



Cattlemen Organize To Save Business

Join Independent Cattlemen's Association

"Every business in Floyd County is directly affected by the ups and downs of the livestock business," stated Bill Masterson, Guthrie, Texas cattleman as he addressed local livestock men gathered in the Lighthouse Electric community room Monday night, Feb. 24.

Concerned livestock producers, from ranchers to feed lot operators met to organize a chapter of the Independent Cattlemen's Association. This movement has grown over the state as livestock men have faced financial ruin due to lower prices for meat but higher production costs, and foreign imported meat produced at low foreign costs.

"These foreign producers pay no local taxes nor do their workers' salaries contribute to our local economy as our own would if our cattle could be furnished to the buyer," observed one livestock operator.

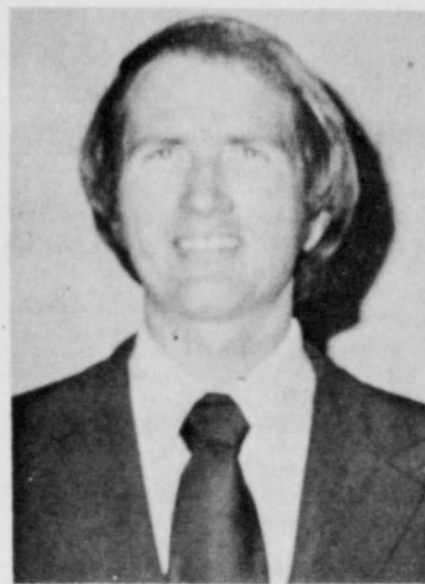
Masterson also reminded local land owners to write their state and national legislators about retaining control over their privately owned

land. In Washington's last vote on land use, private control over one's land was saved by only seven votes. Three Texas Representatives voted in favor of Federal control over private land use. This would affect urban as well as rural land. Picnickers seeing an attractive front yard in town would be able to stop and set up a picnic or tent campsite there as indiscriminately as out on private land in the country if this bill had passed.

Elected to lead the Floyd County Independent Livestock Association were L. N. Johnson, South Plains, as chairman; Q. D. Williams, Floydada, co-chairman; and Raymond Reeves, South Plains, secretary-treasurer.

Future meetings will be held in Lockney, date to be announced. Four delegates will be chosen from the county to represent the local viewpoint at the State Convention at Austin in June.

Memberships are sought among all occupations, business men as well as livestock producers.

Local Ginner Retires After 48

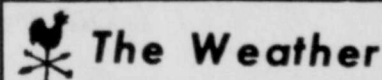
Years Service

Whirlwinds In Prep All American

Football Yearbook

Whirlwinds Mark Craig and Mike Reeves will be included in the Prep All-America Football Yearbook, 1974-75, as announced today by Coach & Athlete magazine and L. G. Wilson, Coach-AD, Floydada High School.

These athletes were nominated last December and are representative of the most outstanding football players in their school and community.

Nominations for the Prep All-America Football Program are made each year by high school coaches, sportswriters and college recruiters across the country. Upon receipt of his athletic record, each nominee is included in the Prep Football Yearbook and each was considered by the judges for Coach & Athlete's Prep All-America Football 100 Team. This national all-american team (as chosen by the Awards Selection Committee) will name the country's top 100 high school football players.

Announcement of the All-America 100 Squad will be made at the end of this month.

Criteria by which the local athletes were nominated for the program include athletic ability, statistics based on outstanding performance, and sportsmanship and personal leadership displayed during the current season. The athletic achievements of the local nominees will be presented in the 1974-75 edition of the Prep Football Yearbook to be published in July, 1975.

Sponsored by Coach & Athlete magazine, Prep All-America Football is an annual sports awards program. The purpose of the program is to promote and encourage sports achievements and individual athletic ability on the local level as well as on the national level. Heading the Awards Selection Committee that will name the top 100 high school football players is Dwight Keith, editor of Coach & Athlete.

Dear Fellow Floydadans,
Floydada people do a lot of squawking about not having enough doctors. I say that's hog wash! What we need is more juicers, not more doctors. If every home had and used a juicer (not to be confused with a blender) every day, in about one year's time the doctors and pharmacists would have to "moonlight" to make a decent living.

Those of you who enjoy being sick and paying doctor and hospital bills don't need to read the rest of this as it will only upset your so-called intelligence. You, of course, "know better." What you mean is, food is your god and anyone who dares molest his majesty is blaspheming. I know how you feel because I, too, am very guilty of living to eat instead of eating to live as our God intended. God put Adam and Eve into a garden but neglected to give them a stove and oven for some reason. How stupid of Him, huh?

One can become well or ill according to the food one consumes, and millions of people are unconsciously committing suicide daily at their own tables. Perhaps the worst — although least suspected — way to devitalize food and lower its nutritional value, that man has ever devised, was also the first — cooking. Cooking (boiling, frying, baking) lowers the nutritional value in many ways:

1. Cooking destroys all enzymes at 130 degrees.
2. Cooking destroys many nutrients, especially vitamins C and B, which are vulnerable to heat.
3. Cooking in water soaks minerals and water-soluble vitamins out of the food, which are then usually thrown away with the water.

4. Cooking changes the biochemical structure of proteins and fats and makes them more difficult to digest and assimilate. Meat and eggs should be cooked very slowly — a roast for instance for 24 hours at 160 degrees.

Just because one is still alive and so are millions of others who have eaten mostly cooked food all their lives, does that prove cooking your food is good for health? Stop and think a

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6 percent of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

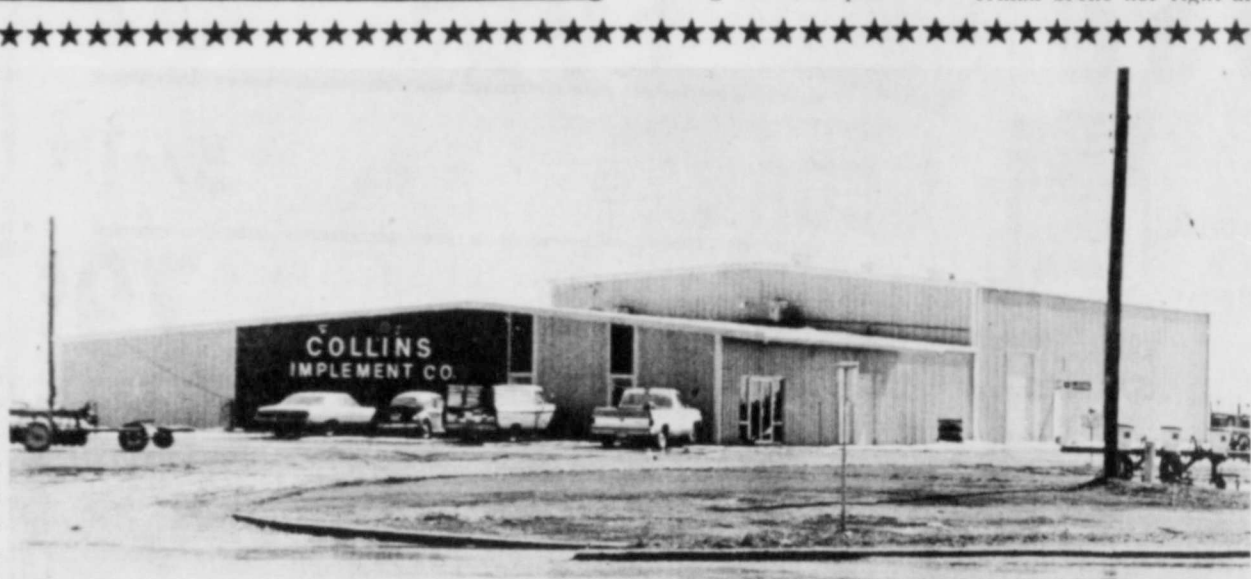

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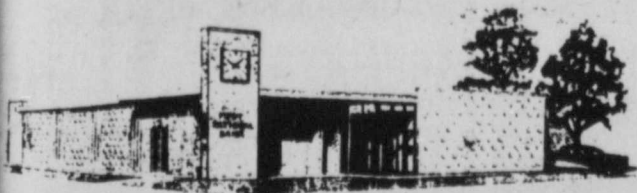

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Texas Senator Announces Candidacy For President

February 17, 1975
This past year, I have traveled to more than 30 states in a conscious effort to determine first hand the views and attitudes of the American people towards their national leadership and to ascertain if I had a constructive role to play beyond the United States Senate.

I have decided to seek the office of President of the United States.

I am convinced that Democrats of all persuasions can unite again around worthwhile ideas that can lift this country from economic recession and political paralysis.

The task before us is to restore the meaning of America's two great promises: opportunity at home and moral leadership abroad.

These are the promises

which have inspired the people of the world for generations. They brought to our shores the dispossessed, hungry millions who were seeking justice, work and freedom. Certainly, the most urgent need is to get people back to work.

Individual independence: — for those who choose to labor in our factories and in our mines, a stable and fair income in a safe working environment;

— for those who choose to operate small businesses, an assurance that diligent work will bring with it a reasonable chance for success;

— for those who wish to farm the land, the assurance that the necessary time and effort will enable them to successfully live off the land;

— for those who choose professions, a guarantee that quality education and training will be available;

— for those overtaken by serious illness, protection from the spectre of financial ruin;

— for those who have reached retirement age, confidence in the adequacy of their income and the security of their surroundings;

— and, for all people, men and women, Black and White, rich and poor, young and old, there must be full, fair and equal application and enforcement of the law of the land.

Again, jobs are our most immediate need. But economic opportunity and individual independence must remain our fundamental goals.

In foreign policy, America's performance must also relate to America's promise. We have been forced, painfully, to recognize the limits of power. And, while the United States must remain militarily secure and a formidable world leader, we must also be a farsighted leader.

We must have a foreign policy which gives as much weight to interdependence as it does to military strength.

Sadly, this world is not so peaceful a place that we can

now beat the guns into plowshares.

Rather, the world today is made up of nation states which fear each other, but which need each other.

And, it is this question of needs which we must bring to the front: the need in this country for a steady supply of raw materials; the need for greater trading opportunities for American products.

But there are other less tangible needs which rank equally in importance: a need to call attention to injustice; the need to support the legitimate aspirations of democratic societies; the need to nurture freedom within the limits of international law, and short of military adventure by any great power; and the need to abide by our own laws as well as our treaty obligations.

These are the needs of America's conscience. This also is what America's promise is all about, and to ignore this fact is to ignore some of the most noble chapters in our history.

For too long we have been adrift. This Administration, which has been in office since 1969, has failed to govern with either wisdom or foresight. It has bounced from crisis to crisis. It has reacted to the problems of the moment. It is without specific goals. It is without sensible plans.

It needs to be replaced. I bring to this campaign leadership which is at once candid, unafraid and positive.

I seek the Office as a Democrat — as a member of a party whose goals were forged by some of the greatest leaders of the western world: Wilson, Roosevelt, Truman, Kennedy, Johnson. Our party's commitment is to people; its history is one of success in time of economic crisis. It is a national party, diverse and strong, and vital.

I bring to this campaign a background which embraces military service in the Second World War; membership in both the House of Representatives and the Senate; and sixteen years as a private citizen, building a business away from the nation's capital.

I believe this blend of private and public outlooks, Washington and non-Washington viewpoints, and legislative as well as administrative experience is what is required of the nation's leadership in the last half of this turbulent decade.

Our problems demand a broad outlook; I submit my career and my record as evidence of such an outlook.

Franklin Roosevelt said in 1932 that one who believes in new standards of government for meeting new problems and in the translation of forward looking thought into practical action, must welcome a chance to do his share towards that end.

In undertaking this campaign, I welcome the chance to do my share. I will run an energetic, national campaign.

I am confident that this is what my fellow Democrats expect, and I look forward to their judgement and that of their fellow citizens throughout America.

Quoting the annual report of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas, affiliated treatment centers in Texas provide treatment and rehabilitation, speech and hearing and educational programs, and many other services required by the physically disabled to live normal lives.

The largest group served includes those with major

deformities of bones and joints, severe speech defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis and stroke. The Easter Seal Campaign, which provides funds for continuation of these services, begins February 24, and continues through March 30, Easter Sunday.

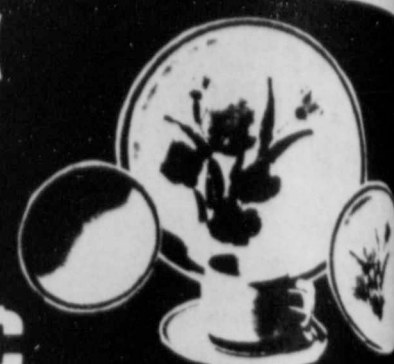
