The Course That Leads To Ruin

An American army officer pats a new-type fifteen-pound anti-aircraft shell on display in his office in Philadelphia and says: "Here is a very potent guarantee of peace—for the United States." He went on to explain that the shell, with a delicate mechanism in its nose, was very effective, and that it is almost beyond the reach of any other nation because of its cost.

That is a rather typical example of our belief that we are a superior people. We have been holding back on the sale of latest-type American planes in the belief that we have secrets which we cannot afford to divulge. We have been talking about the extent to which the Garand automatic rifle makes our Army superior to those of other powers. We have been bragging about the accuracy of bombing planes equipped with a sight developed in this country. This is all well and good, except when we conclude that these special equipments make us a foe so dangerous that no power dare tread on our toes.

Experience shows that secrets seldom are truly secrets in these days of vast spy rings. Even if they are, they remain secrets only a short time when war develops. If one American plane is shot down its secrets will be revealed immediately. Capture of the Garand rifle, and complete disclosure of its points, will follow immediately upon its introduction into combat.

Our military branches probably will profit more by selling our latest devices to the combatants, and observing their results under war conditions. Military weapons are developed more rapidly during wars than any other time. Regardless of that course, however, we cannot afford to conclude that possession of some secret makes us superior to other nations of the world. That course leads to ruin.

Lewis On The Way Out

It has long been said that if you give a fool enough rope he will hang himself, and John L. Lewis seems determined to prove it. Mr. Lewis' announcement that unless he is permitted to dictate the affairs of the Democratic Party he will call a convention of youth, Negro, old-age and labor groups to take appropriate action scares no one. It merely serves to brand Lewis as a self-centered egotist that he is, and further discredits him before the rank and file.

Whatever this country may want, and it must be admitted that there can be little assurance of the exact nature of the desires of the masses, it does not want that for which John L. Lewis stands. And there is reassurance in that certainty. The country may, probably does, favor liberal policies. There is no indication of any desire for radicalism.

A bolt might conceivably affect the balance between the two major parties to some extent, but it would accomplish no further purpose, except perhaps to further discredit John L. Lewis, if that is possible.

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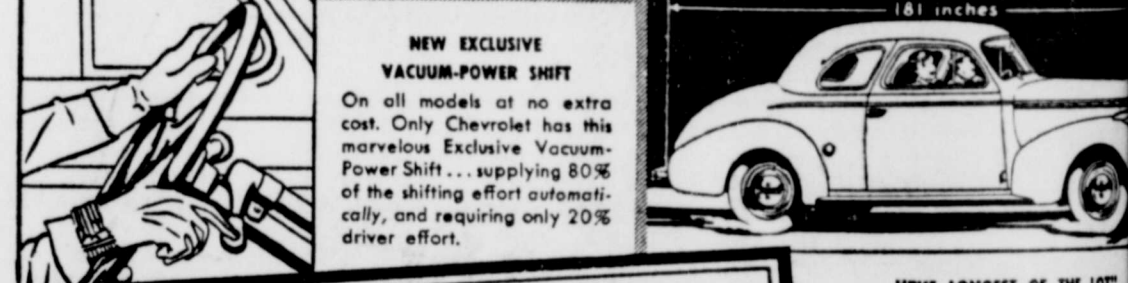
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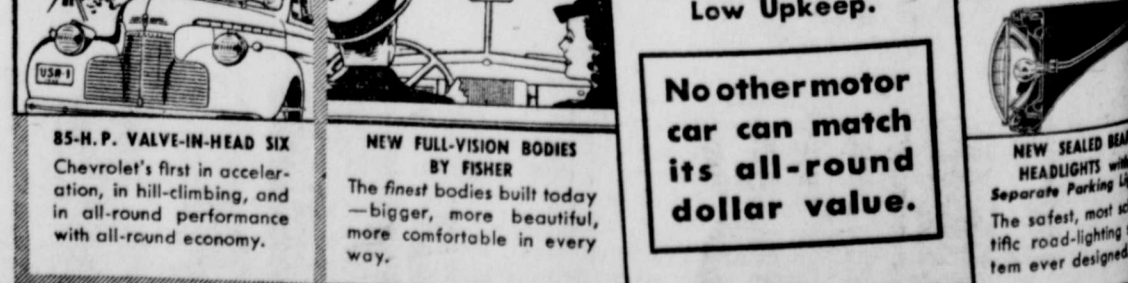

VOICE OF TEXAS

Importance of Texas, commercially and politically, has been brought afresh to the attention of the Nation. Two members of the President's cabinet have been recent visitors.

Secretary of the Interior, Harold L. Ickes came down to make the speech at the tenth anniversary banquet of the opening of the Kilgore Oil field. Texas gave him a royal welcome, but Texas doesn't agree with him that the Federal government should assume control of our natural resources. Texas citizens still believe they are capable of doing the job.

Then came genial, smiling Postmaster James A. Farley. He had a few odd jobs to do in dedicating postoffices and then attended the postmaster's convention in Marshall. There he met a very large percentage of the members of the fourth estate—because newspaper editors have been very fortunate in getting Texas postmasterships, and all of them are making good.

Another tragedy to our school children was narrowly averted the other day. The ceiling of the San Saba high school collapsed and crushed desks just seconds before the boys and girls were scheduled to file in.

There were 400 of these boys and girls. The crash was such that it is improbable that any of them would have survived had they been in their places. It would have been a worse tragedy than the terrible gas explosion at New London.

School buildings should be regularly and thoroughly inspected. Nothing should be left to chance when the lives of our boys and girls are in jeopardy. The terms soon will close. In vacation, every school house in Texas ought to be rigidly inspected.

Curtis Cook Is Honored By The Burk Bulldogs

Curtis Cook, newspaperman, who has made the Burkburnett Bulldogs one of the best publishing football teams in Texas Monday received an award for his loyal service.

With the football team gathered for the occasion, Fred Brown made the presentation at the Burkburnett high school. Brown last year was the triple-threat quarterback and one of the four captains of the Bulldogs. Cook's award is a large mahogany plaque bearing the inscription "To Curtis Cook in appreciation of his friendship and loyalty—Fighting Burkburnett Bulldogs."

The award henceforth will be given annually to a person singled out as an outstanding supporter of the football team.

Since 1935 Cook has been interviewing, photographing, and boosting the Bulldogs. During all that period he has been correspondent for The Wichita Falls Record News and Daily Times, and he has certainly kept the sports pages alive to the glory of the Burkburnett teams. For the last three years he has been a regular, full-time member of the Record News staff, but he has maintained his home in Burkburnett commuting daily to his work.

Varied Career

Before entering the newspaper business, Cook was a minister, radio script writer, school teacher, athlete and highly distinguished student. His chief interest lies in medical-chemical research, in which field he made a discovery found highly valuable in detection of lead poisoning.

Something of a child prodigy in his youth, Cook appeared in hundreds of churches over the Southwest, before he was 15. He started his high school education in Wichita Falls, then finished at a school in Galveston, where he played football. He was pastor of an Evangelical church in Galveston while attending high school, and moved to a Houston church when he entered Rice institute.

He interrupted his college career to attend a theological seminary, returned to Wichita Falls where he taught some classes and attended others in the high school studied several subjects at Hardin Junior college, and again returned to the ministry, taking over the Burkburnett Presbyterian church. He was also associate editor of the Burkburnett Star for some time.

Somewhere in between he found time to write scripts for radio station KGKO, and to take up newspaper work. He is married and has two sons, Curtis Carroll Cook and Tillman Wilcox Cook, who will probably be quarterbacks for the Bulldogs.

'Flattery vs. Reproof'

The Apostle Paul said, "All Scripture is given by the inspiration of God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness—Again, 'we reprove, rebuke, exhort, with all longsuffering and doctrine.' II Tim. 3:16-17, II Tim. 4:2. He said, in I Tim. 5:20 'Them that sin rebuke before all that others may fear.'"

Reproof or rebuke, is helpful and constructive to one who wants to do right. It is true that very often it is unpleasant at the time that it is administered. Heb. 12:11, "Now no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous; nevertheless afterwards it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which the exercised thereby." None of us enjoy a spanking or reproof, at the time, but afterwards we realize it was for the best and then it is appreciated. We do not like to be rebuked. We are so human, and possess a certain amount of vanity, that we had rather one would flatter us than to be corrected. We had rather one flatter us than tell us the truth. However, if we honestly and sincerely want to do the right thing, we will welcome constructive criticism and reproof. The person who is offended or refuses to accept such correction, or fails to profit by it, shows that he does not want to do the right thing.

Flattery is dangerous. It is dangerous to the one who flatters, to the one being flattered, and to the one who may be looking on, or be affected by it. It is a form of hypocrisy and deceit. He who so flatters is doing a three-fold injustice and injury. He injures himself, for he is trying to deceive. He realizes the other needs to be rebuked for he is in the wrong, but because of the lack of moral courage, and because he is a hypocrite he fails to do his duty. He does the other a great injustice and sins against him, by encouraging him to continue in his error. He has kept him from seeing his error and correcting it, and thirdly, he injures the onlooker. The third person may be led to commit the same error, because you failed to reprove and correct the one who needed it. Paul said, "They that sin re-

buke before all that others may fear."

No one can claim to be my friend, who sees me in error and refuses to come to me and try to help me. He becomes one of the greatest enemies on earth who will flatter me when he realizes I am wrong. Even if I refuse to be corrected, he has not done his duty until he has pointed out, to me, my error and if necessary rebuke and chasten me for it. And I certainly will not be manifesting the correct spirit unless I listen and consider seriously the suggestions of the one trying to help me. If I just get mad, and tell him it is none of his business what I believe or what I do, and refuse to be helped, I alone can be held accountable and responsible. But if he does not try to help me, knowing that I am in the wrong, he too will be held responsible, for he becomes guilty of, and a partaker of, my sins. Certainly if he flatters me and pats me on the back, and tells me I am alright, he becomes guilty, and must answer for his guilt.

Will you then not consider the attempts of the Church of Christ to help you. It becomes our duty to tell you the truth, (we will not flatter you and make you think you are alright, when we know by the word of God that you are not) and it becomes your duty to listen and consider. Paul said, "Am I become your enemy because I tell you the truth?" Gal. 4:16. Come and study with us. A welcome awaits you.

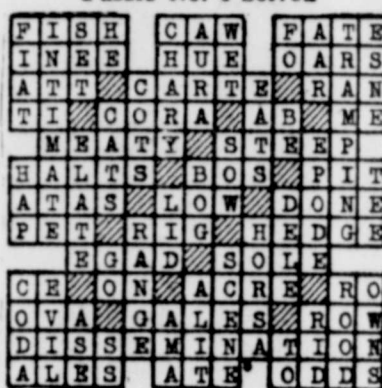

Annual "Early Diagnosis" Campaign Starts

By Mary Quinn, Executive Secretary Wichita County Tuberculosis Association
The Wichita County Tuberculosis association this month is asking citizens of Wichita county to use what they have bought, a knowledge of tuberculosis, through the annual early diagnosis campaign.

The campaign is financed by part of the money spent for Christmas seals and its purpose is to drive home certain truths that we must know and use. Only one sixth of the known cases of tuberculosis are isolated in hospitals provided for their care.

The disease may be gaining a firm foothold in the body and spreading to others before the victim knows he has the disease. This year the tuberculin skin test has been given to 541 children in this county and of that number 122 revealed a positive reaction. This report tells us that 122 children had been exposed to active cases of tuberculosis and have the germ in their bodies. This does not necessarily mean that the child is ill at this moment, or ever will become ill, from tuberculosis.

However, with the test indicating presence of tuberculosis germs in the body, the parents should have a desire to determine, insofar as possible, whether areas of disease are developing, or have developed, which will cause illness and which, if untreated, will be more contagious to others. The X-ray reveals whether or not there is any damage being done to the lungs.

If the young adults of America would take advantage of the numerous opportunities offered them by local tuberculosis associations during the early diagnosis campaign, and demand that the places where they live and work be rendered free from tuberculosis in the contagious stage, the disease would almost be under control within their generation.

Local members of the Wichita County Tuberculosis association are Mrs. H. R. Hayes, Dr. I. D. Russell and J. S. Mills. Any of these people will be more than glad to furnish any information concerning diagnosis and treatment of the disease.

D.H.I. Man Talks To Future Farmers

John Hobbin, member of the Dairy Herd Improvement Assn., of College Station, spoke to the members of the Future Farmers class at the high school auditorium Monday morning, according to Morris Dean, vocational agriculture teacher.

Mr. Hobbin has twenty-six dairies under his supervision in Wichita, Wilbarger and Archer counties. Only the Baumhardt dairy here is a member of the association and Mr. Hobbin visits his dairy each month and weighs and measures the milk from each cow.

Mr. Hobbin stated that there are three principles for the success of dairying farming. The first one is breeding. Management and proper feeding are the other two.

Mr. Dean stated that the boys have just concluded a pest eradication contest, in which approximately 800 rodents and pests were killed. They included prairie dogs, rats, sparrows, crows and opossums.

A number of the boys are practicing to enter the vocational agricultural state contest which will be held at College Station soon. The dairying judging team, Ed Richard Whiteside, Jas. and the courts must of necessity speed up to take care of the increased business and to also cut the cost of operation. The other district judges and I, by requiring that jury fees be paid before cases are put on the jury docket, and requiring that all preliminary matters, such as hearings on law questions, be held before the jury is called, and by trying only jury cases while the jury is in attendance at the Courthouse, have cut the cost of jury trials and have also made jury service less tedious and burdensome to the jurors. This sum of money has been reflected in transfers to the general fund of the county totaling \$29,000.00 where it was used for salaries, charity and other county business.

In addition to the amounts transferred direct to the county's general fund we have, by virtue of a change in the law paid the three court reporters' salaries from the jury fund to the extent \$40,023.38 since the law went into effect. These payments of salaries direct from the jury fund and the transfer of \$29,000.00 in cash to the general fund reflect a return to the county of \$69,023.38 because of economical operation of the district courts.

The summoning of jurors by postcard as was formerly the practice in this county was unsatisfactory and was likewise not prescribed by law. The law provided that jurors should be summoned by the sheriff or a deputy in person. This method was tried with fair results, but at a cost of about \$100.00 per jury week for the deputy's time, automobile and gasoline. Some jurors were easy to summon, but it required many miles of driving to notify others. Knowing that in the Federal court jurors were summoned, successfully, by registered mail, I wrote a law to apply to the state courts and asked its passage by the legislature for this county. It met with such favor that it was passed for the entire state of Texas. Under its operation we can, and do, summon jurors at a cost of 22c each, thus saving approximately \$75.00 each jury week, or approximately \$2,000.00 per year of the taxpayer's money.

I realize that jury service is often burdensome, particularly at some times, while with many people there are other times when such service would not be unduly burdensome. With this idea in mind I have made it a practice to postpone jury service for each individual who asked it to such reasonable time as would be most convenient for him. I shall continue to do this, except in special venues drawn in capital cases where the law does not allow it.

I feel that there is room for much improvement in our courts. These who have served on juries know that I am right in this. These improvements cannot be made all at once. It shall be my constant effort to study and analyze our procedure with the idea in mind of recommending changes to the legislature after I shall have determined that the suggested change will really help. Reform will come as the result of careful scientific analysis and thought, not from tinkering. During the time that I have served you as a trial judge, I have tried approximately 1,000 contested cases before the jury and 1,000

without a jury, both civil and criminal. This is, of course, exclusive of thousands of default judgments and hundreds of other matters such as juvenile cases, hearings for the support and custody of children, injunctions, adoptions, habeas corpus hearings, etc. I believe that this wide experience has given me an understanding of the problems that arise in the trial of a case which will enable me to give the people and litigants of this county constantly improving service as a trial judge.

An increasing problem that concerns all of us is the growing rate of juvenile delinquency. The proper handling of a child of tender years charged with crime calls for the best and most praiseworthy thought of the judge. Juvenile offenders are seldom represented by lawyers and the hearings are always informal and every effort is made to get at the foundation of the child's trouble. The public is entitled to protection, and the action of the judge must bring about such protection and must at the same time help the child to become a useful member of society. I have worked diligently to this end and in many cases we have given a new thought to these children and saved them from what might have been the wrong kind of life.

Many of you I know personally. To you, whom I have not been privileged to know so well, permit me to say by way of introduction that I came to Wichita county in 1907 and was reared on a farm near Burkburnett. With the idea in mind of preparing myself for the type of work that I am now doing, I graduated from the high school at Burkburnett and then took degrees in literature and in law from one of the leading state universities, and finally took a course of postgraduate work in law at Harvard university. I am 37 years of age, married and have two children.

As I said in the beginning, I shall be forever grateful to the people for the confidence shown me in the past. I believe that with the added experience that I have had and by continuing hard work and application to the duties of this office I can render you constantly improving service. Upon this basis I respectfully ask your support in the coming Democratic Primary.

ty Judge in 1923-1927. Judge of Wichita county should not only be a County Judge, but should, due to the importance of Wichita county in North Texas, and in state affairs, be a leader for the development of North Texas and in securing for this section of the state the things that rightfully belong to our section. My acquaintance with public officials in North Texas should increase my usefulness for Wichita county.

It will be impossible for me to personally contact each voter of this county but I shall endeavor to do so, but I want this letter to be a personal solicitation for your vote and influence in this campaign ahead. - 2: Complete the county road system so as to give every farmer of Wichita county a hard surface road from his farm to market. I heartily endorse the Wichita County Planning Board and the program to improve the rural roads of Wichita County with available Federal funds.
- 3: I recommend emphasis to be placed on lower valuation rather than on lower tax rate which will afford a great saving to taxpayers in taxes collected, and a special relief to an over-taxed oil fraternity which is the backbone of this county.
- 4: Work for the designation of a State Park at Lake Kemp so as to give access to Lake Kemp from the state highway bordering the lake without having to pay \$1.00 to enter and fish in our own property which was bought by tax payers money—a right now denied our citizens to fish in their own property.
- 5: Safe guard the rights of our local laborers on all Wichita county work and on all WPA projects so as to secure all available work for Wichita county citizens.
- 6: Cooperate with all Wichita county civic groups and units of government in all plans to build a better Wichita county.
- 7: Special treatment of all veterans and particularly disabled veterans whose administration and estates may come before the probate court.
- 8: Courteous consideration and aid for all old age pensioners on all matters before the County Commissioners court.
- 9: The people of this county have seen fit to legalize liquor and have prescribed the rules of its administration and enforcement. I shall impartially observe the enforcement of this law as well as all other laws before me as County Judge. My personal opinion shall not be substituted for the law as written but I shall not tolerate violations of such law

by road houses nor permit the restrictions against law to churches, hospitals.

10: I promise thorough treatment of Wichita county matters before me as of before the Court. I give a special justice and consideration of the right of any and all times before my court. I record in this office of my ability people and work to give development to county. I shall be honored by my job by service who are still the only remaining in the world.
