Tornado Strikes Hansford County

The good life in Hansford County became a charmed life shortly after midnight, Thursday, when a destructive tornado damaged homes, wiped out barns and machinery and caked livestock with mud before taking to the air again just west of the Spearman city limits and roaring off to Beaver County, Okla.

Except for some minor wind damage in spotted locations, the city of Gruver suffered little more than loss of power as the twister ripped up mile after mile of utility poles and power lines.

A spokesman for Southwestern Public Service Company said, Friday, that service should be restored to Gruver by late Saturday. In the meantime, Baker & Taylor Drilling Co. was furnishing a huge generator at the "Ag Barn" at Gruver so the annual Junior Livestock Show competition could continue Friday and Saturday as scheduled.

With the rising sun, Friday, Hansford County Judge R.L. McClellan made a helicopter tour of the county to assess the

actual extent of damage.

Hardest hit appeared to be the place of County Commissioner Buddy Lowe located a short distance east of the Gruver city limits. Every truck and tractor on the place suffered major damage and a barn was totally destroyed with parts of it deposited atop utility poles by the tornado winds.

At least one place near Morse was hit and ammonia tanks virtually wrapped around a tractor.

The home of G.C. Brillhart suffered extensive damage while the Charles Brillhart home fared better but a barn there was destroyed. A home on the F.W. Thomas place suffered major damage and at least one trailer house located at Caprock Feeders was totally destroyed.

Hansford County Sheriff R. L. McFarlin and his crew of deputies and volunteers were up most of the night, first tracking the storm, then checking for possible injured persons in the path of the tornado.

At press time, there had been no injuries reported in Hansford

County. In a phone conversation with Sheriff McFarlin at mid-morning, Friday, United Press International said there were at least five persons seriously injured in Beaver County, Okla.

The sheriff said it was definitely established that the storm was a tornado. It was tracked some 50 miles ON THE GROUND from a point just east of the Diamond Shamrock facility in Moore County to about the west city limits of Spearman.

McFarlin said this on-the-ground swath cut by the twister ranged from a quarter to a half-mile wide and miraculously missed many homes on its course by moving between farmhouses on its way north-eastward.

The sheriff agreed with Judge McClellan's assessment of livestock damage. He said some owners -- out early checking -- had found some minor wounds on some animals, evidently caused by flying debris in the winds but no dead animals -- horses or cows -- had been sighted nor reported.

Both officials agreed that the

animals everywhere in the county were mud-covered but lying placidly as though nothing had happened. On close inspection, it was felt that cattle reposing quietly in the pastures were in a state of shock from the storm.

It was too early to estimate a "ball park" figure for damages, but it was the consensus that -- despite no injuries nor loss of life nor animals -- damage would run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The assessment will occupy

the next several days.

Meanwhile, it is life-as-usual in Hansford County with the livestock show in full swing at press time and most residents fulfilling plans already made for the weekend.

--And the record remains intact.

Neither of the cities of Gruver nor Spearman have suffered a direct violent weather blow during the entire period since the weather service has been keeping weather records of the area.

Police week:

Dogs, drunks, drag-racing

The police reporting period March 12 - 18 was marred by only one accident reported and investigated but incidents investigated in that period were numerous and just about ran the offense gamut short of a serious major crime.

The busy period for the Spearman Police Department began Friday night when two Spearman residents were apprehended for "drag racing" in the 400 block of HW 207. They were arraigned in municipal court and fined for the offense.

That same night a Spearman youth was taken into custody for being a minor in possession of alcoholic beverages, public intoxication and traffic offenses. He was released to the custody of his parents pending disposition of the case.

To add variety to Friday night, two Spearman residents were detained for yelling obscenities at an out-of-town law enforcement officer traveling through the city at the time.

Saturday, a Spearman resident was arrested for public intoxication, traffic offenses and reckless destruction of property after he struck a gas meter while attempting to flee the arresting officer.

Also, Saturday, a Spearman resident was arrested for driving a motor vehicle with license suspended.

Sometime during late Sunday evening and early Monday morning, a person or persons unknown threw a soft drink bottle through a window at the McClellan Grain Store. That incident was still under investigation at press time.

Tuesday was "complaint" day with one filed concerning an animal and one against a Perryton resident for a traffic offense.

Wednesday, a Spearman resident reported that, sometime between Feb. 17 and March 17, tools were stolen from an unoccupied residence here. An investigation is underway.

Thursday, the Spearman Police Department received two warrants from Burger for Spearman residents. One was served and one will be served according to Chief Ron Robinson.

The single accident report to and investigated by the police department occurred Sunday at Ninth and Archer streets at 10:45 a.m. A 1969 white-over-green Ford two-door driven by Marion De. Stewart and a 1973 blue Ford four-door driven by Mary E. Vitela, were in collision.

City Sales Tax Rebate Up 10.80% Over Last Year

The State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$48.9 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for March.

The payment is the largest representing a single month's tax collections ever distributed -- 29 percent over the same period in 1981.

This record payment, reflecting taxable sales made by Texas businesses in January, is the second record payment in two months, but Bullock added a note of caution.

"Record sales can be one indicator of good times, but they are not an indicator of profit margins. These taxes are based on sales price or market value. True, Texans are spending more but these figures don't tell us what the merchants or suppliers or manufacturers are having to pay for the goods they buy."

Bullock explained that last month's record \$106.4 million payment to cities who levy the local sales tax represented collections from taxpayers who pay monthly as well as those who pay quarterly and yearly.

The City of Spearman received a payment of \$13,627.21 for the period ending 3-7-82. This is compared to \$9,446.08 for the same period last year.

1982 payments to date to the city for the one cent sales tax are \$55,560.26 up 10.80% over

the 1981 figure of \$50,142.47. The City of Gruver received \$1,904.34 for the period ending 3-7-82. Their payment for the same period in 1981 was \$1,704.74.

1982 payments to date to the City of Gruver are \$8,541.90 up 3.58% over the \$8,246.42 in 1981 for the same period.

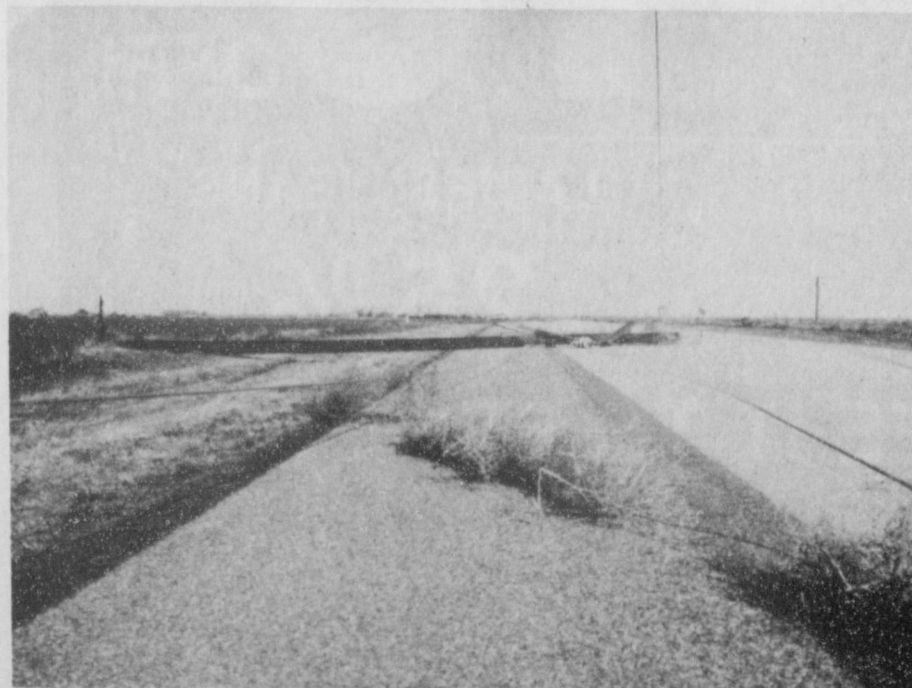

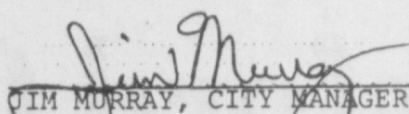

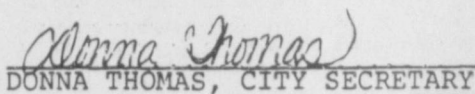

Sergeant Charles Henderson, Area supervisor of Hansford County, reports that for the month of February, the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated a total of 4 accidents in this county. There were 0 fatal accidents with a total of 0 persons killed, 2 injury accidents with a total of 2 persons injured, and 2 property damage accidents. In District 5B, which includes the top 31 counties of the Texas Panhandle, there were 322 accidents investigated by the Texas Highway Patrol. Highway Patrol Captain Bob Russell reports that the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated 2 fatal accidents with a total of 3 persons killed, 110 injury accidents with a total of 166 persons injured, and 210 property damage accidents.

Farmers Union Field Hearings

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- The worst economic collapse in 50 years can still be remedied, but it will take major emergency amendments to the Agriculture and Food Act of 1981 to turn things around, George W. Stone, president of National Farmers Union, said.

Noting that 1982 U.S. net farm income is now being projected at \$14.5 billion, Stone said this would be a 55 percent drop from the 1979 level.

"We are back to the kind of roller-coaster ride farmers used to suffer 50 years ago before the federal farm programs were established in the first year of the New Deal," Stone declared, pointing out that there was a 60 percent drop in farm income from 1919 to 1921 and a 70 percent drop from 1929 to 1932.

"During the years from 1933 to 1973, when we had reasonably strong farm support programs, the swings in farm prices were tamed down to the 20 to 25 percent range," he explained.

Stone called for a grassroots uprising, starting with a series of grassroots mobilization rallies in March and April, aimed at quick legislative or administrative action to undergird farm

prices and income.

He announced that the first such rally would be held at the Co-op Cotton Compress in Lubbock, Texas at noon on Monday, March 22. Additional mobilization rallies will be held in Kansas, Colorado, South Dakota, Indiana, Wisconsin, Montana, Washington and Arkansas, while state meetings would be held in Minnesota, Oklahoma and elsewhere.

Stone warned that "simply finding scapegoats is not going to save farmers struggling to survive."

"We have to do more than just point out what is wrong and who is wrong," he insisted, "we have to change what is wrong about farm price and credit policies."

The grassroots mobilization rallies, which will be conducted as public hearings designed to obtain the views of main street businessmen, implement dealers, bankers and farm credit suppliers, community leaders and local governmental officials, will be aimed at getting movement in the Congress as well as in the Executive Branch, Stone explained.

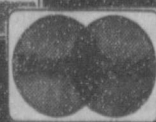

Errors Delay Refund Checks

Dallas, Texas -- "While an error-free tax return can be processed by the IRS within 6-8 weeks at this time of the year, a return with an error can take up to 12 weeks and, in some cases, considerably longer," said Sharon L. Wrublesky, Chief, Taxpayer Service Division for the Internal Revenue Service. "With three-fourths of taxpayers expecting refund checks, it is important to avoid the most common filing errors."

Along with the errors of failing to attach Forms W-2 and schedules, failing to sign (both spouses must sign a joint return) and transposing numbers, Ms. Wrublesky listed the following problem areas to steer clear of:

Entry on Wrong Line - Many taxpayers are entering W-2 wages on line 7 and then repeating this figure on line 8E. If IRS does not catch this mistake, the taxpayer's tax will be doubled and a balance due notice will be issued instead of the refund check the taxpayer might have expected.

Failure to Claim the Interest/Dividend Exclusion - Many taxpayers are forgetting to claim the interest/dividend exclusion (\$200 for single return, \$400 for joint return).

Earned Income Credit - Taxpayers either make a math error when computing the credit, claim the credit when not entitled or do not claim it when they are entitled to the credit.

Taxpayers should complete their returns and then set it aside for a day. Sometimes a fresh look during a next day review will reveal an overlooked error," advised Ms. Wrublesky. Fewer errors mean faster refunds.

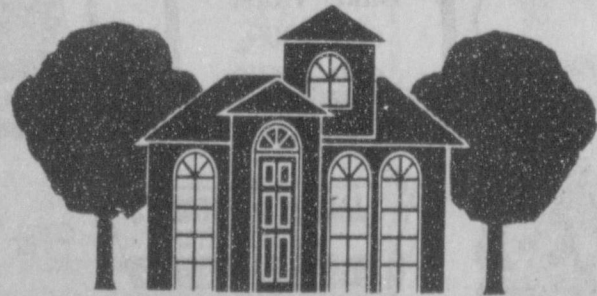

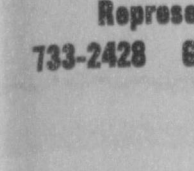

Anyway, while going through the large volume of mail we get each day and which usually goes in file 13, I ran across a release from the National Wildlife Federation which begins...Gas station attendants of the future may be asking automobile drivers whether they want to fill up with regular, unleaded or "leafy" varieties of fuel. The "leafy" brand would come from certain kinds of plants and trees -- the as-yet-untapped sources of petroleum-like substances. According to the release, preliminary research suggests that at least 30 different plants could someday be farmed for hydrocarbons -- the organic compounds found in crude oil but also manufactured by nature in certain plants. Among them are the desert plant "gopherweed", indigenous to the southwestern part of the United States, which they say mixed with certain chemicals can produce several barrels of oil per acre. Also the milky sap that gives milkweed its name can also be processed into fuel, and so may the sunflower.

Just think, if there are any farmers left, they may call themselves "gopher farmers" sometime in the future.

Register If You Want To Vote

Secretary of State David A. Dean reports that only two out of every three eligible voters in Texas are registered to vote. Eligible voters not currently registered to vote must do so by April 1, 1982 -- in order to vote in the State's May 1st primary election.

Qualifications for voting are: 1. You must be a citizen of the United States. 2. You must be at least 18 years of age on the day of the election. 3. You must be a resident of the county, or political subdivision conducting the election. 4. You must be registered to vote.

Persons who are not entitled to vote: 1. Those convicted of a felony whose full rights of citizenship have not been restored. 2. Those persons found mentally incompetent by a court of law.

To register to vote complete a post card application for voter registration and mail it postage-free or present it in person to the voter registrar in your county. You may register to vote at any time, but your application must be received by your county Voter Registrar by April 1, 1982 in order to vote in the May 1, 1982 primary election.

You may register to vote if you are at least 17 years and 10 months of age, but you must not vote until you are 18 years of age.

To obtain a voter registration application, contact your county voter registrar (in Hansford County, contact Helen Dry, County Tax Assessor-Collector; or call the Secretary of State's office toll-free at 1-800-252-9602 and one will be mailed to you.
