

Gen. Marshall Tells Need Of New Powers

'Urgent Necessity' For Keeping Men In Army Is Described

WASHINGTON, July 17. (AP)—General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, testified today that there was an "urgent necessity" from a military standpoint for congress to declare a national emergency under which selectees, reserves and national guardsmen could be retained in service beyond the present one-year period.

From the strategic point of view, the army chief said, the efficiency of the war department and the military forces would be greatly improved if congress would act to clear away present prohibitions against longer service.

Marshall told the committee it was absurd to believe he had an American expeditionary force in mind when he recommended continuing in service beyond a year the selectees, national guardsmen and reserves.

Testifying "on legislation to lengthen the service of the emergency troops, the general said in reply to questions by Senator Austin (R-Vt.) that he would much prefer that congress declare flatly that the nation was imperiled, thus giving the war department more "elbow room" in which to work.

"The whole thing that remains," Marshall said, "is, 'Is there an emergency?' I say there is and the war department says there is. You gentlemen will have to settle it."

As an example of what he said was the hindrances that often develop through congressional limitations, he said that the army had been "set back very seriously" in development of essential air facilities in Brazil.

Expressing reluctance to mention the country involved, Marshall said that he had been handicapped in cooperating with Pan-American Airways in establishing landing fields and other facilities in Brazil because congress had stipulated, in making \$200,000,000 in emergency funds available to the president, that two-thirds of this money be spent for the army and one-third for the navy.

The same limitation, he continued, had delayed development of other airfields in the vital Caribbean area for three months because of the technicalities involved.

The chief of staff declared that "we are concerned with the aggression of military force" built up through long training and participation in actual campaigns.

The bill before the committee—an administration measure—would remove entirely the present one-year limit on the service of selectees, members of the national guard and reserves on active duty.

Morgenthau Favors Civilian Rationing
WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Secretary Morgenthau said today that he was in favor of immediate curtailment of civilian goods production in order to speed up the output of defense materials.

He made the statement at a press conference after pointing to automobile factories as an example of industries which he said could be used even more for defense work and were still busy turning out non-military goods.

The treasury chief reiterated his skepticism that federal spending this fiscal year would exceed \$19,000,000,000.

Debate May Bring Division Of Churchill's Vast Powers
LONDON, July 17 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill's decision to have the house of commons debate anew Great Britain's war production may lead to a division of his powers, informed political observers said today.

Statements criticizing British war production have caused serious harm abroad, Churchill said in his Tuesday address before the house, but he promised another day of discussion soon at which the government would be prepared to answer its critics.

The house debated the matter two days last week following reports of chaos in all-plane production, especially the servicing of American-built planes shipped to England for assembly.

The new debate was expected to bring into the open some of the underground criticism of Churchill heard in London and occasionally voiced in the press. The principal charge made against Churchill is that he has

Pickets Close Aircraft Plant

Production of aircraft equipment was stopped at Air Associates, Inc., Bendix, N. J., today when a crowd of several hundred men and women stoned and forced the retirement of the day shift as it headed into the gates to work.

At least six persons were injured in the ensuing fighting between police and those who stopped the workers.

Difficulties started at the Bendix plant Saturday when members of the CIO-United Automobile Workers placed a picket line there in protest against dismissal of nine sheet metal workers.

R. E. Fowler, company public relations counsel, asserted that the attacking throng was composed mostly of CIO workers from the Brewster Aeronautical corporation plant at Newark and the Federal Shipbuilding and Dry Dock company at Kearny.

At River Rouge, Mich., members of the CIO-Steel Workers Organizing Committee ignored a 30-day cooling off period imposed by the state labor mediation board and went on strike at the Great Lakes Engineering works, engaged in building lake ships for iron ore transport.

The strike involves an inter-union dispute and the Office of Production Management had asked the SWOC not to "defy the government" with a walkout. Charles Cowl, SWOC field representative replied that "we are not defying the government but we are defying a firm that is defying the government by refusing to deal with the union of the employees' choosing."

A week-old strike at the American Car and Foundry company, Chicago, involving about 1,000 members of the CIO-AW, was referred to Washington, meanwhile, after negotiators meeting with a federal conciliator failed to reach an agreement.

Local 805 of the union, which signed a contract with the company in March demanded changes in production procedure which would enable workers in various classifications to earn from \$7.25 to \$9.18 a day.

The United Aircraft corporation announced at Hartford, Conn., signing of an agreement with an AFL machinists union and wage increases aggregating almost \$4,200,000 a year for 25,000 employees.

In another shipyard strike, 2,000 AFL workers walked off their jobs yesterday at the Todd Galveston Dry Dock, Inc., Galveston, halting repairs on nine merchant vessels, among them the seized Italian ship Colorado. The union and company have been unable to reach an understanding on a master shipyard agreement recently prepared at New Orleans, but planned another conference today.

Little change occurred in the cemetery fund with revenues of \$123 and expenses of \$121, leaving a balance of \$1,663.

Italians To Hold Consular Staffs
ROME, July 17 (AP)—The foreign office informed the United States embassy tonight that the American consular party, en route home under expulsion orders, would not be permitted to leave Italy until word had been received that a similar Italian consular party had arrived at Lisbon, Portugal, and disembarked from the United States navy transport West Point.

More Nurses, Marines Arrive In England
LONDON, July 17 (AP)—Six more American Red Cross nurses and seven U. S. marines rescued from the Netherlands steamship Maasdam, torpedoed in the North Atlantic last month, arrived in London today.

Reservists Return To Japanese Army
SHANGHAI, July 17 (AP)—An unidentified number of Japanese reservists in addition to the vast number of men already under arms are being called up as an accompaniment to the Japanese cabinet shift, according to reports received by foreign sources here.

The reports early in the week were accompanied by disclosure that the Japanese port of Kobe (most likely point of embarkation for any southward military move) had been in effect closed to foreigners for a 10-day period starting July 15.

The general belief here was that the new cabinet would put into effect decisions already reached, but whether Japan intends to move north against Russian Siberia, south into French Indo-China, Thailand and the Netherlands East Indies, or intends any special move remained a matter of speculation.

Pending appointment of a new Japanese premier, Shanghai sources admitted they were unable to analyze the Tokyo cabinet crisis.

They generally agreed, however, that Japan faced two choices of international policy: to continue in the axis camp or swing toward the British-American bloc.

The reported troop call-up would seem to indicate the former unless it is window-dressing or reinforcement of forces in China.

City's Cash Reserve At Unusual Low

Small Revenues From Water Cuts Down Balance

Decreased revenues during June left the city with only \$387 cash balance in the general fund, the smallest reserve in a decade.

Chief cause of the decline appeared to have been the sharp decrease in water consumption which was down by 30,000,000 gallons for the first three months of the year. Abundance of rain was believed responsible. Revenues from this source were off correspondingly, being \$13,332 less than for the same period a year ago.

Part of this decline, however, was due to a lower excess rate.

General fund revenues from all sources since April 1, beginning of the fiscal year, totaled \$50,211 and disbursement for the same period amounted to \$60,230, of which \$62,063 was for capital outlay and operating expenses for the first quarter of the year.

Thus the cash balance of \$15,341 at the start of the year was all but dissipated.

Expenditures were \$1,552 in excess of the budget allotments for the period. Administrative and building funds were over by more than \$1,000 and the street was over by \$6,400. However, the water and airport units were under \$3,200 and \$3,800, respectively, and the fire department was under \$1,500.

Interest and sinking fund expenses for June were \$6,752, making a total of \$51,218 for the first quarter including \$32,000 in bonds and \$1,000 in warrants. It left the fund with a cash balance of \$6,600.

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For an indication of the direction of the new government's foreign policy observers awaited the choice of a new foreign minister.

Tonight the premier-designate received General Elki Tojo and Admiral Koshio Okawa, war and navy ministers, respectively, in the old cabinet. This was taken to mean they would be asked to continue at their posts, thus assuring that the government's relations with the armed services, which have exercised a powerful influence on all its policies, would be unchanged.

Interest centered chiefly around the appointment of a successor to foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka, who was instrumental in aligning Japan with the axis under the Berlin treaty of Sept. 27, 1940, and who personally signed a neutrality pact with Soviet Russia last April 13 at Moscow.

Hopkins In England On War Mission

LONDON, July 17. (AP)—Harry L. Hopkins, supervisor of the United States lease-lend program, arrived in London today, visited Prime Minister Churchill immediately and then attended a meeting of the British cabinet.

LONDON, July 17. (AP)—Harry Hopkins, supervisor of the lease-lend program, arrived today at a northern British air base after flying the Atlantic in an American plane.

Hopkins, who visited Britain last winter, was met by W. Averell Harriman, American co-ordinator of aid for Britain, who only recently returned from a tour of the Middle East.

Besides talks with Harriman, a conference with Lord Beaverbrook, British minister of supply, to discuss top-speed production of tanks was believed to be high on Hopkins' program.

Henderson To Ask Ceiling On Gasoline

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Leon Henderson, price administrator, asked all petroleum refiners in the Gulf coast area today to maintain a base price of six cents a gallon on gasoline.

Henderson said that prices in that area had advanced from three and five-eighths cents a gallon at the first of the year to six cents on June 19.

"Several cargoes have recently been reported moving at prices ranging from six and one-half cents to six and one-half cents," Henderson said.

Price administration officials said that there was an "extraordinary" demand for gasoline in the Gulf area and the request to maintain the six-cent price was deemed necessary in order to control speculative buying.

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Leon Henderson, price administrator, said today that rent control laws would be necessary in defense areas where voluntary methods fail to prevent increases.

In many places where the housing shortage is acute rents are "skyrocketing," Henderson told a house committee investigating labor migration.

In some shipbuilding, ordinance and army cantonment centers as many as one out of every two rented homes have had rent increases ranging from 20 to 100 per cent since October 1939," he testified.

Lear Incident Officially Closed
WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Undersecretary Robert P. Patterson said today the war department considered "a closed incident" the disciplinary measures meted out by Lieutenant General Ben Lear to troops who yoo-hoed at Memphis girl golfers.

Patterson said Lear, commander of the Second Army, had submitted a report and added it would not be made public.

Farm Price Fixing Proposals Debated
WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Protests against any attempt to fix farm prices at present levels came today from state agricultural officials of Georgia, Texas and Wisconsin.

Tom Linder, commissioner of agriculture of Georgia, told a senate agriculture sub-committee that "mere talk of fixing a ceiling price" was lowering the returns of cotton farmers at the time their new crop was starting to market.

J. E. McDonald, Texas commissioner, and Ralph E. Ammon, director of the Wisconsin department of agriculture, also opposed any effort to peg prices at present levels.

Tractor Drivers Leave Tulsa Job
TULSA, Okla., July 17. (AP)—Between 50 and 60 tractor operators at the \$22,000,000 bomber assembly plant under construction here left their jobs today, a union official said, because "they could make a little more money in other parts of the country."

"The hourly wage scale here is from \$1 to \$1.15," said Jim Burke, business representative of the Operating Engineers Local Union No. 948 (AFL). "Some places are paying as high as \$1.50."

Army To Construct Recreation Camps
WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—The army selected sites today for six new recreation areas to be added to the 24 already in operation or approved for construction as week-end rest camps for soldiers in training at large camps.

The new areas, with the capacity of each, included: Kansas City, Mo., 1,000; Oklahoma City, 500; Lake Brownwood, Tex., 1,500; Fort Worth, 500, and Los Angeles, 1,000.

GERMANS RUSH TOWARD MOSCOW IN MAIN DRIVE

A "tremendous struggle for a decision" between 9,000,000 German and Russian troops was reported by Adolf Hitler's high command today, and Nazi dispatches claimed what appeared to be a complete 90-mile break through the center of the Stalin line.

Jubilantly hinting at a climactic turn in the 26-day-old campaign, the German high command asserted that the Russians now were throwing their last reserves into the conflict in a desperate attempt to stem the Nazi blitzkrieg.

DNB, the official German news agency, said Hitler's invasion columns, storming through the vital central front guarding Moscow, had captured Smolensk, 230 miles west of the Soviet capital.

DNB also reported that Polotsk, detoured by onrushing panzer spearheads, had been taken later by enveloping tactics.

Precise limits of the 1,100-mile Stalin line are unknown, but presumably Smolensk is near the rear or behind the line.

Some reports have said the great man-made barrier, extending from the Gulf of Finland to the Black sea, was as much as 75 miles deep, with an average depth of about 20 miles. Since the German thrust from Vitebsk, on the west side of the line, to Smolensk represented an advance of some 90 miles, it appeared that the Nazis had made a clean break-through.

An authorized spokesman in Berlin flatly declared that German "schnell truppen" (speed troops) had raced far beyond Smolensk to within 110 miles of Moscow itself, but this was later corrected.

The claim was based on a German press report that Nazi troops had captured the town of Gorodische, 110 miles from the Muscovite capital. Subsequently, however, the captured town was identified as another by the same name, on the southern front between Zhitomir and Berdichev, facing the Soviet Ukraine.

The Germans said their troops, concealed in artificial fog, had "stormed the last of the underground fortifications near Kiev," the Ukraine capital.

"Great successes are in the making," Hitler's field headquarters proclaimed, casting off its reticent mood of the past week.

A Moscow communique acknowledged violent all-night fighting in which German and Russian troops contended for mastery of the road to Leningrad.

The battle raged in the Pakov-Porkhov sector, 150 miles southwest of Leningrad. Details were lacking.

"In other sectors, no major operations took place and no significant changes in the positions of our troops occurred," the Soviet high command declared.

But on the all-important central front, guarding Moscow, a critical hour had struck.

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O'Daniel Won't Hurry To Senate

AUSTIN, July 17. (AP)—Governor W. Lee O'Daniel does not plan an immediate departure for Washington.

The United States senator-elect revealed he would make a tour of army camps and flying fields beginning today and continuing into next week.

His initial stop, he said, would be Hicks Field, Fort Worth. Friday he planned to visit Camp Wolters at Mineral Wells and Sheppard Field at Wichita Falls.

The governor added he would spend Saturday at Camp Barkley viewing troop maneuvers. It was understood here governors of several other states would witness the Camp Barkley exercises.

The governor planned to return here late Saturday, present his usual Sabbath radio program from the mansion, and continue his tour next week. An itinerary for next week's visits has not been completed, he said.

Scouts Go To Weed Friday

Boy Scouts were reminded for a final time today that the buses and trucks transporting them to council camp near Weed, N. M., would leave from the First Methodist church Friday promptly at 6 a. m.

Because they are operating on schedule to pick up scouts west of here, there can be no waiting, said Dr. W. B. Hardy, district chairman. Those who plan to attend senior camp at Philtrum in Northern New Mexico will leave with the regular group, Dr. Hardy said.

Around 125 scouts from all points of the 16-county council are due to participate in the New Mexico 10-day outing.

New Cabinet In Cuba Completed

HAVANA, July 17 (AP)—A new 18-man cabinet was announced today by President Fulgencio Batista, less than 24 hours after the old ministry resigned en masse to permit reorganization.

Batista, renamed Senator Carlos Saladrigas premier along with 10 other former ministers. Eight of the ministers are congressmen and informed quarters said they expected Batista would find easier congressional backing for his agricultural and economic policies.

Lindbergh And Ickes Bandy More Words

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Secretary Ickes declared today he believed that if Charles A. Lindbergh "were an upstanding American" he would have turned back his German decoration "long ago, regardless of how, when or where he got it."

The interior department chief made his statement at a press conference after being informed that Lindbergh had written President Roosevelt suggesting an apology by Ickes for his criticism of Lindbergh's position in the present international situation.

"I've never said at any time that he is connected with the interests of a foreign government," Ickes said. "I have said, however, that he has gone about the country preaching appeasement and disunity which is in the interest of a foreign government—namely Germany."

When handed a paper quoting from Lindbergh's letter to the president, Ickes read it aloud in a plaintive voice, and then commented, "this doesn't sound like an expression from a knight of the German eagle."

Asked if he would apologize to the "flier, in event he returned the German decoration, the secretary replied: "I would think a lot more of him."

A White House secretary said the flier's protest to the White House was intended more for the newspapers than for the president. (Quotations from Lindbergh's letter may be found on page 4.)

British Sink 17 Axis Ships

LONDON, July 17. (AP)—Within the past 24 hours British bombers have put out of action 17 axis ships totaling almost 100,000 tons and have struck smashing new blows at Hamburg and other industrial areas of the German reich, the air ministry announced today.

The ships were smashed in a massed daylight assault yesterday on the port of Rotterdam in the German-occupied Netherlands, from which Nazi garrisons in occupied countries are largely supplied, a communique said.

The assault on Hamburg and other areas in northwestern Germany was carried out during the night in a continuation of the non-stop offensive against the reich begun more than a month ago. Bad weather handicapped the raiders but they succeeded in starting many fires and caused numerous direct hits on their targets, the ministry declared.

The night raid cost the RAF three planes and four were lost in the assault on Rotterdam, the British acknowledged.

"I dare hope that there will be one censor who is French enough to let this letter pass through, so that the entire world may know the way in which German clemency operates toward us."

This is the last sentence of a letter from Auvergne, written by a nameless citizen of France, now living under the rule of the Nazis, one of the many letters included in **THEY SPEAK FOR A NATION**, a collection edited by Eve Curie, Philippe Barres, and Count Raoul de Roussay de Sales, trans-

lated by Drake and Denise deLacy, to be published July 25 by Doubleday, Doran. There is a jointly written introduction by the editors.

On the margin of the letter from Auvergne the censor wrote: "There are plenty of them!—and of those who also, listening to the BBC broadcasts, wish for the triumph of the cause of the Allies, so heroically sustained by England."

Among all the Englishmen called to the colors by Great Britain during the present war, few fill a role as heroic as that of the fishermen who man the North Sea trawlers and mine sweepers. So hazardous is their task that only volunteers are asked to undertake it, day after day they do their jobs at sea, without the fanfare and publicity which attends the more glamorous operations of the Royal Air Force and the Royal Navy. Yet to a great degree, maintenance of free sea lanes to the British Isles, and prevention of actual invasion of the United Kingdom itself, depends upon the methodical work of these fishermen, who cast their nets today for the deadly catch sown by Nazi warships and the Luftwaffe—the sinister magnetic mines which plague British coastwise shipping.

There's good sleep ahead for you sufferers via this route!

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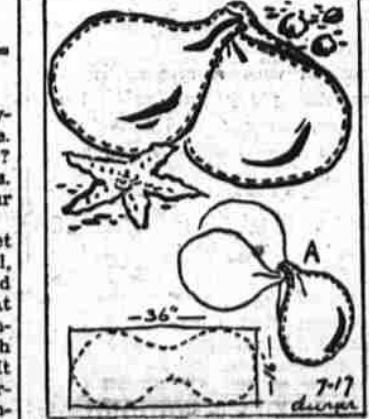

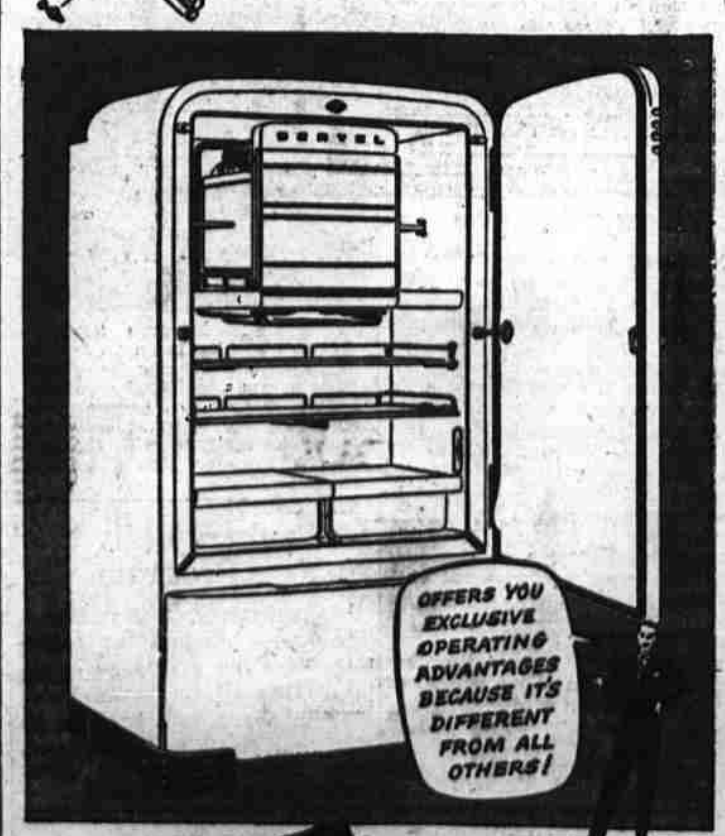

Lindy Asks Apology Of Harold Ickes

NEW YORK, July 17 (AP)—Charles A. Lindbergh today advised President Roosevelt that he had no connection with any foreign government, that he received a German decoration while serving the American embassy and declared that he had a right to an apology from Secretary of the Interior Ickes for certain "statements and implications."

Saying that he wrote as an American citizen, Lindbergh, who recently resigned as colonel in the air corps reserve, wrote: "For many months, and on numerous occasions, your secretary of the interior has implied in public meetings that I am connected with the interests of a foreign government, and he has specifically criticized me for accepting a decoration from the German government in 1928."

"Mr. President, is it too much to ask that you inform your secretary of the interior that I was decorated by the German government while I was carrying out the request of your ambassador to that government? Is it unfair of me to ask that you inform your secretary that I received this decoration in the American embassy, in the presence of your ambassador, and that I was there at his request in order to assist in creating a better relationship between the American embassy and the German government, which your ambassador desired at that time."

State Rejects Bid To Lease Gaines Land

Bascom Giles, state general land commissioner, has announced the rejection of an application to lease an alleged area of vacant school land amounting to 1,735 acres in the vicinity of Cedar Lake oil pool in Gaines county.

The application was filed by Robert B. Violette, Fort Worth, under new vacancy law provisions. He alleged a vacancy between block C-80 and block M along the Gaines and Dawson county lines.

Giles ruled that no vacancy existed for the reason records of the general land office and measurements on the ground indicated the area claimed as vacant conflicted with valid surveys which had been previously titled or sold and had

been occupied for many years in good faith.

The application affected the location of more than 900 sections of land in Gaines and Dawson counties and if granted would have probably caused more than one-half of all the surveys in Gaines county to be moved about 700 yards east of their present location. Giles said the application was the outgrowth of a confusion of land lines south of Lamesa originating about 1900, which was for the most part, settled by court decisions establishing the famous Coffee corner and the townsites of Lamesa. Giles ruling conforms to these decisions.

Compromise Offered In Army Service Extension Argument

Oil Men Ponder Proposal To Give Crude To Britain

AUSTIN, July 17 (AP)—Texas oil men today pondered a proposal to donate one day's flow of crude oil from Texas wells—in excess of 1,000,000 barrels—to Great Britain.

Presented at a statewide oil promotion hearing yesterday, the plan, originated by John F. Camp, San Antonio operator, was assured sympathetic cooperation of the Texas railroad commission provided it was approved by Federal Oil Coordinator Harold Ickes and the British government.

At the hearing, members Jerry Sadler and Olin Culberson of the commission, bitterly condemned "selfish interests in the oil industry," which, they asserted, were interfering with efforts at cooperation in the national emergency.

Sinclair-Prairie Oil company representatives requested greater allowable production in the North, west-Central and Panhandle Texas areas and, with others, pleaded with the commission not to shut down the East Texas field because of a recent material decline in

bottomhole pressure.

Representing Camp, R. H. Cuyler of Austin told the commission and assembled oil industry representatives that the oil for Britain plan would have a tremendous moral effect in Britain and Germany, showing the nations Texas could produce as much oil, under production restrictions, in three and a half days as Germany could in a year.

"The plan calls for the elimination of one of the regular shut-down days," Cuyler explained. "It is not impractical. It has the approval of President Roosevelt, Lord Halifax, Governor O'Daniel and many Texas operators."

"The federal treasury department, at the suggestion of the president, has volunteered to collect the oil and British officials have assured us they want it and will pick it up at designated coastal points."

Cuyler expressed the opinion technical details of production, transportation and transfer could be facilitated by use of warrants deeding the value of quantities of oil to the president and collectable at ports.

Royalties, pipe line costs and taxes, he declared, could be deducted from the value of the oil donated.

Congressional Leaders Offer Suggestion

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Senators Wheeler (D-Mont) and Truman (D-Mo) today suggested compromise draft legislation which would permit selectees now in service to leave the army after one year but require those inducted in the future to serve for a longer period.

The proposal was advanced by the two senators separately as the senate military committee called General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, to discuss an administration bill which would remove entirely the present one-year limit on the service of the selectees, members of the national guard and reserves on active duty.

Truman, chairman of the senate defense committee, expressed belief that the highly controversial legislation could be passed in the form sought by the administration but only after lengthy and bitter debate.

As a compromise in this situation he said he believed "it would work" if legislation was enacted to require continued service by national guardsmen and reserves and by all selectees inducted in the future.

Coupled with enactment of this requirement, he continued, should be an appeal to the patriotism of selectees already in service for as many as possible to remain there throughout the emergency.

"I don't believe many would leave," Truman said, "and it would avoid the charge that congress would be breaking a contract with those who have been inducted."

Support for the administration's draft legislation came from Senator Lee (D-Okla) who declared that "if it was necessary to draft the men in the first place, there certainly is justification now for retaining them in training."

"There is far greater danger to this country," he said, "now that Germany has started into Russia. The Nazis may slice a chocolate cake, and then they will have all the vast resources of the soviet to pour into war in the west."

Lee predicted, "will be ready for a long war and therefore we should have an army adequate to prevent any threat to our own safety."

The War Today—Russian Will To Resist Key To Future Of War

The German thrust through the heart of the main Russian line to the strategic railway center of Smolensk, Napoleonic route to that city, has created a grave threat not only to the capital but to the structure of the Stalin defenses.

From the Bolshevik standpoint the saving grace of the position lay in their continued power of resistance and their claim to have flung the Hitlerian invaders back in a thirty-mile retreat in the Bobruisk sector to the south of the Smolensk battle. There is no indication, however, whether the Reds have the strength to exploit this small set-back.

The situation, so far as can be judged from incomplete reports, is that the Germans have driven a deep and apparently rather narrow salient into the Russian front, enveloping the city of Smolensk which the Nazis this morning claim to have occupied. A spearhead of mechanized units also is said to have raced farther on to within 110 miles of Moscow.

Unless the Russian forces on either side of that salient are disorganized and lacking in striking power, the Germans are taking a chance on having this salient pinched off, thereby leaving their forces in the Smolensk zone surrounded. The Red attack south of the salient likely represents an effort to capitalize this position, but the German command must feel fairly sure of its ground in making such a spectacular thrust.

Revenue Men Check Deed Records For Failure To Pay Full Tax

Have you executed or received a deed or other property transfer or lease instrument in the past nine years in which the consideration mentioned in the instrument was obviously less than the real consideration involved? If so, you are likely to get a letter in a few days from Uncle Sam's internal revenue department asking that you come down to the courthouse and explain the situation.

Whenever a real estate instrument is executed, a tax of 55 cents on each \$500 or fraction thereof over \$100 is due to the federal government, under a law that has been on the books many years.

This tax should be paid on the entire amount of the transaction, including cash and/or the value of property exchanged.

For various reasons—and possi-

bly to avoid payment of this tax—many deeds and other instruments have been filed with the consideration referred to as "\$1" or "\$10", or "\$10 and other considerations." Thus, the tax was not collected at the time of filing of the instrument.

But two deputy collectors from the internal revenue service—A. D. Priest and C. L. Powell—are checking all deeds recorded in the county clerk's office since 1932 to eliminate the delinquencies. Those persons who have filed instruments with such inaccurate reference to the consideration will be asked to state the full value of the property at time of the transaction and to

pay the tax on same. Notices to be mailed by the revenue men will point out that "whoever makes, signs, issues, or accepts, or causes to be made, signed, issued or accepted any instrument, document, or paper of any kind or description whatsoever without the full amount of tax thereon being duly paid x x x is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall pay a fine of not more than \$10 for each offense."

However, the collectors said no effort would be made to bring prosecution of these cases when the parties in error made full payment of taxes due.

NYA Project For Girls Planned For Big Spring

A National Youth Administration project for girls—the first of its kind for Big Spring and the third NYA project to be operated locally—is due to be launched here soon.

Following a conference with Charles W. Graves, area counselor, Howard county commissioners agreed to sponsor a girls project for productive sewing and hot lunch preparation.

Under current rulings, NYA projects now must dovetail into existing ones—that is the girls project here will feature productive sewing in part for NYA enrollees and preparation of lunches for youths employed on the NYA airport project.

Ben Jackson, area supervisor, was expected here Wednesday from San Angelo to give a start-

ing date for the project and to announce a supervisor.

Between 30 and 40 local girls currently appear to be eligible for the experience, and if plans materialize, they probably will be assigned alternate periods during the month.

With the exception of a project in Coleman, the Big Spring NYA girls' program will be more extensive than any in the state. It is open to girls between the ages of 16 and 24 and full information may be had from Graves at the Howard County Welfare office on any Wednesday from 10 a. m. to 12 noon.

Materials for the project are to be furnished by NYA, a somewhat unique arrangement. Arrangements have been made for a house at 501 Gregg street.

Meals prepared by the girls will be sent to the airport in a special metal trailer turned out at the NYA metal shop in San Angelo.

Materials turned by the sewing room will be distributed through regular welfare channels, it was stated.

Other NYA projects underway here now are the airport terminal building and the resident center which features training in radio, woodwork and welding.

Vegetable Salads For Summer Meals

Nutritionists tell us to "work in" a leafy, green or yellow vegetable, raw or cooked, once a day, sometimes twice. What better way than via the salad bowl? Salads or raw shredded cabbage, raw slivers of carrots or turnips, diced tomatoes, celery, cucumbers, scallions, etc., temptingly seasoned with salad dressings, give you all the vitamins and minerals raw vegetables offer.

As for cooked vegetables, into many refrigerators go leftover cooked peas, limas, string beans, carrots, etc. If you toss them with crisp salad greens, raw vegetables, a bit of minced onion, diced green or red pepper, or minced parsley (peppers and parsley are both rich in vitamins A and C) and salad dressing, you can have a salad bowl as varied as you please. Fresh herbs, such as tarragon, chervil, dill, and sorrel, uplift the salad, too. And if a hearty version is more to your liking, just add some grated, crumbled or sliced cheese, diced hard-cooked eggs, meat, fish, or chicken—home-cooked or canned.

In making salad dressings frequently use lemon juice as a seasoning, for it adds vitamin C. Try, too, adding minced onion, chutney, chives, curry, fresh or dried herbs, or sliced olives to bottled or homemade salad dressing. Jellylike salads fit especially well into hot-weather meals. They can be made and safely tucked away into the refrigerator early in the day, or the day before. You can buy packaged gelatin, to which you can add vegetable, meat, or fish mixtures.

String-Bean Relish Salad
Tasted by Good Housekeeping Institute. Use Institute-approved measuring cups and spoons. Measure level.
1 1/2 lb. green string beans 1 tsp. granulated sugar
2 1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. black pepper
1 1/2 lb. boiling water 1/2 c. vinegar
1 1/2 c. chopped white onions 1/2 c. water
3 tsp. salad oil 1/2 c. Green Beans
Cook beans, which have been cut lengthwise into 1 1/2" pieces, with 1 tsp. of the salt and boiling water, covered until beans are tender—about 15 min. Drain; add remaining ingredients except salad greens. Mix well with a fork. Chill for several hours. Serve on any desired salad greens. Serves 4.
Main Suggestion: Serve with stuffed mushrooms, sliced tomatoes, cornbread, and raspberry tapenade.

Ham Supper Salad
Tasted by Good Housekeeping Institute. Use Institute-approved measuring cups and spoons. Measure level.
1/2 lb. sliced, smoked ham (about 2 1/2") 1 1/2 tsp. sweet-pickle relish
1 c. sliced celery 1 1/2 tsp. chili sauce
1 c. sliced hard-cooked eggs, sliced 1/2 c. mayonnaise or salad dressing
Combine first 3 ingredients. Then stir in the next 3 ingredients, which have been combined. Mix thoroughly. Chill until ready to serve. Serve on any desired salad greens. Serves 4.
Main Suggestion: Serve for dinner, with canned cream-of-mushroom soup, buttered broccoli, bean soufflé, cottage pudding topped with crushed strawberries, and leaf salad.

Lorenze Dressing
Tasted by Good Housekeeping Institute. Use Institute-approved measuring cups and spoons. Measure level.
1/2 c. currant jelly 1 tsp. paprika
1/2 c. lemon juice 1/2 tsp. granulated sugar
1/2 c. salad oil 1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 c. chili sauce
Cook currant jelly with a fork, and beat until smooth. Add remaining ingredients, and beat with hand beater until well blended. Serve over fruit salad or mixed greens. Makes 1/2 c. dressing.

Rural Students' Attendance Mark Is 75 Percent

Jiffy Meals Help Cut Cooking Corners In Summer Time



Salmon and mushrooms—both from cans—make a tempting summer dish that can be prepared in less time than it takes to eat. The salmon is served cold with a hot cream sauce. The mushrooms are served round the platter. A garnish of hard-boiled eggs and a salad complete the jiffy meal.

A pantry and refrigerator stocked with foods for jiffy meals will help cut cooking corners in hot weather. Many summer tidbits, such as ham, shrimp and tongue, come canned and packaged for quick service.

It's the cheese in the meat that puts SPAGHETTI NORMANDY in the top class of quickie meals. Heat 4 cups of canned spaghetti and tomato sauce, add meat balls and serve heaped up on a heated platter. Sprinkle or pass Parmesan cheese. Complete the meal with a tossed green or fruit salad, rusks, fresh apple sauce and ready-mixed

gingerbread. If the mechanical refrigerator boasts any vanilla ice cream or orange sherbet, serve it atop the gingerbread.

I vote for my special blend in meat balls—1-2 pound chopped beef, mixed and ground twice, with 1-4 pound each of chopped lean veal and fresh pork. Season with 1 teaspoon finely-chopped parsley, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-3 teaspoon each celery salt, paprika and onion. Add 1-3 cup sifted dried bread or cracker crumbs and 1-4 cup Parmesan cheese. Shape the meat into inch balls with the hands and chill until meal time. Sprinkle balls with flour and brown in 4 tablespoons fat. Cover and cook 7 minutes. You will have enough for four.

Make hot biscuits and pass strawberry jam, fruit salad with celery seed dressing and crisp carrot strips. Sign off with sponge cake-peach shortcake.

You can run off a dinner in short order when you call upon CANNED CORNED BEEF. Cut the beef into inch cubes. Simmer 3 minutes 3 tablespoons each of chopped onions, green peppers and celery in 2 tablespoons butter. Mix in 6 eggs, beat with 1-2 cup tomato juice. Season with 1-4 teaspoon each of salt, pepper and chopped parsley. Add the beef and cook until creamy. Serve at once on top of seasoned spinach.

Here is a menu requiring a little shelf-aid, but it easily fits into the jiffy class. Turn a pound can of tuna or salmon into a shallow buttered baking dish. Surround with 2 cups cream sauce and 1-2 cups peas or beans. Bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Whisk up sour cream muffins and bake along with the fish. Mix a cup graham flour, cup flour, teaspoon soda, teaspoon baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 cup sugar, 1 egg, 2-3 cup sour cream and 1-3 cup boiling water. Bake 20 minutes in greased muffin pans.

Secretary Of Navy Knox To Open Affair

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Within the space of approximately two hours the government will determine by lot tonight the order in which it will call up for military service the second group of selective service registrants.

After brief preliminaries beginning at 5 p. m. (CST) in the departmental auditorium, Navy Secretary Knox, blindfolded, will dip his hand into an historic glass jar used on similar fateful occasions of the past, and the second national selective service lottery will be off.

The lottery, on a much smaller scale than that of October 29, 1940, when 9,000 numbers were drawn, will determine priorities of service for approximately 750,000 young men registered July 1 who had become 21 years old after the first draft registration last year.

Secretary of War Stimson had been scheduled to take the first capsule number out of the 900 in the jar, but selective service officials said he would be unable to attend and the honor passed to Secretary Knox.

The total of numbers in the jar was determined on the basis of the highest number of registrants in any one of the nation's 6,500 selective service districts. The record, 661, was set in the Sparrows Point district near Baltimore, Md.

In addition to the 661 officials decided 139 "safety numbers" should be drawn to take care of those 21 year olds who were out of the country on July 1 or who for some other reason may register late.

The serial numbers drawn tonight will be apportioned among those held by about 8,000,000 of the 1940 registrants still unclassified.

If the first number drawn is 54, each man holding registration number 54 will be assigned "sequence No. 1" in his selective service district. All holding the second number drawn will be assigned "S-2" and so on until all registrants in each district have sequence numbers. The integration with old registrants then will work this way:

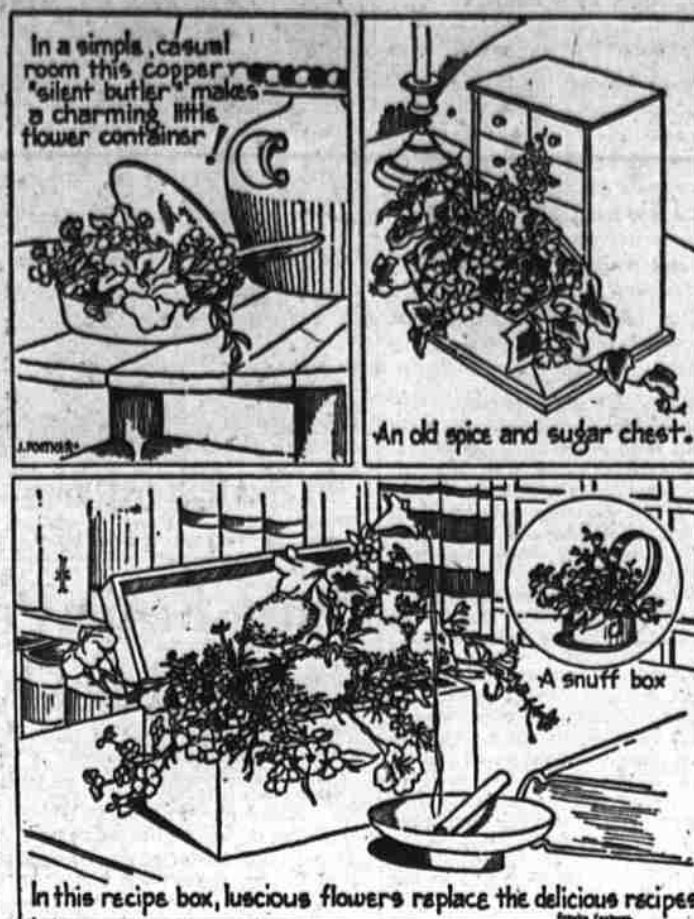
If a district has 200 old registrants and 20 new ones the ratio will be ten to one. The new registrant holding "sequence No. 1" will be subject to call only after 10 men of the 1940 group are called. "S-2" will go in after the second group of ten old registrants, and the last man on the list will be "S-20."

LOUISVILLE, (AP)—Two-year-old Charlotte Vaughn gave her two-month-old puppy, Perky, a swim in a rain-filled wash boiler, walked away and forgot him.

Later, Charlotte's mother discovered the pup apparently lifeless in the water. Adapting a leaf from first aid manuals intended for humans, Mrs. Vaughn revived Perky by rolling him, tummy down, over a fruit jar instead of the customary barrel.

Woman Drives Into Cafe
BERKELEY, Calif.—Miss Evelyn A. Adams, 23, while parking a car, stepped on the accelerator instead of the brake. James Katokis, owner of the restaurant, inside of which the car eventually found refuge via the plate glass window route, estimated total damage at \$500.

Boxes Have Charm When Filled With Summer Garden Flowers

No. 1—Boxes have a charm all their own—when the additional appeal of garden flowers is added the combination becomes irresistible. A "silent butler" one of those helpful ash or crumb receivers takes to a few short flowers like a dream. This is just the way to use those stemless wonders from your garden. Gladioli and sedum are the flowers in the above picture.

No. 2—Do you have an old spice box which is the pride of your life? You will be even more proud of it if you pull out the bottom bin and cram it full of old fashioned flowers and vines. Variegated ivy trails out of the corners. You can either cut off the branches or use them pot and all if the drawer is large enough. Calliope and delphinium lend color to the effect sketched above.

No. 3—A little wooden chest or recipe box is just the thing for a "treasure" of garden flowers. Gay blooms placed in an interesting old leather or wooden box is just the right accent for your library. You'll probably have to put a glass or pottery liner to hold the water. I used an ice-box dish. See phlogosol, the new chrysanthemum type marigold, tiny sprays of old fashioned "pinks" or dianthus gave this arrangement interesting contrasts of form and color. Hearings On Eleemosynary Heads Held

AUSTIN, July 17 (AP)—The board of control and members of a special senate committee scheduled a second meeting today to discuss the status of 10 superintendents of state eleemosynary institutions.

A special committee of the house of representatives had recommended that the institution heads be not reemployed when their contracts expire on Aug. 31.

The senate group was named after the house committee made its recommendations and Senator Clay Cotten of Palestine, chairman, said the senate committee was opposed to summarily discharging any superintendent without cause.

Cotten declined further comment following an initial conference between committeemen and board members yesterday.

The house committee, after an investigation, recommended that the control board not rehire superintendents at the Austin school for the feeble-minded, the school's farm colony, Corsicana orphanage, Gatesville reformatory, Gainsville girls school, San Antonio State hospital, Tunk State hospital, Big Spring State hospital, Austin State hospital and Abilene State hospital.

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Cavalry Will Attempt To Show It's Not Out Of Style In New Mexico Maneuvers

FORT BLISS, July 17, (AP)—The cavalry has been here within sight of the Mexican border, sabre-carrying men on horseback have been the impressive force. Now tanks, armored cars, midjet automobile and even motorcycles strike out into the desert first. Then the troopers—really mounted infantry now—come up for the fight where horses only can go.

In the World War, the cavalry had a machine-gun platoon. "The modern cavalry division now has as much firepower (the ability to throw bullets and projectiles from a variety of weapons) as an infantry division and it can move three times as fast over terrain where trucks can't go," Major General Innis P. Swift, commander of the first division, said today.

"The army is a team. Each particular branch has its function. The reason the German army has done so well is that they have a coordinated team. Most of the first cavalry division's fighting mechanism is in its reconnaissance squadrons, an all-purpose fighting unit that has 18 light tanks (13 tons each); 40 armored scout cars, each carrying four men, three with semi-automatic rifles and the fourth with a sub-machine gun.

This squadron's mission is to seek out the enemy, hold him until the horse drawn artillery and the cavalrymen, who fight dismounted, can contact him. Then the reconnaissance squadron slips out to harry the flanks.

In the war games here, both the first cavalry division and the 56th cavalry brigade (federalized Texas National Guard), which is the "enemy," have been assigned light commercial airplanes, manned by civilian pilots, to test the ship's usefulness as behind-the-front-line couriers.

Incidentally, he writes a golf column for the Avalanche-Journal at Lubbock and the other day a reader wrote in to the paper suggesting that the column of Collier Parris, sports editor, be dropped in favor of Charley's comments. Oh, well, maybe Collier can play golf better than Akey.

We left Bob hanging fire in the second paragraph. He's taking off today for Ruidosa with his family. The other night he took in the baseball game and for the first time saw Big Spring win a game although he had seen many tilts here before he moved to Dallas. Big Spring always lost when he turned out.

Maybe this isn't entirely sports, but concerning the new Wright Aeronautical Corp. plant near Cincinnati, it is said that there is enough floor space for all 16 of the major league teams to play eight simultaneous games with 240,000 spectators on hand and still have enough space left for a college football game. The plant only has 212,000 square feet of floor space.

Ever get a gripe on at the official scorer at a baseball game? It's simple, this keeping a box score and any fool ought to be able to do it. For instance, John Jones raps out a single to short and he hustles over to stop it but doesn't pick it up in time for the throw. Then John tears out for second on the next pitch. The catcher fools around, thinking he has lots of time, and John is safe. Tom Brown, next up, hits a single, tries to stretch it to second and is tagged out while oversteering. Of course, Jones came home, Bill Smith lines one out that hits the ump. The pitch to Joe Jenks is so wide it gets by the catcher and Smith goes to second. Jenks lays one down so that Smith is safe on a play at third. Sam Sampson is safe when the third baseman holds the ball too long in keeping Smith on third. Hank Green loops one to right field and Smith scores after the catch. Andy Anderson strikes out and the catcher misses the ball, but pegs to first to retire the side.

How would you score it? Probably Jones earned a hit if there was doubt as to whether he had handled such hard hit ball in time to retire him. He does not, however, get credit for stealing a base for alert playing would have caught him out. Brown, being out on his time at bat, gets credit for a single and let's say the second baseman a put out and the centerfielder an assist. Smith hit the ump so he gets credit for a single.

That pitch to Joe Jenks is scored as a wild pitch and an error against the pitcher because Smith advanced to second. In laying one down, Jenks gets credit for a sacrifice but is charged with a time at bat and no hit. Had there been two outs he could have had no credit for a sacrifice.

Sampson gets no hit and the third baseman gets an error because he should have thrown Sampson out. Green gets no sacrifice on his fly ball—for there isn't any such rule anymore. The right fielder gets a putout. On Anderson's play, would you give the pitcher credit for a strikeout? The answer is "yes." But the catcher, instead of getting the put out, gets an assist in this case while the first baseman gets the put out. Two runs came in, remember. How many were batted in, and how many earned. Two were batted in and only one was earned. In the latter case the side should have been retired before the second run was made. These are just a few problems. Simple, aren't they? Yanks Begin Putting It On Ice, But Brooklyn Wavers

The latest report on the major league races is that they probably are going to follow the same pattern that everybody was accustomed to before last year.

The powerful New York Yankees are right on the verge of running away from the rest of the American league while the National league is in the throes of another one of those push-and-pull struggles that very likely may last right down to the finish in September.

The bombers from the Bronx blasted out a 10-3 victory over the Cleveland Indians yesterday in the first tussle of their three game double and cleared up most of the doubt about their being the best club in the league.

With Joe DiMaggio hitting a double and two singles to stretch his hitting streak to 56 consecutive games, and Charley Keller smashing out a triple and his 20th home run of the year, the Yankees rode rough shod to their eighth triumph in 11 games against the Indians this season and increased their first place margin to six full games.

On the other hand the Dodgers, who had a chance to bottle up the senior circuit just as completely, were rained 7-4 by the St. Louis Cardinals and had their lead cut to three games last night.

The New York Giants straved off the Cincinnati Reds' threat at third place in the senior loop by whipping Bucky Walters 7-4.

Pittsburgh and Boston divided a doubleheader, Jim Tobin pitching the Braves to a 4-1 triumph in the first game and then the Pirates rallying with seven runs in the seventh inning of the nightcap to win 13-5.

The Chicago Cubs captured a 9-5 decision over the hapless Philadelphia Phillies in their great game, Charley Root gathering in the 198th triumph of his career although needing help. He also contributed a home run to his own cause.

In the other American league games the Boston Red Sox edged out the Chicago White Sox, 3-1 and the St. Louis Browns overpowered the Philadelphia Athletics, 11-2.

Why did he give up a promising grid career at one of the plush West Coast schools? Well, his Dad thought enough of his chances on the diamond to give him his choice of college football or pro baseball. Without hesitating, Mel chose the latter.

It was sort of a case of "it might have been" so far as Mel's father was concerned. The elder Reeves had a good start in baseball himself but gave it up and married instead. He was going to play second base when Young Cupid dealt him the knockout blow.

Mel has played baseball most of his life but never tried to compete in actual organized setups until he was well on his way in high school. He wound up by playing first base and outfield during the duration of his school work.

He was offered scholarships by St. Mary's, California University,



and San Francisco State Teachers. Each chance, though, stipulated that he should play football as well as baseball. Mel had an idea they wanted him more for his gridiron work than for baseball and gave up the idea of accepting any of them.

In 1940, Mel played with Los Angeles in the winter league, stationed at San Francisco. He held down the centerfield spot on that particular club.

But, Mel counts a happening in a Saturday game as the high point of his career thus far. He hit a ball for 424 feet in San Francisco's Seal stadium in 1939.

Right now, Mel is not backward about admitting his hitting is not so good. But, he knows it is merely the bane of all baseballers, a slump, that has him in its grip.

Signed up and playing with the Santa Barbara club in the California State league during the forepart of this season, Mel had a batting average of .332. He doesn't know what happened to him but he is certain it will not be permanent. In the meantime, the left-hander is keeping at it full steam and hoping for that day when he regains his hitting eye—and, as determined as he is, he'll do it.

Currently, Mel is the Bomber utility man. He can handle the outfield or infield and can even take his trick on the mound.

Reeves is 20 years old, born December 4, 1920, at San Francisco. He's not an excessively big fellow, yet he's not so small—he has 180 pounds of good solid brawn spread over a six-foot frame.

Like all baseballers, Mel has one pet superstition. He is strictly against having his uniform cleaned. It seems he was scheduled to pitch in a big Sunday game at Jackson, Calif. his home. Getting ready for the big occasion, Mel had his suit nicely cleaned. When time came for the engagement, Mel strolled out to the mound, then came off with a resounding thwack—the opposition had blasted him off the hill. Therefore, Mel would just as soon his suit was hidden when the laundryman comes around.

WASHINGTON—Here and there in Capital Town:

They had driven miles along the main highway and had stopped "for gas—at 15 cents a gallon. When traffic got thicker, they turned into a back road, stopped again for gas, 19 cents.

Henderson's father-in-law said. He was mumbling and grumbling, but all of a sudden he turned to his wife.

"I wonder," he said hopefully, "if Leon can't do something about this."

Bomber Killers

I saw a report recently that Ankara, Turkey, was the most rumormongering city in the world, but it can't have much on Washington. I don't think anybody would pay much attention to any of the rumors if it weren't for the fact that occasionally one comes along like the day-ahead rumor that the U. S. would occupy Ireland.

More often, the rumors are wrong. So there has sprung up in the capital an army of rumor killers—folks who take it on themselves to squelch wild stories.

For example, two rumors that I have heard lately are that (1) Winston Churchill won't be prime minister two months from now; (2) William S. Knudsen won't be production chief half that long. With a single barrel, the rumor-killers have left these two riddled to the ears. In each case, they ask the question: Who would be put in his place?

In many cases, rumors can be

Answer To A Gripe

That old advice to the effect that "if you have a gripe, write your congressman," doesn't apply to the army.

The other day, Sen. Harry S. Truman of Missouri got a letter from a lieutenant in training, taking the government apart for some of its policies, foreign and domestic. What the senator, a colonel in the reserve corps, wrote back was:

Dear Lieutenant:

While I was a lieutenant of field artillery in training at Fort Sill in 1917 and later a captain in France, it never would have occurred to me to write a letter to my senator and give him my opinions on the state of the nation.

"First, I was too busy with the job in hand. Second, I didn't feel qualified, and third, there was something in army regulations which said that an officer in the army should not express opinions on political subjects.

"Things may be different now. The younger officers may be smarter; they may have more time, and the regulations may not be enforced. In any case, while I am now a colonel in the field artillery reserve, I would not presume, were I on active duty, to write back to Washington and advise my colleagues on foreign policy. I would be too busy training my regiment."

I don't know about the rest of it, but the senator surely knows his army regulations.

Editorial — BIG SPRING BENEFITS FROM PILOT TRAINING PROGRAM

When it comes to directly sharing in the benefits of the national defense program, Big Spring must look to the air. For what we are getting—and it looks like what we may hope to get—will be in an aviation line.

Right now an extensive program of improvements costing well over half a million dollars is underway at the port. This has been well publicized and there's not much use going into it again.

There is another phase, however, with which the public is not so familiar. It is the Civilian Pilot Training program. Big Spring has been almost a pioneer in certain phases of this work and has

realized considerable from it. Meeting the demands of the CAB for adequately handling a CPT program, Art Wintheliser, manager of the airport and head of the Big Spring Flying Service, has accumulated eight airplanes for use. Two more are contemplated to meet demands of additional work.

During the past year the government expended approximately \$39,000 in flight training here for young men and women taking primary courses and in those taking re-ratings and secondary training. Dr. P. W. Malone, coordinator, has estimated that on the basis of the way in which the program now is materializing, training expenditures of around \$100,000 to

\$150,000 may be expected here in the year ahead.

All of this is coming at little or no cost to the community. Yet it serves a double purpose of making this a civilian air center and of helping the community share in the defense program, both by contributing needed pilot material and by receiving welcome expenditures.

Now the government is letting down educational bars, a sign that the program is to be further stimulated. Youths with brains, ambition and aptitude will have a chance now to become professional pilots. We submit that it would be a wise policy to extend every practical cooperation to the CAB in further developing the Civilian Pilot Program in Big Spring.

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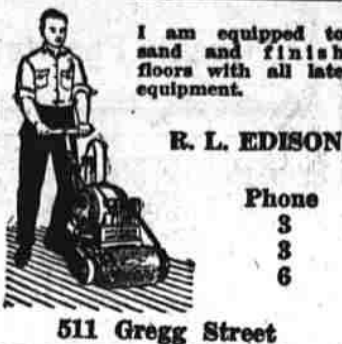

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Would-Be Fliers With Ailments Find A Real Friend In Dr. StrongBy HERMAN ALLEN

NEW YORK—A 22-year-old husky tracked out to Mitchell Field a while back and said he wanted to be an army flier.

The army folks said fine, they needed fliers badly. They turned him over to the medical examiners, who beamed with delight at the sight of his stout frame. They checked him over: eyes, 100 per cent; heart, perfect; nerves, steady as a rock; lungs, ears, nose ... A-1! But—oh—what's this?

Down near the base of the young giant's spine the doctors found a tiny spot, hardly larger than a pinhead—the outcropping of a cyst, exclaiming—700 fewer than the quota. "Sorry, son, we can't use you."

"But—gee—I want to be a flier!" "Sorry—that thing might cause trouble later on. We just can't take the chance, but here's what you do—You take this card over to the American Flying Services Foundation."

"American Flying Services Foundation? What's that?"

"Well, it's an outfit that helps fellows like you get into the flying services. You go and see them."

The war department wants 30,000 fliers this year, an average of 280 a month from each of the nine "corps areas."

Yet, in the First Corps Area (New York, New Jersey, Delaware) only 420 applicants passed the stiff physical educational exams—700 fewer than the quota. In April only 34 passed.

To Dr. S. M. Strong, brisk, pin-nosed retired army surgeon, this was alarming. He checked up and learned the army (and the navy) was having similar difficulty all over the country. He got together with H. L. Roberts, commander of the New York Aviators Post of the American Legion.

They decided to work out a way to help youngsters who had physical defects that could be corrected or who needed brushing up to pass the educational tests. The result was the Flying Services Foundation, with Roberts as chairman and Dr. Strong as medical chairman.

Dr. Strong continued the story of the young man with the cyst. "We examined that cyst further and decided there was a very good chance it could be operated on successfully. The arrangements were made and in a few months we hope the army will have another flier."

Service medical examiners at first were hostile when Dr. Strong asked them not to reject a candidate immediately when they found a defect that might be remedied. When he convinced them he was merely trying to boost the number of acceptable applicants, they wholeheartedly agreed to finish the examination and submit a full report to the Foundation.
