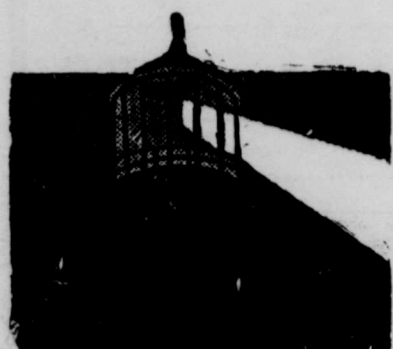

Baumann Brothers Return From Month Tour, Visit In Germany

R. J. Baumann and brother, Walter Baumann of Nordheim returned last Sunday, August 23 after a four week trip to Germany and Switzerland.

They left Houston via jet July 26 and spent four weeks sight-seeing in beautiful Germany and a short trip into Switzerland.

In Karl Marx Stadt, East Germany they visited five second cousins whom they had never seen. They stayed in East Germany two weeks, visiting and traveling through the country. All people there are compelled to work, no unemployment there. They are not allowed to leave the country until a woman becomes 62 years of age and a man 65. They can leave for a visit but must return. In East Germany they commute by street cars, and of course cars.

Apartment houses are built nine stories high and accommodate as many as 126 families.

The climate there is cold. They grow all kinds of grain and Irish potatoes, are a main crop, and fruits, such as apples, pears, cherries, etc. are grown in profusion.

West Germany looks very much like our country. The people

have freedom, prices are about the same or cheaper. They traveled to Frankfurt by train.

A highlight of their trip was being here when the annual peace celebration was held in Waldshut, Germany. A cousin they had wanted to see in Waldshut, had died, and they planned to stay only a short time, but extended their stay there to five days enjoying the celebration. This celebration has been held annually the 3rd week in August for 502 years and people from all countries surrounding participate in the activities and furnishing entertainment for the week. Pictures show gay colorful street scenes for the affair, flags, colorful awnings, street dancing, games, etc. Many of the buildings there were built as early as 800.

Waldshut is not far over the line into Switzerland, and they traveled into that country for a sightseeing tour.

They rode down the Seine River on boat seeing the castles and grape vineyards on hillsides on each side. This was also a delightful day.

The Baumanns enjoyed every minute of their trip and plan to return.

Atomic Energy Commission Will Conduct Program In C-City School

man Omar Burleson has announced that the Atomic Energy Commission will conduct a high school lecture-demonstration program at the Colorado High School on November 10, 1970.

The program, "This Atomic World," is a graphic presentation of the story of nuclear energy and its peaceful uses.

Burleson advises the 40-minute assembly program by specially trained science teachers covers the highlights of basic nuclear physics, radioactivity, chain reaction, reactors and their uses, transmutation and

application of radioisotopes in medicine, industry and agriculture. Students participate in at least three demonstrations.

The assembly is designed to interest all students, although a more detailed discussion on nuclear science is available for science classes.

The lecturer uses a radiation counter, a reactor model, a Van de Graaff generator and a number of electrically activated panels to illustrate his talks. He is available to appear before local civic clubs or similar gatherings.

Abilene, Sept. 1 — The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$1,949,900 for highway safety and betterment improvement of state highways and farm to market roads in District 8 during 1971.

A total of 32.6 miles in Mitchell County.

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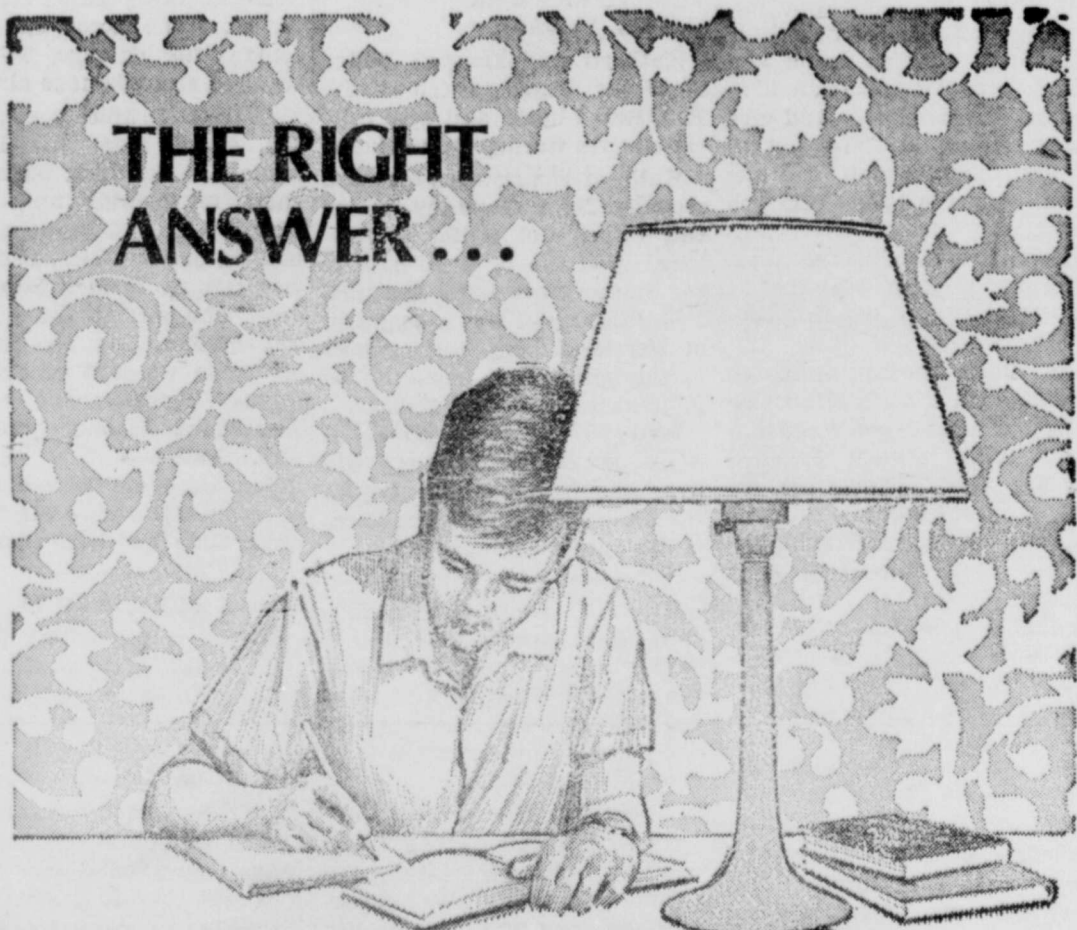

Custer City, South Dakota, exists only because of tourist dollars. I talked to one restaurant owner and he said without tourist dollars he would not be able to stay in business.

And what's wrong with tourist dollars? Tourist dollars may be seasonal, but they are plentiful enough to make the seasonal effort worthwhile.

Several months ago I mentioned in this column that Leavenworth, Washington has refused to pass out of existence. Instead, by redoing all of the store fronts, it has become a prosperous growing town that attracts tourist dollars.

Now, North Bend, Washington is redoing the store fronts to fit the alpine atmosphere that exists in the Cascade Mountain area. North Bend is doing this because the freeway is being built around their town and they know it will take something different to attract skiers in the winter and tourists in the summer to stop in their town to get gas, or eat or buy film, or buy antiques or souvenirs.

In Arkla, Arkansas, the pitch is centered around pioneer-type building. Probably it didn't take "Abilene-Town" backers very long to decide on a western motif for their museum-shop complex.

Lorraine can and will attract tourists to leave the highway with their dollars when the local merchants decide on a project that will convince the driver that it would be a good place to rest, or eat, or fill-up the gas tank, or buy "some little something" that someone needs. And that "some little something" can turn into several purchases - that's my experience.

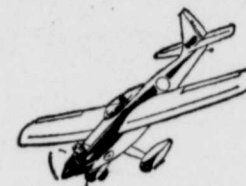

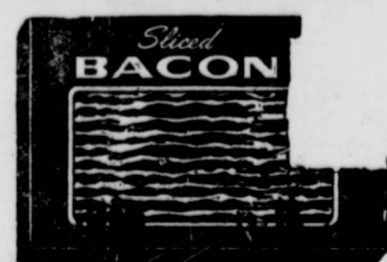
