REQUEST FOR MORE TROOPS ON STRIKE JOB

 AUSTIN, July 29.—The request of Colonel Nimon, commander of the martial law area in Denison, for additional guards men to enforce the martial law at that place was received by the Governor, but no action was taken by Mr. Neff. Nimon's request for additional troops followed Governor Neff's proclamation yesterday extending the martial law area at Denison.

COMPRESS MAKE SHED EXTENSION

J. T. Carter will begin work Monday morning on a contract he has with the local compress for extension of its sheds to cover additional space of more than 2,000 square feet.

The contract calls for two sheds, one 16x256 feet and the other 100x176 feet, one of the sheds, the last named to be next to the railroad for a loading shed. The new improvements will cost about \$8,000 and will give the local press needed additional room. The local press was destroyed by fire a few years ago, but a much more modern and commodious press has been constructed to replace the old one, and with the increased facilities cotton will be pressed here and billed out without delay. The press is one of the best in Texas and the best in West Texas, this being concentration point for cotton for a large area, north, south and west of Ballinger.

The run-off campaign is when there will be only two candidates in the race for any one office and one of them will run-off from the other.

LIE PASSES IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, July 29.—An investigation of charges that certain senators interested financially in the rates and duties proposed in particular schedules pending in the tariff, bill was proposed in a resolution introduced in the senate today by Senator Caraway, democrat from Arkansas.

The resolution proposed for the inquiry to be made by a judicial committee, which would be instructed to report to the senate within ten days. The committee would be instructed to inquire into the charges made against the senators. The language of the resolution says: "are, or were, financially interested in the passage of extension of so-called emergency tariff."

Senator Caraway read from an editorial in the New York Herald charging that certain senators were interested in the production of wool. Immediately the interpretation was construed to be that all senators mentioned in the editorial were identified with interests which would be effected by the tariff bill.

With running crossfire in a debate Senator Gooding of Ohio chairman of the republican agricultural tariff bloc, said that Senator Carway voted for a duty on rice and that his interest in rice growing should be investigated.

Denying that he or any of his relatives had any financial interest in the production of rice, Senator Caraway said that anybody who so charged was an "unqualified liar."

DEMOCRATS IN COUNTY MEET

The Runnels County Democratic Executive Committee convened Saturday morning for the purpose of canvassing the primary election returns. The official count will be carried in a later issue of The Ledger.

The Runnels County Democratic Convention is due to convene at the court house at two o'clock this afternoon, at which time delegates to the state convention will be selected and other business of the party attended to.

The county convention promises to be a tame affair, as there are no issues at stake or reasons why any particular faction should control in party policies by sending a delegation favorable to any cause or candidate to the state convention. It was indicated that only a few of the rural voting precincts would be represented in the county convention.

BALLINGER BOYS MAN HELD FOR OFF TO CAMP RANSOM ESCAPES

 SAGUA LA GRANDE, Cuba, July 29.—Eugene Jova, son of the American Consular agent here, who was kidnapped yesterday by bandits and was held for a twenty thousand dollar ransom, escaped from his captors today after a fight in which he was wounded, according to Chief of Police here. The chief said that he believed that he had the bandits surrounded.

The Ballinger military company of the National Guard is off to Camp Mabry, entraining here Saturday afternoon at four thirty. This is in response to a telegram received Friday afternoon instructing the boys to report at Camp Mabry by first train.

A hurried mobilization was made, and about thirty of the members of the local company were equipped in short order Saturday morning, each man supplied with full equipment pack. The company will arrive at Austin Sunday morning and will march to Camp Mabry where they will spend two weeks in the usual training, hikes, war maneuvers and studies which belong to the curriculum required of the National Guard units.

With few exceptions the boys were eager to go, and looked forward to the two weeks in camp as a regular picnic affair. They may return home with a different opinion of army life. Several were excused for various reasons, and some failed to be released from the training.

Some of the boys left here feeling that they might be ordered out to do guard duty on account of the strike, but this is not probable, and will not be required of the guard units unless the strike situation should become more serious, and the latest reports indicate that the strike will be brought to an end soon. The time for training was fixed several months ago, and all units had received orders to report at Camp Mabry on July 28th. The Ballinger company was at first excused, on account of some disruption in the company, due to the absence of many of the men and the inability of others to leave home without working a hardship on them. Later orders called them out.

The Lubbock, Coleman, Bangs, Santa Anna, Sweetwater, Canyon City, Comanche and Brownwood companies, were concentrated at Brownwood Thursday night and a special train carried them to Camp Mabry. The Brownwood Chamber of Commerce met the train and gave the boys a feed of melon and sandwiches.

FATHER OF WAR HERO DEAD

 DENISON, July 29.—Dr. Joseph G. Ellis, seventy-three, pioneer Denison physician, and well known in the north Texas medical circles, died here this morning after a long illness. Dr. Ellis was the father of Captain J. G. Ellis, Jr., commander of ambulance company twenty-seven, who was killed in action in France in July of 1918.

 Today's developments in the railroad shopmen's strike indicated that a speedy settlement would be made, as the strike draws nearer the fifth week. B. M. Jewell, head of the shopmen's union and his executive council, and Timothy Healy, arrived in Chicago, following a conference with President Harding.

Supervisors of the mechanics union petitioned President Harding to include them in his peace plans. Full recognition for all loyal employees, men who did not strike, and men who filled strikers places, is urged by president of the New York civic organization.

Preparations are under way by ninety members of the National agreement executive board of the shop crafts and twenty-five general chairmen of the offers union to attend the meeting in Chicago next Tuesday for the purpose of discussing Mr. Harding's proposals.

Much depends on the outcome of the Chicago conference and it will be watched with intense interest by both sides and the public.


