Q. How much will the TU Electric rate hike increase electric bills?

A. The percentage increase throughout their system is 15.3%. On the average, the change will add \$20 to a 1,577 kilowatt-hour bill for July and \$18 to the average 1,410 bill for August and \$18 to the average 1,410 kilowatt bill for September. The average October bill of 914 kilowatt-hours will increase by \$12.

Fifty-eight report for fall practice

48-page document refutes allegations against CISD

A 48-page document was presented to the Colorado ISD trustees this week detailing the findings of a Texas Education Association (TEA) investigator who was on the school district's campuses May 3-7.

Dr. Donald F. Enos, Program Director of the Division of Equal Education Opportunity was responding to a complaint by Sarah Ortiz of Colorado City and Gilbert Rodriguez of Abilene. The complaints were made in letters to the agency dated March 12 and April 8 alleging that the Colorado ISD was discriminating against minority students based upon race in the awarding of honors credit in several courses, for awarding and presentation of scholarships, the implementation of the district's discipline management plan and in the hiring and retention of minority teachers and administrators.

Also listed in the report as complainants and interviewed by Dr. Enos beside Rodriguez and Ortiz were Sister Guadalupe Rodriguez, Yolanda Molina, Leslie Perkins, Veloria Owens, Joe Robinette, Betty Robinette and Ester Goss.

Several complaints also alleged violations of the Open Records Act - by superintendent Don Nimmo and the board of trustees - Larry Blassingame, Diane Garza, Dwayne Harris, Yolanda Molina, Jesse Munoz, Jr., Roxie Strain and Tony Turner (Turner took his place on the board following the Spring election).

The allegations and the findings of Dr. Enos are as follows:
Allegation 1: Colorado ISD discriminates on the basis of race in the administration of their discipline management plan.

Findings: Colorado ISD, Colorado High School and Colorado Middle School do not discriminate on the basis of race in the enforcement of their discipline management plan. In this area, however, Enos said "the CISD does have a number of areas where specific tendencies are beginning to develop. These areas could become major problems in the future if both the administration and faculty do not take immediate action".

The areas he is referring to include:
The number of detentions at CISD for minority students in 1991-92 were 53.7% of all detentions and in 1992-93, the figure was 64.9% while the minority student population was between 44.4% and 46.1%.

Also, he noted that corporal punishment is a potential problem

at the Middle School and the investigator said "immediate action is required." In the 1991-92 school year, 56.0% of the students who received corporal punishment were minority and the figure had increased to 91% in the 1992-93 school year.

In-school suspension (ISS) at the Middle School indicated 74.5% of the students receiving ISS in 1991-92 were minority and 65.5% in 1992-93 were minority students.

In his comments in this area, Enos said "when there is a preponderance of disciplinary action directed toward minority students by a predominantly majority administration, faculty and community, there is a perception, whether true or not, that there are discriminatory practices involved in the administration of that discipline." DPS Trooper Keesee is busy

DPS Trooper Karl Keesee investigated two accidents on Interstate 20-West Thursday afternoon and early Friday morning that miraculously saw only minor injuries reported. The back of a paint truck, used to stripe highways, was hit by an 18-wheeler that did not brake until after impact.

James Daniel, Plano, was driving the 18-wheeler and was cited for failure to control speed.

Around 2:30 a.m. Friday, a 1992 Pontiac and an 18-wheeler owned by Independent Grocers of Abilene were involved in an accident on the Morgan Creek Bridge. The driver of the car, Kevin Shepard, Norman, Oklahoma, was treated and released from Mitchell County Hospital despite having the rear wheels of the trailer pass over his vehicle.

The contents of the grocery truck were dumped into Morgan Creek and the entire tractor-trailer rig was seventy-five percent over the bridge according to Keesee. The scene was passable for through traffic around 9:30 a.m. Friday.

Trustees draw closer look

Dr. Donald Enos' visit to the Colorado ISD to investigate discrimination allegations also turned up some other concerns so serious that he suggested further investigative action by the Division of Governance and Special Investigations of the TEA.

Enos said if the following allegations were found to be true, he would recommend that the district receive an accreditation visit with consideration of the placement of a master in the district.

The master from the TEA would have the final say on all CISD matters and complete control of the district during his stay here.

The reasons this is being considered is because of the allegations that board of trustee members are entering school campuses on official business when the visits have not been approved by the board as a whole and as such, board of trustee members are individually affecting the everyday operation of the school without official authority from the entire board.

Other allegations by Enos state trustees are in violation of the Texas Open Meetings Act as they stray from the agenda, discuss items in executive session which are not on the agenda and individual faculty members appeal directly to the board of trustees or influence them in their decisions instead of following proper channels.

He also stated that the confidentiality of the executive sessions and items discussed in the sessions have been "leaked" to other individuals in violation of the law.

Enos concluded his report by asking the district to submit a plan by September 24, 1993, to resolve the issues discussed in the report and to have an ongoing investigation into allegations of violations of the Texas Open Records Act, Open Meetings Act and the violations of statewide standards for school board members.

Hunting lease info still needed

We need more hunting leases is the plea of the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce this month as the hunting seasons are getting closer and closer.

"We have calls everyday for hunting information and where to hunt in Mitchell County," said Jay McCollum. "If the landowners only have dove leases - we can get that information out to prospective hunters also".

Leasing land for hunting is a very lucrative business and last year it brought some \$932,000 into the county. In 1991 - before a

Allegation 2: CISD has discriminated against the Hispanic community and the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) by not allowing it to present its scholarships during the high school graduation ceremonies.

Findings: Enos said based upon his findings, there was not a preponderance of evidence that showed the district discriminated against the Hispanic community and LULAC.

However, he did add that "unless the two parties mutually agree to sit down and work out their differences or agree to binding mediation, the problem will continue to grow and result in providing less education opportunities for the students of Colorado City. The students will be the losers when all is said and done, not the administration of CISD and not the representatives of LULAC."

Northcutt in N.M. show

Local artist, Charlotte Northcutt, will have a showing of her work through the month of August in the Kachina Lodge in Taos, New Mexico.

The show opened Saturday, August 7 in the Navajo Room of the Lodge.

concentrated effort was made to attract hunters - an estimated \$850,000 was spent on hunting leases.

McCollum said it was very important to keep Mitchell County hunting information in the minds of hunters because of the money they generate other than paying for the leases.

Garie Warden Randy Bullard reminds those who lease land for hunting or charges a fee for hunting on property they own or property they control that a hunting lease license is required.

Allegation 3: Colorado ISD and specifically the board of trustees discriminated against the minority students of the district at the February 8, 1993 board meeting in their decision to designate or not to designate the courses of Biology II, Chemistry II and Humanities and Advanced Social Sciences as honors courses.

Findings: Even though there was not a preponderance of evidence to indicate discrimination, the Colorado ISD, the board of trustees, the administration and the faculty of the high school did in fact approve actions, rescind actions, and take no action on items that should not have even been addressed during the school year. Enos added that "unfortunately the losers in this case are the students of Colorado ISD. The high school faculty, the school administration, district office personnel, the superintendent and the board of trustees all violated their own policies."

Allegation 4: CISD violated the Open Meetings Act by allowing the "Executive Council" at the high school to decide the issue of honors classes, by not allowing opposing views to respond to the board concerning the issue of honors courses on March 8, 1993. CISD has denied access to relevant public documents prior to board meetings, abridged individuals' constitutional right to free speech when they were not allowed to respond in the March 8 meeting and the trustees misapplied and misinterpreted regulation Subchapter F, Graduation requirements in the designation of honors courses.

Findings: The investigator found that the CISD had denied access to relevant public documents prior to board meetings in violation of the Texas Open Records Act and had misapplied and misinterpreted regulation Subchapter F, graduation requirements but later corrected their error. Other allegations were found not to be true.

Also on the agenda is action on the contract and agreement for the detention of juvenile offenders from Mitchell County. Presently they are held in Abilene because they have to be kept separated from adult offenders and the jail is not equipped for this. A new facility has been opened in Sweetwater by Recor, Inc. and the county is expected to consider a contract with them. The Abilene facility charges \$60 per day and the charge will be the same in Sweetwater.

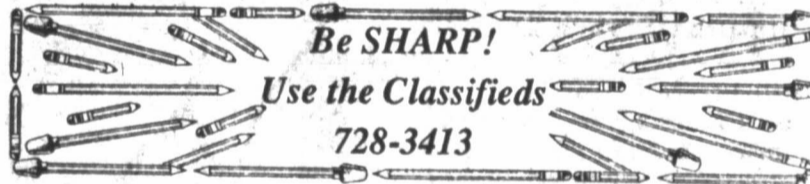
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At Spade Community Cemetery...

Historical marker dedicated

The Spade Community Cemetery Historical Marker was dedicated at 10:00 a.m. Saturday July 31, with a group of approximately fifty people in attendance, including Judge Ray Mayo and commissioners Buddy Herenberger of precinct three and Carl Guelker of precinct two of Mitchell County Commissioners Court. Dorothy Shurtleff represented State Representative Rob Junell.

Spade Cemetery Association president Tom Moore opened the meeting with a few words of welcome. Invocation was offered by Otto VanZandt.

President Moore gave special recognition to the following: Mrs. Dale Geer, former chairwoman of Mitchell County Historical Commission, whose presentation concerning historical markers to the reunion of 1989 started the movement.

Kregg McKenney, who gave the first contribution designated for the marker that inspired the group to work toward securing the monument.

Ross Hargrove, whose persistence and hard work traced the beginning and early history of the cemetery and Liberty School that is inscribed on the marker.

Doris McClellan, whose untiring efforts in contacting state and local historical commissions kept the ball rolling that culminated in the marker being acquired and unveiled-a period of about two years.

Mrs. Mabel Hood Logan, who attended Liberty School a few years and Ross Hargrove, who attended a few months were recognized and each spoke briefly of memories of those days.

Jim Baum, chairman of Mitchell County Historical Commission was introduced and gave the speech of dedication,

paying honor to those early settlers who founded the community, began the cemetery and established the school.

The cemetery was started in 1898 as a family burial place with the death of an infant son of R.F. and Addie Hargrove. In 1902 the parents of R.F. Hargrove were buried there. Mr. and Mrs. R.F. Hargrove gave 2.5 acres around their son's grave to the community for cemetery and school purposes. Liberty School was built there and was also used for church services, funerals, Grange meetings etc. Down through the years Mr. and

Mrs. R. F. Hargrove and three other of their children have been buried there, as well as members of many other families.

A son of R.F. and Addie Hargrove, Ross Hargrove, and his son, Robert Hargrove, his grandson, Kregg McKenney and his great-grandson, David McKenney unveiled the marker.

Chairman Jim Baum closed the meeting and the group adjourned to the Thompson Room of the City National Bank in Colorado City for continuing the Spade 27th Annual Reunion including the modern version of "Dinner on the Ground."

TDA accepting applications

The Texas Department of Agriculture and the Southern United States Trade Association (SUSTA) are currently accepting applications for the 1994 Market Promotion Program (MPP) for value-added products. The branded portion of the MPP provides matching funds to individual companies to promote high-value agricultural products marketed under brand names. The program assists U.S. companies in exporting their agricultural products by sharing the cost of marketing and promotional activities.

"This program has enabled small and mid-sized producers of

high-value agricultural products to increase their sales worldwide," said Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry. "Without these matching funds these companies would find it too costly to attempt to enter and develop overseas markets."

U.S. produced branded foods, beverages, seafood, food supplements, pet foods and intermediate products are eligible for this program. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's guidelines, the products must be at least 50 percent U.S. agricultural origin by weight excluding added water and packaging.

Eligible activities include advertising, promotional materials production, trade shows and in-store merchandising.

The deadline for receipt of application is August 15. A \$200 fee is required at the time of application. The minimum request is \$5,000 per company, and the maximum grant is \$270,000 per company.

For the cowboys, it's everyday stuff—just relocated from their wide-open spaces to a small arena in Wichita Falls. Since bronc riding, wild cow milking, branding, penning and roping are all in a days work, the cowboys perform with the precision and skill that rank tops in showmanship. For the cowboy, it's a time to put on their town duds, have fun and make some money for their favorite charities. For the spectators, it's a time to gasp with awe or cheer with delight.

To watch a guy thrown high into the air, land in a disarranged heap and then walk away laughing isn't the everyday fare for the average citizens. Rides like that are exciting to watch. The spectator can experience another range of emotions when observing the wild cow milking. A 750 lb. cow can totally eliminate the question "where's the beef?" - because the beef is all over the cowboy in a head-slugging, power-kicking fit. If and when the mission is accomplished, the cowboy must run as fast as possible to the finish line with the bottle containing the hard won milk. It has been known to

happen to have that rugged cowboy who has just wrestled an angry cow, to get up, start running at break-neck speed and stumble over his own boots. So much for winning—but the crowd loves it.

For those who might enjoy watching competition outside the arena, there is an event called Talent on Saturday morning at 10:30. The ranches enter their photography, painting and crafts in a contest which can be viewed by the public. They also produce skits, song and verse. From the rough and tumble arena, one finds the beauty and peace of their lifestyles expressed in their various art forms.

Cooking is staged on Saturday at high noon as a Cooking Contest between the ranches. The 1993 menu is chicken fried steak, beans, cornbread and cobbler. Local citizens enjoy the mouth-watering experience of serving as judges, and with only their taste buds to guide them, they will go about rating each dish from all ten ranches.

Over the two day period, points are kept in all divisions of competition. When the last event is over and the last point counted, the 1993 "Best Ranch in Texas" will be named. Also, the "Top Hand" title is awarded by the same point system. In 1992, the R.A. Brown Ranch in Throckmorton was awarded "Best Ranch in Texas" and Donnell Brown earned "Top Hand".

Craig Cameron, nationally known horse trainer, will be demonstrating his proven techniques of gentle training on Saturday at 1:30 p.m. Patience and understanding of horse psychology are the basis of Cameron's training program, and using these proven methods, he has started colts for a number of top cutting horse establishments in the Southwest.

There will be a Back To School Dance on Saturday, August 14 from 8 till midnight. Bring your favorite tapes for the dance. It will be for middle school age students and up.

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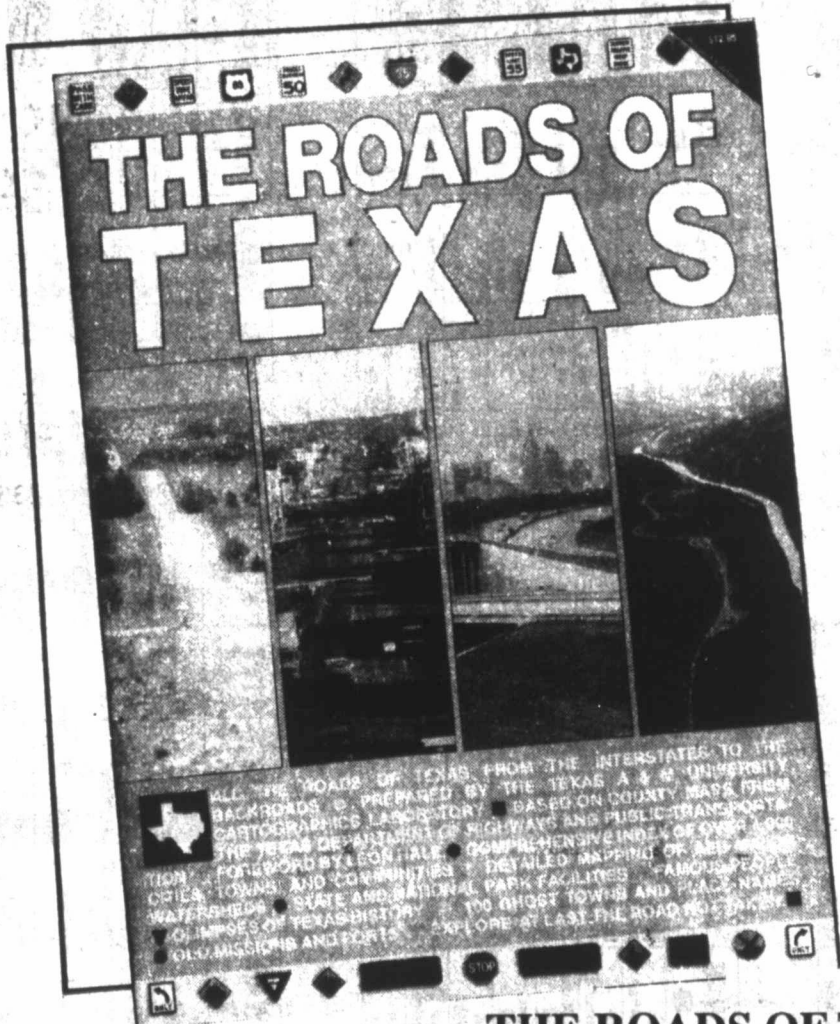
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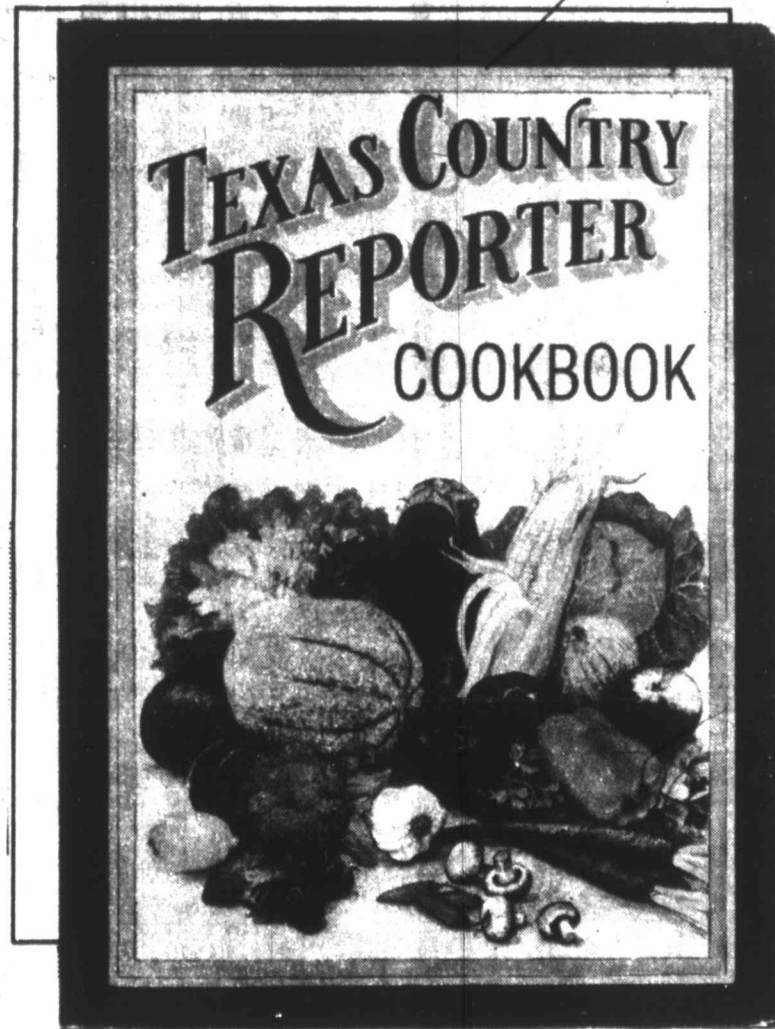

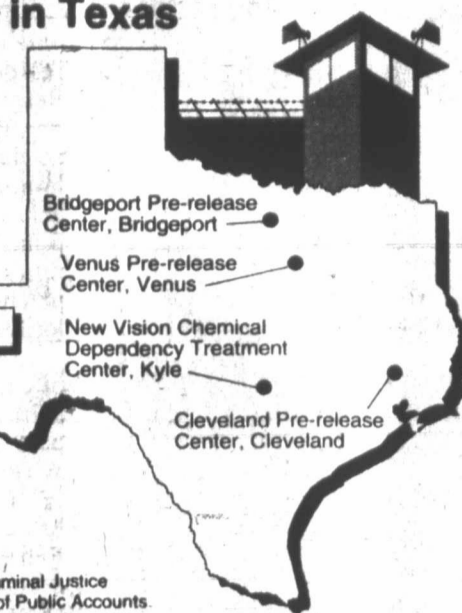

The occasion is an open house celebration Sunday, August 15, in honor of the Center's 40th anniversary. Scheduled from 2 to 4 p.m., the event will include refreshments and tours of Abilene's newly expanded facility which is located at 4601 Hartford.

"We're proud to open the doors of the Center to everyone, particularly those who have been a part of Rehab's history," said WTRC President Bill Snowden.

Last year 98 individuals from Mitchell County were served by Rehab out-patient facilities. With average treatment costs estimated at \$769 per patient, Mitchell County residents received approximately \$75,362 worth of care.

"Even if you've already visited the Center in the past, the recent expansion/renovations in physical therapy, industrial rehabilitation, the shop and the addition of a covered entrance are something exciting to see," Snowden added.

WTRC board members and staff will be available to assist with tours, answer questions and visit with those in attendance.

An encore presentation of Rehab's television special, "How Far Is Tomorrow?" also is slated to air on Abilene's KTXS-TV from 1:00 p.m.-2:00 p.m. and KRBC-TV, 2:00 p.m.-3:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 15. Featuring original script and songs by Denton writer Donna Tammell, the production focuses on the development of West Texas and ultimately WTRC.

The Rehab Center opened in temporary quarters in Abilene in 1953 and moved two years later into its first permanent building which today serves as the corporate offices. A second facility opened in

San Angelo in 1977 following a merger of WTRC and the West Texas Therapy Center. San Angelo's present facility opened its doors in 1982.

For forty years, West Texas Rehab has provided out-patient treatment services to individuals without regard to age, race, origin or financial circumstances. The only time patients are charged is when special equipment such as braces or hearing aids are secured for the patient to own. Admission is by referral from a physician or approved agency such as a school,

hospital or nursing home.

More than 175 trained, licensed professionals deliver quality care in physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech pathology, audiology, orthotics, industrial rehabilitation and support services to approximately 13,500 patients annually.

"Our anniversary theme, 'Legacy of Love' truly expresses what the Center, its mission and its supporters have in common, a 40-year commitment of providing help and hope for the disabled of all ages," Snowden said.

The reduced price for lunch is 40¢ and for breakfast 30¢.

Every household will be furnished with an application which must be completed to apply for free or reduced price meals. To complete answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information is not complete and cannot be processed:

1) names of all household members; 2) amount of income received by each household member such as wages, welfare, alimony, etc., or your Food Stamp or AFDC number if you receive these benefits; 3) signature of an adult household member; 4) Social Security number of the adult who signs the form of the word "none" if that person has none.

Within 10 days of the receipt of the application the school will notify you whether or not your child/children is eligible.

The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must notify the school when your income increases by \$50 or when your household size decreases.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for free or reduced price benefits, please tell the school and they will help you in getting an application completed.

You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

In the process of serving the children, there will be no physical segregation of or other discrimination against any child because of race, color, handicap, age, sex, religion, national origin or optical belief.
