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Congress Is Relieved of Townsend Scare

If the congressional investigation of the Townsend plan goes on long enough, our congressmen are likely to wind up by concluding that what they had feared was going to be a raging tornado has been just a mild breeze after all.

Congressmen scare easily. It goes with the job. And when the Townsend business got under way, the noble representatives began to recall the fearsome whip which Wayne B. Wheeler used to crack, and took it for granted that another great extra-political organization was coming into being to issue orders to them.

But now things are looking different. The fine unselfishness of the organization takes on a less beautiful hue in the light of revelations about high fees for organizers. The venerable doctor himself may be just as devoted as he ever was, but it is pretty apparent that some people in his organization were much more concerned with the loaves and fishes than with the idea of secure old age for the unfortunate.

And that can be expected to lessen Congress' fears. For what frightened the congressmen about the business was the high moral purpose that hung over it during the time of its youth. A congressman can, if pressed, say "No" to a lobbyist or a self-seeker; but if you confront him with an outfit which is sincerely and intensely devoted to a great cause, it just isn't in him to get tough.

The thing to remember, after everything else is said and done, is that this Townsend movement did voice a great deal of pitiful fear and pathetic hope.

Growing old is no part of a joke, for many Americans. It means the loss of security—dependence on someone who may meet that dependence grudgingly, the shadow of poverty across the path, the constant fear that tomorrow, or the day after, some unpredictable accident may destroy what little security has been won.

Because millions of old people know that fear all too intimately, the Townsend plan drew an amazing response.

We have had time, by now, to look at the thing sanely; time to study its cock-eyed economics, time to weigh the somewhat unlovely way in which district organizers collected so much a head for every pathetic hopeful they could bring into the fold. These things are beginning to convince Congress that there is nothing to fear, after all. But underneath it all there remain the conditions which gave the Townsend plan its initial momentum.

These conditions will still exist, no matter how damaging the congressional investigation may prove. The Townsend plan, as a movement may be crippled to the point of death; the fear and hopelessness that made millions of people embrace it are yet to be dealt with. And it will take more than a congressional investigation to set them right.

To famed jungle monarchs such as the Ethiopian Lion of Lions, and the British variety, must now be added those which March and April came in like.

Centennial Year Renews Interest In Lone Star Navy

Facts concerning the actual existence and movements of a Texas navy have until recently been the secret of a handful of Texas historians. Plans for the celebration of the Texas Centennial, however, have caused lay minds to develop a historical inquisitiveness about the early incidents that molded the Texas of today. Also encouraging this desire to ferret out long-forgotten Lone Star tales is a current newspaper contest based on nine momentous questions dealing with important events in Texas history.

Details of this contest are outlined in weekly advertisements published in Texas newspaper. Advertisements announcing subsequent contests in the series of nine will appear regularly in this paper. A current contest question deals with the Texas navy and in particular with the famous "sloop of war Austin."

Back in 1825, when the wrecking upheaval of revolution was cutting deep into Texas life and property, the provisional government employed a strategic move to acquire the so-called Texas navy. Realizing the efficacy of a small armed fleet for scouting and disciplinary purposes in southern waters, but lacking the necessary funds to put such a fleet into action, the government issued letters of marque and reprisal to private ship owners, giving them the legal

right to "prevent invasion by sea" and to "blockade the Mexican ports and destroy her commerce." Activities of such ships, invaluable to the successful completion of the war, included breaking up a blockade of the Texas ports and averting an attempt to close the New Orleans boat line.

Purchase by the republic of two brigs, three schooners, a sloop and a steamer in 1840 appreciably swelled the small but effective navy, lent in that year to the Mexican states of Yucatan and Tabasco, which were revolting against the central government. This expedition to undermine the Mexican government, by allying insubordinate States with Texas, proved so profitable that for nearly three years the fleet operated in this way on a free-lance basis. The famous sloop of war Austin, about which legendary tales of great battles and heroic services are told, was one of the most gallant performers in this fleet.

In 1843 President Houston ordered the navy to return to home port, but Commodore Moore, leader of the fleet, having promised assistance to his friends in Yucatan, disobeyed the governmental command and sailed once more into tropical waters. The enraged president officially suspended Moore from command and issued a proclamation requesting all navies afloat to look out for the runaway fleet and seize the "post Captain Moore and bring him and the ships into Galveston so that the culprit could be adequately punished." Commodore Moore, after paying his debt to his friends, returned home voluntarily. Texans acclaimed him a hero, and, though court-martialed, he was acquitted.

This incident witnessed the virtual end of the Texas navy's active service. Its vessels were beached and suffered from dry rot and decay. Those that were still on hand were turned over to the United States at the time of the annexation three years later.

World's Largest Stage To Be Erected On Centennial Grounds

DALLAS.—The world's largest stage, according to Centennial officials, will be constructed on Texas Centennial Exposition grounds.

W. A. Webb, exposition manager, said the stage would cost approximately \$100,000. The stage, measuring 350 wide and 200,000 feet wide, will be used to present the "Cavalade of Texas," \$250,000 historical drama of Texas.
