ANNAPOLIS, Md., (AP)—Ah, security!

That sentiment did the mombos behind the smile of Eddie Erdelatz yesterday as he boarded a plane for his native California. Articulate Eddie had just signed a new five-year contract as head football coach of Navy.

All the informed sources agreed—though Navy and Erdelatz kept quiet—that it called for about \$17,000 a year.

Erdelatz, a long-recognized defensive tactician who graduated magna cum laude last season from the post-graduate school of advancing the ball, has been summarily successful at beating Navys archrival.

Four of his five Navy teams have whipped Army.

Last Nov. 27, an undersized bunch of athletes Erdelatz dubbed "the team named desire" did it again, 27-20. Then they smeared a little icing on the cake with a 21-0 victory over Mississippi New Years Day in the Sugar Bowl.

The team finished with a 7-2 mark.

Erdelatz said yesterday he had a desire to end his head coaching career where it began, at Navy.

"I am very happy and proud to continue as head football coach at the Naval Academy," he added.

Within the last month, printed

rumor had him headed first to the San Francisco 49ers and as late as yesterday morning to the Los Angeles Rams.

Erdelatz said he had talked with President Dan Reeves of the Rams, but no offer was made.

Capt. Elliott Loughlin, Navy's director of athletics, said yesterday: "Eddie's value to the Naval Academy is not confined to the mere winning of football games but also to the manner in which he coaches and the fine leadership qualities demonstrated in his handling the squad."

Committee to View Changes On Linemen

NEW YORK — Three football rule proposals were under consideration Wednesday by a sub-committee of the NCAA football rules committee. The proposed changes centered around how much the movement of linemen can be restricted without interfering with modern offensive football.

Tuesday's committee discussion involved:

1.—The false start and "sucker shift."

2.—The movement of linemen into the backfield to protect the kicker on spread formations.

3.—The "tackle eligible" forward-pass formation.

Committee chairman H. O. "Fritz" Crisler of Michigan referred the proposals of the main body to the sub-committee, whose job it is to clarify the new rules in such a way that they will not conflict with the current rules.

The sub-committees are due to make their reports and the committees will vote on the proposals today.

The chairman indicated that some overall changes in the rules could be expected. "However," Crisler added, "I don't think we'll have any fundamental changes, such as an unlimited substitution rule."

There's slow-pitch softball and touch football, thought Ralph Wilson, a used-car dealer who developed the new rules for aging cake enthusiasts. And so why not slow-break basketball?

Under high school and college rules, the team with possession must move the ball into the opponent's half of the floor within 10 seconds. But in slow-break basketball, a player may not bring the ball down court until 10 seconds have elapsed.

Slow-break basketball has caught on so fast that six teams are already organized in a league in Hamilton. The first games were played last week and action resumes tonight.

The players are in the middle and late 20s. Two of the teams are sponsored by service clubs and a third by a church. The players are clerks, salesmen, industrial workers, lawyers and even a banker. Another league is in the process of being organized.

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Winners in Six Major College Basketball Tilts Mop Up Wins Trailing From Field, Hitting Fouls

People yelling foul over college basketball's free throw rule have something to argue about today. The winners in six major contests last night scored fewer—or at best, one more—field goals than the losers.

Duke, Yale, Wake Forest, Nebraska, Oklahoma A&M, and Niagara all won without a clear-cut verdict from the field.

Duke defeated Clemson 75-66, but had only a 25-24 field goal edge; Yale picked up its first victory of the season 73-63 over Brown, but was outscored 26-25 from the field; Wake Forest top-

ped Seton Hall 71-63, but trailed the Pirates 23-21 in field goals; Nebraska surprised Kansas State 69-59 with a mere 21-20 field goal edge, and Niagara beat Canisius 68-64, although outshot 24-20.

But the biggest talking point for those protesting the rule was the Aggie-Wichita game. The Cowpokes and Wichita were even-up with 13 field goals apiece—yet the Aggies won it in a waltz by 16 points, 69-53.

Oklahoma A&M wrapped up the upset of the Shockers with 43 free throws.

The Aggies' high scorer, Mack Carter, had 16 points—all on foul shots.

The present college foul rule grants a 1-and-1 stipulation: the shooter gets a second shot if he makes his first on fouls net resulting during a field goal attempt and awards an automatic pair of free throws for fouls during the final three minutes.

In all, the six games cited totaled 255 field goals—but the winners claimed only 125 of them.

Even where the field goal allotment was in more orthodox alignment, the extra free throws popped up to send scores bursting past the 100-point mark.

North Carolina State, No. 2 team in this week's Associated Press poll, ran up a 105-81 victory over high-scoring Furman.

St. Louis' Billikens set a school record with a 102-82 triumph over Drake, despite Willie Cerf's 31 points.

Westminster (Pa.) hit 50 per cent of its shots to whip West Virginia 102-80—highest score ever against the Mountaineers at home. And Rhode Island made it 107-75 over New Hampshire in a Yankee Conference game.

One scoring record was missed. Texas Christian's Dick O'Neal had 40 points with four minutes remaining, but Texas went into a freeze to protect ex-Longhorn Slater Martin's one-game Southwest Conference mark of 49 and O'Neal wound up with only 42. TCU won it 79-64. O'Neal, a sophomore, did break his own Southwest free throw record, however, with 18.

WE ATTENDED A MEETING the other day in Carlsbad, concerned with the channelization of a new river between Artesia and Lake McMillan. The subject of what happens to the bogs and breeding grounds for wildlife had

come up the night before at a GPA meeting. It was a good question and the engineers had a pretty good answer.

They assured sportsmen there is enough underground water seeping upward in the ground where wildlife is found that moving the Pecos river won't hurt much. But an out-and-out engineer, who admitted he knew very little about wildlife, forwarded what we feel was the best idea of all.

According to the engineer, John Mutz from Albuquerque, the boglands southeast of Artesia have grown to an immense size during the last 10 years, and if left alone will take over the whole river delta between Artesia and Lake McMillan.

This, he logically explained, would never do for the farmers or the sportsman. In his own words, "I like to hunt, but don't think I'd particularly enjoy walking through a minor Okefenokee swamp for a shot at some ducks."

Therefore he continued, "We suggest the game department, and all other interested sportsmen (meaning the GPA) take over a part of the river delta and add the developing hand of man to raising en masse some of our wildlife species."

It's Mutz' idea that the salt cedars will never leave, and bogs from underground springs and free flowing wells in the area will supply all the needed moisture for a good game refuge, run properly by the game department. This, he explains further, "will still give plenty of breeding and feeding spots, but won't turn into a large, ugly swamp where the game is so safe it will die of natural death."

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To Be Long, Hard Fight

THERE WAS CONSIDERABLE confusion last year during the annual March of Dimes. Someone apparently felt the work of the research program was about over and that before long it would not be necessary to ask for money to continue the program for the work with the victims of polio.

That was anything but a far-sighted view. Someone failed to take into consideration all of the victims of polio and the aid and help they will need during the year's ahead.

Too late to correct the mistake we made in the early announcements prior to and during last year's campaign we learned that we had not completed the discovery of a sure serum against polio and we learned we had forgotten all of those needing help.

Unfortunately, polio is a disease that requires costly treatment—too much for the average family to pay or absorb. Sometimes only three or four patients from a county pull down or use all of the funds of that county.

No one objects to this because they are glad and happy to help the victims of polio and they are glad to contribute to the research work it is hoped sooner or later will provide a serum to halt polio.

That will be a happy day in the history of our nation and in the world. And seemingly we are not too far away from that. However, there are thousands and thousands of youngsters over the nation suffering from polio. Many of these are in iron lungs, others are receiving various kinds and types of treatment, and they need our help.

So once again during the month of January we are being called upon to make our gifts and our contributions to the March of Dimes and to continue to war against polio.

We are sure that all in this community and this county want to aid and help in raising the funds needed and in helping to make it possible not only to help our own local cases but to assist others and to make it possible for the research to be continued over this nation of ours.

So once again we are being invited to aid and help during this March of Dimes and to help provide the funds which will make it possible for our war against polio to be continued and carried on until the victory has been won.

- Coffee Talk -

Rural Members

Now that the present board of education has filed unanimously to seek reelection in the Feb. 1 voting, observers will be watching closely to see whether a hoped-for plan to insure rural representation actually develops.

The way board members filed will make it somewhat difficult for the plan to work perfectly.

Present rural members are George O. Teel of Hope and Howard Stroup of Atoka. Monday night one board member indicated he'd be willing to run for a six-year term and Teel flipped as to who'd take the other.

Teel got it, so Stroup filed for a four-year term.

The organized 1952 plan was that rural candidates would file only against each other, and city members against one another, thus giving the rural assurance of a 3-city 2-rural representation on the board.

However, the top two men in, for instance, the six-year race, get the two six-year posts, the top two in the four-year race get those posts, and high man in the two-year gets that.

It might have been better, the afterthought goes, for Stroup and Teel both to have filed for the four-year terms, or both to have filed for six years. If they had chosen to run for four-year terms, rural opposition would simply have filed against them for four-year terms. That would have insured the two-three representation.

Candidates in the election don't file against someone—they simply file for a term of office and the top two, or top man in the case of the two-year, are chosen.

So a rural candidate could file for the six and another in the four, and conceivably Teel and another rural man could be elected for six years, and Stroup and another rural man for four years, giving the rural a 4-1 representation.

Or city candidates could so far outpoll rural men there'd be a 5-0 balance in favor of the city.

Unopposed?

There is talk both ways on whether or not contests will develop in the school election. Little talk is heard about opposition coming out, although it may develop now that the present board has gone ahead and filed, and everyone knows the situation.

The current board has worked well together and has done a good job while staying remarkably free from controversy. It could go on unopposed.

On the other hand, there has been talk that Charley Bagley of

Hope may file in the election, as well as one or two in town. The action of the board in filing together, although not as a "ticket" strictly speaking, may effectively block single or united opposition tickets.

Any Voter

Here's something else on the schoolboard election:

Where a board election alone is involved, one does not have to be a property owner to take part in it. Anyone who is a qualified voter for any general or city election can vote.

Only when a bond issue is at stake is it required that the voter on the bond issue be a property owner. That is just, because it is the property owner who will be paying the cost of the bond issue. But everyone has a direct interest in board elections, and so they are open to all qualified voters.

New Engineer

Artesian in Santa Fe last week say the resignation of John Erickson came as a complete surprise to the brand new Simms administration on the eve of its take-over. There has been no talk heard of a successor to the apparently well-liked and obviously well-qualified Erickson. There have been reports two men will be appointed to take his place, dividing up the responsibility and authority previously delegated to one man holding the state engineer's title.

The theory is that the job has constantly grown to where it is now a man-killer, and that the work to be effectively administered must be divided between two men.

There has been no indication of who is being considered for the post, although finding qualified men for this demanding job is already in the works.

Chavez Pledges to Back Non-Political Highway Program

NEW ORLEANS — Sen. Chavez (D-N.M.) late yesterday pledged the Senate public works committee to cooperate in any feasible road program proposed by President Eisenhower "provided it is not based on political maneuvering."

Chavez, chairman of the Senate group, spoke to the annual convention of the American Road Builders Assn.

"Roads should be built for the people of the country and not in order to give bond holders the chance to make a killing," Chavez said.

"Congress does not want to make a road program only in the interest of heavy populated areas. We want to get the farmer and rural residents out of the mud," Chavez said as long as his colleagues were conscientious about public works projects, politics will not be involved.

But he warned that "We should forever be on the watch for the ambitious politicians who sit on the other side of the aisle. They are not thinking of roads being of service to the American people so much as they have the idea of the election of 1956."

The New Mexico senator said there are many problems to be worked out in the construction of roads because of the situations in various states.

Chavez said many Western states are troubled with finances since the government owns a great deal of the land in many of them.

Reapportionment would determine the number of representatives to be elected from each county "provided that each county shall be entitled to elect at least one member of the House of Representatives" and "that no member of the House . . . shall be elected by the voters of more than one county."

THE TOTAL membership of the House "shall never exceed 71 members."

The proposal, if passed by both the House and Senate, would need the approval of the people.

The House met briefly and received one bill—the "feed bill," which provides money to pay legislative expenses throughout the session.

Following a short debate on the Los Alamos question, the Senate received the joint resolution, referred bills to committees, and also scheduled an afternoon session.

DONNELLY TO CONFERENCE

Congressmen Back Artesia Import Stand

All congressional representatives for New Mexico, along with Gov. John Simms, have commended the Artesia Chamber of Commerce on its oil imports resolution, promising to try to cut down on foreign imports.

Mr. Paul Scott said this morning all congressional delegates have answered a letter from the chamber. First to answer was Rep. John J. Dempsey, who ended his letter with a sharp crack about foreign relations.

Dempsey wrote: "I agree with everything you say in connection with importation of oil, and am glad people are awakening to the danger of permitting so much oil to come into this country."

Dempsey ended his letter with the remark, "I will do everything I possibly can to see that this is stopped, but the philosophy here seems to be to take care of foreign countries rather than our own."

Sen. Dennis Chavez informed the chamber he has been conferring with Oklahoma's senior senator Robert Kerr on oil importation, and is striving to introduce a bill to limit the importations.

Gov. John Simms said he realizes New Mexico must maintain a healthy and growing oil business and industry, and that foreign importation of oil can greatly hamper the economy of the state.

Sen. Clinton P. Anderson said in his letter, "I have been watching the importation of foreign oil for quite some time and have been urging congressional action on it. I hope something can be done in the not too distant future."

Rep. Antonio Fernandez assured the chamber he would do all in his power to limit importation, and is presently studying the situation in hopes of introducing a bill to cut the high importation mark.

He explained that he co-sponsored a bill recently on importation of coal, and feel the eastern coal sections will support the movement to cut down on oil importation into the United States.

Scott said the board members were quite pleased with the tone of all letters from the representatives and senators, and have hopes that oil importation will be slashed some time this year.

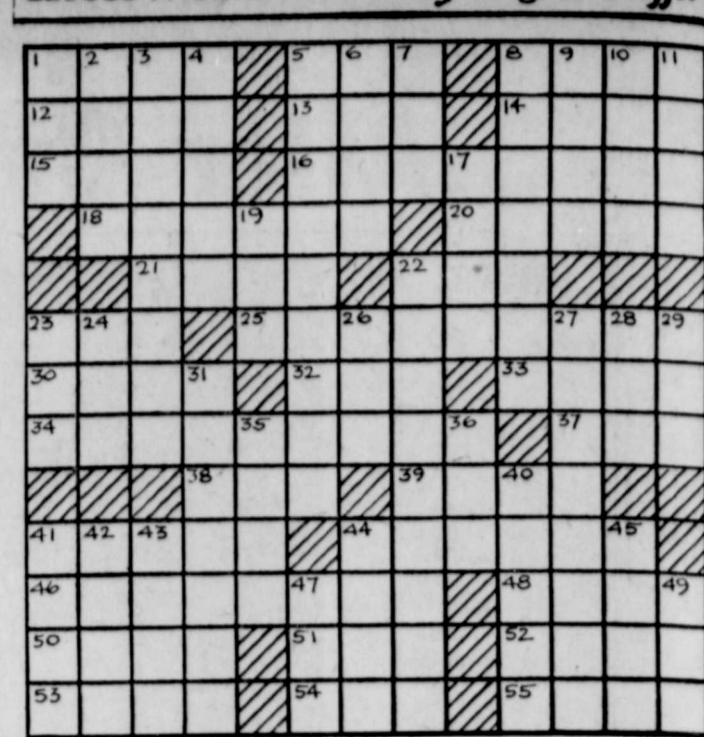

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Woman Firehouse Dispatcher Smells Fire in Sleep

SEATTLE, Wash. — Olive Jorgensen can smell a fire in her sleep.

Her bedroom is a sort of combination firehouse and communications center. Three telephones hang on a wall beneath a shelf stacked with radio transmitters. Beside the bed are a pair of firemen's boots, duck trousers, coat and helmet.

When a fire breaks out in King County Fire District No. 4, Mrs. Jorgensen's husband, James, jumps into the boots, helmet and other gear while Olive gets busy with the rest of the equipment.

As dispatcher for the district, covering 12 square miles and 25,000 residents, Mrs. Jorgensen calls the signals for three fire stations, dispatching the amount of equipment needed and alerting other stations through her radio intercom equipment.

At the push of a button on her desk, she can turn on radio loudspeakers in the homes of the fire chief and four assistant chiefs. She also can sound fire sirens at four remote fire houses, which in turn call out the volunteer firemen. With still another button she can control the traffic signals on a nearby major highway, giving fire trucks priority to cross.

In her role as protector of her district, Mrs. Jorgensen literally is chained to her job. She says:

"Can't go across the street for coffee. I'm married to those telephones. Can't run my mixer in the kitchen very long because I might not hear the telephone. Have to keep shutting it off and on. You'd think now I'm in my right mind with a family the size of mine."

At least, Mrs. Jorgensen admits, she keeps up with what is going on.
