I've been so happy to hear how many from here have been going to see "Thundering Sounds of the West" in the Pioneer Amphitheatre in Palo Duro State Park. A Silverton family and Silverton story is important in the presentation, and the following background story has been furnished by Mrs. Ples Harper of Canyon.

O. P. Cowart grew up in Silverton and helped for many years in the store which belonged to his father. Among his delights as a boy was exploration of the canyons nearby, and some eleven years ago he returned as ranger and concessionaire in the Palo Duro Canyon State Park, to the crevasse he loved. Later when the two responsibilities were divided he chose to be concessionaire, and as part of his duties he gave support and inspiration to the developing Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation. Now that the work of the Foundation has progressed to the point where it is presenting its first view of Panhandle history in the production, "Thundering Sounds of the West," which is playing every night except Tuesdays in the beautiful new Pioneer Amphitheatre, Mr. Cowart has charge of the food concession at the theatre, where the administration can take advantage of his experience in the canyon when it is needed—as it often is.

Mr. and Mrs. Cowart have three children who contribute to the success of the production. Their son, Jim, is in the chorus of villagers in the western town which opens and closes the shows. Their daughters, Lillian and Lou Ann, who are both accomplished musicians, each have solo numbers to perform. In addition, all three of the young people ride as flag carriers, using the skills they developed as they ranged the canyon on horseback as they grew up.

"Thundering Sounds of the West" is the story of the whole Panhandle, and it includes the battle of Col. Mackenzie with the Indians in 1874 and mentions his daughter of the 1400 horses. The writers of the script for this production were Mrs. O. P. (Rose) Cowart and Mrs. Ples (Margaret) Harper, and they tried to develop in the audience a sense of the happenings in the whole length of the Palo Duro chain, the 126 miles. This show is a wonderful opportunity for the people of the Panhandle to review and reveal their history, and the travelers are seeking it out and responding to it with great enthusiasm.

Agriculture Secretary Explains Farm Bill

Secretary of Agriculture Freeman has issued the following statement relating to Farm Bill, H.R. 8611:

"This is in reply to the large number of inquiries received by the Department of Agriculture concerning provisions of the legislation relating to wheat, feed grains and cropland adjustment contained in the Farm Bill, H. R. 8611 recently approved by the House Agricultural Committee, and to its ultimate effect upon farm income and consumer cost, particularly questions concerning a so-called 'bread tax'."

Major provisions of the House Bill are:

1. A wheat program basically similar to the one in effect last year would be improved and would increase wheat producer's incomes by \$150 million a year while continuing to reduce Government costs and improve production and marketing flexibility.
2. The feed grain program which has successfully reduced carryover supplies of feed grain from 84 to 36 million tons since 1961, and added \$3 billion to farm income while achieving market stability, would be extended and improved.
3. A cotton program that would continue the one-price approach which has successfully placed domestic processors in a competitive position with foreign processors and increased domestic consumption while giving cotton farmers

more freedom of choice in planting and marketing.

4. A new cropland adjustment program that would assist farmers in shifting acreage from allotted crops into conservation and recreation uses.

5. A dairy program that would make available to dairy producers in Federal order market areas a class I base provided the plan is approved in a referendum.

6. The present wool incentive program, designed to encourage domestic production of wool, would be continued for four years, with the minimum support level to be set at 77 percent of parity.

Under the bill approved by the House Agricultural Committee, the voluntary wheat certificate program would be continued for four years.

Basic provisions of the bill would:

1. Suspend marketing quotas while the program is in effect.
2. Continue and simplify computation of state, county and farm allotments. Allotments would be computed on the basis of the preceding year's allotment instead of five and ten-year averages.
3. Benefits would be computed on the basis of projected yields instead of being tied to historical averages.
4. Acreage allotments with payments for diversion of acreage to conserving use would be continued.

5. Diversion payments authorizing additional voluntary diversion up to 50 percent of farm allotment.

6. Domestic marketing certificates would be issued for not less than 500 bushels annually.

7. Wheat with domestic certificates would be supported at or near 100 percent of parity, or about \$2.50 a bushel.

8. Support non-certificate wheat through loans at a level on competitive world prices and feeding value of wheat related to feed grains.

9. Continue authority for export certificates.

10. Permit guar, sesame, safflower, castor beans, mustard seed or flax to be grown on diverted acres at reduced payment rates.

11. Allow substitution of wheat and feed grain acreages as in 1965.

12. Leave minimum resale price of CCC wheat at present level.

13. Provided authority to broaden provisions for exempting flour clears not used for human consumption from marketing certificate requirement.

Contrary to the charges by those who oppose the proposed voluntary Wheat Certificate Program, it does not constitute a "bread tax" on consumers.

The Wheat Certificate Program completed its first year June 30, with these results:

Profit to wheat users thus far in 1965, according to recent Stan-

dard and Poor's Surveys, is higher in nearly every case than for the same period in 1964.

Consumer prices for wheat products have remained stable. Bread prices in the past 12 months have averaged around 21 cents a loaf or less, virtually unchanged from the period before the certificate program went into effect.

This has occurred despite dire predictions that the certificate program would raise the price of bread and wheat products to consumers.

The new legislation would provide the wheat farmer an additional seven-tenths of a cent for the wheat used in a loaf of bread by domestic bakers. It will be the first time in 15 years that the wheat farmer has had an increase in his share of the returns from a loaf of bread.

Under the 1965 Farm Bill, the feed grain program would include the following basic provisions:

1. The program would be continued for four years.

2. Corn and grain sorghum are included, and under certain conditions barley, oats and rye.

3. Price support for corn would be at 65 to 90 percent of parity, with grain sorghum, barley, oats and rye at comparable levels.

4. In addition to price-support loans and purchases, price support payments would be made to participants on that part of their base that is necessary to make the

program effective. The secretary could authorize soybeans on feed grain acres with price support payments.

5. Payments for diverting acreage from feed grain to conservation would be up to 50 percent of the price support rate for the commodity in the county as under previous programs.

6. Yields on which diversion payments would be computed would be the yield expected on the farm in the current year rather than being tied to a historical five-year average.

7. As in previous years, under certain conditions, diverted acreage could be devoted to guar, sesame, sunflower, safflower, castor beans, mustard seed and flax at reduced payment rates.

8. Producers could plant wheat on feed grain acreages and feed grain on wheat acreages as under the 1965 program.

9. Up to 50 percent of the estimated acreage of conserving crops on the farm must be maintained in conservation.

Included in the Farm Bill is a new program, the Cropland Adjustment Program, which would offer long-term contracts to farmers to divert land from crops to recreation, open space around cities, wildlife habitat, and other conservation uses for the public benefit.

Under the Cropland Adjustment Program:

1. Farmers could enter into contracts during the period 1965 through 1969.

2. The contract period would not be less than five years nor more than ten years.

3. In order to take part, a farmer would have to agree to retire all of his acreage of at least one surplus crop.

4. Grazing or cutting hay would be prohibited except in case of drought, flood or other natural disaster and then only with reduction in rental payments.

5. For diverting cropland to approved uses, producers would receive assistance in establishing such uses in addition to diversion payments.

6. Diversion payments could be made either in installments or annually during the contract period.

7. Total acreage placed under contract in any county would be limited to a percentage of the total eligible acreage in the county to avoid an adverse effect on the economy of the county.

8. The Secretary would be authorized to transfer funds appropriated for carrying out the program to any other Federal agency or to states or local governments for use in acquiring cropland for the preservation of open spaces and natural beauty, the development of wildlife and recreational facilities, and the prevention of air and water pollution.

9. The Secretary would also be

authorized to share with state and local government agencies the cost of establishing practices and uses which will establish, protect, and conserve open spaces, natural beauty, wildlife, and recreational resources and prevent air and water pollution.

10. No land could be brought into the program where ownership has changed within the last five years.

11. The annual payment on retired land may be increased if the owner agrees to permit access to the land without charge by the general public for hunting, trapping, fishing and hiking.

If the farm bill fails to pass, we would go back to the 1958 law on cotton, and there would be no effective feed grains, wheat, or wool programs. Continued rises in stocks of surplus commodities could be expected, in addition to a sharp reduction in farm income."

Superhighway Driving

Some women are frightened by the thought of freeway or turnpike driving. But, you'll have a safe journey, if you'll follow the rules of the road.

Concentration on your driving is absolutely necessary on freeways, as faster-than-usual traffic adds to your driving responsibilities. Keep alert; be on the lookout for changing conditions; expect the unexpected.

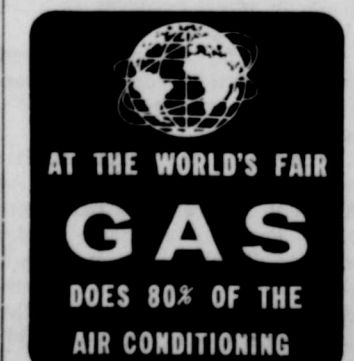
Speed control is important. Freeways are not race tracks and posted limits should be respected and not be exceeded. Check your speed often. On freeways, you can gradually increase your speed to a point far higher than you intend without realizing it.

Because of your higher than usual driving speed, longer stopping distances must be allowed for. For each 10 miles per hour of speed, stay at least 20 feet (a little over 1 car length) back of the car you follow. Or, multiply your speedometer reading by two and stay that many feet behind the car you are following.

In case of a flat tire give a stop signal and pull completely off the road pavement as far as the shoulder permits. At night, use flares or reflector. A Bernzomatic tire inflator is the easiest way to seal a flat. This convenient aluminum cylinder will inflate and seal your tire in just 60 seconds and give you 100 miles of continuous travel.

Prepare well in advance when you want to leave the freeway. Watch at least a mile in advance for a sign designating your interchange. Accidents are caused when drivers spot their exits late and then make sudden changes in speed or direction.

Remember, once you're off the freeway you're traveling with considerably slower traffic, so adjust your driving intelligently to the new conditions.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Ten Cents (10c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Section 51, Article III, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article III, of the Constitution.

hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise in not more than ten (10) years; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty Cents (30c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"The following state institutions then in existence shall be eligible to receive funds raised from said Ten Cent (10c) tax levy for the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, and for the succeeding ten-year period:

Arlington State College at Arlington
Texas Technological College at Lubbock
North Texas State University at Denton
Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont
Texas College of Arts and Industries at Kingsville
Texas Woman's University at Denton
Texas Southern University at Houston
Midwestern University at Wichita Falls
University of Houston at Houston
Pan American College at Edinburg
East Texas State College at Commerce
Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville
Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos
West Texas State University at Canyon

Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches
Sul Ross State College at Alpine
Angelo State College at San Angelo.

"Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by said Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations:

"(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1978.

"(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966 shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institution to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state senior institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

"(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations for the said ten-year period that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

semester of the tenth year. All such designated institutions of higher learning shall not thereafter receive any general revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this Amendment, and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This Amendment shall be self-enacting. It shall become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede and repeal the former provisions of this Section; provided further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any state institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this Amendment but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as allocated to any such institution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

Meeting A Challenge At The Fair



Building the doughnut-shaped pool for the new half-million dollar Florida Citrus Water Ski Show at the New York World's Fair this year was one of the Fair's most impressive rush-construction achievements.

The idea for the water show and subsequent approval came on very short notice. In fact, the pool had to be completed in only 84 days, yet it had to be built to withstand the stresses created by fast motorboating in 3 1/2 feet of water.

Because of the extremely tight construction schedule, the builders had to find a system that would enable workers to

fasten steel to steel and wood to steel with reliability and speed. The answer was found when a specialist from the Ramset Operations of Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation demonstrated how the Ramset powder-actuated fastening tool could fasten into steel columns and "I" beams within seconds. The tool utilizes the energy of a blank industrial cartridge to seat fasteners into concrete and as much as one inch of steel by a simple squeeze of its trigger.

The builder's decision to use Ramset powder-actuated tools was based on the following comparisons: In applications that require welding steel to steel, generally it takes a workman about five minutes for each weld. However, to build the ski pool, it took workmen, using a powder-actuated tool called Super-Power Jobmaster, less than one minute to seat four fasteners into steel.

As a further comparison, bolting 2 x 6 or 4 x 8 timbers to steel could take as much as 30 minutes per bolt, because the workman has to drill through the wood beam, then drill through steel. Special bolts would then have to be inserted into the drilled holes, and the workman would have to tighten up the bolts with a wrench.

With the Ramset system, the contractor completed the fastening in about 30 seconds. All in all, the tool completed fastening work as much as ten times faster than other methods, the contractor reported. The rush job accomplished, the water ski show was ready to go on time.



The spectacular pool is 252 feet long and 178 feet wide, while a wooden island in the center is 74 x 136 feet. And, the walls of the pool are actually 5 feet high. This allows 1 1/2 feet above the water level for wave-splash created by the motor boats towing skiers at high speeds around the sharp turns.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the state during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not

receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Sec. 5. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officeholder previously elected to a two-year term.

Sec. 6. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Historic Mound Near Alto



The home site of a tribe of Caddo Indians who lived about 1000 A.D. near Alto, in Cherokee County, today supports a forest of small trees. This is the site of Texas Forest Service Indian Mound Nursery, located six miles southwest of Alto, along State Highway 21 where it crosses the Neches River.

Only a granite monument atop a 30 feet high, "L" shaped mound testifies to the Indians' having been there. A portion of the mound and surrounding area was excavated in 1940 by the Department of Anthropology of the University of Texas. Although no important artifacts were found, items of pottery, flints and sites of several houses were located. Archaeologists believe the mound was used as a place to worship their sun god. Occasionally, pieces of pottery and flints are unearthed as the area near the mound is cultivated by nursery personnel.

Presence of several constantly flowing springs nearby probably accounts for the Indians' use of the area. Availability of surface water for irrigation was a major factor in selecting the area as a state tree nursery.

To the citizens of nearby Alto goes a large amount of credit for their part in purchase of the 173 acres in 1940.

The nursery produces tree seedlings for reforestation in Texas. Initial production in 1940 was about 10 million seedlings. Maximum capacity is about 21 million seedlings which are sold to Texas landowners at cost.

Trees are to be used for reforestation and windbreak planting; none are sold for ornamentals or for landscaping.

Supplying tree seedlings for reforestation and windbreak planting is but one of the many ways your Texas Forest Service, now celebrating its 50th Anniversary, performs its obligation to Texans.

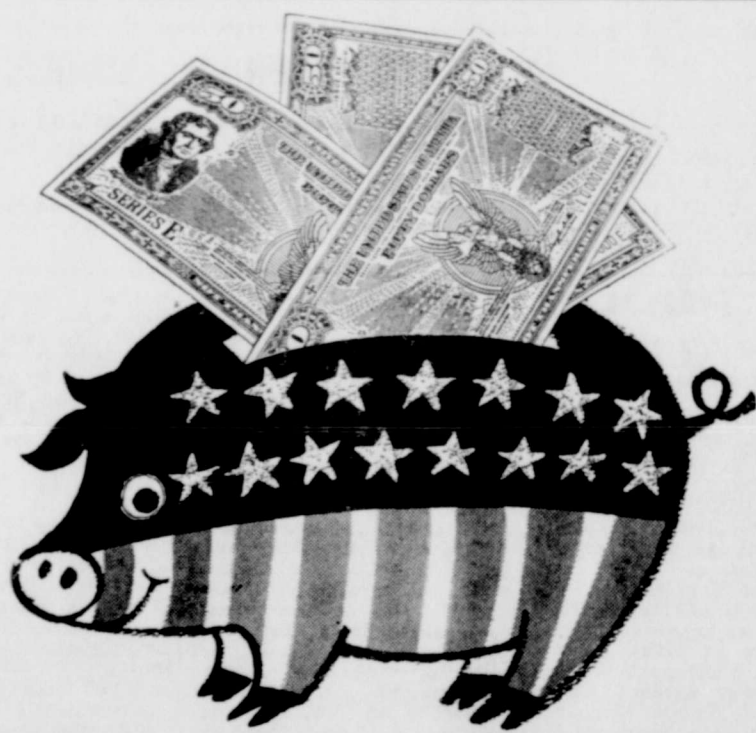

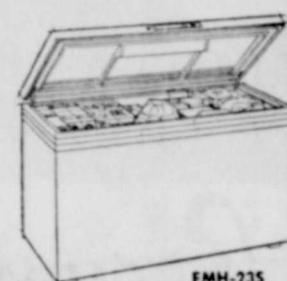

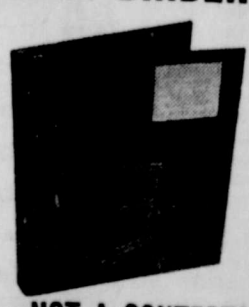

The Briscoe County Historical Society met Thursday evening at 8 o'clock in the P.C.A. community room with 25 present.

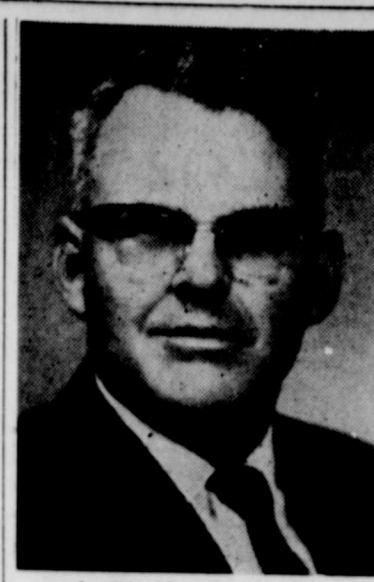

"Summer Wardrobe Hints"
