The School Trustees of the various School Districts of Kimble County are hereby notified that it is their duty under the recent school laws to order elections for School Trustees, post notices of same and appoint Election Officers to hold said election the first Tuesday in April. Any person desiring to hold an election for Trustees may call at my office for the Election Supplies, as I have them on hand.

You are further notified that the Scholastic Census of the children of Kimble County must be taken during the month of March, and will include all children who will be seven and under eighteen years of age on September 1, 1916. All parents and guardians are especially requested to see that their children are enumerated during the month of March.

You are further informed that the State apportionment reported to me by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction was \$7.00. And now he reports to the County Depository \$6.00, claiming that \$1.00 must be applied to last year's deficiency, thus making the funds of the various schools short \$1.00 per capita.

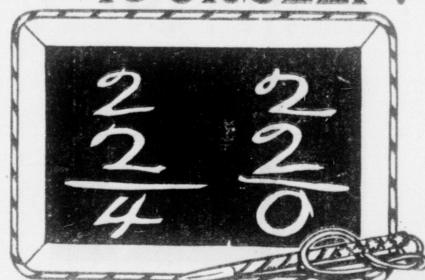
