FRENCH REDS PLANT BOMBS FOR LEGION

ALL OPENS ON PLAINS AS WINTER GRIPS NORTH

COUNTY CROPS RETARDED BUT NOT HURT YET

RAIN HERE TOTALS .31 OF AN INCH; ROADS ARE HEAVY

Low hanging clouds which have issued occasional showers and threatened heavy downpours in the immediate vicinity of Lubbock for several days, dumped a total of .31 of an inch of moisture on the city Sunday night, and continued in a threatening mood, with light drizzles during Monday. Driven by a cold wind from the northeast, fall descended upon the South Plains showing up maturity of an already late cotton and feed crop over the county.

Reports here today are that the rains fell in varying quantities all over the section of the state, making roads heavy and in some places almost dangerously slippery. The spell has brought no immediate damage to crops. In the opinion of Don L. Jones, superintendent of the experimental station, but some damage if it continues, mainly due to non-maturity of crops which are already late. Mr. Jones, however, sees no danger of a killing frost for some time. He said and expressed the belief that as long as the wind remains westerly, there is a high probability for clear weather, the great relief to the farmer at the present. It is said that two weeks of open weather early in October would mean much toward full maturation and feed.

ern Canada Is Grip Of Winter

WYOMING, Sept. 25 (AP)—Canada today was gripped by a heavy snow and sleet to all sections of the prairie. COTTON PRICE SOARS HIGHER

\$3.50 PER BALE HIKE FOLLOWS REPORT OF WEATHER TODAY

Numerous reports of a cold wave over portions of the cotton belt, which it was feared might result in damage to the yield if the frigid weather continues, brought about a \$2.50 advance in the price of baled cotton in both New York and New Orleans exchanges. This Associated Press announced today.

Cold Rain Cause of

NEW YORK, Sept. 25 (AP)—Reports of weather unfavorable for the development of late cotton in the southwest resulted in increased demand in the New York cotton exchange today and prices rose about \$2.50 per bale. Cold rains were reported from northwestern Texas, while the official forecast predicted freezing temperatures in northwestern Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle.

70 Point Raise Seen

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 25 (AP)—Official forecasts for cold weather with freezing temperatures in the northern portions of the belt and prompt stoppage of large tenders for October contracts prompted an advance of \$2.50 a bale in the cotton market here today. Covering by shorts and trade buying eventually forced December to 21.45 and January 21.48, 70 points above the previous close.

## Water Development Requested By Trio

AUSTIN, Sept. 26 (AP)—Three applications for water development were granted today by the state board of water engineers and action on three others, proposing use of water from the Brazos, was postponed when the new Brazos Valley Water association presented immediate grants until it can look into the application.

## Stepfather Killed, Wife And Son Held

BIRMINGHAM, Calif., Sept. 26 (AP)—Charles Van Alderwell, 39, manager of the San Francisco office of the American Railway Express company, was shot and killed during a quarrel with his wife, Marie, in their home today. Jerome Frank Van Alderwell, 14-year-old stepson, and his mother were charged with responsibility for the shooting. Both were held in the city jail.  
Young Cornell said he found his stepfather choking his mother. He said he shouted a warning to his stepson to end his attack. The boy said when Van Alderwell did not stop he shot him with a .22 caliber rifle. The police said they were not sure if the mother was trying to shield her son.

## Wandering Parson Facing More Woes

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Sept. 26 (AP)—More charges against the Rev. Willie F. Jordan, detained here pending arrival of officers from Charlotte, N. C., were announced by local authorities today.  
A letter from Herndon, W. Va., written by G. Meador, asserted that Jordan left a wife and an only child dead there several weeks ago. Meador declared that the preacher came to that city some six or eight months ago from Wisconsin, intending to pastorate there. On July 17, the letter continued, Jordan recommended receipt of a call from Washington, D. C., to conduct a five weeks' series of meetings. Word came from Washington later that he had been killed and his body thrown into the Potomac river. Shortly afterwards, however, he returned to Herndon but left again without making arrangements to repay \$125 borrowed from Meador and Dr. E. S. Tolson to make the trip to Washington. Deputies from Charlotte, N. C., are understood to be enroute here with a warrant charging Jordan with murder.

## Von Maltzen Rites Set For Tomorrow

VOLLBRATHSBUHE, Mecklenburg, Germany, Sept. 26 (AP)—Funeral services for Baron Agost von Maltzen, German ambassador to the United States who was killed in last week's airplane crash on the Berlin-Munich line, will be held tomorrow. The body lies in the great hall of Gross Lauenow castle, the ancestral home where his German relatives still reside. It will be carried by rail through the castle park to the family burial place on a little hill nearby surrounded by tall pine trees, to rest beside that of his mother.  
The father, a consular official, has requested the German foreign office not to send representatives, as he wishes the ceremony to be entirely private.

## Strange Rites! Ashes Of Writer Strewn On Moscow By Associates

MOSCOW, Sept. 26 (AP)—Strewn from a military airplane, the ashes of Walter C. Whitfen, late Moscow correspondent of the Associated Press and for many years its representative in various world capitals, have been scattered over the highways and byways of this city of his last assignment.  
The funeral was the first of its kind in the history of Moscow and the ceremony was watched by a large group of spectators. It was in accordance with one of the correspondent's last wishes.  
Russian Strews Ashes  
The ashes were carried in a flower urn and were scattered over the city by N. Kotoff, a Russian newspaper comrade and assistant, when the plane had reached a height of about 500 feet.  
The ceremony took place after a religious and civil service attended by the entire American colony here, as well as by representatives of the soviet foreign office, the soviet news agency Tass, and Soviet Press and an attaché of the Japanese embassy. Mr. Whitfen having once served in Tokyo.  
Charles Stephenson Smith and William Koswick, representing the Associated Press, spoke briefly before the ceremony.

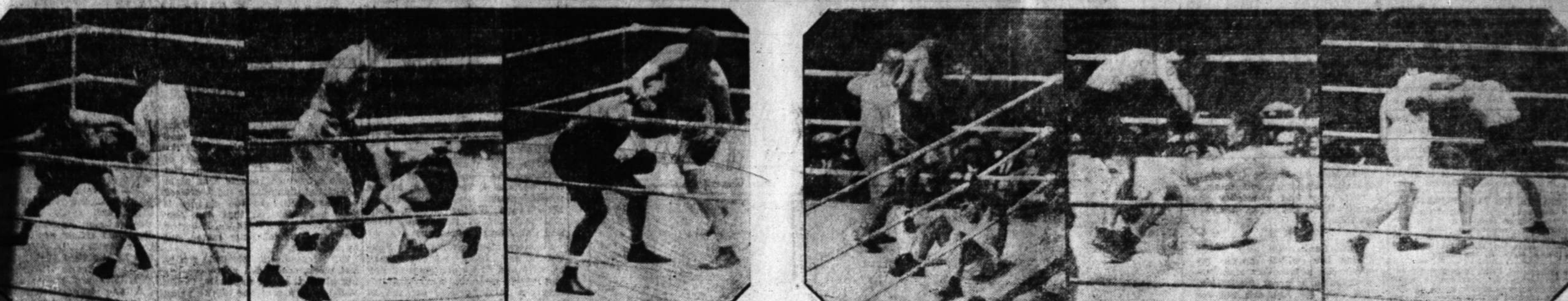

Tunney, however, kept at him, eternally watching for an opening, and in the fourth round nearly cut the champion to sleep—knocking him to one knee with a furious fusillade of right and left. Dempsey weathered the storm after being on the verge of a knockout, but back strong and proceeded to mix it with the champion. Tunney gave as good as he received, a flying Jack feverishly with a jab on the back of the head. Dempsey, however, was still dangerous, but when Tunney, perhaps still out of breath for a moment, relaxed his guard slightly in the seventh round, Dempsey nailed him with a blow like the one he used to be famous for, and Gene went down in a heap, slumping dejectedly to the ropes with one hand and taking a count of five—a count that some observers say was stretched to 13 by Dempsey's failure to retire to his corner promptly before arising. Now it was Tunney's turn to weather the storm and face defeat. He did it like a champion, and opened with an attack on Jack's face. Dempsey stuck to his gun, standing the champion to the floor again in the ninth round. Tunney was up speedily, however, and unleashed a final bombardment, with his deadly one-two punch, that had Dempsey groggy, bleeding and all but out at the final bell.

The batteries for Sunday's game were: For New Orleans, Danforth and Dowle; Anderson, For Wichita Falls, Stengraf and Joe Cobb.

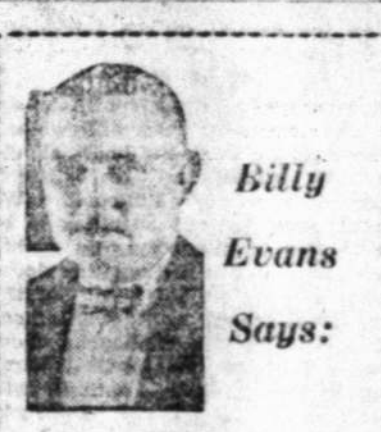

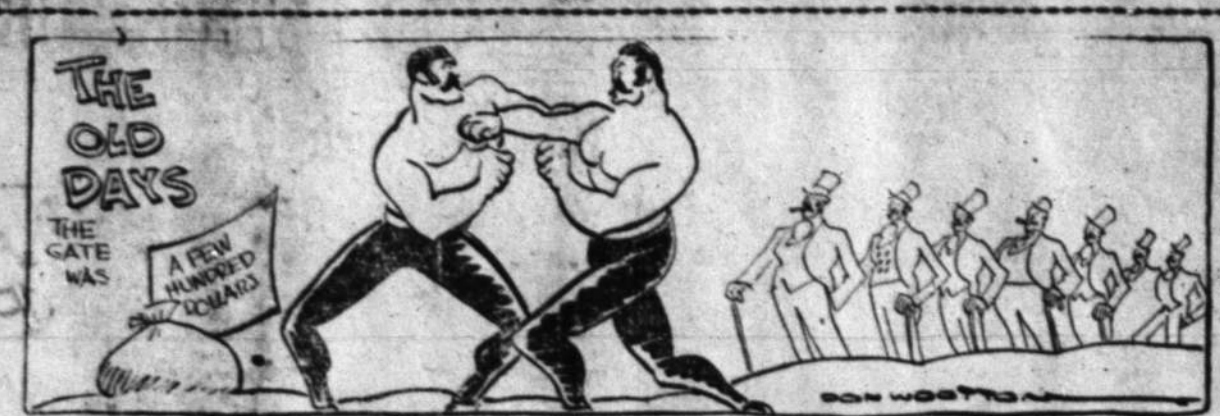

Massachusetts' Political Power Wanes As Republicans Cast Wary Eye On New York, Dutcher Says In Capital

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—Time was when one heard considerable crabbng about the predominance of Massachusetts men in the federal government.

Weeks ago chairman of the Senate foreign relations committee and Gilbert was speaker of the House.

Now Weeks and Lodge are dead. Gilbert is in virtual retirement in the Senate and even President Coolidge himself has started on the way back toward private life.

Massachusetts isn't setting many of the big pulses and no other state seems likely to establish an oligarchy here such as she had attained in the last days of Murray Crane, even Pennsylvania, which is the most solidly Republican of all the very big states, complains frequently at the fact that she doesn't get much federal patronage simply because the party knows she needs no coaxing.

On the other hand, the tendency to smile upon New York is more and more reflected in the administration's appointments. Enough of these instances have been cited in previous dispatches to dispense with any repetition, here, but the belief is constantly strengthened that the Republican party is doing all it can to reduce the possibility of a victorious Al Smith ticket in November, 1928.

Hence the play to New York. The party may not believe that Smith will be nominated; it may not believe he can be elected. But the G. O. P. isn't overlooking a single bet.

The International Permanent Court of Arbitration at the Hague hasn't much connection with American party politics, generally speaking. Some New Jersey Democrats may believe it is a pet project or something of Mayor Frank Hague of Jersey City, but they are mistaken. The court is an international body with four American members.

The death of Oscar S. Straus last year left three—Charles Evans Hughes, Ellis Root and John Easton Moore, professor of international law at Columbia University. All really bright children will note promptly that these three important persons are of New York. For that matter, so was Oscar Straus.

Unless one or two have been lost overnight, there are 48 states. Presumably there was someone of sufficient distinction in one of the other 47 to fill the shoes of Straus which would have given some other section of the country a look-in. Perhaps even Judge Webster Thayer of Massachusetts might have done.

Just the other day came the news that President Coolidge had offered the post to Judge Benjamin N. Cardozo. What! You don't know who Judge Cardozo is? Well, Judge Cardozo is the chief justice of the court of appeals in New York.

But Judge Cardozo was not selected without inspiration from the New York politicians who plan the anti-Smith strategy. To quote from a leading New York newspaper:

"The invitation to Judge Cardozo was extended by President Coolidge after consulting Charles D. Hilles, Republican national committeeman, who although Judge Cardozo is a Democrat, strongly

WHEAT

With only a normal amount of moisture the Panhandle of Texas will become a real factor in the wheat market of the world in 1928," says Walter Barlow, general manager of the Great West Mill and Elevator company.

Farmers throughout the Panhandle are busy sowing wheat, tractors and drills are running day and night, and Mr. Barlow states that the total acreage for the 26 Panhandle counties sowed to winter wheat will exceed 1,600,000 acres.

"This is a most conservative estimate," said Barlow. "There are some who believe that the total acreage will exceed 1,800,000 acres, but I believe that is a little too high."

There will be 350,000 acres in Curry and Quay counties of New Mexico and fully 500,000 acres in the Oklahoma strip. That means that there will be 2,750,000 acres of wheat in the Amarillo trade territory.

"The land was never in better condition. The majority of it has been broken two and three times. There is an abundance of moisture to start the crop off right. Thousands of acres are already up. With only a normal amount of moisture this winter and next spring a crop that will average more than 29 bushels to the acre is almost a certainty."

The 2,750,000 acres of wheat will produce 55,000,000 bushels of wheat and the Panhandle of Texas alone would have more than 30,000,000 bushels. The importance of such a crop and the prosperity it follows it can only be estimated at this time.

Mr. Barlow's statistics show that the wheat acreage of the 26 Panhandle counties has increased 66.2-3 per cent since 1924, when it was only 900,000 acres. In 1925 the acreage was 1,100,000, and in 1926 1,500,000 acres.

Reports from all over the Amarillo territory are to the effect that the acreage will be the largest in history, some sections reporting as much as 169 per cent increase.

"One of the best features of the 1928 wheat crop is that farmers are sowing it earlier than usual," said Mr. Barlow. "This means that they have a better chance to escape a crop and that the price should be better as our wheat gets on the early market."

"Don't forget that the Panhandle still leads the world in the quality of its wheat. This was particularly true this year and right now will be beginning for wheat from the Panhandle, Kansas may boast of the best wheat in the world, but the Panhandle produces it."—AMARILLO NEWS.

With the present wet weather flooding on, it would seem that this is going to be a good fall to sow wheat in this part of the country. There will be a good season all through the winter and up into the spring, which will make the production of wheat more certain than if it is planted in the dust, and it will bring in some mighty good money next summer between cotton crop. The South Plains will grow wheat, especially in some sections. Lubbock county soil possibly is not all adapted to the growth of wheat so well, but there is a large per cent of the county that will grow good wheat, and we believe that every farmer where his land is at all adapted to wheat should have some this winter.

OIL FRAUD IS NOT YET OVER

EIGHT DEFENDANTS IN RECENT CASE ASK MERCY OF COURT

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Sept. 25.—John S. Pratt, special prosecutor in mail fraud cases in connection with the promotion of the Invader group of oil companies of Oklahoma, last night confirmed reports that eight additional defendants had offered to plead guilty to the charges if they were assured that one year prison terms and fines would be the maximum punishments meted out by the court.

Six defendants pleaded guilty last week, suspended sentences being given three of them. B. Frank Wood drew a sentence of two years and two remain to be sentenced.

Must Return Funds The court in passing sentence on the men made it a condition that they turn over their gains from the promotions for the benefit of stockholders who were said to have invested \$20,000,000 in the companies.

Postal inspectors, according to Pratt, have insisted that at least three of the eight remaining defendants, Owen A. Wood of Amarillo, his brother, Bert G. Wood of Fort Worth and L. R. Texas Utilities Will Open Plant At Post Tuesday

The Texas Utilities commission pioneer power and ice manufacturing on the Plains, will formally take over the light and power plant of the Post Power company, A. Post, Tuesday, in a public reception to be held at the company offices, it was announced today by Hubert L. Allen, district manager of the company.

The reception will begin in the afternoon, and continue into the night, and every citizen of the city is being urged to inspect the plant and offices some time during the reception, Mr. Allen said. Post will be the 42nd Plains town served by the Texas Utilities company with light and power lines.

A new transmission line has been completed from Slaton to Post, to serve the new addition from the gigantic plant of the firm here, and the work will begin at once on rebuilding of all lines in the city 96 miles to make them standard in conformity with the company's other holdings.

Roy B. Holland, who has been in the ice manufacturing plant of Utilities company at Post will be active manager of the enlarged holdings, Mr. Allen said.

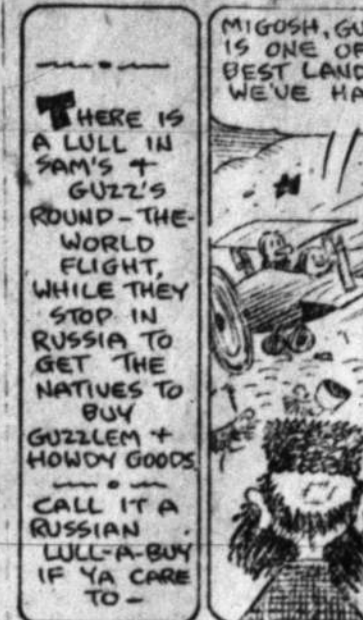

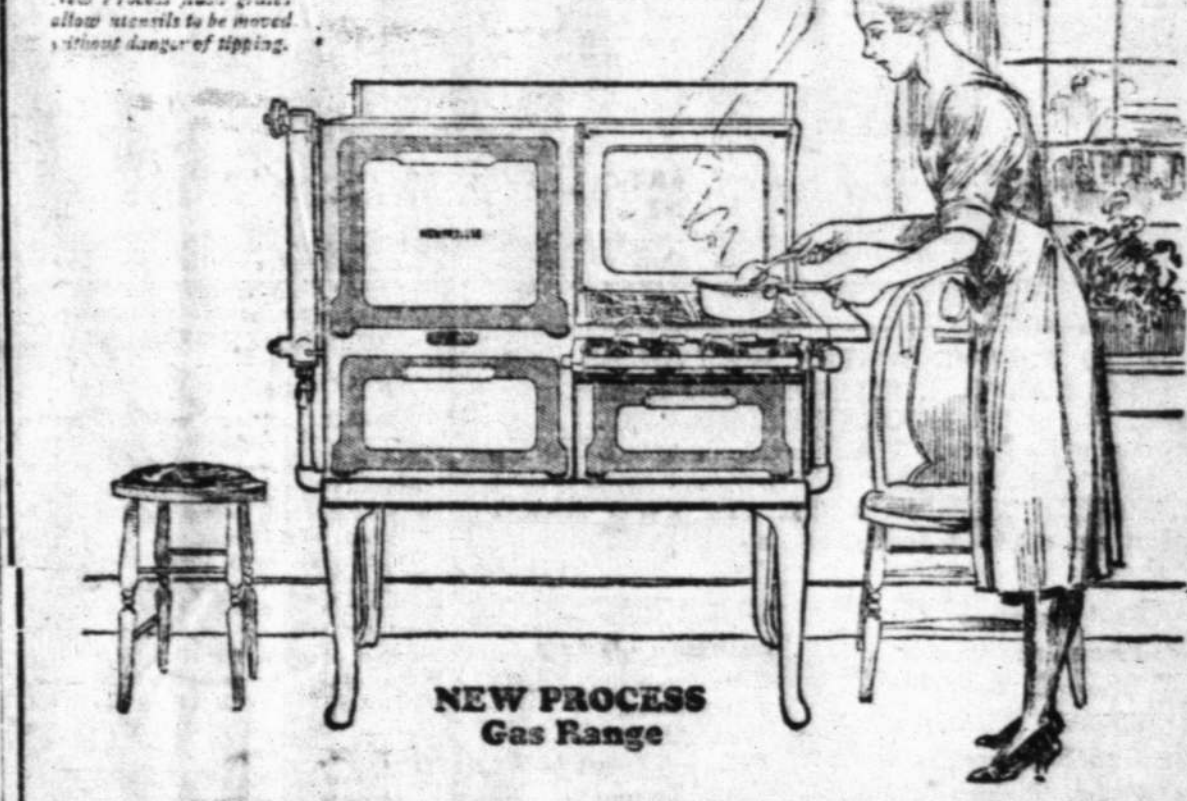
