### V. A. Gives Vets Helpful Hints

Veterans Administration today gave three helpful tips to the thousands of veterans planning to start training this fall under the Korean GI Bill.

First, VA said, GI application forms should be filled out fully and completely. An incomplete application can only cause delay, because VA will have to write to the veteran for the missing information.

Second, veterans should be sure they enclose a photostat or certified copy of their service separation paper, along with their completed application form.

Third, applications should be sent to the veteran's nearest VA Regional office, and not to VA headquarters in Washington, D.C.

Any applications received in Washington merely will have to be referred to the appropriate regional office—a time-consuming process.

VA said it expects two-thirds of a million veterans to be in training this fall under the Korean GI Bill.

### Social Security

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Question: May an individual draw his monthly social security payments and continue to work?  
Answer: When an individual has reached the age of 72, and has qualified for social security benefits, he may receive his payments regardless of the amount of his earnings. Any beneficiary under the age of 72 is entitled to his social security checks for all months in the year provided his wages as an employee or his net earnings from self-employment, or a combination of the two or any kind of employment whether covered or not, do not exceed \$1200 in the year. If he works in every month of the year and his earnings exceed \$1200 he loses one month's check for each \$80 that is in excess of \$1200. Under this provision, a beneficiary under age 72 who has net earnings from \$1200.01 to \$1280 would lose one month's check; from \$1280.01 to \$1360, two month's checks; and so on until his earnings reach \$2080.01, or more when he would lose checks for all 12 months in the year. However, he can be paid for any month his earnings do not exceed \$80 no matter what the annual total may be. For further information contact: Social Security Admin. 766 Cedar Street

### Parents Not Setting Good Examples

"Many so-called model parents are far from model in setting a good example to their children in safety practices."  
Mr. E. C. McFadden of Dallas, Vice-President of Employers' Casualty Company and President of the Texas Safety Association, Inc., made that statement in behalf of the child safety program now being sponsored by the Texas Safety Association, the Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council.

"Too often parents treat children as if they were deaf, dumb, and blind," he said. "They don't realize that children have keen minds and pick up their first habits, good and bad, from their parents. This is especially true of safety habits which are a responsibility of parents, and a

### BLUE PANIC DOES WELL

O. R. Rich, framing the Chester Hopper farm just north of the Spade community, is more than well pleased with the amount of grazing he has received from 6 acres of blue panic grass. The grass was seeded in the Spring of 1954 and this spring it started greenening up before Johnson grass. When it was about 8-10 inches high, Mr. Rich started pasturing 4 head of cattle on it and the 6 acres has furnished grazing for them all summer. At present, it is eaten down fairly close but 2 days after the rain of little over an inch on September 10, the grass was making new growth.

Mr. Rich has a sorghum field he can pasture now and give the blue panic a chance to make growth to withstand the winter. The grass was plowed once this year and the middles run once.

Two outstanding features of the grass noted by Mr. Rich was the fact that it will not scour the cattle when they are first turned on it. Last year it was over waist high and this year about 10 inches when the cattle were turned on it, but there were no ill effects. The other feature was that the grass puts good gains on the cattle, nearly equal to the feed lot, he said.

The grass was seeded in the Spring of 1954 with the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District's small seed drill.

Mr. Rich and Mr. Hopper planted cotton this year where summer peas were last year and the effects of this conservation practice are evident in the size of the stalks. They are anxious to compare the yields with land not in peas.

grave responsibility which they are sometimes inclined to overlook.

"Safety begins at home," Mr. McFadden said, and parents should be sure they set good examples in their own safety practices for their children to follow. He asserted that parents themselves often are victims of their own carelessness, or are responsible for accidents to their children through failure to stress safety measures in their own behavior around children.

"How many fathers go through red lights, weave in and out of traffic and ignore other safe driving rules while their own children are riding with them?" he asked. "How many mothers jaywalk, beat lights, and disobey good safety precautions while accompanied by their children? Yet these parents scold their children, for doing the same thing."

Mr. McFadden reminded parents that National Safety Council figures show that more than 4,000 children under 15 will die in traffic casualties this year unless these accidents are prevented by better safety education of children at home.

"It simply doesn't add up," he said. "If parents want to do right by their children, they must set a good example in everything they do. If they want to instill in their children the necessary precautions which will keep them out of the list of 'scheduled' accidents each year, they had better inventory their own safety habits and make sure they are setting good examples for their children."

Mr. McFadden outlined basic lessons in safety which parents should check themselves on before teaching them to their children.

"Be safe parents, he urged, "and you'll have safe children."

That prediction has become a reality after four years of state-wide drought, broken only recently by rains. But the problem is still with us—and the Legislature still has not found a solution.

Part of the blame rests on the fact that opposite political views block attempts to draft a master water plan. Yet, the public, too, must share some of the responsibility for this failure. When financial plans are proposed, people fear burdensome taxes will be imposed in areas which will receive only nominal benefits from such a program. As it now stands, the problem will never be solved until political factions and the public are willing to assume a rightful share of responsibility—both administrative and financial. The water problem is two-fold. Our largest supplies lie in underground reservoirs. Most of our

A. Korea veterans must apply and pay their first premium within one year from the date that VA determines their disabilities are service-connected.
