S/Sgt. Charles E. Hooker, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Hooker of Abernathy, received the nation's second highest award, the Distinguished Service Cross, in a ceremony at Goppington air field, in Germany, on Aug. 6. It was presented by Major General John E. Dahlquist, commanding general, 36th division.

S/Sgt. Hooker was honored for extraordinary heroism in action last March near Miesheim, France. When Co. G, 143rd Inf., was halted in an open field by low grazing cross fire from four enemy machine guns, Hooker was assigned the mission of leading two comrades back to re-establish contact between it and his own company.

Before reaching his company he assaulted two of the machine gun emplacements, throwing hand grenades and firing his sub-machine gun. Surviving artillery, mortar and small arms fire, he silenced both guns and killed nine Germans.

After contacting Co. G, he secured two additional men and led his small group in attacking the two remaining gun positions. Although he was the target for heavy machine gun fire, he pressed home his assault, killed one gunner, captured six crew members and silenced both of the guns.

Sgt. Hooker entered service at Ft. Sam Houston, May 24, 1944, and was stationed at Camp Fannin, Texas, and Ft. Geo. G. Meade, Md., before going overseas in November, 1944.

He has the expert combat medal with two green stripes for leadership in combat.

Mrs. Charles E. Hooker and their four children live at Lyford.

## Jesse Webb Freed From Jap Prison Camp



Pfc. Jesse E. Webb, son of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Webb, Lockney, formerly of Abernathy, has been freed from a Japanese Prisoner of War camp, according to the following telegram, which was received in Abernathy Saturday afternoon, and delivered to the Webbs by another son, W. G. Webb:

John D. Webb, Abernathy, Texas.

The Secretary of War has asked me to inform you that your son, Pfc. Webb, Jesse, returned to military control 30 August 45. Report further states that he is hospitalized physical condition good. Hospital is sending you his new address and further information. Until his new address is received address mail to him. Rank, name, serial number, hospitalized central directory section, APO 886, %PM, N.Y., N.Y. E. F. Witsell, Acting The Adjutant General.

Jesse began service in 1940, with the National Guard, and late in 1941 sailed from San Francisco and was one week past Hawaii on Dec. 7th.

The Webbs had a letter from him in March, 1942. It was dated in Java on Jan. 20, 1942. In June, 1942, the Webbs were notified by the War Department that the 131st Field Artillery group was in Java at the time of the final capitulation, and that members of the group would be considered "missing in action" until definite information to the contrary was received. Their next report was a card from Jesse. Sent from a prisoner of war camp at Moulmein, in Burma, it was received here Christmas Eve, 1943. On Jan. 22, 1945, two cards came from Jesse, one dated Jan. 22, 1944, and the other on May 19, 1944. They were sent from Camp No. 3, Prisoner of War Camp, Thailand.

**RULES FOR MAILING YULE GIFTS  
OVERSEAS, SEPT. 15 TO OCT. 15 . . .**

Millions of Christmas gifts will go overseas again this year to our armed forces. It will be especially difficult to deliver these gifts safely and on time, the Army and Navy point out, unless families of service men and women co-operate in starting them off right. The following rules are therefore suggested for mailing Christmas packages abroad:

1. If your soldier is enroute home or about to come home, do not send him a Christmas package.
2. Use his latest address and be sure it's complete and accurate; name, rank, serial number, organization and unit, APO, in care of Postmaster at port of embarkation. Address it—and then check it.
3. Mail Christmas gifts overseas from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15. In the Army, this is the only time you can mail a parcel overseas, without a written request from your soldier. But . . .
4. If there's reason to believe he may move to a new location, it's safer to wait 'til you can mail your gift to the new address, even if this means asking him for a letter requesting your gift so that you can mail it after October 15.
5. Use a heavy box and strong cord. (Government-approved overseas boxes can be bought at retail stores.)
6. Send only useable gifts like tinned fruit, canned luxury foods, razor blades, fountain pens, wallets, watches, etc.
7. Don't mail perishable foods, intoxicants, weapons, poisons, and all inflammable materials, including matches and lighter fluid.
8. Your package must not weigh over 5 lbs. It must not be more than 15 inches in length and girth combined.

Navy gifts should be sent during the same period—from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15. However, gifts destined for Navy, Marine or Coast Guard personnel may be sent throughout the year without a written request.

Mail Christmas cards any time, but seal them and put on first class postage.

Dear Friends: Just a line to say hello, thanks for the paper, and to say my A. P. O. number has changed since the end of the war in the E. T. O. It is now 752 and most likely be that for some time. Also, would like to continue to receive the Review . . . Will relate a little strange quirk that came my way one day while doing my job. Since landing on the beach in France June 22, 1944, my job as an artillery mechanic has been to contact six large guns each day (8-inch ones) and do any repairing, taking parts to them or, to make a long story short, to keep 'em firing . . . Would manage each day to try to eat with the service battery at noon for the simple reason they fed the best. The setting of my little story took place about three miles south of Siegen, Germany. Service battery had moved a German out of his rather nice and well furnished home and set up their C. P. and living quarters. This German was a rather prosperous, well-dressed fellow of about 45 years, could have passed for just any business man with a country home. He could speak quite good English. For some reason he and his wife left their much cherished canary bird, and each day he would come back to feed it. One sunny day while waiting for the mess Sgt. to present his chow, the battalion clerk and I were prowling around in a wooded spot in back of the then C. P. As we walked about just looking to see what we could, one of us stepped on a very soft spot, and we wondered why it was so soft. We licked away some leaves and about

five inches of loose soil, then pulled out a suitcase containing a very well kept storm trooper's uniform. Also, some pictures and some rather important looking papers. The pictures were mostly of groups of S. S. men and, our friend, the owner of the house and canary bird, seemed to be the big shot in each group. Needless to say, that next day when he came to feed his pet, he received a very warm reception. He was turned over to the English counter Int. corps — couldn't find any of our own. The English major who received him had been at Dunkirk in 1940, so I expect Jerry got the proper care. A section of Sieger was still in German hands at that time and the six eight inches which I was contacting each day had been getting some very well placed shells each day. But, after this fellow went away the shells never came quite so close anymore. Thanks again for the paper, expect I won't be back to Texas for some time yet. Not sure yet if I have 71 or 81 points, sweating out two more battle stars, have three now. So long for now, John L. Vaughn.
