

Contest Echoes Election Of Congressman Garner Witnesses Face Stern Examination In Mitchell Trial

Attempt To Prove Guilt Of Murphy Slayer Is Difficult

Witnesses Tell Of Finding
Murphy's Clothing Near
Mitchell's Tent Near Time
Of Killing.

MITCHELL'S BROTHER TAKES STAND FOR HIM

Defendant Is Calm and In
Easy Manner Throughout
Trial; Proceedings To
Continue Today.

(By Associated Press)
FORT DAVIS, Aug. 29.—State
attorneys today gave circumstantial
evidence against Paul Mitchell, 27, on
trial for the slaying of Pat Murphy
at Iran, Texas, last September.
They were subjected to stern cross
examination today.

Mitchell and his brother, Dave,
were indicted after Murphy's body,
the skull crushed, was found at the
bottom of the Pecos river, Septem-
ber 30, a heavy stone was tied to
the body.

Finds Clothing.
J. W. D. McGonigal, who at the
night's session testified to
finding a belt near Mitchell's tent
resembling that worn by the dead
man, admitted his arrest for having
violated a search warrant issued by
Mitchell's counsel, Blanche McCoy,
a principal state witness, also was
asked about his private life.

The woman on direct examination
testified a shirt found near
the defendant's place as one which
McGonigal allegedly saw as a Murphy.
Frank Fry, deputy sheriff, told
of taking Murphy's body from the
river and measuring tracks which
McGonigal said were along the
same way as the defendant's shoes.

county's property valuation for 1928
total \$22,092,101, the records of

Burns revealed yesterday.

crease to new residences and busi-
ness property in the city during the

practically unchanged, his report

REPRIEVES GRANTED
Gov. Moody Stays Death
For Two Wednesday

AUSTIN, Aug. 29.—(AP)—A sixth re-
prieve was granted late today by
Governor Dan Moody to Juan Flores,
scheduled to be electrocuted
shortly after midnight tonight at
the state penitentiary at Huntsville.
The reprieve extends two months.
Flores was charged with killing a
Mexican boy, 15 years old, at San
Antonio in a grocery store holdup.

AUSTIN, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Governor
Moody late today granted a reprieve
until September 21 to J. R. "Bob"
Silver, sentenced to death for par-
ticipation in the holdup of Roscoe
Wooten, Post Vorth theater cashier
who was killed. Silver was to have
been electrocuted September 2.
The reprieve was recommended by
the State Board of Pardons so the
case might be investigated further.

Better World Wheat Market Is Forecast For 1929
By The United States Department Of Agriculture

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(AP)—A
better world market for the 1929
wheat crop than that prevailing
during the past month was fore-
cast today by the Department
of Agriculture in its annual out-
look report for winter wheat,
which noted, however, improve-
ment "probably will be only
slight, if any, better than for
the present season."

Among factors considered
likely to bring about a better
situation the department named
low prices now prevailing

which "will probably check ex-
pansion of acreage in some
countries, not only of this fall's
seedings but of 1929 spring
wheat, and the better-than-
average yields secured or in
prospect this season in the large
surplus-producing countries
which "can hardly be expected
to be repeated next season in all
these countries."

"The world's carry over of
wheat at the end of the pres-
ent season will probably be
somewhat larger than at the end

Lives of 9 People Claimed As Planes Found Wrecked

Curtis Falcon Plane With
Merrill and Ronne Falls
In New York Woods;
Hunt Carried On 3 Days.

NO REASON ASSIGNED FOR EITHER TRAGEDY

Big British Columbia Air-
ways Monoplane Is
Washed Ashore In Wash-
ington; 7 Aboard Ship.

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—The Cur-
tis Falcon biplane in which Mabel
Merrill and Edwin Ronne dis-
appeared Monday night while on a
flight from Buffalo to Curtiss Field
N. Y., was found wrecked late to-
day atop a thickly wooded hill near
Port Jervis, N. Y.

The wreckage was located by J.
Nelson Kelley, a Fairchild pilot and
one of scores of aviators who par-
ticipated in a systematic search for
the missing plane.

Wreckage Is Isolated.
C. S. "Casey" Jones, head of the
Curtiss Flying Service, who has
been in charge of the searching
squadron operations from Ithaca
telephoned Frank H. Russell, Cur-
tis general manager, that the
wreckage had been discovered, but
in such an inaccessible spot that
no one had been able to reach it
and learn whether Merrill and Ron-
ne had been killed.

Jones and his party, he reported
struck the edge of the thick under-
brush near the scene of the wreck
at 8:15 tonight and an hour later
cutting their way with axes and
plunging saws almost impenetra-
ble bushes, they had progressed but
a mile and a half. No one else, al-
though Jones said, had been able to get
any nearer the wreckage than that.

Becoming lost, they abandoned
search, to be resumed tomorrow.

Eight Nations Agree To Adhere To Kellogg Pact Answering U.S. Invite

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—Eight nations today formally had com-
municated to the United States adherence or intention to adhere to
the Kellogg anti-war treaty in response to invitations extended by
America to 48 countries Monday after the signing of the compact in
Paris.

Adherences came from Peru and Liberia and declarations of in-
tention from the Dominican Republic, Denmark, Bolivia, Austria,
Cuba and Costa Rica. Unofficial advices also brought information that
Bulgaria, Rumania, Norway, Argentina, and Yugoslavia intended to
come in.

Favorable replies from the re-
maining nations are expected with-
in a short time in view of Secretary
Kellogg's pressing invitation point-
ing out that "any government ad-
hering promptly will fully share in
the benefits of the treaty at the
very moment it comes into effect."

Notices of adherence sent to
Washington for deposit in conformity
with terms of the treaty are con-
sidered equivalent to signature of
the treaty itself and will become
effective as soon as the pact comes
into force. When that will be of-
ficials are unable to foretell. The
United States Senate, to whom the
President will send the treaty as
soon as it convenes in December
probably will act as promptly as
possible, and the constitutional re-
quirements of ratification in other
countries likely will necessitate some
time.

**League Of Nations
Council Gathering
For Fall Session**

Troubles of Nations Will Be
Presented to Leaders In
Geneva; Membership
Change Expected.

(By Associated Press)
GENEVA, Aug. 29.—The trouble-
some request by Costa Rica for an
interpretation of the Monroe Doc-
trine by the Council of the League
of Nations will not be includ-
ed in the Agenda of that body
when it starts its autumn session
tomorrow.

The subject will be considered
privately.
This was decided by council
leaders tonight.

The general view is that the
Monroe Doctrine is a unilateral
proclamation by the United States.
Therefore, it is held, the League
of Nations is neither competent to
explain nor justified in expounding
its meaning.

Several changes in council mem-
bership are in prospect. Council
term expires here there is a feeling
that it should be re-elected so that
it will be well represented at Ge-
neva during reconstruction in that
country. Spain probably will be
chosen to the council as successor
to Holland. Either Venezuela or
Paraguay is likely to be named as
successor to Colombia.

APPEAL IS MADE TO SECRETARY KELLOGG

Cites Importation of Men
From Mexico and Use of
"Goat Barbecues" to Win
Election for Garner.

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Aug. 29.—Sid Hardin,
superintendent of schools at Mis-
sion, defeated for the congressional
nomination in the fifteenth district
by the veteran John Garner, rank-
ing house Democrat at the July 28
Democratic primary has appealed to
Secretary of State Kellogg to in-
vestigate illegal voting of 10,000
Mexicans it became known here to-
day.

"The deciding factor was that of
approximately 10,000 citizens of
Mexico voting in our elections,"
Mr. Hardin wrote to Secretary Kel-
logg, according to a letter made
public by T. E. Ervin, former state
representative, his chief of counsel.

"As a candidate in that primary
against Hon. John N. Garner, I
have filed a petition in the 38th
district court of Texas at Uvalde,
contesting the nomination of Con-
gressman Garner."

Officials Ignored of Practice.
"My purpose in writing you is to
direct your attention to the fact
that citizens of Mexico are voting
illegally in elections in the United
States and no doubt doing so with-
out the knowledge of the Mexican
officials."

He also asked that Secretary Kel-
logg use his influence to have re-
turned to Texas jurisdiction such

YOUR CHILDREN

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The approach of school brings the annual crop of vaccinations. In every state the various boards of health demand that children show certificates of successful vaccination before they can be admitted to public schools. It has taken many years to convince some parents of the necessity of vaccination, but most people now realize that in being vaccinated their children are protected from a real and ever-threatening danger, and not needlessly subjected to an inoculation with nothing but official red tape behind it.

Smallpox is no respecter of persons. It spares neither rich nor poor, young nor old. It is one of the most terrible and loathsome of diseases. Vaccination has pretty well stamped out smallpox in this country, but were the eternal vigilance of health authorities to relax for one instant there is no doubt that it would be only a question of months until the disease had whole communities in its grip.

We read constantly of the progress of science and its contributions toward the lengthened span of life. The age to which man may expect to live has been increased by many years in the last few decades. Not by medicines and pills, even by the treatment of disease, but chiefly by the prevention of disease, smallpox among them. Diphtheria is another. Since the discovery of antitoxin we have learned to think of diphtheria as little more serious than tonsillitis or any other sore throat. Only those who have battled with it before the days of antitoxin know its terrors.

And so it is with vaccination. We do not fear what we do not know. The fact that we do not know smallpox is due entirely to the reason of vaccination.

One French doctor in a recent address made the remark that a country was in the greatest danger from an epidemic of disease when it felt the safest, because it was likely to forget the precautions necessary to prevent that disease.

Boards of health see to it that our vigilance on this score does not relax. They are saving us in spite of ourselves.

But parents have come to understand and realize the necessity of vaccination and no longer defer when asked to comply with the little yellow slip, which spells safety for their children.

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST - Seedless white grapes, cereal cream, crisp broiled bacon, creamed hash potatoes, baked radishes, crisp toast, milk coffee.

LUNCHEON - Salmon salad, whole wheat bread and butter, sandwiches, blueberry bread pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER - Shoulder of veal braised with vegetables, tomato and cucumber salad, apple sauce with ginger bread, milk coffee.

Almost any kind of fruit can be used in place of blueberries. Large fruits, such as peaches or apples, must be cut in small pieces, but berries can be substituted and used in exactly the same fashion.

Blueberry Bread Pudding. One quart berries, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup raisins, 1 cup water, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup butter. Wash and pick over berries. Combine with sugar, salt, cinnamon and water. Mix well and cook ten minutes. Cut several slices of bread and remove crusts. Spread with butter and cut in half inch cubes. Put in a layer of hot berry mixture into a buttered mold. Fill with bread cubes. Press down until mold is half full and add more berry mixture. Fill again with buttered bread cubes and again press down. The mold should be packed full of bread saturated with the berry mixture. Place in the refrigerator to become cold and firm. Turn out of mold and cut in slices to serve. Serve with hard sauce.

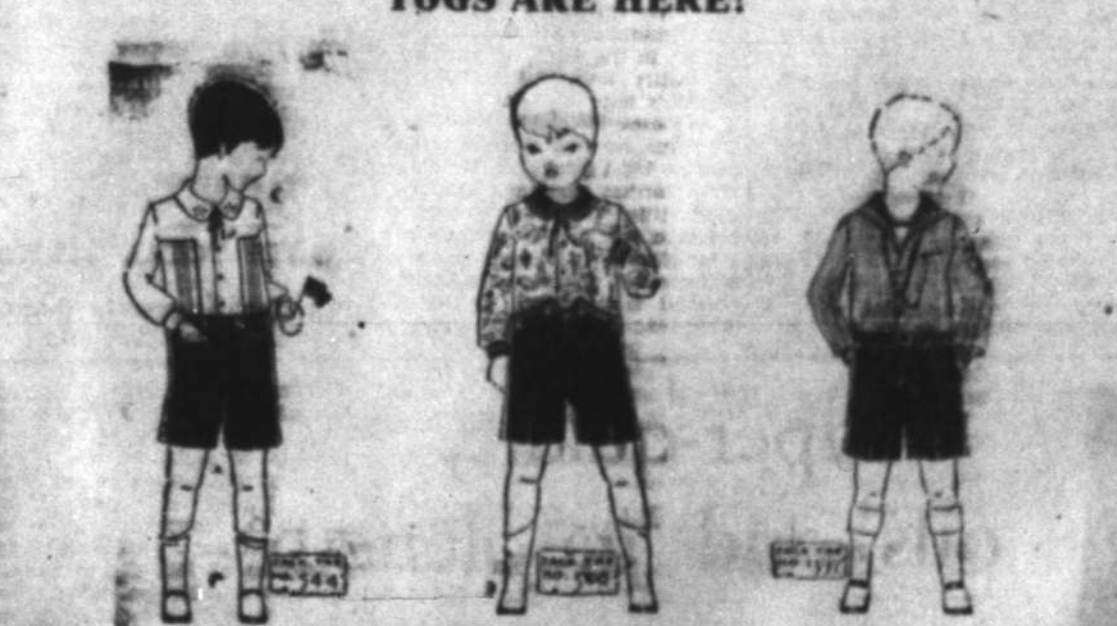

of the speakers' bureau, and Representative John Q. Tilson, of Connecticut, director of the Eastern speakers' bureau, Hoover laid down the general course of action he will deliver in the East and at least one will be made in New England.

Budget Is Pared

Budget conference brought heads of various departments of the Republican national committee into consultation with J. R. Nutt, of Chicago, national treasurer, Jeremiah Millbank, Eastern treasurer, and Dr. Hubert Work, chairman of the committee. The chiefs engaged in a pering down process described as designed to trim all expenditures on the expense budget so as to bring the total to as nearly within the three million dollar figure as possible.

At the same time Dr. Work issued a statement describing as "abnormal" quotations attributed to John J. Raskob, chairman of the Democratic national committee, charging that he had information that the Republican budget was between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000.

Budget Not Extended

Raskob, chairman of the Democratic national committee, reiterated here today that the republicans are trying to raise a budget in excess of the \$4,000,000 maximum campaign fund announced by the Republican National committee. Raskob's statement was directed to the statement by Chairman Work of the Republican committee that Raskob's assertion republicans are planning to raise a fund of from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000, was "absurd." Raskob said the Democratic fund would not exceed \$4,000,000.

Mexican citizens as had voted illegally.

In a letter to Frederick R. Lehlbach, chairman of the Congressional Investigation Committee, as made public by Mr. Erwin, Mr. Hardin asserted: "I received a majority of the legitimate votes of the district but was defeated by the nomination."

He demanded the committee "investigate and prosecute those responsible for the deplorable conditions existing in this congressional district."

Among the allegations, which Mr. Hardin asked be investigated were these:

"While there were less than 27,000 votes cast in said district, there were approximately 10,000 votes cast by persons who were not residents of the precincts or the county of the state of Texas or of the United States, but were in truth and in fact citizens of the Republic of Mexico and that these Mexicans were imported at a very great expense, and permitted to vote and their illegal votes were cast for the Hon. John N. Garner."

Mexicans Taught to Vote. "That the uneducated and ignorant Mexicans, who could neither read nor write, were taught to vote for the first time on the list and in furtherance of a conspiracy to elect the Hon. John N. Garner, his name was placed on the ballot, not by drawing for places as required by law, but was arbitrarily placed first on the ballot by the so-called political ring."

"One of the methods used in preparing the Mexicans for the casting of their illegal ballots was that of feasting them by the thousands at 'goat barbecues' where they were served large quantities of intoxicating liquors in violation of the Federal prohibition laws and as a result of these 'goat barbecues' and liquor parties, the uneducated and ignorant Mexicans were voted in blocks."

Alleges \$100,000 Spent. Mr. Hardin alleged that more than \$100,000 was spent in behalf of Mr. Garner's candidacy. He cited the returns from Duval, Starr, Zapala, Webb and Brooks counties, all along or near the international border, and asserted he had statements from many citizens in numbers greater than the votes counted for him that he had been their choice in the primary voting.

In Duval county Mr. Garner got 1193 votes to none for Hardin. "I have the statements of at least 100 reputable citizens who voted for me in the above county and will so testify under oath," said Mr. Hardin's letter.

Loss in Home County. In his home county of Hidalgo, lost by 752 to 4,029 for Mr. Garner. Mr. Hardin alleged he received more than 700 votes in two precincts of the 22 in the county.

Mr. Garner, a veteran of the lower house of congress, has been accused as probably the next minority leader.

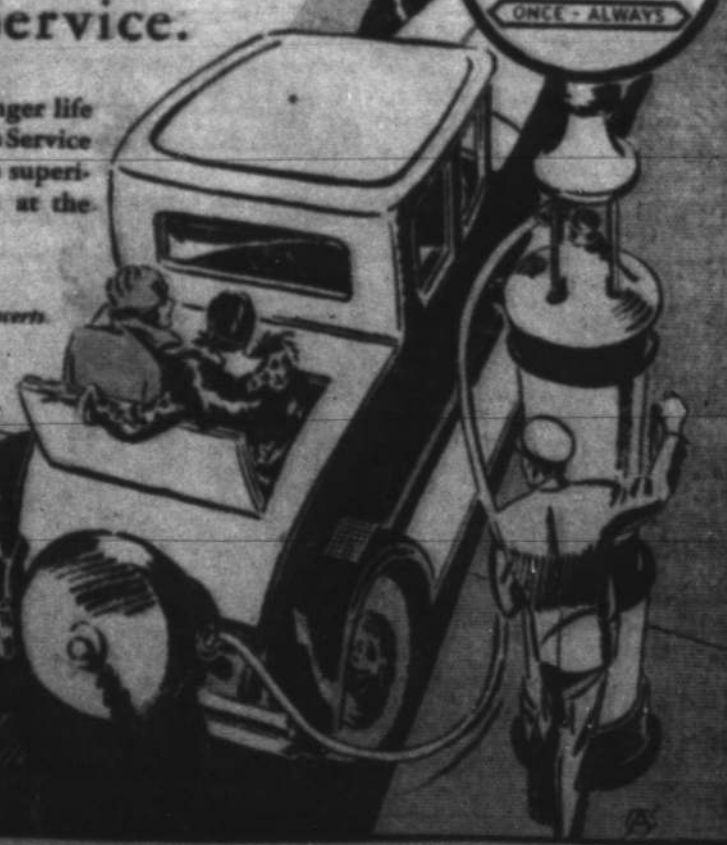

Those Make Be Capitol

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Dupre Makes Plea For Boys' Work To Lubbock Rotarians

Cites Delinquency Cases As Cause For Alarm; Boys' Counselor Is Urged As Means of Betterment.

Pointing out that untold benefits would be reaped from the plan, George Dupre, local attorney who recently moved here from Hillsboro, struck a vital spot in the city's welfare conditions yesterday in a speech before the Lubbock Rotary club, as he made a plea for the employment of a man capable of working with authorities and at the same time acting as counselor for the youth of the city.

Urges More Interest. Citing examples of grave juvenile delinquency here and in other parts of the state, Mr. Dupre urged more individual interest in the boys of the city. His speech was the principal part of the program for the club's regular weekly luncheon.

"I am not disparaging your county court and I am not criticizing your city court," he told his listeners, "but I do say that Lubbock's boy problem should be placed in the hands of some man who is big enough and strong enough to take care of them, to listen to their troubles and advise with them."

Problem Is Allocated. "We say that the world is going to hell," he said, "but it is what we do about it. Our entire social, economic and governmental system rests finally upon the shoulders of the individual and if the boys of today, who are going to be the leaders of tomorrow, do not get our attention as they should their future weaknesses will find us directly responsible."

Murray Makes Report.

President R. J. Murray followed Mr. Dupre and reported on the recent meeting of presidents and secretaries of Rotary clubs of the district, held last week at Mineral Wells. For the month of June the Lubbock club led the other 33 clubs of the district in attendance with a percentage of 93.15, Mr. Murray reported. The average attendance was 83 per cent, he said, and Lubbock was followed in the standings by Arlington, Post, Falls and Belton.

Ray Graham was chairman of the program and out of town guests included Arthur P. Duggan, Littlefield; Morgan Copeland, Brownfield; Ed Roberts, Roswell; Grady Kinman, Dallas, and Bill Lawrence, Mineral Wells. Messrs. Copeland and Duggan were each called upon to make a few remarks at the close of the program.

Trading Grimes To Pirates Was Biggest Mistake Of 1928 Season For Giant Boss

By BILLY EVANS

Even the greatest of baseball managers make mistakes. I consider John McGraw as outstanding in the matter of handling a ball club. He is smart, he is courageous, he believes in taking a chance rather than sticking to the stereotyped play so closely followed by many leaders, and last but not least, he believes in himself.

McGraw has the courage of his convictions. He is willing to gamble on his judgment and seldom has an ally to offer if failure is his portion.

But, as I have said before, the greatest of leaders make mistakes and last winter when Pitcher Burleigh Grimes was traded to Pittsburgh for Yule Aldridge, New York made a deal that may cost that club the pennant.

Recently I read where McGraw said the deal was made contrary to his wishes and that he knew nothing of the completion of the shift in pitchers until he read the news in the papers. If that report is true, then the higher-ups may have to shoulder the responsibility for the transaction that may prove so costly.

Last season Grimes had one of his best years, winning 19 and losing only eight, a record that won him his first ranking on the New York pitching staff. Aldridge, with the pennant-winning Pirates won 13 while losing only 10, a good record, but not nearly so imposing as the mark set by Grimes.

It was only natural that the trade that sent Grimes from New York to Pittsburgh in exchange for Aldridge should create more than passing attention. The experts were a unit in the belief that New York got much the worst of the deal.

Now the experts are not always right. Usually, when the wise boys are united in the belief that a trade is all wet, the player picked as the "goat" of the transaction steps right out, has his best year and makes the experts look like a lot of dumbbells.

Burleigh Grimes, however, has done just the opposite. He has made the experts appear more than wise by delivering even better than predicted, while Aldridge has failed to run true to form.

With the season two-thirds over, Grimes boasts the best record in either major league in the matter of games run, being the first to reach the 20 mark. While winning 20 games for Pittsburgh, he lost only nine, and that with a club floundering about in the second division most of the season.

Aldridge, late in signing, therefore slow to report and round into shape, shows at the same stage of the race only four victories against four defeats. Just figure where the Giants would be if Grimes' 20 victories were added to their games won. Answer: On the way to another pennant. Instead of three games behind as was the club at Lubbock for several days.

Big Scout Exhibit Being Planned for P-S. Plains Fair

Regulations Are Given Out For Competitive Work In Exhibit; Many Prizes To Be Given.

Plans for a big exhibit at the Panhandle and South Plains fair, which opens here October 1, are now being made by the South Plains area council of the Boy Scouts of America.

The scouting exhibit will be housed in a special tent, 65 feet long and 35 feet wide. The area around the tent will be used for exhibits of different types of tents, pioneer construction work, Indian totem poles, and many other interesting articles.

Rules Are Made. Troops of the council will be following rules and regulations will govern.

1. The competition is open to all Boy Scouts and Boy Scout troops in the district covered by the Panhandle and South Plains fair.

2. Reservations for a troop booth must be made by September 23. All exhibits must be in place by 9 a. m. October 1.

3. Only one entry allowed from any scout or troop for any one prize.

4. Worthy exhibits not listed for competition will be awarded ribbon prizes.

5. First honors will be given if the exhibit is worthy, but there must be three or more exhibits in the same class to win first money or prize.

Troop Exhibits. The troop exhibit should be made to occupy a table space of five by ten feet and wall space six feet square. These exhibits may contain anything pertaining to scouting. They

will be judged on neatness, arrangement and variety of scouting material shown. The fair association offers the following prizes: First prize \$12.50; second prize \$7.50; third prize \$5.00.

Handicraft Exhibits. The South Plains council will offer ribbon prizes for the following exhibits in individual competition:

1. Arrows. A brace (3) of target arrows mounted on beaver board not to exceed eight inches wide and not over three inches longer than the arrows.

2. Leathercraft. A group of three articles as outlined in the merit badge for leathercraft. The three articles to be mounted on a suitable background.

3. Tin Can Craft. Three or more useful or ornamental articles made of tin cans.

4. Airplanes. No restrictions on design or construction. Must be able to fly under own power.

5. Indian Bead Work. Two or more articles suitably mounted.

6. Bead Looms. Any design made of bead material.

7. Woodcarving. Any article as outlined in the merit badge for woodcarving.

8. Wood Work. Any article as outlined in the merit badge for wood work.

9. Taxidermy. Any specimen as outlined in the merit badge for taxidermy.

10. Pioneering. Bridges, towers, derricks or other forms of pioneer construction. Model must not be over 24 inches in any direction.

Patrol Competition. The following rules will govern patrol competition:

1. Knot Boards. Boards to contain 30 knots. They may be in any shape, but must not scale over 12 square feet of background.

2. Neckerchief Slides. One for each member of the patrol mounted on a light background not to exceed twelve inches square.

3. Paper Knives. One for each member of the patrol mounted on a light background not to exceed 12 inches square.

Complaints Come In. Numerous complaints have been received concerning rank weeds over the city which are a great menace to the health and sanitation conditions of Lubbock. Later fires may easily break out as a result, it was said.

The police department is to cooperate with Dr. Rollo in seeing that the weeds are cut, it was learned yesterday.

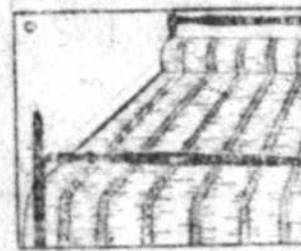

But He Appears In Jail

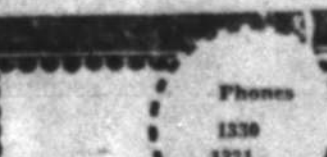

FEVER IS RAGING

Typhoid Claims Seven Near Dallas Recently

DALLAS, Aug. 29 (AP)—With seven deaths in the past week, and about twenty-five persons ill with high fever indicating typhoid fever, city and county authorities took vigorous action here today to stamp out an incipient epidemic of the disease in a Mexican settlement near Record Crossing, northwest of here. Three of the seriously ill have been removed to a hospital here, and city health officer, said he would have others stricken brought here.

Health officers were assembling chemicals with which to treat wells and other possible sources of infection, and several public nurses will be sent to the community to instruct the Mexicans in methods to check the disease.

The health chief said there is no cause for alarm here. Adding the water is pure.

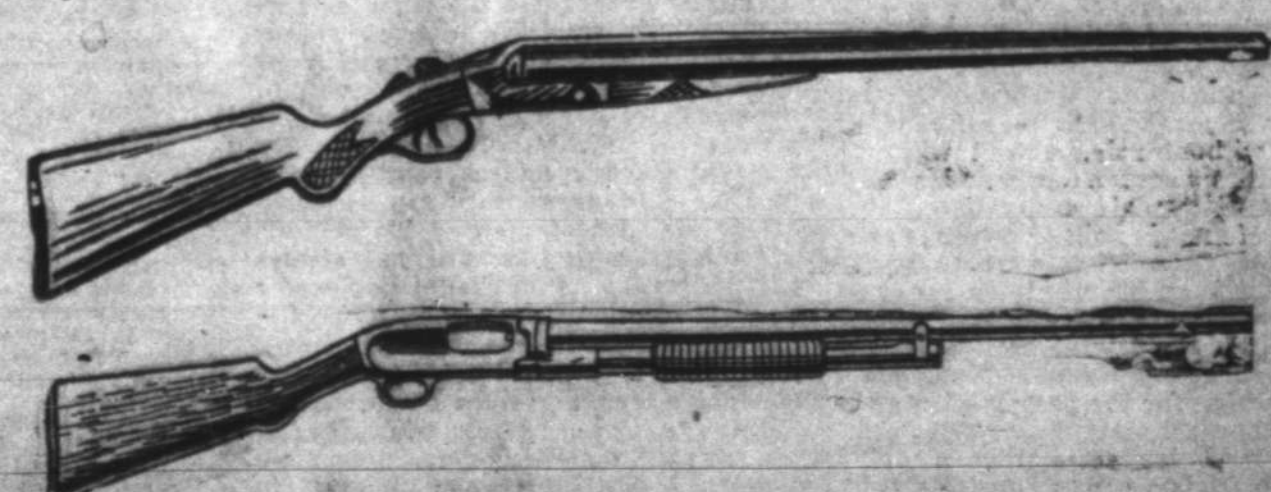

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 29. (P)—An early advance of about \$1.50 a bale was followed by reactions in the cotton market today and although prices fluctuated frequently rather heavy liquidation was encountered in the final trading on fears of large private crop forecasts. December contracts which had traded up to 18.85, or 26 points net up, eased off to 18.32 and closed at 18.34, compared with 18.43 at yesterday's close. The general market closed steady at net declines of 6 to 12 points.

Opening prices were higher in sympathy with bullish Liverpool cables. The English market came in 2 to 3 penny points higher than the local and private cables attributed the firmness there to continental buying, trade calling and shorts covering. First trades here showed gains of 11 to 15 points and before the initial demand was supplied October contracts reached 18.62 and the general market showed advances of 23 to 26 points. Several reports of crop deterioration added to the firmness.

Crop Report Affects

When the weekly weather and crop summary was issued traders at first construed it as mildly bearish although the report as a whole was mixed. Early buyers sold and before the offerings were absorbed October contracts reacted to 18.32 and December highs but still 1 to 2 points over the 18.43, or 24 points down from the previous close. Continued unfavorable crop reports carried values up 12 points from the lows but after mid-season fears of large private forecasts and bearish crop condition averages brought liquidation which carried prices off to new lows for the day at 18.32 for October and 18.32 for December or 37 points under the early highs and 9 to 11 points below yesterday's close. There was a minor rally at the end and prices closed at 18.32 and 18.34, or 24 and 6 and 12 points, respectively, lower for the day.

Trading on covering and buying promoted by bullish crop advices, apprehensions that further showers in the south would stimulate boll weevil activities, and unfavorable private weekly reviews of crop progress.

October contracts sold up to 19.26 and March to 19.14, with all positions selling well above the recent level, but the advance was checked by realizing at these figures and the market weakened after the publication of the weekly report of the weather bureau. This report evidently was less bullish than expected, and the market acted as if there had been considerable buying recently in anticipation that this weekly review would furnish a basis for profit taking. Offerings increased and the market worked gradually lower during the afternoon.

There were little spurts of covering which caused more or less irregularity, but the bulges met increased offerings with the market becoming more active and weak late in the afternoon. The bulk of the selling was attributed to realizing for liquidation, but there was a little more southern selling here in the last half hour which probably encouraged some selling by local or Wall Street interests. October broke to 18.90 and March to 18.72 and closing prices were the lowest of the day.

NEW YORK STOCKS

NEW YORK, Aug. 29. (P)—A sensational upward movement of stock prices was checked by heavy profit-taking just before the close of today's market. Extreme gains, which ran from 2 to nearly 14 points in the active issues were cut down, and in a few cases wiped out. Both the railroad and industrial averages compiled by the Associated Press showed net gains. The latter touching a new high record for the year. Trading started off at a terrific pace with the result that the ticker fell more than 20 minutes behind the market, but it slowed up during the afternoon. Total sales were 3,743,000 shares.

The unexpected ease of call money in the face of heavy month-end and Labor Day demands provided the chief background for the upward movement. Call loans renewed at 7 1-2 per cent and the official rate held steady at that figure all day, but loans were arranged in the "outside market" as low as 7 per cent in the afternoon. Time money held firm at 6 1-2 per cent.

New high records were established by more than two score issues including such representative shares as American Can, U. S. Steel common, National Cash Register, Paramount Famous Lasky, Briggs Manufacturing, Loose Wiles, International Nickel and Victor Talking Machine.

A brisk demand for the copper shares was influenced by reports that the refined storage of the red metal were at the lowest levels in years. American Smelting ran up more than 10 points to a new peak at 348, as against a low of 169 earlier in the year. Kennecott and Calumet and Hecla also moved into new high ground and Anaconda moved up 2 points.
