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### Lamesa Bank Deposits Show Gain Of \$30,773 Over December Call

Deposits in the Lamesa banks continue to show a substantial gain with each succeeding statement. Although the usual peak in deposits is reached in the December call, this is not the case this year as deposits exceed the December call by more than thirty thousand dollars.

At the close of business March 26th, the banks here showed a total deposit of \$2,129,579.58, as compared with \$2,098,806 December 31st 1939, or a gain of \$30,773.

Total cash quickly available totals \$1,708,279.72. Loans and discounts total \$593,518.89.

The banks in Lamesa are possibly in the best condition for the time of year in the history of the county. It is very unusual for banks in this section to show a larger deposit in the spring than in the fall, as is the case this year. It is ordinarily the reverse.

### Dunn Clinic And Hospital Will Open This Week

The final touches are being put on the new Dunn Clinic and Hospital, at the North end of Austin Street, this week, and they expect to occupy the new place this week end.

Dr. and Mrs. W. H. Dunn, owners and operators, have been in Lamesa for many years and in the building of this new place have realized a dream of many years to have a compact place, and yet one that would adequately care for their practice here.

The new building, facing the south, is finished in Oriental White stucco with black trim. Modernistic architecture has been used throughout.

A spacious lobby at the front, is easily accessible to all departments of the clinic. On the west is the doctors office. Immediately behind this is the examination room and the bookkeeping department. A hallway divides this department from the operating room and nursery. All departments are closely connected so as to facilitate speed and accuracy in the operation of the plant.

The nursery has a glassed opening from the main hallway, where visitors can view the new-born babies, without entering the nursery. Another feature is an observation room, in which those who desire may witness an operation through a glass partition. The operation room is large and roomy. The laboratory, sterilizing room, X-ray room, wash-up room and X-ray dark room all open off this room.

Across the hall and along the east side of the building, is the patients rooms. There are four of these with five beds. Each room has a closet, wherein all bedclothes

#### Interest Mounts As Election Is Drawing Near

County Court Room Will Be Polling Place For All Qualified Voters

Interest is mounting in the Trustee Election for Lamesa Independent School District which will be held Saturday.

The election will be held in the County Court Room of the Dawson County Court House. The General Election laws of the State of Texas will apply and any resident of the School District, who is otherwise a qualified voter is entitled to vote.

There are three trustees to elect at this time and the following names have been filed and will appear on the ballot: J. H. Harp, A. G. Bearden, Fred N. Sanders, Swanson Hurt, and C. A. Baldwin.

Harp and Sanders are present members of the board. Others who will hold over from last year are Lee Billingsley, W. K. Crawley, T. D. Bandle and Sam Richardson. W. D. Arnett is retiring from the board.

Little interest was shown in this election last year, when only 22 votes were cast, but with the interest already shown, it is reasonably sure that there will be several hundred votes polled this year.

### Total Of 1,197 Votes Top All Former Records

Total Falls Only Three Votes Short Of Pre-Election Estimates

Thursday saw the largest vote in the history of Lamesa elect W. L. Marr as Mayor and Vernon W. Bryant and R. E. Speck City Commissioners.

A total of 1197 votes were polled as compared with slightly more than one thousand two years ago. Although the vote was far ahead of the last election, there was never the less more interest shown on the part of the people as a whole. The campaign was conducted all the way through on a clean basis and there was not the slightest sign of dirty politics on the part of a single candidate.

Mayor Marr who sought re-election over L. E. Eager, received 681 votes, while his opponent received 508 votes.

In the Commissioners race, Vernon W. Bryant, seeking re-election, lead the ticket with 651 votes, with R. E. Speck receiving 542, W. G. Weekes, 365, M. Hatch 333, S. F. Reynolds, 189, Carl M. Cox, 129 and Leonard Scott, 102.

Thus the city government is set for another two years and the consensus of opinion among various people over the city indicates that practically all are entirely satisfied with the results, which should make a most harmonious administration possible.

### 3,330 Motor Cars Registered For Dawson County

Monday, April 1, was the deadline for registering motor vehicles in Texas without penalty, and Tax Collector R. W. Herndon reports that a total of 3330 motor vehicles had been registered through that day, as compared with 3013 for the same period last year.

Passenger car registrations totaled 2,825, with 360 commercial vehicles, 285 farm vehicles and 60 trailers.

Approximately \$40,000 was collected by Herndon during the 1940 registration period, while for the same period in 1939 37,489 was the total.

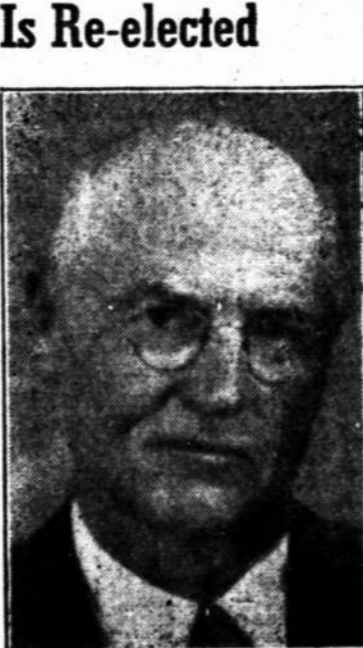
### Lamesa CC Camp To Hold Open House To Visitors Saturday, April 13th

The CCC Camp at Lamesa will hold open-house April 13th, in co-operation with the Soil Conservation Service and in commemoration of the seventh anniversary of the founding of the Civilian Conservation Corps. All citizens of this area are cordially invited to attend. The camp will be open to visitors from 2:00 p. m. to 5:00 p. m. The Soil Conservation Service will conduct field trips to the country to show visitors the various work projects under construction by the camp personnel. Guides will be stationed about the camp to conduct inspection tours of the barracks, mess hall and kitchen, school facilities, and other points of interest about the camp environs. Refreshments will be served to the visitors in the campmess hall.

In the five years this camp has been located in Lamesa, approximately 3,000 young men have passed through work and educational training here. It is estimated that the payroll for the camp during that period has been nearly \$500,000, much of which has been spent in this community. Of the 122 men at camp at the present time, 120 are engaged in some form of academic or vocational training designed to fit them for better social and economic participation in their respective communities upon completion of their terms of enrollment in the corps. The camp is at present under the command of Mr. Clarence E. Parks of Lamesa, with Mr. Fred L. Coil, Subaltern, Mr. J. A. von Lanken, Camp Educational Advisor and Mr. F. A. ### School Safety Patrol Makes Good Record

The student patrol of the elementary and grammar schools have been serving the school faithfully during this entire year, states Mr. G. M. Roberts, principal of the two schools. ### Dr. Allen D. Albert Is Final Speaker Of Series To Be Heard Monday



Dr. Allen D. Albert

The last in the series of lectures on International Understanding, being sponsored by the Lamesa Rotary Club will be given at the high school auditorium Monday evening at 8 o'clock.

Dr. Allen D. Albert of Chicago and Paris will deliver the address and will have as his subject, "The Struggle for Raw Materials."

These lectures have proven highly entertaining as well as educational to those who have heard them, and the one Monday night should prove as interesting as the three which have already been delivered.

Allen D. Albert has had an interesting career as a newspaper man, having begun in Washington, D. C. and New York. He was a war correspondent in the Spanish-American War. Chief Editorial writer for the Washington D. C. Times from 1895 to 1910. Publisher of the Columbus (Ohio) News from 1910 to 1911 and Editor and Associate Publisher of the Minneapolis Tribune from 1912 to 1916.

As assistant to the president of the Chicago Century of Progress, it was his responsibility to visit many of the European capitals on diplomatic missions relative to the exposition, and also to be commissioner of the exposition to Japan and China.

For a number of years Dr. Albert has been especially interested in the causes of city growth and programs of city development, having been consultant to many city development bodies. He is a member of the American Academy of Political and Social Sciences, and was special lecturer of the departments of English and Political Science in the University of Minnesota from 1912-1913. He received the degree Sc. D. in sociology from Evansville College in 1922.

He is the author of many articles on city planning, city analysis, and social changes. He is also the author of articles in encyclopedias on "World Fair Architecture."

Dr. Albert has been very active in the Rotary club movement, having served as President of Rotary International and as Rotary speaker on many occasions. He has delivered anniversary addresses for the Rotary clubs of Chicago, New York, Boston, Minneapolis, Omaha, and other cities. He made the opening address for two years at the Institute of International Relations at Nashville, Tennessee, and during 1937-39, addressed one hundred and sixty-six Institutes of International Understanding sponsored by individual Rotary clubs.

### Dr. Domain Gives Interesting Talk Here Last Monday

Describing Hitler as a menace to civilization, Dr. Nicholas Doman of Budapest, Hungary, Monday night told of the problems of Europe in the third of four numbers on the Institute of International Relations sponsored by Lamesa Rotarians. It is unapologetic for German women, both married and unmarried, not to bear children as Hitler has ordered, Dr. Doman said.

**Camps are Described**  
Concentration camps in Germany are not what the writers have been led to believe, but actually one-third of persons in the camps have died from starvation and torture, the speaker explained. He described a 1939 map of Central Europe as prehistoric.

Dr. Doman said there are more typewriters and fountain pens in that section of Europe than there are persons who can write and read. Germany supplies those articles in return for agricultural products of the other nations.

**Victory For Allies**  
Russian-Finnish peace was pointed out as a victory to Germany and a direct blow to the Allies.

"America save Finland its sympathy and Russia its exports," he said, "and steel and ammunition help far more than sympathy." People of Central Europe are emotional and disagreeable, explaining the unrest prevalent there, the speaker said.

"Americans are considered either millionaires or unemployed but living conditions of most unemployed Americans are better than those of many employed Germans, he further explained.

**U. S. Government Praised**  
Dr. Doman commended the American form of government as the finest in the world and said "it would be a luxury for European countries to elect a president every four years."

The talk was interspersed with humorous remarks. Approximately 200 attended. Final talk of the series will be conducted next Monday, night.

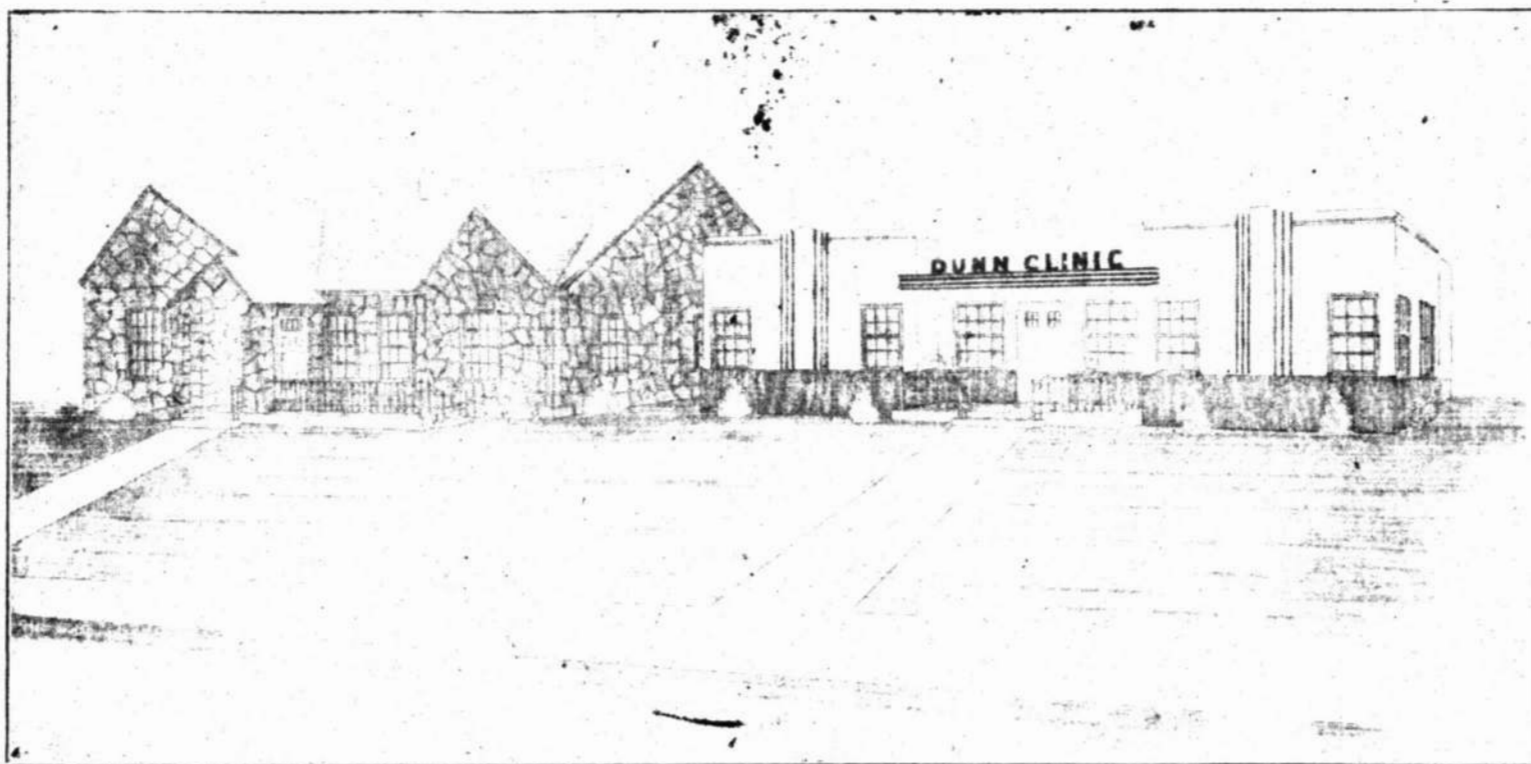

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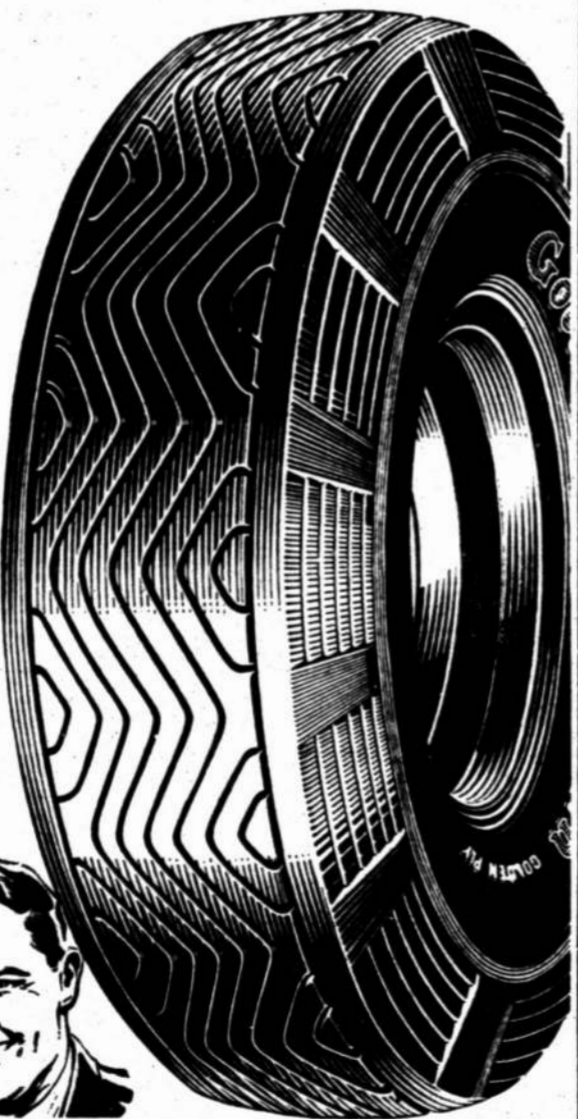

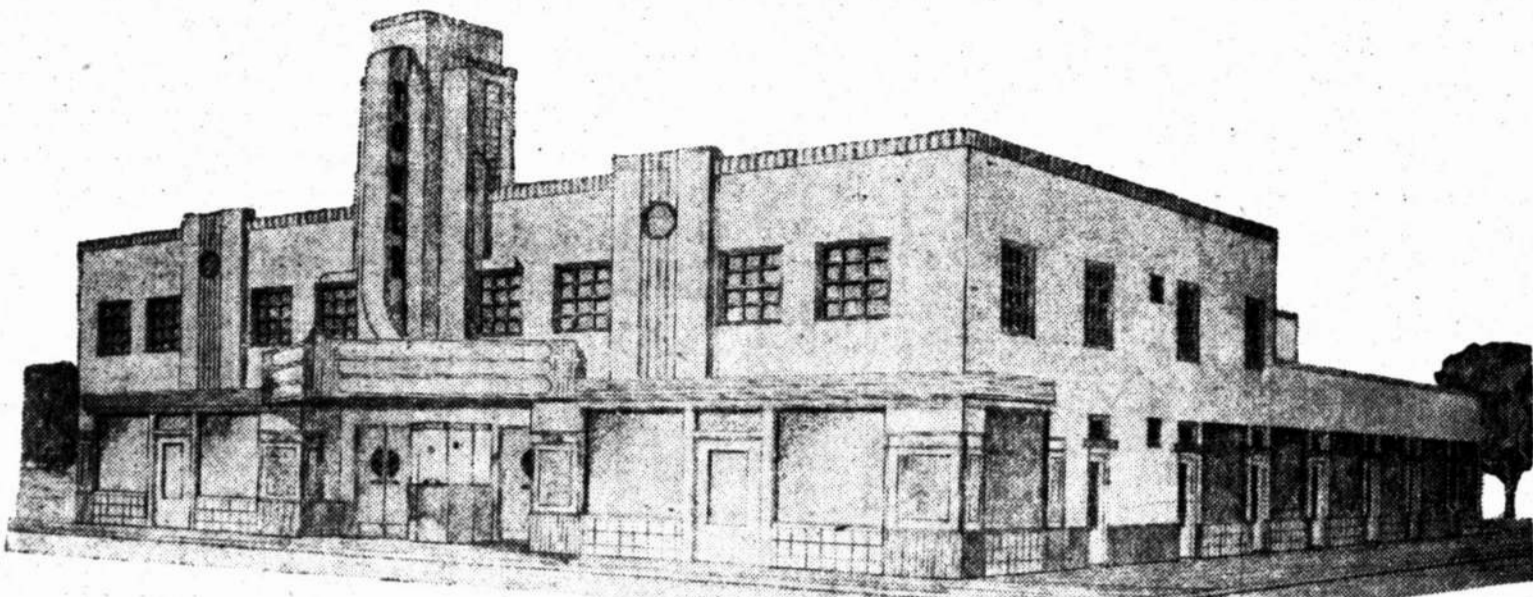

Hale county has the largest tilled acreage, 517,039; Lubbock, with 473,147 acres is second; Lamb with 451,366 acres is third; Swisher, 411,057, fourth; Floyd, 403,889, fifth; and Castro, 400,214 acres is sixth. These counties are the only ones with an excess of 400,000 acres of tilled land.

Yoakum Has Smallest

Six other counties, Parmer, Hockley, Lynn, Dawson, Terry and Crosby, have between 300,000 and 400,000 acres. Yoakum is the smallest, with 80,000 acres.

## Border Strips Are Being Used In This Area

Border strips will be used by many farmers in the Lamesa Camp Area this year to protect their fields against wind erosion damage and also to provide food and shelter for wildlife, according to Geo. D. Keathley Jr., Agronomist of the Soil Conservation Service SCS-CCC Camp located near here.

Areas where border strips will be planted usually are those especially subject to wind erosion. Keathley points out, A narrow strip of Sudan grass or sorghum along the field borders will check soil blowing from adjacent fields or roadways and at the same time will favor development of desirable species of birds and animals.

The clean cultivation of large areas of farm land has been an important factor in the depletion of wildlife, and thus favored the increase of insect pests which native birds and animals on the farm tend to keep under control. Keathley points out.

From a wildlife standpoint, the development of border strips of protective vegetation is more desirable than the same area of vegetation in a compact block, he says. Such strips provide travel lanes for birds and small animals and afford more extensive range into adjoining fields.

Gullies and other severely eroded areas also provide ideal sites for the use of plants and shrubs that will serve the dual purpose of controlling erosion and improving wildlife environment on the farm or ranch. Keathley says.

**Farmers Donate Acres To WPA Lunch Rooms**

Acres donated by farmers for the production of vegetables to be used in the WPA school lunch program will be considered non-depleting under the 1940 AAA program.

Under a special ruling of the AAA such acreage will be classified under the home garden provision of the 1940 program. The ruling stated that the acreage must be devoted entirely to vegetables but not affected by commercial vegetable allotments.

Approval of the acreage as non-depleting will be given provided none of the vegetables are sold, the acreage is designated before production, and the designation is approved by the county committee.

This classification applies only to gardens for the production of vegetables under the WPA program. It was pointed out that the WPA is sponsoring a state-wide project for the production of vegetables to provide rural school children with lunches.

**Farmers' Short Course Dates Are Announced**

The annual Farmer's Short Course at Texas A & M College will be held July 8-12. H. H. Williamson, director of the Extension Service, has announced.

The annual gathering will again be divided into three sessions. The junior short course for 4-H club members and other boys and girls is scheduled July 8 and 10 and the adults will meet July 11 and 12.

County agricultural and home demonstration agents will hold their annual conference in between these two sessions on July 9 and 10.

A number of special groups, including the Texas Home Demonstration Association and the Texas Agricultural Writers, have scheduled their annual meetings to coincide with the adult session.

**Mattresses For Texas Farmers Are Being Made**

First Cotton mattresses to be made in the nation under the U.S.D.A.'s new program for supplying surplus cotton and ticking to low-income farm families were those processed in Austin, according to information in a telegram received here from Grover B. Hill, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture.

The first two mattresses to be made with cotton and ticking supplied by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation went to one white family and one Negro family in Austin county. Applications for the first mattress was filed in the office of County Agricultural agent W. E. A. Menscher and certified by the county AAA committee.

Thirty-two mattresses for low-income families were made in Austin County within the first five days of the program's operation. Two days after the initial mattresses had been made in Austin County, production got under way in Ellis County. Three mattresses were made in three centers the first day of operation and a dozen the following day, according to reports received by Mildred Horton, vice director and state home demonstration agent for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, who is in charge of Extension supervision of the mattress program in Texas.

Cotton has already been received in Lavaca and San Saba counties, and production will get under way within the next few days. Miss Horton said Surplus cotton is also en route to the eight other demonstration counties in the state: Collingsworth, Hockley, Nolan, Van Zandt, Rusk, Frio and McLennan.

In Collingworth County more than 300 applicants have already been certified for the mattress-making materials. Three hundred of four hundred applications in Ellis County have been certified in addition to more than 90 applications filed by low-income Negro families in this county.

With the success of the project in the 12 demonstration counties secured, meetings in 167 Texas counties are planned as a means of expanding the program over the entire state.

**Employees Get Receipts For Tax Deductions**

Employees covered by the old-age and survivors insurance law are now required by law to give their employers receipts for the money taken out of their wages for old-age and survivors insurance taxes, according to Robert M. Mayne, acting manager of the Social Security Board field office at Big Spring. This new requirement of the Social Security Act, he explained, went into effect January 1, 1940.

Mayne pointed out that formerly the employer was only required to furnish the employee with a notation which would permit him to check the accuracy of the tax deductions. "This," he said, "could even be included on a pay check which would, of course, eventually be returned to the employer. But now the law specifically stipulates that the employer must furnish a statement suitable for retention by the employees." He added that the law provides a \$300 penalty for each willful violation of this provision.

"Certain specified information must be included on the receipt but the wording is left to the employer. In addition to the amount of tax deducted, the receipt must show the name of the employer, the name of the employee, the period of time covered by the receipt, and the total amount of wages paid to the employee during this period.

Employers are required to furnish such receipts at least once a year and may furnish them often—every quarter, or every month, or every payday, as they see fit. The receipt must be given to the employee within two months after the end of the period which it covers, and, in any case, when the employee leaves the job.
