Cisco To Crack Down On Liquor Sales In City

City officials, pastors, and private citizens in Cisco, and the Sheriff of Eastland County, J. F. Tucker, are working on a crack-down in Cisco, in an effort to rid that city of alleged illicit sales of whiskey and beer.

The citizens met with Cisco's city commissioners under the auspices of the Cisco Ministerial Association.

A spokesman for the citizens, the Rev. Ralph T. Wooton, pastor of the First Baptist Church, said a petition had been submitted to the city, asking that an alleged bootlegging establishment located near one of the city's schools be closed permanently.

"We realize," the spokesman said, "that if this country is to recover and continue its existence, individual citizens must begin such 'grass roots' movements as this."

The minister told the commissioners, "We are dealing with principles rather than personalities as our major concern and in doing so we come as the result of a spontaneous uprising in the spirit of cooperation."

Eastland County Sheriff J. B. Tucker, present at the meeting, told the citizens his department had raided the establishment mentioned in the petition, 30 times during the past year.

District Liquor Control Board Supervisor L. C. Bowman of Abilene has pledged support in halting liquor sales here, the Rev. Wooton said.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal, Police Chief M. L. Perdue and County Attorney Joe Nussle were present.

New Locations For Eastland; Many New Tests

Eastland county is getting far oil play at this time with a number of new tests and locations being announced from all sections of the county. Malco Refineries No. 1 A. N. Prince is to be a 2,900 cable tool test 3 1/2 miles south of Nimrod.

Jack-Chamberlain's No. 1 Mrs. M. E. Moss, 1 mile west of Olden, is drilling at 1650 feet. This well is to be drilled to the Ranger sand. J. & M. Drilling Co. is the drilling contractor.

Shirley & Venuto will drill No. 1-A C. V. Fox as a 1450 cable tool test, seven miles southeast of Ranger.

Water Bond Election Will Be Called At An Early Date; No Opposition Has Been Shown

Following a business session of Directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District, in Ranger late last week, it was officially announced yesterday, that good progress is being made with reference to the construction of a large dam to be built in this county. Preliminary work, such as clearing for minor, yet important details, is going forward as rapidly as could be expected, it is said.

Engineers are completing minute details, and have made reports to the committee. At this time it seems that the total cost for the dam, pump and filtration station

and pipe lines together with labor and other items will amount to something like \$1,500,000, and the Bond issue will be for this amount.

This, of course, will be divided between Eastland and Ranger, as both cities will call special elections to vote the bonds.

Just when the election will be called cannot be said at this time, though directors are working in an effort to have the election as soon as possible.

A public meeting will be called within a few days in both the cities.

Mayor And Commission Express Gratitude To Firefighters Sat.

In an interview today Mayor Price Crawley expressed his personal, and on behalf of the City Commission, appreciation and sincere thanks to the Ranger Fire Department, both the regular Department and the Volunteer Department for their splendid work in fighting the Arcadia Theatre fire on last Saturday.

While the theatre was a total loss, they stated that in their opinion the Departments did a fine job in confining the fire to that one building. Mayor Crawley said that he had been advised by experienced fire fighters that it was rarely possible to confine such a large fire to one building when it was immediately adjacent to buildings on either side, and the fact that it was done in this case indicates that the various Fire Departments really did a fine piece of work.

Crawley said that it would be impossible to single out any particular member, or members of the Departments for individual recognition of their work.

They also expressed their sincere appreciation of the help received from Lone Star, through the work of Ed Harper, Archie Robinson and others from the Lone Star. They were also very high in their praise of the Eastland, Breckenridge and Cisco Fire Departments for their excellent cooperation in making the run from our neighboring towns, and for their efficiency in fighting the fire after they arrived upon the scene.

Mayor Crawley expressed regret that the new booster fire truck which was on order at the time of this fire had not arrived. The booster, which is a completely new Chevrolet two-ton truck, with new pump and tank for 400 gallons of water should be delivered within the next week or ten days. The Commission has also been considering ways and means of purchasing a new 750 gallon per minute pump to replace the old 1925 model American LaFrance we now have.

Mayor Crawley again emphasized that the entire Volunteer Fire Department responded wonderfully and could not be given too much credit in holding the loss to the one building.

Federal Jury Names Three For Tax Fraud

SAN ANTONIO, Mar. 18 (UP)—Two Houston men and one from Galveston have been indicted for income tax evasion by a federal grand jury at San Antonio. Among 26 indictments voted by the panel are bills against Frank S. Simmons of Houston, for tax discrepancies in 1945 through 1947; Orville C. Scheer, president of Scheer and Company of Houston, who is charged with evasions for the same years; and Benjamin S. Brown of Galveston, charged with evasions for the years 1945 through 1948. Federal prosecutors say the evasions will total "thousands of dollars."

Twisters Hit At Mineral Wells And Wichita Falls

Freak weather capers hit Texas last night, bringing winds up to 120 miles per hour, two small tornadoes and numerous thunderstorms. The capers were caused by the passage of a warm front, squall line and two cold fronts in quick succession. The storms upset utility services in numerous cities, damaged rooftops and trees, scattered hail on young crops and wiped out air travel with dust clouds in some West Texas points. Dust cut visibility to zero in parts of West Texas and almost as low over the entire western half of the state.

One of the tornadoes dipped into the northwest fringe of Wichita Falls last night, flattened a warehouse and several small out-buildings, and scratched the roof off several others. There were no reports of injuries. Another "baby tornado" hit at Mineral Wells, causing some damage to property, but also failed to bring injuries to anyone. Hail fell at Stamford in West Texas, and some hail fell at Mineral Wells. The 120-mile winds blew at Guadalupe Pass, where high winds are not uncommon. Elsewhere, scattered thunderstorms hit a wide area, snapping telephone poles in the Fort Hood area, and power lines in San Antonio. Some light wind-storm damage was reported in Fort Worth and Dallas.

And weather conditions have postponed the scheduled airlift of 9,000 soldiers from South Carolina to Temple. The men, members of the 31st (Dixie) Division were to be transported to the Fort Hood area today as a part of operation Long Horn. Fifty military transports had been scheduled to take off at dawn today from Shaw Air Force Base in the initial flight of the largest air movement of troops in U.S. history. Brig. Gen. Lacey A. Morrow of the 18th Air Force ordered the postponement because of a squall line moving across the south east from Texas. The flight is expected to start at 3 a.m. tomorrow.

AF Thunderjets Set New Record For Jet Flight

NEUBERG, Germany, March 18 (UP)—Two United States Air Force Thunderjets have completed what air experts say is probably the longest sustained jet flight in aviation history.

The F-84 Thunderjets landed at Neuberg, Germany, today after a 2800-mile flight without refueling. The flight spanned seven nations and took four hours and 48 minutes, indicating an average speed of almost 585 miles an hour.

The two planes took off from a United States air base at Neuberg; then flew over Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Italy, France, Britain and Belgium, and returned to Neuberg.

The pilots are Major Robert Korp of Reading, Penn., and First Lt. Larry Kilgus of Salt Lake City, Utah.

Prisoners Escape Florida Jail In Movie Type Break

PENSACOLA, Fla., Mar. 18 (UP)—Three prisoners overpowered a guard today at the Escambia County Jail in Pensacola, Florida, then freed a red-haired woman prisoner and escaped.

The men bound and gagged jailer J. H. Holman early this morning and locked him in a cell. They looted a jail safe before they fled. Sheriff R. L. Kennericks says the three men are armed and dangerous. He won't comment on where they go their weapons, but says he has "an idea."

The woman fugitive is Mrs. W. G. McQuigg, who was being held on 12 charges of forgery. She was recently returned to Pensacola from Huntsville, Texas, where she was arrested.

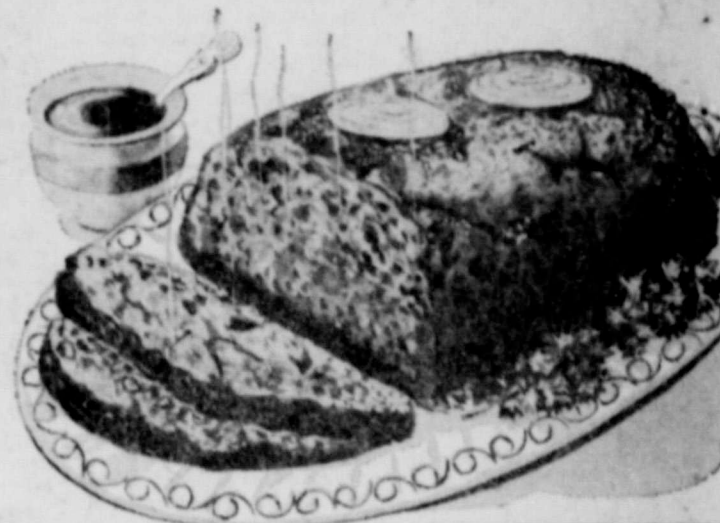

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the District on the 1st day of April, 1952, for the purpose as set forth in the resolution adopted by the Board of Directors on the 1st day of March, 1952, which is as follows:

"RESOLUTION
BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT, CALLING AN ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING THREE DIRECTORS OF SAID DISTRICT. THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held on April 1, 1952, in Eastland County Water Supply District, as created by House Bill No. 888, passed by the Fifty-first Legislature, for the purpose of electing three (3) directors of said District.

2. For the purpose of said election, Eastland County Water Supply District is divided into two election precincts. All of the territory of the District contained in the City of Ranger shall be known as the "Ranger Precinct," and all of the territory of the District contained in the City of Eastland shall be known as the "Eastland Precinct."

(a) The election in the Ranger Precinct shall be held at the Chamber of Commerce, in the City of Ranger, Texas. Lee Dockery is hereby appointed as Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two (2) clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(b) The election in the Eastland Precinct shall be held at the County Court-house, in the City of Eastland, Texas. Billy C. Frost is hereby appointed as Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two (2) clerks to assist him in holding said election.

Only qualified voters residing in Eastland County Water Supply District who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

3. C. B. Pruet, P. M. Kuykendall and L. E. McGraw, have made application to this Board to have their names printed on the ballot and such applications are hereby granted. The ballots, however, shall be large enough to permit the writing in of other names.

4. The ballots for said election shall be printed in substantially the following form:

"OFFICIAL BALLOT"
C. B. Pruet, Director
P. M. Kuykendall, Director
L. E. McGraw, Director.

Each voter shall leave on the ballot the names of the three candidates for whom he desires to vote. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.

5. No person shall be elected a director unless he resides in and owns taxable property in the District. No member of the governing body of the City of Ranger and no employee of said City shall be elected a director. Likewise, no member of the governing body of the City of Eastland and no employee of said City shall be elected a director.

6. Notice of said election shall be given by publishing a copy of this order in the Ranger Daily Times and the Eastland Telegram, newspapers of general circulation published within said District one time each, such publication to be at least ten (10) days before the date herein set for said election.

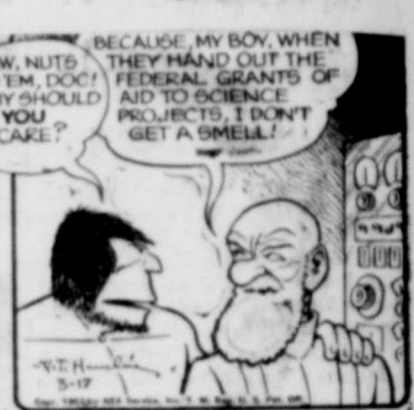

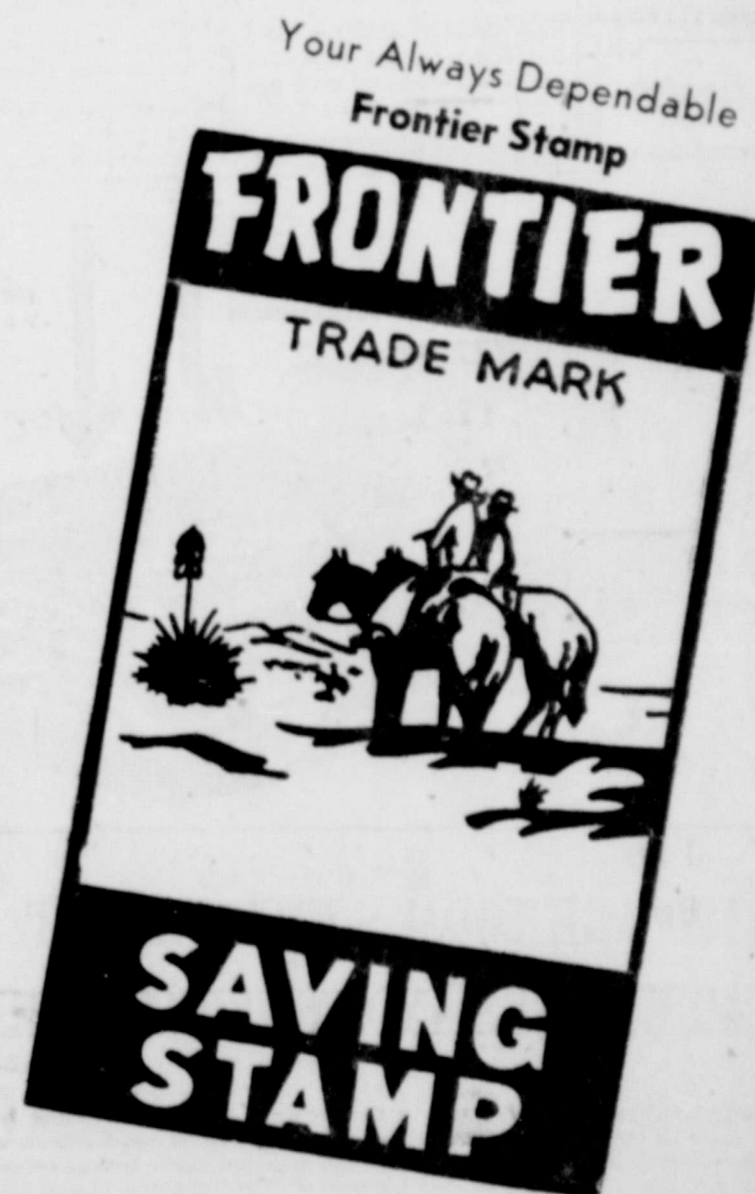

Oilmen Will Hear General Johnson On March 28 At Sixth Annual Meet

AUSTIN, March 16 Brigadier General Alfred H. Johnson, chairman and executive secretary of the Munitions Board Joint Petroleum Committee and chief of the Office of Petroleum Programs, will be the dinner speaker at the sixth annual meeting of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association in Fort Worth March 28.

General Johnson, an outspoken defender of a free enterprise petroleum industry who is lavish in his praise for its initiative and far-sightedness in making possible oil for all needs in peace and war, will discuss the role of petroleum in the defense program.

His military career, practically all of which has been devoted to the development of aviation from which both civilian and military aviation has profited, was launched in 1922. Today he holds the rating of command pilot.

During the 1930's General Johnson was one of the pioneers in high altitude flying, assisting in the development of the turbo-supercharger and pressure cabin air planes which are used universally in commercial and civilian aviation today. In 1936 he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for development and flight testing of the first successful pressure cabin aircraft.

During the War he headed the procurement, production and inspection of Air Force material in Ohio, Michigan, and Canada. He later was assigned to the Strategic Bombing Survey in the European Theater surveying the German aircraft industry. Near the close of hostilities in Europe he was transferred to the Far East Air Forces and was stationed in Manila until July 1946. Leaving the Philippines, General Johnson next served as commanding officer of the Okinawa Air Material Area until January 1947 when he was made assistant chief of staff, A-4, Far Eastern Air Force Headquarters in Tokyo.

In October 1949 he was named chief of the Industrial Planning Division and after the outbreak of the Korean fighting became chief of Production Resources Division which is responsible for expanding aircraft production base to take care of the growing demands of the Air Force.

General Johnson was born in North Dakota. He married Mary McCaskell, daughter of a prominent San Antonio lawyer, in 1927. Since that time he has considered Texas his home state.
