Scout Requirements Haven't Been Changed

The Boy Scouts of America say that it hasn't changed its religious requirements, even though it appears that the Rhode Island Scout who was denied Eagle Rank because he was thought to be an atheist, may qualify after all.

Chief Scout Executive Alden G. Barber, professional leader of the 6-million member B.S.A. issued a statement today that Jimmy Clark of Foster, R. I. will appear before a Board of Review next Saturday to determine his eligibility for Eagle Rank. Barber said, "After reviewing a statement made last night by young Clark that he can subscribe to the Scout Oath and Scout Law, we concur with the action taken by Scout Executive Robert Parkinson who has forwarded the boy's application to a Board of Review to be conducted by the Narragansett Council." The Board of Review is composed of volunteer Scouters who review all applicants for advancement in rank.

The controversy developed when Parkinson delayed the boy's application for Eagle Rank after the father had stated that

the family members were atheists.

"In order to be members of the Boy Scouts, boys need to affirm that they subscribe to the principles of the Scout Oath and Law, and it now appears that young Clark has confirmed this by his statement", said Barber.

Barber emphasized that the Boy Scouts of America believes that no boy can grow into the best kind of citizen without recognizing his obligation to God as expressed in the Oath and Law.

Seal Coat Work Contract Let

A contract for seal coat work on 491.4 miles of highways in the Lubbock district was awarded by the Texas Highway Commission during its November meeting in Austin.

The contract includes work in Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Parmer, Swisher and Terry counties.

Included in the work is a 9.709 mile strip of State Highway 194 from one mile west of Hart to the Swisher County line. Other Castro County seal coat work will include Farm to Market roads 2397, 303, 1057 and 2392.

Write A Letter

Nov. 18, 1970
Dear Editor:

The American Red Cross is launching a new "Write Hanoi" campaign as part of its continuing all-out effort to gain more humane treatment for U. S. prisoners of war in Vietnam. The appeal is described in the attached public service message which we hope you will be able to use soon in your newspaper.

Like the drive last winter, this one will call on Americans in all walks of life to send letters to the President of North Vietnam expressing concern over that government's failure to adhere to the 1949 Geneva Conventions which Hanoi has signed but refuses to follow in its handling of American prisoners. U. S. and South Vietnam military forces, on the other hand, continue to abide by the POW Convention in handling North Vietnam and Viet Cong prisoners.

Latest figures show that 437 American servicemen are being held as prisoners of war and another 1,000 are missing and possibly captured. In recent weeks, the govern-

ment of North Vietnam has appeared to be easing its stand somewhat by reporting the names of some prisoners. But this action still falls far short of the POW Convention requirements, which include identification of all prisoners, adequate diet and medical care, repatriation of sick or wounded prisoners, communication with their families, protection from abuse or reprisals, and inspection of prison camps by delegates of the International Committee of the Red Cross.

North Vietnamese leaders are known to be conscious of public opinion in this country, so a great outpouring of letters from American citizens may help to obtain better treatment for U. S. prisoners.

We will deeply appreciate your help in calling this campaign to the attention of your readers through publication of the enclosed message, and to stress the importance of it in your news and editorial columns.

Other survivors include his wife, and one granddaughter, Kathy Crawford.



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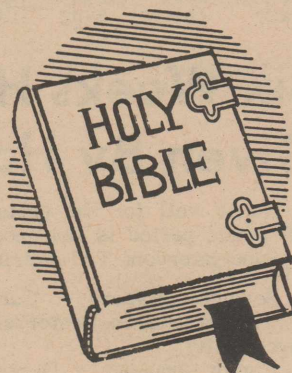

Homemakers Haven

Now is one of the best times of the year to enjoy apples. Apples must be mature when picked to have good flavor, texture and storing ability. Look for firm, crisp, well-colored fruit, and choose according to the use in mind.

Basically there are two types of apples marketed, eating apples and cooking apples. Red or golden delicious apples are best when served raw, either eaten out-of-hand or sliced and diced for salads, sandwiches, or desserts. Their delicate flavor is lost when cooked. Apples that are good cooked or raw include McIntosh, Jonathan, and Rome Beauty. The latter ones are exceptionally good for baking.

Once bought, apples should be stored in the vegetable crispener of the refrigerator and need to be used in two to three weeks. Every day apples are kept at room temperature, their storage life is decreased by more than a week.

To keep the apples from browning, sprinkle with lemon, orange or pineapple juice, or a commercial anti-darkening agent.

FRESH APPLE BREAD

1 c. oil
2 c. sugar
3 eggs, well beaten
3 c. flour
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. soda
2 c. chopped apples
1 c. nuts
2 tsp. vanilla

Combine oil, sugar and eggs. Combine flour, salt and soda, then add to oil mixture and mix well. Add apples, nuts and vanilla. Pour into greased bread pan. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour to 1 1/2 hours. Yield 12 servings.

SIMPLE FRUIT SALAD

Make a simple syrup by using: 1 cup sugar, 1/2 c. water and juice of a small lemon (about 3 tablespoons of juice.) Let boil for a minute and set aside to get cold. Slice favorite fruits into this cold syrup -- apples, bananas, pears, etc. Sliced into this syrup, the fruit will not turn dark.

SOUR CREAM FRUIT SALAD

1/2 c. chopped apples
1/2 c. pineapple chunks
1/2 c. grapes, seeded and cut in half
1/2 c. miniature marshmallows
2 T. chopped pecans
2 T. sour cream

APPLE CAKE

2 eggs, beaten until foamy
3/4 c. cooking oil
2 c. sugar
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. soda
3/4 tsp. salt
2 tsp. vanilla
4 c. thickly sliced apples
1 c. nuts, chopped
2 c. flour

Beat eggs and add remaining ingredients in order listed. Mix well and bake in sheet pan in 350 degree oven for 45 minutes or until light brown.

ICING

1 large pkg. cream cheese
3 T. butter
1 1/2 c. powdered sugar
Vanilla to taste

Blend the ingredients well and spread on cake while it is still warm.

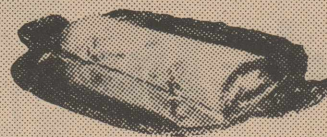
Here's one of Mrs. Simpson's favorite recipes.

WALNUT ROLL

Mrs. Rolan Simpson, 3213 56th St., Lubbock

Brush a jelly-roll pan, 10x15 inches, with oil, line it with wax paper, and oil the paper.

Separate 7 eggs. Beat the yolks with 3/4 cup sugar until the mixture is pale in color and thick enough to "ribbon." Beat in 1 1/2 cups ground walnuts and 1 teaspoon baking powder. Fold in egg whites, stiffly beaten. Spread the batter in the prepared pan and bake the cake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 15 or 20 minutes or until it is golden. Cool the cake in the pan, cover it with a damp towel and chill it.



Dust the cold cake generously with sifted confectioner sugar and turn it out on a board covered with two overlapping sheets of wax paper. Carefully strip the paper from bottom of cake. Spread cake with 1 cup heavy cream, whipped and flavored to taste with sugar and vanilla. Roll up the cake, using the paper as an aid, slide the roll onto a flat serving platter. Sprinkle with more confectioner sugar. (Rum or almond flavoring is also good.)

Second place finishers in each state receive \$500 educational grants. Schools of State Homemakers of Tomorrow are awarded complete sets of Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. Culminating the tour for state winners will be announcement of the 1971 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow, whose scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. State Homemakers of Tomorrow ranking second, third and fourth in the nation will have their scholarships raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000. National judging is based on original test scores plus personal observation and interviews during the tour.

Initiated by General Mills in the 1954-55 school year to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career, the Betty Crocker Search -- only national scholarship program exclusively for high school senior girls -- will have awarded more than \$1 3/4 million in educational grants upon completion of this year's program. During its 17-year history, almost seven and three-quarters million senior girls have been enrolled.

The test to be administered here and throughout the nation Tuesday (Dec. 1) was prepared and will be scored by Science Research Associates, Chicago, which also selects the school, state and national winners.

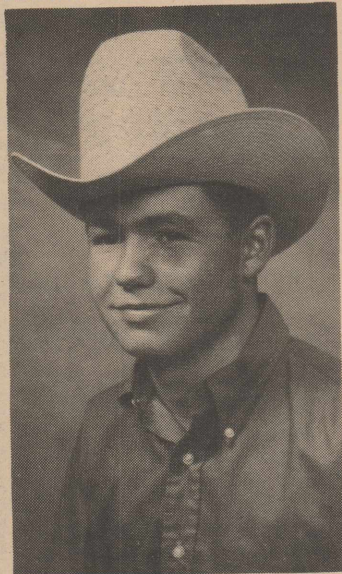

MONUMENTS

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Water - Natural Resource Or Vehicle Of Disease

Today much attention is being focused on water supply as an aspect of man's environment that can be either a natural resource of great benefit to him or a vehicle by which disease organisms or toxic chemicals can be distributed widely.

The public has no way of directly protecting its own water supply. Constant vigilance by health and waterworks officials is necessary for continued safe water production and distribution. These professionals exercise this vigilance by regular evaluation of existing public water supplies and thorough study of proposed installations.

The Texas State Department of Health inspects the water systems in all communities throughout the State. Employees of the Water Supply Program of the Division of Sanitary Engineering review and approve plans and specifications for new water systems and additions to existing systems, and field representatives make regular surveys of facilities to secure corrections needed to assure safe drinking water for public use.

Travelers may have noticed that some communities have a sign posted at their city limits announcing that their municipal water supply has been approved by the State Health Department. This sign indicates that the water supply does more than meet the minimum requirements of the U. S. Public Health Service Drinking Water Standards and State Health Department regulations.

Today there are some 450 public water supplies across the state that have been approved by the State Health Department and certified as safe and sanitary.

The evaluation of a public drinking water supply appraises the origin, treatment, distribution, and storage of water, and the bacteriological, physical, chemical, and radiochem-

ical qualities of the water as it flows from the tap.

The owner or manager of every water supply system furnishing drinking water to 25,000 or more persons is required by state law to have the water tested at least once daily for the determination of its sanitary quality, and to furnish a report to the State Health Department. Public water supplies serving less than 25,000 persons must be monitored at least four times a month.

In enforcing its regulations, the State Health Department has so thoroughly blanketed the field of water sanitation with State Health Department engineers that water-borne diseases from public drinking water supplies have virtually disappeared in Texas.

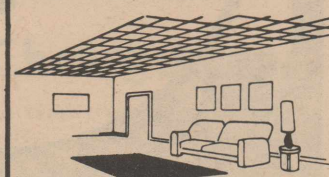

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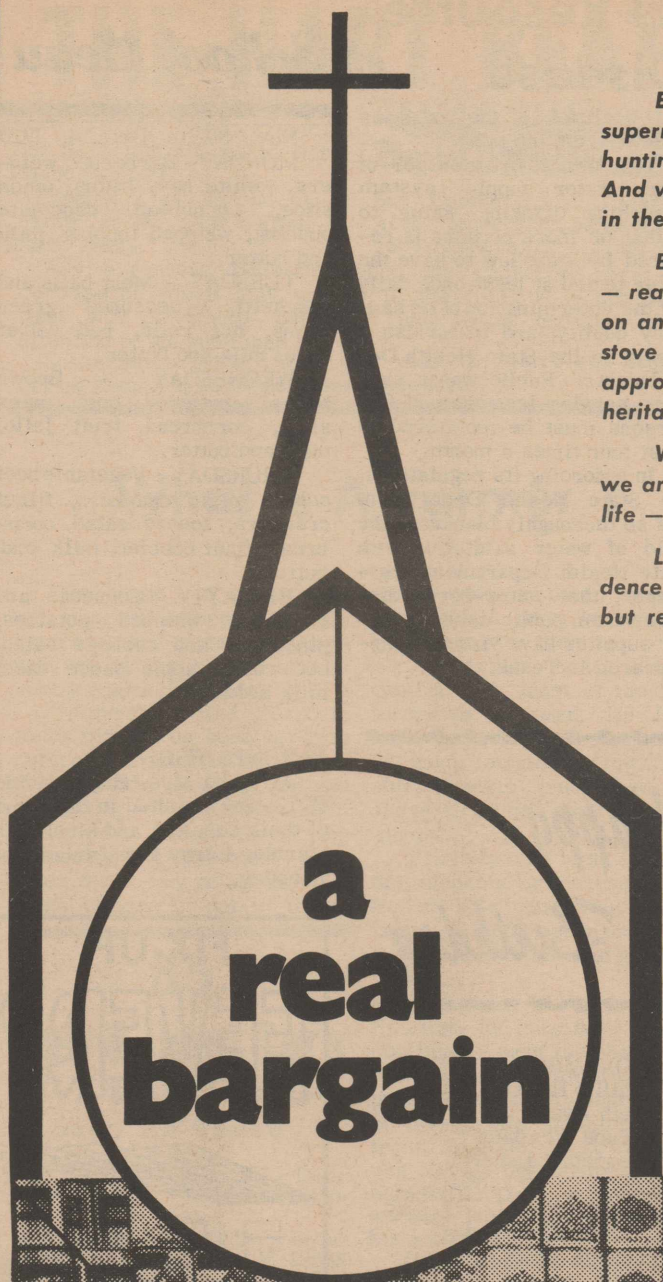
