20 WOMEN AND CHILDREN DIED IN STEAMER CRASH

(By Associated Press)
CHRISTIANIA, Norway, June 17.—Twenty persons, mostly women and children, were drowned when a Norwegian mail steamer sank late yesterday. The steamer went down immediately following a collision with another vessel.

The collision occurred in Vest Fjord, between the Lofoten Islands and the Norwegian mainland.

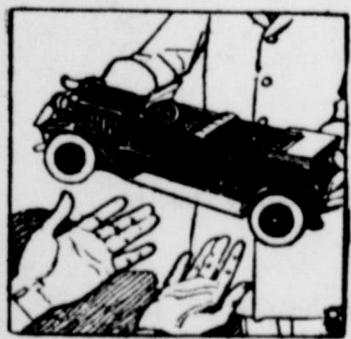

NEFF GOES ONLY AS "SPECTATOR"

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 17.—Governor Neff announced today that he would go to the Democratic National Convention in New York. He said that he would go as a "spectator." He will leave next Thursday and expects to arrive in New York Saturday.

ALBRIGHT FAILS TO GET ON TICKET

The democratic executive committee of this county, in session Monday for the purpose of making up the primary ballot, voted unanimously against placing the name of Ernest G. Albright on the ticket.

Chairman Estes Lynn laid the matter before the committee, "laying the cards on the table," so to speak, and passed the question up to the committee, and the committee voted to track the law in making out the ticket.

Mr. Albright failed to file his application with the committee in accordance with the law. The law provides that all applications must be filed with the committee by midnight of June 2nd, and specifies how the application shall be made and sworn to. Mr. Albright failed to do this, but instead addressed a brief letter to Chairman Lynn stating that he was a candidate for congress. The letter was received on June 1st.

Mr. Lynn immediately notified Mr. Albright that he had not filed his application as the law required, but it was too late for Albright to get his application in the hands of the chairman.

Similar action was taken by some of the other nineteen counties in this congressional district, while some of the committees voted to let the name go on. The committee in Taylor county, Congressman Blanton's home county, voted to place Albright's name on the ticket, the vote being 6 to 3.

Congressman Blanton wired the Taylor county committee protesting the placing of Albright's name on the ticket. "Albright didn't lawfully file," said Mr. Blanton's telegram, "I protest putting name on ticket."

In reply to Mr. Blanton, County Chairman Stinson of Taylor county, said that he agreed with the congressman, but that the committee had voted to let the name go on the ticket. Stinson said that he told the committee that it was illegal, but they voted to admit the name of Albright regardless.

The Runnels county committee transacted the business in a harmonious way.

POLITICAL SPAT WAS OVERDRAWN

CINCINNATI, June 17.—Published reports between he and William Butler, republican national committee chairman, were overdrawn, said Bascom Slem, secretary to President Coolidge, on his arrival here today.
"The statement that I had gone to the president and threatened to resign was also much stronger than the real facts in the case," said Mr. Slem. A disagreement between William Butler, Coolidge's campaign manager, and Secretary Slem was responsible for the report that Slem would resign as private secretary to the president.

NEGROES AND WHITES HAVE GUN BATTLE

NEW ORLEANS, June 17.—One negro is dead, a white man is seriously wounded and several negroes badly hurt as the result of a shooting scrape at Leesville, Louisiana, late yesterday when a bunch of negroes attempted to liberate two negro prisoners.
According to word received here from Leesville today, the negroes armed themselves and attempted to set free two negro prisoners whom the white officers were holding.

TEXAS ENJOYS REAL SUMMER

DALLAS, June 17.—The weather bureau report today showed that there had been little change in Texas temperature during the twenty-four hours ending at 7:00 o'clock this morning. The bureau predicted generally fair and warm weather for tonight and tomorrow.

Yesterday's high temperatures were practically a duplication of Sunday's readings, the range running from 110 degrees at Lubbock to 86 degrees at Galveston. Scattered showers fell at different points in the Panhandle country.

COOK & COX WILL NOT BE REMEMBERED

FT. WORTH, June 17.—Executive clemency for all the defendants in the Dr. Frederick Cook mail fraud case, except Dr. Cook and S. E. J. Cox, has been recommended to President Coolidge by Judge John Killits, of Toledo, who was sent to Texas to try the cases, it was learned today.

Cook and Cox and two dozen or more other men were convicted of using the mails to defraud in connection with oil promotion schemes, and they were sentenced for terms in the federal penitentiary varying from one year to twenty-five years. Cox was sent up for eight years, and a heavy fine assessed against him. Dr. Cook was given twenty-five years and a \$10,000 fine. Cox is in the prison serving his term and Cook is in the Fort Worth jail pending action of the court of appeals.

STOLEN MAIL FOUND IN BRUSH

JOLIET, Ill., June 17.—An automobile with twenty-five pouches of registered mail, believed to be a part of the loot of the \$3,000,000 mail robbery at Roundout, Illinois, was found today. The mail pouches were found on a farm South of here.

RECEIVE FRESH SUPPLY GRASSHOPPER SYRUP

The Carrie Mercantile Company will receive a carload of black-strap molasses tomorrow, and it will be sold to the farmers at actual cost. This firm is distributing the low grade molasses at 24 to 26 cents per gallon, charging 26 cents when it is drawn from the barrel, or 24 cents when a customer takes as much as a barrel.

DOUBLE TRAG- EDY TAKES LIVES OF 3

BRISTOW, Okla., June 17.—Two separate alleged domestic difficulties took a toll of three lives here today, two of whom were children. The dead are Marie Williams, age 1 year; Alfred Williams, age 3 years; children of J. W. Williams, a railroad worker; and Lee Conner, age 35, an oil field worker.

The two children were drowned in a lake and Conner shot himself to death as the result of a "domestic triangle" which led up to the death of the three children and the attempted suicide of Mrs. Williams, who was rescued from a lake by a man.

The police quoted Mrs. Williams as saying that she threw her children in the water and plunged in after them, but was rescued before she drowned. The children drowned before aid could reach them.

INSURGENTS MEET TO OR- GANIZE PARTY

ST. PAUL, June 17.—A purpose to organize a new national political party, despite the cruel and unwarranted attitude of Senator LaFollette, was expressed at the opening today of the National Farm Labor-Progressive convention. William Mahoney, of St. Paul, chairman of the convention which is undertaking to form the new party, said that the organization would be perfected regardless of LaFollette's attitude toward the move.

Mahoney was chosen temporary chairman of the organization. He reviewed the history of the Farm Labor Party in Minnesota, and said that the time was "auspicious to disrupt the old parties." He urged the delegates to act in unity, so as to "end the reign of the exploiter."

"This is not primarily a LaFollette movement, but a movement of the working class, with LaFollette as an important factor," said Mahoney in a passionate appeal to the delegates assembled to help launch the campaign.

It is said also to be the most economical way to fight the hoppers.

FRENCH TO HOLD RUHR; WANT GERMANS DISARMED

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, June 17.—A declaration of Premier Herriot's cabinet, submitted to parliament today, affirms that the Ruhr will not be evacuated until the guarantees provided for in General Dawes' report have been complied with.

Other features of the declaration include the pronouncement for the restoration of normal relations with Russia. The declaration calls for the prompt ratification of the remaining treaties which were signed at the Washington disarmament conference, the international labor convention, and conclusion of peace with Turkey.

The new French ministry stands for the disarmament of Germany by the allies and as soon as possible by the league of nations.

NOON-DAY BLAZE IN MARKET SMOKE-HOUSE

A sheet iron room at the rear of the Stroble Market was the scene of a little blaze and much smoke about 12:45 Tuesday afternoon. Someone discovered the smoke and turned in the alarm. The fire wagon crew laid a string of hose from Eighth Street, and a few dashes of water quenched the embers which the chemical truck had reduced the fire to. The fire seems to have started in the roof and ate its way into the wooden support in the sheet iron roofing. The second story of the building occupied by the Stroble Market is occupied by Ray Hopper, who runs a rooming house in the building, and the family washing was hanging on a line stretched

on top of the roof of the sheet iron building where the fire originated, but this was not damaged, and the total damage amounted to little.

Several of the candidates for governor have in their platform a law enforcement plank, or at least they generally have a great deal to say in their speech making about being in favor of law enforcement.

W. E. Pope, the last candidate to speak at Ballinger, struck what seems to us to be the keynote on that question when he scoffed at such talk as some of his opponents engaged in about law enforcement, or ridiculed the idea of any candidate for the high office of governor standing up before an intelligent audience of American citizens and telling them that he was for law enforcement.

Mr. Pope said that before the governor could take his seat he would have to take an oath that he would enforce all laws, and aside from that, have we reached that point where before we will vote for a candidate he must stand up and preach to us that he is in favor of law enforcement?

The candidate who is not in favor of law enforcement, and in favor of enforcing all laws as prescribed by law and according to the constitution of our country, is not worthy of the ballot of one citizen, and no citizen who does not occupy the same view towards the laws of this country should not be entrusted with the ballot.

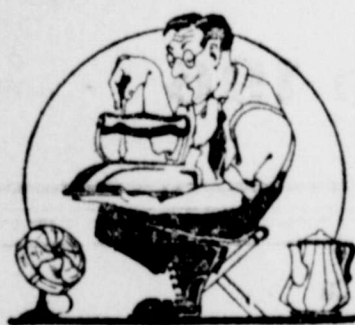

"The local National Guard company is a branch of the regular army of the United States. Our government has equipped and supplied the Ballinger company with approximately \$10,000.00 worth of war materials, including guns, ammunition, clothing, tents, etc. Our local company is composed of 71 men and 3 commissioned officers at this time.

"In keeping with the policy of reducing expenses of our government, the regular army has been reduced to a minimum strength and the National Guard of the several states of the union has been organized and recognized and is working in conjunction with the regular forces in order that your home and loved ones may be protected in the event of any emergency. The expense of maintaining the Guard is small, indeed, compared with the cost and upkeep of the same number of men in regular service.

"The local company is composed of young men of our community who have offered themselves for training in order that they may be ready and prepared to defend our land and country should the occasion demand. Once each year an annual encampment of the Guard of the State of

Texas is held for the purpose of giving these men intensive training, and the two weeks spent at these encampments is worth more to the individual than he could hope to acquire in twelve months' training at his home station. Our encampment will be held this year at Galveston, beginning July 5th and ending the 19th. A number of our men are employed by local concerns and it is the earnest desire of this command as well as of our government, that such employers will not only consent for these men to attend this encampment, but will urge upon them to do so. The encampment isn't two weeks of outing and pleasure, but to the contrary, it means close application upon the part of the soldier in active drill work and maneuvers of all kinds. The men are all anxious to make this camp, being their first at Galveston, and the local officers are very anxious that the Company make the best showing it has ever made, especially as to numbers in attendance.
