

EVENT TO BE HELD FRIDAY BY MERCHANTS

**Fairest of Ranger Will Vie
For Cash Prizes at Willows
At 8 P. M. Friday.**

Plans were fast being rounded into shape for the opening of The Willows Friday night and the big bathing revue and water carnival, to be staged in connection with the opening. More interest is being shown in the project this year than ever before, with the Lions club, Rotary club and City Commission as co-sponsors.

The committee in charge of arrangements has worked out a program for the opening, with cash prizes for winners of first, second and third places in the bathing revue, and for winners of first and second places in the boys' swimming contests; first and second places in the girls' swimming contests and for first and second places in the fancy diving contest, which is to follow the revue.

The Ranger high school band, under the direction of Arthur Shelton, will furnish a band concert and will play while the beauties parade out the ramp to the platform in the center of the

Judges of the bathing revue will be Charles J. Moore, J. E. Meroney and Fire Chief G. A. Murphy, who will be located in a boat in the pool, near the platform.

A number of the merchants have already secured girls to represent their firms, while a few still have been unable to secure anyone. Any girl wishing to enter the contest can get in touch with Miss Britton at the The Ranger Times office and she will aid in securing a sponsor. All girls who enter will be given a bathing suit by their sponsor, which will become the entry's property after the revue, and in addition they will have a chance of winning one of the cash prizes.

Prizes for first place in the bathing revue will be: Winner of first place, \$100; winner of second place, \$3.50; and winner of third place, \$2.00.

Cash prizes for both the boys' and girls' bathing revues will be \$100 for the winner of first place, \$3.50 for the winner of second place, and \$2.00 for the winner of third place.

50-yard swimming race and the girls 25-yard race will be \$2.50 or first place and \$1.50 for second place, while a similar cash prize will be awarded to the two winners of the fancy diving contest, which will be open to both boys and girls.

The complete program for the evening appears elsewhere in this paper.

Baldwin's Career Clew to Britain's Temper

If it is true that you can tell a good deal about a people by the sort of man they elect to office, future historians ought to prize the memory of Stanley Baldwin, who has just stepped down as prime minister of England.

Bluff and hearty, a living image of the cartoonists' John Bull, Baldwin had a career which is a complete tip-off to the state of mind his country has entertained for the past 10 years or so.

Only a nation that was both bewildered and sacred would have kept this man as prime minister for so long and prized him so highly. For Baldwin was distinguished by the possession of the most negative of all the virtues; he could be counted on never, never to do anything rash.

He was prime minister at a time when grimly portentous things were happening in the world, and it was his boast that he let them happen, refusing steadfastly to take the risks that might have stopped them.

Immediately after the war the world managed to build up a system of collective security. It was a sadly imperfect system, but it was all there was, and it seemed to be the only available way to restore some sort of order to the brand of international anarchy which we call foreign politics.

While Baldwin was prime minister this system began to break up.

The Japanese were the first to test it. They moved cautiously at first, and drew an almighty frown from Washington. But Washington frowned alone, and stopped frowning as soon as it discovered its loneliness. So Japan went ahead, and presently was moving in on Manchuria and China just as if no collective security system had ever been thought of.

Italy followed suit, after a while, in Ethiopia. Germany was not long in learning the lesson, and kicked the last of the Versailles treaty overboard. And before people knew quite what was going on, the collective security system was dead, and all the nations were feverishly getting ready for a war which looked painfully close and threatening.

Now the man who could have done more than anyone else to stop this was the prime minister of Great Britain; and Mr. Baldwin, who held that job, refused steadfastly to life a finger.

Mr. Baldwin had read the temper of his people correctly. They simply did not want to take the risks. They were tired, confused, afraid—and if any American feels like criticizing them for feeling that way, let him reflect that the United States was too afraid of risks to support the collective security system at all, even when it was first started.

So Mr. Baldwin's safety first record speaks volumes about the world's state of mind in the last few years. It reveals a world which was too weary and frightened to take any chances—and which, as a result, let itself slide into the mess which we can see all around us today.

Going into retirement, Mr. Baldwin leaves an extremely useful milestone for the historians.

Love Escapades Ensnarl Artist

VIENNA—Johann Proel's colorful career has come to a premature end, at least temporarily. Proel, a talented 42-year-old painter, may be a dangerous crook, but he is also a lovable fellow, and women of all ages fell easy victims to his fascination.

Early in life he started out as a "never-do-well." At 14, Proel ran away from home to become a sailor. As cabin-boy he crossed to New York in 1910. There, after serving as dish-washer and waiter, he established himself as a hot-dog vendor. For some reason, which he does not like to explain, he attracted the displeasure of the New York police and returned to his family in Vienna in 1913. Here he was boy-waiter for one year.

When the war broke out, he immediately joined the colors and fought in many parts of the world, collecting wounds and medals.

The war was over much too soon for his tastes, and he was glad when he found a chance to join the French Foreign Legion, which, for eight years, he fought rebellious tribes in Morocco, receiving more wounds and medals.

As he had always been a good draftsman, he then decided to become a painter and went to Paris, where he joined an academy of arts. During his four years in Paris he became an excellent artist. But one day a few valuable paintings were found missing after Proel had visited a gallery there.

After an interlude in a French prison he went to Dresden without a penny. There he had the idea of introducing himself to a naive young American girl, who studied art in Dresden, as the famous French painter, Henri Matisse.

The girl, who was tremendously proud of her acquaintance with the world-known post-Impressionist artist, gladly helped the great man out when he was in "temporary financial difficulties."

After lending him about \$800, she thought of looking up what the encyclopedia had to say about the great painter. To her surprise, she found that Matisse was born in 1869, while her "Matisse" did not look more than 40. That meant the end of her romance and also the end of Proel's sojourn in Dresden.

He returned to Austria. In Salz-

burg and Vienna, the black-eyed, athletic man with graying temples and the many scars easily found women, ranging from 18 to 57, who were only too glad to marry the interesting artist and, for this purpose, to finance his alleged divorce in Paris and a lawsuit for 50,000 schillings which he asserted he was conducting in France.

But his last bride, a wealthy middle-aged Viennese, had a thorough inquiry made into Proel's life through a private detective agency. That led to Proel's arrest.

Golf Psychology—by Denny Shate

No. 4.
The 430 to 450-Yard Hole
We now come to a consideration of extra yardage needed for par on the hole between 430 and 450 yards. We have reasoned in an earlier article that we are not likely to get our par by "being home" in two pokes. So it is a matter of what shot to play to get down in one put for our par.

This is, of course, a matter of individual decision. If you pitch well you are within ideal pitching distance. If you prefer the easier-to-play and often more effective chipshot, so much for that. With flat ground or an open approach to the green, a straight-faced iron or even a putter is used by many

golfers with deadly effect. And even if you don't get your par, it is nothing to be greatly concerned about. Even the crack player often leaves himself so far from the pin that three putts are his lot. A five will seldom lose this type of hole—a four more often than not will win it.

I recall two important matches in my own experience where misjudgment of distance on this type of hole, rather than inability to get needed length, caused me to be short, while extreme care in trying to lay the third shot dead has resulted in my actually holing out for a birdie-three. I sincerely believe that many high handicap men play this shot much more consistently than I do.

It may also be encouraging to know that on many of my own cards, and on the cards of many of our best players we have many a five of this type of hole and are forced to balance with a birdie-three when arriving at the easy drive and pitch hole.

Play Each Shot for Itself
From this and previous articles you will see that each shot must be played for itself alone. Your short par three is a pitch. Your long par three is a full spoon or brassie. Only one other shot is necessary—the drive. Your short par 4, after the short par 3. The long par four, after the drive, becomes the long par 3 shot, etc. Therefore you can simplify your problems by forgetting the shot just finished and considering the

Parking Meters Paid Expenses First Year

FORT WORTH—Less than a year after the first parking meter was installed in Fort Worth, collections from automobile owners enabled the city to pay for 983 devices.

The 983 machines cost \$55,100. This week, a final payment of \$5,672 was made to the Oklahoma City company from which they were purchased. In addition, \$28,000 taken from the meters went to the city treasury.

Average daily "take" from Fort Worth parking meters is 30 for each meter. December, 1936, furnished the biggest month, when Christmas shoppers paid \$8,754 for the privilege of park downtown.

NEW YORK—The tragic accident that put Mickey Cochrane in the hospital with a fractured skull once more brings up the question: What to do about the so-called bean ball?

Unfortunately, the bean ball, or duster, in the case of most pitchers has been a definite part of the game ever since the catcher quit catching the ball on the first bounce.

As Burleigh Grimes explains, it is virtually impossible for a pitcher to hit a batter who expects to be hit.

The bean ball victim usually loses track of the ball, or else the ball sails, as in the instance of Cochrane.

A number of great hitters have found it utterly impossible to get out of the path of a pitched ball. They appeared to be paralyzed as sped toward them. The late Frank Chance and Jake Stahl were outstanding examples. Cochrane was hit before. Ray Chapman made no move to get away from the pitch the afternoon he was killed by a ball thrown by Carl Mays.

In the old days, batters frequently stuck their anatomies and heads in the way of pitched balls to get on base.

GRIMES and other pitchers point to a certain zone which hurlers may use with comparative safety in loosening up hitters. It gives batters time to get out of the way.

The duster is not always employed to frighten a batter, or chase a plate-crowder back.

It sometimes is used to get a right-hand hitter out of the catcher's way so that the catcher can better whip the ball to third base when a runner is getting too frisky. Similarly, when a runner on first is threatening to steal with a left-hand batter up.

Pitchers often throw behind a batter to break up a squeeze play, or throw the ball high and inside. Otherwise, the only ball that an accomplished batter couldn't handle would practically have to be a wild pitch.

It is easy to assume that every batter has a weakness and that if a pitcher has control all he has to do is pitch to this weakness to be effective. What beats this argument is that if a pitcher had perfect control he wouldn't hit a batter on the head.

WALTER JOHNSON beamed a player in his early days, walked the next three men, and couldn't pitch for a week.

It was said that they wanted Johnson to dust off Max Carey who was running wild in the 1925 world series, but the Big Train refused. Casey battled the Pirates to victory.

It is reported that they tried to get Carl Hubbell to beat Dean during the row at Sportsman's Park. Hubbell shook off Gus Mancuso twice and finally called him out on the diamond for a conference when it was said that he told his catcher:

"Listen, Gus, I want to win, but not that badly." Johnson didn't and Hubbell doesn't have to loosen up hitters to win.

But batters will continue to be hit by pitched balls as long as there is a saying that "the pitcher was just wild enough to be effective." The wonder is that more batters aren't hit.

A MOTHER'S NOTE
DOES your husband like meringues? Mrs. Peter Fagan of Jamestown, N. Y., writes that her husband does, and asks for a few aids to continued domestic harmony.

Parisian Meringues
Two cups sugar, 1 cup water, 5 egg whites, 1-2 teaspoon almond extract, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla extract.

Combine sugar and water and boil until syrup forms soft ball in cold water. Beat egg whites stiff and add to hot syrup, continuing to beat constantly. Then place saucepan on ice or in ice water, stir in flavoring and continue to stir for 5 minutes. Cover and stand for another 15 chilling minutes. Next shape as you desire them on a buttered sheet and dust with cornstarch. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees F.) 30 minutes.

That's the recipe Mrs. Fagan asked for. But here's the more usual method.

Raspberry Meringue Tart
(6 servings)
One cup sugar, 3 egg whites, 1-2 teaspoon baking powder, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon vinegar, 1 teaspoon water, fresh raspberries and lightly whipped cream.

In a bowl, using wire whip, beat egg whites, baking powder and salt until stiff. Combine the vanilla, vinegar and water. Begin adding sugar to beaten egg a little at a time, alternating with a few drops of the liquid mixture. Keep beating on even after all the ingredients are used.

Shape into thick-edged tarts, on small tins or dishes, from which it is to be served. Bake in very slow oven (225 degrees F.) for 1 hour. Cool, then fill with fresh berries and top with cream.

Another remarkable meringue dessert uses this same tart recipe. Fill the tarts with sections of ravel orange and cover them with chilled cooked custard with chopped patachios nuts in it.

For your summer fruit ice creams, meringues are the perfect cases. Remember these simple rules: Combine sugar and egg whites slowly and continue to beat a little while more, bake in slow oven. For ice cream, crush center of meringues to form pocket. Chocolate sauce over plain meringues is another dessert idea certain to please husbands in Jamestown and every other town.

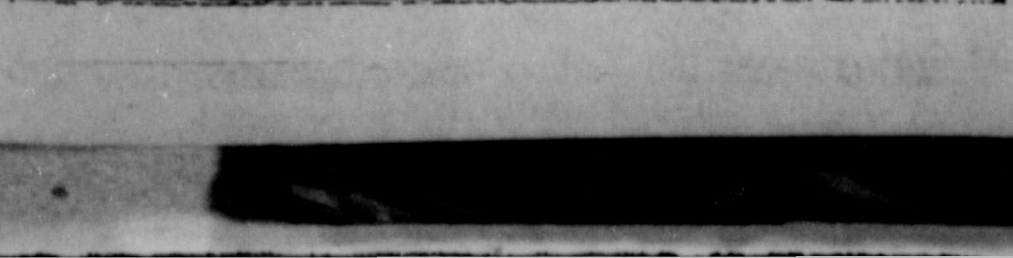

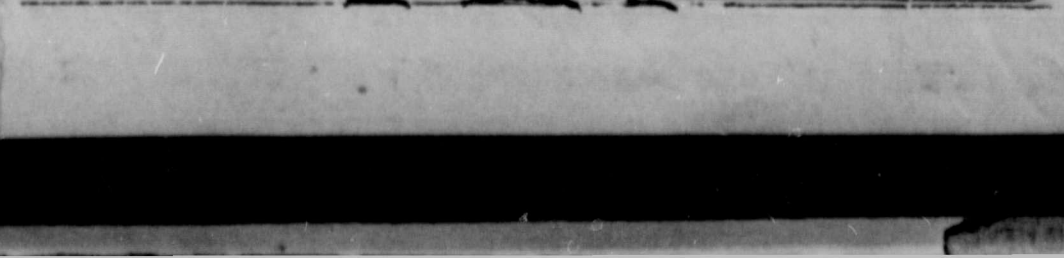
