



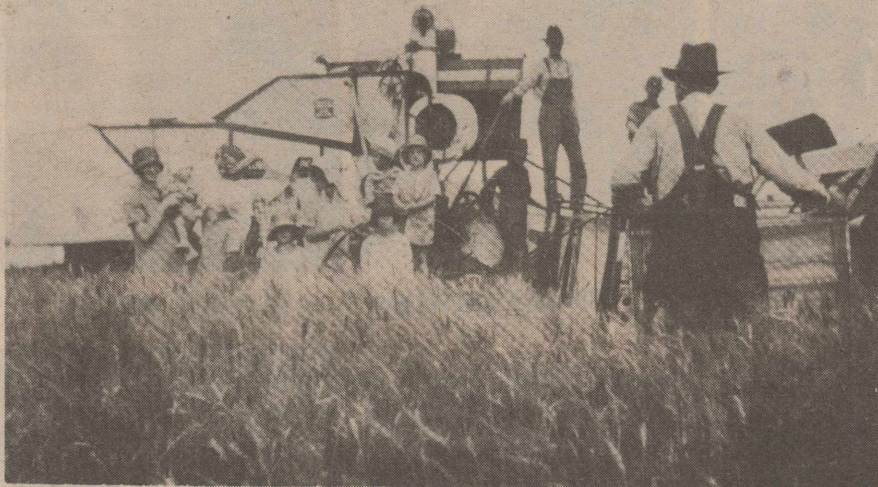

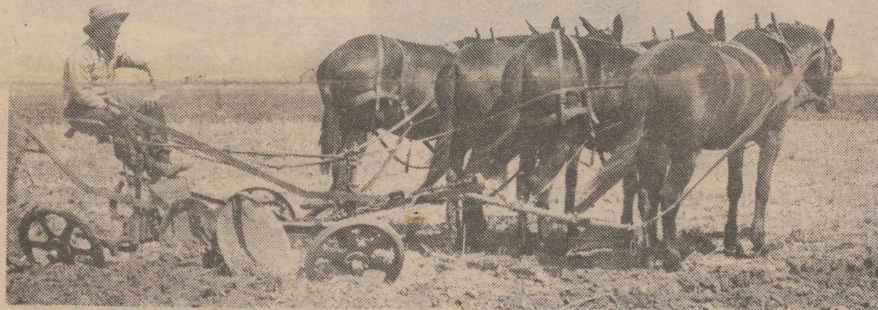

School Board Employs One, Approves Agriculture Budget

School board members met Monday evening in regular session. Meeting with them, a representative of Hub Business Machines in Lubbock, presented a demonstration of a copy machine. It was voted to purchase the machine with federal and state funds.

Mrs. Diane Jones was employed as Title I remedial reading teacher for grades seven-ten. A graduate of Clovis High School and McMurry College, she has 16 years teaching experience.

Bids were opened for the 1972 school bus and a high bid of \$200 was accepted from Doug Higgins. The board also accepted the 1981-82 agriculture program budget as presented by vocational agriculture teacher Jerry Mathis in the amount of \$8,255.

Football and student school insurance for the 1981-82 school year was approved with Heritage Insurance Managers of San Antonio.

Business Manager Nancy Bowden gave a report on delinquent taxes and suits. Bid submitted by Farmers State Bank was accepted as depository pledge for two years from September 1981 to September 1983.

Board members adopted school hand books as presented by principals Williams Ammons and Jack Burkhalter.

Everything is readying for the Hart Days Celebration July 23-25 with the final deadline of July 18 for all clubs and organizations wishing to have a money-making booth. Persons should contact Manuel Sanchez at 938-2495 to register their booth. At that time, they also will sign up for their turn in the ticket booth at the carnival.

Pre-activities include the beard growing contest with Rev. Jack Lee and Jim Purcell selling shaving permits and assessing fines to men without permits. Judging will take place Saturday afternoon at 1 p.m. Rules state that to be eligible, the beard could not have been started earlier than June 15.

The carnival opens Wednesday night to set the mood for everyone and will run through midnight Saturday.

Thursday officially opens the festivities with gala activities set for 8 p.m. in the elementary gym. Little Miss Hart will be crowned from a group of four girls, ages five through seven, who have entered the competition. Miss Hart will be selected from a bevy of ten beauties.

Lions will begin cooking those tasty Lionburgers Thursday, serving from 7 to 10 p.m. both Thursday and Friday. Saturday, they will continue to offer the charcoaled pleasers from 11:30 to 2 and 5 to 10.

Hart Longhorn Band Flag Corps will give away \$50 worth of gasoline from Jim Black Oil Company during Hart Days festivities Saturday, July 25.

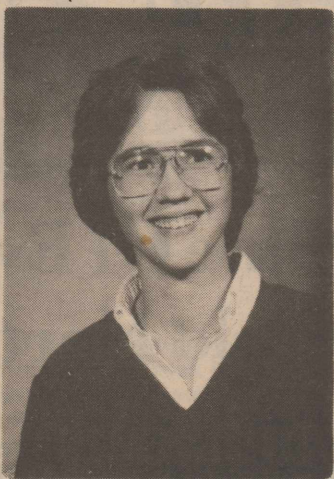
Donations of \$1 may be given to any flag team member. Proceeds will be used to help pay for flag camp expenses at Wayland College in August.

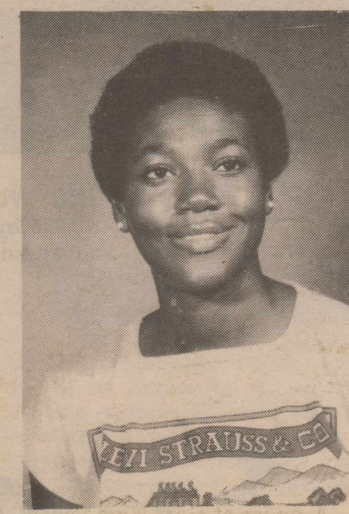

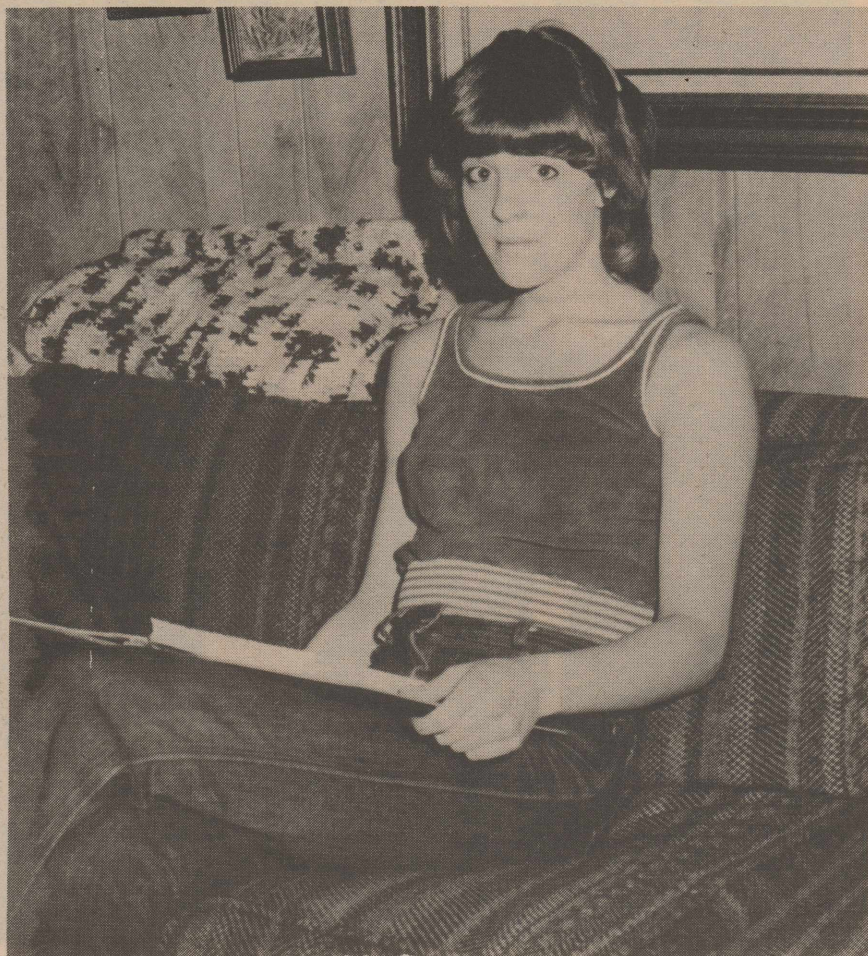

TACOS

- 1 box taco shells

- 1 1/2 c flour
- 2 c sugar

- 4 T cocoa
- 4 eggs--add all ingredients to 2 sticks o.eo, melted
- 1/2 c pecans

Pour in a 9x13 inch pan. Place in 375° oven, heat until ready.

ICING:

- 1 stick oleo, melted in skillet
 - 2 T cocoa
 - 6 T milk, bring to a boil
- Stir in one box powdered sugar and add vanilla.

Fellow members of that class throughout high school years are invited to make plans to attend. Interested guests will be welcomed.

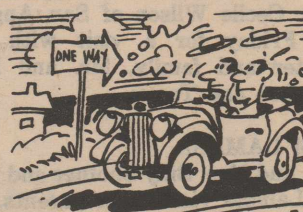

MEAL TRENDS

Quantity of food consumed at home is declining partly to smaller size meals with fewer dishes and decreasing household size. (According to the Bureau of Census, today's household averages 2.8 members compared to 3.4 in 1980.) More people are skipping meals and more meals are eaten away from home than 10-15 years ago.

MOST EATEN

Breakfast is meal most frequently consumed at home (86%) but more people are skipping this important meal. Lunch is the meal least often consumed at home with a 13% decline since 1965.

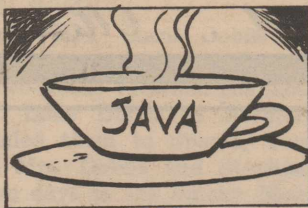

WASHINGTON (Liberty Lobby News Service)—Liberty Lobby and The SPOTLIGHT have repeatedly criticized today's educational system in general and the Department of Education (DOE) in particular as grossly inadequate and dangerously misled.

For many years we have pointed out that national test scores have dropped to all-time lows and that discipline in many classrooms has disappeared.

Much of this decline in educational achievements results from innovations in teaching methods. While these novelties have done much for the administrators who dreamed them up, they've succeeded only in virtually destroying students' educational achievements.

Some new statistics show just how bad the situation really is. Dr. Max Rafferty, former California superintendent of schools, writing in the Colorado Springs Gazette Telegraph, reports that the number of public schools in the U.S. has declined nearly 7,000 in the last 10 years.

It is astounding that 4 million fewer children attend public schools today than a decade ago. More than a third of the nation's teachers are dissatisfied with their jobs. Nearly half of them would pick another career if they had it to do over again. And 10 percent say they're resigning now.

Is it any wonder they want to quit? Some 113,000 public school teachers were physically attacked at work in 1979-80. The assault rate in that period jumped 60 percent over the preceding year. In some New York City schools, any given teacher is almost certain to be attacked.

What's happening to the education of students? Dr. Rafferty quotes 1979 testimony before the U.S. Senate Subcommittee on Education:

"For the first time in the history of our country, the education skills of one generation will not surpass, will not equal, will not even approach those of their parents."

So this is where those great educational methods have brought us, such as:

- New math
- Giant high schools
- Year round classes
- Open classrooms
- Group teaching
- Behavior modification programs (better to equip the child to learn)
- Humanist philosophy, so a child's learning processes won't be held back by family standards; and
- Busing.

These ideas made a lot of money for U.S. government bureaucrats and administrators who dreamed them up. But what did they do for the children?

For the first time in history, the education skills of one generation won't even approach those of their parents.

Not only did these educators manage to destroy the education of our children, they also effectively killed our young people's family and national allegiance, something that used to give them a sense of responsibility and pride.

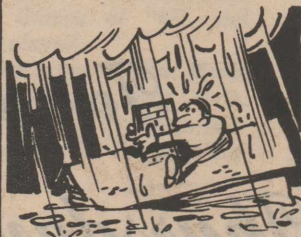
In our technical age, to think that our children aren't even getting so good an education as was given when young people trudged through the fields to a one-room school is astounding—but true.

If this isn't reason enough to wipe out DOE and everything it stands for, and return the responsibility of education to parents and the local community, what is?

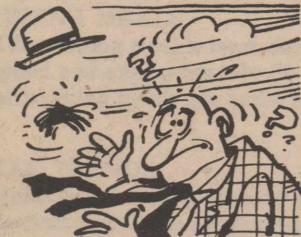

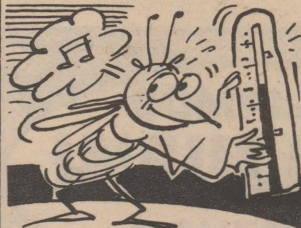
WEATHER WISDOM

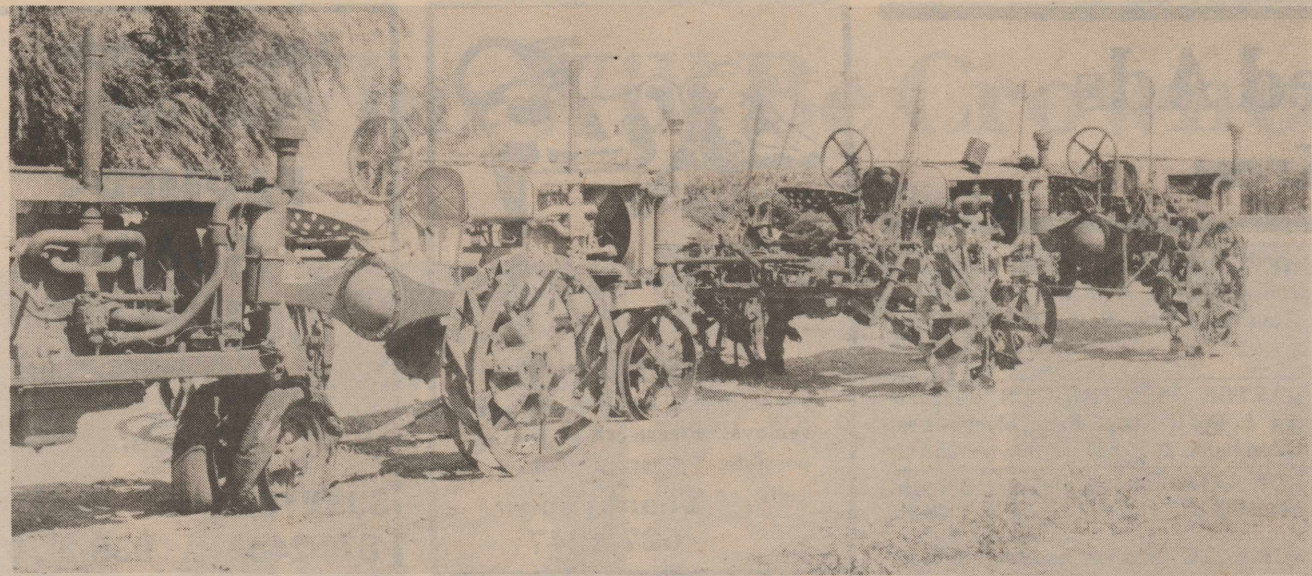

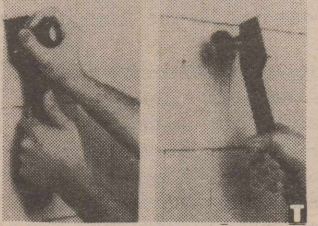

More Than a Paint Scraper

Springtime is paint-up time and a most important tip for painting is preparation. And here's a real help, an entirely new paint scraper design that does more than scrape. It's made of tough, light-weight polypropylene which resists most chemicals and is engineered to scrape paint, not knuckles. Curved handles minimize the chance and transfer maximum leverage to the scraper head.

First, some tips — peeling or blistered paint should be removed with a scraper down to the bare wood. Scrape so that the strokes are parallel to the grain. Cut with the grain, not against it. Let the weight of the hand over the scraper head keep pressure constant on the tool throughout the stroke. Bear down only as strongly as required to keep the blade cutting. When blades get dull it's past time for a change.



On the "Best" model there's a large knob and 12 in. handle for extra pulling power to tackle tough scraping jobs with less fatigue. Popped nails are no problem either. A nickel-plated steel core hammer head knob is also designed for light-duty nailing. Nail loose boards or shingles into place. Countersink all exposed nail heads. Fill holes with putty after prime coat. Quick changes of the blade edges are made with a turn of the screw. The 2-1/2 in. four-edge blade gives you a choice of two serrated edges for rough scraping and two smooth edges for fine scraping.

The "Better" model features one two-edge blade in the scraping position and extra blade storage. It comes in three sizes: 6, 7 and 9 in. with 1, 1-1/2 and 2 in. width blades.

After you're finished with the rough and fine scraping, you can use the unique Surfoam® tool with a carbide grit sanding blade to do a final finishing, and sandpaper or steel wool to feather the edge of the sound paint.

SNACKING
