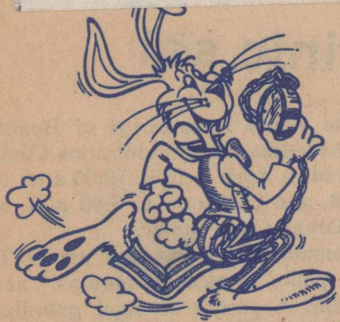

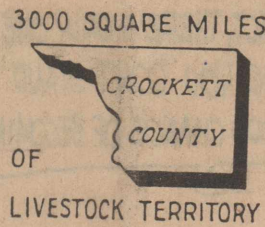

Services here at graveside for Mr. Kinser

Good news for the local economy

There was good news for the Crockett County economy this month as the use and sales tax analysis for the third quarter of 1986 was released by State Comptroller of Public Accounts Bob Bullock.

With 99 outlets reporting, gross sales were up 5 percent over the third quarter of 1985. This is the second time this year sales have increased over the previous year, indicating an upturn in the local economy.

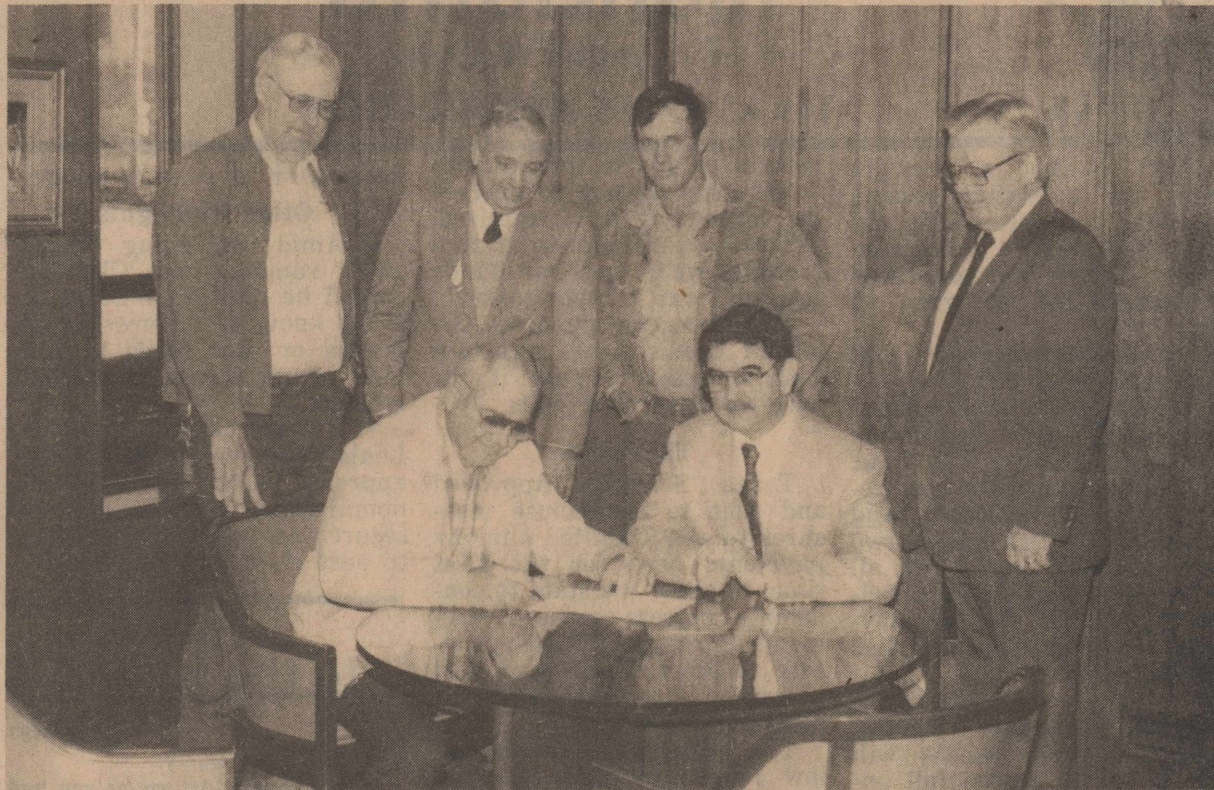
Gross sales for the third quarter of 1986 were \$9,413,364, while for the same period in 1985 gross sales were \$8,968,689.

Absentee balloting heavy

Absentee balloting was hot and heavy for the school board election which fields seven candidates for two spots in Saturday's election. At 3:30 Tuesday afternoon, a total of 226 votes had been cast by absentee ballot, and there was an hour and a half to go before absentee closed at 5 p.m.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. Saturday at the law library in the courthouse and close at 8 p.m.

The seven candidates are Ralph Moore, Gary Vannoy, Pon Seahorn, Jimmy Ortiz, Jesse Fierro, Penn Baggett, and Jeffrey Sutton, the only incumbent on the ballot.

Water District and bank officials met this morning to close the papers on the new waste water plant. Bonds were purchased by the Texas Water Development Board Fund and construction will start soon. Construction to start on sewer plant

After well over ten years of planning and negotiating a new waste water plant is going to become a reality for Ozona patrons of the Crockett County Water District.

Water District board vice president Dan Davidson, secretary, Harold Shaw, attorney Tom Cameron and manager, Dee Keilers were in Austin Monday to sign the final papers with the Board of Water Development. The Board of Water Development Fund purchased the bonds for a total commitment of \$785,000. Of this amount \$715,000 will be transferred for construction. The money will be received today at Ozona National Bank. Final details were ironed out Tuesday at the bank with water district directors and the manager.

The plant is designed for a population of 5,040 and should be fully capable of taking the community through the year 2020 or longer, according to Keilers. With the final closing, the actual construction on the

plant should begin in 15 days. Projected finish date is 150 days from the beginning of construction.

Reese Albert of San Angelo will handle the pipeline construction. Able Irrigation of Eagle Pass, will take care of the stabilization pond work, and PMI of San Antonio will furnish the pump equipment. Holt Power Systems of San Antonio will be in charge of the generating system. Eddie Moore Welding of Ozona will do the fence construction and Lilly Construction is in charge of clearing.

Cost of the above construction is approximately \$462,000. The balance of the bond money will be used for engineering, inspection, land acquisition, fees and contingencies.

Keilers said there is a possibility there will be some day labor jobs open, but that most crews brought their own men who are specialized in their field. The construction, however, should be a boost to the local economy.

Search fails to turn up victims of terrorism

Local officers conducted a gigantic land and air search between Ozona and Juno Thursday after receiving word from a San Antonio television station that two illegal aliens had been killed by a terrorist group and their bodies dumped several hundred yards off Hwy. 163, according to a letter received by that station.

Reporter Dale Rankin of KENS in San Antonio called Sheriff Billy Mills Thursday and read a letter received by him in the mail telling of the claim. The letter was signed the New South Freedom Fighters. The group listed four demands, which it said must be met exactly, and until such time, two illegal Mexican aliens would be killed each month.

Local, federal and state law enforcement officers met early Thursday afternoon in the sheriff's office and listened to the taped message. Following the meeting officers fanned out by helicopter, vehicle and sometimes on foot. The search was called off at dark Thursday and resumed Friday at daylight. An influx of reporters from all over the state converged on Ozona Friday. However, by the end of the day, there was nothing to report, indicating the entire thing was a hoax. Copies of the letters were distributed to ranchers along the 45-mile strip on both sides of Hwy. 163. If there are bodies concealed beneath light brush, as described in the letter, they are more likely to be found by a ranch hand.

Most officials feel there was no substance to the charges made, but officers were obligated to make a search of the rugged terrain. Several hundred yards off the highway between Ozona and Juno takes in miles of rough, rugged country.

There was some doubt about the authenticity of the terroristic threat from the beginning, since most terrorists and such organizations tend to make public the plight of their victims and there is seldom any effort to conceal any act. However, the matter is being investigated by federal authorities in San Antonio, since it is against the law to send such threats through the mails. The original letter is being studied for latent prints.

The letter writer or writers express indignation over the amnesty portion of the 1986 Immigration Reform Act. According to the letter, the act has triggered an invasion of Mexican nationals who hope to buy forged documents to prove residency in this country for 5 to 7 years. It claims two illegals will be sacrificed each month until all demands are met.

Among other demands, "Congress must pass a law which grants the right for the U.S. to support any and all factions who oppose the Soviet-controlled Sandanistas with equal aid the Soviets supply in Nicaragua."

The other two demands have to do with Congressman Henry Gonzales and San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros. The letter demands that Gonzales apologize for his opposition to the Contras among other things, and

that Cisneros publically apologize for his statements that illegals are beneficial and good for the Texas economy and society.

According to the letter, copies were sent to the President, both houses of Congress, five nationally known newspapers, the three television networks, CBS, ABC and NBC; the three local San Antonio television stations, the mayor of San Antonio and Time magazine.

Emergency farm and ranch loans available

Applications for emergency farm and ranch loans for damages and losses caused by drought, excessive rainfall and flooding which occurred January 1 through November 30, 1986, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Eden, FmHA County Supervisor, Ben T. Rucker, Jr., said today.

Crockett County is one of twenty in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought, excessive rainfall and flooding.

Rucker said farmers and ranchers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers and ranchers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer or rancher must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be

eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Rucker said. Farmers and ranchers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until September 9, 1987, but farmers and ranchers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming and ranching season," Rucker said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers and ranchers who work at and rely on farming and ranching for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers and ranchers who are U.S. citizens and to farming and ranching partnerships.

The FmHA office in Eden is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The telephone number is 915-869-3941 and the office is located in the Eden ASCS Building.

Cold weather returns

Record cold weather blasted Ozona Sunday and lingered into Monday. Ozona awoke to an overcast, cold Sunday morning and winter lost no time in backtracking. At 2 p.m. Sunday snow was reported at Midway Lane. By 2:10 blowing snow hit downtown Ozona.

After two hours of snow flurries, some fairly heavy, the temperature dipped from 28 degrees at mid-afternoon Sunday to a cold 20 degrees Sunday night. It was still a very cold

25 degrees at mid-morning Monday. Another freeze followed up Monday night and all new growth was killed.

Balmy spring weather for the past two weeks fooled all but the mesquite trees, and the freeze killed all new growth on trees and shrubs, devastated fruit trees and nipped roses in the bud. Iris which was in full bloom all over town turned toes-up and dropped their flowering heads.

It had warmed to 68 degrees at mid-afternoon Tuesday, but the damage was done.

Literary team captures District championship

The Ozona High School Academic and Speech team captured the District 6-AA Literary Championship for the first time in recent history last week at the University Interscholastic League District Spring Meet in Iraan.

Qualifying eight competitors in twelve events for regional competition, the team earned 133 points to overcome perennial champions Iraan who lead until the end.

"I told you not to settle for second best, and you didn't," said speech coach David Porter to the group at the close of the competition. "I'm very proud of you."

Competing with students from Forzan, McCamey, Eldorado, Iraan, Reagan County, Stanton, and Rankin, Ozona captured six gold, two silver and four bronze medals.

Michael Glaze qualified for regional competition in three events, winning News Writing and Accounting and placing second in Editorial Writing.

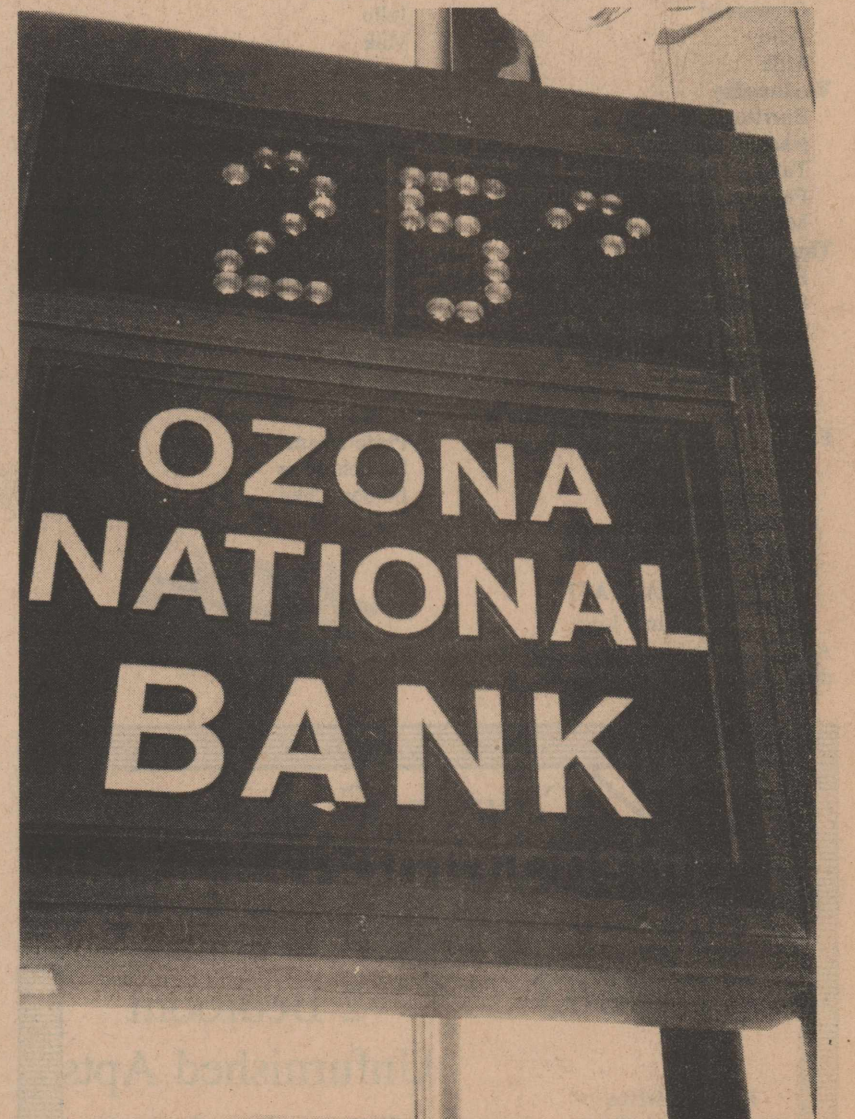
Copie Davis and Bret Hood qualified in two events each. Hood won typing and the chemistry division of the science contest while Davis captured second in Informative Speaking and third in Headline Writing.

Qualifying in one event each were Margaret Jones, first in Lincoln-Douglas Debate; T. C. Tucker, first in Editorial Writing; Mark Sanchez, third in Lincoln-Douglas Debate; Isabel Benitez, third in Spelling; and Summer Shacklette, third in Prose.

Brian Cooke won 9th grade Oral Reading, a district competition which does not advance but does add to a team's point standing.

Among students placing but not advancing to regionals were Terel Seahorn, fourth in 9th grade Oral Reading; Davis, fourth in Feature Writing and sixth in Prose; Sanchez, fifth in Persuasive Speaking; and Larisa Schoenhals, fifth in Ready

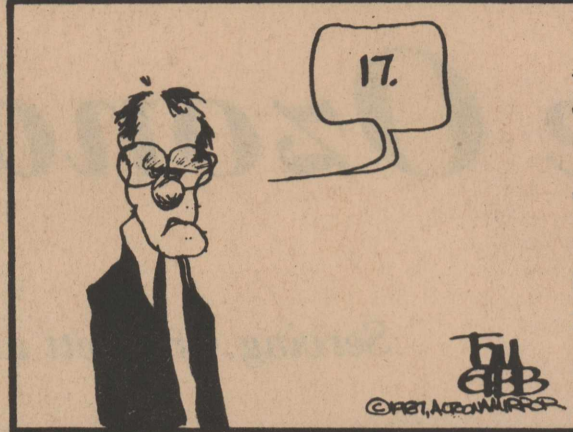
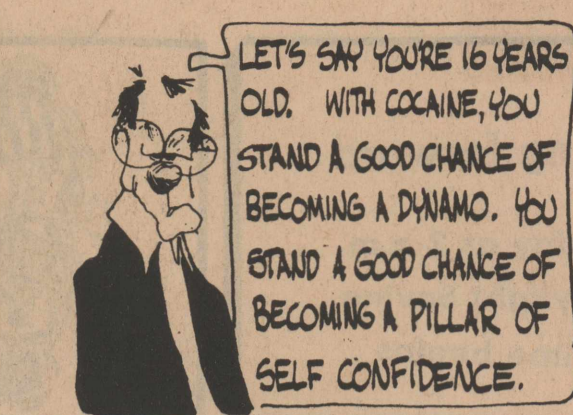
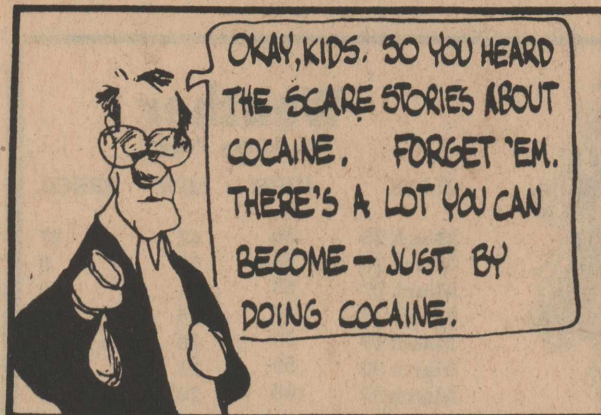

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—At a certain stage, the legislative session resembles a passle of freight trains hell-bent on a collision course, driven by engineers determined not to give an inch.

Lawmakers reached that stage last week. Why?

Overcrowded Texas prisons closed their doors again last week for the umpteenth time, the Texas crime rate was reported up 15 percent, and federal authorities stayed two death penalties here. And all the while, Texas faces a federal court order for not solving a prison problem that has lingered for years.

On top of that, the State Treasurer warns on a weekly basis that state checks will start bouncing in the fall unless taxes are raised.

And still, half-way through the session the legislative leadership isn't close to agreement on how to solve the prison problem or fiscal deficit.

But just as the freight trains seem to avoid collision at the last minute, perhaps this Legislature will too, for the leadership is proving flexible. They just don't agree.

Latest Prison Solution

Governor Bill Clements altered his opposition to new taxes to support a proposal to let voters decide whether they want to bear a \$750 million sales tax hike dedicated to new prisons.

Clements said he wouldn't mind letting citizens vote on all tax issues, reviving the initiative and referendum issue.

But Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, who dislikes both dedicated funds and I&R, killed it in the Senate, and then warned that checks definitely will bounce soon, unless \$2.5 billion is raised.

Lottery Teetering

Earlier, hopes had been raised that the prisons could be built with state lottery revenues, if the Legislature could hurry up and propose a constitutional amendment for voters to approve.

Then Comptroller Bob Bullock reminded lawmakers they had until April 1 to pass the issue if they want the revenues to be spent in the 1988-89 budget. That's the latest date to hold a constitutional election within the current session.

But House members led by Tyler Rep. David Hudson said they had 70 votes, enough to kill the lottery in the House. "The lottery is a dead skunk in the middle of the road," Hudson said.

Bullock also wrote law-

makers to advise them not to require his agency to oversee the lottery, if it is legalized. "The idea is foreign to us, and frankly, we've got our hands full with our current tasks."

For emergency purposes, the lottery seems dead, although time remains to pass it for long term revenue goals.

The Senate

Texas Senators approved and sent to the House measures to allow limited alimony payments here for the first time, to allow the state to condemn ingress-egress easements through private property to get to state land, and to repeal property taxes on pleasure boats.

The alimony bill would allow judges to order alimony payments in cases where a marriage had lasted at least 10 years and one spouse had no ready job skills because of a homemaker role. Opponents argued it opens the door to sweeping payments.

The ingress-egress bill allows the state or its lessees to claim a road through private land to landlocked state tracts.

The House

Speaker Lewis joined supporters of a bill allowing private citizens to carry handguns, despite opposition from lawmen. But Lewis, who owns a gun shop in Fort Worth, said police officers are overreacting. Only Texas bans carrying handguns.

If passed, citizens of sound minds could carry guns everywhere except to school-grounds, polling places, government offices, places that sell alcohol, or while drinking and driving.

The House also voted to allow prison guards to use force against inmates for self-

defense or to prevent escape.

Other Highlights

• Amid continuing "Pony-gate" rumors, Gov. Clements denied he and other SMU officials knew of schemes to fix grades or hire coeds to provide sexual favors to football recruits.

• His UT regents nominee, Louis Beercherl of Dallas, was approved after he told the nominations panel he did not secure the post by promising to oust chairman Jess Hay.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club
by Mrs. Bailey Post

Growing herbs is increasing in popularity today among home gardeners, and if you have noticed, all spices are going up in price each time you shop, so you may want to try growing some of the favorite and easy growing herbs in your garden. Too, they make very satisfactory patio or indoor plants. You can buy small plants at most any nursery or plant seed. You might enjoy growing sweet basil and rosemary provided variety and decorative, delicate blossoms. Herbs are also very welcome to improve the flavor of food. Summer savory for snap beans, anise for fruit salad, sage for dressings and brewing tea.

Like most houseplants, a group of herb plants will do better than individual plants scattered in different locations. Indoors or outdoors, the soil should be well drained, and plants should receive adequate sun exposure. Plantings should be well spaced and picked and cut back often to grow and produce longer. Should you be

fortunate to have several discarded wagon wheels, they would be perfect for an attractive planting of different herbs. If spaces are too small, knock out some of the spokes.

There are many catalogues for herbs with old-timey uses.

The United States Dept. of Agriculture has shown that certain kinds of flower seeds germinate better when exposed to light.

This means that the seeds should not be covered by soil, whether started indoors under lights or in a garden row. Make shallow furrows by pressing the edge of a thin board into moist soil or planting soil mixture. Sow the seeds thinly down the furrows. Don't cover with soil, water with a very fine mist so as not to wash away the seeds or bury them under soil. Light requiring kinds include: Ageratum, Begonia, Brownallia, Calaeolaria, Coleus, Cineria, Gloximia, Impatiens, Petunia, Nicotiana, Primula, Salvia (red only), and Snapdragon.

A View of the World Through The Word

Samson was a man who lost his spirituality, or I should say gave it away, to the call of the world. The Spirit that once stirred Samson could not continue to dwell in such a worldly man, thus his influence for good was nullified by his carnal ways. Read Judges chapters 13-16 for this well-known story.

When Samson had given his secret to Delilah, she promptly had the Philistines seize him, gouge out his eyes, and put him in chains. Then the Philistines brought Samson before them so he could entertain them. They made sport of him. He was a fallen "man of God" and they delighted to ridicule him. In his last act, Samson brought the house down killing himself and a number of others.

This story has some points to make in our day. The Spirit of God does not dwell in carnal men. When a religious "strong-man" falls, men of the world make sport of him by parading his sin over the land.

As if Oral Roberts wasn't enough to give religion a bad name by his fake claims and questionable tactics, here comes Jim and Tammy Bakker to add fuel to the fire. Then the glass house that so-called "holy ones" inhabit begins to crumble and a host of big names are included in the fiasco.

Sin follows the "domino theory." Once Satan gets his foot in the door of a person's life, he wants more, demands more, and gets more. One sin leads to another and another and another. Now the sweet voices selling Christ on television have hit a sour note. A little make-up will help cover physical limitations, but deep spiritual lackings will eventually surface. Judas sold the Lord for a few pieces of silver—now the price has gone up to include cars, homes and theme parks. The smell is still bad. Rottenness in the soul comes forth as sin.

Men reap what they sow. What we are seeing transpire in this conflict among television evangelists has been

in the making for a long time. The harvest is here now. The lies, the greed, and the false doctrine that has been planted are coming to bloom in full force. The scene is not a pretty one.

Its going to get worse. Oral's bottomless pit cannot be filled—funds will always be needed. The money given, regardless of the amount, will never satisfy men void of the Spirit of God. The Pentecostal community will have an in-house fight that will leave them hurting and the skeptics of the world laughing. The denominational stew that is cooking will boil over, and Satan will find delight at the mess made.

Meanwhile, the secular media has a field day. When religious personalities fail, it puts a point on the world's scoreboard. The world delights to see anyone preaching Jesus fall from high places.

Just remember this—Jesus is the same yesterday, today, and forever. It is men that fall, not the Christ. When people take their eyes off of Christ they start to wander and fall apart. God demands the glory and gives His place to no one.

The Word of God is powerful, and it is the gospel that saves. Preaching Christ in pretense is beneficial only to the point that He is put forth, the pretense will sooner or later come out and the false teachers will fall.

Don't give up on religion because of a few rotten apples. Preaching and entertainment have no common link. When men try to "act" out their devotion, they will be pulled by the glitter and gold of the world. The glory of Christ calls for self denial not self glorification.

Let your faith rest in the Word of God, and not in the fund-raising ability of some false teacher or in the theatrical ploys of ungodly people. With your eye on Jesus, and Him alone, you will never fall regardless of what men do.

CROCKETT COUNTY OUTDOORS

Saturday, April 4, is the Big Day for a small group of dedicated sportsmen over most counties in this part of the state-spring turkey season. This is the season when folks go turkey hunting, not just killing turkeys incidental to deer hunting. It's a sport for the real hunter...calls, camouflage, being quiet and sneaky in new green foliage and red dawn. Calling wildlife into gun range, in my opinion, is the ultimate in hunting. Beats the socks off the ambush and accidental happen-to-cross-paths type of hunting routine we have fallen into. It's a science, an art, a technique that must be studied, practiced and developed.

All this hooplah is centered around the mating season of our Rio Grande strain of wild turkey. This is the time of year that gobblers put together their harems of hens with matrimony on their minds. The ideal time to call up a love-sick gobbler is at the beginning of the mating season, but we've already missed that by several weeks. However, gobblers are always a sucker for a pretty face (or a new sweet voice, in this case), so calling can still be productive. Our season this

year is about a week earlier than last year's, so we're getting closer, anyway.

With a few exceptions, laws pertaining to spring turkey hunting are about the same as deer season. A general hunting license is required, and spring turkeys must be tagged the same as in the fall. Be sure to use either the "Spring Only" or the "Fall or Spring" tag from your license, and don't get over anxious and kill a hen by mistake. Turkey may be hunted in Crockett and surrounding counties with any rifle, shotgun, or other legal firearm, and bows with a minimum draw weight of 40 pounds and arrows with broadheads. Be careful not to mess with turkeys on a roost, day or night, as this is not only illegal, but a doggone good way to run turkeys out of the area. Legal shooting hours are 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset, and the season will run through April 19.

Spring turkey hunting is an enjoyable, rewarding experience. Most of those who've tried it have been hooked and put it above all other types of hunting. Try it...I think you'll like it.

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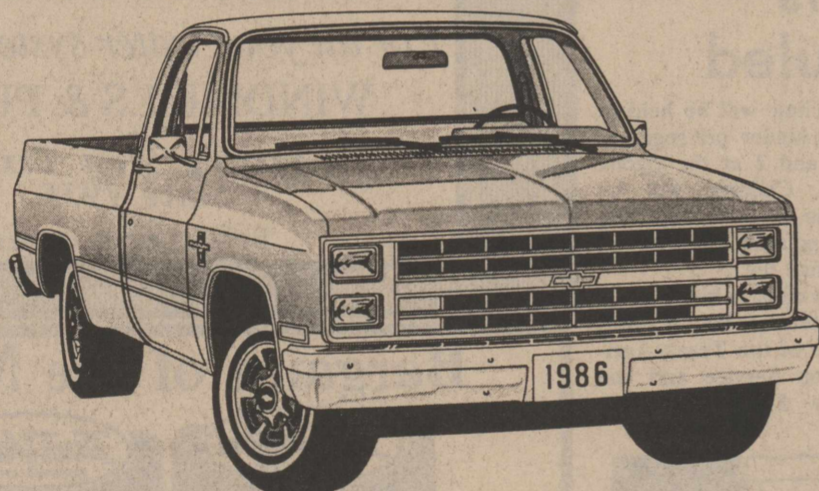


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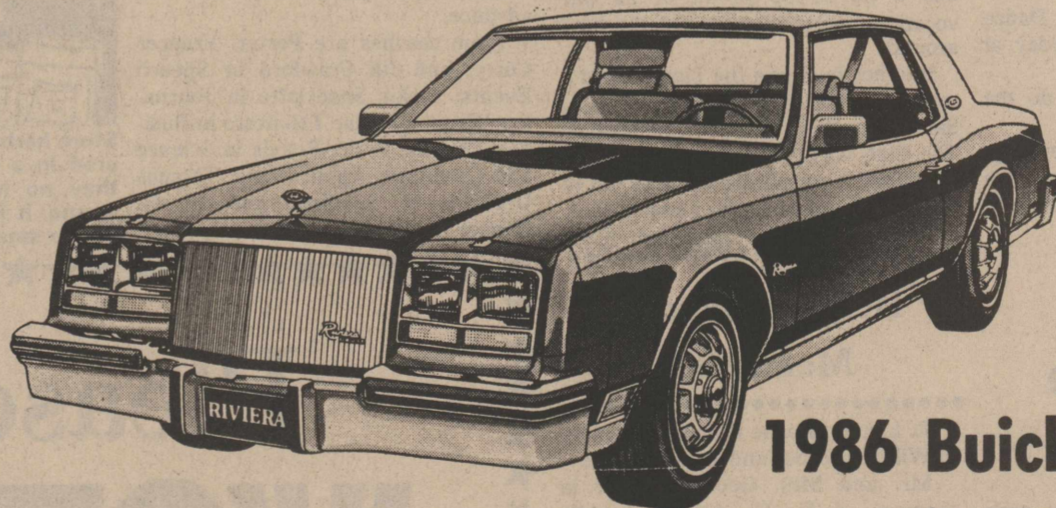
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Burglary suspect arrested investigation closed in case

the investigation is continuing.

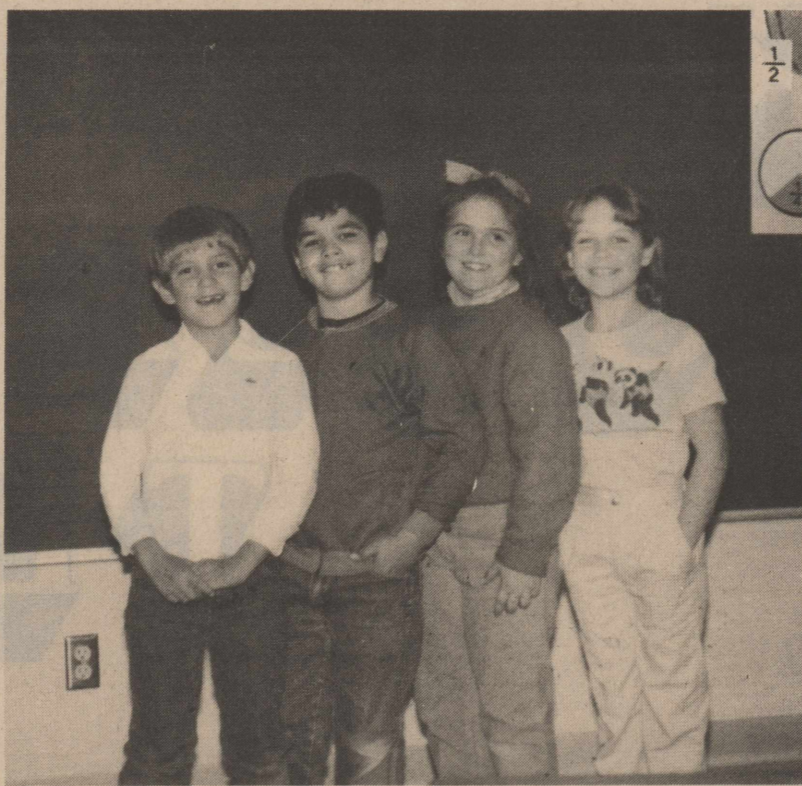

Extension Office News

Bringing home a report card can be one of the trials of childhood—especially if the grades are less than perfect.

Children are anxious for their parents' reaction to a report card. And how parents react can be encouraging or discouraging to the child.

Parents who praise children for doing their best give them a sense of accomplishment and self-worth. But when praise is coupled with statements like "you can do better than that," the encouragement can be eroded by the implication that what has been done is not good enough.

County field gains producer

The Henderson (Canyon gas) field in Crockett County gained another producer with completion of Conquest Exploration Co., Houston, No. 6-27 Jones Ranch "A", 10 miles southeast of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3,700,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 52,222-1. Gravity of the condensate is 62.6 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 7,820-914 feet, which had been acidized with 2,800 gallons and fractured with 100,000 gallons and 500 pounds of sand.

Scheduled as an 8,500-foot wildcat, it was drilled to 8,111 feet, with 5 1/2-inch casing set at 8,101 feet, and plugged back to 8,060 feet.

Location is 2,250 feet from the south and 1,950 feet from the east lines of 27-KL-TCRR.

Baytech Inc., Midland, will drill the No. 2 Holt "36" as an Ellenburger oil test in the Holt Ranch multipay field of Crockett County, 10.5 miles north of Ozona.

Location is 1,526 feet from the south and 1,398 feet from the east lines of 36-OP-GC&SF Survey. Contract depth is 8,500 feet.

Traffic death toll lowest in ten years in 1986 year

The 1986 traffic death toll in Texas was the lowest it has been in 10 years, according to DPS Director Col. Jim Adams.

The number of persons killed on Texas' streets and highways has decreased 3.1 percent—3,568 for 1986 compared to 3,682 deaths in 1985, Adams said.

"We are very pleased with this decline, through the number of people who died in traffic accidents in Texas last year is certainly still of tragic proportions," he said. "The good news is that it is getting safer to drive in Texas."

The death rate on Texas' roadways, another measurement of traffic safety, reached its lowest point ever—2.4 deaths per 100 million miles traveled.

From 3.9 in 1981, the death rate in Texas has dropped steadily each year. In 1985, the rate was 2.6.

"Not only was the 1986 fatality count the lowest in the state since 1976, last year's figure represents 1,133 fewer traffic deaths than recorded in 1981, the worst year in Texas traffic history," Adams said.

"It's hard to assess a single cause for this reduction since so many factors are involved," Adams said.

"Speed law enforcement, DWI enforcement and a greater public awareness of the consequences of drinking and driving all play a role. An additional factor has been the seat belt

legislation, which went into effect Sept. 1, 1985."

A comparison of the final fatality figures for the first year the safety belt law was on the books with the same period the year before shows the number of persons killed in the front seats of cars and light trucks declined by 7 percent.

"That 7 percent amounts to 157 lives arguably saved by seat belts," Adams said. "The safety belt law is working. Unfortunately, a survey conducted for the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation has indicated a slight decrease in seatbelt usage in Texas. We hope people realize this law definitely saves lives."

In 1986, 1,304 fatalities in Texas were listed as DWI-related, compared to 989 in 1985. Adams said the DPS feels that increase is largely due to better reporting of alcohol involvement in accidents, rather than a sharp increase in DWI.

"We feel that society's less tolerant attitude toward drinking and driving is continuing to pay off in the overall reduction of fatalities, though the problem of DWI is still a serious one," Adams said.

The number of motorcycle fatalities increased from 364 in 1985 to 403 in 1986, an 11 percent increase. Of those motorcyclists killed, 77 percent had not been wearing helmets.

Conquest Exploration to drill wildcat in county field

Conquest Exploration Co., Houston, has scheduled its No. 8-27 Jones Ranch "A", an 8,500-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 3/8-mile north of 7,896-foot Canyon gas production in the Henderson field, 3/4-mile southwest of a 9,221-foot failure, 2 7/8 miles south-southeast of the Ellenburger gas reopener and lone producer from that pay in the Clayton Ranch multipay field, and 10 miles southeast of Ozona.

Location is 2,825 feet from the south and 950 feet from the east lines of 27-KL-TCRR Survey. Ground elevation is 2,455 feet.

The Ellenburger reopener, J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, No. 1 Clayton-Hemphill, drilled to 8,673 feet, was finished July 19, 1986, for a calcula-

ted, absolute open flow of 6,600,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 40,654-1, through perforations at 8,668-73 feet.

Indian Wells Oil Co., San Angelo, will drill the No. 2 Montgomery "B" as a Canyon sand gas test in the Ozona multipay field of Crockett County, 15 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 4,600 feet from the north and 700 feet from the west lines of 1-Z-C.C. Montgomery Survey. Contract depth is 6,900 feet; ground elevation, 2,462 feet.

Frank James is in the Methodist Hospital in Houston recuperating from surgery.

Susan Scott wins title of Miss Concho Valley

Susan Scott, 20-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lane Scott, won the title of Miss Concho Valley 1987, Wednesday evening, March 25, at Santa Fe Junction in San Angelo, during the Miss San Angelo Pageant.

Susan, a student at Angelo State University, won the title after being named first runner-up to the Miss San Angelo winner. There were five finalists in the running.

Susan will participate in the Miss Texas-USA Pageant in San Antonio August 3. This pageant is a preliminary to the Miss USA and Miss

Universe pageants. The Miss Texas-USA Pageant is the largest state pageant in the United States. The 13-year-old pageant has produced the last three Miss USA's.

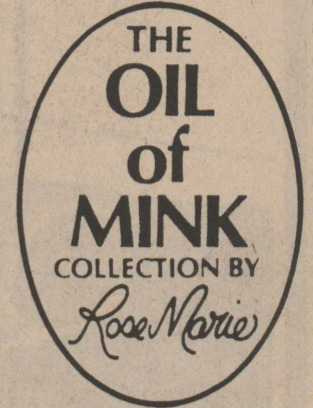

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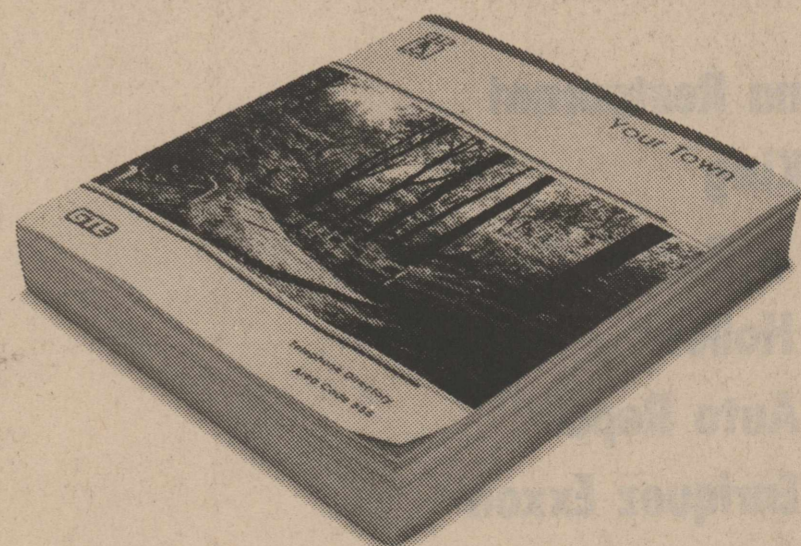
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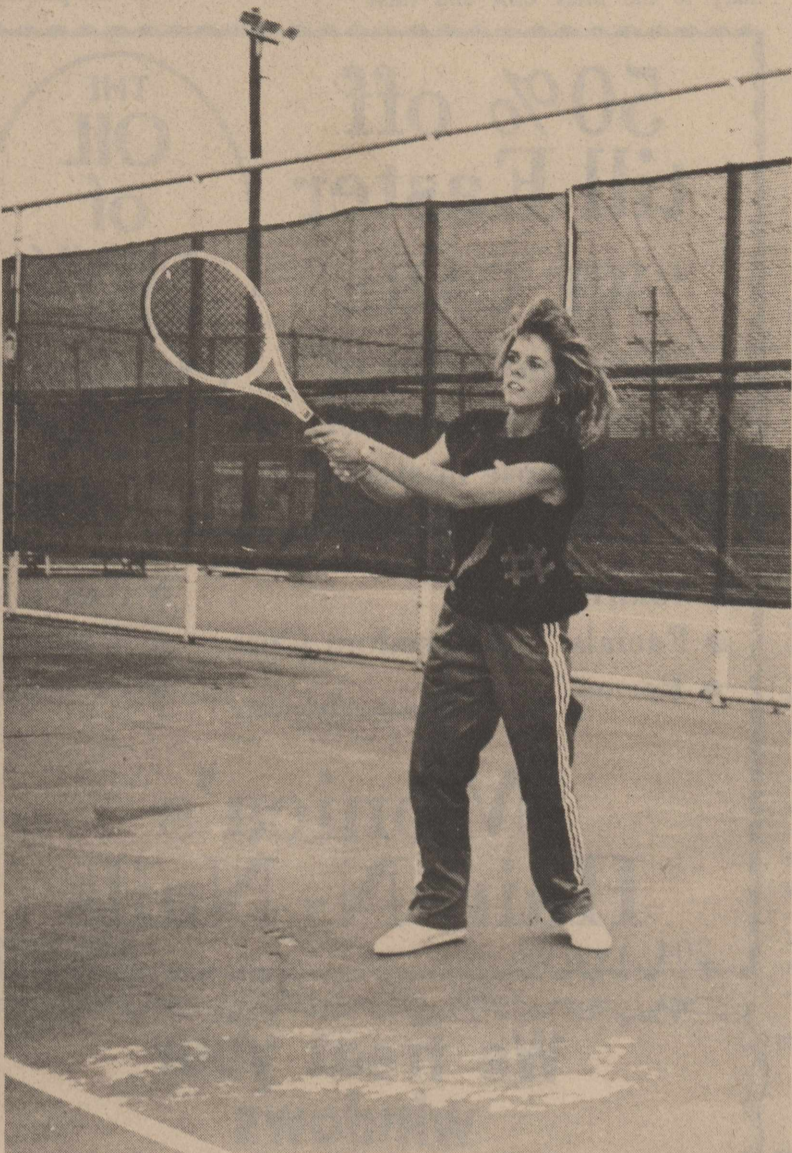
