Poppies Ready at V. A. Hospitals for Texas People to Wear Memorial Day

Poppies which the people of Texas will wear in honor of the war dead on Memorial Day, are being shipped from the Legion Hospital in Kerrville and the Veterans Administration Hospital in Waco, where the little red flowers are being made by disabled veterans of both world wars, working under supervision of the Texas Department of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Shown in the picture are: Guy Bridges (in wheel-chair), World War II Veteran, who has been making poppies for four years

while in the Legion Hospital and Philip Whittlesey (in bed), World War I Veteran, who has been making poppies for several years while in the hospital there.

"Making these flowers has provided interesting employment for veterans at the hospitals during the winter and spring months," explained Mrs. Frank Sheffield, Poppy Chairman of the Department. "It has helped keep their hands and minds busy, relieving them of long hours of tedium and contributing its occupational therapy value toward their recovery."

"Poppies making has given these veterans the encouraging experience of being able to earn money again, often after many months of idleness. They are paid by the Auxiliary for each poppy they make and are able to earn helpful amounts during the poppy-making season."

"Much of the money is sent home by the veterans to help support their wives and children, who often have a difficult time when the veterans require hospitalization and are unable to work for long periods. It gives the veterans a decided lift in moral when they are able to send something to their families. Those without dependents use the money to create a nest egg for themselves against the day when they leave the hospitals and endeavor to re-establish themselves in life."

"The poppies are fashioned by hand, veterans working in their beds, in wheel chairs or in occupational therapy shops. Materials are provided by the Auxiliary and the finished products collected regularly by Auxiliary workers. The flowers are made of crepe paper in replica of the little wild poppies of France and Flanders, which grew on the battlefields and cemeteries of the two world wars."

Remains of Pvt. William Shields Being Returned

The body of Pvt. William L. Shields, who was killed in Germany, April 13, 1945, by mortar shell fire, has been returned to the United States for reburial. Funeral arrangements will be announced later by his family.

Pvt. Shields, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy L. Smith of Mosquito, N. M. and formerly of Morton, was born on May 31, 1922 in Hailleyville, Okla. He attended Meadow High School and prior to entering the service in August, 1944 made his home in Terry County, Texas.

Pvt. Shields left the States in March, 1945, after receiving his basic training at Camp Crowder, Mo. He received the marksman-ship and good conduct medals, also the purple heart.

Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy L. Smith, Mosquito, N. M.; and his brother, Walter W. Shields, of Morton.

Land Commissioner, Bascom Giles, has announced that sealed bids will be accepted until 10 A. M. June 7 on certain areas of public school surveyed and submerged lands authorized for leasing for oil and gas development by the School Land Board.

Giles, who is chairman of the Land Board, said the opening of bids will begin immediately after the deadline.

Further information concerning the tracts offered for leasing may be secured from the General Land Office.

Among the offered tracts, 320 acres 14 miles south, 5 miles east, in the Public School Land Grant.

Very little planting has been done in Cochran county and farmers are all hoping now for some sunshine so that they may get cotton planted next few days.

Rainfall for Year Now Totals 9.50 Inches in Morton

Sudden downpours of rain Thursday night and Sunday night gave Morton a total of 1.01 inches of moisture for the week-end. Showers were hard but did not last long at a time.

Rainfall here so far this year has amounted to 9.50 inches, which compares with 4.35 inches received last year from January 1 through the month of May. Total rainfall for Morton for 1948 was only 14.01 inches.

The rainfall this year by months has been as follows: January, 2.56; February, .15; March, none; April, 3.33; May, up to this time, 3.46. This gives Morton a total of 9.50 inches.

Soil Conservation Supervisor to be Elected at Meeting Monday, May 23

There will be a meeting at the Neely Ward School house Monday evening, May 23 at 8:00 p. m. to elect a Soil Conservation Supervisor for sub-district 2 of the Cochran, Yoakum and Terry County Soil Conservation District.

A program of music and information is being planned and the people of precincts 3 and 4 are urged to attend. At the close of the meeting the election will be held by secret ballot. All resident land owners over 21 years of age and their wives are eligible to vote.

The program will be of interest to tenants as well as land owners.

To those who would like to know just what soil conservation districts and District Supervisors are here is a clear cut definition given in the Soil Conservation law. Districts are civil subdivisions of our State Government. They are created by land owners for the benefit of the land that they own. The boundaries and names are determined by the people who create them. Two-thirds of the voting resident land

owners must vote in favor of the creation of a district before it can be formed. Districts are governed by five elected resident land owners who make their living from farming or ranching. These officials are called District Supervisors. They supervise the conservation activities within their district. Their salaries are determined by State law. They may receive a maximum of \$80.00 per year.

Cochran County to Install Two-Way Police Radios

Cochran County will install two-way police radios within about 60 days. Judge Glenn W. Thompson announced this week.

Other counties, including Plains, Hockley, Yoakum, Terry and Winkler as well as counties in Eastern New Mexico are also installing the same frequency radio system.

Thompson said the equipment here would include a two-way radio in the court house and sheriff's car and a portable machine to be used anywhere.

Library Presented By Study Club to Cochran County

Praise for the establishment of the Cochran County Library, which is now located in the basement of the county court house, largely due to a woman's organization—the 1936 Study Club.

In 1937, only a short time after the Study Club was organized, a book tea was given at the home of Mrs. Hume Russell. About 75 books were received at this tea and this was the very modest beginning of the present library.

When the Book Lover's Club was organized in the fall of 1936, it was decided that dues for this organization would be in the form of a book to be added to the library. This book is usually one that a member of the club has reviewed.

On Sept. 1, 1939, these books were presented to the county and kept on the third floor of the court house. Miss Lanora Jackson was then employed by the county to be in charge of the library one day a week. To the members of the Study Club, who have sponsored the library from its very beginning, fell the task of running the library during the rest of the week.

Only last month in an effort to make the Cochran County Library more widely used, the county officials voted to employ a full time librarian, Hessie B. Spotts, now in charge of the library and is ready to help the patrons with reading selections. The library is open daily from 9:00 to 5:00 except Wednesday and Saturday. On Wednesday it closes at 2:00 and on Saturday afternoon it closes at 4:00. A library card is available for 50c per year. Anyone interested in purchasing a card may contact the librarian, Mrs. Spotts.

In 1939, when first presented to the county, the library consisted of 320 books. Through the contributions of books from the Study Club, Book Lover's Club, Lions Club and many individuals has grown to 850 volumes. Just recently the Study Club gave a book tea at which time 31 books were given. In this manner our county library is slowly growing out of the need of children's books to still great.

The most outstanding book added recently is "The Big Fisherman" by Lloyd C. Douglas. This best seller was released to the public in November. It is an outstanding story of Simon Peter, the most lovable and human of the Apostles of Jesus.

Many enjoyable books of fiction and non-fiction are available to the public and all persons in the county are invited to avail themselves of this opportunity to enjoy good books.

U. S. SERIES "E" SAVINGS BONDS DRIVE UNDERWAY IN COUNTY

The "Opportunity Drive" for the sale of series E savings bonds started Monday.

L. L. Price, campaign leader, explained that the drive is called "opportunity" drive because "the contributor himself is the principal beneficiary." The appeal for the six-week drive through June 30 will be "Put More Opportunity in Your Future."

Morton's First State Bank has a bond-a-month plan in which a customer may have the cost of a bond deducted from his checking account each month. The national quota for the drive is \$1,040,000,000. The Texas quota is \$36,950,000.

Reasons for the campaign according to Mr. Price are, "our national debt, the wisest possible distribution of this is the responsibility of all of us. Through continued investment in these Bonds by individuals we distribute the debt as widely as possible rather than concentrate it in banks, thus securing a better balanced ownership and a less volatile debt. Three Oil Well Completions Made In Cochran County Field Recently

DeKalb Agricultural Assn., Inc. No. 4 J. D. Laney, et al, 440 feet from south and 2,029.51 feet from west lines of lease in labor 31, and labor 32, league 64, Midland CSL survey, pumped 24 hours to make an initial production of 90.6 barrels of 32.8 gravity oil. The fluid recovered was cut with 16.3 per cent water. Gas-oil ratio was 200-1.

The pay zone at 4,785-4,928 was treated with 10,000 gallons of acid.

Great Western Producers Inc. of Lubbock, No. 6-B I. W. May, 1,730 feet from south and 440 feet from east lines of lease in tract 7-B, league 64, Midland CSL survey, made a daily initial production of 171.12 barrels of 31 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 79-1. No water was present.

The pay section at 4,850-4,884 feet was acidized with 8,000 gallons.

DeKalb Agricultural Assn., Inc. No. 1 D. S. Wright, estate, 440 feet from south and east lines of lease in labor 18, league 97, Brewster CSL survey, pumped 24 hours to make an initial production of 88.3 barrels of 32.4 gravity oil. No water was present. Gas-oil ratio was 164-1.

The pay zone at 4,750-4,920 feet was acidized with 8,000 gallons.

Casing Set

Intermediate casing has been set at Humble Oil and Refining Company No. 1 Masten, wildcat projected to 12,000 feet in south-west Cochran county, six miles southwest of Lehman.

The venture was bottomed on 4,527 feet in lime, waiting for cement to cure on 9 5/8-inch pipe cemented at 4,519 feet with 1,700 sacks. It is due to drill plug and make more hole.

Location is 660 feet from north and west lines of labor 18, league 135, Armstrong CSL survey.

Drilling was continuing at Stanolind Oil and Gas Company No. 2 Holt, outpost to the recently discovered Landon-Devonian field in south-central Cochran county.

Last report had it below 7,432 feet in lime.

Men Active As R. C. Volunteers In Vet Hospitals

Red Cross field directors in 106 Veterans Administration hospitals report 1050 men volunteers assisting in the Red Cross program for veteran patients.

Men are performing more than a score of different volunteer jobs, ranging from calling square dances to teaching mathematics, replies to a questionnaire indicate.

Largest number of men volunteer their services as teachers, entertainers, leaders of hobby clubs, or movie projectionists. Others participate by ward visiting, staging parties, escorting visitors, pushing wheel chair patients to hospital activities, driving, leading sports events, storytelling, and acting as pin boys for patients' bowling teams.

Among the volunteers are clerks, chemists, roofers, researchers, singers, carpenters, locksmiths, accountants, teachers, mechanics, students, truck drivers, artists, crane operators, brokers, dairymen and lawyers. They range in age from 18 to 80. "Personal contact with other volunteers," is the majority answer to how they became interested in Red Cross volunteer service. Many said, "My wife is a Red Cross Gray Lady." Others answered that they became interested through newspaper publicity, by information given to a civic or welfare organization to which they belonged, or through their own previous experience as a patient in a military or veterans hospital. About two-thirds of the men volunteers are veterans, including one chess teacher from the Spanish-American war.

Adams, Social Security Administration Representative, will be in Morton at the Post Office at 11:00 a. m. on May 26, for the purpose of answering any questions you may have on social security; discussing possible benefits and taking claims from persons who seem to be entitled to benefits; and taking applications for social security account number cards.

Employers—The payroll tax report, which you make every calendar quarter, must include the name, social security account number, and the amount of wages paid to each employee. Every business firm that has one or more employees is covered by the Federal Social Security Act.

Twenty-eight art students and graduates of Eastern New Mexico College will be installed soon as charter members of the Kappa Pi national art fraternity. Date for the installation has not been set. The chapter on the campus will be known as the Alpha Alpha Omicron.

Kappa Pi is open to both men and women. It was founded at the University of Kentucky in 1911 and now has chapters in nearly all parts of the United States. Chapters are installed only in recognized colleges, universities, and art schools meeting the standards of national accrediting agencies.

Dot Ann Hogan, Morton, is among those to become charter members.

Mrs. Anna K. Wilton, associate professor in art, is sponsoring the fraternity. Carl C. Jordan, assistant in art, is the co-sponsor. President Floyd D. Golden and Mrs. Golden are to be honorary members.

Storage Space For 16½ Million Bushels of Wheat

Storage space for 16½ million bushels of wheat at Pan-Tech Farms, formerly Pantex ordnance plant, near Amarillo, will be made available under plans adopted by the board of directors of Texas Tech college.

The board authorized a committee headed by Chanslor Weymouth, Amarillo, to sign leases with the Commodity Credit Corporation or some other organization for the space in warehouses and igloos on the 17,000 acre property. Weymouth estimates the Panhandle wheat crop at between 45 and 50 million bushels. He said much of the wheat will spoil unless storage space is found. The committee also was authorized to employ sufficient men to maintain the Pan-Tech lands and equipment.

The board at its meeting this week also contracted with the City of Lubbock to supply water to the campus, following a temporary break-down in the Texas Tech water system.

An appropriation of \$4,690.94, was made to complete the animal husbandry building on the campus, and \$12,000, was set aside to renovate a portion of West hall, men's dormitory, for exclusive use of Tech athletes.

Texas State Fair To Offer Record Premiums in 1949

Farmers and ranchers of the Southwest will take home more premium money from the State Fair of Texas this fall than ever before in history.

This news is announced in the 1949 State Fair Premium List, first copies of which are now in the mails inviting all pure-bred livestock breeders to exhibit their herds and flocks at the 1949 exposition.

The Premium List was published a month earlier this year to give farmers and ranchmen more time to plan and prepare the exhibits which they will show to some 2,000,000 visitors when the Fair opens on Oct. 8 for its 16-day run.

Total premium will be \$65,235. 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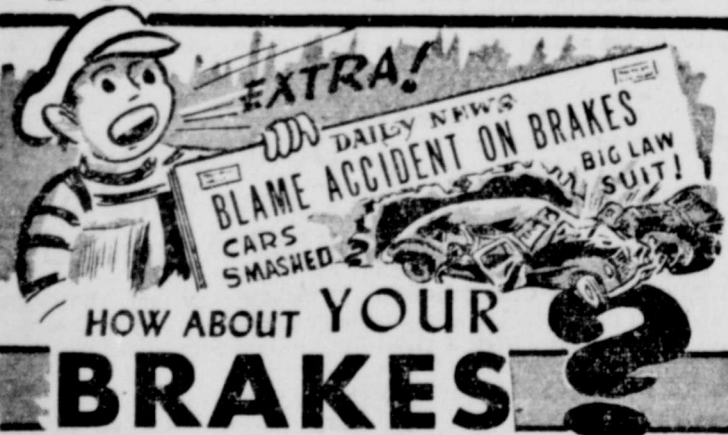

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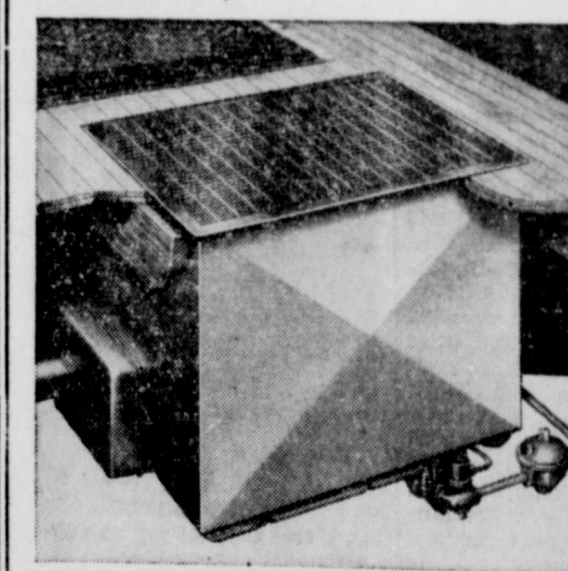

Tech College To Receive \$3,000,000 In New Buildings

Plans for construction as soon as possible of \$3,000,000, in new building at Texas Technological college have been approved by college directors.

The first group, to cost about \$2,000,000, will include addition of two wings on the Administration building, two wings on the Engineering building and either a new Home Economics building or wings on the present Home Economics structure. Studies are being made on details of a new pure science building, which will be a part of the \$3,000,000, program.

Directors, at their meeting this week, voted to issue between \$2,600,000, and \$2,900,000, in bonds, to be retired by income from the College Building amendment voted by referendum in Texas two years ago. Central Investment Company, Dallas, was employed to arrange sale of the bonds early in June.

The board said classroom space is a major need of Texas Tech and the Administration building wings alone will give 16,000, additional square feet for classes. The Engineering building wings would permit concentration of engineering work and release for other purposes space now allotted to engineering over the campus.

LIVESTOCK LIFE-LINES

Prolonged sucking by calves may cause cows to become hard milkers.

Flocks should be culled at regular intervals to eliminate unprofitable producers and those showing signs of disease.

Veterinarians believe that mosquitoes play a part in spreading the virus of fowl pox from infected flocks to healthy ones.

Irregular feeding of the nursing sow will cause pigs to go hungry from lack of milk on one day and scour from overfeeding the next day.

The feeding of some form of sugar for a few days before and for two or three weeks after freshening sometimes helps to prevent ketosis in dairy cows.

If discarded lead-paint containers are left in the barnyard or pasture, cattle may lick enough paint from them to be poisoned.

The spread of anthrax in farm animals is favored when there are heavy rains followed by dry periods and extreme heat, along with an abundance of flies.

Infectious sinusitis, a widespread and costly disease of turkeys, is believed to be caused by a virus, and there is evidence that it may be transmitted through hatching eggs.

Alfalfa and bluegrass are said to contain certain nutritional elements, not present in other feeds, which are important to the prenatal development and livability of pigs.

Unfavorable environmental conditions alone do not start outbreaks of infectious disease, but they do make livestock easier targets for infection-producing germs that are lurking nearby.

Gardening Tips

By Mabel Ann Manley

During damp weather often peas and other vegetables are covered with powdery. This is a disease that thrives in cold damp weather. It can be taken care of by a weekly dusting of 60 mesh dusting sulphur. If a rain comes the dust should be applied more often.

Aphids (vegetable lice) are rampant. These tiny insects thrive in cool damp weather. They can be taken care of by using the old stand by, black leaf forty. The solution is made of 1 1/2 teaspoons of "black leaf 40", 1 cubic inch of soap to 1 gallon of water. To be the most effective the solution should be sprayed on when the temperature is above 70 F. Use this about every seven days.

Now is the time to get a supply of sabadilla dust to combat those squash bugs that are sure to strike. "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" is an old trite saying but nothing could be truer concerning the squash bug.

A supply of rotenone on hand will help you to get rid of those cabbage bugs, cucumber beetles, blister beetles, and fruit beetles. Cut worms can be combatted by putting out a poison bait made of 5 lbs. bran, 1 tablespoon paris green, 1/2 pint of cheap molasses, 1/2 gallon of water. This mixture also helps combat "June bugs" that often burrow under plants and eat the roots. Put this mixture out at night and remove any left over the next morning to keep away from children and animals.

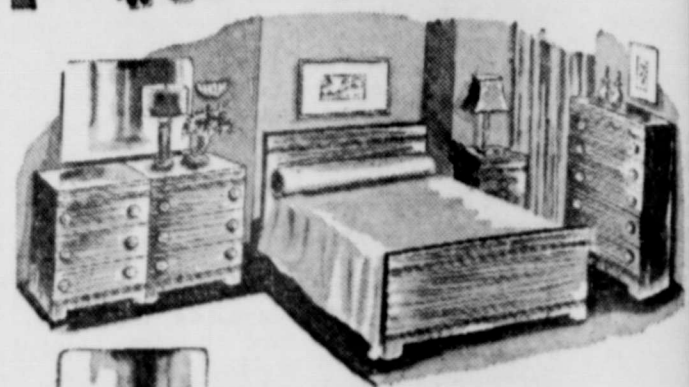
