SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED TO ABERNATHY GIRL IN TECH BY LUBBOCK COUPLE

First of four \$350 scholarships to high school graduates of the Panhandle and South Plains, to students of Mexican descent, will go to Miss Socorro Rangel, 20, graduate of Abernathy High school and now a resident of Lubbock, for college study at Texas Tech.

The four scholarships will come from a fund established by Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Parks of Lubbock, owners of several theatres in West Texas, some of them showing Spanish language films.

One scholar will be selected yearly by the foreign language department of Tech for the continued schooling. They will be able to remain in school on the scholarship for the entire four years required to graduate.

Miss Rangel, whose parents resided at Abernathy 18 years before moving here, will enter school this September. She held a B-average in her high school studies and will major in sociology at Tech. She will study Spanish as a minor course.

Her father is an employee of the Santa Fe railroad while Miss Rangel is employed at the Llanos theatre in Lubbock, owned by Parks.

The award winner is the eldest of 12 children, including five girls and seven boys. The girl was encouraged by Mr. and Mrs. Parks due to their "long and sympathetic interest in Texas citizens of Mexican descent and anxiousness to have more of these students continue their education on through high school and college levels."

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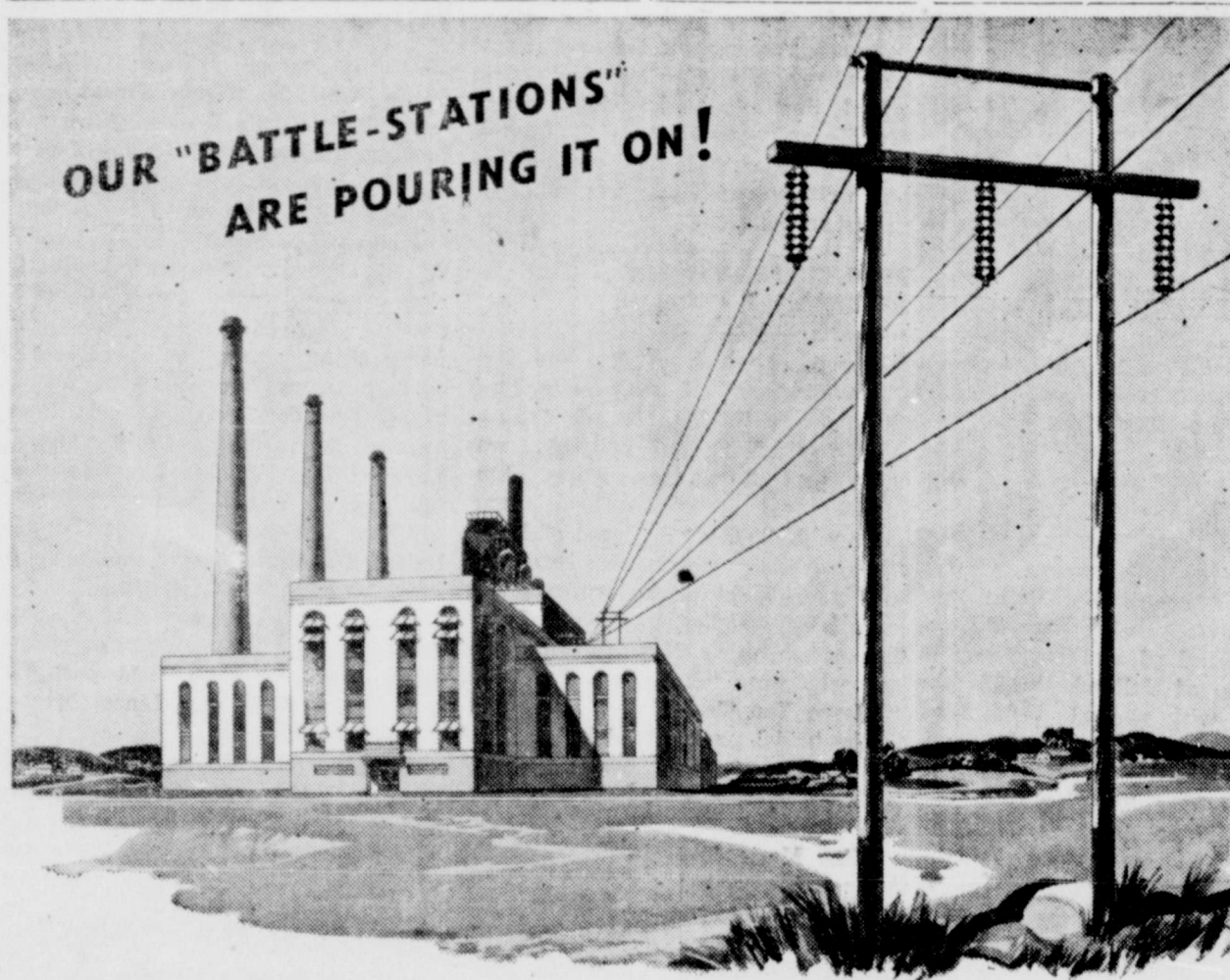

(Editor's Note: Following is an interesting letter written by Pfc. Carl Shipman, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Shipman.)

In Belgium, May 11, 1945.

Dear Mama: Maybe I can write you a fairly long letter now. They have lifted some of the censorship.

I'll tell you when I left the states, and about it until now. I left New York Oct. 7, 1943, and I landed in Belfast, Ireland, Oct. 19.

We had a pretty good trip except the sea was a little rough. We stayed there about six months. In March of 1944 I went to Cardiff, Wales, and on June 7, 1944, hit the beach of France and fought until June 16. I got hit and went back to South Hampton, England, then to Birmingham, England, and stayed there until I came back to France in September.

tember. Then I fought in Brest...

When we finished there, I went to Paris and stayed 45 days. Then, on Nov. 10, 1944, I came to the Seigfried line in Germany, fought in the bulge at Rockenath, Germany, and on Feb. 15, this year, I got hit again. I went back to the hospital in Paris and left to go back to my outfit in Germany.

I only got part of the way. Now I'm in the hospital in Liege, Belgium — just how long I'm going to be here, I don't know. Mom, I've got plenty of points to get out of the army, but I don't have any idea just when they are going to start letting us out. I hope it isn't too long, tho.

First, I'm anxious to get back to the states. I'm pretty sure I won't have to go to the Pacific. I had thought I would get some mail today for I wrote my outfit to send it to me but, as you can see, I haven't got any of it. When I was in Paris, I was stationed about a block from the Eiffel tower. In fact, we used to have guard under it. There isn't any place in Paris I haven't been or seen. There aren't many places in the ETO I haven't been in.

I guess I'll get a pass in a couple of days and see what Liege looks like. I guess the buzz bombs tore it up pretty bad. How are things going at home? Fine, I guess.

This is all for today. I'll write again in a couple of days. You do the same. All my love, Carl.

Dear Buford: It has been some time since I have written you, but now that I must, to ask for the Review, I will. Please keep sending it, for it's just like a letter from home, even now, and when we're at sea—Mister, it really is a morale booster.

I have just received the latest one, and it was really O. K. It surely has been hot here lately, but nothing like it was 'way down south in the Pacific. We have been having some very nice times out here together — my wife and I. We went to Frisco the other day and saw Frankie Carle and his orchestra. Not bad, either! I've been catching up on my sports. I've been bowling, playing tennis and baseball. Our division team beat the Marines in an 8 to 7 thriller yesterday. It's nice to be able to go places and do things—so, I'm making the best of every opportunity while I can, because I expect to be going out again in the near future. Give my regards to all

Dear Buford: I have received the first paper since leaving the States — thanks for sending them. Mail service is very slow here and will be slower from now on. In the last paper, dated April 7th, I saw where a fellow from there was in near where we are. The last time I was on land was in February. I am no longer a land sailor. Your friend, Carl K. Hudgins, Pfm 1c.

Dear Buford: How is everything around Abernathy? I heard it was rather dry there. I hope it has rained by now. Buford, are there any boys from around Abernathy out here? I would like to know, as I might could look them up. This sure is a hot place out here. It is lots hotter than Texas. Boy, would I like to be back in good old Texas. California doesn't even compare with Texas on anything. Buford, you should have seen the parade we had

the home folks of Abernathy. As ever, Cleatus Lebow, Vallejo, Calif.

Dear Buford: Well, Buford, I will try to write you a few lines today, since it has been quite some time since I last wrote you. I hope this finds everything in Abernathy running smoothly. I hear a lot of the boys are getting furloughs now. I am certainly glad they are. Maybe some day I'll get one of those things they call a furlough. At least, I hope so. I guess it really is a good feeling to be home one more time. Buford, I had a letter from the folks saying they wouldn't let you send the paper to the boys unless they wrote and told you they wanted it. I have missed getting a lot. I certainly would like to get it. That is if it is possible for you to send it to me. I'd like to have the back copies I missed. That is, if you have any on hand. I always look forward to getting the paper to find out where all the boys are, and to see what was going on in my little home town. I am sure all of the boys are missing the paper, that is, if they haven't already written you to ask you to send it to them. I don't guess all of them are as slow as I am. I have been intending to write you for a long time but never could get up this energy or whatever it was, to do it. So, in closing, I would appreciate it a lot if you would start sending me the paper. Thanks a lot, lots of luck. A. ever, "Birdie." (Pfc. W. C. Bryant.)
