JUDGE CONSIDERING THE DEFENSE PLEA OF FAULTY BILLS

AUSTIN, April 25 (AP)—Alleging faulty indictment counsel for F. A. Dale and H. H. Moore, expelled members of the Texas house of representatives today staved off scheduled opening of their trial on charges of accepting \$1,000 to influence legislation.
Criminal Judge J. H. Hamilton, after hearing an afternoon's argument, took under advisement until Tuesday a demotion to quash the indictment, attacked from half a dozen angles, mainly as failing to show date, and Moore, susceptible to legally defined bribery. Defense attorneys say that the state had failed to allege that Dale and Moore were in position to secure unfavorable house committee report on the optometrist tax bill involved, even if Dale did pocket \$1,000 tendered by Willis Chamberlain, Texas Optometry Association lobbyist, near a local hotel alley, one night.

PUBLISHERS MEET AT A. P. LUNCHEON

HISTORY OF NEWS GATHERING AGENCY IS RECOUNTED TO JOURNALISTS

NEW YORK, April 25.—Some six hundred newspaper publishers from all sections of the country attended the annual luncheon of The Associated Press at the Waldorf-Astoria this afternoon and heard addresses by Frank B. Rowes, president of the organization and Henry J. Allen, former governor of Kansas. Mr. Rowes, the principal speaker, spoke of the history, growth and development of the Associated Press, a national wide cooperative organization operating without profit and producing a news report without bias and uninfluenced by any interest.

POLICE GUARD PINEDO

Mayor Welcomes Aviator To City Of New York While Throng Cheers Him

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—Crowds gathered by police, who feared anti-fascist manifestations. Commander Francesco De Kincio, Italian aviator whose four continent flight was halted by the destruction of his plane in Arizona was welcomed to New York today.
Just before Mayor Walker extended to Commander De Kincio the official welcome of the city, police who formed a body guard for the aviator arrested a young Italian, who broke through the cordon holding in his arms a large bouquet of flowers.
Piercing hands tore apart the blossoms, but the suspected bomb was not found. The household beaver was disclosed as an ardent admirer. Commander De Kincio grasped the young man's hand in a firm grip, starting in disappointment as the man fled.
Fears of the police were increased while Commander De Kincio was being taken to city hall where the official welcome was given. The aviator stood up in his automobile, in an open car, and waved at the crowd that cheered him.
When a few admirers pressed through the cordon, Commander De Kincio shook hands with them.

GIVE LAST HIGHWAY AID

Practically All Funds of Department Used In Promise of Road Aid to Counties

AUSTIN, April 25 (AP)—Four that virtually the state last available highway money has been tentatively promised in allotments tonight grew with the highway commission after it had been promised conditionally state aid of about \$450,000 and federal aid of approximately \$1,155,516 to match \$1,154,775 county money.
With today's give, about \$2,450,000 in federal aid and about \$1,633,135 state aid has been allotted.

AMERICAN LANDS IN MEXICO SAFE CLAIMS DIPLOMAT

PRESIDENT PUBLISHES MEXICAN DENIAL OF CONFISCATION TALKS OF POLICIES

COOLIDGE TOUCHES ON FOREIGN SITUATION AT A. P. MEET

(By Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, April 25.—Mexico recently has declared she will not confiscate American property. President Coolidge disclosed tonight in a speech analyzing this nation's foreign policy particularly in respect to Mexico, Nicaragua and China.

Mr. Coolidge declared that "it will surely be possible to reach an amicable agreement" with Mexico on the basis of this word which was given to him at a conference with Ambassador Teller after the latter's return from a recent trip to Mexico City.
In his first public address since Congress closed, the president spoke before more than 1,000 newspaper editors and their wives at the dinner of the United Press association's commemorative of the twentieth anniversary of that organization at the Biltmore hotel. By an elaborate radio hookup, he also spoke to every section of the nation and some foreign countries, devoting his address almost entirely to a discussion of America's foreign policy. His words gained frequent applause.

Policy Upheld

Mr. Coolidge also was hopeful of the Near East and Chinese situations which he said involved this country because its determination to protect American lives and property.
Giving considerable attention to the Mexican problem, he said "grave difficulties" in the way of the senate's proposal for arbitration of the dispute with Mexico over the agriculture and land laws. The principle of arbitration was not open to arbitration, the president stated.

Active Uncertain

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The Mexican ambassador has assured the American government that Mexico does not intend to confiscate American property, but it remains for the future.

Son Of Ambassador Jailed In Rum Case

DETROIT, April 25 (AP)—Lacking bond of \$1,500, Sanford P. Smiddy, 27, son of Professor T. A. Smiddy, Irish free state representative to the United States was in the county jail tonight, charged with having violated the federal tariff act in smuggling whiskey from Canada.
Smiddy pleaded not guilty when arraigned today before United States Commissioner J. Stanley Hurd and was held for examination a week hence. His arrest which did not become known until today occurred Friday while he was at the wheel of an automobile being brought across from Windsor to Detroit on a ferry boat. Customs officers said 43 bottles of whiskey were brought across in the machine, most of it packed under the radiator.

SNYDER AFFAIR TRACED

Details of Love Introduced in Trial After Murder Described by Witness

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—After offering testimony to show that Albert Snyder, art editor, had been strangled to death with a piece of picture wire, the prosecution today turned back from the immediate details of the killing, and instead described the love affair between Snyder and the woman who was charged with the murder.
The trial began today with the opening address to the jury of District Attorney Richard S. Newcomb, in which vivid character sketches of the victim and the accused were followed by a graphic description of the planning and execution of the crime of Queens village on the morning of March 26, as the prosecution charges it was committed.
At the end of the day's session 13 witnesses for the state had been on the stand. Police Lieutenant Charles E. Doran was the fourteenth witness, but his testimony was delayed while counsel for the defense sought to exclude a diagram, aid to have been drawn by Gray showing a Kingston street, where certain purchases were made.

FELONY CHARGES FACE RAYMOND'S WIFE AND DOCTOR

CLAIM THEY CONSPIRED TO HIDE FACTS IN HIS DEATH

EACH MAKES BOND

PLEA OF ILLNESS FAILS TO HALT ARREST OF ACTRESS

(By The Associated Press.)
LOS ANGELES, April 25.—Dorothy Mackaye, stage actress and Dr. W. J. Sullivan, Hollywood physician were indicted by the county grand jury today on two felony counts and special charges with "conspiring to cover up" the death of Ray Raymond, musical comedian star.

The evidence was presented to the grand jurors by Chief Deputy Davis and Deputy District Attorney Forrest Murray.
Dr. Sullivan Dr. Sullivan appeared during the grand jury session and requested an opportunity to repeat his story before the jurors.

It was said the physician denied allegations that he participated in the alleged covering up and said he accepted a \$500 fee from Miss Mackaye only for professional services in attending her husband after the fatal fall, flight with Paul Kelly, screen juvenile, who is under indictment for murder.

The indictments were returned at five o'clock in the court room of Superior Judge Chas. B. Darnall after witnesses had appeared before the grand jury to tell of the alleged "conspiracy" to hide the true facts in the actor's death.

With bail fixed at \$5,000 in each case, Chief Deputy District Attorney Harold L. Davis instructed detectives to place Miss Mackaye and the doctor under arrest at once.

Although the actress was declared by her attorney, Roger Marchetti, to be suffering from complete nervousness exhaustion at her home, she was ordered taken into custody unless bond was posted by the time the warrants were issued.

CHINESE FIRE UPON FOREIGN WARSHIPS

INSTANCES OF ATTACKS ON ALIENS INCREASE IN NUMBERS

(By Associated Press.)
SHANGHAI, April 25.—The United States auxiliary vessel Penguin was fired on heavily yesterday in the Yangtze river with rifles, machine guns, and field pieces. Several of the Penguin's men were injured, one of them badly.

SHANGHAI, April 25.—Foreign warships in Chinese waters have been fired on again by Chinese troops. Recent statistics reported that American vessels, including the warships, in Chinese waters had been thus attacked on 45 occasions since August 16, 1925. This number was increased when the United States destroyer Peary was fired on yesterday near Kiangling on the Yangtze, about 125 miles off Hankow. The source of the firing was not located and the vessels did not return the fire.

Three British warships, the Mantua, Keppel and Walseley, also were fired on by Chinese batteries from the south bank of the Yangtze near Chikiang yesterday. The British replied with a heavy bombardment and soon silenced the Chinese guns.

The most precarious situation for foreigners at present in China appears to be at Hankow the seat of the radical Cantonese government. There are still about 80 foreigners left in Hankow among them 65 Americans. Because of the turbulent events in that city they spent the night at the waterfront, under the protection of the warships anchored in the river.

Dispatches from Hankow indicate that military preparations are under way on the outskirts of the city, in anticipation of an attack by General Chiang Kai-Shek, leader of the moderate Cantonese government at Nanking.

SMITH-COOLIDGE TALK

New York Mayor Greets President and Holds Conference With Him But Subject With-Held

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—Al Smith, democratic governor of New York, said his respects tonight to President Coolidge in his Biltmore hotel suite, but whether the 20-minute conference included a discussion of the present presidential candidacy possibilities of either was not divulged.

Asked what transpired at the talk, Governor Smith replied:
"I called at, of course, to bid him welcome to the city. I told him to be sure that he wanted to providing he didn't get caught at it."

When asked what the president said, the governor answered:
"He said he would take a chance."

Governor Smith, in the city for the weekend, went to the president's suite from his own rooms three floors below in the hotel.

NEW FLOOD STAGES ARE FORECAST ON LOWER PART OF RIVER

HOOVER IN CHARGE

CITIZENS FLEE WHEN MORE TOWNS ARE FLOODED

(By The Associated Press.)
MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 25.—Swiftly and irresistibly the flood waters of the Mississippi river and its tributaries rolled across new ground today in three states—Arkansas, Mississippi and Louisiana—inundating additional towns and thousands of acres of farm lands.

Driving the homeless before it, the floods culmed new victims here and there, swallowing a Mississippi National guard rescue worker near Greenville, an Arkansas planter near Pine Bluff, and the captain of a government craft assisting in levee strengthening on the Arkansas river near Gould.

With the known death list past the one hundred mark, estimates of the total fatalities ranged from 200 to 600. Rescue workers in the Mississippi delta in fear that many lost their lives today as the flood waters continue across the region.

FIVE DROWNED

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 25 (AP)—Five more deaths by drowning, and one from pneumonia growing out of exposure in the Arkansas floods were reported here today. Two of the five dead were white men, whose names could not be ascertained.

25 LEAP TO DEATH

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 25 (AP)—Twenty-five persons, whites and negroes, were drowned at Heads, a small village near Leland, yesterday when they jumped into the flood waters to escape from a burning building. The Memphis Commercial Appeal said tonight in a dispatch from a staff correspondent at Leland.

THE GOING FORWARD OF LUBBOCK

The continual going forward of Lubbock is still an outstanding feature of the city. People who come to Lubbock on their regular rounds at intervals of possibly sixty and ninety days, frequently mention this, and some times you will notice an old Lubbockite look with much surprise at the speaker when he makes a statement of that kind. Not that the Lubbockite is pessimistic, and thinks that the town is not doing its best, but many times we people, who stay close at home, are very much by the town as we are by the family. The children grow every day. They, in a few short years become grown men and women. We do not notice the growth, but to the fellow that sees them just occasionally, there is a marked change and the growth is rapid. Lubbock has not had a boom since away back when the railroad first arrived, but it was a town of only 1,500 people then, and now we have easily 18,000 people, and the most of the people are of the opinion that 20,000 would possibly come nearer being correct. This goes to show that while we are mindful of the growth of the community it is daily taking place, and the result is that we are building a city that will be the outstanding city of the Southwest.

At this time, some folks—Lubbock people, are inclined to complain some, that there is not much activity here as there should be. To these people, we would call attention to the wonderful growth that is continually going on. Had you noticed the great number of houses under construction at this time? Had you noticed the increasing demand on the city commission for water, sewer, light, etc? If you have not, a little checking up will convince you that there is much going on in this city that we are really not taking much notice of.

There is no slush about Lubbock. It has grown consistently for years. It has had just reasons for all its advancement, and this makes it one of the safest places to invest money that can possibly be found. The investor has never had occasion to regret the dollars that have been put into Lubbock property, consistently, for it has always been the source of a liberal profit, and still goes steadily ahead.

Lubbock is so situated that she does not have to depend upon the cotton crop as the only source of revenue. It will be surprising to you to know the amount of poultry alone that is handled at this place. The biggest wholesale poultry house in the West is located in Lubbock. At this house the poultry is killed and packed for shipment, and the numbers of car loads would be surprising to you, but it means a terrible sum of money each year to the farmers, not only of Lubbock, but over a trade territory 100 miles wide by two hundred miles long. Besides this house, that slaughters the poultry and ships in that condition, are a number of other large concerns that handle nothing but live poultry. Many car loads are shipped annually from this place, and then there is the production of eggs. Many carloads of eggs are shipped from Lubbock, and all of this means the distribution of as many dollars as represent the total resources of all of the banks in Lubbock.

This is only one item of diversification, there is the dairy industry, and the diversified farming, the other products of the farm, that count for much.

There is then no reason that Lubbock should not go steadily forward. There is no reason that the price of cotton should hinder the growth of the city. The Texas Technological college with its large enrollment of students from all parts of the Union, and with its great corps of instructors and officials, brings to the city one of the greatest revenues that any town can boast of, and at the same time maintains a citizenship that is of the very highest type, which is not always the case where there is a large payroll.

There is no wonder then that people who come to Lubbock from time to time notice the splendid advances the city is making and note with pleasure the substantial character of the improvements.

Lubbock grows. Not in leaps and jerks, but a good healthy, steady growth.

IS AMERICA MAGICAL

When some months ago a society of sons of old Dutch settlers in New York celebrated the

tercentenary of their ancestors' landing, more than one editorial commentator was moved to remark on the complete absence of any trace of hyphenism in the thoughts and utterances of the participants. The implied moral—in one instance it was explicit—was that there was something inherently loyal and assimilable in the spirit of this ancient people which caused them to cleave to America without reservation and which was lamentably lacking in our later immigrants. As is doubtless natural in such occasional essays, two or three somewhat major oversights were committed. It was overlooked for instance, that in the course of three hundred years no people can in a maelstrom of populations such as ours retain enough of its original identity even for sentimental uses, and the Dutch in the region around New York is root American precisely in the same sense as English is, say, in the vicinity of Boston. Hyphenism in a Knickerbocker is excluded on the same fundamental ground as it is in a Yankee—by sheer definition.

More than that, the processes by which the far-flung racial strains of the Old World coalesce into a nation in this country seem to be widely misunderstood outside editorial offices, as well as in. To commend the New York Dutch for having lost their homeland consciousness after three centuries is apparently to be unaware that other later arrivals have done much the same thing in less than one. Witness, for instance, the continuing amalgamation of German newspapers in the United States and its implications of a gradual drifting of German settlers out of German consciousness into America. Nor do they always amalgamate; it has come about in many sections of the country that there is nothing to amalgamate with, and there is no choice for the editor but to turn the key and walk out. In Indiana, by way of illustration, there was fifty years ago a large and prosperous German press. Dailies of that language flourished in every larger city—in Indianapolis, Terre Haute, Fort Wayne, Evansville, Logansport and many others. Now the last of these dailies, the Fort Wayne Freie Presse, Staats-Zeitung, founded 70 years ago, has just given up the struggle. And lest it should be thought that its editor has missed the significance of his own abolition, listen to his valedictory:

"The decline and gradual disappearance of the German-language dailies (he says) is in the final analysis due to the development of the country. In the last 50 years America has grown from a land peopled by a mixture of the most diverse European races to a proud and homogeneous Nation, whose civilization is a composite of the contributions brought to her shores by these many people. Among the races that have given most to America's material and cultural progress are the Germans. And it was inevitable that they, too, should in the end be merged in the greater entity which they have helped to build. . . . When Americans of German descent return to Germany after long years of absence, they feel like strangers—no matter how warmly they may be received by friends and relatives. And everyone recognizes them as Americans. It is only after they leave this country and are again face to face with the old homestead that they realize how fundamentally their whole character has been changed, how their habits and customs and their way of thinking about things has been transformed by their life in America."

And what is true of English and Scotch, of Dutch and German is quantitatively at least, true also of many other peoples of more recent settlement. It may not be so strikingly obvious; but that is due merely to the continuance of the stream of immigration from their homelands, which serves constantly to replace the Americanized generations by fresh arrivals.

This Americanization, when one stops to think of it, is something not far short of a miracle. We are, after all, not the first country to have tried the experiment of building a Nation out of motley materials. Rome and Austria had their fling at it, so did Russia and Turkey. And after centuries of earnest effort, they collapsed like a house of cards. Certain earnest citizens of the founding strains may flatter themselves with the thought that it is their efforts after the Austrian fashion that have made America the one successful exception, and that Americanization is no more than the adoption by the later comers of the civilization planted here by their own ancestors. Nothing is farther from the truth. The immigrant divests himself of his nationality precisely because he is left free to cling to it. It is a voluntary act, inspired not by the desire or the compulsion to imitate someone who came here yesterday, but by the magic of a free environment and a new idea in human relationships.

PROGRESS OF PROHIBITION

Sentiment in favor of prohibition is making remarkable progress all over the world. The normal and economic forces of the great countries are coming to consider seriously the advantages of total abstinence. Naturally they are watching with keen interest the experiment in this country.

There has been a remarkable development of prohibition sentiment in Germany which was made manifest in the recent vote in the Reichstag in favor of local option for certain districts. The Progressive-Liberals seem to be favorably disposed toward trying local option and this would mean the entering wedge for stricter prohibitory enactments.

Germany is the best prospect among European nations for an enforcement program that I know of. If that nation eventually comes to adopt the American experiment it probably will be because of the keen respect Germans have for the economic laws which govern industry.

Norway, which recently repudiated prohibition enforcement as Americans understand it. The laws were mainly caused by the loose laws, pressure of an economic nature brought by France, Portugal and Spain, which had wines and liquors to sell, made it impossible, even for the prohibition which existed to be enforced.

THE MAN OF MANY JOBS

If there is any man in the United States mentally and physically equipped to handle a multiplicity of positions, it is Herbert Hoover, secretary of Commerce. Hoover's labors include everything from reclamation of the arid lands of the United States and promoting of foreign commerce to looking after the public health. In fact there is apparently nothing in the way of public welfare in which he is not interested and his capacity for work is indicated by the fact that he neglects none of his multitude of duties.

Among the other official positions held by the Secretary of Commerce is that of president of the American Health Association, and Mr. Hoover is intensely interested in this work. Writing in the May issue of "Children, the Magazine for Parents," relative to the "national rally day of childhood," to be celebrated May 1 as Child Health Day, Mr. Hoover says:

"In six years our idea of health has greatly expanded in meaning. From health in the physical sense, we have arrived at the ideal of health as wholeness, signifying the development of the child in his complete endowment—physical, mental, emotional and spiritual.

"This year, May Day, which has become a national rally day of childhood sends out to the country an appeal to sound out the splendid endeavors in behalf of children by adding to what is already being done a greater consideration of the spiritual needs of the child. To the churches of America the American Child Health Association has issued a call for cooperation and they have answered it unanimously.

"If, to the efforts which science is so earnestly making to study and safeguard the young, to what the schools are doing to meet the expanding needs of the new generation, the homes and churches of this country should make common cause to restore to our children something of the faith and idealism upon which rests the very foundation of our nation, we may face the future fearlessly in the knowledge that we are rearing a generation equipped at every point to bear the strain which our great material resources place upon us as a nation."

American Trade And The War Debt

In a recently published memorandum, entitled "The United States and the War Debt," the Foreign Policy Association lays special emphasis on one aspect of the debt problem which so far has not received the consideration which its importance seems to demand. Of course, it is pretty generally recognized by this time that the \$11,552,000,000 of war debts and the \$10,000,000,000 additional in interest which we are scheduled to receive cannot be paid in money, but that in the long run we must accept the equivalent of these sums in either goods or services. Few of us, however, have given much thought to what this entails.

Some three or four years hence the United States is scheduled to receive payments from its war debtors, at the average rate of approximately \$1,000,000,000 per day. Payments are to continue at this rate for fifty-five years, and thereafter are to become still larger. In addition to these prospective receipts there are the payments on the private foreign loans, which have now reached a total of \$12,000,000,000 and are steadily increasing. This means that the United States faces the prospect of receiving each year goods and services with a value of at least \$1,500,000,000 over and above the value of what it sends abroad.

This in itself simply means that we are the world's richest nation and its greatest creditor. But it also means that this country faces a reversal of its trade relations. Its whole commercial policy heretofore has been based on the anticipation of a large surplus of exports. Imports have been barred by tariff walls, while the export trade has had no end of government coddling.

It is true that the United States has been a creditor ever since the war, and that it still has a large surplus of exports. Yet this affords no argument against the prospect of sweeping changes. Our trade balance continues favorable for the reason that our debtors are paying us with the proceeds of private loans. Foreign borrowings in the United States now average close to \$1,000,000,000 a year, and as long as we continue to lend on this scale it will not be necessary for the borrowers to render us goods and services. On the other hand, this continual borrowing will produce an unfavorable trade balance which we must finally face.

A reversal of the trade balance will not come overnight. It will be a gradual process, but in the end it may involve considerable industrial readjustment. Our basic industries are geared for quantity production, and are seeking new foreign outlets for their surplus. The ultimate necessity of taking in more than we send out will not ease their task of finding new markets. It is obviously impossible to forecast the full commercial and industrial effects of our new role as a creditor Nation, but it is important to note that such effects must eventually be experienced. And the results may have a powerful influence on the policy which the American Government ultimately adopts toward the European war debts.—New York World.

THE HOME IS WORTH ALL IT COSTS

The Better Homes in American organization is drumming up interest in Better Homes Week, April 24th to May 1st. We have never taken kindly to the "week" idea, but have no hesitancy in commending the campaign for better homes sponsored by this national organization which seeks to make home life in America a more pleasant thing by preaching the doctrine of the prime importance to the individual of not only a place to live, but a better place.

The home should come first in the citizen's interest. America's greatness is founded on the institution of the home. If the family place of abode is not as attractive as possible, as comfortable as possible, as convenient as the finances of the family

will permit, then the coming generation is being cheated of what amounts in America to a birthright.

With the nation more prosperous than at any time in its history, with wages at the peak and unemployment practically non-existent, with a high standard of living becoming the goal of most families, and with the output of manufacturing genius available to the average home-builder at prices reasonable indeed compared with general costs and offering in many cases advantages not far removed from extra cost, it is time for America to think not only of the owning of homes but of better homes; homes as good as the increased wages of the day will allow.

We will not boast a "week," but we will boast the better home in fifty-two weeks in every year.—Quinn Tribune-Chief.

FIGHT TYPHOID KILL FLIES

Citizens of Lubbock should begin now to think about avoiding typhoid fever this summer. The American Medical Association says that remarkable improvement has been noted in the typhoid mortality rates in the large cities of the country. No reason exists for typhoid in smaller places and it is incumbent upon every good citizen to give proper attention to this dangerous disease.

Typoid, as our readers know, is transmitted by flies of human excreta. The flies feeding on this from a typhoid patient, crawl over the food that somebody else eats, and another typhoid case develops. The usual details of the transmission of this disease are not pleasant to contemplate.

One of the chief weapons in the war on typhoid is the death of flies. Every citizen should be on the battle-front. Stables and barns, as well as homes, should be disinfected. Where the owner declines to do this they should be compelled to do it. The fly is the typhoid carrier, for that reason "swat the fly" is not an idle slogan.

This summer, typhoid will probably attack some of our people. It may be a citizen who has taken every precaution, but is the victim of another's careless disregard. It may be an old person, or a possible child. There is no way to tell. The only thing that we can do is to fight the disease as best we can in the light of modern science. The message that is strongest is: "Kill the fly."

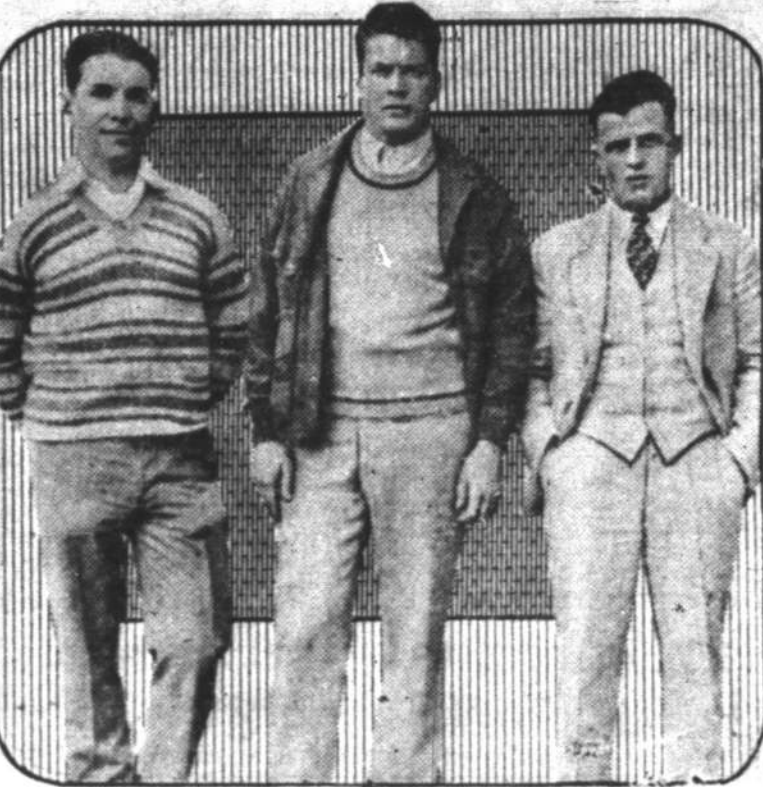

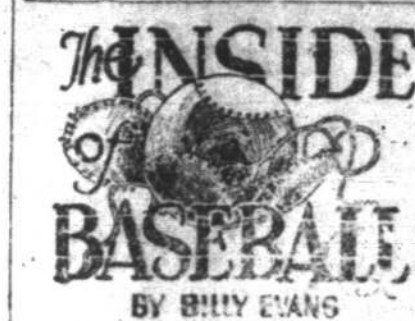

ture to disclose in what measure the assurance will ease the diplomatic controversy over the Mexican oil and land regions regulations.

Apprehension in Washington that Mexican authorities are threatening steps which, from the American viewpoint, will amount to a violation of American rights, even though those steps may not be regarded by Mexico herself as constituting confiscation.

President Coolidge, disclosing in his New York speech tonight the assurance message delivered to him by the Mexican ambassador, said he was convinced an amicable adjustment would be possible. This declaration, however, followed a statement by the president that the American government feels that Mexico "is threatening" to disregard the cardinal principle that private property must not be taken without fair compensation.

Officials Silent

Officials here declined to add anything to the words of the president or to say what significance they attached to the ambassador's assurance. It was recalled, however, that the Mexican foreign office has contended all along that the policies adopted by President Calles toward American property owners in Mexico did not involve "confiscation" and that it was upon this very question of the true meaning of the term that Washington and Mexico City came to an impasse.

It was after that impasse had been reached that Ambassador Teller made a hurried trip to Mexico City and talked over the whole situation at length with those in charge of the foreign policies of his country.

Conferred With Coolidge

Upon his return to Washington, he visited President Coolidge at the temporary White House. No apparent change in the diplomatic relations of the two countries followed, and tonight's announcement by Mr. Coolidge was the first public intimation of what took place.

"I am glad to report that the Mexican ambassador has recently declared to me that she (Mexico) does not intend to confiscate our property," said the president, in his New York speech, "that she has shown diligence in carrying out and punishing those who have murdered our citizens, and expressed the wish, which we so thoroughly entertain, of keeping cordial and friendly relations with the people of both countries. It will surely be possible to reach an amicable adjustment."

No Settlement Made

Since Mr. Teller's call upon the president, officials here have said repeatedly that no change has taken place in the diplomatic deadlock, and Mr. Coolidge himself pointed out in New York tonight that the question of the Mexican land seizure policies still is in an undetermined stage, and is pending in the Mexican courts. This observa-

tion of the president's accord with an oft-repeated statement of officials in Washington that a final showdown still is awaited.

It has been indicated that the American government expects to take no further diplomatic action unless there is an actual physical attempt to dispossess American land holders. Should such a step be taken, the American government will decide its policy, not on the basis of Ambassador Teller's statement alone, but after consideration of the whole record of diplomatic exchanges between Washington and Mexico City.

Several points in his speech, President Coolidge recalled that American recognition was granted the Mexican government only after assurances had been given that American property would not be confiscated. No official would say, however, whether the president's words were to be interpreted as forestalling a withdrawal of recognition if confiscation ensued.

Shelbyville, east of Greenville.

Arkansas City Evacuated.—Arkansas City, a town of 2,000 people has been evacuated, according to reports to the Arkansas Military authorities, while the refugees seeking haven at Shelby and other nearby towns, which are gradually being flooded by the Arkansas river flow.

Evacuation also was being forward at Indianola, Arcata and other towns in the Mississippi delta, but there was no forcible evacuation by order of the Military authorities in either those places or in Greenville. Adjutant General Green announced at Vicksburg.

While the flood waters were spreading at an alarming pace, comprehensive plans were laid here for relief work with Secretary Hoover at the helm.

Full Government Aid

"Coming here from Washington by direction of the president, the man who led Belgium through the war hurriedly conferred with Red Cross and other officials and announced that the full resources of the government would be placed at the disposal of the relief agencies.

The commerce secretary, before embarking on a tour down the Mississippi to Vicksburg and New Orleans to get a first hand picture of the situation, declared that the full five million dollars the country had been to give through the Red Cross would be needed and that perhaps more would be called for later.

Meanwhile agencies of the government were converging forces rapidly on the flood district with supplies of all kinds to relieve the suffering of more than 150,000 now homeless. Rescue work also was going on a pace in all districts with the aid of additional motor boats, army and airplane used to get out the refugees on levees, knolls and house tops in isolated districts.

Flood Stage Rising

While the flood waters slowly seep-

ing back into the Mississippi through its tributaries, a constant rise in the river between Natchez and New Orleans was noted with the gauge at New Orleans showing a rise of 2 of a foot to 2 1/2 feet, four feet above flood stage.

Army engineers were still gravely concerned about the impending situation lower down the river and they said today their next move would be to prevent the dynamiting of the levees above that city, which might be attempted in an effort to divert the flood waters.

From Lake Providence, La., above Vicksburg, south to the mouth of the Red River below Natchez, forces under command of George C. Schoenberg, Louisiana state engineer, were building up the levees against the forecast record stage of fifty eight feet.

Directly across the Mississippi from Natchez, the most desperate fight was in progress. Additional men were mobilizing and a large ferry boat was pressed into service to transport sand from the Mississippi side to fill the bags used in topping the levees.

Fearful of a flood in this area, many women and children already have been evacuated to Natchez and other towns. All able-bodied men remained, behind, however, to carry on the levee work.

Engineers also were driving large forces of men in strengthening the levees at and just below Helena where some seepage had been noted.

A highest gauge of record at Helena if the dykes hold was forecast today by the weather bureau, which predicted a stage of 55.8 to 57 feet by Wednesday.

Olney Arranges To Furnish Boys Gifts

Under the present plans being used the original gilt is purchased by some local merchant or individual and placed in the care of a member of the pig club. When the first litter is six months of age, two sow pigs are to be returned in payment for the original gilt. These two pigs are then placed with two other club members under the same agreement. These pigs that are then returned are sold, the money pooled and distributed back to the original purchasers.

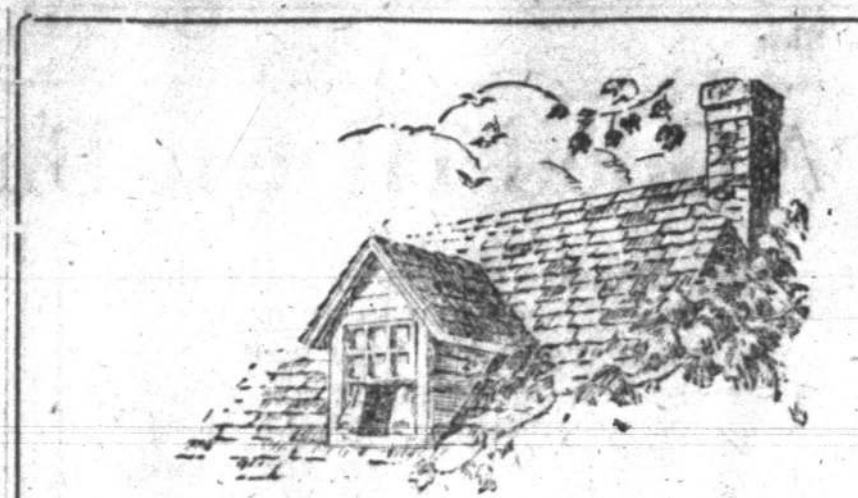
