CISCO FLIER IN ENGLAND EARNS MEDAL

Guest James H. Waters, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. E. Waters of Cisco, and with the eighth army in Europe in England, writes his parents that he has just been awarded an air medal upon which these words are engraved: "The coolness, courage and gall displayed by this officer reflect great credit upon himself and the air forces of the United States." Waters and members of the 93d bomber group also possess two presidential citations.

Lieutenant Waters, who was born and reared in Cisco, entered the service about three years ago. He is a graduate of Austin high school and visited Cisco and home last summer. He is 24 years of age.

FRIDAY BE WORLDWIDE PRAYER DAY

Cisco churches will observe World Day of Prayer Friday in a meeting at First Christian church beginning at 10 a. m.

This round-the-world religious movement is now in its 17th year and is celebrated in fifty languages. It is stated that the services Friday will start in the Fiji Islands and close in Alaska.

Mrs. John Shertzer is president of the Cisco organization — known as Cisco Council of Church Women — and will direct the meeting.

An elaborate program has been arranged to center around the theme, "And the Lord Wondered That There Was No Intercession." Rev. J. R. Wright, Rev. Leslie Seymour, Mrs. W. H. Cole, Mrs. J. M. Latimer and Mrs. W. W. Wallace are among those who will take part in the celebration.

Mrs. Shertzer expressed the hope that there will be a large attendance of Cisco church members and serious minded citizens on this day set apart for prayer and petitions for divine guidance.

RISEING STAR BUYS SECOND GAS SYSTEM

For a cash consideration of \$10,000, the city of Rising Star this week acquired title to the city distribution system of the Southwest Natural Gas Co., transfer of the property being as of February 20, says today's Rising Star Record.

Continuing, the Record said: The Southwest Gas Co. acquired the franchise and distribution system here by purchase from Tom Bryant in 1927, and had the field to themselves until 1934, when the city, during the administration of W. E. Tyler as mayor, entered the field with another system. Both systems have operated here since that time.

CROSS PLAINS-DE LEON R. R. QUILTS MAR. 15

CROSS PLAINS, Feb. 24. — Freight patrons of the Katy railroad have been notified that train service will be discontinued on the DeLeon-Cross Plains branch on March 15.

It has not been learned when the work of taking up the rails and salvaging other materials will start.

MANY CIVILIANS SLAIN. MOSCOW, Feb. 24. — A Red Star dispatch from Krivoi Rog said the Germans had destroyed that mining center in the Dnieper bend and executed 17,000 Russian civilians and buried them in a mine at Valiavka.

TOJO THE GOAT. CHUNGKING, Feb. 24. — Reports from Shanghai by the Central News Agency declared today that "a movement to overthrow that 'a movement to overthrow Premier Tojo is spreading throughout Japan," where conditions were said to be growing "increasingly unstable."

POSTWAR HIGHWAY MEETING ON SATURDAY

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 24. — Plans for postwar improvement on the highways and adjacent land will be discussed by board members of the Texas roadside development program here Saturday, Mrs. Frank Sorell, past state chairman and organizer of the program, announced here today.

Other board members here for the meeting will include Judge W. R. Ely of Abilene, present chairman of the organization; Gibb Gilchrist, dean of engineers of Texas A&M College and past state engineer of Texas highways; Mrs. I. B. McFarland of Houston, past state chairman for the group and Mrs. Jerry E. Stillwell of Dallas.

WASHINGTON AGOG. WASHINGTON, Feb. 24. — Political weather vane spun in all directions today as congressional and other leaders strove to assay the political effects of Senator Barkley's break with the white house on Mr. Roosevelt's fourth term prospects. Some antifour-termers and lukewarm administration followers believed Barkley's stand will slow up or actually "jeopardize" the president's re-nomination.

JAP OUTER BASES NOW IN REACH

Japan's outer defense bulwark in the Marshall, Caroline and Marianas Islands lay under the range of American bombs and guns today over a vast stretch of Pacific reaching to within 1300 miles of Tokyo.

American naval-air forces, unchecked in the Central Pacific, reached out a vengeful arm some 700 miles beyond the great base of Truk to smash at Saipan and Tinian in the Marianas.

These important secondary bases, lying closer to Tokyo than the former American possession of Guam, may have sheltered units of the Japanese fleet that escaped the previous assault on Truk. Radio silence from the task force which sent hundreds of planes against the Carolines delayed news of what further blow had been dealt to Japanese naval strength.

RED ADVANCE CONTINUES ON ALL FRONTS

MOSCOW, Feb. 24.—Red Army assault forces were reported blasting their way through Dno today in violent street fighting that presaged the imminent capture of the rail hub on the way to Pskov, against which two other armies were closing from the north and northeast.

The Germans are fighting fiercely in an attempt to cover the approaches of Pskov, gateway to the Baltic states. The expected fall of Pskov would pull the underpinning out of the entire Nazi defense system on the northern front.

Berlin said Russia is massing powerful forces on the central front in preparation for large scale attacks which would put the whole battle line in Russia on the move.

NEGRO NAVAL OFFICERS. WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—For the first time in its history, the navy is going to have Negro commissioned officers. The navy department has announced that it is now selecting Negro candidates for commissioning as officers in the U. S. Naval Reserve to fill approximately 22 available billets.

SENATOR BARKLEY RESIGNED AS DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY LEADER; WAS RE-ELECTED AND ACCEPTED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24. — The house today overrode President Roosevelt's veto of the more than two billion dollar tax bill by a vote of 299 to 95. The senate is expected to take a similar slap at the chief executive tomorrow.

In a caucus of senators this morning, Senator Alben Barkley of Kentucky, Democratic majority leader, resigned that post following his vitriolic break with President Roosevelt yesterday. He was unanimously re-elected by the group and agreed to accept.

In the house, tall, lanky, vigorous Representative Dougherty of North Carolina, 80-year-old chairman of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee, who has carried the President's banner in many tax battles, declared he and Roosevelt had "parted company" on the present issue, and he led the House parade to override the executive.

While the political repercussions may bear more profoundly on the coming campaign, the immediate effect of the uprising, so far as the average citizen is concerned, is that the new revenue bill undoubtedly will become law.

This will raise the government's wartime income above \$42,000,000,000 annually. The statute would provide:

1. An increase in individual income taxes of \$664,900,000.
2. Much higher excise levies on so-called luxuries, including a boost in the liquor tax from \$6 to \$9 a gallon, effective April 1. This is expected to yield an additional \$1,051,300,000.
3. Postal rates boosted in several categories, to the extent of \$96,900,000. However, the out-of-town letter rate remains at 3 cents.
4. The social security payroll tax frozen at 1 per cent for employer and employee, instead of rising to 2 per cent each. This provision was a principal irritant to Roosevelt.
5. Numerous changes in the war contracts renegotiation law, including an amendment which opens the way for contractors to appeal to the courts for renegotiations they consider unfair.
6. The corporation excess profits tax is raised from 90 per cent to 95.

The measure embodies no increase in corporation normal taxes. There is no sales tax.

Individual income tax changes would not affect the 1943 returns due this March 15. Henceforth, however, taxpayers would not be allowed the customary 10 per cent credit for earned income, nor would they be allowed to make deductions in income tax computations for federal excise taxes they have paid.

ALLIES FRUSTRATE LATEST ANZIO ATTACK

NAPLES, Feb. 24.—Allied gunfire beat off new German attacks on the Anzio beachhead front and broke up another enemy attempt to reform for a third major onslaught against the 5th Army line, it was disclosed today.

Sharp localized fighting flared upon both flanks of the rain-lashed beach-head yesterday as German skirmishes probed vainly for a weak spot in the Allied lines around Aprilia and Cisterna.

American and British infantry, fighting in ankle-deep mud, beat off the enemy thrusts, however, aided by a blinding mid-day rain-storm that grounded the Luftwaffe's low-flying attack bombers.

At the same time, the big field guns of the 5th Army for the second time in three days broke up a big concentration of Nazi tanks and infantrymen massing in the Aprilia area for another large-scale thrust down the Aprilia-Anzio road.

On the main 5th Army front in the south, Allied and German patrols clashed repeatedly in the Cassino sector while both sides maintained a constant artillery duel over the battle lines.

CHOOSE YOUR GOVERNMENT NOW.

Fifteen states have endorsed the proposal to limit by constitutional amendment the peacetime taxing power of the federal government to twenty-five per cent on income, gifts, and inheritances. The issue is not merely one of taxes. The people of this country must decide what kind of government they will have after the war.

Robert B. Dresser stated the issue clearly when he said: "Necessarily involved in this controversy as to taxes is the question of whether our system of free enterprise is to be replaced by national socialism. Under free enterprise the capital required to provide jobs is furnished by the individual, and ownership of the business is in him. Under socialism the capital is furnished by the government, and it becomes the owner."

There is only so much capital in the nation. If the taxing policies of government result in government absorption of private capital, the nation automatically becomes socialistic. This country is headed that way. American Federation of Labor spokesmen observed in 1940: "As labor and industry survey what has happened to labor and industry in those lands where all powers have been concentrated in the central authority, they fear and oppose the steps which thus far have been taken here, to enlarge the dominion of the Federal government over the lives and fortunes of the American people."

Since 1940, momentum toward the socialized state in America has increased—wholly apart from the war emergency.

UNFORCED THINKING.

In an interesting and thoughtful letter from the front, a young soldier begs us "as newspaper people, please try to force our people to think. That's your great responsibility to the community and to the nation."

What he wants us all to think about is the necessity of nations working together, after the war as well as in it. If we don't, he says, "we shall repeat the tragic blunder of 1919 and our souls will be eaten out with the frustrating sense of having fought a second war-without-a-purpose."

He's right about wanting us to think, but wrong about asking anyone to "force people to think." Forced thinking, like forced labor of any kind, would be unsatisfactory. One thing a democracy does not do is to try to force any man, woman or child to think in any direction counter to his own will or belief. Persuasion is another matter.

Perhaps it is the duty of every newspaper to stimulate its readers to think. To lay down facts before them, ask a pointed question occasionally, and thus encourage them to think for themselves. Do they want a world of bickering, of war preparation in secret places, of fear, of hate, and of war again in the end? Or do they want a world of live-and-let-live, of team work, of brotherhood?

If Americans will think for themselves about these things, we shall have a good world, a good America, and a lasting peace.

FARMER'S ACE.

A wholesome change is taking place on the farm. Farmers are growing wary of centralized government control. After a decade of trying to fit their existence to the dictates of politics rather than natural laws, the farmers are fed up. Their attitude is best exemplified in their battle against subsidies.

Farmers in the future are going to have to depend upon themselves to an increasing extent in reaching sound solutions on agricultural problems. This does not mean that each farmer will have to fight his battle alone. That day is long past. He can now turn to such farmer-owned business organizations as the marketing cooperatives. The co-ops help him sell his produce at a fair price. They strive to stabilize supply and demand, while leaving the farmer free to concentrate on the job of production.

The marketing cooperatives will prove to be the farmer's ace in the hole when disillusionment with "super" government becomes complete.

WAR RELIEF.

It is not only necessary for the American people to win this war, but desirable to do considerable wiping up around the edges in the progress of the big job. Congress has faced this problem intelligently in voting the expenditure of \$1,350,000,000 for participation in the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration. The Senate has followed the House with a vote of 47 to 14. The House was unanimous about it, but the Senate has done well enough.

Along with such an international commitment, there need be no doubt that, while the great war is in progress and when it is over, this nation's wounds will be bound up and the widow and orphan will be cared for.

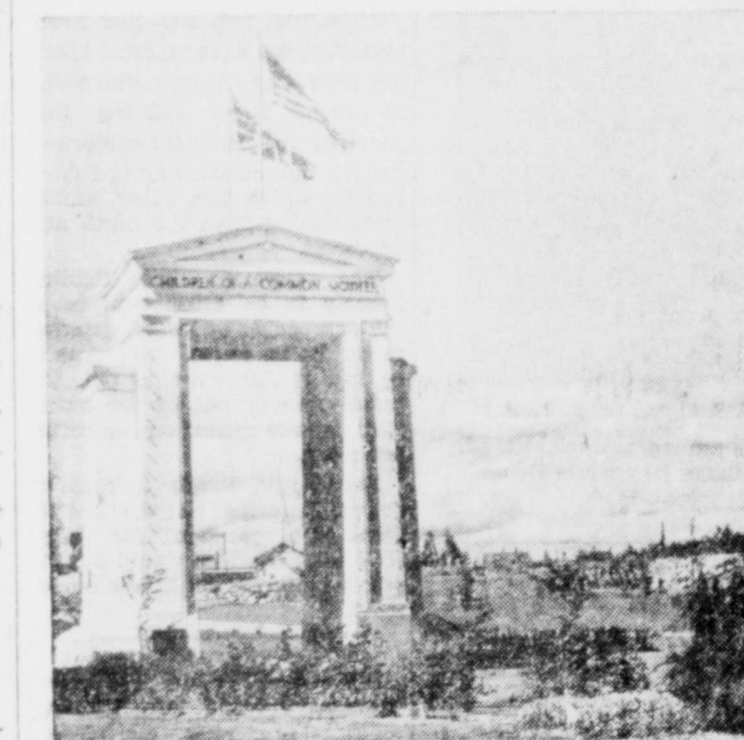
