime Saturday or Sunday. It was reported that a prybar was used to pry the lock off a shop door to gain entry to the building. Several large shop tools were reported missing including a portable air compressor and a stationary air compressor, two air tanks, sockets and other related tools.

Don Porterfield reported to county officials that a tractor was stolen from his farm located 10 miles east of Tahoka on U.S. 380 during the night of Jan. 17 or early morning of Jan. 18. Reported missing was a 1974 John Deere 4430 which had been loaded on a trailer. Crime Line is offering a \$500 reward for information on this incident.

Police investigated an accident on Monday at South 5th and Ave. J that involved a 1971 Pontiac driven by James W. Jolly of Rt. 4, Tahoka, and a 1978 Chevrolet driven by Opal Martin of Hobbs, N.M. No injuries were reported. "Both drivers were wearing seat belts, otherwise they could have been injured as heavy damage occurred to the vehicles, stated Police Chief Gary Morrison.

Jailed during the past week include one each for attempted murder, DWI second offense and driving while license suspended and one for public intoxication.

Rep. Steve Carriker Seeks Re-Election

Seventy-eight District State Representative Steven A. Carriker announced that he has filed for re-election to his seat in the Legislature, thus ending speculation in the state press that he might seek higher office. "My strongest interest lies in continuing to do the best possible job for the people of my district and the most effective place to do that is in the Texas Legislature," Carriker said.

Representative Carriker is currently serving a four-year term on the Democratic National Committee and was elected Majority Whip of the Texas House last January. Since last May when the Democratic Chairman went to the Senate in a special election, Carriker has been head of the House Democratic Caucus, the only sophomore member ever to hold that position.

Serving on the House Agriculture Committee, Carriker has been responsible for a number of measures important to West Texas. Among those are the Farm and Ranch Security Program legislation, legislation to insure free access to highways by farm machinery, and the "Buy Texas First" law which requires state agencies to support Texas agricultural products by giving them first preference in state purchasing. He also serves as chairman of the Texas Department of Agriculture Farm Credit Task Force where he has been vocal in his opposition to proposals to drain Texas credit to prop up troubled banks elsewhere. As Agricultural Water Subcommittee Chairman, the results of his field hearings held at Texas Tech were incorporated into the state water plan.

On the House Elections committee Carriker was the tie-breaking vote in getting a bill to establish a direct Presidential Primary for Texas voters to the floor of the House.

Carriker has earned high marks from the state's teacher organizations and gives much of the credit to his wife Kathy, on leave from her own career in teaching while their young daughters are still at home. He sponsored legislation on teacher's behalf to insure them of fair compensation for extra work under the tutorials law.

Kathy and Steve have two daughters, Karen, 3; and Stephanie, 1, and a son, Jacob, who is in the fifth grade. They live on the family farm in Fisher County where Steve grows cotton and grain and raises beef cattle on a 1700 acre operation.

HPUWCD To Measure Water Level In Aquifer

High Plains Water District personnel will be making their annual depth-to-water level measurements in the District's network of more than 950 water

level observation wells to determine what effects this past year's irrigation pumpage had on the water level in the Ogallala aquifer.

This measurement determines the distance from the land surface to the water table. Wells in the observation well network are located at a density of approximately one well per square mile. The wells, which are privately owned, will be tagged with the well number and the water-level measurement as readings are completed.

The Water District's staff will use the information gathered through this measuring effort to update water table evaluation maps and maps showing the saturated thickness of the Ogallala aquifer.

In Lynn County, Obbie Goolsby will be making the readings in a total of 40 wells.

Lewis Spears Elected To Membership In American Angus Assn.

Lewis Spears of Tahoka has been elected to the membership in the American Angus Association, according to Dick Spader, executive vice president of the national organization with headquarters in St. Joseph, Missouri.

The American Angus Assn., with over 30,000 active adult and junior members, is the largest beef cattle registry association in the world.

Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and 52, staples 31 and 32, mike 35-49 at around 150 to 200 points over 1985 loan rates. This was slightly above last week's prices, said Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock. Higher grades and longer staples traded near loan levels.

Abundant available supplies were reduced sharply around January 1 when Commodity Credit loan entries accelerated. Many growers, discouraged with current market prices, chose the loan rather than sell, Bennett continued.

Meanwhile, with harvesting virtually completed and ginning finished at most gin locations, the Lubbock office classed 15,000

samples during the week ended Thursday, Jan. 16. This brought the season's total to 1,167,000 and compares with 1,393,000 classed by the same date last year.

The week's predominant grades were grade 42 at 47 percent and grade 52 at 29 percent. About 31 percent was reduced one grade because of bark.

Predominant staples were staple 31 at 38 percent followed by staple 32 at 28 percent and staple 33 at 16 percent. The average was 31.66 thirty-seconds of an inch.

Mike 35-49 accounted for 59 percent, 33-34 was 20 percent, 30-32 amounted to 14 percent and 27-29 was 4 percent. The average was 3.5.

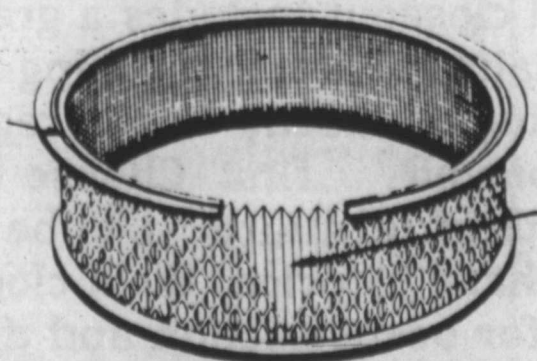

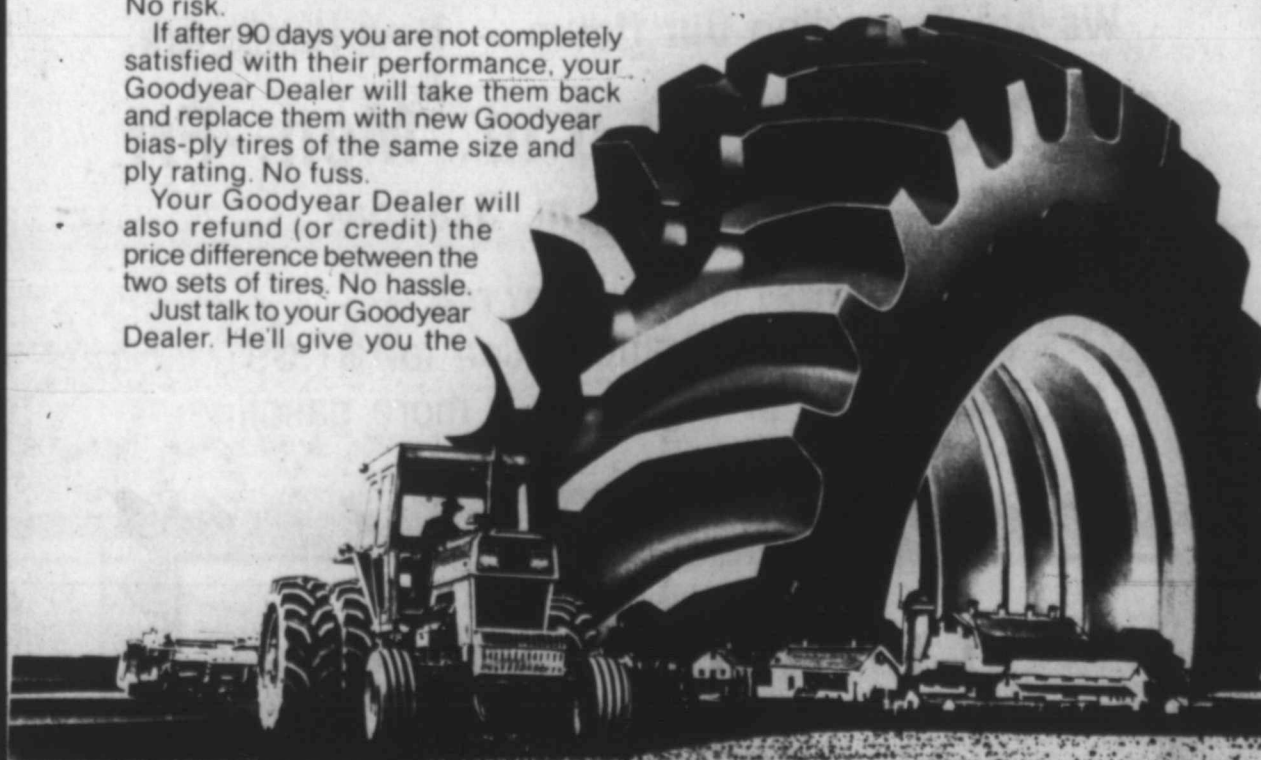

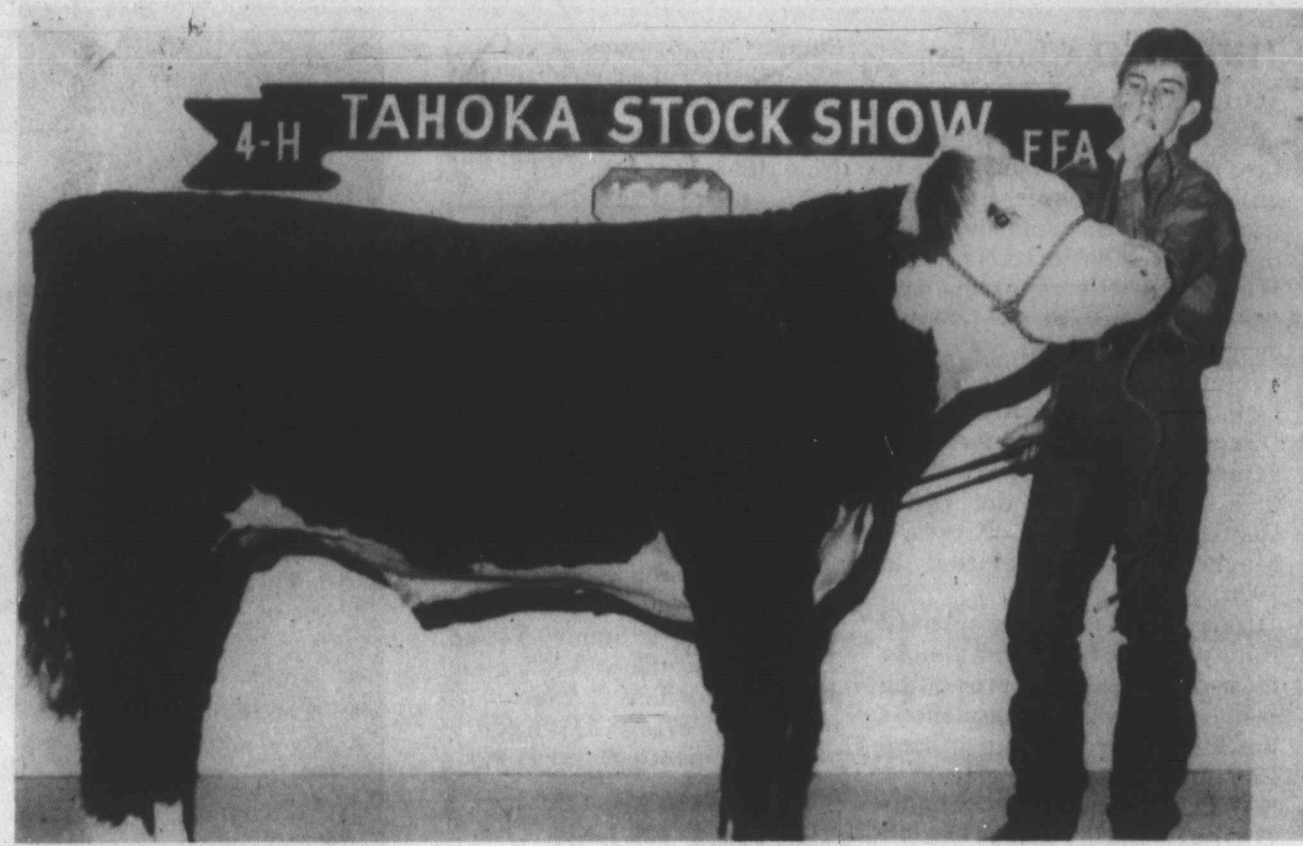
E.L. Edwards
