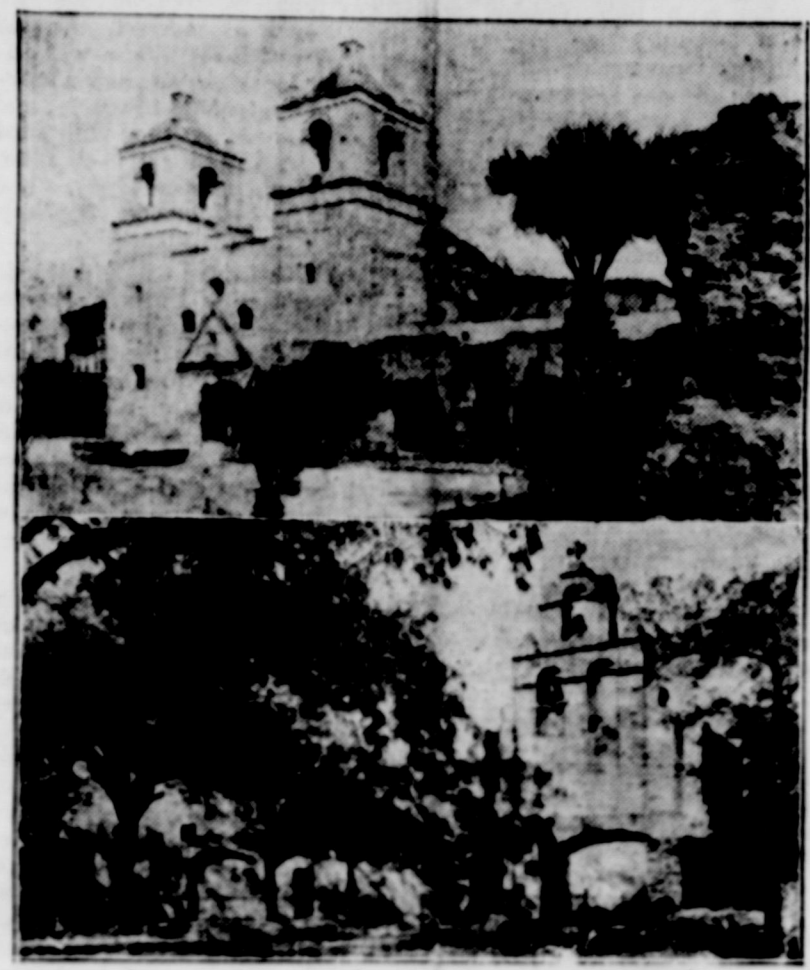
Start Drive To Eradicate T. B.

BABY BONDS NOW ON SALE AT P. O.; DENOMINATIONS \$25 TO \$1000

All Information Can Be Obtained From Postmaster Griffith

United States saving bonds in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1000 will be offered for sale, according to a bulletin posted in the Sanderson post office. The bonds will be offered for sale starting today, Friday, March 1. Postmaster Clyde Griffith stated. He also stated he expected to have the bonds here by the day of the sale for those who desire to buy them.

The selling prices of the bonds are \$18.75, \$37.50, \$75, \$375, and \$750, respectively, for the above five denominations. The bonds will mature in ten years from the first day of the months in which they are purchased.

These bonds will be redeemed by the government, if the owner desires, at any time after 60 days from date of issue. Their redemption value is at cost price during the first year, but thereafter increases every six months until the maximum return is obtained by the owner for the full ten years.

Protection against loss or destruction is afforded by registering the purchaser's name on the books of the U. S. treasury, or the government will hold the bond in safe-keeping for the owner.

It is not lawful for any one person to buy any one time to hold savings bonds issued during any one calendar year in an aggregate amount exceeding \$10,000 maturity value.

Survey Discloses Over 40,000 Over 65 Years on Relief

Data Will Be Used To Bolster Legislation For Social Security

Austin.—There are more than 40,000 persons 65 years old or older on the relief rolls of the state, results of a survey conducted by relief authorities revealed. A study of relief cases for the month of December, 1934, showed 41,787 persons in that age classification receiving public aid.

More than half, or 23,856 were men, 17,931 women. There were 9,499 single men and 9,879 single women reported. Married couples, both 65 years old or older, on the relief rolls totaled 6,358, while there were 9,693 married couple recorded in which either the man or woman had reached the age of 65.

Similar statistics were compiled on relief clients 70 years old or older. There were 24,832 such clients in December.

Bexar county had the greatest number of clients in the 65-year-old classification, 2,357. Harris county had 2,348, but Dallas county had the surprisingly low total of 813.

Relief funds required to care for these more than 40,000 relief clients in December amounted to \$528,078.50, administrators have reported.

Results of the survey will be presented to the State Board of Control and will be available to legislators interested in drafting social security legislation. Adam R. Johnson, state relief administrator, said.

After a week end of dust storms Sanderson people awakened Monday morning feeling a cold blast from winter's latest thrust. The thermometer dropped to a low level of 22 degrees above on that morning while on Tuesday morning it registered 19 degrees. A slight moderation was noticeable Wednesday when the mercury climbed back to 22 degrees.

A fortunate thing is that little cold spell was "dry" and very little loss will be suffered by ranchmen, many of whom recently sheared their goats. However, it is the consensus of opinion that a majority of lambs dropped during the cold snap will die.

The San Angelo section reported a snowfall Monday, and snow was also reported at Fort Stockton.

Damage to radiators and plumbing, which accompanied the cold wave in January, was not repeated at this time, as the mercury did not long remain under the freezing point.

Last week the slogan of the Sanderson Eagles was "On to Ft. Stockton." Helpful Household Hints

In the spring, although no poet has ever sung a song about it, the housewife's fancy seriously turns to thoughts of house cleaning, and she gets busy shining up her house. It used to be that May was a popular month for the semi-annual clean-up, but in most places the weather is too warm then for hard labor and, so, the modern mistress has advanced her cleaning time to this month.

Clean-up Needs

Of course, the most essential things at this time are plenty of cleaning rags, dust cloths, a good scrubbing brush, a mop, a broom, a dust mop, a vacuum cleaner, soap and cleaning powder. Any old underwear, pieces of sheets, etc., make good cleaning rags, and cheesecloth dust-cloths are easily procured. The best sort of scrubbing brush is one with a pointed end for reaching into corners. The broom should be firm and the dust-mop pliable so that it can be used in small spaces. There is nothing like a vacuum cleaner for upholstered furniture, rugs and drapes.

DO YOU KNOW THAT:

- Wax can be removed from cloth by placing the marred fabric between clean blotters and pressing with a hot iron?
- Adhesive tape can be removed from the skin with gasoline?
- Alcohol will take gum from cloth?
- A cloth dampened with ammonia will often restore the color to spotted clothing?
- A brush with steel bristles is

the best thing to use for cleaning suede shoes?

RECIPES—Salmon Souffle

Remove the skin and bones from the contents of one large can of salmon and separate the flakes; season with one teaspoon of salt, one-eighth teaspoon of pepper, one-half tablespoon of lemon juice and one teaspoon of finely chopped parsley.

Cook a half cup of bread crumbs in one-half cup of milk; stirring constantly; add salmon and yolks of three eggs, beaten; beat the whites of the eggs until stiff and fold into the salmon mixture.

Turn into a well greased baking dish and set in a pan of hot water; bake in a moderate oven until well puffed and firm in center. Serve at once with pimiento sauce.

Oyster Roast

Since the oyster season is so nearly over I thought that you possibly might like a new way in which to serve this delicious food before it is too late in the year; so here is an unusual recipe:

- 1 pint of oysters
 - 1/2 cup of oyster liquor
 - 1/2 cup of milk
 - 1 cup of cooked celery
 - 2 cups of cracker crumbs
 - 1/2 cup minced ripe olives
 - 4 tablespoons of fat
 - Salt and pepper to taste

EDITORIAL COMMENT

POPULARIZING BABY BONDS

United States treasury officials are working apace with plans to launch issues of government bonds in denominations as low as \$25 in order to appeal to and meet the needs of small investors. The move is a commendable one from several angles. It will not only give the purchaser a high degree of security for his savings but will give him direct and palpable interest in the financial stability of the government of the nation in which he is a citizen and voter.

But have the sponsors considered what would be really the greatest action the United States could take toward making government bonds really attractive to the small investors who should be thus interested in their government? The first desideratum, of course, is security, and this will have to be buttressed sooner or later by bringing the budget into balance, but this appeals equally to little or big investors. And what is it that makes big investors want government bonds?

For many the most attractive feature about them is their tax exemption. But is this any inducement to the small investor? Practically none. The wealthy man whose income tax is in the higher brackets, by foregoing a few hundred dollars in the interest rate, saves himself thousands of dollars in taxes. To the small saver the tax exemption means only that the government pays him a smaller return than it would pay if it collected the proper tax on all investments alike instead of selling this escape privilege.

What applies to the federal government in this regard applies equally to the state and local governments, whose humbler citizens should likewise be encouraged to take a financial stake in the good management of their public affairs. One of the surest, most effective and far-reaching means of popularizing federal, state and municipal government bonds with small investors would be to enact a statute or constitutional amendment—whichever may prove necessary—to forbid the exemption of those bonds from taxation.—Christian Science Monitor.

THE JUST WAY TO PAY

Congressional leaders appear to have made up their minds that new taxes cannot be avoided much longer. Washington dispatches say that congress is beginning to agree that all expenditures above budget estimates will have to be matched with new revenues, and re-enactment of a number of "nuisance taxes" is expected before the winter ends.

A nation which is already groaning under a heavy tax load can hardly be expected to throw its hat in the air over this news. Nevertheless it is the only sensible attitude to take.

We are piling up our national debt at a prodigious rate these days. It cannot be helped, and there is nothing to do but make the best of it. But we are under the obligation to pay as we go, as far as we possibly can.

Debt increases cannot be avoided, but they should not be resorted to as long as existing sources of revenue remain untapped.—San Angelo Morning Times.

NOBODY'S BUSINESS

By JULIAN CAPERS, JR.

Austin, Feb. 18.—Appointment of Sarah T. Hughes 98-pound bundle of feminine energy and brains, who has represented Dallas county in the lower house for the past four years, to be judge of the 14th district court in Dallas county, started a train of legislative and political repercussions which still reverberate through the capital.

Gov. Allred, by naming her has gained the friendship of thousands of women in every corner of the state. She is the first regularly-appointed woman judge of a district court in Texas. She led the Allred forces in their floor fight when the 44th legislature convened to supplant Coke Stevenson of Junction as speaker with Bob Calvert of Hillsboro, despite her personal friendship for Stevenson. She lost that fight as she has lost many others during the past four years—but not until her opponents realized they had been in a real scrap. She is recognized in Austin as one of a group of half a dozen able leaders who really "run" the house.

Sen. Claud Westerfeld of Dallas, a newcomer to the senate this year, took a political spanking over Mrs. Hughes' appointment. He did not favor her. When the appointment went to the senate he gave out a sarcastic interview, declaring she "ought to be at home in the kitchen washing dishes." Then he said she was temperamentally unfitted to be a judge. Then he said he would claim time-honored "senatorial courtesy" to invoke an adverse vote on her confirmation.

Each of these moves was a mistake. When he tried to relegate Sarah to the kitchen sink by a newspaper interview, women all over Texas went into action and poured thousands of letters and telegrams into their senators in her behalf.

The senate put "on the spot" turned on the Dallas senator. Had Westerfeld been politically wise enough to have kept quiet, he might have gone before the committee on nominations, claimed senatorial courtesy, and doubtless his colleagues' honored custom of satisfying a fellow senator about appointments in his district. But not after he had turned the wrath of the womanhood of the state loose upon their senatorial heads. So they opened the committee hearings to the public—and unprecedented procedure.

Harry P. Lawther of Dallas, once president of the State Bar association, appeared as the only protestant against Mrs. Hughes' confirmation. He was not impressive when the committee caused him to admit, in effect, that he didn't favor Mrs. Hughes because she hadn't voted for a bill he advocated at a previous session.

Westerfeld saw C. F. Cusack, his manager in the runoff primary last summer, appear and testify in Mrs. Hughes' behalf. Later it developed that Cusack wanted to run for Mrs. Hughes' seat. The committee reported her favorably, and the senate overwhelmingly confirmed her. An aftermath was the publication in a Houston newspaper of the supposedly secret vote on her confirmation. The august senators grumbled the reporter for an hour then decided he had violated no rule, but had ignored an ancient custom, and outsmarted them. So they will take steps to prevent that happening again.

A more important effect of the Hughes incident was a healing of the breach between the house and senate. More than 100 house members had signed a petition indorsing Mrs. Hughes. Her rejection by the senate would have put many of the house members on the warpath, and might have blocked legislation with another impasse between the two houses, such as marked the last special session. The house was openly jubilant at the senate's confirmation, and now house, senate, and the governor are all filled with good will toward mankind and each other. Only Westerfeld is unhappy—and nobody is helping him be that way.

Rep. Tom Cooper of Lindale, in "deep East Texas," himself a newspaperman is sponsoring a joint resolution in which the legislature invites President Roosevelt, Vice President Garner and members of congress to Texas for the Centennial in 1936. The invitation will be presented by the delegation aboard the Texas Press Centennial special train in late April.

For a freshman legislator, Rep. Fred Harris of Dallas has achieved a signal distinction by writing and obtaining a unanimously favorable report from the highways committee for a drivers' license law. Harris' vigorous presentation of carefully gathered statistical information on highway accidents, showing that the people of small towns and rural sections are more often the victims of irresponsible motor car drivers than residents of cities with traffic regulations, won over his colleagues from the rural districts, who have consistently opposed a drivers' license law in the past. His bill provides enforcement by a vehicle commissioner, who can suspend the license

"It will reduce motor accidents on Texas highways from 10 to 30 per cent," says Harris, and many house members agree with him. He has the support of the Parent-Teacher organizations, automobile clubs and of numerous other powerful groups throughout the state for his bill, which comes up in the house in the near future, with excellent prospects of passage.

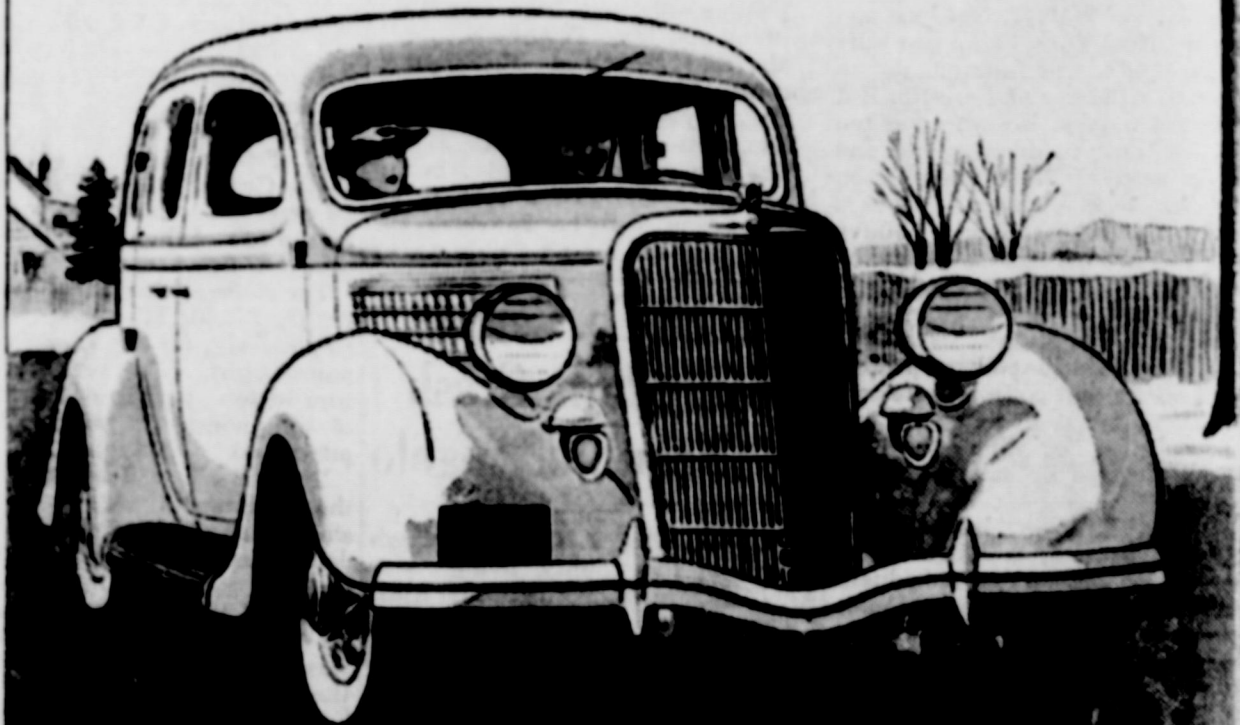

ALLRED INVITES GOVERNORS OF 47 STATES TO CENTENNIAL, 1936

States Also Invited to Send Exhibits to the Central Exposition.

Dallas, Feb. 25.—Texas, preparing to welcome the world within its portals in 1936 for the statewide celebration of its Centennial, is looking to her sister States to participate actively in the commemoration of the achievements of her independence.

To this end, Walter D. Cline, managing director, has sent letters to the governors of 47 other states requesting them to take suitable action to assure exhibits from their respective commonwealths at the forthcoming central exposition at Dallas. Mr. Cline pointed out that most of the state legislatures now are in session and that makes the present an appropriate time to submit to them the matter of state exhibits, in order that they may make adequate provision of funds, through appropriation, in the several states, for such exhibits.

Mr. Cline is authority for the assertion that the central exposition may provide a separate building to house such state exhibits, although at other expositions some of the states have erected their own separate structures for that purpose. California and Florida customarily prefer separate exhibits, he said.

Mr. Cline's action, together with that of the Texas Centennial Commission in sending out formal invitations, signed by Governor James V. Allred of Texas, to all the governors of the states to attend personally the Texas celebrations, constitutes the state's first official proclamation to the world that Texas' Centennial of 1836 is nearing a reality and, in the near future, will have become an accomplished fact.

The world is being put on notice that Texas expects its citizens to come and view its wonders and possibilities and that Texas is preparing to act in accord with the words of its governor, who has urged that "during the Centennial we should let our visitors know that all Texans are a friendly people."

Thus merchants and manufacturers, outside of Texas, are informed that in Texas through the Centennial, they are to be afforded a splendid opportunity to contact personally and demonstrate their merchandise and products to over 6,000,000 Texans and millions of transients, visiting the state during the Centennial year.

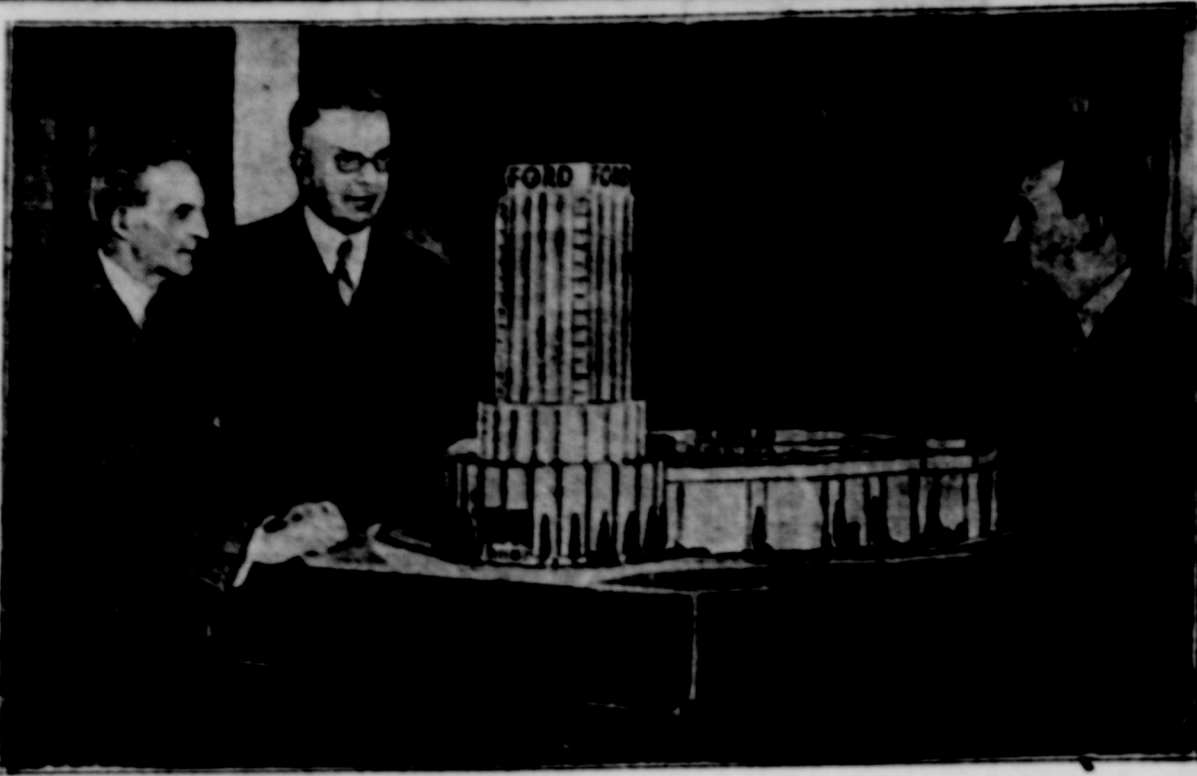
\$50 PRIZE AT PRINCESS

The Fords Plan Their San Diego Exhibit

Both Henry Ford and Edsel B. Ford, president of the Ford Motor company will visit the California Pacific Exposition this summer to make final arrangements for the Ford exhibit.

Mr. Davidson told the Fords that it is hoped that the exposition will make a definite contribution toward world amity, as the assembly of more than 80 representatives of

countries whose shores line the Pacific Ocean, is bound to bring about greater understanding and good will.

The building that is to house the Ford exhibit is to be a permanent structure that will remain in beautiful Balboa Park, site of the exposition, after the show is over, and the exhibit removed. A huge circular building, partially roofed, is fronted by a tower rising from what appear to be two immense gears, one inside the other. The building, architecturally, is done in the modern motif, but its open court, in the center, is characteristic of the Spanish and Mexican types of architecture that dominate the exposition.

A special feature of the Ford ex-

hibition will be a series of dioramas showing in pictured story life in the principal Pacific Ocean countries.

Inside the main section will be two great corridors. Along one will be shown the actual manufacture of Ford parts, including the rolling of steel and some of the more interesting foundry operations, such as die-casting. In the other corridor will be grouped a number of exhibits showing the technical development of the Ford car—torsion, tensile and other tests of steel; ball-bearing and piston-ring tests, and inspection; methods of testing the action of weather on upholstery and other features. Construction of the Ford exhibit will start immediately.
