FORCE IN CHINA REQUESTED BY NEW MESSAGE

Repetition of Nanking Outrage Feared Elsewhere

AMERICANS ARE MOVING RAPIDLY

Nationalists Advancing Into the Southern Provinces

(By The Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, March 29.—Recommendation for strong action to prevent recurrence of the Nanking outrages at other points in Nationalist controlled territory is contained in a message forwarded to the state department today by Minister MacMurray.

While the message which reached MacMurray from Nanking did not bear the signature of the sender as received here, department officials believe it probably was signed by Consul Davis, who is still aboard a warship at Nanking.

Removal of Americans Rapid
SHANGHAI, March 29.—Removal of American citizens from that section in Central China held by Nationalists has now been extended to districts threatened by the Nationalist advance.

Refugees are moving out of Southern Shantung, Anhwei, and Southern Honan provinces.

19 Chorus Girls And Manager Are Arrested In Waco

WACO, March 29.—As the curtain went down for the final act in a music box revue here last night, nineteen chorus girls stepped from the stage into the custody of Waco policemen.

The officers acted upon orders from the censor board. The manager of the show is charged with an immoral act. Each of the defendants made \$25 bond.

Injunction Hearing Set For Panhandle Next Thursday

Judge Newton P. Willis of the 24th district court will hear in Panhandle Thursday morning the arguments in the petition for an injunction to restrain the Gray county commissioners from using county funds to pay officers alleged to be deputy sheriffs.

The petition is so worded that it must be acted upon Thursday, and unless the judge extends the case it will terminate automatically.

There is considerable interest in the hearing because it involves an interpretation of the state statute permitting counties to pay "deputy highway officers." Counties may not pay ordinary deputy sheriffs.

The petition alleges that the county does not have deputy highway officers, but is illegally paying deputy sheriffs.

Forty-Two Witnesses Are Fined Total of \$12,300 For Failure To Appear In Trial In Sweetwater

SWEETWATER, March 29.—Forty-two witnesses who failed to appear at the opening of the murder trial of L. F. Kirk, charged in connection with the death of Crawford Tabor in Runnels county in 1928, have been assessed fines aggregating \$12,300.

American Plane In Nicaragua Is Hit By Bullets

(By The Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, March 29.—An attack by Liberals upon an American airplane of the Marine corps was reported to the Navy department today by Rear Admiral Latimer, commander of forces in Nicaragua.

The admiral said a force estimated at 200 men opened fire yesterday with rifles, machine guns, and pistols on an airplane carrying Captain H. D. Campbell and Lieutenant F. H. Scribner.

Part of the tail of the plane was shot away but the officers were not injured.

Federal Road Aid To Be Released For Texas Roads

(By The Associated Press.)
AUSTIN, March 29.—Federal road aid to the amount of \$6,500,000 worth for 1927 again will be released to the state highway department within two or three weeks, after being withdrawn for about six months due to the poor financial condition of the highway department.

The road situation has been cleared up by the new commission and federal aid will be more easily obtained hereafter, said W. R. Ely, member of the department.

Fire Committee Sees Demonstration Of Big Truck

Fire Chief Ben White and Ike Lewis of the city council went to Lubbock Sunday to see a demonstration of an American LaFrance fire truck.

The delegates returned well pleased with the performance of this truck, which was a 750-gallon pump. The fire truck committee has been receiving a good response in its efforts to raise \$6,000 toward the purchase of a new truck and hiring of a fireman to stay on duty, and an order will likely be placed soon.

A demonstration of Seagraves trucks previously had been witnessed in Amarillo.

In last night's session, the city council purchased an additional 1,500 feet of standard fire hose.

DETROIT, March 29.—Aaron Sapiro, whose standard law governing cooperative marketing has been adopted in whole or in essence in 40 states, was pictured today as a man alleged to have been damaged to the extent of a million dollars by articles printed in Henry Ford's weekly, the Dearborn Independent.

Forward—or Backward?

(EDITORIAL)

The federal government is ready to release several millions of dollars to help Texas counties build good road, after withdrawing this aid during the latter part of the Ferguson administration. Gray county may receive state and federal aid as a gift if the road bonds are voted now, but delay may cost the county more than a million dollars.

Now, while federal and state aid is available and the rich oil properties are being taxed, is the time to vote road bonds. If tomorrow's vote fails to obtain a two-thirds majority, Gray county people will take a damaging step backward at the time when the Panhandle is going forward. Randall county has just voted bonds, and on the road to Fort Worth there is scarcely a county which has not voted road bonds in a big highway program.

Can Gray county afford to boast in one breath, then say "no" to her greatest opportunity in the next? We think not. There are scores of oil men who would make their headquarters here if Pampa had office building and good roads. A road building program would do more than any other project to hold Gray county and Pampa in the good will of the oil men.

Fifty per cent of the road materials can be obtained right here in the county. Work would be provided for laborers. Pampa would be a popular center of the oil field, instead of one held back by roads which cannot stand up under traffic. There is not a business in this district which will not profit hugely from good roads.

The tax question is not an issue. No county is more able financially to build the roads. Growing valuations will automatically lower the taxes and make possible continued building of good roads in the interior of the county.

Pampa must not fall in this election. Her population and her wealth give her the deciding power. She failed the rest of the county once, although she stands as the one to profit most. "Out of the Mud" is a good slogan, but the question of the hour is, "Shall Pampa blindly slip back into the mud when the rest of the Panhandle is rapidly getting out upon hard-surfaced roads?"

Scarcely a month passes but several counties vote bonds for good roads. Gray county, a rich, proud, progressive Plains territory, certainly shall not act like some backward, cotton-broke county never known to accomplish things. Think it over, AND VOTE FOR THE BONDS.

New Privileges Now Are Pampa's

GRAY COUNTY MAY HAVE 92 MILES PAVING

Proponents Point Out Need for Hard Surfacing

SPEAKERS OUT FOR BIG VOTE

"Out of Mud" Now Is Slogan of Good Road Fans

Gray county voters will go to the polls tomorrow to determine whether the county shall issue bonds for the hard-surfacing of approximately 92 miles of highway and the building and maintenance of lateral roads. An affirmative two-thirds majority vote will authorize a maximum issue of \$1,200,000.

A similar election lost by about a dozen votes last fall, largely on account of the small Pampa vote cast, as the time for the election nears the

ELECTION DATA

1. In voting, scratch out what you do not want; marking an "X", Oklahoma style, ruins a ballot.

2. Qualified voters must have been in the state a year, in Gray county six months, and must be a property holder. Take your poll tax receipt to the polls at the Chamber of Commerce rooms.

campaign promoting the issue is becoming thorough. Pampa headquarters for the drive tomorrow will be at Mayor Reid's office, and those not having a way to get to the polls may call 216 to receive transportation.

A delegation comprised of J. H. Lavender, J. L. Nally, and W. S. Barcus went to Grandview last night and discussed the election with a large audience. Enthusiastic talks were made, many questions were asked, and it appeared certain that this voting box will give an overwhelming majority for the bonds. Two speakers from Groom were present, including the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

Mayor F. P. Reid and Commissioner W. A. Taylor went to McLean today to take part in a mass meeting.

A full, intelligent vote will carry the bond issue, it was stated by campaign managers today. Voters are being urged to scratch or mark out "against the issuance of bonds" on the ballot, since Oklahomans or others who use the "X" sign will ruin their ballots. In Texas the voter marks out what he does not want.

Tomorrow will bring parades and various other activities over the county. "Gray County Out of the Mud" is the general slogan. Statistics showing that the rich oil properties will furnish the taxes without burdening the other property holders have been compiled and published.

BREEDERS OF SOLDIERS

A woman writer deplors the fact that women have practically no place in history. The exceptions are so few that they merely emphasize the colorless part the sex has played in human events in the past. "Breeders of soldiers"—this title, whatever its heroic significance in other ages, is not a popular one today.

Of course women have been more than producers of cannon fodder. Their sacrifices are between the lines, if not on the pages of history. And history, it may be said, is a poor substitute for a well-balanced chronicle of human experience. Writers too long have jumped from war to war in their histories, filling in with general statements of conditions which give little insight into the underlying circumstances. The poor work of historical writers has made it necessary for social scientists—the sociologists—to tear down classical errors and build up a semblance of the record of people, instead of events. Decisive battles are important, but one has but to recall the decisive battles of the last war to know that more important facts than battle results make up the real history of a struggle.

And women, taking a more full place in all human affairs at the present time, are finding their relations to big events growing more and more important. It is a rather awkward situation for them to have the mental endowments of the long glorified male, but being prevented by physique, custom and tradition from carrying out all of the projects they may help to form.

History henceforth will doubtless contain many references to brilliant women, and the fact that women will do more deciding than fulfilling will give some difficulty to investigators. In spite of the advancements of civilization, the sexes are far from being aligned with respect to their capabilities.

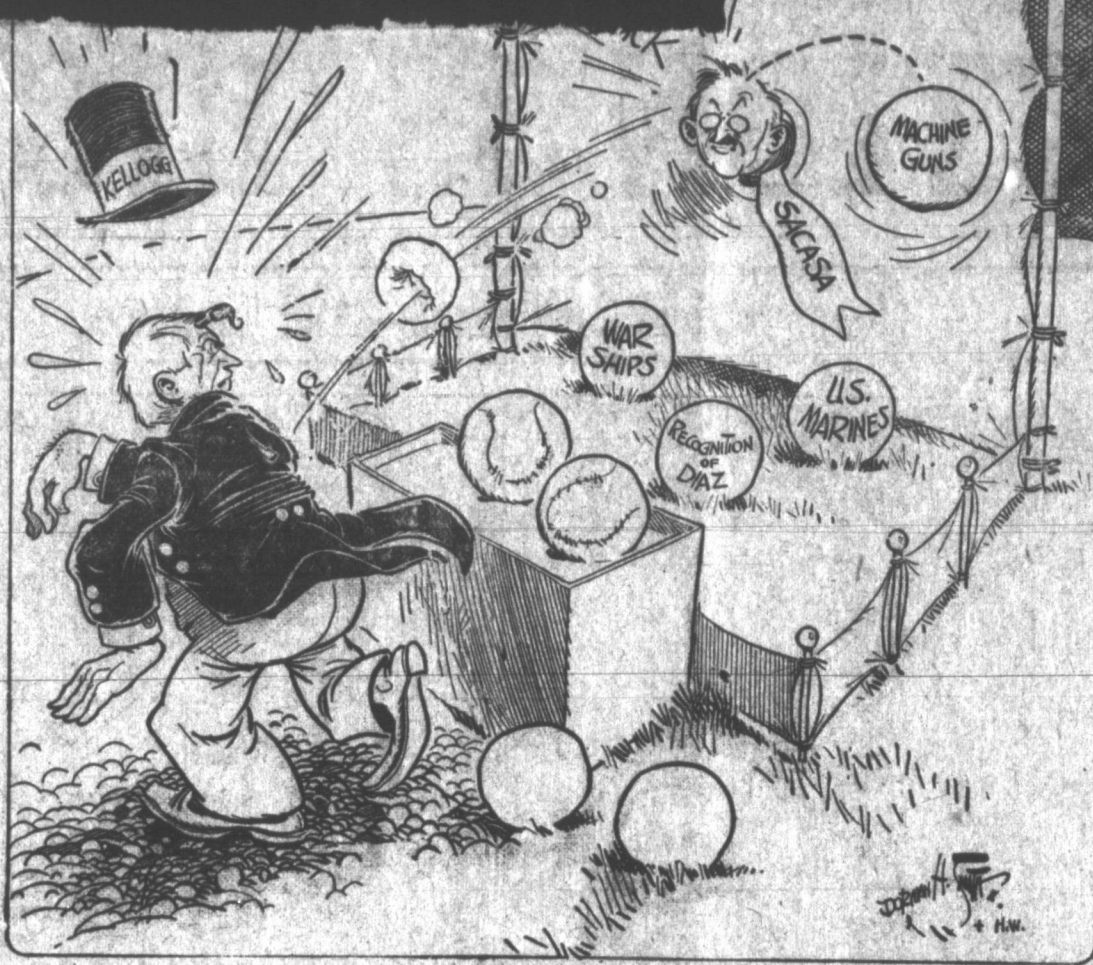
Terrible Smedley Butler has taken charge of the Marines in Shanghai, and it is to be hoped his reputation preceded him.

Women Powerless In Lincoln's Day

NEW YORK—Women may consider themselves the power behind the throne, but the presidential

chairs of American history have not concealed any influential women, says Honore Willile Morrow, author of "Forever Free," the first novel based on the life of Abraham Lincoln.

Mrs. Morrow spent eight years scanning biographies and read more than 150 volumes for data. Mention of female names was so rare that she had to resort to secret service files for the character of her villainess.

"Only in the last decade have American women become important in the lives of men who are making American history," she said. "In the period of the Civil War there were no women of outstanding political influence, we must have counted them merely as breeders of soldiers, for after reading every scrap of printed material about Lincoln and his era I find no mention of women who served outside the home."

Magic Fuel of Motor Once Indian Panacea Says An Oil Man

(By The Associated Press.)

OIL CITY, Pa., March 29.—Oil, once a founding of industry, staged barnstorming tours in the days of its poverty before it put millions of automobiles on the road.

Alvin Watterson, who is 81 and probably the oldest man in the nation's second wealthiest industry, recalls the medicine show incident as a smooth deal in oil a year before the singing of the Drake well, reputed here to be the first drilled.

Watterson and his gather skimmed a rainbow liquid from the surface of Oil Creek with woolen blankets in 1858. They wrung the crude oil into ale kegs and transported it to Pittsburgh on their river boat. They sold it to mendicants who put it into attractive bottles with gaudy labels and balleyhooded it by the light of flaming torches at Seneca or Rock Oil "the original Indian medicine to cure all the ailments of man or beast." The sale was tremendous, Mr. Watterson declares.
