Funeral services for William Lange were held last Friday afternoon in the First Methodist Church, with Rev. J. B. Stewart, pastor, officiating.

Mr. Lange was found dead from an apparent heart attack about 4 p. m. Dec. 28 about one-half mile north of town. He had been in ill health for a number of years and was 81 at the time of his death.

Born May 19, 1879, in Clinton County, Ia., Mr. Lange came to McLean from Maquoketa, Ia., in 1928 as an employee of the Prairie Pipe Line Co.

He began farming for the W. E. Kennedy family in 1939 and had resided in the Kennedy home the past 10 years.

He was a member of the Lutheran Church.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Walter Peterman, Lost Nations, Ia., six grandchildren and one great grandchild. Two daughters and one son preceded him in death.

GRAY COUNTY OFFICIALS IN NEW TERMS

Gray County and district officers began new terms of office Monday following swearing-in ceremonies at the courthouse in Pampa.

Administering the oath to the new and re-elected officers was District Judge Lewis M. Goodrich.

Truitt Johnson was sworn in as new Precinct 4 commissioner, replacing Archie Dwyer. Dwyer, who did not run for re-election, had served out the term of his father, John W. Dwyer.

The elder Dwyer died 16 days after beginning the two-year term in 1959.

Next for Four Years

Johnson's term also will be for two years. However, the commissioner's term will be increased to four years in the next election.

Dwyer and his wife, Judy, and 2-year-old son, Brad, moved to Lubbock this week, where he will enroll as an agronomy major at Texas Tech.

Two other local officers also received the oath Monday. They are Justice of the Peace Cliff Day and Constable J. D. Fish.

Reports Erroneous In Alanreed Game, Superintendent Says

Alanreed Supt. James Waller said this week that reports published earlier on the championship game in the December Alanreed Grade School Tournament were erroneous.

It had been reported following the game, between the McLean Cubs and Lelia Lake, that officials had failed to hear the horn ending the contest, and as a result, Lelia Lake won.

However, Supt. Waller said the controversial foul called on a McLean player as the game ended actually had been committed prior to the final horn.

"A McLean boy fouled a Lelia Lake boy before the horn went," Waller explained. "Then the boy who was fouled passed the ball to another player, who shot as the horn sounded."

Two Free Shots

At that point McLean was leading by one point. The fouled player then received two free shots and made them both to give Lelia Lake the championship.

The superintendent said he had talked with "several interested coaches" who were viewing the game, and all agreed that the fouling had been committed before the horn sounded.

Waller said he had no desire to see the McLean Cubs lose the game and certainly would have been pleased if they had won. But he felt the officials had been fair in their calling.

Juniors Play Lefors

The McLean Junior High Cubs and Junior Tigerettes will travel to Lefors tonight for a pair of basketball games.

The girls will begin the evening with a 7 p. m. contest.

Latest Census Lists 400 Farms in Gray

RECEIPTS OF POST OFFICE RECORD GAIN

Postal receipts in McLean increased by some 11½ per cent in 1960 over the preceding calendar year, according to Postmaster Bill Reeves.

Reeves reported this week that the local Post Office records show total receipts of \$31,867.45 in the past year, compared to \$28,580.19 for 1959.

The amount is gross receipts, adjusted to show rate increases that have been put into effect the past two years.

The postmaster also reported a sizeable gain in the volume of Christmas mail last month.

Reeves estimated the Christmas mail increase at some 10 per cent above that for the same period in 1959 and 1958.

Dedication Planned

Preparations are underway for moving the Post Office into the new building that is nearing completion here.

Reeves reported that new equipment is scheduled to arrive by Jan. 15, with occupancy of the new brick structure set for about Feb. 1.

Actually, the building contractor has finished work on the new structure—which will greatly increase the amount of Post Office space available—except for installing various pieces of equipment due to arrive this month.

The McLean Lions Club has started making plans for a dedication program to mark the opening of the new building. Legislators and high-ranking postal authorities will be invited to attend.

Mrs. Beulah Gholston Dies in California

Funeral services for Mrs. Beulah O. Gholston, formerly of McLean, were held on Dec. 22 in the Lorenzen Mortuary in Los Angeles, Calif., it was learned here this week.

Mrs. Gholston died on Dec. 18 in Los Angeles at the age of 63. Interment was in Oakwood Memorial Park in Los Angeles, and the officiating minister for the services was M. W. Chaffin, former minister of the McLean Church of Christ.

Mrs. Gholston was born on June 2, 1897, in Texas. She was a member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors include a son, W. J. Gholston; two daughters, Mrs. Opal Patterson, South Gate, Calif., and Mrs. Violet Cross of Maryland; a sister, Mrs. Lola Pool; two brothers, William Cameron and Oscar Cameron, and nine grandchildren.

Vaccination of Dogs Scheduled Jan. 25

Dr. E. B. Range, Shamrock veterinarian, will be in McLean on Jan. 25 to vaccinate dogs for rabies, City Manager B. J. McCartney announced this week.

Dr. Range will be in the city hall commissioners' meeting room from 2 p. m. to 8 p. m. Residents having dogs they want vaccinated are asked to bring the animals on a leash.

Charge for the shots will be \$1.50 each, and tags will be furnished for animals which are vaccinated.

McCartney urged all persons owning dogs to have them vaccinated against rabies at this time.

Magee and Breeding Send Cattle to Sale

Magee and Breeding, McLean, have assigned cattle to the Southwestern Hereford Sale, to be held in conjunction with the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth on Jan. 31.

The 173 bulls and six females in the offering will be screened and offered for sale on Sunday, Jan. 29. The sale, sponsored by the American Hereford Association with the Texas Hereford Association cooperating, represents one of the largest offerings of registered Herefords to a southwestern Hereford sale in recent years.

Safe entries will be sold in individual lots as well as in pens of from two to five head, with group entries being sold without "choosing."

The number of entries and consignors indicate the presence in the sale of herd bull prospects and top range bulls as well.

Check on Shots, Residents Advised

Residents concerned about the diphtheria outbreak in the state were advised this week to check with their family doctor for suggestions concerning immunization of local children.

Mrs. J. B. Waldrop, McLean school nurse, said that children should be immunized against the disease to prevent a possible outbreak here, but she suggested that parents talk first with their physician before taking any further action.

UNITS UP IN SIZE SINCE 1954 COUNT

A total of 400 farms were counted in the 1959 Census of Agriculture conducted in Gray County, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of agriculture.

This compares with 523 farms counted in the county during the last census conducted in 1954.

Total land in farms was 563,719 acres, an increase over the 560,333 acres in the 1954 report.

Definition Changed
The definition of a farm was changed between 1954 and the last census.

For 1959, each place operated as a unit of 10 or more acres from which the sale of agricultural products totaled \$50 or more, as well as each place operated as a unit of less than 10 acres from which the sale of agricultural products totaled \$250 or more, was counted as a farm.

In 1954, each place operated as a unit of three or more acres on which the value of farm products produced totaled \$150 or more, as well as each place of less than three acres from which the value of all agricultural products sold totaled \$150 or more, was counted as a farm.

Affects Comparability
Thus, the change in definition of a farm affects the comparability of the data for 1959 and 1954, particularly in respect to the number of farms.

The average size of the farms showed a gain, from 1,071.4 acres in 1954 to 1,409.2 in the latest enumeration.

While the size was gaining, the average value of the farms also was going up. The newest report lists the average value at \$77,896, while the 1954 figure was \$68,233.

Average Acre Value Up
Average per-acre value placed on the land went up from \$51.87 to \$55.82.

Of Gray County's farm operators, 141 owned their farms, 146 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage and 108 were tenant farmers.

Average age of farm operators in the county was 52.2 years, up from 50.9 in 1954. There were 86 (See FARMS, Page 2)

THE SCD SUPERVISOR'S JOB

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is a speech given by T. C. D'Spain, a Donkey County Soil Conservation District supervisor who lives south of Amarillo, at a supervisors' leadership meeting recently in Pampa. D'Spain should be well qualified to discuss such a subject—he was conservation farmer of Texas in 1962.)

By T. C. D'SPAIN

Why be a supervisor? Since the dawn of history, conservation has been man's greatest need, but it has seldom been practiced. One who is to serve as a supervisor must realize that conservation means using our world wisely.

He must feel the need to show the world that it has many things called natural resources and some of these are necessary to life itself.

God has entrusted these resources to man to be cared for, protected and used to his best judgment. A man, seeing the waste that has taken place in the past years in soil erosion, water erosion, forest destruction, wildlife extermination, soil exhaustion and many others should, by nature, desire to be a supervisor and help correct these things to make a better America.

In saving the soil he will be showing his concern for his survival and for those to follow.

A supervisor must be one who desires to serve. This desire must not be motivated by the fact that he is elected by his neighbors but by an inward desire to help those he comes in contact with and cause them to see the need of conservation.

A supervisor must be an informed man. He can acquire information by being in regular attendance at local meetings, reading conservation magazines and

literature and investigating local conditions. Attendance at state meetings affords information not gained locally and gives an overall picture of conservation.

A supervisor must be one who is willing to sacrifice a reasonable amount of time. He must visit with those for whom he is responsible, talking, informing, suggesting remedial practices and encouraging them to accept sound conservation practices with the help of their local soil conservation district.

A supervisor must be one who is willing to be a cooperater with his soil conservation district. He should have a basic conservation plan on his farm or ranch. If he is not sold enough on the program to put it into use, he will never get his neighbors interested.

Seeing the results of a program is more convincing than hours of talk.

A supervisor should know about the origin of the district, why it was organized, its purposes, its goals, its boundaries and its subdivisions to be able to answer the many questions that arise among the farm and ranch folks.

Along with being soil and water conservation minded, a supervisor should believe in local rights in matters of soil and water conservation.

In this present time of many changes he has to always be on the alert.

A supervisor should be willing and eager at all times to furnish items of interest and news material about the local SCD to press, radio and television.

If you are selected to serve as a supervisor and because of age, health or any other reasons that hinder in this work you should give the job to someone else not so handicapped. It is too important to be neglected.

A supervisor should ask himself this question:

Am I burdened with this job of supervisor, or is it a challenge? If you consider it a burden you have failed to meet the first qualification of being a good supervisor.

farm operators 65 or more years of age, compared with 73 in 1954. Of the 400 farms in the county, 275 were commercial.

34,907 Head of Cattle

There were 29 farms with sales of \$40,000 or more; 55, with \$20,000 to \$39,999; 75, with \$10,000 to \$19,999; 62, with \$5,000 to \$9,999; 33, with \$2,500 to \$4,999, and 21, with \$50 to \$2,499.

There were 34,907 head of cows and calves on the farms reporting in the latest census, an increase over the 33,891 in the 1954 enumeration.

Detailed statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc., are presented in the preliminary report, with comparable statistics for 1954.

Land Bank Reduces Interest on Loans

The board of directors of the Federal Land Bank of Houston has approved a reduction of one-half of one per cent in the interest charged on new loans beginning Jan. 1, 1961.

In making the announcement, Hal Weatherford, bank president, stated that the board also authorized a reduction of one-half of a per cent beginning on Jan. 1 and until further notice on some \$24 million of loans which bear an interest rate of six per cent.

Land bank loans in this area are made and serviced through the Federal Land Bank Association of Pampa, which serves Gray, Roberts and Hemphill Counties.

According to the Pampa association's manager, J. E. Gunn, there are 203 loans in force for about \$1,969,495.47.

Officers and directors, other than Manager Gunn, are John Talley, Miami, president; W. B. Jackson, Pampa, vice president; J. L. Andrews, McLean, Oscar Forney, Canadian, and Paul Bowers, Pampa, directors.

Weatherford explained that the reduction in interest rates will mean substantial savings each year to many farm and ranch owners in this area and across Texas.

'HISTORY OF GRAY COUNTY' IS RELATED AT MEETING

The Lefors Home Demonstration Club held an open meeting in the Civic Center Thursday night to present a program on the "History of Gray County."

Speakers of the evening included Judge Ivy Duncan, Pampa; Mrs. B. J. Diehl, Lefors; and Gene Gee, a star rank Scout, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Gee, Lefors.

"Our Heritage" was given by Judge Duncan in relating the tragic story of the John German family, who was traveling with their seven children from Georgia to homestead in the West on Sept. 11, 1874.

Their wagon was attacked by a band of 19 Indians, who brutally murdered the mother and father and older children, but took as hostages the two youngest, Julia, 7, and Addie, 5.

He then related the hardship, terror and final rescue of the two girls by L. Baldwin. There is a marker just north of Lefors paying tribute to L. Baldwin for the bravery he showed in the rescue.

Judge Duncan has been instrumental in seeing that the marker will be moved into the Lefors City Park where it can be landscaped and cared for.

Gene Gee spoke on the history of Lefors itself, giving statistics of interest.

Speaking on Gray County, Mrs. Diehl explained that the county is bordered by Wheeler, Roberts, Carson and Donley Counties in the north Panhandle. Gray County is square in shape, having 337 square miles.

The broken, rolling area is devoted to livestock raising. The surface portion of the high plains in Gray County is divided by two streams, the North Fork of Red River, which crosses the county in a gorge west to east, and McClellan Creek.

The bed of the North Fork is full of sand, having a surface flow part of the year. Even when surface soil is dry, water may be obtained by digging a few feet.

The principal lakes of Gray County are Lake McClellan and Lake Walsefield. Rivers are Red River and North Fork River. The creeks are Cabin, Cantonment, Graham, Grapevine, McClellan, Red Mud, Red Tree, Sand, Sweetwater, Thut and Turkey.

These creeks are tributaries of the North Fork branch of Red River.

The soil of Gray County is described as fertile sandy loams and chocolate loam.

Gray County would not at the present time be classified as a hunters' haven, as in early settlement time. Game abounded then. Wild turkey, quail, prairie chicken, deer, antelope, black bear, even bobcats were commonplace.

According to oldtimers, Mobeetie, in adjacent Wheeler county, and along the Canadian River banks of Roberts County are still wild with birds, coyotes, threatening the livestock, especially baby calves.

Rabbits and prairie dogs abound. There are beavers, ground squirrels, muskrats, badgers, polecats, coons and opossums.

Poisonous snakes include rattlesnakes and water moccasins. Other snakes are chicken and blue racers. There is a variety of lizards and waterdogs in the damp places.

Indians used to roam these plains. Their weapons were well adapted for use on horseback. The warriors could carry 100 arrows in a quiver slung over one shoulder.

The Indians used a number of techniques against the white folks; perhaps the most barbaric Indian practice was that of scalping their victims.

The first brick school house was built in Alameda around 1898. Wedgeforth County was created in 1873, including the area known now as Gray, Wheeler, Donley and Collingsworth Counties.

Mrs. Diehl concluded by reading the boundary of Gray County as set up act of Legislature in 1876.

Those present decided that this was just about the best place on earth to live, with its brilliant history and glorious future.

Refreshments were served to approximately 20 persons.
