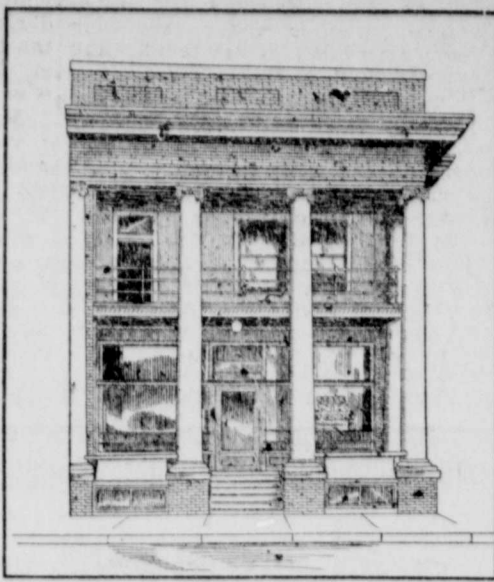

### Master of the Rolls

#### Once Not Empty Title

In the days before printing, the old records were always written on a form which made them literally a roll, says the *Dearborn Independent*. One sheet of parchment was used and the next one was sewed to its bottom edge, and the process repeated until a document might consist of a hundred or more sheets, or skins, as they were then called, all sewed together in one long strip. A piece of wood was then fastened to either end in the manner of a modern map, and the strip rolled up from the bottom into a great roll or bundle. The reader began at the top, slowly unrolling one end as one rolled up the other end on another stick.

From this form rolls came to stand for manuscripts, particularly official manuscripts or court records. The keeper or master of the rolls was then the high officer who kept the records of the English courts of justice. Today the president of the chancery division of the high court of justice in England, ranking next to the lord chief justice of England, is styled the master of the rolls. Originally the master of the rolls had custody of the records, but in the course of time this charge became merely nominal.

### Fantastic Titles Given to Court Favorites

Among the whimsical titles which appear on the pages of national history few are more apparently frivolous than the duke of Marmalade, the count of Lemonade, and the earl of Brandy. They are, or were, however, real titles bestowed by a genuine monarch on three favorites during the last century. In 1811, a revolution occurred in Haiti, and Christopher, a negro, declared himself emperor. Through conspiracy and plot he retained power until 1820, preserving to the last the appearance of a royal court and creating numerous nobility. Among them were the three mentioned; and far from being instances of the frivolity of the African character, they were names of places, the first two being originally plantations, but latterly towns of some importance.

### Good Reason for Returning

Commodore Albert B. Armitage of the British navy, in his book "Cadet to Commodore," gives the following glimpse of the explorer Shackleton in the role of a reporter: "Shackleton and some of his comrades joined the Isis in Port Said on their homeward journey after his wonderful dash for the

pole. He was cheery and full of vim as ever. The publisher of his book, 'The Heart of the Antarctic,' a copy of which he sent to me—several reporters, and Italian officials met him. I took him to see my home, and then to our agency, where he composed a number of telegrams. He wanted, so he said, a 'catchword.' He walked up and down the room, muttering several phrases to himself. 'I've got it at last,' he cried, 'Death lay ahead and food behind, so I had to return.'

### Dancing to Paradise

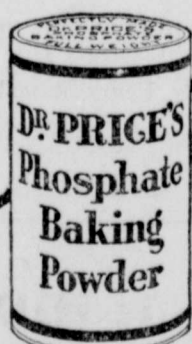

### FLUVANNA NEWS.

#### T. L. Winston Dead.

This is not meant for an obituary, but a somewhat extended paragraph relative to the deceased. True, Mr. Winston's home was at Snyder but his business was here. This, together with the fact that he died here, accounts for this article, under the head, "Fluvanna News." The people of this community were greatly shocked and deeply grieved when they learned, last Friday, June 11, 1926, of the untimely and sudden death of Brother Winston. He having been for

several years the cashier of the First State Bank of this place and a cotton buyer, was a familiar figure both in the bank and on our streets. As usual he had spent the previous night with his family in Snyder. Friday morning he started back to Fluvanna but failed to appear at the bank. About noon he was discovered sitting in his car in an unconscious condition, by the side of the road at the edge of our village. He was promptly brought to the Dowdy drug store, where medical aid was summoned; but all in vain. The family arrived from Snyder before death relieved the sufferer at about 2:25 p. m. Mr. Odom, a Snyder undertaker, was called, who took the body to Snyder and prepared same for burial.

Brother Winston, with his family, once resided for a few years at this place, and, as indicated above, had been active in our business affairs for a long time. He was a man of splendid business ability—was patient, kind and sympathetic and always ready to extend the helping hand to those in need, even to the length of his cable. His sudden exit from the walks of men is mourned by a host of friends of this and other communities.

Thomas Lackey Winston was born at Haddley, Texas, November 19, 1885, and came to this section some 22 years ago. He professed faith in Christ at the age of seven and wanted to unite with the church, but his parents, thinking him too young, dissuaded him. He did, however, at about the age of 17, unite with the Broadway Baptist church of Fort Worth. In the course of time he also became a Knights Templar Mason. Later he transferred his church membership to Snyder. He was married to Miss Estella Wilson of Snyder, by the undersigned, July 16, 1907. Three children were born to this union—T. L., Jr., Mack and Lillie Fraser. Mr. Winston's present illness, a few years ago. Two brothers and a sister survive and were at the funeral. They are: J. K. of Fort Worth, A. F. of Vernon, and Mrs. W. H. Albertson, the wife of a Baptist minister, of Haskell. Several other relatives live in or about Snyder. In addition to Snyder relatives, two of Mrs. Winston's sisters—Mrs. Ross Edwards and family of Lubbock and Mrs. R. L. Lester and family of Canyon, attended the funeral.

The funeral service was conducted by the Village Preacher, a friend of the family for many years, at the family residence Saturday at 3:30, and was attended by a large company of sympathizing friends—many of whom were of the Fluvanna community. The casket and five of the six mercantile houses of Fluvanna were closed for the occasion. The pallbearers were Messrs. C. R. Buchanan, R. H. Curnutte, Jodie Monroe and Dr. W. R. Johnson, all of Snyder, and D. A. Jones and O.

S. Wills of Fluvanna. The floral offering was both large and beautiful.

### Church Services.

While some were away on visits or otherwise hindered from attending, a large number of our people seems to have had a mind to worship the Lord on last Sunday, for there was a good attendance at the services at the Presbyterian church, and fine attention given during both morning and evening services. This is as it should be. Let the people attend church ever Sunday when reasonably possible to do so.

There will be services at both the Methodist and Christian churches next Sunday. We hope that these services will be well attended.

It may sound a bit strange when we say that all-day religious services were held here Monday, not in the open; during which time the thermometer reached and recorded a maximum temperature of 108 in the shade—the warmest day of the season up to that time.

Several people, and of different churches, attended and worked at the job. We do not know whether prayers were said or not, though they should have been, even if the service was in the form of a cotton-chopping in the Baptist church.

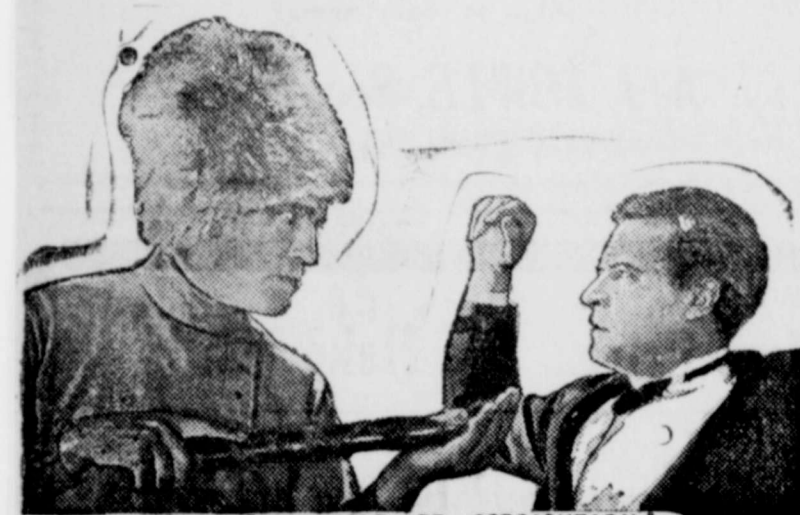

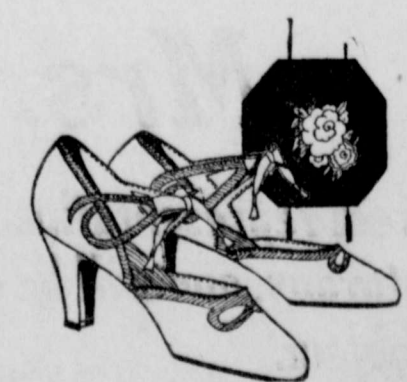

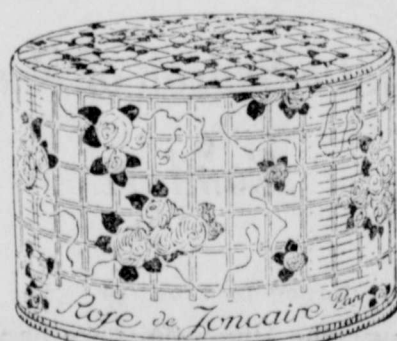

# KITCHEN KORNER

Mrs. J. L. Carrell of the "Happy Hammer Club" was the winner of the second prize in Class No. 1, and this is the story of her kitchen improvement:

"When we went to our club meeting one day last fall, we had no idea that there was going to be a contest of any kind. When our Home Demonstration Agent put before us the plan for a kitchen improvement contest, I decided very early, not for this purpose, but for an interest in the club work than for really making a modern kitchen.

"I went home and broke the news to the family. We decided we would not be able to do so much, but could make some improvements.

"My kitchen is 8x12 with a south window opening into the front porch and a door on the west leading into the dining room, another window on the north leads to the back porch. We had already painted the walls and ceiling a light green, but the shelves, etc., were unpainted. In the southeast corner, there was a row of shelves used for dishes and pans. I drove nails in the wall just below each shelf for hanging utensils. I took a piece of wire and bent it into a U shape and nailed it to the wall in the lower shelf. Inside of the shelf we fixed a little piece of blank which was very narrow, where the hanging utensils, etc., could be put. These shelves extended to about the top of the window. We built more shelves, extending to the ceiling. There were store things that are not used often, as sauce grinders. There is a door in the front to shut off the view.

"In the southwest corner we had an old home-made table covered with zinc, which was badly worn. It had a flour bin and meal bin and a large drawer we used for storing groceries. As we have a large family, one such bin did not furnish sufficient room for all, so the other groceries, sacks of dried beans, egg baskets, etc., found a parking place on the floor under and beside the cabinet. That alone would have been enough to class my kitchen inconvenient and out of date. Miss Roten told me not to fix up for the committee when they came out, but to let them see the kitchen just as it was. By the time they had stumbled over boxes, sacks and cans, I think they were fully convinced that there was indeed room for improvement. We have a new zinc on the cabinet, now and do not have that to contend with. In place of the extra large drawer we now have two, which we use for towels, napkins, etc. We built in a bread board just above the flour bin and put a new zinc on the cabinet. We removed the legs from the cabinet and made the bins extend to the floor. Then we began and built up to the ceiling. First we have a shelf we use for the keeping of a baker's powder, and all those things we need each day.

"Next there are two shelves for dishes. For my cups, I took two long pieces of galvanized wire and made hooks about every four inches by twisting it up. This makes very good cup hangers. I put one in each shelf.

"The cabinet has doors that have glass in front of the dish shelves. The lower part is solid wood to hide the shelf that is not so attractive. My ceiling is nine feet high, so that gives plenty of room up above for two large shelves for storing extra groceries, canned goods and things put away for winter. These have wooden doors.

"In the northeast corner was a table we used for storing things that had to be kept away from the ants. We had the legs placed in cans with water or insect powder to keep ants off of it. We moved this table over by the cabinet and put a curtain of unbleached domestic around the shelf on it.

"In the northwest corner between the two doors is a new white sink with water piped to it, of which I am very proud. We had water piped to the back porch but since it was on the north it was very disagreeable in the winter, as well as inconvenient at all times. If we had had no other improvements but the sink, it would have helped us all to be more agreeable as we hated to draw down water.

"In the northeast corner we kept our brooms, mops, ironing board, etc. This we have curtailed off with three-cent unbleached domestic.

"The stove is on the east side of the kitchen, where it is not far from sink, cabinet, or cook table. "Another thing I am proud of is a wheel tray table, that my son made in high school this winter. It is three feet by twenty inches. It usually occupies the space between the stove and the curtain in the corner, but the rollers on it make it possible to move it around ready for my convenience. I also have a kitchen stool made from a high chair, bought about twenty-six years ago.

"I have my cook table, shelves (inside and out), cabinet, stool and sink stand all painted white, in flat finish, my husband having done all the painting and building. "We feel that we owe the pleasure of having a more convenient kitchen to Miss Roten, our county agent. If it had not been for her I would still be taking the same old drudgery steps that I had to prepare a meal or do anything in the kitchen."
