New At ASCS

Stewart Hired As County Director

New county executive director for Mitchell County Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service is Donald E. Stewart.

His appointment, announced Saturday by Curtis E. Latimer, chairman of ASCS county committee, will be effective Sept. 8.

An employee of ASCS for nine years, Stewart will be moving here from Marfa where he is now serving as county executive director of Presidio Jeff Davis ASCS Committee.

Stewart was graduated from Fluvanna High School in 1955 and received a bachelor of science degree from Sul Ross University where he studied agriculture, history and English.

He began his employment with ASCS as an assistant performance supervisor and general clerk in Borden County. He moved to Martin County and then returned to Borden County ASCS before returning to college for work toward his BS degree.

Later he worked in Pecos County, trained in Dawson ASCS and then became county office manager in McMullen. In 1967 he moved to Marfa as county executive director for Presidio Jeff Davis ASCS.

He is currently serving as vice president of Marfa Lions Club. He and his family are affiliated with the Baptist Church.

Mrs. Stewart, a graduate of Texas Tech University has taught six years, both in elementary and secondary grades. A member of Marfa High School faculty until this year, she is now writing a thesis for master's degree from Sul Ross.

They have two daughters, Sundee, 11-year-old fifth grader, and Sidney, age 7, who will begin second grade here.

Federal Food Grant To CAP

Mitchell County Community Action Program has been allotted \$6,000 in a federal emergency food grant effective Tuesday.

The allocation is to be extended over a 20-month period and will be used for temporary assistance only, said Mrs. Robert Shamburger, CAP coordinator.

Families of four or more with yearly incomes of \$3,600 or below will be eligible for the food service program, the coordinator explained.

The fund is coordinated with existing government food programs and is planned as a supplement for those programs. Applications will be made through CAP office on East 10th Street.

Local allocation is a part of a \$55,000 grant approved by Office of Economics Organization for Abilene District-CAP which serves Taylor, Haskell and Stephens Counties as well as Mitchell.

Announcement of the federal grant was made by Congressman Omar Burlison who said the program will benefit approximately 16,000 low income residents in the four counties.

Using 1960 census figures Mrs. Shamburger estimated more than 6,000 persons in Mitchell County to be eligible for grant assistance.

Outside Exhibit Area In Museum Plans

Colorado City Museum will have an outside exhibit area at its new location at corner of Third and Oak Street.

The 50 X 50 feet space will be developed with shelters, trees, flowers and walk ways to exhibit items.

Plans for the new beautification project have been announced by members of the Museum Committee, chaired by Ralph Lee.

Clearing the asphalt and concrete covering could begin as early as next week, city officials said Wednesday, and should be completed prior to tentative dedication date Oct. 17, same day as Old Timers Reunion.

Renovation of the building, started in May, is in final stages and includes reconstructed sidewalks and entrance with wrought iron banisters and antique yard lights donated by Texas Electric Service Company.

Floor was stripped of wax and dirt, then cleaned, waxed and polished by personnel of

Colorado Independent School District and school equipment.

Glass front of the building was replaced with cedar and a door was built into the west end (leading out to the proposed exhibit area).

Exterior has been completely sandblasted, painted with a sealer and two coats of paint. Inside walls and ceiling have also been re-painted.

Much of the work has been done by city employees, according to City Manager J.A. Sadler Jr.

Jury Selection Complete

Trial Testimony Opens

Testimony in the trial of Robert Eugene Montheith and his wife Judy, will get underway Monday 10 a. m. in District Court.

The Abilene couple are on trial here for the alleged murder of their 3-month-old daughter, Stephanie, last January in Abilene.

Jury selection was completed at 7 p. m. Friday after five days of questioning for 142 of the 150 persons named to the special venire. Only eight remained on the jury list when the 12th juror was selected.

Nine jurors were selected during the first four days of the week, and the final three today.

Friday's first selection came at 4:30 p. m. as attorneys agreed on Charles Richey, 34-year-old Texas Electric Service Company employee. J. W. Boyd,

42, Loraine stock farmer, and John Stansel, 47, employee of Texas Pipeline Company, were final jurors named.

First and only juror selected in Monday's questioning was Lynn Hamilton, 47, Loraine Insurance salesman.

Named during Tuesday's session were Eldon G. Smith, 49, TESCO employee, Emory Sweat, 59, farmer and oilfield worker, Westbrook, Joe Boyd, 45, TESCO employee, and Cecil Lozano, 48-year-old maintenance man for Colorado City schools.

Defense attorney Nelson Quinn of Abilene made a motion that the jury be dismissed because the death penalty for murder constitutes cruel and unusual punishment and that improper tests were given veniremen to qualify them on the death penalty.

Quinn also claimed there were not enough women on the jury list.

Both reasons, he said, denied the defendants opportunity to

have a broad-based spectrum of the community on the jury as finally chosen.

Judge Austin McCloud overruled the defense attorney's motion and called for testimony.

Many of the women on the jury list were excused for various reasons before questioning began. Majority of those reaching the courtroom for questioning were disqualified on the death penalty.

With the exception of Lozano and another Mexican-American disqualified because he could not read or write, all members of minority races questioned disqualified themselves on the death penalty also.

Montheith, 23-year-old former Abilene High School and Abilene Christian College athlete, and his 18-year-old wife have been in Mitchell County jail since Aug. 18.

They had been in Taylor County jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond each since a few days before their infant daughter died Jan. 17.

They had been jailed on attempted murder charges before the child died in an Abilene hospital.

State alleges that the child was severely beaten Jan. 10, three days before she was hospitalized in critical condition. Criminal District Attorney Ed Paynter of Abilene is seeking the death penalty for both parents. He is being assisted by 32nd District Attorney Weldon Kirk of Sweetwater.

Court-appointed defense attorneys are Bob Hanna and Quinn of Abilene and Tom Rees of Colorado City.

New Patrolman

A third highway patrolman will join the Texas Department of Public Safety here Tuesday.

The addition of Tommy Parker to the local staff will make the largest complement of DPS officers ever to serve Mitchell County.

Parker, now of Abilene, will be working with another recent highway patrol newcomer, Randy Wilkinson, until he becomes familiar with county roads and highways.

Personnel for the three-man highway patrol station in addition to Parker and Wilkinson includes Jim Mauldin, Buddy Hertenburger is stationed here in the DPS License and Weights Division.

CAP To Initiate Health Service

An extended family health service clinic will be initiated Monday night at Medical Building (former Rhode-Cowan Clinic).

The program, an extension of well baby clinic, is being sponsored by Mitchell County Community Action Program for mothers in low income families.

The once-a-month clinic is to be open the first Monday night of each month, according to Mrs. Robert Shamburger, CAP coordinator.

"The initial meeting will be Monday night, 7:30 p. m., to avoid conflict with the Sept. 7 Labor Day holiday," Mrs. Shamburger said.

Participating doctors in the program are Dr. W. S. Rhode,

Dr. John Chinn and Dr. Joe Terry. They will be assisted by Mrs. Brice Webb, Mrs. Joe Terry and Mrs. Jean Hall, all registered nurses. A fourth assistant nurse will be named at a later date.

Monthly sessions will include counseling, medical examinations, regular clinic visits and educational programs.

Three major services of the clinic, according to CAP officials, will be cancer detection tests, pre-natal care and counseling to those who desire information about family planning.

Signs are up designating six crop demonstrations in various parts of Mitchell County.

Demonstrations, programmed through the county extension office, include varieties of grain sorghum, cotton and sudan.

Cotton variety demonstrations are spotted on Mrs. Ned Smith's land in Buford Community, farmed by James Cox, Raymond Wheeler farm north

of Loraine and Alton Raschke farm in Longfellow Community.

A sudan variety demonstration is located at Kenneth Merket farm near Loraine and a grain sorghum demonstration is being conducted by Linden Solomon on Will Berry farm in Cuthbert Community.

Yield has been determined for another grain sorghum program on Whit Holman farm in Landers Community.

Crops were planted April 20 in a two and one pattern, according to Bobby Lemons, county agent, and harvested Thursday.

Last rain for the dry land maize was 4 June 9.
