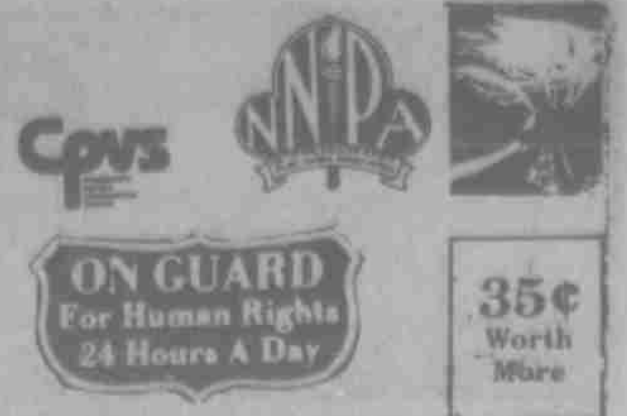

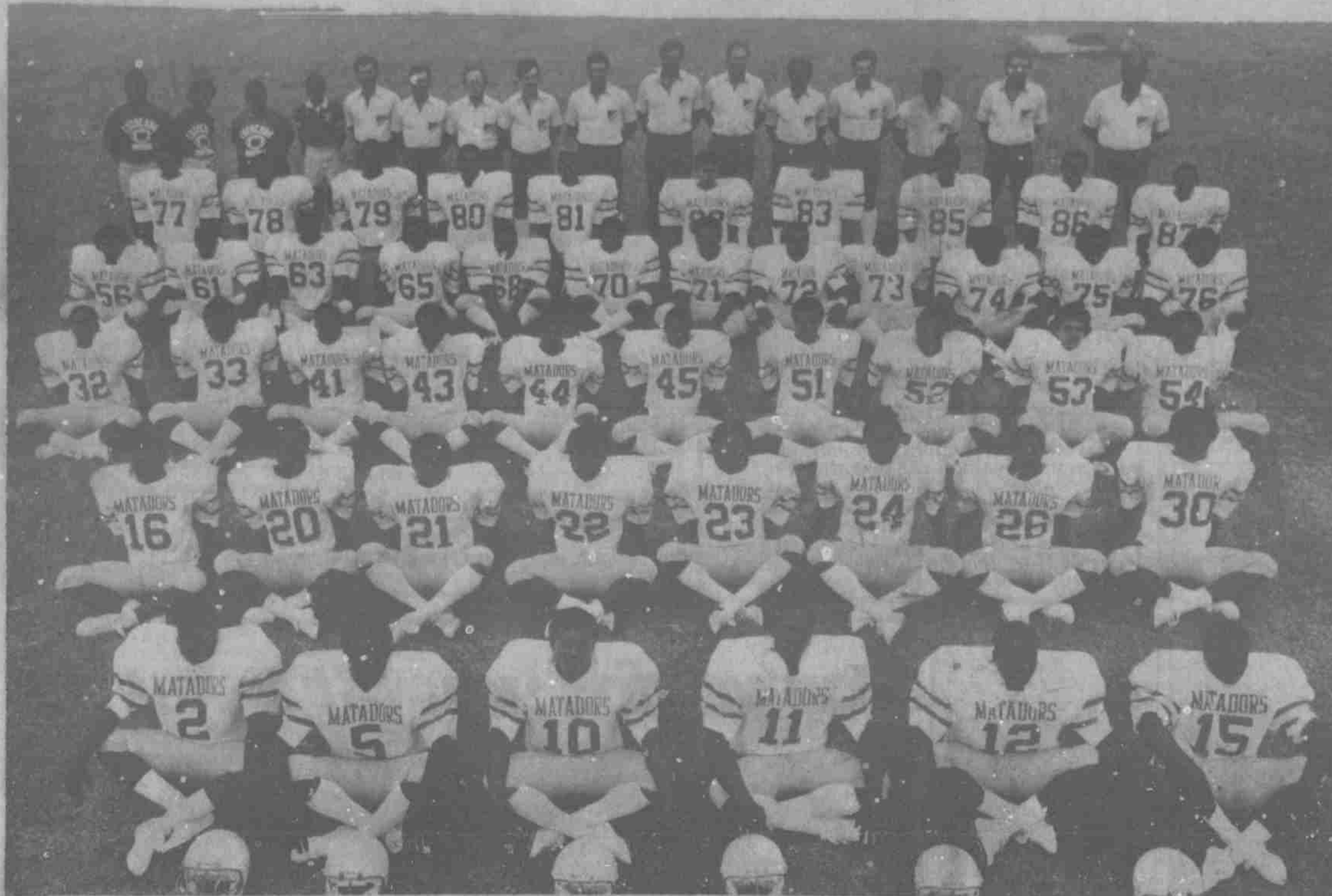

Journalism Convention Held

The Eighth Texas Association of Journalism Educators' convention was held October 18-19 in Lubbock.

This is the first time the convention has met in the City of Lubbock. Students from the Lubbock schools, including Estacado, participated in contests at the convention. Competing in newswriting were Bridgett Mask, video newscast; Charlotte Demming and Debra Gomez, and in on-site photography; Kris Mask and Janie Tijerina.

Other writing events were featured. Those included sports, editorial, and feature. Students also had the opportunity to compete in yearbook copy and caption and yearbook layout and design. A first time for the

convention was the video newscast contest.

In each of the writing events, students interviewed someone in press conference style. They were then given time to write their stories.

Students in on-site photography were given a roll of color slide film and given two hours on the campus of Texas Tech.

Kris Mask, EHS junior was fourth place in action photography at the convention. He was given a certificate for his efforts.

Sessions included everything from newspaper re-design to law and ethics in journalism.

Local reporters offered a TV panel. Also local advertising and public relations officials, newspaper and photographers offered panel discussions.

Students were also given the chance to attend sessions in all areas of journalism.

Several guests attended the opening session. From Lubbock, Councilman T. J. Patterson; Dr. E. C. Leslie, LISD Superintendent; Gib Weaver, Assistant Superintendent of Secondary Schools, LISD; and Wayne Dickey, Instructional Program Administrator of LISD.

Tim Lautzenheiser, sponsored by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, was opening speaker. Lautzenheiser is a motivational speaker who travels across the country speaking to groups about how to promote success through positive attitudes.

Directors for the convention were the journalism advisers from each of the five local high schools.

"Parents, Encourage Your Children To Stay Free From Drugs!"

What a parent can do to have a drug free child is to learn about the type of drugs kids get into.

We need to have a frank open discussion with our children. We need to set examples for our children. We need to impress upon them that they are being sold a bill of goods by the drug pushers. That they are being led to believe that drugs and cool when, in fact, they give you a false feeling of self worth. That drugs prevent you from thinking sensible. That drugs are detrimental to your health.

It's important for you to encourage your children to get involved in activities that can give them a feeling of well being. Volunteer activities, sports, other recreational activities, religious activities at the church. These are the things kids can substitute for drugs.

Most of all, parents, give your child your attention, love and understanding. Join the PTA! Join the Booster Clubs and invite drug counselors to your meetings.

Let your school superintendent, principals, and coaches know you are holding them accountable, and yourself for your children.

The Lubbock Independent School District is trying to do something about drug abuse. Kids who use drugs are losers anyway you look at it.

Their grades suffer because they can't concentrate; their attention span is affected. Drugs, like marijuana and alcohol, are referred to as "Gateway or Stepping Stone Drugs", which means their abuse can lead to more dangerous, more habit forming drugs like crack, cocaine, LSD, even prescription drugs such as tranquilizers, sleeping medication, and etc.

If you can stop drug use in its experimental stage, we will be getting a grip on the problem before it becomes a major problem with our kids.

Back to Basics A Must for Our Survival!!

Across the nation, the cry from all Black organizations, the Black Press, and all Black leaders is -- "Back to Basics."

Work and self help -- these are a couple things that sort of went out of style ... but like it or not ... Reagan may force them back upon us!! Work and self help.

Booker T. Washington, following a visit to Washington, D. C. a few years after the period of Reconstruction (1867-1877), noted what he described as a tragic tendency "to look to the Federal Government for everything," even as a little child looks for total support and guidance to its parents. As a whole, we have developed poor work habits ... which makes it hard for you to adjust when you get rigid working conditions ... or a really tough job ... which most jobs will be if the cut backs continue. And those who have lost the work habit will be lost ... or soon dismissed ... because too many will think that being on a job ... any job means back to what has been the norm ... and that will not be so ... any more.

Thank God for Booker T. Washington and Rev. Leon Sullivan ... you name'em ... they all knew that sooner or later ... "self help" was the answer. There is a personal satisfaction that you should really get to know and enjoy in getting something done through your own efforts. The pleasure of the work of an artist. A carpenter knows what we mean ... so does a writer ... who puts a blank sheet of paper in a typewriter and have it emerge as a newsworthy thing that gets read by thousands ... the sense of satisfaction is beyond compare!! A job well done ... gives a sense of happiness that is hard to express ... it is felt!!! Too many of our schools are teaching our children to be worked rather than work ... to get by ... rather than excel ... to make it rather than achieve ... to avoid work rather than enjoy honest labor.

Labor is not only with a shovel, but a pen, word processor or whatever you use ... Work is even smarter using the telephone. But get the latest ... the most modern happenings which will be needed the coming year or years. The ability to work the ability to pull yourself up by your own bootstraps ... get hippped ... get with it ... get smart ... get moving on the road to success.

Back to basics also means back to the Black Church, Black Press, and Black Community Organizations. Blacks who have made it coming home and being a part of the flock and remembering where they come from. Back to basics also means ... all of us ... no matter what economic or social status we are working together for the good of all of us ... and remembering no matter what ... we are all in this same boat together and none of us has arrived until we all arrive.

We cannot let out of our awareness the classic observation of Alexis de Tocqueville regarding the role of power relations and power coalitions in the amazing development of early American life. De Tocqueville spoke of what he called: "a power seen from afar" ... as developing whenever groups or individuals who shared common conditions come together or coalesced.

Frederick Douglas spoke eloquently of this ubiquitous, but distinctive need when he said that no

Society shapes and influences the values and behavior of its citizens. Black people have been acutely affected by the prevailing attitudes of society.

Black parenting in this country is rooted in "survival". The conditions of slavery set the tone for child rearing. Raising strong children was likely to get

We should all remember and take as our personal creed: "If it is to be it is up to me" and live by it. Remember the only ones who can save us from us is us, and the only ones who can help us is us. Let's get back to basics and save us from us and help us ... help us. Why Not!!!

them sold. Raising alert, inquiring children was likely to get them killed.

For years Black children have been taught to "be seen and not heard." They were not encouraged to question people or their circumstances.

After slavery ended, racism continued to reign and with it discrimination against Blacks across the board. As a result, limitations, restrictions and suppression were woven into child rearing. It wasn't until the 60's that Black people began to challenge the order that held those limitations in place.

The 60's brought cultural awareness, an acceptance of Black heritage and saw more Blacks break through limitations imposed by white society, especially in the area of employment.

The 80's find us watching in horror as Black youngsters fall prey to illiteracy, to teenage pregnancy, to drugs. The victory of recapturing racial dignity in the 50s will be short-lived if we lose a generation of youngsters.

Looking back at the years following slavery, there were qualities in our family relationships that gave us the needed strength to survive. We often talk about the times changing as though something outside of people are responsible for the changes.

While it is true that drugs and other vices are most prevalent today - I say that we have created the space of breeding ground for the vices by letting our family relationships weaken.

What worked in the past was: parents being involved in their children's lives, the extended family, a close-knit community in which social activities occurred, that community having a vested interest in young people's progress. These added up to a base of emotional security - a support system - a number of

'Tue Got A Job ... I Have The Right Stuff'

(Guess What? ...

You Do Too!)

If you read the last article, then you know all about setting up your resume correctly and writing an effective cover letter. That was the subject of the last article. If you missed the article, then you should write to me immediately and I'll send you a sample cover letter and resume. (Please, follow directions at the end of this article). This week, I'm going to talk about something equally as important - the interview and follow-up. No matter how good your resume is, you can't get a job without a good solid interview and great follow-up. Do read on...

Again, whether you're looking for a managerial, secretarial, clerical, janitorial or other professional position - you'll need to pay close attention to this information. Employers tend to feel that what you do when trying to get the job is usually a good indicator of the kind of employee you'll be. So, they scrutinize you pretty closely. Those of you who are unsure of the meaning of the word scrutinize should look it up, because it is the key to the entire job hunting process.

After you send your resume to the hiring company, you should call the company. This shows that you are interested in the job and actively seeking an interview. Be persistent. If the person who hires is not in, call back. When you speak to the interviewer, you should ask them if they received your resume and then ask them for the next step in the hiring process. If they say that it is an interview, then ask for an interview. If they say that they will look at the resumes and then determine who they will call, then ask when you can expect to hear from them again. If you don't hear from them by that time, call them again. Be persistent - it's called letting them know that you want the job. You must, in a very respectful way, put the interviewer in a position where he or she must either interview you or tell you that you won't be interviewed and tell you why. This way, you don't waste excess time vying for a job that you can't get. And, you find out if there is something wrong with your resume. If so, change it. At the same time, be critical. Listen to the interviewer and be able to judge whether or not their comments are valid.

So, now you've got the interview. What do you do next? Well, before the actual interview, you should get as much information as you can on the job you are applying for and the company for which you'd like to work. This is because you should be able to speak clearly and concisely about your particular qualifications for the job; which you can't do if you don't know exactly what the job is. Furthermore, in that interview you should be able to ask the interviewer at least three intelligent questions about the company/job. This lets the interviewer know that you care and are truly interested in the company and the job. When the interviewer asks you a question, answer it. Don't answer questions unless you are asked to do so. Why? Because, you may say the wrong thing simply because you are nervous and because you feel less nervous when there is noise instead of silence.

At the interview you should wear conservative clothing. Don't have a wild hair style, braids should be very neat, you should not chew gum, you shoes should be shined, clothes should be very neat and clean. I do not feel that women should wear pants in certain office environments. And, since you won't know the office environment before you actually get to the office, don't take a chance and wear pants. No one should wear jeans or dungarees or whatever you wish to call them. And remember, first impressions count - so make yourself look good.

Now, after the interview, here's what you should do. First, the day after the interview, send the interviewer a note thanking them for their time. Then, approximately five days after the interview, you should call the interviewer and check on the status of your application. This, of course, is if the interviewer hasn't called you first. If, after you speak to the interviewer, you are told that the decision hasn't been made - call back several days later. The key to getting any job is persistence. Let them know that you want the job. Again, write to me and I'll send you a list of questions that you can ask at the interview and some sure-fire tactics to help get that interview and job!

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THE ATONEMENT FOR SIN

The extreme importance of salvation is emphasized in our Confession of Faith. It is the subject of 5 (25%) of our 20 Articles of Faith.

- The word "atonement" is found in our English Bible only once in the N.T. (Rom. 5:11).
- The Greek word "KATALLAGE" - noun; "KATALASSO" - verb; is translated atonement (1), reconciliation (2), reconciling (1), reconcile (6). This word "denotes reconciliation; a change on the part of one party, induced by an action on the part of another; in the N.T., the reconciliation of men to God by His grace and love in Christ." —Vine. God is never said to be reconciled. It is man that must be reconciled.
- The O.T. word for atonement "KAPHAR" (has to do with a covering), is translated 70 or more times "make atonement", and is translated "make reconciliation" 4 times. It is also translated a number of other ways — pacify, pardon, purge away, etc. It is definitely related to the N.T. mercy seat and propitiation.
- While it is helpful to consult word studies on atonement, reconciliation, etc., we must be careful not to take a restricted meaning of a word that may not harmonize with the overall usage in the Bible.

I. SALVATION IS BY GRACE.

A. God Saves Only Sinners.

(See Article "VI. Of The Fall)."

- Man is a sinner by birth, nature and practice.
- Sin is transgression of the Law. I John 3:4. (Anything that is not in the will of God is sin).

B. Salvation Is Wholly By God's Grace.

- Grace is God's unmerited favor. No man merits it.
- It is wholly of grace. Not part grace and part works. See (a)-1-2-3

II. SALVATION IS BY THE SAVIOUR.

A. What The Saviour Did For Sinners.

- He became the mediator, the go-between who possessed the nature of both God and man. I Tim. 2:5
- He was appointed by the Father. (b)-1 John 3:16
- He freely took upon Him our nature, yet without sin. (b)-3 Phil. 2:7
- He personally obeyed all the Laws of God, and lived a life completely and perfectly in the will of God.
- By His death He made full and vicarious atonement for our sins. "Vicarious" means on behalf of, or in place of another. Through the sacrifice of Christ, God is propitiated and the sinner is reconciled unto God. See (b)-5-6-7-8-9

B. The Saviour Took The Sinner's Place.

- He was a perfect example, but it was not through His perfect example that men are saved. He did not die as a martyr.
- He voluntarily became our substitute. (c)-1-2-3
- He bore our sins in His own body. (c)-4 I Pet. 2:24; (c)-5 I Pet. 3:18

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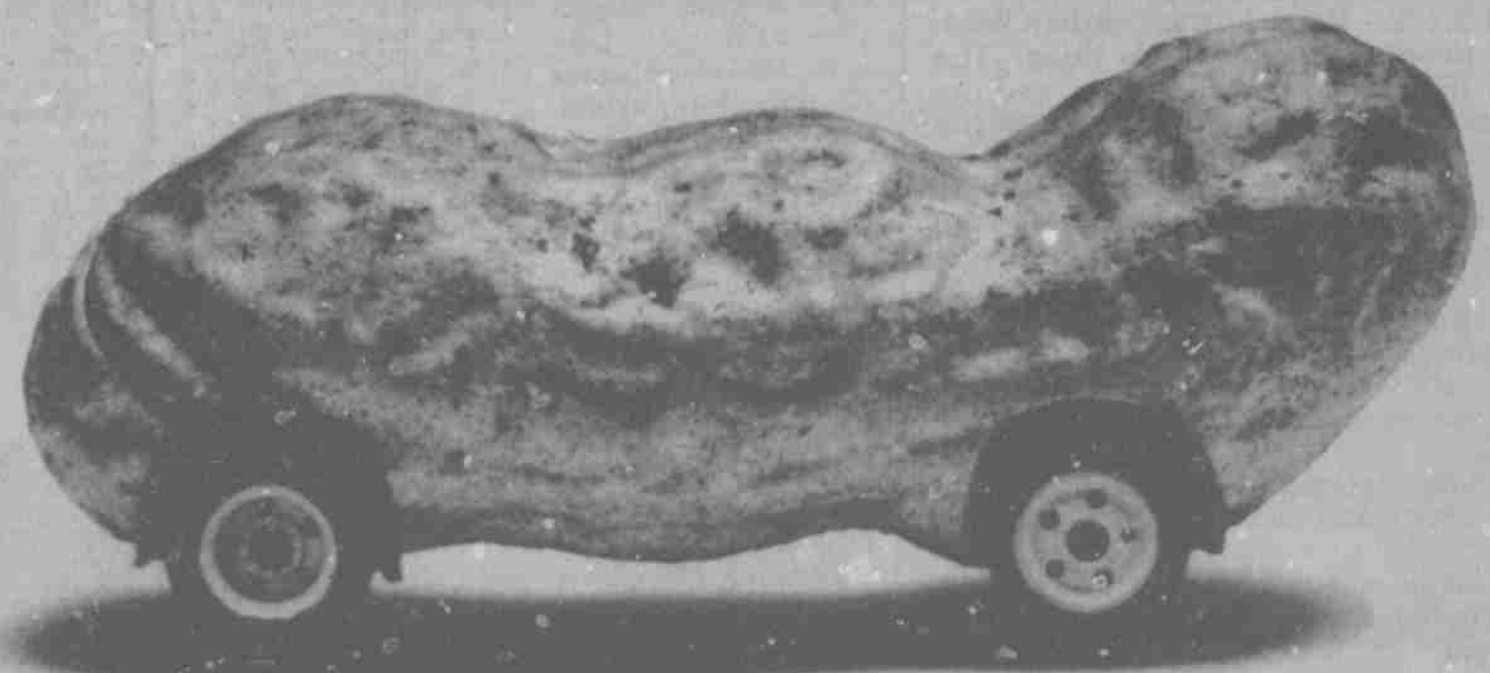

The following are excerpts: "Today, some 22 million Americans have at least used cocaine and more than 4 million are either hooked or on the uncertain road to addiction... The price is low enough to attract youngsters: the potency is stronger, assuring quicker addiction.... The trick today is to use more than one drug at a time. Cocaine for up, Alcohol and marijuana for down. Heroin and cocaine together for a really exclusive high." "Drug abuse crosses all socio-economic status.... Adolescents use alcohol and drugs because they like the effect. None of them mean to become dependent." "..... the active part of cocaine, from which crack and its lesser cousins come, was devised by a mountain plant as a means of keeping insect pest away. The insects got the message.
