City Council P-TA Names Nominating Committee

Snyder City Council P-TA held its February meeting with Mrs. Elmo Crowder, president, presiding. The following were elected to serve on the nominating committee: Mrs. J. C. Massingill, Travis Jr. High, as chairman; Mrs. James Bellamy, Central; Mr. R. E. Cooper, Principal of Lamar Jr. High. Mrs. Crowder appointed as a By-laws committee to make necessary revisions in the By-laws, Mrs. J. C. Massingill, Travis, Mrs. Wraymond Sims, Travis; Mrs. Nathan Mearese, Northeast.

Recommendations for action which were adopted at the State Convention were read. And it was pointed out how the Legislation Program of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers is a continuing program based on the third Object of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers: "To secure adequate laws for the care and protection of children and youth." The parent-teacher legislation program is concerned with basic issues that may lead to legislation that will "promote the welfare of children and youth in home, school and community." The success of the Texas Congress Legislation Program may be accomplished through study and subsequent actions in the light of parent-teacher policies.

The State Legislation Program of Recommendations for action are:

1. Continue support of the Minimum Foundation Program for quality education in the public schools.
2. Support legislation to facilitate assistance in guidance for the mentally and emotionally disturbed children who are in your public school.
3. Support legislation to provide a minimum sick leave program for teachers.
4. Support adequate local and state appropriations for the strengthening and expansion of public school programs of home and family life education for children, youth and adults.
5. Support legislation for the protection of the Permanent School Fund.
6. Support legislation for creating regional audio-visual libraries.
7. Support legislation for the improvement of an actuarially sound teachers' retirement program.
8. Support the establishment and maintenance of an adequate State Juvenile Parole System.
9. Support legislation to strengthen and improve laws for the protection of children and youth from sex offenders.
10. Support more forceful legislation prohibiting the sale or distribution of obscene material, including the showing of obscene commercial motion pictures or obscene foreign films.
11. Support legislation for the conferring of appropriate laws that strengthen the traffic safety program of Texas.
12. Support legislation for adequate state facilities for all dependent, neglected and orphaned children.

"Especially important to all of us in this state is the birthday of our own organization. We refer to the February 'Fruit' Founders' Day, which is the same as saying it is our birthday. Have you ever

thought of the relationship between those two days that come so close together — St. Valentine's Day and Founders Day? Love is at the heart of each, for the P-TA was founded because of "a great caring — a caring for children and for what happens to them."

"I love you" can be said on February 14 and repeated just as fervently on February 17.

Mrs. Massingill spoke on the meaning of Founders Day and its observance. And how far too few parents realize the importance of the home for rearing democracy's children. In spite of the tremendous influence of the church and the school — there is too great a tendency in this country to pass the buck to community facilities — but the first thing that will build a great man, or a great woman is love — the kind of love that grows out of action, understanding, and patience. And there is no use in your trying to take care of my children, unless you are taking care of yours first. Any organization that takes the child as its basic concern inevitably turns its face to the future — The P-TA has no more important citizenship activity than to help parents become more competent in rearing responsible trustees of our American heritage. From a child's earliest years he must be prepared for individual dignity, individual freedom and individual responsibility — for such treasures as our American heritage cannot be placed in the hands of ignorant or careless heirs — America's children must be brought up to know how dearly freedom was bought.

Steel In House Frames

NEW YORK (AP)—Steel-frame houses are reported in "Steel Facts," a publication of the American Iron and Steel Institute, as able to be put up faster and maintained cheaper than conventional homes.

One model recently shown has exterior steel wall panels which interlock and a coated steel roof that reflects sunshine for lower air conditioning loads.

In another recent home building project, a composite steel and wood beam uses a piece of light gauge steel with regular 2 by 10-inch lumber to double the load-bearing capacity.

If you use sawdust as a mulch, apply extra nitrogen. A sign that nitrogen is lacking is yellowing of plants.

Aggie-Steer Game Erupts Into Brawl

In a night punctuated by a gang fight and an aggregate scoring record, Texas moved to the threshold of the Southwest Conference basketball championship with a 63-73 triumph over Texas A&M.

The fight came at the close of the Texas-A&M game and involved about 350 students of the two schools. Three students were injured, none seriously, and even football coaches Hank Faldberg of A&M and Darrell Royal of Texas couldn't stop it.

Police finally brought things under control.

Texas won its 10th straight game and held onto a three-game lead when second-place Rice defeated Baylor 74-70. A&M fell to third place with a 64 record.

Southern Methodist and Texas Christian raced up and down the court without a thought of defense as the Methodists won 69-52. The aggregate of 207 was the highest in conference history. Southern Methodist was only one point away from the one-team record.

Arkansas whipped Texas Tech 78 and stayed in a tie with Southern Methodist for fourth place, each at 53.

Bennie Lenox of A&M racked up 43 points for a school scoring record but it didn't do much good. Texas was led by sophomore Larry Franks, with 24 points and senior Jimmy Gilbert, with 22.

Rice ran its conference record to 7-3 against Baylor. The Owls came from behind late in the night to nip the Bears, who have won only two games out of 10. Kendall Rhine of Rice had 28 points but fell farther behind in the scoring race. Lenox now has 40 points while Rhine shows 431, in one less game, however.

Gene Elmore of SMU matched A&M's Bobby McKinley of Texas Christian in the Fort Worth marathon, each pitching in 30. Dave Siegmund of SMU had 29. Tommy Boyer led Arkansas to its narrow triumph over Texas Tech, scoring 20 points. He also got his 40th straight free throw, giving him a percentage for the season of 80.7—tops in the nation.

Texas tackles Southern Methodist in the Fort Worth rematch Saturday night while Rice gets Texas Tech at Lubbock. Texas A&M plays Texas Christian at College Station and Arkansas and Baylor tangle at Waco.

Wolves, Tors Post Narrow Cage Wins

One major upset and another near one keyed the final night of District 3-AAA cage play Tuesday.

The battered Colorado City Wolves came up with the big eye-opener of the evening by nipping Sweetwater 40-39 on a jump shot by Mike Hart in the last 30 seconds of the game. The Wolves went into the game with a record of 6-9 and were still smarting from a 66-19 licking handed them just the past Friday by Lamesa, but rallied to come through with the upset of the year within the league in their last attempt for a victory.

The Sweetwater loss also prevented the Ponies (3-7) from tying for fourth place in the final standings with Brownfield (4-6), which took it on the chin the same night from Snyder, 79-69.

Hart was high for the winners with 17 points. Darrell Turnbow and Troy Bradbury paced the Pony attack with 14 and 10, respectively.

The near miss occurred at Lamesa, where the second place Lake View Chiefs (7-3) came within an inch of upsetting the champion Tornados (10-0) before succumbing, 53-52.

Jessie Blann of Lake View was high scorer for the game with 18 points, while Roy Probst matched Blann in the losing cause. District scoring king Wallace Franklin paced Lamesa with 15, followed by Rex Nolen with 14 and Bubba Robertson with 11.

Snyder's Tigers capped off their District 3-AAA campaign in fine fettle here Tuesday night, coming from behind to knock the props out from under the Brownfield Cubs, 79-69, in a foul-prone cage battle which saw all five Cub starters being ejected from the contest via fouls.

The triumph gave the Bengals a final district reading of 4-4, followed by Sweetwater (3-7) and Colorado City (1-9). For the season, Snyder ended with a mark of 10-14.

Elsewhere within the district, lightning struck in Wollville, where Colorado City lifted itself from the depths to bump off Sweetwater, 40-39. Lamesa came out with little more than its scalp in the other duel of the evening in another one-point decision, keeping its record spotless with a 53-52 victory over Lake View.

The Tiger win was a gratifying one, as the team bounced back from a nine-point first period deficit while racing to its third straight team scoring record for the year. It was the third game in a row in which the Bengals tallied over 20 points after mopping up on Colorado City 72-30 a week ago and then dropping a 74-76 cliffhanger to Sweetwater the past Friday.

Personal fouls took what was probably an unprecedented 10 for the district this season. Each team had a like number called against the last 25 seconds of the contest with only four players on the floor after their first starters had been whistled dead.

The Tigers, due to liberal substituting of borderline cases, by Coach Ned Underwood, were a little more fortunate as far as fouling out players was concerned. They lost just two—Jimmy Wilson and a second left to the third quarter and William Robinson with 2:12 to go in the game.

With those two performers went the rebounding strength of the club, as Robinson had pulled down 11 and Wilson 9 to lead the team, which held a 34-30 rebounding edge over the visitors for the game.

Brownfield coach Elroy Payne stuck with his original five players throughout the battle, and they began to fall like flies during the second half. Their tallest—James Howell, who was first to be benched with 4:16 left in the third quarter. It was bang-bang-bang in the final period, as Connie Vernon got the whip with 5:04 left. Gary Nunn, who scored 13, remained scoring, scoring ace Teddy Howell got his at 3:02, and Archie Jennings succumbed at 0:25.

Due to the rash of fouls, both teams ended up with 36 free throw attempts. Snyder made good on 25 of same to 23 called by the Cubs.

Howell, with 23 points, led all scorers for the game, although Snyder's Drew Bullard and Stuart Long were right on his heels with 22 and 21, respectively.

Wilson also ended the game in double numbers with 14, as did Cubs Vernon (11), Ivey and Jennings (10 each).

OH And Running
Brownfield was hot as a pistol during the first quarter, and raced to a wide 27-18 lead at the end of the period. It was their largest lead of the game, and was quickly erased by the Bengals as they won the second stanza got underway.

With Wilson, Bullard, Long and Jackie Stewart showing the way, Snyder quickly erased the Cub lead to pull ahead at 31-23. The score was knotted on five other occasions during the period before the Tigers went ahead to stay at 42-40 near the end of the first half.

Over the span of the contest, the score was tied 11 times and the lead was bantered back and forth on nine occasions.

Twice late in the game the Tigers increased their margin to 12 points—at 77-65 and 79-67.

Robinson, the senior rebounding ace, acquired three quick fouls early in the game and sat out the entire second period and half of the first before being inserted at the start of the second half. He sat out from then on until sustaining his fifth foul late in the contest.

As was the case in Friday's Sweetwater game, the Tigers were red hot from the field. They hit 27 of 33 goal attempts for 81 per cent, including a torrid 12 of 20 during the second half. Brownfield also rang up an admirable

Wins With Ease

Snyder B shook off the effects of a sluggish first half in their preliminary game against Brownfield B to card a 64-42 decision. It tipped their final mark to 8-2 in district—their two losses both being at the hands of Lamesa B—and gave them a season reading of 16-8.

They departed for the dressing room at halftime trailing by 22-23, but outscored the young Cubs by 22-7 in the third period to turn the contest into a near rout.

Jerry Vestal followed up his 31-point explosion of Friday at Sweetwater with 20 to lead all scorers for the game. It wasn't until the second half that he managed to mesh his gears, though, as he had only four free tosses to his credit at termination of first half play.

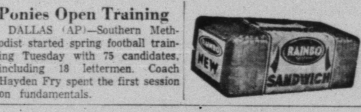
Salazar knocked out German in the ninth round after having been knocked down in the third round himself. He weighed 118, German 117.
