BURKETT BLAMES POLITICS FOR RUCTION

PLAYED WITH RICKENSTEIN ON AGGIE TEAM

Ranger Banker Regards Fort Worth Man as Gamest Player And Squarest Shooter

"The gamest player and squarest shooter of them all," is the way S. A. Lillard Jr., vice president of Ranger State bank speaks of Rickenstein, Fort Worth business man and former football player at A. & M. college, who was referee of the Breckenridge game and will be one of the officials at next Saturday's game between Ranger and Eastland in Ranger.

It has come to light that Mr. Lillard was a teammate of Rickenstein playing halfback, while the Fort Worth man played right guard on the team of that historic year, 1909, when A. & M. took national honors and every member of the team, including Rickenstein and Lillard, was awarded a gold football.

According to Mr. Lillard, Rickenstein had a game knee which was forever getting blown out of place. He always insisted on going in, stayed until they had to drag him off and then, after applying some bandages and resting up a short spell, he was right back in the line.

That Rickenstein never asked a favor as a player and never gave one as a referee, is Mr. Lillard's opinion, in which opinion a number who saw his work in Breckenridge concur.

Robinson Appointed U. S. Senator From State of Indiana

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 21.—Approval of the appointment of Arthur R. Robinson, Indiana attorney, as the new United States senator from Indiana was expressed today by Clyde Webb, republican state chairman, and other organization leaders.

The selection of Robinson to fill the vacancy left by the death of Senator Ralston was announced by Governor Jackson last night. Robinson, a former state senator and superior court judge, is 44 years of age. He was a candidate for the senate in 1916, but was defeated. He has practiced law in Indiana a number of years.

Greece Sends Severe Note To Bulgaria

ATHENS, Oct. 21.—Greece has sent Bulgaria a severe note demanding satisfaction on account of the Bulgarian occupation of Demirhisir, together with heavy punishment for those responsible for the incident and indemnity for families of those killed.

Greek forces have crossed the Bulgarian frontier and occupied Tetris to compel compliance with the demands. The Bulgarian occupation of Demirhisir was ended after short fighting and the Bulgars compelled to retire.

GOVERNMENT OFFICIAL BOBS WOMAN'S HAIR

LONDON, Oct. 21.—At Limuru, Kenya, Africa, there is an Englishman who regularly shingles his wife's hair once a week, according to a letter just received here.

At first, when his wife made the suggestion, he declared himself ready to be hanged first, but when he found that the cost of travel to the nearest hairshingler plus the cost of the shingle itself would set him back \$10 a week, he meekly submitted and now prides himself on the artistic effects he negotiates.

Immediately he was besieged by all the white women in the district to do their shingling for them. To keep peace in the district he did it. Once started they wouldn't let him stop. GRAND JURY TO PROBE RETURN OF STOLEN JEWELS

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—With each development in the \$683,000 Donahue jewel robbery adding mystery to the case, the grand jury will begin work on it today. James P. Donahue has been subpoenaed to appear as a witness, but the leading witness is expected to be Noel C. Straff, private detective, who is alleged to have paid \$65,000 for return of the jewels to Sam Layton, an unidentified go-between. Straff said he paid the reward to Layton in a room at the Prince George hotel, but investigation of the hotel books revealed that Straff had not registered there on any day since the robbery.

DIEHL TO PUSH SUIT AGAINST FORMER OFFICIAL

A. A. Diehl, Ranger attorney, has been employed by the Eastland county commissioners' court to prosecute the suits brought by the county some time ago against the bondsmen of former District Clerk J. BORAH SAYS WORLD COURT MERELY BAIT TO CATCH U. S.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—European diplomats and their American supporters are using the world court as bait with which to draw the United States into the league of nations, Senator William E. Borah, Idaho, said last night in a speech here. Borah said he would carry on a congressional fight against membership of the court so long as the tribunal is clothed in its present garment; that it is now simply an instrument of the militarists and had accomplished nothing towards peace.

FRENCH CANNOT ACCEPT DEBT FUNDING AGREEMENT

PARIS, Oct. 21.—The French foreign office today stated that the cabinet had decided not to accept the American debt funding proposal, but would have Finance Minister Caillaux make counter proposals within a few days.

GOVERNOR HAS NO ANSWER FOR SATTERWHITE

Speaker of Texas House Says He Will Call Special Session If She Does Not

AUSTIN, Oct. 21.—No comment was made by Governor Ferguson on the reports from Washington that Lee Satterwhite, speaker of the Texas house, had announced he would call a special session of the legislature in the event the governor declined to issue the call.

Satterwhite, who is in Washington with other Texans before the house ways and means committee, was quoted as saying he would withhold his call until the governor had definitely declined and until Attorney General Dan Moody had completed his investigations of the state highway department, probably about three weeks hence.

SEYMOUR, Texas, Oct. 21.—Commenting on Speaker Satterwhite's statement from Washington, that he would call a special session of the legislature if Governor Ferguson did not, Representative King, who issued the first call, said today it was no reflection on representatives of the people to meet once in a while to see how things were being run. He said it was a wise thing for the people of Texas to know how their government was being run, and that "Public servants should welcome rather than resist a close inspection of official acts."

SATTERWHITE SAYS HIS MIND NOT YET MADE UP

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Lee Satterwhite, speaker of the Texas house of representatives, told a United Press reporter he was considering calling a special session of the legislature if Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson failed to do so. The session would investigate the activities of the state highway department, which have been under fire, he said.

He said he had not made up his mind to call the session and would not do so until after he had conferred with the attorney general of Texas, who has been making an investigation of the highway commission. This report will probably be ready in two weeks.

Petitions for the session are being circulated, he said. He did not know if enough signatures had been secured to obtain the session but he did know that the necessary 50 had been verbally promised.

RUMORS OF WAR SHIFT TO NEAR AND FAR EAST

Europe, dreaming in peace in the wake of the Locarno treaty, found today martial difficulties in the Balkans, while press reports from the far east pictured Japan anxious lest Chinese strikes should develop eventually into a Russian-Japanese war. Other rumors came out of Morocco and the near east. The French, despite heavy rains, finally cleaned up the last Riffian stronghold. From Beirut came reports of an insurrection on the outskirts of Damascus.

Stories of Japanese anxiety over the present military movement in China were reported by the Tokyo Express. Japan is said to fear the possibility of a new war with Russia in event the Chinese Generals Wu Bei Fu and Seng Yuhn Siang should drive Fu Ling out of Manchuria, thereby confronting with loss of her concessions there.

The correspondent said Japan would fight for her Manchurian rights. The Wu Bei Fu and Seng Yuhn Siang combination would be Russian supported and, if successful, Japan would lose her hold there.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Officially advised that the Druse tribesmen of Syria had captured part of the city of Damascus in their warfare with France, the American government today ordered two American destroyers to proceed at once to the Eastern Mediterranean to protect American lives.

The official spokesman for the state department regards the near east situation as quite serious, but every effort will be made to protect the lives of the 1,000 or more Americans in the region of the Druse-French guerrilla warfare. The sending of the destroyers, it is officially vult of the Druse tribesmen. The states, is the direct result of the refusals may be used to remove refugees from Damascus. They will proceed probably from Alexandria to Beirut and thence to Damascus, if needed.

CREW OF WRECKED ITALIAN FREIGHTER ARE RESCUED

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Twenty-seven members of the crew of the Italian freighter, Ignazio Florio, were rescued in mid-Atlantic by the Steamship President Harding, according to a wireless message. The ship was reported bringing to New York the men who were rescued Tuesday.

STATE TO ASK DEATH PENALTY FOR TOGO RAY

Slayer of S. B. Houston Goes To Trial Today; Defense Lawyers Seeking Continuance

The State will ask for the death penalty in the case of Togo Ray, 19 year old Sabana youth, who is charged with murder growing out of the killing of S. B. Houston at or near Sabana on Monday afternoon, July 20, of this year. Houston was shot with a rifle while visiting at the home of a former wife who is an aunt of Ray's.

The case against Ray was called in the 91st district court this morning at which time the State, which is represented by County Attorney W. J. Barnes, Senator H. P. Brelsford and Judge Askren, former attorney general of New Mexico, of Santa Fe, New Mexico, announced ready. The defense, represented by M. E. Lawrence, O. F. Chastain and Frank Judkins, offered a motion to quash the venire of 200 men that had been summoned from which to select a jury, on the ground that they had not been drawn according to law. Judge Davenport overruled this motion and attorneys for the defense proceeded to call the list of defense witnesses, a large number of which were absent. The defense then asked for time to prepare a motion for continuance on the ground of absent witnesses. The court then ordered a recess two and one-half hours for this purpose.

As indicated in babeas corpus hearings and examining trial that took place soon after Ray's arrest, the defense will urge some form of insanity as a defense. This is also indicated by the large number of doctors on the defense witness list.

Because of insufficient room in the 91st district court room to accommodate the court and spectators, Judge Davenport stated that when court is convened this afternoon it would be in the 88th district court room on the second floor of the court house, which is some larger.

Court-martial of Colonel Mitchell To Have Limitations

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—A general court-martial destined to go down in history as one of the greatest ever held in this country is being assembled by the war department for the trial of Col. William Mitchell for conduct "prejudicial to good order and discipline." The placing of air service officers on the court is considered an indication that Mitchell will not be allowed to re-state his opinions on aircraft, but will be tried on the ethical charge of discrediting the military service. It was admitted that Mitchell's statements would not be proved for accuracy. The only aim is to decide if the statements are injurious to the morale of the army.

ROYAL A FERRIS TO BE HOST AT OYSTER ROAST

DALLAS, Oct. 21.—Royal A. Ferris, veteran Texas banker, is to be host Friday, October 23, at an oyster roast to be given at the state fish hatchery, within the grounds of the State Fair of Texas here, when, according to his invitation thus extended through the newspapers, he wants a banker, a farm owner, a tenant farmer and a merchant from every community in Texas to be his guests. "As the time is short," Mr. Ferris said, in extending the invitation, "I am asking the newspapers to carry my request in this manner."

"I want every banker to whose attention this invitation comes, to act as my personal representative, and name from his community the farm owner, the tenant farmer and the merchant who will attend the party."

It is Mr. Ferris' request that each banker wire him immediately, the names of the men who will attend from his particular section.

My object is to have gathered within the fair grounds," Mr. Ferris said, "a representative group from every section of Texas that can be reached in this manner. I want these representative men to realize, from what they themselves see, just what a great influential agency for Texas development and progress the state fair has come to be. I believe this is a good way in which to bring about that realization."

Hours for the oyster roast will be from 12 to 2 p. m. Friday, October 23. This will give opportunity for every man who accepts the invitation to visit the various departments of the state fair during the forenoon hours and in the afternoon following the entertainment.

MARVIN GOODWIN DIES

HOUSTON, Oct. 21.—Marvin Goodwin, ex-manager of the Houston Buffaloes, has lost his last fight. He died Wednesday morning at 5:05 a. m. from injuries received when his airplane fell Sunday. Both of his legs were broken in several places.

THINKS RANGER IS BECOMING A MONEY CENTER

Vice President of Bank Passing Quarter Million in Seven Days, Sees Growth And Stability

Ranger is fast becoming a financial center for a large and increasing territory, in the opinion of W. W. Housewright, acting vice president of the Citizens State Bank, a new institution which passed the quarter million mark in its deposits on its seventh day of operation and had at the close of the tenth day, accumulated deposits aggregating more than \$271,000. These funds are not in the nature of diversion from any other financial institution of the city, but are an earnest of the city's financial growth and a growing tendency to maintain in the city, financial institutions of sufficient number and magnitude to carry on the increasing large business of the city, it was indicated by Mr. Housewright.

"The simple fact is," Mr. Housewright said, "Ranger is assuming greater importance daily in a financial way. I do not doubt that when the reports are made, it will be shown that not one but all financial institutions of the city are on the increase. Really, while we feel a just pride in our own rapid growth, and are thankful to all who have contributed to it, a quarter million or a half million dollars one way or the other, is a comparatively small item in Ranger's financial affairs."

"I believe the revelation of the importance of the natural gasoline industry through the columns of The Times recently did much to bring the people to a realization of this. It will be noted that one plant now under course of construction, is costing about double our own present deposits, not to mention the upkeep and maintenance of various refineries, compression plants and other industries and business enterprises in and near to the city. I regard the growth of her financial institutions, as an earnest of the growth and solidity of Ranger business in general."

MAVERICKS ARE PREPARING TO INVADE RANGER

Game Against the Bulldogs Next Saturday Promises To Be Replete With Thrills

Led by Captain Cox, all-star full-back of last year, the Eastland Mavericks will invade the city of Ranger Saturday afternoon, bent on Bulldog meat. This will be the Mavericks' third interscholastic league game, and having won the first two, they intend to keep their slate unsoiled by defeat.

The Mavericks will be somewhat weakened by the absence of Matthews at tackle and Cox at center. Milton Day, star lineman of the Eastland team, will also be unable to enter the game on account of an injured leg. Nevertheless Coach Adams has hastily whipped men into shape to fill these gaps and will have as strong a line as in previous games.

The Eastland aggregation will be accompanied to Ranger by about 1,000 fans, all of whom are looking forward to victory. Although the dopestors favor the Bulldogs, Ranger is quoted as having the fastest backfield in their district and is confidently depending on them to pave the way to a win over Eastland, who has depended largely on their line in other contests.

The Bulldogs have some demon players on their team, among them Shell and Shipp in the line, who are noted for their ability to stop line plunges. In Walker, Mills and Hery, Ranger has a backfield that is not only mean to stop on the offense, but is also great on breaking up plays when on the defense.

General Electric Is Under Fire For Alleged Monopoly

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—The corporate structure of the General Electric company again will be examined today as the federal trade commission continues its hearings against the Radio Corporation of America and associated companies in the radio field.

The complaint charges that eight companies, including the General Electric, the Western Electric and the American Telephone & Telegraph companies have combined and conspired to restrain competition in the manufacture and sale of radio devices and domestic and trans-oceanic broadcasting.

Reading of the list of companies in which the General Electric holds stock, covering 100 typewritten pages, took up most of yesterday's session. The respondents protest that the commission has no jurisdiction in the case.

STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER SEES MOODY

Offers to Testify Before Grand Jury, But Told Other Matters Being Probed

AUSTIN, Oct. 21.—An interesting conversation took place between Attorney General Moody and Joe Burkett, of Eastland, member of the state highway commission. Seeing the activities of Mr. Moody with regard to highway maintenance contracts and knowing the Travis county grand jury is investigating some of these contracts, Mr. Burkett came to Austin voluntarily and went direct to Mr. Moody, offering to go before the grand jury now in session at any time and give any and all information which he might possess.

Mr. Moody informed Mr. Burkett that he was not a prospective witness in any of these matters and that he did not intend to call him before the grand jury; that Mr. Burkett had not been connected with any matter which the grand jury is investigating nor does he anticipate calling the commission to testify in the investigation now under full swing.

Politics was responsible for "most of the criticism of the highway department and for most of the agitation for a special session of the legislature," Mr. Burkett said.

Mr. Burkett characterized overpayment of the American Road company by more than \$15,000 "an error in bookkeeping." He said that error should have been detected in at least three places, before the money was paid.

The division engineer was first innocently at fault in approving payment of the money; next the error should have been detected in the comptroller's department, and finally in the treasurer's department, he said. However, when it is considered that more than \$48,000,000 has been paid out by the highway department the error involving more than \$15,000 is comparatively small, it was said.

"In general, conditions are splendid in the 94 counties of my district," he said. "With the exception of one county judge, the judges and commissioners of the 94 counties are well pleased with the way highway work has been handled."

Will Plan Opening Of Auditorium At Tonight's Meeting

That the opening of the new American Legion headquarters now only a few days removed will not be confined to members of the Legion, was announced today by A. N. Larson, one of the high officials in the Ranger post who has the matter in charge, but it will include all ex-service men and all women who are eligible to membership in the auxiliary, whether these be actual members or not. This action was taken by the Legion recently when it was arranged to have a preliminary meeting tonight at post headquarters to make final plans for the opening. All ex-service men and their wives, widows and other women closely related to them are not only invited but are urged to participate in these preliminary plans and in the final opening, Mr. Larson announces.

It was further stated that while it is hoped all eligibles, both men and women, will avail themselves of the opportunity to become affiliated with the Legion, there will be nothing narrow or selfish in the functions to be performed by the Legion in its new quarters. It will not be necessary to establish the fact that a buddy is a Legionnaire in order for him to get help when needed, it is stated. All he has to do is to establish the fact that he is an ex-service man. A large attendance at tonight's meeting is anticipated.

Ranger Is Not Taking Hand In "Black" Probing

Ranger has thus far, held entirely aloof from the investigation going on in Cisco in regard to the eligibility of Black to play in this year's games. Cisco professes to be doing the investigation on its own account and of its own accord. Other towns with other teams hint that Cisco was late in taking the matter up. However that may be, Black either is or is not over twenty-one years of age and somebody's family Bible ought to be all that is necessary to decide the matter.

There are people in Ranger who believe Cisco is going to be a real contender for that district championship and that in the event Ranger wins from Eastland next Saturday, it will be a bulldog-lobo tussle over the big meaty bone. If it comes to that, Ranger might take some interest in such matters, it is stated in foot ball circles, but up to the present, a number of sought interviews have resulted in a total failure to find any Ranger school man or fan who is giving the matter much thought—yet. Later perhaps. But by that time, Cisco may have ironed the whole matter out.

FRANCE FAILS TO SETTLE.

Finance Minister Caillaux and his associates on the French mission failed to obtain a program of permanent settlement for which they expressed hope, but with merely a five-year payment proposal which in effect defers for that period, a final settlement.

While sharing the natural disappointment that a permanent arrangement was not reached the United States regards the result as a step forward, chiefly in the closer understanding it has developed between the two nations. The arrangement which M. Caillaux has agreed to lay before his government calls for annual payments of 40 million dollars from France for the next five years. Agreement on a program of final settlement to succeed the proposed temporary pact at its expiration would be left for negotiations to continue in the interim.

Secretary Mellon made it plain that the United States is much more concerned with the early payments than the French can make than with those promised to be made 50 years and more hence. Concretely \$100,000,000 in 1928 might not be worth more than \$8,300,000 now. The members of the American debt commission do not desire to deal in stage money.

PREPARING FOR WAR.

Following announcement that Turkey had mobilized four classes of young men for service on her frontiers, Great Britain announces that a strong British fleet will be maintained in Near Eastern waters during the next few weeks.

Notwithstanding the fact that relations between England and Turkey over the Mosul question are severely strained, London does not look upon the mobilization in Turkey as having any bearing on that situation, but believes it is best to play safe.

While England contends that the question of ownership of the Mosul oil lands is in the hands of the League of Nations, Turkey contends that the league commission has rendered its decision admitting that the title is in Turkey but recommending British mandate. Turkey holds that the territory belongs to her and that she is perfectly competent to govern it her own way without the intervention of any third party.

It is a very valuable and desirable strip of territory that England will not relinquish without a struggle.

A sheriff and six deputies at Miami, Fla., are indicted for shooting escaping prisoners. The evidence indicated that the jail door was left open on purpose, and the sheriff's posse killed the fleeing prisoners from ambush. This may be a simple method of getting rid of undesirable, but the grand jury didn't think so.

China is opposed to the proposed tariff parity and declares the right to fix its own tariffs without begging another nation to grant it autonomy. Somewhere we have heard it said that the United States entered the world war to secure the right of self-determination to all nations. But from all indications in Europe that was "the bunk."

During the first six months of this year motor vehicles in the United States increased 13.9 per cent. This does not include 70,200 official vehicles owned by states on which registration fees are not paid.

And written on her face were all the inarticulate sorrows that follow for womanhood, in the wake of human misdeeds, human selfishness.

In her face was mirrored not only the lesson that with a single pound of flesh the law seldom is satisfied.

No wrong has been committed by the 22-year-old girl. She is the victim, unable to strike back, upon whom blind justice inflicts its indirect, unmerited vengeance.

She's daughter of "The Wolf"—So the World is Hostile.

Daughter of La Salle street's "Lone Wolf" is Alice. As such, she is bucking a hostile world—for "Dad's" sake.

"Long John" and "Lean John" are the "Lone Wolf's" other nicknames. His true name is John Worthington, and no slyer, craftier buccaner ever pilied his trade in the hectic field of frenzied finance, so Chicago police will tell you.

For years "The Wolf" was hunted far and near by the authorities. At

intervals the chase would stop. Then it would be resumed again, following a new depredation. "The Wolf's" tongue was oily and his manner, glib.

They say he talked "cuckers" out of millions in fake stock deals.

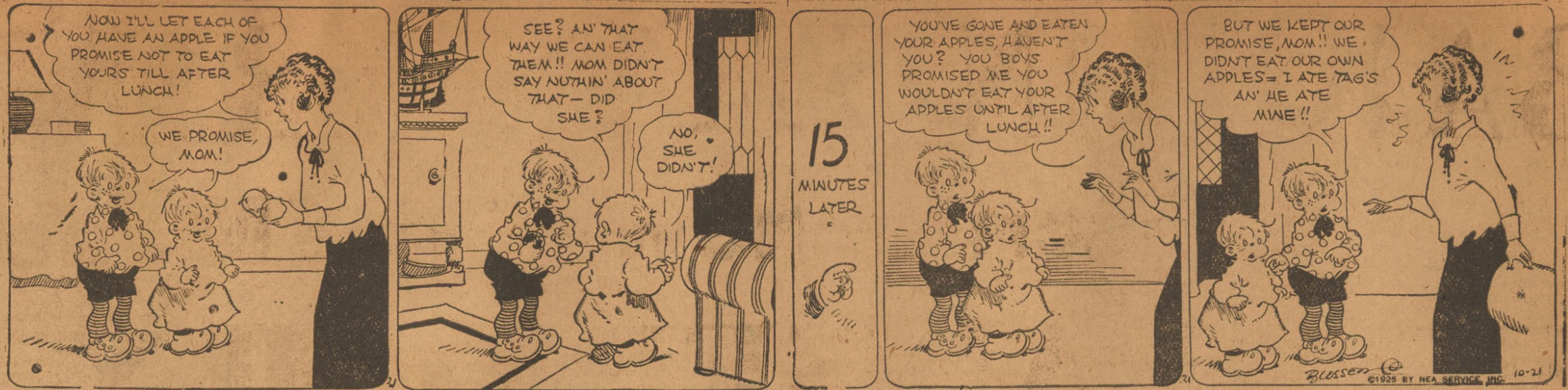

Federal Inheritance Tax Declared Unjust

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Condemning the federal inheritance tax as discriminatory and unjust, a delegation of 18 Texans today demanded its repeal before the house committee on ways and means, which is beginning the work of framing the new \$300,000,000 tax reduction measure.

The Texans were led by Lee Saterwhite, of Amarillo, speaker of the Texas house.

"The federal government confiscates under this inheritance tax a share of the estates that should go to the heirs," said Saterwhite. "The law was passed as an emergency war measure and there is no excuse why it should longer stay on the tax books."

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—A cable message from Geneva, Switzerland, announces that December 6 has been designated as "International Golden Rule Sunday." The day, which is the first Sunday in the month, was fixed at a meeting of the International Near East association's executive committee, whose membership includes Dr. Fridtjof Nansen, Viscount Cecil, Georges Clemenceau, Henry Morgenthau and other international figures whose interest in Near Eastern philanthropy is well known.

The purpose of the observance of Golden Rule Sunday is to call attention to the needs of international orphanage and educational work in the Near East. Whether the orphans under American care in that area are fed and clothed or go ragged and hungry will depend in no small degree upon the attitude of the American public toward this annual observance.

LITIGATION THIS YEAR IN EASTLAND COUNTY
