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Paul Harvey presented the situation perfectly a few days ago when commenting on problems related to this nation's high wage scale. He says that "Historically, most Americans have not recognized the negative aspects of a pay raise. Each of us has been inclined to demand more income to keep up with the rising cost of living... unaware that these increases push the cost of living higher. Also, each increase puts the American worker in a higher tax bracket. Thus in higher prices and in higher taxes the worker is forced to pay his own wage increase!"

This is one of the most obvious facts of the economy, so plain that an average person can hardly overlook it, and most simply explained as a way to gain a temporary advantage over other people while higher price is catching up with higher wage... while greed is being overtaken by its consequence. After a while the same old wage-price ratio is re-established, but at a higher level.

That is what happens in the mainstream of the economy, which is concerned with current take home pay and current cost of living. But it applies also to such factors as pricing our products out of the market or eliminating many other sales by shrinking the value of savings or fixed income.

Harvey said that higher wage at Zenith alone has cost 60,000 jobs since 1971. Because of higher production costs and the resulting higher price, sales of the product took a sharp drop. Imports have been underselling it on the world market and the home market. Furthermore, the people who decline to buy the home products because of higher price include many thousands who are demanding higher pay, thereby pricing some of their own products out of the market.

In defense of high pay we are told that we need it because of our higher standard of living. This line of thinking is based on the idea that prosperity is measured in dollars and cents and overlooks the more basic fact that production is what really counts. Our standard of living is determined by availability of goods and services. If they are abundant they are spread among more people, if scarce, among fewer people. Money is irrelevant except as a medium of exchange. If wage scales were half as much as now prices would be proportionately lower and weekly checks would go just as far.

But now we come to another consideration. If wages were half as high and product prices were more competitive, we'd sell more at home and abroad, and fewer people would lose their jobs, and our government... that is, we taxpayers... could save some of the billions being spent on welfare programs.

And there is still another consideration. The inflation spiral resulting from higher pay and higher price has been disastrous to the value of savings. We used to think that thrift is a virtue, but we have been painfully taught that the money laid aside for a rainy day does not retain its purchasing power. Accordingly the buying potential of savings is slashed to one third, one fourth, or even less of the original value. People who thought they were providing are the first victims. They have had money stolen from them by the various causes that produced inflation. The same applies to people whose fixed income buys less after every price increase.

Secondary victims are the very people whose high wage demands contributed to inflation. The shrinkage in value of savings and fixed income accounts for a big loss of market, and a consequent big loss in jobs.

## Programs Booked In Six Areas on Electrical Shock

A program on electrical shock co-sponsored by Cooke County Electric Cooperative and Texas Farm Bureau will be available next Wednesday and Thursday to adults and students of several Cooke County communities.

The program is presented by Joe Smetana of Waco, safety director of the Texas FB. He shows a brightly colored model home along with props having special lighting effects. One of those is a plastic man that lights up as injury and death situations are simulated both inside and outside the house.

The audience is reminded that most people do not realize the life or death facts about electricity. The average home has current of 120 or 240 volts and more than 100 amperes, and the service is divided into several circuits, each protected with fuses or circuit breakers for fire prevention. However the fuses or circuit do not protect a person from shock.

Electricity constantly seeks a ground, and the human body often completes the circuit to ground. The amount of current to light a 15 watt bulb, only one tenth of an ampere, can be fatal if it flows through the heart.

The programs are scheduled as follows: Wednesday, Mar. 9: Callisburg HS at 9:30; Electric Co-op at 2; and Ross Community Club at 7.

Thursday, Mar. 10: Muenster HS at 8; Gainesville HS at 10:30; and Valley View Elementary at 12:40.

Also at this time the hospital district ballot has four unopposed candidates, however others can still file up to the March 7 deadline. It permits filing a candidacy 25 days before election whereas the others have a 30 day limit.

On the city ballot are David Bright for re-election as mayor and Ted Henscheid for re-election as alderman, Position 5. The third candidate is Ray Walterscheid for Position 3 alderman to succeed Herb Miller who declined to run again.

## County Officials Receive Pay Hike

A pay hike of \$35 a month was voted for elected officials of Cooke County at Monday's meeting of the Commissioners Court.

The increase follows one approved earlier in the month for employees of the county.

The raise is calculated to up the county payroll by \$35,000 a year, to be paid partly out of fees and fines from the recently created county probation office. Previously the Cooke and Denton probation offices were combined and the revenue went to Denton. Other funds for the raises hopefully will be realized from cost saving measures additional interest from county deposits, and if more is needed it may come from federal revenue sharing, which would be replaced later. County Judge Greg Underwood added that the increased county budget next year may require a tax increase.

Commissioners also heard a report from Prichard and Abbot, a firm which appraises oil, gas, industries and utilities for the county tax office. The report revealed that because of rapid depletion in certain areas in 1976, the value of oil property may decline as much as 20 per cent. From a total value of \$25 million in 1975 it is expected to drop to \$21 million. The change is said to apply principally in the Walnut Bend area.

Presently about 30 per cent of the county's ad valorem tax is received from oil and gas properties.

The commissioners authorized an inquiry into the coyote problem which has been costly to county stockmen. Possible solutions are to employ a county trapper or restore the bounty system. However commissioners are hesitant about the bounty, remembering how it was abused before.

**Doris Felderhoff Has Great Record as Ladyjack of SFA**

NACOGDOCHES — Doris Felderhoff, 6-0 star center of the Stephen F. Austin State University Ladyjacks, is showing fans that there is more beauty and brains than brawn in women's basketball.

The All-American sharpshooter from Muenster was recently selected as a member of the prestigious list of "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities," and is basking in the glory of her team's number four national ranking.

Felderhoff is living up to her selection to the Kodak All-American Team last season with an impressive 18 points per game scoring average and 14 per game rebounding average, and an academic grade point average high enough to launch her into the honor of "Who's Who."

That's the kind of stuff that parents brag about and friends quote. "My parents are proud. They have backed me all the way but never pushed me, just let me make my own

choices," she said, blushing to a shade as red as her hair. "My friends respect me and seem to be proud, too. Even the guys who sometimes act so shocked to find out that I'm an All-American basketball player," she added.

The road to her All-American selection began for Doris in the seventh grade. None of her five brothers have shown a particularly outstanding talent for the sport so far, but it seemed to be just the sport for the lanky redhead that would grow to her perfect 6-0 height for the game.

After graduating from Muenster High School, Felderhoff was recruited by the well-known Flying Queens of Wayland Baptist College in Plainview before finding a more comfortable position as a sophomore starter and claimed the All-American selection her junior year as SFA's first woman to receive the honor.

The senior health, physical education and physical science major feels that basketball has taught her a great deal more about goals in life than the one she's been shooting a ball at for nine years. Happiness is her number one goal.

"I want to be happy and successful at my work. I want to do my job well and raise a family," she said.

"Basketball has taught me teamwork, which will be essential in working with other people later. It has helped me think and react quickly and to adjust to pressure," she said. "It has also made me a more open-minded person. You meet a lot of different kinds of people, and



I have learned to accept people more for what they are and not so much for what I hear or see."

And while she feels the good things far outweigh the bad, playing basketball has had its disadvantages for Doris.

"I have not been able to see my family much, primarily because of the distance I am from home," she said. "Socially, basketball really affects my life. During the season, I can't go out nearly as much or do much partying because of the rest I need to keep playing," she added.

Now that her playing days are almost over, Doris looks forward to coaching basketball and teaching after her graduation in May. She sees a bright future for women's athletics.

"Women's athletics is growing rapidly and at this rate, the quality of players will get better and more emphasis will be placed on women's basketball," she said.

Currently the emphasis is pretty strong at SFA, as the Ladyjacks boast a 20-4 record and begin their post-season play in hopes of a trip to the national championships to be held March 22-26 in Minneapolis.

Highlights of the successful season for the SFA team include defeating the defending national champions, Delta State of Mississippi, and defeating Doris' former teammates at Wayland, while the Flying Queens were ranked as the number one team in the nation. The Ladyjacks currently are holding onto the number four ranking of which Doris can boast a large part in reaching. She has consistently been the leading scorer for the past two seasons.

Despite worries with knee problems, Doris hopes to finish out her final season with style, and with the Ladyjacks of SFA, she may get that chance.

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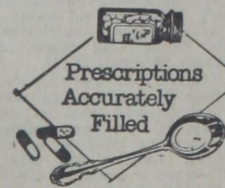
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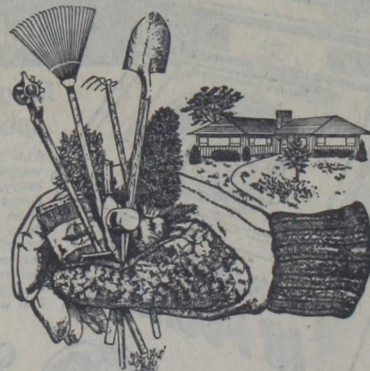


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**Local Students Compete in Speech Tourney at Irving**

**FM 373, FM 1630 On Contract for Improvement Jobs**

FM 373 and FM 1630 are included in a comprehensive program of road improvement in a nine-county area of North Texas, according to a report this week from the State Department of Highways and public transportation.

A contract for the complete project of 35 jobs was awarded to Diron Corporation of Wichita Falls for \$428,997.45 and the work will consist of a seal coat, two-course surface treatment and plant mix seal.

The work on FM 373 will be for a distance of 6.2 miles beginning "3.3 miles east of FM 2382." That starting point apparently is near the former Valley Creek school location.

Work on FM 1630 will begin at FM 373 and extend east 5.3 miles.

FM 373 is the north-south road through Muenster. It intersects 1630 five miles south of town.
