SMITH TAKES OFF IN FLIGHT TO HAWAII
BRITISHER SCORES OPPONENTS OF NAVAL PARLEYCHARGES SOME
WOULD REJOICE
OVER FAILUREPLENARY SESSION ENDS
WITH NO RUPTURE OF
NEGOTIATIONS

(By Associated Press)
GENEVA, July 14.—The plenary session of the British naval conference speaking at today's session, declared that nothing had occurred at the conference which imperils the good relations between the nations represented.

Mr. Bridgman said that the British delegation had asked for a plenary session because it developed that the atmosphere of the conference was being vitiated by gross misrepresentations of the British case in certain quarters. He declared that some trouble had been caused by parties who would rejoice at the failure of the conference.

Definite Reduction

Even if no agreement were possible on cruisers, he declared, it would be worth while to reach an agreement on destroyers and submarines. Acceptance of the British proposals, he continued, would mean a definite reduction in the offensive power of every type of warship because it reduced their size.

He then reiterated Great Britain's reasons for her proposals as being based on the British need of a large number of cruisers for the protection of her food supply and overseas routes.

Needs Said Justified

Admiral Jellicoe pointed out that the British cruiser needs were saying that it was difficult to reduce them in view of the despatchability of the navy to the mother country and the dominions and the land communications which must be protected. This necessity, he said, was proved by the activity of the German raiders during the world war, including the raids of the Emden.

"If we found 114 cruisers insufficient during the great war, our lowest possible figure now is 70," he said.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—(P)—Cotton consumed during June totaled 862,630 bales of lint and 76,811 bales of linters compared with 831,115 bales of lint and 72,768 of linters in this year and 518,607 of lint and 70,415 of linters, the census bureau announced today.

25 Known Dead
From Heat In East

NEW YORK, July 14.—Twenty-five persons in cities in the east were killed by the heat in the last 24 to 36 hours. It was shown by compilations made here today.

Three others in New England towns were killed in electrical storms which brought only temporary relief to the heat blanketed section yesterday.

Although predictions were for slightly cooler weather today, forecast temperatures gave little indication of relief.

In New York where five persons had died since the heat wave appeared, the temperature at 10 o'clock was 89 and climbing. The humidity was holding at 75.

From Pennsylvania came reports that five had died during the day.

GIRL FAILS IN
BANK ROBBERYARRESTED IN ATTEMPT
TO CASH SPURIOUS
MICHIGAN CHECK

SAGINAW, Mich., July 14.—Blonde, bobbed haired and defiant, a 19 year old girl is being held here today following her unsuccessful attempt late yesterday to get \$5,000 from the paying teller at the Peoples savings bank.

Coolly pointing a decrepit revolver at E. E. Speckhardt, teller at the bank, the girl shoved a \$5,000 check signed "mike it snappy" through the window and arily commanded the teller to "give me \$5,000."

Failed By Clerk

Speckhardt dropped to his knees behind the counter and pressed the burglar alarm system. Within a few seconds a policeman, several hundred pedestrians flocking at his heels rushed into the bank and discovered the girl. She fell into the patrolman's arms, and took refuge in tears.

The young woman gave her name as Viola Harris of Flint. She is unknown in that city.

"I needed the money to pay off a mortgage," she told police, "and thought that would be an easy way to get it."

Flyers Believed
In Canadian Wilds

NEW YORK, July 14.—Ray L. Hall, editor of Pathe News, declared today he is convinced the French fliers, Nungesser and Gail, will be found either dead or alive in the Canadian wilds. His statement was based on a report from two Pathe photographers, who are following two Indians into the woods north of Chicoutimi, Quebec, to what the guides believe is the wreckage of an airplane.

Mr. Hall said his men had made a seven weeks preliminary survey in the north, returning to New York to report their findings. After hearing their reports, Mr. Hall sent them back to Quebec two weeks ago where they organized an expedition to penetrate the woods. They are traveling by canoe, he said, carrying an extra craft in which to bring back the fliers if they are found.

25 Reported Slain
In Clash In Mexico

MEXICO CITY, July 14.—(P)—Twenty-two rebels and three federal soldiers are reported in special dispatches from Puebla to have been killed in a five hour combat at Xonotlan. The federal forces ejected the rebels, commanded by Fernando Lara, from strong positions in the mountains and pursued and dispersed them.

FLIERS RETURN
TO COAST OVER
PROPOSED LINEPLEASED AT APPROVAL
OF AIRLINE PLANS IN
THIS CITY

Gratified by the approval accorded their plans for an airline from Los Angeles to Oklahoma City, Jack Frye, president of the Aero Corporation of California, and H. J. Grimes, Los Angeles capitalist, dropped into Lubbock yesterday afternoon on their return flight to Los Angeles, after having made a missionary trip to possible stations along the proposed route.

Pleased With City

The fliers were guests last evening at a dinner given by members of the Lubbock Aero Club. Mr. Frye, whose exploits in the new industry have yielded him a fortune, spoke favorably of the advantages of Lubbock as a landing station, pointing out that its geographical location renders it an ideal place for re-fueling on transcontinental flights. He further stressed that by virtue of Lubbock's being a concentration point of a vast territory, this city would bring profitable returns to any airline.

At the 18 months ago, the Aero Corporation of California, of which Mr. Frye is president, started an air transportation service with borrowed capital of \$7,000 he relates. Within the last 12 months, he explains, the company has realized a net profit of almost \$52,000, through the operation of several lines on the Pacific coast. The proposed line which will come into Lubbock is the first of the corporation's big extension program.

To Return Soon

Mr. Frye and Grimes, who hopped off for the West coast early this morning, said they would return to Lubbock in about two weeks with a large Fokker passenger plane. Upon returning to Los Angeles, the fliers will take a train for New York where they will purchase a new Fokker ship which they will fly to Los Angeles by way of Lubbock. The ship which will be brought to this city is an addition made to the already large number of machines of the company in an effort to expedite better service.

Mr. Frye explained that Lubbock is under an excellent route from New York to Los Angeles. He is of the opinion that a trip through the north or center of the United States is too hazardous with mountain ranges. Across the plains of Texas and the desert regions of New Mexico and Arizona is an excellent route into California.

Aero Club To Meet

The Lubbock Aero Club, in conjunction with all persons interested in modern aircraft, will meet tomorrow night at 8 o'clock in the chamber of commerce offices. E. T. H. Oxford, president of the club, has urged that this be an open meeting attended by any and everyone interested in promoting Lubbock as an air transportation center.

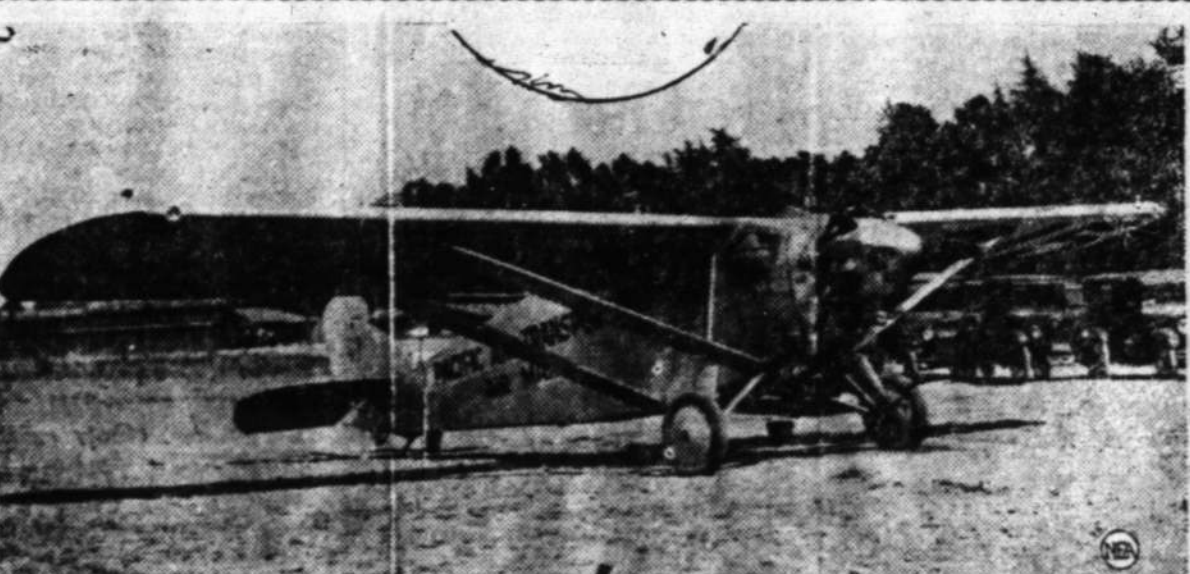
Anhwei Province
Appeals For Aid

SHANGHAI, July 14.—(P)—Urgent appeals for aid were received in Shanghai today from the southern part of Anhwei province, the scene of a great flood disaster on July 8, which caused the death of more than a thousand persons. It was only yesterday that the first news of the overflowing of the lower reaches of the Yangtze river was received in Shanghai, and the reports were still meagre today. Enough has been learned, however, to indicate tens of thousands of persons are homeless and destitute and that vast damage to property has been done.

Governor Refuses

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 14.—(P)—Declaring he never would be blackmailed into granting Dr. C. Stephenson a pardon, Governor Ed Jackson today formally replied to published statements that he had received a check for \$2,500 from the former Klan leader who now is a life prisoner at Michigan City state prison.

The governor asserted that the check was in payment for a valuable saddle horse and equipment and that the transaction occurred months before he would be a candidate for governor, the check was dated September 12, 1925.

PILOT AND MONOPLANE ON ROUND—TRIP FLIGHT TO

TRAIN WRECKPASSENGER TRAIN HITS
WASHOUT AT ATOKA,
OKLAHOMA TODAY

ATOKA, Okla., July 14.—Three persons were injured seriously today when a passenger train from Kansas-Texas passenger train No. 4 struck a washout near Atoka and was wrecked. The injured are: R. Hamilton, Atoka, baggage man; Mrs. Mrs. Meridian Muskogee, Muskogee, Okla.; and Matt Ward, Dallas.

Trainmen said the train was proceeding through a heavy rain which made visibility poor, when it struck a slight grade washout that caused the track to sag. The locomotive and ten passenger coaches and one baggage car were derailed.

Homes Thrown Open

First reports were that the wreck had been caused by a land slide, but passengers arriving here said they were erroneous. Hotels and homes here were thrown open for the 200 stranded passengers who will remain until the tracks are cleared so traffic can be continued northward.

Rain that fell in torrents throughout the night in this section had worn away the grade at the point of the accident, which was a slight dip. Gauges showed that 8.8 inches fell during the night. Streams were under water and highways were under water in places.

MULLICAN TEST
TO BE SPURREDOPERATIONS ON NO. 2 TO
BEGIN FRIDAY; BIG
BARBECUE PLANNED

Kegans et al No. 2 Mullican oil test well, offset test to No. 1, which is soon to be put on the pump at a depth of approximately 400 feet in a shallow oil sand, 12 miles west of Hale Center, is to be spurred in Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock, and the citizens of Hale Center are planning a giant barbecue to celebrate the occasion, it was announced here Thursday afternoon, following completion of plans for the new well.

The rig used in drilling No. 1 has been moved to the new location, and all is in readiness for spudding, it was said. John E. Kegans, one of the backers of the project, issued an invitation today to all who are interested in the oil development of the territory to attend.

Near Producer

The new location is about 300 feet northwest of the No. 1 well, and it is planned to drill the test to the second oil sand which it is believed will be found between 700 and 800 feet. Pumping equipment for the No. 1 well, is expected to arrive here in the next few days. A steel tank reservoir has been completed for use with the pump.

Hale Center has issued a cordial invitation to all to attend the barbecue to be offered in connection with the spudding in of the No. 2 well, and this will be served on the location, it was said. The tract on which the test is located is about 25 miles northwest of here.

Railroad Company's
Actions Are Upheld

AUSTIN, July 14.—(P)—The state railroad commission's action to prevent the Texas and Pacific railway company from taking up rails, ties and other right of way fixtures of the Midland and Northwestern railway was disallowed by district court here yesterday.

The court sustained a demurrer to the petition, holding that the state has no right to interfere with the Texas and Pacific in removing property. Right of the Texas and Pacific to close its line on the property was involved. The rails, ties and other fixtures had been bought in at a judicial sale by the Texas and Pacific after foreclosure.

Warning Issued To
Tourists In Mexico

AUSTIN, July 14.—(P)—Warning to Texas tourists against possible exposure of their children to infantile paralysis was issued today by Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer, who has received reports that several cases of the disease are in Chavez and Eddy counties, New Mexico.

Families taking cross country automobile trips should avoid sections where the malady is known to exist, he said.

Health officials along the border are said to be extending efforts to prevent spread of the disease into Texas.

SILVER WINGED MONOPLANE
DELAYED BY HEAVY FOG OVER
BAY; SECOND TAKEOFF NEEDED

(By the Associated Press)

MUNICIPAL AIR PORT, OAKLAND, Calif., July 14.—The silver winged monoplane "City of Oakland" manned by Pilot Ernest L. Smith and Navigator Emory B. Bronte, took off here at 10:40 a. m., today for a 2,400 mile flight to Hawaii.

The plane left the runway about 4,500 feet from the starting point, on its second take-off attempt, the first having gone amiss when Smith halted after veering toward a crowd of spectators.

As it arose slowly from the ground the escort planes that had been circling about during the delay after the first take-off, fell in behind. The Smith plane headed due west and disappeared in the low fog over San Francisco bay.

General Rain Is
Of Much Benefit
On South Plains

Depositing a fall of from 34 to 1.75 inches, rain swept down over almost the entire South Plains area yesterday afternoon and last night. A precipitation of 34 inches was recorded at the agricultural station, three miles east of town, while it is thought that the fall was much heavier in town and to the west.

Benefit To Farmers

With good stands in cotton and feed stuffs throughout the county, farmers are assured appreciable benefit from the offering. The rain, following closely a series of downpours and showers, has given the county an excellent season. Early food has been materially aided, and late feed and cotton has been practically assured.

Although bus drivers have not been checked in any direction from the city, heavy rains are reported in nearly every surrounding town. Heavy rains were reported north to Amarillo, Lubbock, reaching the highest portion along the route. Crosbyton, Ralls, Lorenzo and Idalia to the east were under good rains, while Shaton, Post, Southland and as far south as Sweetwater were covered with much water. Lamesa and Big Spring report heavy rains, although the fall did not touch Brownfield, Meadow, Hopewell and Loveland to the west. Shallowater, Littlefield, Amherst and Sudan to the northwest were under generous rains.

Farmers coming into the city today from various sections indicate that the rainfall was general over Lubbock county.

AMARILLO, Texas, July 14.—(P)—Walter Peack, 18, of Rochester, N. Y., was killed early today near Boden, 25 miles northwest of Amarillo, when southbound Port Worth and Denver train number 2 struck him as he slept on the track.

His companion, Walter Zerniak, 22, also of Rochester, had gone to sleep on the embankment a few feet away. Zerniak awoke to see the train speeding past and called to his companion. There was no answer. He looked about and saw Peack's body about 20 feet down the track. The head was partially crushed and death had been instantaneous.

BENTON, Ill., July 14.—(P)—Art Newman, former lieutenant and now bitter enemy of Charles Birger, gang leader, today made a statement to newspaper men in which he accused Birger of furthering the attempted assassination of Robert R. Ward, president of the Benton State bank and one of the wealthiest citizens of Frankfort county.

Ward was shot at his home the evening of last December 8, four days before the murder of Mayor Joe Adams of West City, near here, for which Newman, Birger and Ray Hyland now are on trial.

JONES LEADING PLAY IN OPEN TWO UNDER PAR

DEFENDING CHAMP HAS SIX STROKE LEAD IN THIRD ROUND

(By Associated Press)

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 14.—Bobby Jones played his second round of the British open golf championship in 72, one stroke under par, giving him a total for the two days of 140 and maintaining his lead in defense of the title he holds. He was a stroke over par for the first nine but clipped two strokes off coming home.

Has Good Advantage

The champion faces the final 36 hole test tomorrow with an advantage of six strokes under par for the classic St. Andrews course. He was five under par with his record equalling 68 score yesterday and added another today. Bobby's score of 150 for 36 holes compares with par 146 for two rounds.

Bill Mehlhorn, who is watching Bobby's score with intense interest for it was evident that Bobby's 26 hole count would determine the players to remain for the final competition. When Bobby turned in a total of 140 for 36 holes, Bill was eliminated as he had taken 157 over the same route, more than 15 strokes behind.

Jones' game today was almost as spectacular as that of yesterday, although he was more uncertain from the tee. He was pulling his drives today but he did not misplaced his putting touch.

Trailing by all the crowds at the championship, Bobby Jones started this afternoon on his second round of the 72 hole play with his fine 68 of yesterday in support of his bid to recapture the championship he won so brilliantly last year.

Tom Stevens of Los Angeles, the first American to turn in his card today, had 73, which gave him a total of 149 for his two days play.

Arthur Havers, the English star, who took an 80 yesterday, turned in a 74 today giving him a total of 154.

Rene Golias, the French player, who did so well in the qualifying round, took a 78 today which gave him 156 for his two days medal play.

British hopes for the championship were toned by young C. H. Cotton of the Longley Park club, came in with a 72 for a total of 145 to lead the first dozen cards.

Joe Kirkwood with a 72 today was placed in the leading positions among the first cards returned with an aggregate of 144.

Bill Mehlhorn took 40 out and 16 on the return, making an aggregate of 157.

Bobby Jones played the first nine holes in 27, one over par. He passed the 18 in 32 yesterday when he needed only 63 strokes for the 18 holes.

How Myron T. Herrick is honored by the French people, as a man and an ambassador, is reflected in an appreciation by M. Louis Forest, writing in "Le Matin".

"Lindbergh has a keen eye," says Forest. "This young man grasps the essential at a glance. Thus when leaving us he said he was struck with the manner in which Mr. Herrick, the United States ambassador, is received in Paris and in all circles."

"In fact, Mr. Herrick is one of the rare personalities who are popular, personally popular. This tall gentleman whose well polished face has the air of smiling in unison, inspires general sympathy. He has a rare quality, enthusiastic cordiality. His distinction has cordiality, and he does not fear the crowd."

"Formerly, speaking of an ambassador, people said, 'He is persona grata.' This meant, he is liked at court. In our democracies there is no longer a court. One must please the man in the street. Persona grata is translated, 'He is a good soul.' For the people, the American ambassador is a good soul."

"I am not writing these few lines for the pleasure of the publicity. No, I am seizing the opportunity to say how important it is henceforth to have diplomatic men who are abroad citizens and who are persons."

Mr. Herrick is a long time. He has been in the line of his duty for a long time. He is not one of those ambassadors and ministers plenipotentiary, as we have already had too many, who only comprehend their functions when in leaving. They have their return ticket in their pocket and between two trains."

Too Much Haig

The generalissimo who had charge of the English armies in the last years of the war bears the same name as a rather well known brand of Scotch whisky. If a man in certain parts of Scotland got tight, he was up to be labeled as suffering from "too much Haig."

A number of Lubbock people are dubious over the gas supply which will be brought into this city in time for winter consumption by the Prairie Pipeline company, a subsidiary of the Standard Oil company. Many have expressed the fear that the pressure will not be sufficient and that homes and business places piped with gas will not receive a sufficient supply of the fuel to assure cold weather comfort. Such fears are not original with Lubbock people. They have been expressed in every city and every section in the world where gas has been inaugurated and they have remained in those localities until the doubters learned through experience that their fears were groundless. An official of the gas company tells The Plainsman that even should the line be constructed through intervening cities to Lubbock without a single booster station, the pressure this city would receive would be more than strong enough to supply every need. As the plans are now there will be included in the line several "booster stations" to increase the pressure. The Prairie Pipeline company is no small concern. It is probably the most powerful organization of its kind in existence and is backed by unlimited capital. While The Plainsman doesn't know a great deal about the gas business and while he has no brief to hold for the Prairie or any other concern of any kind, he does not believe it is logical that such an organization would take over a large project of this type, and not know long before a single joint of pipe was laid, that it would be successful in every way.

NAVAL CAPTAIN WHO SPANKED AMBASSADOR'S WIFE GETS NO PROMOTION—IT TAKES MORE THAN A BATTLESHIP PARADE TO THRILL CAL.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Some of the highest ranking naval captains who were passed over recently when the navy selected 11 new admirals are probably wondering why they lost out.

There is one doubtful captain, high up among the leading 30 from whom admirals are chosen, who knows very well why he will have to retire on a captain's retirement pension rather than an admiral's. This officer had achieved a brilliant and spotless career up to the recent occasion on which he commanded a fleet which anchored off the capital of a South American republic wherein our country maintains an embassy, and an ambassador.

The ambassador is a political appointee supposed to have been honored in recognition of valiant service for his party which service was not fully appreciated by the voters of his state. At any rate, he has put on some very lively parties at the embassy which have always been appreciated by naval officers and our captain, on the occasion in question, was invited to one as a guest of honor.

For the captain, at least, the function grew more and more successful. The ambassador had carefully left the copy of the Volskel act back home in the States, and an excellent time was being had by all, including the ambassador and the ambassador's wife.

Then, in a moment of hilarious horseplay, the captain overstepped himself. The exact details are not quite clear to him, but it appears that he gave the ambassador's wife a playful spank.

The lady herself, it is understood, took this in good part. But the ambassador, who observed the incident, did not.

BENSON LAUDS TEXAS BUS LAW AT SAN ANGELO

MEASURE SAYING BUS COMMON CARRIER IS UPHOLD AS BEST

(Special To The Journal)
SAN ANGELO, Texas, July 14.—House bill 56, which classified buses as common carriers and placed their operation under the direction of the railway commission, is the best bus law of the 32 in force in the United States, in the opinion of D. D. Benson, Lubbock attorney for the West Texas and Eastern New Mexico Bus Owners association, comprising about fifty bus owners and covering a territory west of San Angelo, Sweetwater, Stamford and other points. Mr. Benson was here Tuesday getting applications for the bus owners in this territory which he will present at Austin the commission on July 14. He will deliver these applications in person.

Lines Said Needed
These applications which he is to present are those setting forth that the lines in question are needed for convenience and necessity. According to the new law the railway commission has the right to reject or accept applications of all parties, operating bus lines, excepting those who were operating lines on January 11, 1927, and who have since been operating the lines continuously. There will be a number of applications for new lines of the feeder variety, he thinks, but the applications for the right to operate trunk lines will be few, he says.

The new law makes the license of the bus operator like the charter of a railway; it is inheritable, assignable, and is in reality a property right, the attorney declared. So long as the operator takes care of the public he will be allowed to keep his license and will be protected from competition, he asserted. The law permits in such a way as to enable the operator to make some money and thus provide good equipment. Terminals in each town will be established and the use of the highways are permitted buses regardless of whether they are licensed with city streets.

Wants Four Cent Rate
Mr. Benson thinks an average of four cents a mile is a proper charge for hauling passengers over the state. In the western zone which he represents, the buses of the association travel about 26,000 miles daily and wear out an automobile every six days, and there are about 12 employees, he estimates.

Not only does the present law law protect the bus owner but it also gives the public protection inasmuch as the buses are subject to regulation like the railways.

The attorney pointed out that the western part of Texas and especially in this area, the bus business has a tremendously large number of passengers.

partite naval conference today, which had been looked forward to with much speculation by observers, came to an end tonight with no rupture negotiations.

On the contrary all the speeches made by the official representatives of the United States, Great Britain and Japan, although they unequivocally explained the various positions on the cruiser problem, were distinctly temperate in tone and breathed a note of hope that the conference would eventually succeed.

More Cruisers Needed

W. C. Bridgman, first lord of the British admiralty and head of the British delegation, and Admiral Jellicoe insisted that the British

need a large number of cruisers with a fixed minimum of 70. Hugh S. Gibson, head of the American delegation, insisted upon the necessity of a low tonnage in order to limit the burden of taxation and to prevent naval expansion.

Admiral Jellicoe, speaking for Japan, publicly proposed limiting the number of 10,000 ton cruisers to ten or less for the United States and Great Britain and seven or less for Japan.

British Believe Parley Is Ended

LONDON, July 14 (AP).—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Geneva says that the general impression there tonight at the end of today's much discussed plenary session was that it virtually marks the end of the conference, at least as a means of securing a limitation of armaments.

NAVY TO TAKE OIL RESERVES

LEASE ADMINISTRATION BASED ON RULING OF COURT ON ORDER

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 14.—An agreement between the navy and interior departments under which the navy after August 1 will take back administration of the naval

oil reserves and leases of land in them, was announced today at the navy department.

Transfer of these land to the interior department followed by the lease negotiated by Albert B. Fall, former interior secretary, with E. L. Doherty and Harry F. Sinclair, covering the Elk Hills and Teapot Dome reserves.

Based On Court Order
An agreement to have the navy resume control is based upon interpretation by the court of the executive order of March 17, last, vesting in the navy the administration of all leases on naval petroleum reserves.

The agreement declares that the navy is now responsible for admin-

istration of all leases heretofore made, excepting three leases of producing wells in reserve number 2 in California.

Co-Operative Approval
These three leases were granted pursuant to authority specifically imposed in the secretary of the interior by congress in February, 1920, and he will continue to exercise control with the co-operative approval of the navy. Secretary Work will ask congress at the next session, however, to transfer jurisdiction over these leases also to the navy department.

The navy's policy it was said, "will be a policy of conservation," under which it will endeavor to keep as much of the oil in the

ground for as long a time as possible.

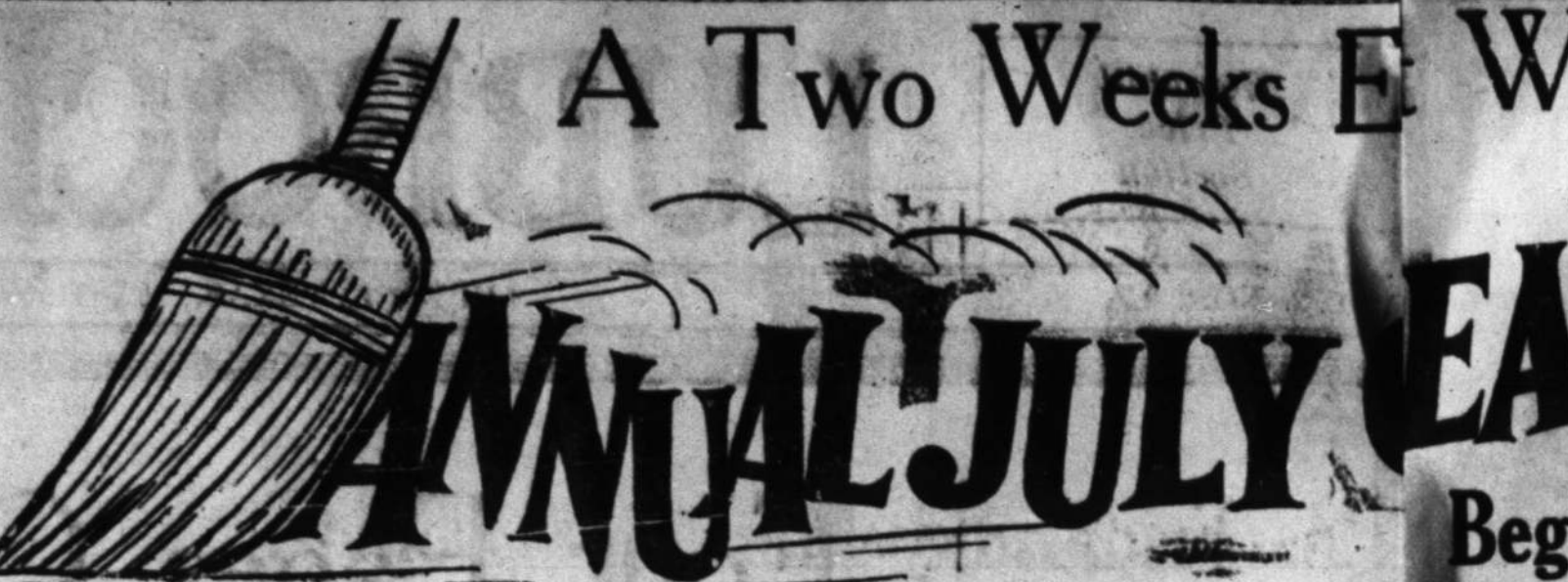
