Jail Problem To Effect County

The TDC (Texas Department of Correction) in Huntsville is not ac-

cepting new prisoners due to lack of space and facilities and this will

not effect Mitchell County locally for two or three months, according

to Sheriff Wendell Bryant.

The county jail has facilities for 27 prisoners, in which there are ten presently jailed. Bryant added that presently there is not anyone in the jail they are holding that has been sentenced to the TDC, but he anticipates there should be some in the next few months.

The Texas Commission of Jail Standards is hosting a meeting May 20 in Austin with representatives from the Sheriff's Association of Texas, TDC officials, governor, Lt. governor, attorney general, members of the legislature, adult probation commission and Texas Association of Counties offices attending.

The purpose of the meeting, according to

Bryant, is to determine how these organizations can help TDC Director

Jim Estelle and the TDC with solutions to the overcrowding problem.

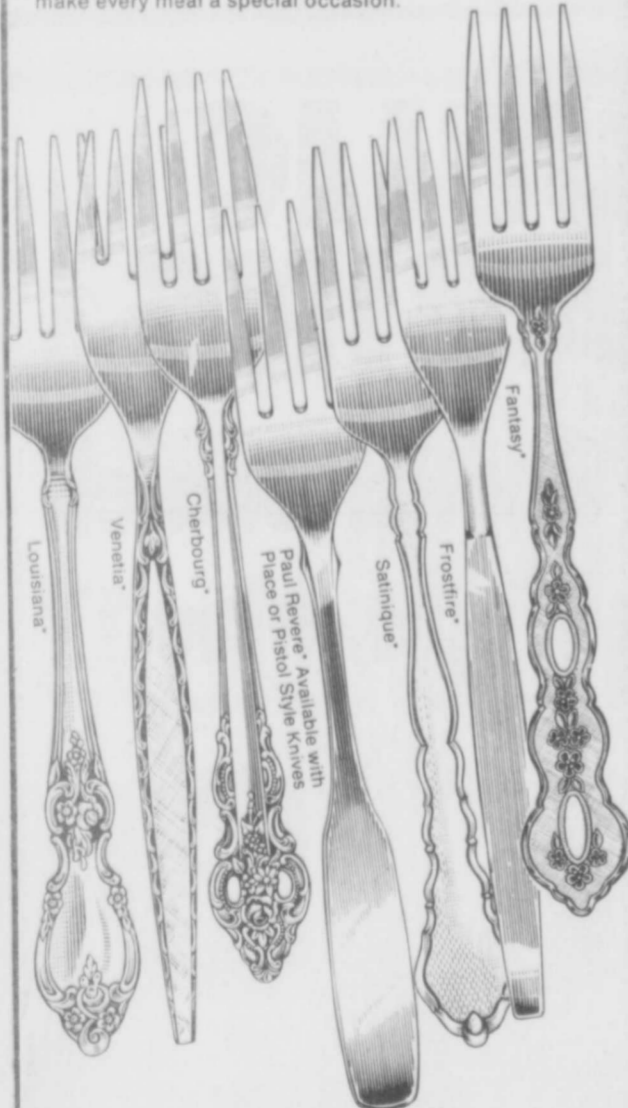

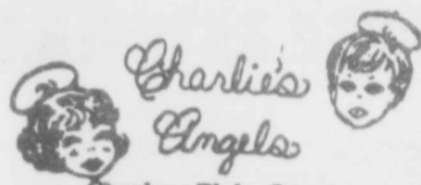

Q. I own an '80 Monte Carlo which I love, except for one thing: The wind noise inside the car, with the windows closed, is driving me nuts! Short of replacing the window seals - which I understand can get downright expensive - is there anything I can do?

A. First of all, you are right about one thing: Window seal replacement can run into money - possibly \$25 to \$30 per side window just for the materials. However, about \$2.98, or less may be your answer. Invest in a silicone treatment. We suggest the stick-type for this operation since the spray type can get a little messy. Every time you wash your car, simply spread some silicone on the rubber seals which go around the window openings. The silicone will go a long way toward keeping those seals in top condition, and should prevent wind noise for years. Also, use the silicone where any part of the plastic on the dashboard rubs on the windshield.

Payments to be Reduced

The Veterans Administration has reduced down payments on VA Graduated Payment Mortgages for the purchase of new homes. The change was announced by Mr. W. E. Welstead, Loan Guaranty Officer of the VA Regional Office, Waco, Texas as part of the Veterans' passed by Congress last year.

On new homes, the down payment requirement for a VA GPM may now be as low as 2.5 percent of the purchase price or the appraised value, whichever is lower.

In the traditional mortgage, the monthly payments stay the same during the entire life of the loan except for changes in taxes and insurance, Welstead explained. In a VA Graduated Payment Mortgage, the monthly payments start at a lower level, then increase by 7.5 percent each year for the first five years then remain the same for the balance of the loan term. In the early years of a GPM, part of the interest is added to the loan so the balance gets larger each year for the first five years.

THE PEBBLE THAT DETERMINED A WORLD SERIES

The only baseball championship for the Washington Senators and the first World Series win for the great Walter Johnson came simultaneously through the aid of one small pebble.

In 1924, when Washington copped the American League flag, Johnson had been pitching for 17 years, mostly in a second-division club, and he was then 37 years old.

Johnson pitched the Series opener and lost a twelve-inning heart-breaker to the New York Giants, 4-3. In the fifth game with the Series tied, Johnson lost again. The score was 6-2. It began to look like the "Big Train" would never get a Series victory.

Washington nosed out the Giants in the sixth game to tie the Series again. In the deciding game, Manager Bucky Harris started another Senator pitcher. The Giants had built up a 3-1 lead when Harris tied the game with a hit in the eighth with two men on bases.

In the Giant's ninth, the crowd roared, for the veteran Johnson went to the mound. For four innings, he blanked the Giants. In the last half of the 12th with the score still tied, Fate stepped in to aid the "Big Train." With one out, Washington's Muddy Ruel hit a high foul to the Giant catcher, Hank Gowdy. It looked like an easy out, but Gowdy tripped over his mask and dropped the ball. Ruel promptly doubled.

Walter Johnson then hit an easy grounder to short; and Travis Jackson booted it for an error. Then it happened: Earl McNeely was up next, and he hit a routine grounder to third-sacker Freddie Lindstrom. But the ball hit a pebble and bounced over Lindstrom's head to score Ruel with the winning run. Johnson finally got his World Series win.

The Senators got their only baseball championship. It was a pebble that decided the outcome.

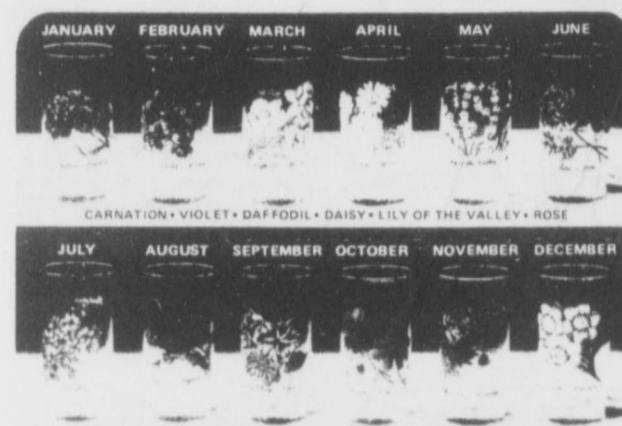
