ENGINEERS ENGAGED FOR CITY WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM

At the adjourned meeting of the city council on last Wednesday afternoon a contract was signed with the municipal engineering firm of Gantt and Baker of Oklahoma City for the drafting of plans for the installation of a modern water and sewer system for Perryton. These are two things that we are going to have in the very near future. We have no sewer system at all and our present methods of sewer disposal are very unsanitary. The water supply that we have at present is hardly adequate to take care of the present consumption. It is estimated that the saving alone in reduced insurance premiums would take care of the additional tax which would have to be levied to take care of a bond issue to install a modern water system. Arrangements will be made for the taking over of the present water plant by the city and using all material possible in the construction of the new plant.

The engineering firm that has been engaged by the city officials to do this work is one of the most competent in the southwest. Mr. E. W. Gantt and Mr. E. W. Baker are both engineers of a long and varied experience and in our opinion the city council have made a wise move in selecting them to supervise this work. Now let everybody boost for this deal and when the bond issue comes, let's put her over big in the usual Perryton way.

STREET CROSSING IN ROTTEN SHAPE

Again we are going to spout off about the condition of the street crossings in Perryton. They are in a horrible shape and it is really dangerous to drive a car over them at a moderate speed. During the past few days we have heard of several cases of springs on cars being broken by the bumpy bumps. The approaches to these crossings could be graded up at a very small cost and the city council should attend to this at once. It is an eyesore to Perryton. Let's fix them.

CAR THEIVES CAPTURED AT CLAUDE TEXAS

The parties who did the stealing in and around Perryton on the day of our celebration have been captured at Claude, Texas. They were arrested by Sheriff Lynch of Claude and Sheriff Billy Christian of Plemons. According to a telephone communication received by Sheriff Talley they are John and Ira McNeely of Shallowater, Texas. They have confessed to several of the thefts committed here. They are the ones that entered the Beever and Garrett homes, stealing some wearing apparel and they also confessed to stealing four hogs from Horace Lackey. The arrest of these two crooks is due solely to the effective work of our own Sheriff, Sid Talley, and the efforts of Billy Christian of Plemons. These two officers are of the fearless type who never say quit when going after a criminal. The following article concerning their arrest is taken from the Panhandle Herald.

Sheriff Henry Lynch of Claude, John Cone of Panhandle, Bill Christian of Plemons, Deputy Wallace Fletcher of Plemons, Sid Talley of Perryton, H. H. Stickle of Canadian and L. A. Coffee of Miami are all investigating alleged thefts committed in their respective counties recently by two youths according to confessions made to officers at Claude this week, by the pair.

The boys, according to statements made to officers, are John F. McNeely, 22, and Ira McNeely, 19, of Shallowater near Lubbock, Texas. They admitted the following thefts which had previously been reported to officers together with other depredations which are being investigated: Auto tire from E. Price and revolver from E. L. Held, removed from the Price car while attending the revival meeting at Panhandle last week; grip containing clothing to the value of \$150.00 from the car of R. L. McDonald of Plemons, while attending the basket picnic on Spring Creek in Hutchinson county last Saturday. Many other acts of a felonious nature, admitted by the boys are being investigated which will no doubt result in charges being placed against them in four or five counties.

The arrests are the result of a special effort of county officers assisted by the best citizens of the Panhandle, in breaking up the crime wave which has infested the section recently. Others are thought to be connected with this pair in disposing of their booty, and officers are making an effort at this time to see that they are properly punished.

The two men in custody have been "summering" in the Panhandle section for the last two years, it is said, and have not confined their crime to any particular section. Several revolvers, a large amount of clothing and auto parts are among the articles found in the car driven by the boys when arrested by the Armstrong county sheriff.

SERIOUS FIRE PREVENTED BY NIGHT WATCHMAN

What would no doubt have been a very serious and disastrous conflagration was prevented by the timely discovery by night watchman Gamel of a blaze at the Wilson Mear Market at 3:15 Thursday morning. The fire started in a case of matches, presumably ignited by rats or mice, and was blazing freely when noticed by Mr. Gamel. He at once gave the alarm and with the assistance of Mr. Wilson and others it was extinguished at once. If this fire had not been discovered it would probably have cleaned out the entire block. This instance is a fitting testimonial to the efficient work of Mr. Gamel whose salary is paid by the business men of Perryton. It is money exceedingly well spent and Mr. Gamel is a very competent officer. The loss of a single building would amount to many times the salary paid for a night watchman. In this particular case it would have been extremely heavy on Mr. Wilson as he carried no insurance at all on his building.

SOME DIFFERENCE IN MISSOURI AND TEXAS WHEAT

We just have to swell up a little and boast of the state of Texas and our wheatgrowers when we think of the article which we read in the last week's issue of a paper published at Jefferson City, Mo. It was headed "Is Wheat King of Cole County" and went on to describe a farmer of that county, who is the best wheat grower of his county. It said that he raised 1270 bushels of wheat on 52 acres which is an average of 25 bushels to the acre. This was a very poor year for the wheat growers of this county but Claude Newman is probably the champion. Mr. Newman raised something like 10,000 bushels on less than 400 acres or an average of about 28 bushels to the acre. One 80 acres on the Newman place threshed out 39 bushels to the acre. The Cole County, Missouri Wheat King better move down to Texas where we really raise wheat.

PURE BRED HOGS EARN MORE MONEY

"The United States Government, through its Departments of Agriculture, has found that the purebred hog has an earning capacity 38 per cent greater than the common hog. The Bureau of Animal Industry, in an investigation and test with several thousand head of purebred and scrub hogs belonging to more than 300 owners, found that the same amount of feed that will make a common hog of 175 pounds, will make a purebred hog of 241 pounds. In figures, it is like this:
A Purebred Hog of 241 lbs. at 10c per lb. \$24.10.
A Common Hog of 175 lbs. at 10c per lb. \$17.50.
The difference in favor of the Purebred is \$6.60.

"On a litter of eight pigs, he difference would amount to \$52.80. A good, registered sow costing \$100, raising two litters a year, will save her owner enough feed on her pigs to more than pay for herself each year—strictly as a market proposition. Sales of any of her pigs as breeding stock above the market price, are extra profit."

The Department issued a report in June on "Cost of Producing Pork in Henry County, Iowa, and Warren County, Illinois." Seven hundred and sixty seven litters in the spring of 1921 on 51 farms were embraced in the report. The report showed that the average number of live pigs in the ten largest litters farrowed was 9.65, while in the ten smallest litters farrowed, the average was 6.14. Of the ten herds farrowing largest litters, seven were purebred two were grade, and one was mixed. Of the ten herds farrowing the smallest litters, three were purebred, six were grade and one was mixed. The purebreds showed the greater prolificacy. The report showed 'nine droves weaning less than four pigs to the sow indicated an average pig cost of \$6.70; twenty-one droves weaning from four to six pigs, cost \$4.76 per pig; eighteen droves weaning between six and eight pigs \$4.27 per pig." The more prolific sow, the less cost per pig at weaning time. The cost per pig included all expenses incident to the herd from the time the sows were bred in the fall until the pigs were weaned in the spring.

A survey of 35,000 litters covering a period of five years, 1916 to 1921 shows the average Poland China sow produced 8.44 pigs. These are the kind that M. A. Shuler & Son offered in their auction sale on September 5.

OCHILTREE COUNTY OIL AND GAS CO. WINS SUIT

PRODUCTION OF ELECTRICITY

The Division of Power Resources of the United States Geological Survey reports that the eleven leading States in the production of electricity by public-utility power plants in 1921, in the order of their rank, were: New York, Pennsylvania, California, Illinois, Ohio, Michigan, Massachusetts, Washington, West Virginia, Montana and New Jersey. The output of electricity by public-utility power plants was nearly 65 per cent of the total output in the United States.

The ten leading States in the production of electricity in public-utility power plants by water power in 1921 were: New York, California, Washington, Montana, South Carolina, Michigan, Iowa, Pennsylvania, Idaho,

and Georgia. In 1920 these States produced nearly 72 per cent of the total amount of electricity produced by public-utility power plants in the United States by the use of water power in 1921 they produced 71 per cent.

The ten leading States in the production of electricity in public-utility power plants by the use of fuels were: New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, Massachusetts, California, West Virginia, New Jersey, and Indiana. In 1921 these States produced 73 per cent of the total amount of electricity produced in public-utility power plants in the United States by the use of fuel.

The ten leading States in the consumption of coal by public-utility power plants in the United States

in the production of electricity were: Pennsylvania, New York, Illinois, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Massachusetts, New Jersey, West Virginia and Missouri. The total consumption of coal for the production of electricity by public-utility power plants in these ten States was a little more than 76 per cent of the total for the entire United States.

The leading States in the consumption of oil by public-utility power plants in the production of electricity were: California, Texas, Kansas, Florida, Louisiana, Missouri, Oklahoma, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Georgia, and Arizona.

The ten leading States in the consumption of gas by public-utility power plants in the production of electricity were: Oklahoma, Ohio, West Virginia, California, Arkansas, Kansas, Texas, Louisiana, Pennsylvania, and Kentucky. These ten States consumed practically all the gas utilized by public-utility power plants in the production of electricity in the United States in 1920 and 1921.

The output of electricity produced by the use of fuels in 1920 was 12.7 per cent more in 1919, but the consumption of fuels was only 6.7 per cent more. In 1921 the output by the use of fuels was only 6.7 per cent more. In 1921 the output by the use of fuels was 5.1 per cent less than in 1920, but the decrease in the consumption of fuels was about 14.2 per cent. This increase of efficiency in the consumption of fuels has undoubtedly resulted from economies in plant operation induced by the high cost of fuel.

SNAKE BITES: WHAT TO DO

"What snakes in the Southern United States are poisonous and what are the symptoms and especially the treatment of bites from such snakes?" asks another subscriber.

The bites of copperheads, water moccasins, coral snakes, and rattlesnakes are poisonous; the bite from a small snake is not as poisonous as a bite from a large snake of the same species. Snakes venom, which contains the poison, is a thin, greenish-yellow fluid of characteristic odor. The deaths from bites of poisonous snakes vary from 5 per cent in the case of copperheads to about 20 per cent for the large rattlers.

The symptoms of snake bite are intense pain, discolored swelling of the bitten part, and profound disturbances of the circulatory and nervous systems. There is great weakness and prostration, nausea, and a profuse flow of saliva. Muscular paralysis may occur in from three to four hours. Unconsciousness is rare, but the patients often fall into a kind of stupor.

As soon as possible after the bite has occurred, a band made of a handkerchief or some similar article should be applied a few inches above the wound, between it and the heart, and twisted with a stick to prevent the poison being carried into the system by the circulating blood. The bites of most snakes consist of but two punctures; these should be freely incised with a knife and the sucked. There is no danger in sucking the wound if there are no cracks or sores in the mouth or on the tongue. After the wound has been sucked it should be cauterized by applying carbolic or nitric acid on the end of a stick, such as a match. Or cauterization may be done by heating a nail, knife blade, or some such article and freely burning all parts of the wound.

After the wound has been sucked and cauterized, the bandage may be loosened. It should be allowed to remain loose for one minute and then be tightened up again. If so alarming symptoms have developed within 20 minutes it may again be loosened, this time for two minutes, after which it should be tightened again. After another period of 20 minutes the bandage should be loosened for three minutes. This procedure should be kept up for several hours, gradually increasing the time the bandage is off; the object is, of course, to allow only small quantities of the poison to get into the system at one time.

If in spite of the local measures and the use of the bandage general symptoms of weakness develop, the patient must be given stimulants. It is commonly believed that large doses of whisky or alcohol in some form should be administered. This is a serious mistake, as the alcohol will do harm by adding another depressant to that which is already in the system.

Instead of whisky it is better to give aromatic spirits of ammonia, one-half teaspoonful in water every hour, and half a cupful of very strong coffee every two hours.

Of recent years serums have been produced which are very effective in certain kinds of snake bites, but they are rarely obtainable when most needed.—Dr. Washbur, in The Progressive Farmer.

AMERICAN PHYSICAL
STANDARDS

The surgeon general of the army,
after studying the records of 1,000-
000 men examined for service in the
war, confirms the findings of the cen-
sus bureau that Kansas is the health-
iest state in which to live. Fewer
men from Kansas failed to pass army
examinations than any other state.
Rhode Island apparently has the low-
est physical standard, for her per-
centage in rejections is the highest
in the nation.

The average American man, it was
found, is five feet seven and one-half
inches tall, and weighs 141½ pounds.
The shortest men are from Rhode Is-
land, and the tallest from Texas and
the North Carolina mountains. Rhode
Island, again, led the lightest men,
while those from South Dakota were
the heaviest.

As a further indication that rural
districts are healthier, the surgeon
general says the records show that out
of 100 men from the city examined,
sixty-one showed physical defects.
Only fifty three out of 100 men from
the rural districts were defective.

One-fifth of class 1 men were found
physically unfit for service either
in the field or at home. Three out of 200
men were rejected for mental defects
—either for deficiencies or mental
abnormalities.

This report of the surgeon general
corresponds closely to reports of the
public health service made shortly af-
ter the war. The latter, however,
details some of the causes of rejection.
Heart and blood-vessel ailments lead
the list, causing 13 per cent of the re-
jections. They are followed by de-
fects in the bones and joints, to which
12 per cent of the rejections are at-
tributed. Eye trouble the cause of
10 per cent of the rejections, is third.
Development defects, such as under-
height, etc., caused only 8 per cent.

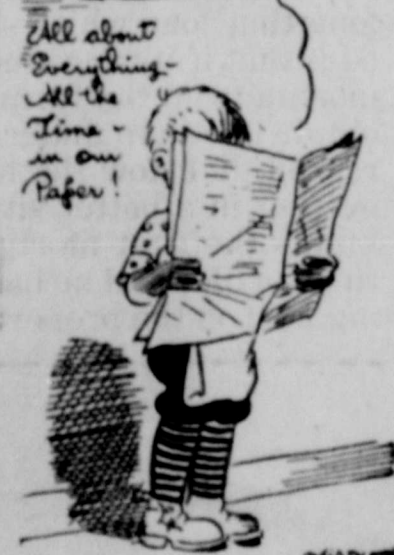
Based upon the later figures, Sur-
geon General Blue concluded the af-
ter-war activities of the public health
service should be listed in the following
order: (1) public health
education; (2) safeguarding the
health of infants and children; (3)
establishment of standards for the
control of communicable diseases;
(4) sanitary surveys to stimulate
improvement of proper waste dis-
posal and the purification of drink-
ing water; (5) improvement of the
milk supply by pasteurization; (6)
studies in industrial hygiene; (7)
malaria control and special activi-
ties to control tuberculosis.

THE KITCHEN CABINET

MORE GOOD THINGS

Put one cupful of raisins through the meat grinder, and then cook in a quart of chicken stock for twenty minutes. Thicken with six tablespoonfuls of flour, blended to a paste with one-fourth of a cupful of butter; season with one teaspoonful of salt, a few dashes of pepper. Add one pint of thin cream mixed with the beaten yolk of an egg. Stir until heated through, and serve with a garnish of the stiffly beaten white, flavored with two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice.

Imitation Pates de Foie Gras.—Boil in separate sauce pans a calf's tongue and a calf's liver and let stand for a day in the refrigerator so that both will be cold and firm. Pare and cut up the tongue into small triangular pieces that will look like the truffles in pates. Put the liver through a food chopper, using the finest knife and repeating the process. Into a large mixing bowl add the chopped liver and one-fourth its volume in melted or softened butter, working the two together until smooth. Now add to the liver paste one tablespoonful of strained onion juice, one teaspoonful each of made mustard and Worcestershire sauce, one-fourth of a teaspoonful each of ground cloves and cayenne pepper, one-half of a nutmeg grated, and salt to taste. Butter the inside of jars or glasses and pack the paste as firmly as possible, mixing the bits of calf's tongue with it. Cover with melted butter, and put on the covers when the butter is hard. Set in the refrigerator and the mixture will keep for weeks.

Waffles.—Beat one egg, add two cupfuls of sour milk, three-fourths of a teaspoonful of soda, one and one-half teaspoonfuls of baking powder, two tablespoonfuls of sugar and about three and a half cupfuls of flour. The batter must not be too thick. Have the iron quite hot before greasing both sides. Do not look at the waffle until it has time to be cooked. Do not serve hot syrup with hot waffles as it makes the crispest waffle soggy.

"HELPING" THE HOUSEWIFE

The department of agriculture has established a bureau of home economics to aid the housewives of the nation—those in the city as well as in the country. Secretary Wallace is looking about for a capable woman well versed in the art of keeping house, whom he would place in charge. The bureau, it is announced, will deal with all problems affecting housekeeping.

Mr. Wallace should have little difficulty in finding someone to take charge of the bureau. There are perhaps 5,000,000 persons in the land who know enough to handle the job. They are the women who for the greater part of their lives have darned the children's stockings, cooked their husbands' dinners and made both ends meet during high prices by hard scrimping. To these women the department of agriculture would administer sagacious advice on the art of keeping house.

With every respect for the very fine intentions involved in this move, it is feared the number of women that would be benefited by it is necessarily limited. Mrs. Jones, who lives out on the farm, for ten or fifteen years now has washed the children's faces and combed their hair before they went to school. After that she did the breakfast dishes, scrubbed the porch, cleaned the house, looked after the baby, and before long began the preparation of dinner. She has gone through this routine year in and year out, until she is an expert at it. Mrs. Jones, during her lifetime, has probably baked enough bread to last all the government employees in Washington many months.

Now the government, it is presumed, is to send her a recipe for making watermelon preserves and a circular on the correct method of sewing on buttons.

The American housewife does not

need advice on the manner of keeping house. She needs an agency that will let the sun shine into her life, that will let things of beauty creep in that have been crowded out by the broom and the dustpan, and that will bring smiles on a face now wrinkled by sorrow, toil and hardship. Perhaps Secretary Wallace can accomplish something like that with his bureau of home economics. If he does, the nation should hail him as the greatest man of his time, for such he would be.

WHAT TO EAT

After using the center from an Edam cheese, save the shell and use it for a shell to bake macaroni with cheese. Cook one cupful of macaroni in salted water until tender, drain and put with well seasoned white sauce.

into the shell, cover with well buttered crumbs and let brown in the oven. Wrap the outside of the shell with a thick paper to keep the heat from destroying the color of the shell.

Green Butter.—This is nice to serve with various dishes on any occasion when green is to be the color note. Wash two ounces of fresh parsley and cook until tender in just the water that clings to the leaves, adding no more unless there is danger of burning. When tender pound to a paste with a little lachry for flavor and mix with three ounces of butter, mixing well. Press the whole through a fine sieve and keep on ice until ready to serve. As a garnish for fish this is especially attractive.

Ribbon Salad.—For each service place a slice of fresh or canned pineapple on two or three heart leaves of lettuce; on the pineapple place two sections each of orange and grapefruit free from all membrane; between these sections place an eighth of an apple, with a bright red peeling left on. Serve with mayonnaise.

Hot Rice With Hot Chocolate Sauce.—Mix one-half cupful of rice with one teaspoonful of salt, one-half teaspoonful of grated nutmeg, one-third of a cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of raisins, with one quart of scalded milk. Turn into a buttered baking dish and bake slowly for two hours, stirring occasionally during the first hour. After two hours add one pint of cold milk and continue baking three-fourths of an hour longer. Serve with hot chocolate sauce.

Sponge Cake Custard.—Spread slices of sponge cake with raspberry or currant jam. Arrange them in a buttered, paper-lined pudding dish, sprinkled with finely crushed peanut brittle. Beat three eggs, add one-half teaspoonful of salt, three tablespoonfuls of sugar and a pint of hot milk. Pour over the cake and bake until firm. Serve hot or cold.

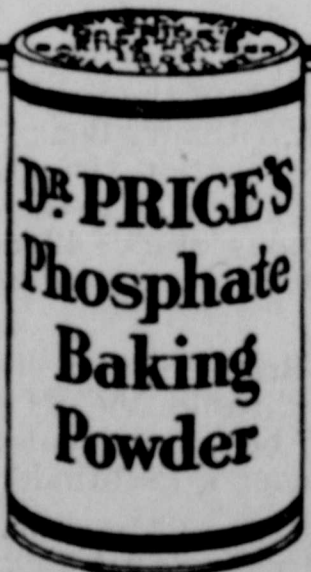

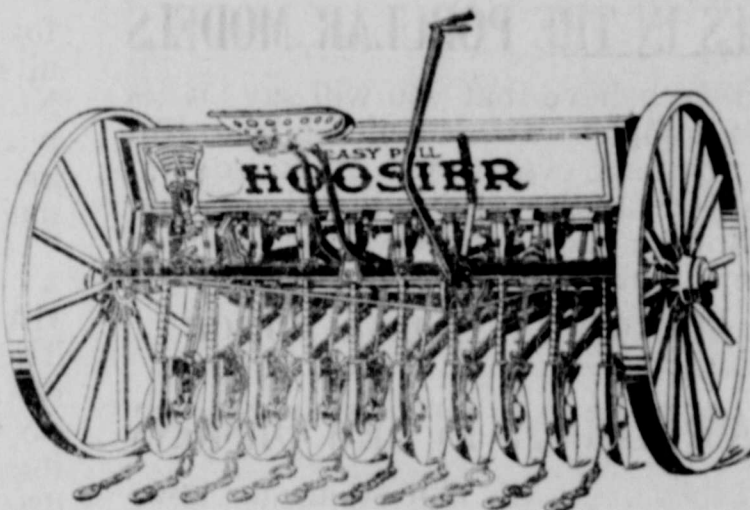

THREE LITTLE PLANTS

One day last Spring one of our
neighbors gave us three little plants.
All came from the same garden on
the same day and were the same
kind of plants. We planted one by
the side of the road, where it got
just what nature happened to give
it. Another was planted on the
shady side of the house, where it
would have all the water that fell
on that side of the house. The third
one was planted in the center of the
backyard, where the waste water
from the kitchen sink could reach it
every day. And now it is time for
maturity, and what is the result?

The flower by the house got to
much water and not enough sun-
shine. It rained so much the first
month that it was almost drowned
out. Then the dry weather came
and the flower just stood there bare-
ly live all Summer. Today it is a
dwarfed, flowerless stem. No beauty,
no pleasure to anybody, but it has
had the same time and the same
work spent upon it. The flower by
the road has had all the sunshine
of the whole Summer, but it did not
get enough rain to balance the sun-
shine and it is dried up and almost
dead just when it should be living
in all its glory. The flower in the
back yard that was fed by the waste
water from the kitchen every day,
received the same number of sun-
beams as the one by the road, but it
is a thing of beauty. It is literally
loaded with perfect blooms. It is
fulfilling its complete mission in this
world, giving beauty to everyone it
meets and sending its fragrance out
into the whole yard. It is a joy to
the whole family.

Why the difference? Simply
this. The flower by the house had
too much water and not enough sun-
shine to fulfill its mission in life.
The one by the road had enough sun-
shine, but not enough rain to bal-
ance the growing possibilities of its
life. The third flower grew perfect-
ly by utilizing the waste water. It
did more. It prevented an ugly un-
sanitary place in the yard by ab-
sorbing the waste water. And now
instead of an empty ugly, unheal-
thy puddle of stagnant water, all
through these long, lonesome, cloud-
y, frosty Autumn days there is
something beautiful to look at
through our kitchen window as we
wash dishes three times a day.

Yesterday we talked about ju-
venile crime. Can you see any anal-
ogy between the story of the three
plants and juvenile crime? What
is the results when a child has too
much of one thing no matter how es-
sential that one thing is to life, and
not enough of another? What is

the result when a child's life is to-
sed by fate to the side of the great
broad road of mankind to live and
grow by chance with no one to care
for it; with no one to see that the
needs of its life are balanced; with
no one to provide a way for it to
have enough of one thing to keep
the other part of its nature grow-
ing? But it is the fate of the third
plant that we would have you think
about most. What saved it? What
brought its life to perfect maturity?
What enabled it to fulfill its mission
in this world? Was it not what
otherwise would have been wasted?

Why have we so many dwarfed
and fruitless lives in the world to-
day? Why are there so many un-
happy, miserable and withered men
and women dragging through life
without a ray of hope or joy in their
lives just when they should be en-
joying the glory of a beautiful,
fruitful life? And why have we so
many juvenile criminals in our land
at this hour? Is it not because
some have had too much joy and
money and pleasure in their lives
and others have not had enough?
And do you not think if the time and
money that is being wasted in Amer-
ica today could be utilized to pro-
vide the kind of schools and plea-
sures, and environment necessary to
a balanced life for all the children
that we would not only save and
bring to a successful maturity mil-
lions of lives in the future, but if
using the waste money and time for
those who need it we would also
save the lives of these that are be-
ing wrecked by waste?

But it is not alone money and
time that is needed. The other day
a teacher said to a motherless boy,
"Son, I'm proud of your work this
year." The answer was, "You are
the first man that ever said that to
me." The sunshine of the soul is a
kind word once in awhile. And the
moisture that makes a boy's life
grow is a teardrop of sympathy now
and then when his heart is cold and
hungry. If we would give a little bit
of love to the boys and girls that
we are wasting on our own selfish
selves, it might fill a deep vacuum
in their lives, start their hopes to
growing and save us from some tra-
gedy. Why, a lot of folks give more
love to dogs than boys. What kind
of a world would this be if all our
waste were utilized to make better
boys and girls?

The big man, the man of property and influence, must set an example in obedience to law for the small man, who also must respect the law, which assures him liberty to grasp his opportunities. Both in co-operation and in obedience to the law can insure the prosperity and happiness of our America.—American Lumberman.
