Sanderson People Seriously Injured In Auto Accident

Lose Control of Car When Steering Gear Locks.

Last Thursday afternoon, as they were returning from San Antonio, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Downum and Mrs. A. J. Horton, mother of Mrs. Downum, suffered body bruises and lacerations when the Chevrolet coupe they were in left the highway near the Lozier bridge and turned over twice.

The accident occurred just when they were nearing the Lozier bridge and was thought to have been caused by the steering wheel locking and a flat right front tire. The car left the road, going down a steep embankment, turned over twice, landing on the four wheels. All glasses in the car were broken and it was badly damaged.

Mr. Downum is suffering from body bruises, a wrenched back and several broken ribs on the left side. Mrs. Downum, in addition to several laceration on her head and about the body, is badly bruised. Mrs. Horton, besides suffering from shock, sustained several lacerations and bruises.

A passing motorist brought the injured to Dryden, where they were met by Dr. Sharp, who brought them to this place for medical treatment.

All are doing fairly well, Mr. and Mrs. Downum being able to be up, but Mrs. Horton is still confined to her bed.

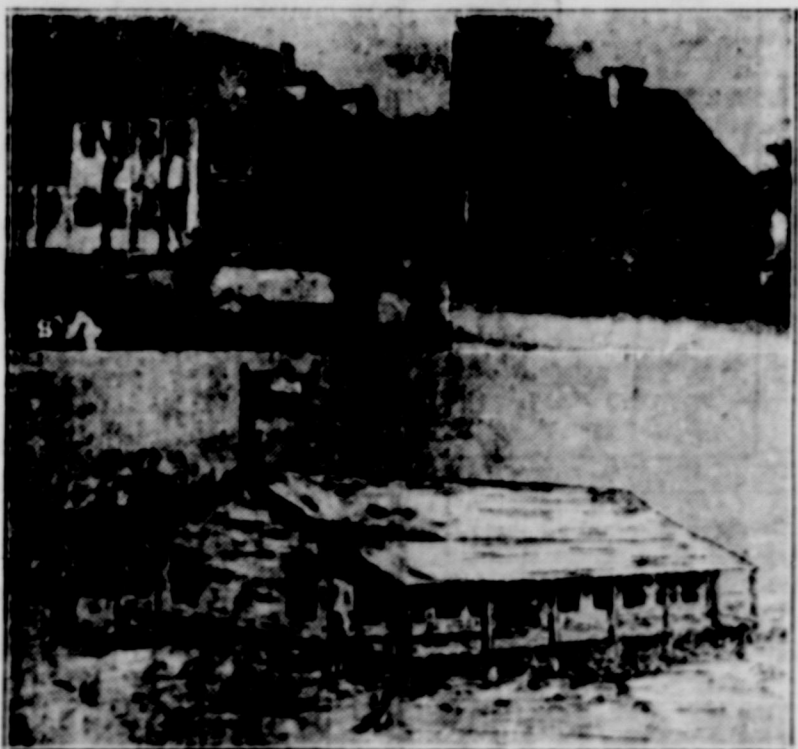
State Funds Needed To Insure Success of Celebration

The capitol of Texas has been located in eight different cities since Texas became independent in 1836—Washington-on-the-Brazos, Harrisburg, Galveston, Velasco, Quintana, Columbia, Houston and Austin. Pictured here are three of the old capitals. Upper left is the old capitol at Houston. An 18-story hotel now stands on the exact location of this old seat of the Republic. Upper right is the first capitol at Columbia, as it looked in 1836. The lower picture is a drawing of the first capitol ever built by the Republic for that purpose. It was erected in Austin in 1839.

Sub-Freezing Snap Hits Here Monday

Water Piper And Auto Radiators Bear Brunt of Cold Snap

Following closely on the heels of a high north wind which struck this place Sunday evening, sub-freezing temperature was felt early Monday morning, catching many unprepared, resulting in many water pipes bursting from freezing, and cars being stalled due to frozen radiators.

This, the first real cold spell felt here this year, was general over Texas, with several deaths from freezing being reported. In some sections rain preceded the freeze and played havoc with growing crops. Snow was reported at Alpine and in the Davis mountains.

Several ranchers interviewed here Monday were of the opinion that practically all the sheep and goats in this section had survived the sub-freezing weather of Monday and Tuesday.

Warmer weather was felt on Wednesday, the sun shone brightly, and everything indicated that the cold snap was over, for the time being, at least.

The thermometer nose-dived to the season's low level of 9 degrees above Monday morning; on Tuesday morning the reading showed a low of 11 degrees—these figures are from the official U. S. weather bureau's thermometer at the Kerr Mercantile company.

Will Play in Tournament At McCamey Today And Saturday

In the first of the week end games played here against the strong McCamey Badgers, Sanderson flashed a passing attack in the first quarter of the game against which the visitors seemed to have no defense. It was this attack that supplied the margin of victory for the Eagles, for in the second half the Badgers reversing their style of play, not only overcame the local dribblers lead, 6 to 3, but forged ahead the score being 11 to 8 at the end of the half. This lead the Badgers held until the last quarter. With only minutes to play the visitors were still leading 13 to 10. A field goal by Falcon and a free throw, which Halley looped, knotted the score. Another free pitch and a field goal by Shelton, and the Eagles forged to a lead that they held until the final whistle, the McCamey squad adding but a single point on a free try. The final score was 16 to 14.

Shelton, Eagle center, was high point man in the game with a total of 8 points.

Sanderson showed a decided improvement in this game over the one played the previous week. Team work was noticeable, and our squad looks a little better than anything that has played here this year.

On Saturday night the team went to Stockton for a return game with the high school Panthers, beating them by a score of 23 to 21. It is regretted that the Times can give no detailed write-up of this game, as the force was too busy to make the trip with the boys. This win makes it three in a row for the Eagles.

This week end the Eagles will go to McCamey where they will participate in the invitation tournament, and compete against team from Fort Stockton, Pecos, Iraan and other high school quints in that section.

Stoddard Hall at Denton (CIA) To Be Torn Down

Denton.—Following the signing of contracts next week by the holders, president and secretary of the board of regents, work will begin immediately on the wrecking of Stoddard Hall at Texas State College for Women (CIA), according to word received from Julian Montgomery, state engineer of the PWA. The razing of this building will be done prior to rebuilding under half million grants from PWA.

L. H. Hubbard, president of the college, has been in Washington since December 31 conferring with PWA officials about the building project, and he will remain there until all arrangements relative to erecting the new dormitory and hospital have been completed.

High Cost of Feed With Continued Drouth Real Menace to Industry

Marfa, Jan. 24.—(T-PN).—A call is being sent out by the Highland Hereford Association to all interested cattlemen in the Big Bend and contiguous territory, to attend a meeting to be held at Marfa tomorrow, Saturday, Jan. 26.

The purpose of the meeting is to launch a movement to interest congress in the present plight of the cattlemen and rescue them from the chaotic condition in which they now find themselves.

Their case is this: Three years ago cattlemen began feeding their cattle. By 1934 they had used all their funds in buying feed. During that year the federal government came to their aid by offering them a price for their cattle.

At present cattlemen have borrowed all the money they can from the various sources available, and these funds have been spent in keeping up their lands and in feeding their stock. A continuation of the drouth seems imminent, and cowmen, generally, have no equity left in either their cattle or their lands. With no funds, and without any chance of profit in the near future, there can be few, if any, payments on interest, taxes, or interest payments on unpatented land.

It will be two years before a paying calf crop will be realized, and even in the event of rain it will be at least six months before cattlemen can expect to stop buying feed.

Something must be done at once or the government and the loan companies are going to be in the cattle business in a big way. It follows, naturally, that if individuals cannot make a profit out of their own business, no one else can.

To discuss this vital phase of the cattle industry all cattlemen in the Big Bend section are expected to be in Marfa tomorrow to help start this movement for relief which is expected to spread to the eighteen cattle-producing states of the United States.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

BIRTHDAY BALLS FOR 1935

The movement to honor President Franklin Delano Roosevelt with community dances and balls to be held throughout the country on the night of January 30, the 53rd anniversary of his birth, gives every assurance of being an impressive success.

The plan was projected by a national committee which includes many of the most distinguished men in the country, the underlying purpose being to devote the proceeds of the sale of tickets to the Endowment Fund of the Warm Springs, Ga., Foundation, in which the President is deeply interested.

The suggestion to repeat the balls came from Henry L. Doherty, utilities operator, patron of the Warm Springs Foundation of which Mr. Roosevelt is founder, and long an intimate friend of the President.

It was to the waters of this spot, where Mr. Roosevelt has built a residence that has become the second White House, that he is largely indebted for recovery from the attack of infantile paralysis which came suddenly upon him in the plenitude of his powers some years ago; and his gratitude has ever since found expression in a desire to enlarge, as far as possible, the equipment of the resort in order that others may experience similar results.

The hall that was recently opened there was one of the results of the interest in the enterprise which the President's humanitarian efforts stimulated among men of prominence who knew of his personal hope that Warm Springs might be enlarged so as to become a real national benefactor.

A new policy with regard to funds raised through the dances this year has been suggested by the trustees of the Warm Springs Foundation, as follows:

"Seventy per cent of the funds raised will be used directly to help committees, individuals, doctors, the hospitals and other organizations struggling with the task of providing care and treatment in their communities, counties or states for those afflicted with infantile paralysis, and such funds will be expended within the community or within the nearest geographical unit of which the community is a part, and 30 per cent of the funds raised to be used to maintain and intensify the efforts of medical research to develop preventives of and immunization against infantile paralysis with the purpose

of eradicating this scourge exactly as medical science has successfully brought under control smallpox, typhoid fever, diphtheria, yellow fever and similar maladies.

One of these dances will be staged in Sanderson, under auspices of the local Rotary club and American Legion post. Your attendance means a contribution to one of the most worthwhile causes in our economic life. Thousands of children today are facing life maimed and crippled—terribly handicapped for the battle ahead—as a result of this disease which, to the present time, has baffled all efforts of medical science.

So don't fail to keep in mind the date of the dance—Wednesday, Jan. 30, at the C. A. C. hall. Don't fail to help this worthy cause by your presence—as a dancer or as a spectator.

ALLRED HEARTENS THE TEXAS COURTS

During his first few days in office Governor James V. Allred has made plain that his course with respect to the exercise of the power of clemency is divergent from that of his immediate predecessors in office.

The course he has charted was anticipated during his pre-election gubernatorial campaign when he advocated the shifting of the pardoning power from the governor to a clemency board which would have more time to devote to conscientious study of applicant's records and pleas.

Governor Allred's prompt revocation of the six-month furlough granted by Mrs. Ferguson in the closing hours of her administration to Joe Hebrecht, a notorious gunman who had served but six months of a ten-year term for robbery, deserves the whole-hearted applause of a crime-ridden people.

Governor Allred's policy is one that should lend encouragement to law enforcement officers and to juries throughout Texas. His announced determination not to undo their work by reckless exercise of the powers of clemency vested in his office will have an incalculable effect on the whole system of justice.

Paroles, furlough and pardons were intended only for meritorious cases. They should not be available to hardened offenders or to those whose records prove them to be social menaces. To this Governor Allred manifestly subscribes.

Juries ought now to take heart with the assurance that when they

sentence a criminal to the penitentiary the door clangs shut and remains closed for a reasonable time.—San Antonio Light.

FRANKED MAIL

Free postal service has become a scandal and abuse.

The volume of "franked mail," that is to say mail matter carried free of postage, is shattering all records.

The amount of material carried this year, if the proper postage were required, would mean a revenue to the government of from 28 to 32 million dollars.

This is the item whose cost Postmaster General Farley deducted from the actual postal deficit of 52 million dollars in order to show his disputed "surplus."

Huge quantities of correspondence circular, leaflets and copies of regulations from emergency divisions of the federal government have swelled this "franked mail" matter to its present vast proportions—not equalled or even approached in war times.

The heavy flow of such mail has continued steadily through the last eight months. There is no prospect of its curtailment but on the contrary, its continued increase is certain.

It is time that franked mail was stopped entirely, and an end made to this drain upon the resources of our government.

It is government extravagance in its most inexcusable form. Most of it serves no useful purpose. Much of it mere electioneering by federal office-holders.

A device for keeping their names and their important performances constantly before their supporters and constituents at home.

A great part of it is for illegitimate propaganda—a use of public money for the propagation of personal views or controverted theories of economics and finance with which the people generally have no concern.

No justification exists for burdening the taxpayers of the country for any such purposes.—San Antonio Light.

NOBODY'S BUSINESS

AUSTIN.—Speaker Coke Stevenson named his 35 important committees this week-end and the ponderous machinery of democratic government made ready for action. During the next three and a half months it will grind out the laws under which Texans will live during the ensuing biennium. It will raise \$40,000,000 or more—and appropriate the sum to the various agencies and departments of government to conduct the budgeted departments of government.

Besides the routine of financing the government by taxes, the solons must determine conclusions upon a dozen or more major issues of policy. Included is the liquor problem—probable submission of repeal of the State constitutional prohibition amendment, and consideration of a method of regulation of the traffic, if prohibition is wiped out in law, as it has already been in fact, throughout Texas. A bitter fight against resubmission is indicated, before the amendment ever gets to the people—if it does. With Governor Allred pledged to resubmission (although personally a dry himself) and the Democratic state platform likewise on record for passing the problem back to the people, the prospect is that an old fashioned prohibition campaign will resound through the hills and dales of Texas by the 4th of July.

Youth is having its fling in Texas' New Deal in state government. Dynamic Jimmie Allred is 36; Attorney General Bill McCraw is 39; Lieutenant-Governor Walter Wood-ul is just entering the 40's; Carl Nesbitt of Mineola, the new Adjutant General, is in his thirties. Ernest Thompson, railroad commissioner, is still in the early 40's. The elder statesmen are still represented on the railroad commission by Commissioner Lon Smith, in the Comptroller's office and the General Land office. The Legislature, as usual, has a generous sprinkling of youthful members.

Gov. Allred, the cynosure of all eyes at present, has taken a leaf from the book of President Roosevelt in his relations with the newsmen who cover the Capitol. The President's happy relations with the newshawks in Washington is traditional, and is largely responsible for his excellent "press." Gov. Allred has adopted a policy of holding his daily press conference promptly at 9:30 without fail. No matter who may be waiting, or in the office, the newsmen know they have carte blanche to "crash the gate" to his office when the clock strikes. Smiling Jimmie meets them, and answers all questions.

The press conferences during the Ferguson regime were declined until they were not held once in two weeks, sometimes. Usually, Governor Jim was on hand, and did as much talking as the governor. With certain individual newsmen, Mrs. Ferguson had fairly cordial relations; towards others, whose papers dealt harshly with herself and Jim, she was bitterly antagonistic.

Job-hunters still haunt the capital. More than 3000 have applied for places on the State Ranger force, with two score jobs to be filled, under the present setup. Every veteran peace officer in Texas, it seems, would be a Ranger. Governor Allred and his aides handle the job hunters suavely, but firmly. There have occurred no untoward incidents such as the "bawling out" that Jim Ferguson gave the assemblage after his wife took office two years ago, when he brusquely told us get to work.

Austin hotels are enjoying an unprecedented boom with the taking of office by the new administration, the convening of the legislature and the consequent descent of job-seekers and lobbyists upon the capital. Frequently there are no accommodations available in the two large hostels. The inauguration ceremonies reflected the high mark when thousands descended upon Austin. The travel volume here indicates the depression is definitely over in the capital, and with the Centennial coming up next year, the innkeepers are anticipating a permanent residence of Santa Claus in Austin.

This story has no particular legislative significance, but here it is: Two gentlemen, well known members of the "third house" (the lobbyists) were discussing a freshman member of the House who had proved a bitter disappointment to them. Quite frankly he told them he favored certain legislation they opposed—and they understood that his

Charges of Misappropriation and Other Irregularities Made at Relief Meeting

RACKETEERING PHYSICIANS MEN LOAFING ON JOB PARTIALITY SHOWN WHITES SOME OF CHARGES MADE

JACK KNIGHT in HERALD-POST

Relief administrators and state executives—Uncle Sam's intermediaries in dole relief in west Texas—met in El Paso Tuesday in a sectional effort to decide what the state is going to do when federal aid for direct relief cases ends February 1.

The meeting was attended by 100 administrators, casework supervisors and certifying officers, and was not without its color. The gathering was held in the Crystal ball room at the Hilton Hotel. Expensive fur coats, diamond rings, silk hose and tailor-made cigarettes were uncommonly abundant among those on the apportioning end of relief in west Texas.

More colorful still were the charges brought out the meeting that physicians in many counties are racketeering on relief clients; clients are soldiering on their jobs, it was said, and a state caseworker "gets all worked up" because local units do not "pass on" the details in orders issued out of the state office.

The discussions were in round table fashion. The meeting was to air various relief problems that have arisen in this section. The body was without authority to take positive action.

The alien question, long a sore spot, especially in El Paso, came up and Mrs. Dorothy Golden, El Paso supervisor, explained the situation.

All God's Children

"We are all God's children and Americans deserve no more to eat than do Mexicans, Chinese and Negroes," Mrs. Golden said. "The national order says that there is to be no discrimination. We cannot deny these people a minimum of food."

Herbert Davis, state field supervisor, said doctors in some counties have made a "racket" out of relief and that any such occurrence in the future should be reported to the state office. It was explained that in cases of illness, the relief organization will buy medicines for the needy persons who are ill, but any preventive measures to be taken in the same family must be paid for by the county health officers.

Wants Full Value

W. J. Classin, executive in the state works division, said the government is entitled to "just as much" for its dollar spent on relief jobs as private enterprises get.

"We do not want relief clients working for exercise," he said, "and when we give a man a job we want the project to be a good one and we want a day's work for the pay. A man who refuses to work should be fired. If his refusal is consistent, vagrancy charges should be preferred against him in his community. His family will not suffer because it will qualify for direct relief."

"We find that discharging such men usually stimulates them to come back and render a day's work."

commonwealth's early history. This measure would assure an appropriation of \$3,000,000—\$1,000,000 which would go toward the erection of the buildings for the central exposition, \$250,000 for their furnishings, and \$200,000 each for the celebrations at Houston and San Antonio; \$400,000 for celebrations at other points of historic interest, and \$750,000 for advertising and publicity for the entire Centennial project.

Responding to a senate resolution the commission has submitted to that body an elaborate report, giving a minutely itemized statement of every dollar of state funds it so far has expended. The original appropriation, that of two years ago for preparatory centennial expenses, was \$100,000, and the commission reported that of this sum it had used but \$28,116.63, and on Jan. 8 had an unexpected balance on hand of \$71,883.37.

Regarded as favorably augury by centennial workers is the fact that Texas' new governor, James V. Allred, in his message to the legislature on Jan. 16, asserted: "It is your honor and good fortune to constitute the centennial legislature of Texas. As the chosen representatives of the people you are in the enviable position of leadership and responsibility occupied exactly 100 years ago by illustrious patriots who laid the foundation of government for the Lone Star State. It should be, and I am sure it is to each of you an inspiration and a call to service."

"This centennial legislature has the biggest opportunity to serve Texas and, at the same time, the biggest responsibility to the people, of any lawmaking body in its history."

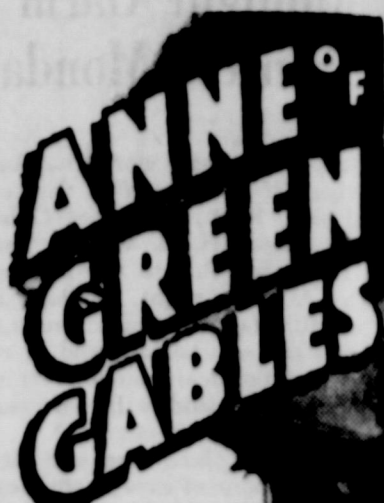
