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Political front still quiet

Unless candidate filings "pick up" between now and Monday, Feb. 4, this is going to be a sort of a tame election year both on the local and state levels.

Sometimes there is a rash of last-minute filings, which might be the case this year, and things might even pick up considerably between the time this editorial is finished and this week's paper is published.

Locally, up to Monday, there was a contest in only one county race, and that for Precinct 4 county commissioner. The only other contest, outside of a few state races, was in this legislative district where the incumbent, W. S. (Bill) Healy, has drawn an opponent in Max Courtney of Southland.

A reporter for a Dallas paper recently quoted an oldtimer as asking, "Did you ever expect to see the day when the biggest primary race was the Republicans running for governor?"

That's the biggest race so far, with Hank Grover of Houston, Jim Granberry of Lubbock, and Odell McBrayer of Fort Worth seeking the GOP gubernatorial nomination.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe's only announced opponent on the Democratic ticket is Gordon F. (Pop) Willis of Austin, who hardly seems like a major threat. Frances (Sissy) Farenthold, who was in the runoff with Briscoe two years ago, still had not been ruled out up to Monday as a possible candidate for the office again this year.

But Mrs. Farenthold has also said that she might try to unseat Chairman Jim Langdon of the Railroad Commission.

So, Sissy's political plans for the year were still "up in the air" early this week.

The year of the Tiger?

If we hadn't opened all our mail here at the office this week, we might never have known that the Chinese New Year — the Year of the Tiger — had just begun.

The above information came in the form of a news release announcing that Miss Chinatown 1974 has been chosen in San Francisco to help commemorate the Chinese New Year.

Looking ahead to the 1974 football season, we hope — for the sake of the Post Antelopes and their fans — that the Year of the Tiger applies only to China and not to District 5AA of the University Interscholastic League. Such a designation, if it worked out, would make the Slaton and Frenship Tigers hard to handle.

A real contest is likely for state comptroller, where Robert S. Calvert is retiring. Former Secretary of State Bob Bullock has been campaigning for months, seeking the Democratic nomination. He visited The Dispatch last summer in the interest of his candidacy. So, he has a big head start going for him, if nothing else.

Hugh Edburg, a division head in the comptroller's department, announced with Calvert's endorsement to succeed his old boss.

Republicans may make a real effort in the comptroller's race, although their candidate hasn't stepped forward.

There could be a real "hoss race" in the Democratic primary if Price Daniel Jr. decides to take on veteran State Treasurer Jesse James, who more than likely will draw opponents both on the Democratic and Republican sides.

At Gov. Bill Hobby has announced for re-election and may even win a four-year term without an opponent, unless someone "gets out there" in a hurry. The same is true for Atty. Gen. John Hill and Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, both Democrats.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White stands a good chance of drawing a serious Republican opponent, say GOP sources in Austin.

We may have made sound more exciting with all those names than it appeared in the beginning, but there are also a lot of offices involved, and the candidates are spread pretty thin. It's still going to take some late filings to add excitement to the upcoming campaigns. — (C)

Parents Patrol good for all

The Parents Patrol which started in the school zones here Monday morning will require the cooperation of the motorists and a devotion to duty by the patrol members to be a success.

Authorized by the city police department and Post Public School officials, the patrol program appears to be off to a good start and takes a big load off the minds of many parents of school children whose youngsters have been going to school while it's still dark since Daylight Savings Time went into effect a few weeks ago.

That "before daylight" period is the most dangerous, of course, but there is always danger when schools are situated on a heavily traveled highway, as the primary, elementary and junior high schools are here. When you have responsible adults manning the crosswalks, there is less danger of a youngster rushing pell-mell from the school campus into the path of an oncoming vehicle.

Parents who are not members of the patrol can give it a big assist by following a few simple rules when they bring their children to school or pick them up after school has been dismissed. These parents are asked not to double park while letting their children out of the car or picking them up. They are also asked not to stop their automobile in a crosswalk.

The fact that there is a parents patrol in operation in the school zones makes us all feel better as far as the safety of our children is concerned — especially after reading that there have been eight children killed in the state of Florida in traffic accidents since DST was re-enacted, as well as a number in other parts of the country.

Let's give the Parents Patrol our cooperation and support; its members are voluntarily protecting the safety of their own children as well as those of every other parent.

Rural traffic crashes in '73 kill 2, hurt 51

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Garza County during the month of December, according to Sgt. H. E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in nine persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the year of 1973 shows a total of 80 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 51 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for December, 1973, shows a total of 499 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 277 persons injured as compared to December, 1972 with 462 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 213 persons injured. This was 37 more accidents, 3 less fatalities, and 64 more injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of December, 1973, occurred in the following counties: Parker, four; Lubbock, three; Wise, Young, two each; and Floyd, Hockley, Terry, Carson, Ochiltree, and Oldham, one each.

Beer can recycling sets record in 1973

GOLDEN, Colo. — Adolph Coors Company's aluminum recycling program topped two billion cans and shattered all yearly collection records in 1973, officials of the regional brewery said this week.

Preliminary reports from the company's 167 distributors reveal more than 87 million pounds of aluminum beverage containers—in excess of two billion cans at an average of 24 cans per pound—have been collected since the "cash-for-cans" campaign began in January, 1970.

Payments to the public reached \$3 million for 1973 which also set a program record.

PLANNING FOR FUTURE

"How much time do you devote to thinking about and planning for the future?" asks Wayne Hayenga, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Managing change is as important in the business of farming and ranching as it is in any other business. Part of what is involved is learning to respect time, especially the manager's time," points out the Texas A&M University specialist.

Hayenga points to a successful business consultant who said recently, "One yardstick I have found useful in assessing the real strength of a company is how much time its very best people devote to the future. Wherever I see most of the company preoccupied with today's and next month's and even this year's problems—very frequently I find an enterprise that was either in or headed for trouble."

"On the other hand, the best managed corporations, I find, are those that invest substantial amounts of their most precious resource—the time of their top managers—in the future."

According to Hayenga, these companies protect their future by defining future problems and opportunities and, most important, deciding how best to shape the future instead of being

shocked by it.

"The start of a new year is a good time to set aside a little extra time to do your planning," says the economist. "Generally, the crop is out and things are frequently slowed down a bit so there can be some effort spent on planning."

What does farm planning entail? Hayenga suggests three questions to help in the planning effort.

First, do you plan to retire in 10 or 15 years, or do you want to buy more farm or ranch land to expand your operation? This is a long range goal.

Second, how can you best ac-

complish your long range goal, and what should you do this year to help you reach your goal? Your banker, attorney, family members and business associates can provide assistance.

A third question, says the economist, is "What do you do if?" This question involves operational decisions: "How will a lack of fuel or fertilizer change my operations? Can my marketing plan be improved?"

"Farmers and ranchers face as big a challenge as any businessman in managing their future. But they need to keep a proper perspective. You can't neglect current problems, but you must also allocate enough time to the future. Otherwise, your business can head down an endless tunnel before you realize it," cautions Hayenga.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — President Nixon has made the symbolic journey to the law-making end of Pennsylvania Avenue in person. His appearance before the joint session of Congress appeared dramatically altered from that on previous occasions. In fact, at the beginning of the 93rd Congress, on Jan. 3, 1973, the President did not himself appear but simply sent his address by messenger.

—O—
This year his tone was less magisterial and more conciliatory. As he looked out on the assembled Representatives and Senators, no doubt he saw a jury of his peers — men and

women who must sit in judgement on his right to continue to hold the office to which he was overwhelmingly re-elected just over a year ago.

—O—
For the first time in more than a century an American President faces the possibility of impeachment. Under the circumstances, it required self-discipline on the part of Mr. Nixon to go through the traditional ritual of apprising Congress of the State of the Union and setting forth his recommendations for the year.

—O—
But the self-discipline of the Congress will be tested this session every bit as much as the President's — not just by the impeachment process but with

the burden of legislative responsibility in an atmosphere of weakened presidential leadership and an eroded public confidence in it.

—O—
There will be temptation for the Congress to assert itself over the chief executive and challenge him with extravagant measures, with possibly an attitude bordering on arrogance. While threatening him with removal from office, Congress might, feeling some carefree power, enact politically attractive panaceas in an election year, while at the same time delaying or ducking difficult decisions highly important to our Nation's well being.

—O—
Impeachment is only the beginning of the challenges facing this Congress. From across the country the voters seem to be saying, "Give attention to the practical problems of our lives and the needs of our nation and not be totally preoccupied with the President's fate — get on with the business at hand."

—O—
This means that Congress will be judged by its willingness to share the responsibility for hard policy choices facing the country. It begins this year with the public scarcely less skeptical of its reliability than that of the President's.

—O—
Only by exercising the strongest sense of duty and self-discipline can Congress redeem its own reputation and serve the best interest of our nation.

—O—
No matter how long they have held the office, or how long they remain, few members of Congress have or will, face a more consequential year than this one. Scrutiny and observation will be intense — as it should be. Stakes in our performance during the months immediately ahead will be enormous.

PERDUE

One of our readers whose surname is Perdue told us that she and her husband on a visit to New Orleans were told by a French waiter that "perdu" in French means "lost." If the waiter had made a deeper study of surnames, he might have gone on to tell the couple that Perdu was first given as a nickname to foundlings (babies left on doorsteps and other "lost" children) and later became a hereditary surname, as so many other nicknames have done.

Perdue is still a surname in France, but the final "e" was added in England to make it Perdue in that country.

Some authorities on surnames do not accept the French origin, but say that Perdue was a nickname given because of the over-worked French oath "par Dieu," which is "by God" in English. They point out that in medieval times when surnames were coming into usage, such exclamations were not looked on with as much disfavor as they are today.

Variations in the spelling of the name include Pardue, Pardew, Pardee and Purdy. A Henry Pardee was listed on the tax rolls in Warwickshire, England, and a Walter Perdu in Staffordshire, both in the year 1332.

Other nicknames said to have been given those who were addicted to the excessive use of oaths and which later became surnames include Bigott, which probably began with Roger Bigod, who was one of William the Conqueror's chief advisors; Godbehere, Godsave, Godsell and Godsil, the latter two from the expression "God's soul."

Government figures show an estimated 15,000 persons named Perdue in the United States, with the name ranking among the 2,000 most numerous surnames.

Purdue University at Lafayette, Ind., was named in honor of John Purdue, one of its benefactors.

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—In our last column, we discussed some points to remember when having a fireplace added to a home. Once the fireplace is built, the next step is purchasing wood to burn it in.

Assistants in the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division says just as there are things to keep in mind when building a fireplace, there are also things to consider when buying wood.

The most important one is to find a dependable firewood dealer.

The majority of firewood dealers are individuals who have been in business for years. They supply good quality wood and depend on satisfied customers for repeat orders.

But although most consumers in the market for firewood never experience any difficulty, there are some who have been burned by a few unscrupulous dealers.

The most common complaints to our Consumer Protection Division are that a dealer has either delivered less wood than expected or that he has charged more than the agreed-upon price.

The best way to be sure you will get the amount of wood you want to buy is to buy by the cord, the standard unit by which wood is sold. A cord of wood contains 128 cubic feet, and measurements for a cord are usually either 4x4x8 feet or 2x4x16 feet.

The easiest way to measure the wood you buy is to mark off

a correctly sized space by the side of a house or a fence and be sure the wood when delivered fills up the area.

Some consumers have complained about ordering firewood from dealers based on a quoted price per cord, only to have extra charges added on for both delivery of the wood and for stacking it.

It's important to establish in advance what the total price will include. Unless you plan to measure and pick up your wood, it is better to have it stacked when delivered to be sure you are getting the full amount.

Some dealers advertise firewood for very inexpensive prices. It often turns out that they are selling wood by the pick-up truck load or by some unit other than a cord. Since pick-up beds can vary greatly, this is a risky way to purchase wood. It's far safer to order wood by the cord and know the amount you will receive.

Occasionally, firewood purchasers will pay in advance, or will pay in full when only a portion of a firewood order has been delivered, trusting that the complete order will be delivered later.

This is not always wise, as one of the attorneys in our office discovered when the rest of his load never arrived. It would be shrewder to pay after delivery of all the wood, or at least to withhold a significant portion of the total amount until you get what you have ordered.

The type of wood you buy is

as important as the amount and should be determined before you buy. In Texas, oak is the most popular firewood for several reasons. It is a very hard wood that burns slowly, it comes in all sizes of logs, and it also has a decorative, rough bark that many people like.

Mesquite is also suitable for firewood, being hard and fairly long-burning. Any other hardwood is fine, too, but such woods as hickory and walnut, which once were in common use in East Texas, are considered too scarce and expensive for use today.

Soft woods such as pine and cedar should be avoided for firewood, but are often used as a kindling since they burn hot and fast.

Investigate carefully before buying unusual woods at "special bargain" prices. Some nurseries occasionally offer firewood at very low prices, but it's best to find out exactly what kind of wood will be included.

In addition, some trees that are decorative and useful in the yard may become very objectionable when used in the house for firewood because they produce peculiar odors when burned.

The age of the wood you buy is also very important. Wood that has dried out over several months or even years is usually preferred, although some people do mix in a little green wood.

Amount, price, type and age—if you determine these four things before purchasing your firewood you probably will have no problem.

If you do have a complaint, consult the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, your county or district attorney, or your local Better Business Bureau.

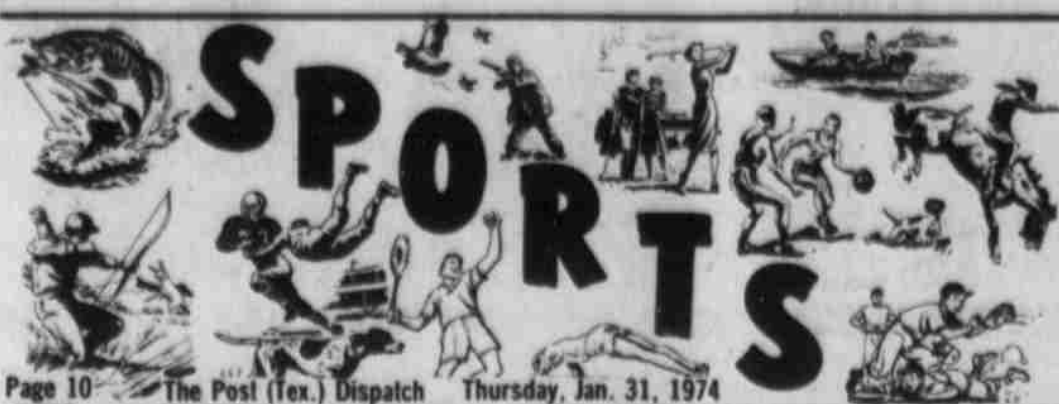

Revenue sharing budget of \$78,806 adopted by county

The Garza County Commissioners Court Monday approved a 1974 federal revenue sharing budget of \$78,806 with \$21,000 of this amount earmarked for purchase of an ambulance for the new emergency ambulance service and for other ambulance service costs.

The distribution of the federal funds showed \$9,000 for public safety with this money going for salaries and other law enforcement needs.

The county's share of the summer youth program was set up for \$1,750. The city and county share the cost of this recreational program begun two years ago.

Each of the four commissioner precincts are allocated \$8,750 for road work use. This leaves \$3,940.30 for financial administration and \$8,115.70 listed as general, which can be used for specific projects as their needs develop during the year.

No burning at dump grounds

The Texas Air Control Board has ordered that there be no more burning of trash at the city dump grounds, effective Jan. 1, Public Works Supt. Pete Maddox said Tuesday.

"The public is asked to cooperate with the City of Post in seeing that this ruling is obeyed," Maddox said.

Derry Harding of Lubbock and Pat Walker of Post, attorneys for the Southland school district, produced minutes of the Post district's board of trustees' decision on the annexation of the land.

Harding contended the minutes reflected "a conditional acceptance" of the land under which the Post district will assume no portion of the indebtedness on \$500,000 in school improvement bonds which have been approved by Southland school district voters but not yet sold.

The Post school district minutes noted:

"For purposes of clarification the approval of all petitions were made subject to a finding by the commissioners court

that the unissued and unsold Southland Independent School District bonds or no portion thereof, are to be assumed by the Post district."

Tom Griffith, attorney for the petitioners, pointed out that no indebtedness exists because although the bonds have been approved they have not "actually changed hands through sale."

Lubbock's Criminal District Atty. Alton Griffin, clarifying for the commissioners, agreed that "no indebtedness exists."

Walker pointed out, however, that the land will not actually be transferred until all appeals are exhausted "and we have repeatedly said we will appeal this through the courts."

He added that the Southland bonds could be sold at any time during that period of appeals, thus making the Post district liable for a pro rata share based on the land which may not be annexed until a later date.

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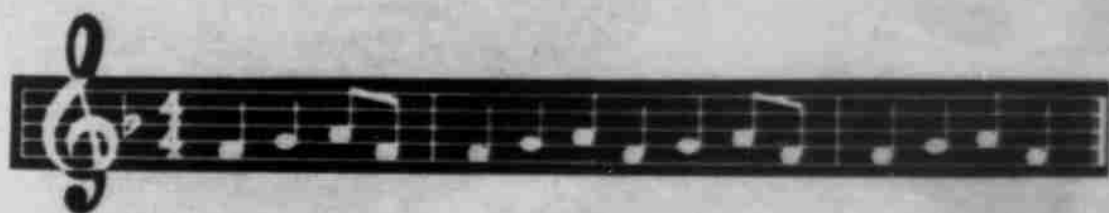
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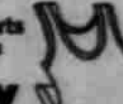
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
