Civic center, upgrading referendums are slated

To appear on city ballot

Referendums, or "straw votes," on a civic and youth center and upgrading of Post's downtown section as suggested by Texas Tech architectural students will be included on the April 6 city election ballot, the city council decided at Monday night's regular February meeting.

The April 6 election will also include balloting for three places on the city council. Terms expiring are those of Fred Myers, Ed Sawyers and Donald Windham.

The wording of the two referendum issues to be included on the ballot was not decided at Monday night's meeting, but will be at the March meeting, the council indicated.

The three councilmen present at the meeting — Windham, Sawyers and Jim Wells — voted to include the referendums on the ballot after agreeing it would be a good idea to "take the public's pulse" on a combined civic-youth center and on the upgrading of the downtown section, as suggested by the Tech students. Mayor Giles C. McCrary said federal funds are to be made available for such projects as the suggested "remodeling" of Main Street.

The council voted to reappoint Faye Cockrell as election judge and to set the election workers' pay at \$1.60 an hour, plus \$2 for the election judge.

In other action Monday night, the council:

—Voted to pay 4 1/2 cents of the 9 cents an hour raise given radio dispatchers by the county, retroactive to Jan. 1 of this year. The 9-cent raise increases the dispatchers' salaries from \$1.60 to \$1.69 an hour. The dispatchers had been raised to the \$1.60 figure in September, 1973.

—Voted not to purchase a postal machine demonstrated by a representative of Pitney-Bowes.

—Listed the names of nine citizens with the city secretary, with three of the nine to be named to serve on the 1974 board of tax equalization. The names listed are those of Bob Dickson, Gene Moore and Dick Tanner, who served last year; Grant Lott, Bill Pool and T. B. Odum, last year's alternates, and Sexton Huntley, Lewis C. Herron and James Mitchell.

—Voted to reappoint Sue Shytles and Jim Jackson to the Post Public Housing Authority Board, with Arnold Parrish and James Mitchell as alternate appointees.

—Authorized Public Works Supt. Pete Maddox to advertise for bids on the purchase of a new automobile for the police department.

—Discussed the proposed 1974 street paving program, with City Secretary Wanda Wilkerson reporting that requests for

paving had been received from seven persons, four on East 6th Street, one on East 5th, one on West 5th and one on North Avenue I. The council voted to employ someone to contact other property owners in an effort to work up a paving program as soon as possible.

The council voted for the city to pay 50 per cent of the paving costs instead of the 40 per cent it has paid in the past and not

to require curbing and gutters for the new paving except for sections that tie in to present curbs and gutters.

—Decided to refer to the city attorney a request by Cecil Foster Sr. for a taxicab and delivery service here and to take action on the request at the next council meeting.

—Voted to pay for curbs and gutters on 0.9 of a mile on South Avenue S to 15th Street, as

requested by the Texas Highway Department.

—Discussed the Post Public Library board's recommendation that the amount of insurance carried by the city on the library be increased to cover the newly-completed addition and its contents. The council decided to confer with its insurance agents and act on the recommendation at its next meeting.

Filings close with no new Garza races

The 6 p. m. Monday filing deadline passed with no new contests developing in any Garza County races, County Democratic Chairman N. C. Outlaw reported today.

The only contests within the county are in the two county commissioner's precinct offices to be filled this year — Precinct 2 and Precinct 4.

In Precinct 2, the present commissioner, Ted L. Aten, has drawn an opponent in L. E. (Sonny) Gossett Jr., and Herbert Walls, seeking re-election in Precinct 4, is opposed by Billy Greene.

In fact, Outlaw said there is a possibility no runoff primary election will be necessary in Garza County. There are only one or two state races in which there are more than two candidates and if one of the office seekers received a majority in these races, there would be no need of a runoff election here.

The latest candidate to file here before the deadline was Carl Cederholm, who seeks re-election as county and district clerk.

Director needed for youth center

The city-county youth board is now looking for a new youth center director before making plans to reopen the youth center at Teen Town.

David Feaster, youth center director last year, now has other employment out of the city.

Those interested in applying for the position are asked to contact Syd Wyatt for an interview appointment with the board.

The youth center's furnishings and equipment have been moved into the Teen Town building, but the board has decided not to reopen the center until a new youth center director has been employed and is on the job.

836 books checked out in January

Post Public Library patrons checked out 836 books during January, the monthly report of Librarian Pee Wee Pierce indicated this week.

Of the 836, 605 were adult books and 233 juvenile books. Seventeen books were added to library shelves during the month.

Miscellaneous income was \$22.60, most of it being \$8.20 in overdue book fines.

County is asked to reconsider

Attorneys for the Southland Independent School District have filed a motion to reconsider a previous order with the Garza County Commissioners Court in the matter of the detachment and annexation of certain Southland school district property.

In the request for reconsideration of the court's approval of the annexation of certain properties from the Southland school district to the Post school district, Derry D. Harding and Pat N. Walker contend the state law the court acted under is unconstitutional, but if it isn't authority in such matters is still left with members of the county school board who have not resigned and whose terms have not expired.

The request also says that the authority to act in place of the county school board has been placed not in the commissioners court but in the school boards of the independent districts of the county.

County Judge Giles W. Dalby said a hearing on the request has tentatively been set for Monday.

Post Ministerial Alliance formed

The Post Ministerial Alliance was organized at a meeting at the First Presbyterian Church at 9:30 a. m. last Thursday, with the Rev. Glenn Reese, pastor of the First Baptist Church, elected as president.

The city has not had a ministerial alliance for the last several years.

management; Frank "Chief" Runkles for his work with youth in Boy Scouting and teaching conservation; the Woman's Culture Club for improvement of the local environment.

Also E. A. Howard Jr., Conservation Teacher's Award; John Ward for his past service with the SWCD board, and The Post Dispatch for its conservation publicity.

Doggett has just completed a Great Plains Conservation Program contract, with projects including 78,154 feet of parallel terraces, balanced crop rotation of one-half cotton and one-half

Kent Hance in Senate race

Kent R. Hance, 31-year-old Lubbock attorney and member of the West Texas State University Board of Regents, Tuesday announced his candidacy for the office of state senator of the 28th Senatorial District, which includes Garza County and 12 other counties in this area.

A professor of business law at Texas Tech University for the past five years, Hance resigned that position last month in anticipation of his candidacy for the senate seat now held by H. J. "Doc" Blanchard.

Hance has headed his own law firm in Lubbock since 1969 when he returned from Texas University School of Law where he received his doctor of jurisprudence degree in late 1968.

While an undergraduate at Texas Tech University working on his BBA degree, Hance was vice president of the student body, president of his social fraternity, a member of Phi Alpha Kappa honor fraternity and the Saddle Tramps. He graduated from Tech in 1965.

Last year, Hance was named one of the five most outstanding professors at Texas Tech for distinguished service, and he was appointed by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby to serve as a member of the state's Citizens Water Ad-

Railroad attitude same

The fact that the nation's railroads are unable to cash in immediately on the energy crisis is their own fault.

The railroads, like the rest of us, should have seen the oil shortage coming years ago and should have been ready to take up some of the slack in transportation. Instead, their argument now is that the oil shortage aside, they need more new equipment, especially for passenger service, and probably won't have it for two years.

The railroads also need hundreds of millions of dollars to rehabilitate track and roadbed for the modern, faster trains the public now demands.

Then, too, the railroads still have the attitude of "we'll do as we damned please and where we please."

At least, that's the way it appears to us after reading a letter from an official of the National Railroad Passenger Corp. to Rep. Omar Burleson, who represents this district in the U. S. Congress.

It all came about after a group of Post civic leaders, including Mayor Giles C. McCrary and Chamber of Commerce directors, wrote Cong. Burleson about the need of passenger train service in our area.

The congressman wrote Mayor McCrary that "the Vice President of Amtrak has

responded to my inquiry in this regard advising that Amtrak has no present plans to establish rail passenger service which I had suggested in the past and which was outlined in the petition signed by you."

Cong. Burleson went on to say that "I can assure you I shall continue to try to impress upon Amtrak officials the need of passenger service in our area of Texas."

The Amtrak official made his reply to Cong. Burleson's inquiry short and to the point. After thanking the congressman for his letter, the Amtrak vice president wrote as follows:

"Amtrak is continuing to make further improvements in the service on the present system of rail passenger service that we operate at this time. The Amtrak Improvement Act of 1973 was signed by President Nixon on Nov. 3. This action insures that efforts under way to make rail passenger service an integral part of the intercity transportation system of this nation will continue. We have no plans to establish rail passenger service from Jackson, Miss., to Dallas-Fort Worth via Shreveport, La., or from those cities west through Sweetwater and Post, Tex., to Los Angeles."

It has been several years now since a passenger train has come through Post. There's no telling when, or if, we'll ever see another one come through. — CD

Spice added to one race

The last-minute entry Monday of Frances "Sissy" Farenthold in the governor's race adds some interest to what is building up as one of the most lackluster Democratic campaigns in the state's history.

State Democratic races are at a new low mark as far as the number of candidates are concerned. Most of the candidates this election year are on the Republican side of the political fence, but in counties where Republican primary elections are not held, and that includes nearly all the sparsely populated counties of the state, that fact does not help build up much political interest.

In many counties, including Garza, where there are no more than two candidates in any

county or precinct race, there is a good possibility that it will not be necessary to hold a runoff, or second primary, election. In only one statewide Democratic race that we can think of at the moment are there more than two candidates, and if one of them in this race gets a majority over the other two, then Garza and a number of other counties will not need to hold a runoff election.

But a first primary election is necessary, and the second go-around in the gubernatorial race between Dolph Briscoe and Sissy Farenthold is going to bring out a lot of voters who otherwise might have stayed home on election day.

Bad news for the coyote

Bad news for the coyotes and the ecologists who urge their protection!

A new program to be administered by the Texas A&M Extension Service through county agents is designed to control coyotes and other predators in 44 livestock-raising counties of Texas.

As pointed out by Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, the new program will greatly improve the state's supply of meat, wool and mohair.

Trained technicians will be authorized to

place devices using cyanide capsules to destroy predators in areas where the coyote population is deemed excessive.

The sheep and goat herds during the past two years have been ravaged by the coyotes and other predators because producers have not been able to use chemical means of control.

The new program is "all to the good." For a while, it appeared that those urging the protection of the worthless coyote at the expense of the rancher's livestock might be winning the battle, but the worm has turned. — CD

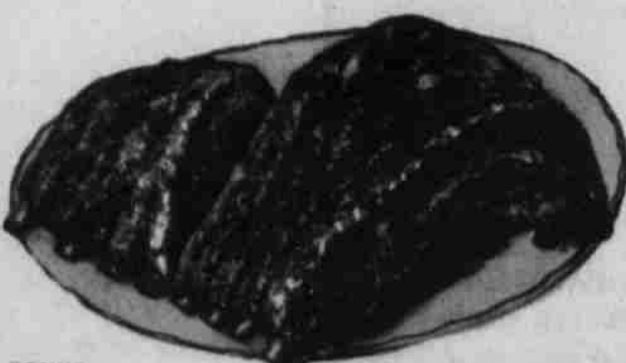

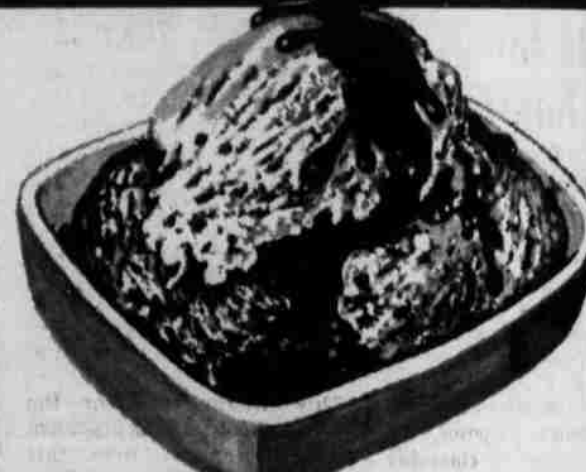

Cooperative Homemaking offered at high school

By JANET CHILDS

For the past three years the high school has been offering Cooperative Homemaking to juniors and seniors. The class is open to both boys and girls and is taught by Mrs. Marion Wheatley. The students have 15 hours of class each week where each girl does lessons pertaining to her job, along with filling out weekly reports.

The students work an average of 525 hours each school year, which is a minimum of 15 hours and a maximum of 25 hours a week. The students work half a day and go to school the other half and are either at work or school throughout the day unless they are running errands for their employers, which many of them do.

The emphasis of this class is placed on the development of the student's attitude, behavior, and skills necessary to secure and hold a job.

The Cooperative Homemaking class is an advantage to the school whereas it provides vocational training without the expense of purchasing the equipment used in the various occupations. It also helps meet the needs for trained employees in the community, as well as provides for the student to finish school and to also receive job training.

The class also provides many advantages to the students. They learn whether or not they are interested in that particular occupation, and provides job training under actual work conditions. It provides the student an opportunity to receive job training while completing high school and gives them valuable work experience before graduation.

The student's family also plays an important part in the program. They provide a cooperative climate and encourage successful student participation as well as insist that the student practice management and relationship skills. They also avoid conflicting situations which force the students to choose between family loyalty and loyalty to the employer.

SCS points out the effects of grass fires

Lately Garza County ranchers have been plagued with mysterious grass fires of unknown origin, the Soil Conservation Service points out. Several hundred acres have been lost in recent weeks. This represents a big economic and aesthetic loss to Garza County.

For example, if a rancher loses 600 acres to a fire this time of year, he automatically loses the home of from 20 to 25 cows and calves, not to mention the valuable wildlife habitat. The rancher is forced to either reduce his herd or absorb the animals within his remaining rangeland. If he does maintain these animals he will probably have to overstock the rest of his range.

Conditions in Garza County are very dry right now and soil moisture is pretty well gone in the top six to eight inches of the soil profile. There is little moisture around the root crown of grasses where growth is

initiated. Fires are especially damaging when conditions are dry, as they are now. Some grass plants can actually die and the end result may be a serious decrease in forage production for quite a long time. Grass just doesn't automatically come back in a week or two, as some people think.

An associated loss from fires is the rancher's fence. Many posts and wire are damaged or destroyed. It takes at least \$1,000 per mile to replace a fence nowadays.

An unwanted fire can affect a rancher's livelihood for a considerable time, as well as ruining valuable wildlife habitat and looking ugly. Denuded rangeland also results in soil erosion.

The rangeland of Garza County is a very valuable resource to all of us. The Soil Conservation Service encourages all citizens to keep this in mind: Exercise care; don't flip cigarettes into the highway right-of-way; be careful burning trash in areas where a fire might have a chance of starting. Hunters, be careful about the use of campfires. A conscious effort by everyone is needed.

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"Tainted" Car

Suppose you lend your car to a friend, who uses it to carry narcotics. If he is caught, could your car be confiscated—even though you were unaware of your friend's illicit intentions?

State laws on narcotics often do say exactly that. The car itself is considered tainted by its misuse, and is therefore subject to seizure.

From time to time, a luckless car owner will put up a fight in court. He will argue that he should not be penalized for someone else's transgression.

But most courts have upheld the confiscation of the car. Two reasons are commonly given:

1) that this will teach car owners to be more careful about lending their cars to untrustworthy friends; and,

2) that in fighting the drug problem, the state should not have the difficult task of proving the car owner's complicity.

As one judge put it:

"The traffic in narcotics is so great an evil as to justify the drastic penalty of confiscation. The public interest outweighs the loss suffered by the innocent car owner."

Usually, however, an automobile can be confiscated only if it was "caught in the act." Thus, your car could not be taken away merely because the authorities find that someone had used it unlawfully the day before yesterday.

Furthermore, you are in a stronger position if the car was not just borrowed but was taken without your consent.

In one case, a youth was caught carrying narcotics in his mother's car. But when authorities tried to seize the car, the mother pointed out that her son had taken it against her express orders.

Under these circumstances, the court felt confiscation was simply too drastic. The court said that would be "an arbitrary invasion of (the mother's) property rights protected by both the state and federal Constitutions."

CHILDREN MAY FIND SHARING DIFFICULT

Even with a full toy box, some children balk at sharing. However, parents influence how a child learns to share.

A child learns what he lives. If he lives with greed, a child learns to be greedy and not to share. Children aren't born with built-in sharing. Nor do they acquire it automatically at a certain age.

Sharing actually requires daily practice — in judgment and in making choices about matters — in line, of course, with the child's age and understanding of things.

To help a child start learning to share, consider his point of view. Toys and other favorite objects offer security to some children.

When a parent asks a child to share all his possessions, the child loses some security. That's why parents should be sensitive to the child's feelings — concerning toys or anything else.

Sensitive parents listen when a child expresses his thoughts — to show him they value his ideas. Also they act with fairness and consideration, so the child knows he's important.

When parents create a sympathetic atmosphere, a child draws nearer to them. As he sees them share feelings — and things, he wants to share too.

Despite the simplicity — and sensibility — of these procedures, problems can arise. For example, some children refuse to share anything because of a power-play with their parents. A child doing this is seeking limits or a framework in which to operate.

In this situation, parents should exert parental power until such time when the child can make independent decisions.

Since using parental power to control children works only under special conditions, it

3. The materials, equipment and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include a 3 cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

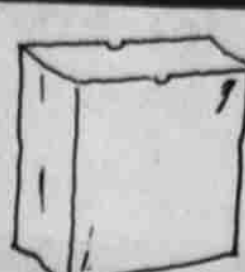

residue soil improving crops, and terrace ridges planted to rye to protect land from soil erosion.

Williams, who received the absentee conservation rancher plaque, operates 12,000 acres in two ranches in southeastern Garza County, near Polar. He has completed a Great Plains Conservation Program contract on one of the ranches and is carrying out a GPCP contract on the other ranch at present.

He has carried out a brush control program at considerable expense to himself, a planned system of range deferment, water wells and storage facilities. His range management has also helped in the conservation of wildlife.

J. R. Bell of the local SCS office and a member of the Texas Section of the American Society of Range Management, presented Lott his range management award.

Nita Burgess, club president, accepted on behalf of the Woman's Culture Club the award presented her organization for sponsoring the development of the downtown Algeria Park and its landscaping with native plants.

Howard, who was presented the conservation teachers award, was introduced as having already received an award from the Texas Advisory Committee on Conservation. His horticulture class at Post High School is assisting with the landscaping of the Algeria Park.

Editor Charles Didway accepted the certificate awarded The Dispatch for its contribution to soil and water conservation.

Sam Ellis, chairman of the SWCD board, was master of ceremonies and presented most of the awards, assisted by Bell and Bob Arheiger, also of the local SCS office.

"Chief" Runkles, who is camp ranger at C. W. Post Memorial Scout Camp here, made a talk on conservation practices, which have long been a part of the Scout camp program.

"Nature is a part of the planned program at Camp Post," Runkles said. "We believe that a boy learns much through the fascinating study of nature."

He said hanging in the headquarters building at the camp is a large framed certificate presented the camp a few years ago by the U. S. Department of Agriculture "for outstanding conservation achievements through exceptional contributions to the conservation of natural resources." The camp here received the certificate as one of the top ten Scout camps in the nation.

"Chief" Runkles also showed colored slides of soil and water conservation at the Boy Scout camp.

In his instructions, Judge Hamsard explained the law of entrapment to the jury and said it was up to the jury to determine as a question of fact whether entrapment was used in this case.

He defined entrapment in his instructions as "the improper inducement of a person by an officer to commit a crime not contemplated by such a person for the mere purpose of instituting a criminal prosecution against such a person."

The jury was given the case at 11:10 a. m. Thursday and deliberated until noon. After a break for lunch, the jury resumed deliberation before reporting about 4:12 p. m. that they were hopelessly deadlocked without a verdict.
