## LAMESA BAND PLAYS TWO ENGAGEMENTS LAST WEEK

The local Chamber of Commerce sponsored and carried the Lamesa Municipal Band to two big picnics and barbecues the past week. As a matter of Good Will and to help out the communities that were putting on these programs the local chamber of commerce was glad to take the band, which is one of the best bands in West Texas, to these places.

Last Saturday the band went to Seminole. Several Lamesans went along and all report that they had a big time. More than 1500 people were fed some of the best barbecue possible to make and all were entertained by candidate speaking and the excellent music furnished by the band. Seminole people and Gaines county citizens who were present were high in their praise of the band and the local chamber for bringing this feature to them.

On Wednesday of this week the local chamber of commerce took the band to Ackerly where it played the same function as it did at Seminole last Saturday. The reports are that three or four thousand people were at Ackerly and candidates from the four counties of Howard, Dawson, Martin, and Borden who spoke in behalf of their races for the various offices. The band played to help gather the large crowds for the candidates to speak, during the feeding of the large mass of people and at the rodeo which was staged during the afternoon. Conway King, one of West Texas' best band directors directed the band on both of the events mentioned above and according to all reports did the job up in good style as he usually does.

Reports are that at both Seminole and Ackerly the large crowds were well fed and taken care of in a grand way.

At Seminole A. L. Duff, county attorney, was the master of ceremonies and at Ackerly the well known Andy Brown wielded the big stick—that made the day most enjoyable in every way.

Lamesa is glad that she was able to have some part in helping these good people of these communities—although it was in a small way—by furnishing her hand to help entertain. We want these communities to know they are appreciated in Lamesa and if at any time in the future Lamesa can serve them they have but to let our chamber of commerce know their needs.
